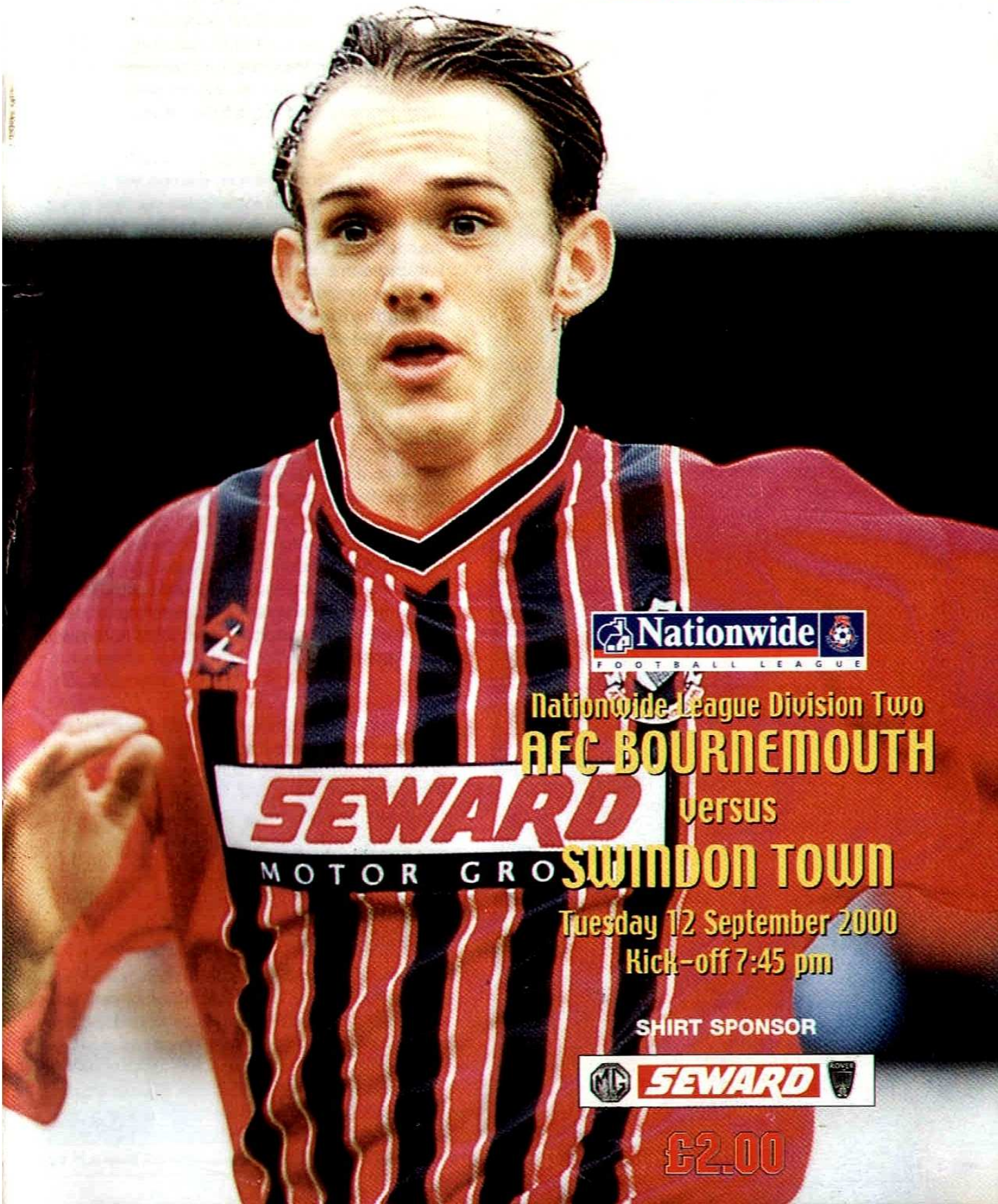

DRAW

We of course are still looking for our first win after drawing with Port Vale on Saturday. You couldn't fault the players commitment and effort in the second half and we probably had enough chances to win two or three games. Unfortunately we cannot afford the fee Manchester City are asking for Nick and various other clubs were willing to discuss a permanent deal with him so reluctantly for the sake of his own career he decided to return to City to consider his future.

During the coming months, looking at the club on a broader basis, our youth policy and its structure needs to be looked at to ensure that all of the clubs football activities whether it be community based, coaching or development coaching have a clear understanding of the objectives and goals we are working towards. FROM THE BOARDROOM

The supposed “end of the world as we know it” will now be delayed. In response to a plea from UEFA, the European Commission has given footballing authorities until the end of October to prepare their proposals for a new transfer system. Meanwhile clubs looking to do business have to make decisions against a background of uncertainty.

Last Saturday I touched on the background to the changes that may be made. I have now spoken to a number of clubs who are in the process of signing players. They want to know how they can ensure they get a fee in the future if they spend monies now; against the current situation that is almost impossible to do. It is a very complex and detailed situation that will no doubt attract lengthy legal debate. A number of agents have made it clear that they will challenge any transfer proposals that do not allow their clients to move whenever they like.

We will soon see clauses being placed in player's contracts giving them the ability to “buy out” their contract for a fixed fee. Under English law if you walk out on an employer without good reason you will have broken your contract. Any employee doing so would have to compensate their employer for the loss of their service. Arguably at our level the compensation would be relatively close to the transfer fee that might have been generated. At higher levels there are likely to be much wider gaps between transfer fees and compensation in a court; Anelka's lawyers, for example, suggested Arsenal were entitled to £900,000 compensation for his breach of contract. The player then moved for over £20 million.

This is a situation that will not be clarified for some time to come. The European Commission may not stop here. They believe there are better methods than the transfer system for maintaining a competitive balance between clubs. They suggest television and

commercial revenues should be split fairly between clubs. Given the existing set up and the potential challenges now being made by some Premier League teams, I am sure this will be the Commission's next target. As a lawyer and as Chairman it is both challenging and of immense practical significance and I will keep you updated.

We have already witnessed the impact of the new rules on the game. The club has been asked to report on the behaviour of Steve Slade, sent off for Cambridge here in August. There are tremendous pressures in the game today and mistakes may be made but we have always prided ourselves on being at or near the top of the clean play chart. No-one will condone dissent or unprofessional behaviour either on or off the pitch. We are a club with high ideals and ambitions.

With the confusion in the transfer market, our main asset is the eight loan signings the club can make each year (for a combined total of 465 days and also two signings of players under 24 to the end of the season). On a loan signing we are expected to meet the contracted wage the player is on at his existing club. Often higher division clubs will contribute something to that cost because of the huge gulf in wages between the divisions. When the right player is available at the right cost then Sean and Peter know we will support them in securing their services.

Your support for the team has been magnificent. Thank you.

