

It was with great delight that last Friday evening another young product of the Swindon Town FC youth development programme came of age with an international debut for England Under-15s.

Chris Taylor, a 14-year-old midfielder from Headlands School was in the England squad that faced Northern Ireland in the Victory Shield game at Windsor Park.

Interestingly he was one of only two players affiliated with clubs outside the top two divisions and his selection speaks volumes for the great work being carried out by Youth Development Officer Phil Cannon and his staff.

Chris tells me he wants to be a professional footballer and has dreams of playing in the Premier League and for England.

I sincerely hope he can achieve those ambitions whilst in a Swindon Town shirt. He has already played for our Under-17s side this season and has performed well.

Against Oxford United a couple of weeks ago he stepped off the bench and helped to transform the game - which we won 2-1.

Chris is the first England player Headlands have had since Town stalwart Kenny Stroud in the early 1970s.

The development of homegrown talent is something close to my heart - despite the threats from those football ignorant bureaucrats in the EU who are threatening to destroy it all with one foul stroke. Already Alan Young has broken into the first team squad and has delighted us all with his substitutes' appearances against Luton Town and Swansea City.

Last season Brian Smith made his debut in what was clearly a trying

time for the club and he is another one for the future. I am told by the youth development staff that we have one or two other nuggets on the conveyor belt - which all bodes well for the future of this club.

Talking about the future, something a little closer, is our first Sporting Club Dinner of the season - next Wednesday, November1 - will welcome a 1966 World Cup winner, Alan Ball.

'Bally' is a very funny speaker and actually stands on his chair to make his speech! If you haven't bought a ticket - or a company table - I would urge you to do so, it's going to be a great night.

Under new chairman Theo Paphitis and even newer manager Mark McGee the Lions are roaring again. Let's hope tonight our brave lads will turn into Lion tamers!





The Lions...

Millwall Chairman Theo Paphitis disposed of the services of joint managers Keith Stevens and Alan Mcleary following a 1-1 draw at Brentford a fortnight ago. The peformance, it was considered, underlined a poor start his club made to the 2000/01 campaign.

The Lions were managerless for their next two encounters, with veteran coach Ray Harford standing in as caretaker boss before the announcement of Mark McGhee's arrival was made. Millwall managed to go about business as usual. Strikes in either half against Premiership Ispwich sealed a 2-0 Worthington Cup Second Round, First Leg victory at The New Den. Paul Ifill opened the scoring in a half with plenty of endeavour, steel and skill, and Neil Harris picked out Tim

Cahill who added the

second to minutes from time. Turning their attentions back to the Nationwide League, Millwall hosted struggling Oxford United and put five goals past the Manor Ground side. Harris underlined his status as one of the hottest properties in the Nationwide League by bagging a hattrick, and all three of his goals were superbly made by 19-year old strike partner Sam Parkin. The youngster, on loan from Chelsea, opened his Lions account on his Football League debut with just under two minutes on the clock and he later added a second before turning provider.

Tonight's visitors are undefeated on the road and new boss Mark McGhee will certainly welcome three points to stay in the top half of the table.



Great Expectations


Following the disappointment of last season's failure to gain promotion, some would argue that McGhee faces a lot of pressure to fufil the expectations of the Lion's followers.

Last season was one that began to show promise for Millwall who mounted a sustained promotion push at the start of the year after a slow start. Neil Harris bagged 25 goals, the first player since Teddy Sheringham to pass the 20 mark, but key defeats left Millwall in 5th place. But Chairman Paphitis has made his intentions clear by sacking the management duo of Stevens and McCleary and the pressure is on for the Scot to succeed.

ark McGhee was installed as the new manager of Millwall two weeks ago and Ray Harford was named as his assistant following his successful spell in taking over team affairs.



