



FORMER chief executive of the Football Association, and one-time secretary of the Football League, Graham Kelly this week joined the board of Luton Town, promising to "work hard to enhance the club's status."

Chairman Mike Watson-Challis said he wanted to harness Mr Kelly's great experience in the game for the benefit of the club, and the new director said he expected to play an ambassadorial role.

He has a host of contacts in the game, having been a professional soccer administrator for 31 years.

He is a chartered secretary, and always wanted to be a professional footballer. Born in Blackpool, he got as far as goalkeeper for his home town club's third XI, having decided he was never going to be good enough to be an outfield player. After a handful of games, he ditched his dream - "I decided I was not going to be a good goalkeeper either, because I wasn't daft enough."

Mr Kelly went into banking, before joining the admin staff at the Football League, then in Lytham St. Annes, in 1968. Eleven years later he was secretary of the League, in succession to Alan Hardaker, before moving to the FA in 1988.

There he played a major role in the biggest change the domestic game has undergone, with the formation of the FA Premiership. "Whatever your view of the rights and wrongs of the Premiership, it was certainly the most significant event of my 11 years at the FA," he said.

Resignation in 1999, after a row about the FA doing deals with the Welsh FA, left him angry at the time, but not bitter. He had time to write his account of his experiences at Lancaster Gate - Sweet FA, still on sale at £16.99 - and to maintain his interest in football at all levels.

He has also been a newspaper columnist, and a football broadcaster, and says he is looking forward to being a club director.

Why has he come back into the game at professional level? - "Simple, I am still as keen as ever to do a job."

And why Luton? - "Why not? No-one else asked me. A call from Luton came out of the blue. I came to see Mike Watson-Challis, and decided that I would like to accept his offer."

Living in Cambridgeshire, Mr Kelly expects to attend most Town games at Kenilworth Road, starting this afternoon.

OUR old friend Raddy Antic, scorer of the most valuable goal in the club's history, is offering to do us another favour. He has sent us a 22-year-old centre half who, he thinks, could benefit from English experience and who might also help the Town.

Forward

Jose Saavedra is under contract with Real Oviedo of Spain, where Antic began a second spell as manager in June. He and Ricky Hill were teammates in the best side the Town have had in recent years, the side that David Pleat built to go up into the old First Division.

Antic has been a top manager in Spain for a decade, with spells at Real Madrid and Atletico Madrid, for whom he achieved Spain's first-ever league and cup double.

Standing at just over 6ft tall, Saavedra has spent ten days on trial at Kenilworth Road, with Antic offering him on loan. If the Town boss is impressed, a deal could be done to keep the player here for the rest of the season.

But the boss has to think about current restrictions on loans. He is allowed to take up to two players under 23 on long-term deals.

Restrictions on other loans are complex: a club can have a total of 465 "loan days" in the course of a season, taking a maximum of eight players. Their deals must be for at least 28 days, and no more than 93. Clubs can have no more than two players at any one time on short-term loans, and cannot take more than two from any one club during a season.

The strategic decisions for managers are to work out when they will most need loans, with some consideration given to the possibility they might want a bit of leeway to bring in new recruits in the last couple of months of the season, as relegation and promotion issues get close.

Meanwhile, there are still plenty of players seeking work, and as many agents hoping to earn a bit of commission by finding it for them.

Midfielder Stokey Mason, 23, a Trinidad and Tobago international, is one of the latest to come to Kenilworth Road to try his luck.

ONE signing has been completed this week, and it is mainly down to the diligence of one of our scouts. Ugo Cerrone is based at Milton Keynes, and has a good record of spotting schoolboy talent. In the summer he was in Kent on a family visit, and took in a football tournament that happened to be taking place.

A 16-year-old centre-back, Robert Gillman, from Welling, caught his eye, and the player came to Kenilworth Road for trials with our youth squad.

He played in the first four fixtures in the Football League Youth Alliance, and did well enough to be offered the chance to chase his dream of becoming a professional footballer. He has been signed on as a first-year scholar, which is what apprentices are called nowadays.



The Manager

IT SEEMS a long time since we last played at Kenilworth Road,

having clocked up around 1,000 miles for two games in four days, at Swansea and Sunderland. The question is how far have we come in terms of team progress, and my judgement is that perhaps we have moved forward a little, but not enough to satisfy me.

In the home game with Walsall we were grateful not to lose, but I felt it was a disappointing team performance, all the more so because it was in front of our own supporters.