WHAT WAS

I was born in Mile End Hospital in the East End of London, so as they say, I'm a true Cockney, born within the sound of Bow Bells. My Dad ran a football team and when I was growing up I used to go every Sunday and be involved in football that way and from there I started playing. I went from Sunday to Saturday football and then district to county level. Scouts came and watched me and as a schoolboy I was at Arsenal for four years and after that I went to have a look round other clubs such as West Ham and Tottenham and when it came to the stage as to where I had to make a decision, Charlton came in with the best offer and I signed for them. I had a good time in the reserve side at Charlton and I owe a lot to Keith Peacock because we had a very good season under him and we won the Combination League title. I wasn't getting a look in at the first team at Charlton, but I was playing some of the best football that I'd ever played and scouts were watching me. The move to Bournemouth came out of the blue. I was watched a few times and the club got in touch with me. There were another couple of clubs interested at the time, but it was Mel Machin who really impressed me and I knew where I wanted to go and I have a lot to thank him for. The first time I saw

Bournemouth was at Wembley in 1998. I went along with Steve Jones and at the time the move was 90% sure, but it was kept quiet. My full League debut was against Millwall in 1998 and it was a great afternoon for me, particularly as I scored my first goal. I played in matches at Fulham and Wolves, big games in which I did well, but then I got a bad injury at Chesterfield after a shocking tackle and that put me back about four months. Once you're out for so long, you have to get yourself match fit again and because the team were doing well at the time, I couldn't get back in. Since then, I've had a number of other niggling injuries, but I'm over them now and I just want to stay fit for as long as I possibly can and get as many games in as possible. Now I've played in a few games, I just want to keep doing well and keep my place.





JASON TINDALL

WHAT IS

I worked exceptionally hard this summer. I got my head down, I came in at the beginning of June, five weeks earlier than I had to, and did a lot of work with Sean. I came back fitter than most. I'm a fiery character who hates losing and I just want to be involved and give 110% every game which is the best I can offer. I play with a lot of passion and a lot of commitment and this season is very important to me. It was important for me to get back into the team and that's where I want to stay. It's

a funny old game, I lost my place in the side a couple of

years ago through injury and unluckily for Stev, he got injured at home to Cambridge and Sean asked me to come on and I saw that as my chance. I gave it my all and felt I did well enough to play in the next game. I felt in that half I did well and Sean has kept faith in me. It's now up to me to keep improving and to stay in the team. We all want first team

football here. I've played reserve team football for longer than I wanted too. I gave the same commitment to the reserve team as I do in the first team, but at the end of the day, you want to play in the first team. It was a fantastic game last season when we won the Combination Cup against Ipswich and the crowd were brilliant which made it special. It was a great team performance, but I would have swapped that to be involved in the first team the Saturday before or after.

WHAT WILL BE

Looking at the future, we have a good team here now. Peter and Sean have come in and done exceptionally well and they have been working hard with the lads and there is a great atmosphere around the place. We've all worked hard and that work will pay off. We have to stick at what we're doing and we'll be in for a good season and there are many good times ahead. I love Bournemouth as a place and it's a lovely, friendly club with a smashing bunch of lads. Peter, Sean and Mel have all been good to me so I like to think my future lies here, as long as I'm in the team, playing well myself and progressing. To be playing week in, week out in the first team at Bournemouth, doing well and taking Bournemouth to bigger and better things are what my main aims are. I've not really thought about what I'll do when I finish playing. Touch wood, there's a long way to go before I have to start making decisions like that. I'd obviously want to stay in football. My Dads involved in the game at West Ham, so there would be contacts through him, but it's not something that's crossed my mind yet. I'm still only 22 and I hope I have a long career ahead of me.

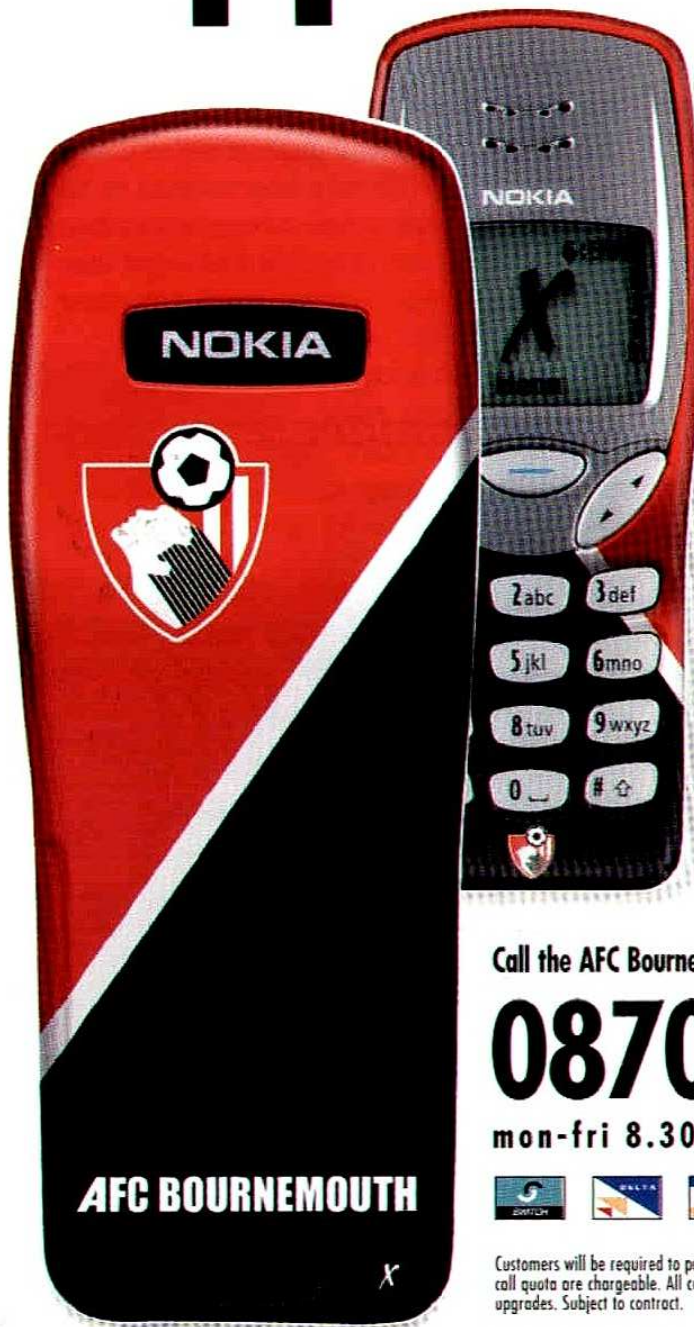

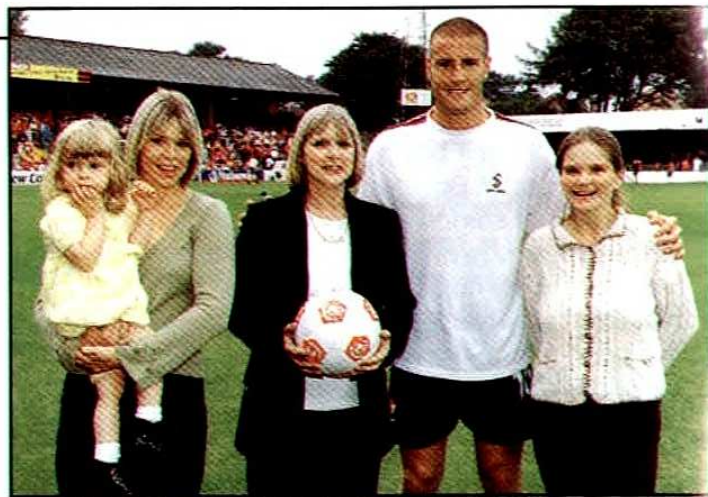

BIG FLETCH

I don't really know what more we can do in our search for three points. We're getting punished for one mistake and then have chances galore, but have no luck. Every team goes through it and we know that our fortunes have to and will change soon.