Millwall's Mark McGhee



Forty-three year old old McGhee enjoyed an illustrious playing career in Scotland, being a member of the Aberdeen side which challenged the Old Firm dominance and landed the Cup Winner's Cup under Alex Ferguson in 1983. He was capped by his country that year, scoring twice, and later moved on to Celtic, where he played alongside former Lions Boss Mick McCarthy in the 1987-88 double winning side. MGhee's managerial career began at Reading where he built the side which went on to land

the Second Division Championship in 1994-95 and finish as First Division runners-up the following season.

His qualities were spotted by Leicester City who moved in for him during December 1995, before going on to manage Wolverhampton Wanderers for three years. His significant managerial experience will undoubtedly enable the Lions to mount a serious challenge for promotion and a win this evening will certainly set Millwall on their way.



Neil Harris prolific striker

> Netted 25 goals last term and is the first Millwall player to do so since Teddy Sheringham in 1991.

Cost Millwall £30, ooo from non-league Cambridge City in 1998 and has since established himself as one of the most feared marksmen outside of the Premier League. "Bomber", as he is known to the Millwall faithful, is a quick-footed centre forward who is a constant threat to any defence. Opponents find it difficult to mark him as he has good pace, can shoot with either foot and is completely unpredictable.

A number of Premiership clubs have shown interest in him, and if he shows more of the same, it is probably only a matter of time before he moves to the Premiership.

Matt Lawrence educated

Started out as a midfield player and is now predominantly a right back, the position he was assigned to on his New Den arrival in March 2000.

Made a late entry into the professional game with Wycombe Wanderers after taking a degree in American Literature in the United States whilst playing college football over there. The Millwall management had apparently been watching him for some time and they finally got their man.

Matt is adept at nullyfying the threat posed by opposing wingers. He is an excellent reader of the game and strong in the tackle, as well as good in the air. It is his surging runs down the right flank that make him a potent attacking force.



1 Tony Warner



Signed from Liverpool in June 1999 after a lengthy spell as an understudy to David James and Brad Friedel.

Previously gained top level experience with Celtic and Aberdeen whilst on loan in Scotland. Made his Football League debut at the Town in 97/98 season against Bradford City.

3 Bobby Bowry

Made his name initially at Crystal Palace and enjoyed top flight appearances during his spell at Selhurst Park prior to his move across South London. A stylish defender who has worked to adapt his natural game to the cut and thrust of the Second Division. Has become an international with St Kitts.

4 Tim Cahill

Aussie born player who appeared at Wembley at the age of 19 and netted on 20 occassions in his first two seasons since breaking into the senior ranks. Left his native land to become a footballer at the age of 16, a forceful, strong running midfielder who is remarkably good in the air for a player of average height.



5 David Tuttle

Barnsley Centre
back who progressed through

the youth ranks at Spurs alongside Stuart Nethercott, Helped Palace to promotion during his time at Selhurst Park and arrived at Millwall for £200, 000.

10 Christophe Kinet

A £75,000 signing from French club Strasbourg in February 2000, he gained Champions League experience against the likes of Glasgow Rangers and AC Milan prior to his move to England, Injury limited his appearances last term, but this pacey and tricky player is back in the reckoning and is one to watch.

11 Paul Ifill

A central striker blessed with pace and trickery, he netted on 11 occasions last term. Enjoyed his first full season at senior level and this former trainee is one to look out for as the campaign unfolds. Opened his account in the Worthington Cup Second Round tie against Ipswich Town earlier in the month.

12 Paul Moody



Signed from Fulham in July 1999 for £150, 000 and notched 11 goals in 24 starts. A late entrant into pro-

fessional football at 24, when Southampton picked him up from Waterlooville. Moved to Oxford United after a loan spell at Reading, then was snapped up by Kevin Keegan.

15 Stuart Nethercott

Millwall skipper and England Under 21 International who made over 50 appearances for Tottenham Hotspur without establishing himself as a real first choice player. Joined the Lions on a permanent basis in April 1998 after impressing whilston loan. Supporters' club 'Player of the Year' last season.