We were giving the ball away too easily, and the way the game went Walsall were right to feel disappointed with a point, when they might easily have had three.

Looking back at that game and the trips to South Wales and Wearside, I think that overall only the goalkeepers could be anywhere near satisfied with their contributions.

Nathan Abbey has done really well. We are all delighted for him, and it was harsh on him, but part of football, when we decided we were going to bring back Mark Ovendale.

Conceding four goals at Swansea obviously was not in the script, and although there was some mitigating circumstance with the dismissal of Jude Stirling, we should have had enough about us to regroup and keep the opposition at bay.

Defensively we were very poor, and that is a criticism of the whole team not just the men at the back. There is no point in debating whether it was harsh on Jude to be red-carded on his debut. It probably was, but in football you get mistakes from everyone on the field, and after the defender was sent off we made far too many mistakes for our own good.

Playing for an hour with ten men is always likely to be difficult, yet how often in football do ten men react positively and beat the odds? Sadly, we did not, and got what we deserved, and there is a continuing concern about our inability to create chances. Again, as with defending, it is up to every member of the team to play his part

in attacking moves, and at The Vetch we were well short of what was required.

I felt sorry for those brilliant supporters who managed to overcome travelling difficulties and keep up their backing on a day when the team failed to respond.

Then it was on to the other end of the country, and for 45 minutes we acquitted ourselves very well at the magnificent Stadium of Light. We were the underdogs against Sunderland, but after a lot of straight talking following the Swansea trip we responded to the challenge admirably for the first half. Sunderland have the luxury of picking a team from 36 professionals, most of them very experienced, and bought at high prices.

For some of their team on Tuesday it was an opportunity to press claims for more regular inclusion in the Premiership squad, but we competed well to hold them to 0-0 at half time.

Our game plan was working, but we knew Sunderland would step up the pace for the second half. They did, and the night ended in another disappointment with defensive deficiencies on show again. Mark Ovendale prevented a rout, but who knows what might happen on Tuesday? If we could get an early goal at Kenilworth Road we might yet make a fight of it.


But if I were given a choice of a win today or one in the cup, I would take three points this afternoon. It's a bit of a six-pointer in view of the league positions of the two teams, and we need a win to get our season going - defeats in two of our four home games so far is clearly not good enough for us, nor for the supporters.

We know we are capable of better things, and now is the time to prove it. I am delighted to welcome Colin Todd and his assistant Andy King back to Kenilworth Road - I remember them both as players here when I was just a young pup in the dressing room. But I hope that today's reunion will end in pleasure for us, not Swindon!

Captain's Log

I WILL be sitting in the stand, mentally kicking every ball

again this afternoon, wishing I could be on the pitch with the lads. We are all aware that this is a very big game for both clubs, and before the game I will be with the team, doing my best to be cheerful and optimistic. I would love to be playing, and trying to spread confidence and optimism around the team on the field, but my recovery from injury is painfully slow, if I may use the phrase!

If I cannot play, the next best thing is watching the team, shouting for them from the stand, and trying to instil confidence in the dressing room.

I would have been at Swansea and at Sunderland, but my treatment and training sessions prevented me travelling. For such long trips the team goes the day before the game, and my priority on Friday and Monday was to maintain my schedule of training and treatment.

It is a matter of sticking to a routine, doing a little training under the supervision of Clive Goodyear, and carrying out the exercise programme he has set for me.

I have been in football long enough - and been injured often enough! - to know that hamstring problems cannot be rushed. Mine was a slight tear, but I am pleased to report that a scan has shown that it has healed up, so a cautious return to more strenuous work is possible next week.

When players are out through injury for a long time they can easily become the forgotten men of football, and you have to learn not to let it get you down. I have discovered that for myself - in a sense you are forgotten, because this business is all about league teams fighting for points.

I have been talking to Stuart Douglas, for instance, telling him not to worry too much if he feels ignored and forgotten. Once he is fit again, and competing for a place in the first team, supporters will quickly remember who he is.


I can admit that on Saturday, when the lads were suffering at Swansea, I was a very frustrated man, with half my attention on the TV sport, and the other half checking the radio for reports on the game at The Vetch. It was tough luck on Jude Stirling to have his big day spoiled, but it has happened to plenty of others - Matthew Spring and Julian James, I recall both got sent off on their debuts - and Jude is going to be a very good player.