CREATED

Again we created a lot of chances by being more direct in the second half which you have to do when you're chasing the game. PRESSURE

Part 55 - West Ham



WEST HAM UNITED FC

London Premiership club who have many links with the Cherries. They were formed in 1895, joining the league in 1919 and they have been in the top two divisions ever since, although have never won the league title.

It was as recently as the 1989-90 season when the Cherries met the Hammers for the only league matches between the sides. The first game at Dean Court ended 1-1 and at Upton Park, West Ham won 4-1. The Cherries went back there

last season in the Third Round of the Worthington Cup and gave an excellent showing before conceding two second half goals. They also visited Dean Court in July for a friendly.

Current West Ham manager is Harry Redknapp who holds the record of being the longest serving Bournemouth manager. Current Cherries players from West Ham are Stephen Purches and on loan Stevland Angus.

Others included in a long list of players who have served both clubs are Steve Jones, Matty Holmes, Keith Roland, Rio Ferdinand, Matt Holland, Dale Gordon, Scott Mean, Bobby Barnes, Ian Bishop, Paul Mitchell, Jamie Victory and Mark Watson.

JAMES WHELPTON

Sheffield born goalkeeper who signed for the Cherries from Guildford United in June 1923 and made one first team appearance in the Cherries first season in the Football League. He was released in May 1924.

ALFIE WHITE

Spenny Moor born forward who joined the Cherries from Derby County in November 1931. It was a successful time for him at Dean Court and he scored 35 goals in 125 appearances before moving to Wrexham in October 1935.

JIMMY WHITE

Parkstone born centre forward and former England Schoolboy international who holds the record of being the youngest ever player to appear in the Bournemouth first team. He was aged just 15 years, 10 months and 17 days when he appeared for the side against Port Vale on the final day of the 1957-58 season. That

proved to be his only appearance prior to joining Portsmouth in June 1959. From there he moved to Gillingham before returning to Bournemouth in June 1963 on a free transfer. It proved to be a good move and he was virtually an ever present over the next four seasons. He made 176 league appearances for the Cherries, scoring 7 goals, before moving to Cambridge United.

KEVIN WHITE

Poole born winger who came through the ranks at Dean Court to sign as a professional in 1966. He made a good start to his career and was a regular from 1966 to 1968, but he found his opportunities were limited after that and he moved to Bath City in 1971 after making 48 league appearances for the Cherries.

TONY WHITE

Clacton born defender who joined Bournemouth as an apprentice, turning professional in June 1985. He made just one senior appearance for the Cherries in a 4-1 defeat at Rotherham on 26 April 1986. He was released that summer and moved to Dorchester Town.

JACK WHITENHOUSE

Oldbury born forward who joined Bournemouth from Sheffield Wednesday in November 1930. He made 105 league appearances in three and a half years at Dean Court, scoring 17 goals, before moving to Folkstone.

ERNIE WHITELAW

Half back who signed from Glasgow Celtic in June 1932. He stayed at Bournemouth for a year, scoring twice in ten appearances before moving to Glentoran.

TED WHITESIDE

Liverpool born inside forward who appeared for Preston, Chesterfield and York before joining Bournemouth in July 1955. He made just one appearance for the Cherries and was released the following May.

MASK WHITLOCK

Portsmouth born defender who started his career as an apprentice at Southampton. He made 61 league appearances for the Saints and also served Grimsby and Aldershot on loan before joining Bournemouth in the summer of 1986. He proved to be an integral part of the Cherries championship winning team and he missed just one match of that historic campaign. He missed just a handful of matches in the Cherries first season in Division Two, but in the 88-89 season, he lost his place in the side and after 99 league appearances for the club with one goal, he joined Reading. The great servant of the Cherries also turned out again for Aldershot before retiring from the full time game.

ERNIE WHITTAM

Wealdstone born inside forward who served Huddersfield, Wolves and then Bournemouth who he joined in June 1936. He made 107 appearances for the Cherries, scoring 28 goals before joining Reading where he failed to make an appearance due to the outbreak of war. He joined Rotherham after the war before finishing his career at Leeds.

ALAN WHITTLE

Forward who played for Everton, Crystal Palace and Orient, making a name for himself during the seventies. He joined Bournemouth in January 1981 as a non-contract player. He made 9 appearances and was not offered terms by the club.

WIGAN ATHLETIC FC

Lancashire Division Two side who have enjoyed a resurgent time with JJB Sports owner David Whelan who has put a great deal of money into the club. They moved from their ramshackle Springfield Park to the state of the art JJB Stadium in the summer of 1999. They are relative newcomers to the Football League, having joined the



professional ranks in 1978. The sides first met on 31 March 1979 at Springfield Park and Wigan won 1-0. The Cherries final home league match that season saw the Latics first ever visit to Dean Court. Goals from Steve Massey and Peter Johnson ensured it was a winning end to the season for Bournemouth as the side triumphed 2-1. Both sides were promoted together from the Fourth to the Third in 1982 and in more recent seasons, the Latics have been looking to gain promotion to the First and have reached the play-offs for the past two seasons and are favourites this season.

Player links are Warren Aspinall who started his career at Wigan and Joe Parkinson who joined Bournemouth from Wigan in 1983.

DAVID WILKINSON

Sunderland born forward who started his career at Blackburn in 1948. He made one appearance for Rovers before joining Bournemouth in June 1950. He made eight appearances, scoring three goals before being released in May 1952.

ERIC WILKINSON

Sheffield born half back who was at both Bradford City and Sheffield United without making a senior appearance. He joined Bournemouth in July 1955 and after 4 appearances in a year, he moved to Dorchester.

EMLYN WILKINSON

Forward who joined the Cherries from his home town club, Merthyr in June 1931. He scored three goals in six appearances before moving to Ramsgate in June 1934.

DAVID WILLIAMS

Newport born Wing half who joined the Cherries as assistant to Tony Pulis. Cardiff born, he had served Clifton Athletic, Bristol Rovers and Norwich prior to joining the Cherries. With the Cherries in danger of relegation in the 1992-93 season, Pulis named Williams as a substitute for the match against Bolton. With 20 minutes left, he replaced Peter Beadle. It didn't help the side as Wanderers scored in the last minute to win 2-1. He went on to join the coaching staff at Leeds United.

GARETH WILLIAMS

Isle of Wight born midfielder who's entire Cherries playing career lasted for 12 minutes when he came on as a trialist from Hull City in 1994 against Chester. Despite being from the Isle of Wight, he said that Bournemouth was to away and did not stay. In his career, he also served Gosport Borough, Aston Villa, Barnsley, Wolves, Northampton and Scarborough.

JOHN WILLIAMS

Former Cherries central defender and assistant manager. Born in Liverpool, he started his playing career with Tranmere Rovers, making his home debut against Bournemouth when the Cherries won 5-0 at Prenton Park. He then moved to Port Vale before joining the Cherries before Christmas in 1986. Harry Redknapp saw him as the final piece in the Cherries championship jigsaw and he proved to be right. He scored on his debut at Bristol Rovers and then scored on his home debut against Fulham. As the side won the championship with record points, "Willo" became a crowd favourite and a rock in the heart of the Cherries defence. He adapted to Division Two very well and was a regular in the side until he was struck down by a knee injury that was to finish his playing days. In a bid to resurrect his playing career, he joined Wigan on loan and then after 117 league appearances for Bournemouth, he moved to Cardiff City in 1991. It wasn't a successful move though as injury wrecked his time as a player at Ninian Park. He was then invited by Tony Pulis to join him back at Dean Court as youth team coach and when Pulis left the club, he took over as a caretaker before Mel Machin arrived. He then worked as Mel's right hand man as the side completed the Great Escape. After being officially named as Assistant Manager, John led the reserves to the Combination Division Two title before being made redundant by the receivers. He was quickly reinstated and in 1998, enjoyed a testimonial match against Southampton that attracted over 10,000 to Dean Court. John left the club earlier this year and is now in the pub trade.