I was sad to miss the trip to Sunderland, because that is a wonderful stadium, in a part of the country that is passionate about football. I was fortunate to play there in the cup a couple of years ago, when we also lost 3-0, although on that occasion we were doing OK until Mitchell Thomas got sent off.

The cup-tie is not dead and buried yet, although we will need to pull out something special to overcome the first-leg deficit on Tuesday.

Much more important is to get three points this afternoon. The players need a morale-booster. There is an added pressure in home games, because of the expectation of the crowd, and if things go wrong it is all too easy to suffer a loss of confidence. Everyone wants to do well, and I will be reminding the lads that despite the poor start to the season, we put in some very good home performances last season, and they have not become bad players overnight. I know we will turn the corner, hopefully today.

FOOTBALL supporter and Home Office Minister Lord Steve Bassam of Brighton has asked us to re-iterate the Government's determination to stamp out hooliganism, and the measures now available to make the game safer and more pleasant for everyone.

The latest legislation enables football banning orders to be imposed to stop known trouble-makers attending domestic and international games for up to ten years. People banned must surrender their passports when England, or their club, play abroad.

You do not have to be arrested at a football match, or convicted of a football-related offence to get a ban, and courts

will crack down on violence, public order offences and racist chanting.

The Minister said: "The majority of fans have nothing to fear. No supporter is going to be banned because they have a tattoo, or because of how they look. Safeguards are in place to protect the genuine fan, and ensure that bans are only imposed where there is strong evidence that they will help to prevent football violence and disorder.

"But the message is clear: there is no place in football for thugs or racists. Clubs don't want them, nor do the vast majority of supporters. Now the police and courts have new powers to deal with them."

Hatters Away

WE MAKE the first of our two league visits to Bristol on Saturday, to take on the Rovers at the Memorial Ground, the stadium which the blue and white half of Bristol soccer shares with Bristol Rugby Football Club.

As usual two excellent coach services offer safe travel to and from the game, operated by Town on Tour and the Bobbers Travel Club.

Town on Tour is part of the Luton Town Supporters Club, and offers its best deals to LTSC members, and you can join the supporters club for a minimum annual donation of £7.

Travel tickets are on sale through the Supporters Club kiosk before and after matches, or via the club shop during the week. The Town on Tour fare to Bristol is £12 for adult members of LTSC, £10 for pensioner and junior members, and £13.50 for others. They leave Maple Road at 11am.

To use the Bobbers Travel Club coaches you need to be a member of the BTC, but membership is a bargain, just £1 for adults and 50p for pensioners and under-16s.

The fare to Bristol is £11 for adults and £9 for concessions. To book, visit the Bobbers Travel Club kiosk before home matches, or at other times phone Paul Deason on 01234 750996. The Bobbers service includes picking up supporters in the country districts. For the Bristol trip, the Bobbers start at Cranfield at 9.30am, calling at various villages en route to Luton, leaving Kenilworth Road at 10.30. They also pick up at the Gateway Hotel, on Dunstable Road near the M1.

Passengers using either coach service can park in safety at Maple Road, for £3 if you can show a membership card of the Supporters Club or the Bobbers Travel Club. The price for others is £4.

IF YOU want to drive to the Bristol Rovers game, the journey is quite simple, and you can expect to do it comfortably in not much over two hours because it is motorway almost all the way.

Leave Luton on the M1 south, then make a right turn onto the M25 west. Near Heathrow leave M25 to turn right onto the M4 heading west. Leave M4 at junction 19, turning left on the M32. Leave the M32 at junction 2, and turn right, signposted to Fishponds and Horfield. Bear right where the road forks, and at the sixth set of traffic lights, about a quarter of a mile further on, turn left into Filton Avenue. The ground is on your left, and there is ample street parking in the area.

Admission is by cash on the turnstiles, £11 for adults and £5.50 for concessions.



Born: Swindon, 13.5.78. Previous Clubs: From Trainee.



Last season Sol made over 25 appearances for Town in both the fullback and wingback positions and his commitment was exemplified by some very tough tackling.

James, still only 18, burst onto the scene towards the end of the 1998/99 season. He was duly rewarded with the number 32 shirt at the start of last season and the young defender/midfielder became a very useful asset to the dwindling squad. James can be called upon to play in a variety of positions and although he made an impact on the first team his form dropped. He will be hoping for more consistent performances in the new campaign.