HAVE THE ROBINS TURNED THE CORNER?

The Match

Despite a first goal for his new club from Mark Rawlinson, Swindon enjoyed a morale boosting 2-1 win at Exeter a week ago to record their first victory of the season. It has been a traumatic few months for the Wiltshire club and new boss Colin Todd has a good squad assembled at the County Ground and he will be sure that his side can get over a disappointing start to the season and start challenging at the right end of the table. League positions mean little at this stage of the season and there is no doubt that Swindon are in a false position.

MISERY

It was off the field matters that dominated the Swindon Town story last season as financial problems beset the club. A disappointing season on the field also compounded the Robins misery. They dropped to the bottom of the First Division on 16 October 1999 - and stayed there to the end of the season. From 26 October to 7 March, they picked up just 7 points from a possible total of 57, which all but sealed their fate. Three wins out of four in March, including a 1-0 win at champions elect Charlton, gave a glimmer of hope, but that proved to be no more than a glimmer as they finished bottom of the First Division. To their credit though, they did pull level with Port Vale on points.

FIRST WIN

This season kicked off with a 0-0 draw at home to Colchester and that was followed by a derby day 2-0 defeat at Reading. In form Walsall then visited the County Ground and kept up their excellent start to the season with a 4-1 win. A 3-0 defeat at Port Vale coupled with Oxford gaining a point against Cambridge a few days later meant that Swindon slipped to the bottom of the table without playing a match. On Saturday they had another local derby, this time at Bristol City. They were held at home by Exeter in the Worthington Cup and the Grecians would have fancied their chances at St. James Park, but first half goals from Alan Reeves and Danny Invincible put Town firmly in the driving seat. Former Bournemouth player Rawlinson set up a tense finale, but it was Swindon who held on for that all important confidence boosting win to set up a two legged tie with last seasons beaten finalists Tranmere.

DIFFICULTIES

It's not been easy times for Swindon Town recently, but this is not the first time that they have had difficulties to overcome. They can draw on their experiences of the past - and the success they enjoyed after coming through hard times and tonight they will be desperate for the points as they look to start climbing the table.

COLIN TODD

Chester-le-Street born Colin enjoyed a tremendous playing career in the game that saw him enjoy successful spells at Sunderland, Derby, Everton, Birmingham, Nottingham Forest, Oxford United and Luton, before finishing his playing days in Canada. He started off in management at Middlesbrough in 1990 and then had two spells at Bolton where he enjoyed great success. He took over at Swindon at the end of last season when the side were relegated and with his shrewdness as manager, he will be hoping to lead them back to Division One quickly.

THE SQUAD

No 1 BART GRIEMINK

6 ft 4 Dutch goalkeeper who joined the club from Peterborough. After only making 44 league appearances for The Posh he decided it was time for a new challenge when his contract expired during the summer. Bart spent a two-month loan period with Town last season and impressed in difficult circumstances. His arrival plus the appointment of former Aston Villa hero Nigel Spink as goalkeeping coach should go a long way to ease Town's goalkeeping problems after Frank Talia, former Cherries keeper Jimmy Glass and Alan Flanagan left the club.

No 2 MARK ROBINSON

Started his career at West Bromwich Albion, joined Barnsley on a free in June 1986 and such was his form there that Newcastle snapped him up for £450,000 in March 1993. After losing his place in the first team through injury, Mark is now

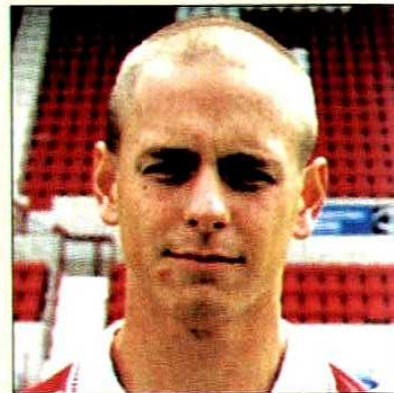
the Town's longest serving player since Swindon paid a then Club record £600,000 for his services in July 1994. He has been a consistent and versatile performer ever since.

No 3 SOL DAVIS

Left-sided fullback back who was offered his first professional contract in the summer of 1998, after a series of impressive performances in the reserves. Last season Sol made over 25 appearances for Town in both the fullback and wingback positions and his commitment was exemplified by some very tough tackling.

No 4 MATTHEW HEWLETT

An attacking midfielder that signed for Town on a free transfer in July 2000 from Bristol City. A fresh start should prove to be just the challenge he needs and there will be no better place to impress and improve his performances than at the County Ground this season. If he can find his form he may just be the attacking spark the Town midfield is so dearly missing.



No 5 ADAM WILLIS

Adam was released by Coventry where he played in the same reserve side as Chukki Eribenne. He was called into action from the reserves towards the end of last season to cover for injuries and suspensions. His confident displays earned him a place in the starting line-up on merit and he was rewarded with a new contract under Colin Todd after being previously told that he could leave the club.

No 6 ANTOINE VAN DER LINDEN

Impressed new boss Colin Todd during the summer with some strong displays at the back. A skilful central defender who can bring the ball out of defence, Antoine came through the youth ranks at Xwerfers in his native Holland before signing for Sparta Rotterdam. He came to Swindon on trial needing a new challenge and Colin believes his passing style will be well suited to his new-look team.

No 7 KEITH O'HALLORAN

He made six starts for Middlesbrough



where he came through the youth ranks before joining St Johnstone in March '97 for £50,000. Keith went on to make over 60 appearances for the Saints but relished the opportunity of proving himself in England after a very successful period at McDiarmid Park. Despite being offered a new contract north of the border, he chose to join Swindon's new era under Colin Todd.

No 8 BOBBY HOWE

Stephen, who likes to be known as Bobby, is an attacking midfielder who signed for Swindon in January 1998 from Nottingham Forest, where his first team opportunities were limited. He was told he could leave the club he has worked hard to re-establish himself in the side and has shown great character.

No 9 CHARLIE GRIFFIN

Charlie started his career in non-league football. He was signed for £10,000 from Chippenham Town where he was top scorer in the Screwfix League with 30 goals. At 21 years of age he is still a prospect for the future and the coaching staff believe that, with a handful of first team games under his belt, he will be ready to challenge for a regular place in the side.

No 10 GIULIANO GRAZIOLI

Signed in June 1999 on a free transfer from his former club Peterborough Utd. Giuliano's previous visit to the County Ground was in 1997 with Stevenage Town in the FA Cup 3rd round. His winning goal dumped Swindon out and handed Stevenage a money-making 4th round tie against Newcastle Utd. Missed most of last season through injury, but when he did play he was the shining light in a very dull season for Swindon. Following the departures of fellow strikers Chris Hay and Iffy Onuora, 'Graz' established himself as the Town's main threat and is a handful for opposing defences.



No 11 DAVID DUKE

Another young player with a great deal of potential. A left-sided midfielder, he was

unable to command a first-team start at Premiership Sunderland after joining them in June '97 from Redby. Impressed new boss Colin Todd in several pre-season friendlies and signed on a free transfer in July.

No 12 JUAN COBIAN

Juan Cobian joined Aberdeen from Sheffield Wednesday on a free transfer in November '99 and the Argentinean has also served Boca Juniors. A rampaging right-sided defender who made a promising start to 1998-99 with the Owls having joined the club for a nominal fee during the 1998 close season. This summer he moved, again on a free transfer, to the County Ground despite offers from a number of clubs. His attacking style will be very much in demand in Colin Todd's new-look side.

No 14 STEVE COWE

Steve is a nippy, darting forward with good vision and very quick feet. Rarely called upon under former manager Jim Quinn, Steve tried to find another club after he was told he had no future with the Robins. However, Steve was another player that came in from the football wilderness to finish the season strongly and do well enough to warrant a new contract with Colin Todd. Formerly with Aston Villa and he has also played for Hereford on loan.

No 15 ANDY WILLIAMS

Andy moved from Southampton in October 1999 in a £65,000 deal after an impressive loan spell at the County Ground. Andy is an extremely versatile player and has taken on a variety of defensive and midfield duties. Formerly a regular Welsh Under-21 international he became a strong candidate for Player of the Season last term which showed how well he settled into the side.

No 16 KIM HEISELBERG

An attacking left-sided fullback, Kim Heiselberg is another player to join the Swindon ranks on a free transfer in July. He returned from Denmark this summer for his second spell in English football after he joined Sunderland in 1998 for £125,000. He failed to hold down a regular first team place and returned to his native Denmark. A technical player that likes to pass the ball and get into dangerous forward positions.

No 17 DANIEL INVINCIBILE

Colin Todd believes that midfielder Danny Invincible can become a real star after completing a deal to sign the Australian on a free transfer in July. Todd moved swiftly to tie up a deal for Invincible after spotting the 20-year-old playing for West Ham in a trial match. The former Marconi Stallions star scored on his Town debut in a 1-1 draw against West Brom at the Hawthorns. Invincible, a former Australian under-20's star, plays predominantly on the

right hand side of midfield, possess blistering pace and his arrival at the County Ground will increase the number of options available to Todd.

No 18 GARY ALEXANDER

Highly-rated 21-year-old who joined the Robins in early August from West Ham United in a £300,000 deal. Gary spent most of last season on loan at Exeter City where he made a big impression - scoring 16 goals in 20 appearances and keeping The Grecians out of relegation trouble in the process. A powerful and hard-working forward, Alexander could be the one to watch this season.

No 20 FRAZER McHUGH

Former trainee who made an impression in the first team last season but failed to hold down a regular place. This season will be his second as a pro and he will want to step up his claim for a regular start under Colin Todd. A hard-working and tenacious midfielder who can hit a hard tackle as well as an accurate pass, this could well be the year that he breaks through.

No 21 GARETH DAVIES

Signed on a free transfer in March 1999, Gareth made the short trip down the M4 from Reading and despite being a firm favourite with the Royals' supporters, he did not figure in Tommy Burns' plans. Gareth is an infectious character but is well known for his commitment and aggressive style. However, Town fans only caught glimpses of him in action due to several injuries, mainly a problematic knee injury, wrecking his last campaign only making 16 starts in all. He should make a return to full fitness in the coming weeks.

No 22 ALAN REEVES

Alan quit Wimbledon's "Crazy Gang" in search of first team football with Swindon. Tall central defender, who cost the Dons £300,000 from Rochdale. Excellent header of the ball, 32-year-old Reeves can be an asset in attack on set pieces, scoring 2 goals in 24 appearances last season. Despite being linked with several clubs in the summer, Reeves is working hard to command a first team place under new manager Colin Todd.

No 23 STEVE MILDENHALL

One of Swindon's home grown talents, Steve is in his fourth year as a professional after successfully coming through the Club's YTS system. Made two first team appearances in 1995/96, came off the bench to play as an outfield player in 1996/97 and made his full league debut between the posts for Swindon in October 1997. 'Mildy' made 6 (2 as substitute) appearances for Town last season. He spent most of the season in the reserves earning praise for his resolute performances, however, he was rarely relied upon to make the step up to the first team.

The Cherries had fallen from grace at an alarming rate and the glory days under John Bond were long gone. 6,216 attended, a massive drop in support from just a couple of years before. The Cherries went into the match in 22nd place and had score just twice in the previous 12 games. Swindon, who had challenged for promotion throughout the season, had lost their way after picking up just 5 points in their previous 9 games. The Cherries shocked their visitors by taking a 23rd minute lead from the penalty spot through Trevor Howard. Five minutes later Peter Eastoe equalised for the Robins and despite second half pressure from the Cherries, the game ended all square. Swindon went on to win five of their next six games to finish fourth, two points away from promotion. The Cherries won three, drew two and lost three of their remaining games and finished in 21st place and were relegated.

THE PROGRAMME

Everything was being scaled down at Bournemouth after a few seasons of spend, spend, spend. The programme was reduced in size and was entitled "Score with the Cherries". It was exactly the same cover as the previous season, just in smaller scale. The cost was 10p for 24 pages. The layout inside was similar to the recent seasons and starts with Chairman Harold Walker stating that the serious decline in support had effected the club immensely, but the club was forging ahead with finishing the Walker Stand behind the Brighton Beach End. The programme was still of a high standard for a Third Division club and the features and statistics were good. The "Cherries Personality Profile" was with Wayne Talkes who lists one of his dislikes as "travelling away". Perhaps he shouldn't have signed for a club on the South Coast!

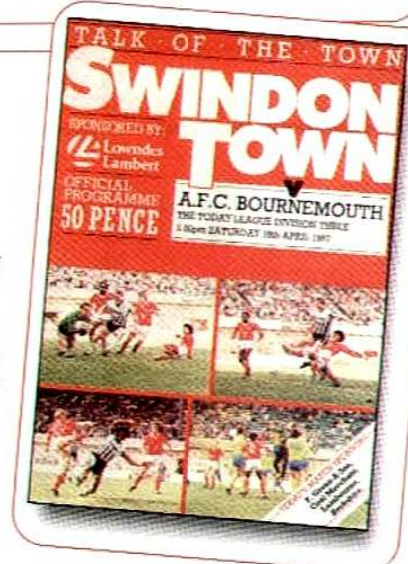

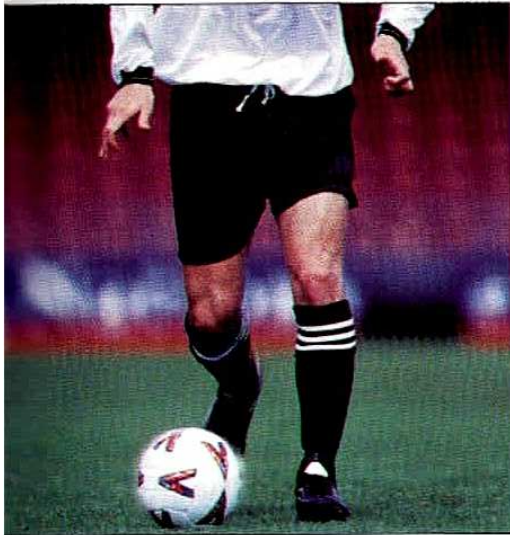

There are ten pages of advertising and plenty of commercial information, but overall, it was an excellent publication.