JUAN COBIAN - DEFENDER

Juan Cobian joined Aberdeen from Sheffield Wednesday on a free transfer in November '99. Following the departures of fellow strikers Chris Hay and Iffy Onuora, 'Graz' established himself as the Town's main threat. If he stays fit, he will be a handful for opposing defences this season.

STEVE COWE - FORWARD

Born: Gloucester, 29/9/74
Previous Clubs: Aston Villa, Hereford (Ioan)
Steve is a nippy, darting forward with good vision and very quick feet. Rarely called upon under former manager Jim Quinn, Steve tried to find another club after he was told he had no future with the Robins. However, Steve was another player that came in from the football wilderness to finish the season strongly and do well enough to warrant a new contract with Colin Todd.

CHARLIE GRIFFIN - FORWARD

Born: Bath, 25.6.79

Former Clubs: Chippenham Town (non-league). Charlie started his career in non-league football. He was signed for £10,000 from Chippenham Town where he was top scorer in the Screwfix League with 30 goals. At 21 years of age he is still a prospect for the future and the coaching staff believe that, with a handful of first team games under his belt, he will be ready to challenge for a regular place in the side.




EVACUATION PROCEDURE

Please leave the area of the ground as quickly as possible, by the route directed. Your co-operation will be most appreciated.

Blast from the Past

Hatters shoot down the Robins

Luton manager, Harry Haslam, had high hopes for the 1973/74 campaign, his second in charge of the Hatters, as he felt that he had managed to blend a unit of youth and experience good enough to have a more than even chance of winning promotion from the old Division Two.

By 4.40 on the opening day, however, those dreams were in tatters as a dreadful 4-0 defeat at Nottingham Forest meant that a quick return to the drawing board was in order as all the preseason plans had to be re-written.

What was said to the players over the following seven days has always remained within the confines of Kenilworth Road but whatever it was certainly worked as the Hatters tore into poor visitors Carlisle and were 6-0 up at half-time. Although the foot was taken off the pedal in the second period, leaving a final scoreline of 6-1, the supporters had seen enough to tell them that the season was well and truly underway.

In that glorious autumn the Town went through an unbeaten run which included notable victories at Bristol City 3-1, F.A.Cup holders Sunderland 1-0 and Crystal Palace 2-1 which pushed them up the table to a top three spot. The visit of Swindon to Kenilworth Road on 13th October was only the fourth home game played from nine starts and an interested crowd of 10,732 turned up to see if the team was as good as the league table suggested.

In those days pre-match entertainment extended to the occasional display by a police dog handling team where the same 'villain' always seemed to have his unprotected arm chewed by a particularly vicious alsation the size of a pony. On this day though, we were treated to the shape of things to come.

For the first time at Kenilworth Road the match was sponsored, with Vauxhall Motors laying on a variety of entertainment before kick-off as well as providing free programmes and marketing material but unfortunately no cars. As if this was not enough old friend of the club, Gigi Peronace, the General Secretary of the Anglo-Italian tournament presented Hatters skipper, Bobby Thomson with a trophy for 'Fairest players and supporters' in the previous season's competition!

After all this activity it was suddenly remembered that there was a football match to play with opponents, Swindon, out to end a run of seven games without a victory. The Town welcomed back winger Jim Ryan to the side at the expense of the unlucky Gordon Hindson while Peter Cruse was given a rare outing in the forward line replacing an out-of-sorts Tom Finney whose brilliant early season form had started to wane. The Robins included a 21 year old winger, who Luton supporters would get to know over the coming few years, by the name of David Moss.

The Hatters opened like a whirlwind and forced four corners in the opening two minutes with the ball dropping twice to the over anxious Cruse who shot at an open goal on each occasion only to see his efforts blocked by John Trollope's body and Rod Thomas's head. The pressure continued to build with the Town spraying the ball around with arrogant ease before the dam finally burst, albeit rather luckily.

Swindon midfielder, Kenny Stroud, was spotted handling an awkwardly bouncing ball in the area following a long throw from Alan Garner although in truth it seemed more like ball to hand. John Aston made no mistake from the

spot and as the Luton supporters settled down expecting a goal feast Swindon netted a surprise equaliser after Tom Jenkins took advantage of a clever through ball to score from close range.