Swindon gained their first league win of the season with a hard earned three points at Bristol City. Defender Alan Reeves headed home the winner in the 81st minute from a Sol Davis free kick. Elsewhere, Walsall lost their 100% record after a 2-0 defeat at Bury. The Saddlers still lead the table though with Bury now in second place. Jamie Cureton continued his fine form for Reading with a hat-trick in a 4-0 win over Brentford. Cambridge United thrashed Rotherham 6-1, an 89th minute goal helped Millwall to a 1-0 win over Swansea, Stoke beat Peterborough 3-0, Wigan beat Colchester 3-1 and Wrexham beat Oldham by the same score at the Racecourse Ground. Mark Ovendale missed his first game for Luton through injury as they went down 2-0 at home to Northampton. Notts County and Bristol Rovers drew 1-1. In the South West Counties League, the Cherries drew 1-1 at Forest Green Rovers and in the Football League Youth Alliance Under 17 League, Bournemouth won 4-1 at Swindon.

Since progressing through from the Cherries youth set-up, Carl Fletcher has shown great potential and he is now showing the Dean Court faithful just what he is capable of and on Saturday, just moments after being named by sponsors Ace Office Supplies as man of the match, he scored the vital equaliser.

PROGRESSION

Carl's progression has been excellent to watch, although he still believes that he can do much better, "I wouldn't say that this is the best I've ever played, but it's good to get a run in the team and we are now starting to gel and looking to get more points on the board. BALL ROLLING

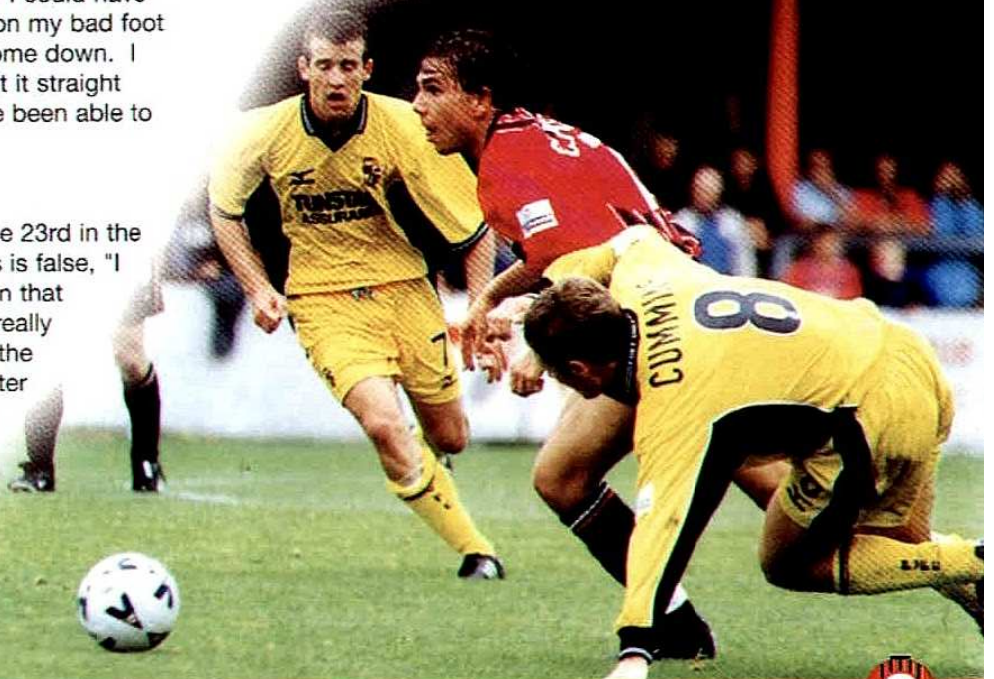

WIN

The Cherries will be searching for that first win tonight against a Swindon side who have just won two away games on the spin, but that will not bother Carl and his team mates, "The only time that will bother us is if we go a goal down. Beforehand, obviously it's on your mind, but as soon as you start playing, you just get on with it. It hasn't been easy because we haven't won for a long time, but what would worry us more would be if we weren't playing well and not winning. We know we're playing alright though and that we're good enough to win games. Against Port Vale we had plenty of chances to win the game. We'll start putting those chances away soon, we're confident of that and our league placing will reflect how we're playing."

CONFIDENT

The opposition tonight will be confident and Carl knows that the Cherries are in for a battle, "It'll be a tough game and they'll be confident after winning at Bristol City. They've got a new manager after coming down from the First Division and they will want to do well for him. It will be a tough test for us, but if we can take the second half performance against Port Vale, carry that on into the game, then hopefully we'll get our first win which will take pressure off everyone." If confidence won games, then the Cherries would be flying high now. That confidence has remained intact because of the excellent football that Carl and his team mates are capable of displaying and it is a vital factor in the sides bid to turn the corner.

2 All matches will be played in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Football Association and The Football League/FA Premier League and the Laws of the Game.

3 Play cannot be guaranteed to take place on any particular day or at any particular time and the club management reserves the right to change its advertised fixtures without notice and liability.

4 In the event of the match being postponed or abandoned, any refund of the admission charge will be at the sole discretion of the club management or in accordance with the club's, Customer Charter. Any refund is subject to a time limitation, the details of which are obtainable from the club ticket office. Persons entering the ground are advised to retain their ticket stub, as this may be required to be produced at a later date.

6 Fireworks, flares, smoke canisters, laser devices, air horns, knives, bottles, glass vessels, cans, poles and any article that might be used as a weapon and/or compromise public safety are not permitted within the ground. **7.**

7 The use of threatening behaviour, foul, abusive or racist language is strictly forbidden and will result in either arrest or ejection from the ground. The following are arrestable offenses under the Football (Offences) Act 1991, as amended by the Football (Offences and Disorder) Act 1999:

The throwing of any object within the ground without lawful authority or excuse

The chanting of anything of an indecent or racist nature

The entry onto the playing area or any adjacent area to which spectators are not generally admitted without lawful authority or excuse.

Conviction could result in a Domestic Banning Order being made.

8 The moving from one area of the ground to another without the permission of a steward, police officer or other authorised agent of the club is strictly forbidden.

9 Persons issued with a ticket for a specific seat must occupy that seat unless instructed otherwise by a steward or other authorised agent of the club. 12 Under the Sporting Events (Control of Alcohol etc) Act .1985, the following are offenses for which a person can be arrested by a police officer and conviction could result in a Domestic Banning Order being made:

A tremendous performance from the Cherries, particularly in the first half, failed to bring its just rewards as two second half goals from the visitors from Norfolk gave them a fortunate passage to round two.

In a blistering opening 45 minutes, the Cherries laid siege to the Norwich goal. The side took a deserved lead on seven minutes when Claus Jørgensen reacted quickest in a scramble to fire a low shot past Andy Marshall. Marshall had a torrid first half, but showed why he is so highly rated by keeping the Cherries at bay. Chukki was denied on 20 minutes by a fine save, and a run and low shot from the impressive Neil Young certainly troubled the former Cherries loan keeper. Just before the break, the Cherries should have at least doubled their lead. This month has seen him add two further full appearances for the side and he has seen the other side of the coin when he was sent off at Colchester, but the youngster has shown maturity beyond his years to put that episode out of his mind and respond with two excellent performances.

RED CARD

For a player so young, it would have been devastating to see the referee brandish the red card at Layer Road, but he has got over that well and paid tribute to the players and staff for helping him through the experience. "I was disappointed at Colchester, but that happens in football. I've put it behind me and all the lads helped me get through it and I felt I did alright against Norwich and Port Vale, although the important thing was that we played well as a team. I didn't feel any pressure at all because the lads and Sean encouraged me before and just told me to get on with my game and that's all that I can do."

HARD

To see a red card so soon into his senior career after being on the field for just three minutes was a dreadful moment as Danny agrees. "It was, seeing the card and then having to walk off was the worst feeling ever, it's a long, lonely walk. I've put it behind me now though but I'm disappointed that I'll have to miss the game at Walsall on Saturday. It's going to be a hard game there which is the sort of game I like because you can only improve yourself in matches like that."

OLD ENOUGH

Centre half positions in the side at the moment are up for grabs with both Karl Broadhurst and Eddie Howe injured and Nick Fenton returning to Manchester City. Despite Danny's tender years, Sean O'Driscoll has been quoted as saying that if a player is good enough, then when he crosses the white line he's old enough. Danny has been

given his chance in that position, something he has taken with both hands, "I been given a chance and I feel I've done alright. It's up to Sean to pick the team and if I can impress him, then I know I have a chance. It's unfortunate to have the injuries and we miss those players, but for me, it's an opportunity to get in the team, improve my game and hopefully to stay in the side for as long as I can."

SURPRISED

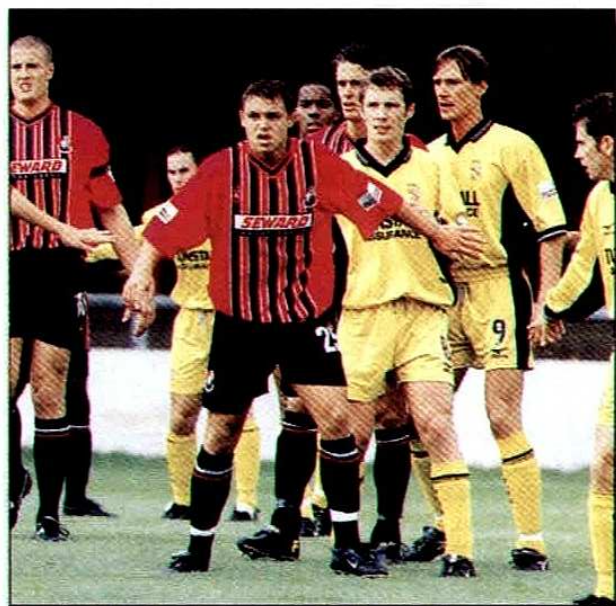
Last season saw Danny make his first team bow for a final few minutes at Stoke in a game where the result didn't effect the outcome of the Cherries season and even first year professional Danny is surprised that he has been given another chance so quickly, "I didn't think I'd get an opportunity this soon into the season. I thought that I would have to wait until there was no pressure, but Sean has given me my chance and Mel Machin has been speaking to me saying how well I've done, so hopefully I can keep things going."

IMPRESSED

On Saturday, Danny again impressed with his confidence and maturity on the field in a game which he felt was there for the taking, "The game summed up our season so far. We've got to learn how to kill teams off and take our chances. One goal isn't good enough in this division. Port Vale only had two chances but they tucked one away and should have done better with the other. We had numerous chances and only put one away and that is our problem. Once we overcome that, we can go on a good run. It's a big game against Swindon, but we're not feeling any pressure. All the lads want to win and will be doing their best to win. We feel we're playing well enough to win and every game we take as it comes and look to do our best and I'm sure that if we keep going the way we are, we'll get our win." Danny shys away from questions about himself though as his thoughts are firmly with the team, "Hopefully we can push up the table. We need a win and with the amount of chances we create, we will do soon. I don't really worry about myself, all I want to concentrate on is the team doing well."

TASK

Smith is under no illusions about the task the Cherries face tonight against what will be a buoyant Swindon side, "They've just come down from Division One and had a good win at Bristol City on Saturday. They're a good passing side which will make for a good game and hopefully we'll get a result and the supporters can go home happy which they deserve!" After tonight, Danny will not be able to play again until Saturday after next when Oldham visit, but if he can be on the winning side tonight, that will certainly make the enforced break more bearable.

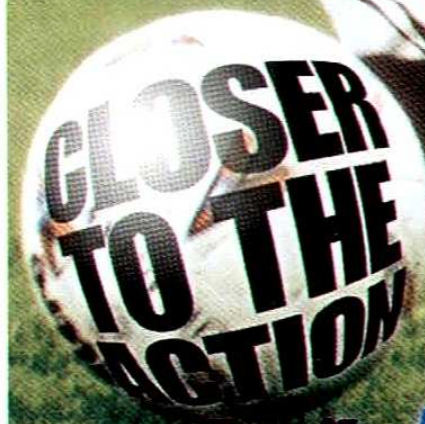

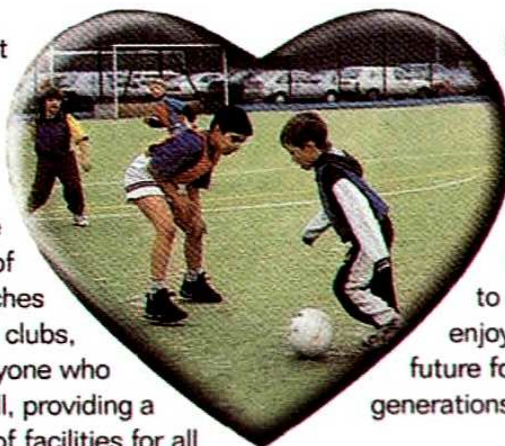

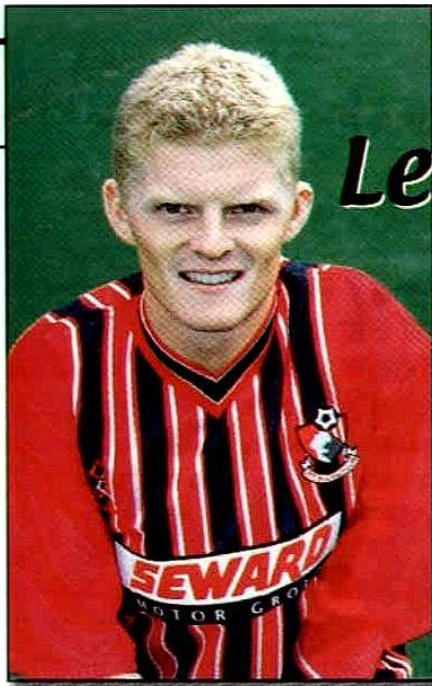

CLAUS JØRGENSEN

Learning from Mistakes

After this evening, Cherries star Claus Jørgensen will embark on a frustrating time as he is forced to sit out both the Walsall and Oldham matches through suspension after receiving his marching orders at Colchester. With the determination that Claus always shows in his play, he will be looking for a successful performance tonight before serving his suspension.

GOALS

That red card was sandwiched between his first goals of the season, a fine individual goal at Colchester and he then showed great reactions against Norwich to fire the Cherries into the lead - it's what went on between that, that he would like to forget, "The goals are fine, but I'd like to forget about the second half at Colchester - the first half as well actually, apart from the goal! It was a bit unfortunate, I just switched off for a second, but I don't think what I said deserved a red card. It's something I've got to put behind me and get one with it. I'm not used to missing games from injuries or suspensions, so I'm annoyed, but I know it's my own fault."