The goal seemed to knock the stuffing out of the Town for a while but the one goal lead was eventually restored right on the stroke of half-time. Luton full-back Don Shanks seemed to have fouled Swindon defender Richard Legg on the edge of the area but the referee awarded an indirect free kick to the Town which was floated over by lim

Ryan for Peter Anderson to head home.

The second period was much more evenly contested with Swindon going close through Moss and only a last ditch tackle from Anderson robbing Mick McGovern who was clean through on goal. At the final whistle Harry Haslam breathed a sigh of relief and was grateful that his team could win and move up to second place in the table whilst playing indifferent football.

By the time of the return on February 26th the country was in the grip of the miners strike which in turn left power stations paralysed leading to severe electricity shortages. This meant that football matches scheduled to be played in midweek evenings having to be brought forward to the afternoon.

The game at Swindon was one such casualty and a crowd of only 2,791 turned up to see the Town, who were still in second spot, take on a Robins side that was rock bottom. Swindon had won only three times since their defeat at Kenilworth Road, while the Town were unbeaten since the turn of the year and this was reflected in the respective line-ups with the Robins showing seven changes from the game four months before with the Hatters only two. Swindon goalkeeper Alan Spratley had one of

those games to forget, regularly spilling the ball and failing to hold on to anything above shoulder height. Although Joe Butler rattled the Luton crossbar early on, the Town soon controlled midfield and two headers from Barry Butlin, converting a Jim Ryan corner and an Anderson cross, gave the Hatters a comfortable half-time lead.

Butlin was denied his hat-trick when knocking the ball over the bar from two yards in the second period and Jim Husband missed a sitter after Spratley dropped a soft shot from Alan West although Swindon enjoyed a late rally with Ray Clarke bringing out a brilliant save from Hatters goalkeeper Graham Horn.

The Town managed to cling on to second position for the remainder of the campaign to win promotion back to a Division One that they left in 1960. No such happy ending for Swindon, unfortunately, as they failed to move off the bottom although their young winger was beginning to attract the scouts to the County Ground!







Hatters on Card

EARLIER this year, as the football world mourned the loss of Sir Stanley Matthews, older follows of Luton Town were also saddened to hear of the death of former full-back Tom Aherne, better known as Bud.

Exactly 50 years ago today Bud was a member of a struggling Hatters Second Division side that managed to bring back a precious point from Maine Road, Manchester. Ironically, it was not until his last season as a first-team player, 1956/57, that he featured on card No. 40 of this

set of football cards which were given away with Cadet's sweet cigarettes.

Bud was born in Linfield in January 1919, and not until he was 26 did he break into the first team of Belfast Celtic, who were then one of the strongest clubs in Ireland. In March 1949 Luton splashed out £8,000 for his services, which was considered a large fee for a player on the wrong side of 30. However, the Town never had any cause to regret one penny of the money, as he was to prove one of their most consistent performers over the next eight years.

Aherne went straight into the first team at Tottenham and made an impressive debut in a 2-1 defeat, but suffered an ankle injury a couple of weeks later which caused him to miss the rest of that season.

He returned to be the regular left back for the 1949/50 campaign, and also added to the two Eire caps he had won at Belfast Celtic.

Bud went on to become a dual international, as he also won four Northern Ireland caps as well as a total of 16 for the Republic. In those days players born south of the Border could represent the province.

Despite playing in a struggling team for his first two or three years at Luton, Bud soon gained a reputation for being one of the best defenders in the old-style Second Division. He was fast, strong in the tackle, and able to kick with either foot. Gradually, under the astute leadership of Dally Duncan off the pitch, and Syd Owen on it, Luton's fortunes improved, and in 1953 they narrowly missed promotion, finishing third in the days when only two went up. Once again, though, Bud's season finished prematurely following another nasty injury.

There was better luck for club and player two years later, however, when the Town finally

> gained promotion in a season in which Bud played every game.

So, at the age of 36, he saw topflight football for the first time, and he made the transition effortlessly. Although, naturally, he was a little slower, he made up for this with clever positional play, which enabled him to take care of the best wingers in the game, even Stan Matthews. Off the field, Bud was always the typical, jovial Irishman, and was a good singer of his country's ballards.

His 267th and final League game came on February 23, 1957, at West Bromwich, where he sustained a broken ankle in a 4-0 defeat. He stayed on the playing staff for another couple of years before taking up a part-time coaching position. After this he worked as a welder in the town, where he was firmly settled with his family.

Right up until his death he remained very much involved with local soccer, particularly with

the St. Joseph's club, which he helped to establish as one of the top teams in the area.