GOOD STEAD

Although the results may not have reflected the way the Cherries have started this season, he believes that showings so far can stand the side in good stead, particularly if lady luck starts to shine on the men from Dean Court, "We can take a lot from how we played last week against Norwich and take the positive aspects from the earlier games and work on that. I don't think that apart from the Colchester game that we've played badly so far. Against Norwich, we should have buried them, but our luck was not in. I remember when Carl Fletcher had the ball on the byline, and I was running towards the near post to give him an option, but he passed it to Chukki which was a good decision, and because I was running, I just couldn't stop and I knew as soon he hit that I was in the wrong place and the ball hit me. That was definitely going to be a goal if I hadn't got in the way, 100% certain. That split second cost us a second goal and we were so unlucky."

DILEMMA

Claus is now in the age old dilemma of hoping that the side plays well when he's out, but then having to battle back for his place, "That's always going to be

the way. We all want the results to go our way and if someone is in my place in the team and helping to get the results then by rights, when I'm not suspended, he'll keep his place on merit. When you're on the bench or suspended, you start to think if you'll ever get back into the side again. Winning is the important thing though whether I'm in the side when I'm free to play again or not. I want to come back into a winning team who are playing with confidence. If you go into a side who are not optimistic, then it can be difficult. In the end, it's always going to be better to be at a club who are winning whether you are playing or not. As soon as I'm back, I'll be banging on the door to get back in. I'm not used to not being available and it's not something I'm looking forward to."

WRONG

As disappointed as he is about missing the next couple of games, Claus knows that he was at fault at Layer Road and he holds his hands up and admits he was wrong, "Yes, I know that I'll now have to take my responsibilities more and I'll learn from my mistake. I always try to talk to the referees during a game because he's out there to enjoy it as we are, and that's why I talk to them. In games you can get carried away as I did at Colchester. I think that a straight red card is the worst thing you can get. It was the first senior red card I've had and I can't get used to seeing my name written down with red card next to it." Unfortunately, Claus has picked up the English language exceptionally well and it was part of his wide vocabulary that he used, words that he couldn't have said in his native tongue, "There are no swear words in the Danish dictionary, so I've only learnt them since I came to England. So I'm a good boy really and it's only the English language that made me say what I did!" In any language, Claus will be missed by the Cherries and tonight he will be sure to look to sign off in fine style.

A Diary of John Cooper - AFC Bournemouth Physio

Check rooms for players and ensure menu is sufficient for diet and nutrition. Players train. Arrange an area for

treatment to injured players, William Huck, Jason Tindall and Nick Fenton. Finish 2030.

SATURDAY 2 SEPTEMBER 2000

Breakfast at 0800.
Give treatment to players prior to travel to ground, ensure fluid intake is ok.
Travel to ground, obtain ice for any injuries. Prepare dressing room for match. Begin strapping players' ankles at 1.30, massage rehab at 1355. Players out for warm up prior to match, game and after match.
Speak to each player and ascertain any problems for journey home and begin to prepare treatments for Sunday am.

SUNDAY 3 SEPTEMBER 2000

Players arrive at 0930 for treatment, 1000 players attend gym for cool down session of one hour swimming, Jacuzzi, finish paper work and leave for home at 1200 approx.

Players arrive 0900 for assessment and massage.
Strappings 0915, leave training and attend gym at 1000.

Lunch 1300.
2nd rehab session with injured players, 1 hour gym work at 2pm. 3pm back at treatment room to complete paper work and plan for next day.
Meet with gaffer and head coach to inform of availability of players and update on injured players.

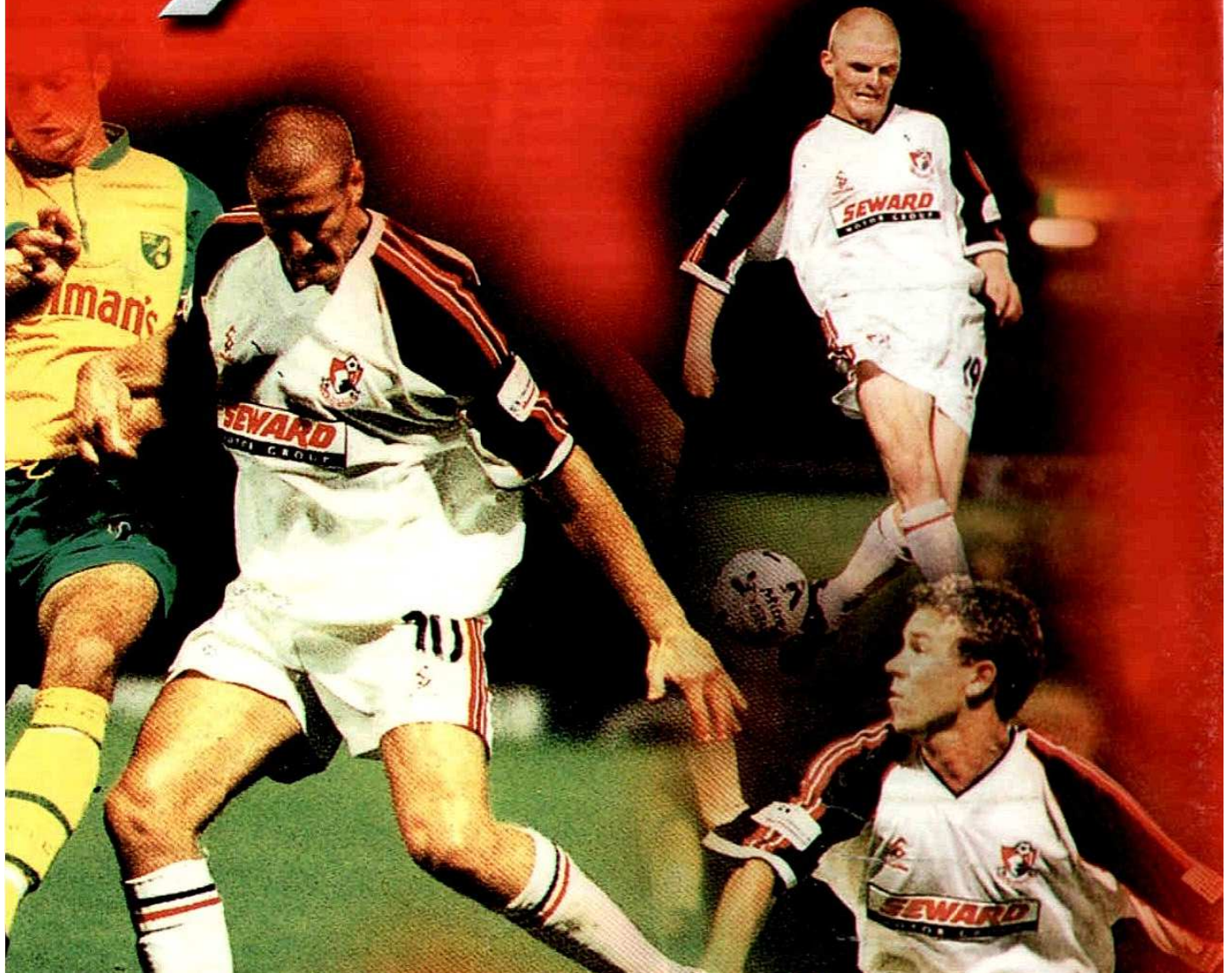