RICKY Hill summed up the frustration he felt as keenly as the supporters when Northampton were allowed to help themselves to their first-ever league win at Kenilworth Road. "Too many players too far below par," he said.

Nathan Abbey was one of the very few exceptions, after a surprise call-up for his first game of the season after Mark Ovendale suffered a neck injury on the day of the game. Abbey produced a memorable display, his best-ever, and as a result retained his place for the visit of Walsall even though Ovendale had recovered by then.

There was precious little else for the home fans to cheer as Northampton's Steve Howard and Jamie Forrester showed the attacking sharpness we lacked, each making a goal for the other. Both managers agreed that but for Abbey's excellence the Cobblers would have gone home with four or five goals.

Northampton's Kevin Wilson added that it was their best away performance for a long time. He made no comment when one of his local reporters suggested Luton were so poor that Northampton should not get carried away with one result. But perhaps our disappointment was put into context three days alter when the Cobblers went to the New Den and beat Millwall 1-0.

GRATEFUL for a point, but unhappy with the standard of play, Ricky Hill immediately began planning a shake-up in the team after the Town's home record was dented again.

There was a very little professional satisfaction from being only the second side this season to prevent the league leaders winning, and only the second to keep a clean sheet against an attack which had netted 15 times in the previous six games.

But Walsall boss Ray Graydon knew his side had thrown away two points. "We would have won it easily but for their goalkeeper," he said, becoming the second visiting manager in four days to pay tribute to the revitalised Nathan Abbey.

Graydon added that though he was disappointed to get only a draw, he was also a touch relieved at the end because the Town could have snatched an unlikely victory with their only shot on target, a volley by Matthew Spring in the 87th minute which was beaten away by the keeper.

Otherwise, the most threatening action came at the other end. We escaped when Darren Wrack hit a post, and several times Abbey did the business when Walsall expected to score. The best of several good saves was a perfectly judged advance and spread after Darren Byfield beat the offside trap for a one-on-one with the young goalkeeper.

In speaking of his admiration for that save, Hill

made the point that in all our games so far, we had never managed to create a similar scoring chance, and that was of great concern. He gave a debut to new striker Peter Thomson, but he found the pace of the game, and, perhaps the indifferent service, too difficult to cope with. He was keen to impress, but it was no occasion for a memorable debut because most of the rest of the team was well below its capabilities.

There was precious little to excite the fans, and there were signs that players are feeling the pressure as things fail to gel at home. Against Walsall, agreed the manager, there were times when fear came into the Town game, with players short of confidence and self-belief. "We didn't do the basic things well," he said. "Our control and passing was not good enough. "And we were not positive enough. You know how I like to see football played. When you are looking for options to pass, look first if you can get it forward. If you cannot, then think about a square pass. If that is also not on, then you might have to pass it backwards. I think we are getting into a state of mind when we think of the back pass first..."

When the Town did try to get forward, possession was lost all too cheaply, leaving gaps for Walsall to exploit. On another day, said Graydon, he would expect his team to score two or three at least from the amount of possession Walsall had.

pass into the path of Dillon, who very calmly shot into the net.

Ten minutes later we clinched it with a near-identical goal, involving the same two players. It finished off Wycombe, whose only threat at the other end had come just before that, when they put us under a bit of pressure, mainly from set-pieces, including long throws.

Scott Ward had one save to make, and made it comfortably, and the fact that he otherwise had an easy game speaks volumes for the way the defence played, with full-backs John Carroll and Steven Dogbe in good form.

Mark Robins, of Rotherham, has six goals to his credit, and three strikers are on five goals so far: Lomana Tresor Lua Lua of Colchester, Simon Haworth of Wigan and Hector Sam of Wrexham, Lua Lua, 19, missed Colchester's 1-1 home draw with Wrexham because he was on his way to Newcastle Utd for £2.25million. Among the week's other results, Brentford 1 Millwall 1 sounds run of the mill, except that it was disastrous for Millwall joint mangers Alan McCleary and Keith Stevens. Lions fans let rip at the pair as they left the pitch at Griffin Park, and a few hours later they were sacked on the grounds that they did not seem likely to attain the club's ambitions. Ray Harford became caretaker manager, which means he might just bring an opposing team to Kenilworth Road next month, for the first time since he was here with West Brom for a Coca Cola Cup-tie three years ago.