18 Steven Reid

Former England Under 16 International who made his senior Lions debut at just 17 years of age. Reid is a highly rated youth product who has been used as full back in Reserve outings and may well be able to feature in the Lions defence in the future. Definately a bright prospect at McGhees disposal.

19 Robbie Ryan



Republic of Ireland international who established himself as the regular left back last season, becoming one of

Millwall's most consistent performers. Signed for a bargain £10, 000 from Huddersfield Town in 1998 and is fast becoming one of the finest full backs in the league.

24 Sean Dyce

Back in action after an injury ravaged his first season at the New Den following a £150, ooo move from Bristol City in 1999. Came to prominence with Chesterfield whom he captained in the 1994 FA Cup semi-final where the Spireites were unlucky to lose to Middlesborough in a replay.

26 David Livermore

Secured a £30, 000 move from Arsenal in 1999 following an impressive loan spell. Livermore was a central defender with the Gunners but established himself in the middle of the park upon his New Den arrival. A mature player who is strong in the tackle and has a tireless work rate. Scored the first goal of the Millenium.





Mullery, Marsh, Lawrenson, Best etc. All great players from the past, their achievements on the field stand up on their own, thus, they are qualified to pass comment on the game they have excelled in.

However the another common trait shared by this crew is their ability to turn the knife, criticise and lambast the players of today.

These ex players, once athletic and gifted with a ball at their feet, now seem to get their kicks from laying the boot into what they see as the "under achieving, over hyped and over paid, primadonnas" plying their trade in the Premiership and with three lions on their chests.

Villa boss John Gregory was incensed by Alan Mullery's comments following "Black Wednesday" in Finland. Mullery questioned the players effort and application in an England shirt, hinting they preferred chatting about which wine bar they were gracing in the evening, instead of

discussing zonal marking at set pieces. Of course the trappings of the modern game are far and above what was enjoyed during their playing days, and wages are obscene when weighed up against the performances and abilities of certain players. This influx of crazy money cannot be solely blamed on the players, and who would turn down or shy away from earning a seven-figure salary if it was available?

Certainly not Mullery and co. I believe this is half the problem, explayers appear jealous of the earning potential in the modern day for footballers who in many cases would not be fit to lace their boots. Picking up a few hundred quid a week commenting on a Worthington Cup game on a Tuesday night to make ends meet, whilst nowadays a ten-year Premiership career could set you up for life, must stick in the throat of the class of the seventies.

Whilst agreeing that skill and ability is disproportionate to pay, the

accusation of minimum effort maximum pose is in most cases unfair. I think the majority of professional players will always give their best, in England's case they have been in a rudderless vessel for the last two years, unsure of what was expected of them and the direction ahead.

Anyone who has played the game and retired will tell you the rose tinteds come out and you remember all of the magic moments, and few of the average outings. I personally would have 20 Premiership goals this season if given a chance, "why did he take the keeper on, I would have chipped him from the by-line!!"

I suspect the expert panels on the media have their socks and shinpads on under the desk, kicking every ball as if it were 1971. The enthusiasm and knowledge these people have is valued, their sniping is not. If you haven't got anything nice to say, don't say anything at all!!



Falling From Grace

Swindon aren't the only club to have played in the top flight and been relegated to Division Two...

As a Swindon supporter living in Reading and, more importantly, surrounded by Reading supporters, I am constantly reminded of our meteoric plummet from the Premier League to Division Two.

The fact that Reading never made it into the top flight is not the point, but rather that Swindon, like many clubs in this division, were once playing football with the creme de la creme of British football when now, a trip to Rotherham (no offence intended) is the norm.

With a quick glance at the lower leagues, no less than eight teams, some struggling, some not, played at one stage in their history in the top flight. Near rivals Oxford United spent four years under the guidance of the late Maurice Evans in the old Division One, with Mark Wright in the centre of defence and the prolific John Aldridge up front.

Fellow strugglers Oldham once struck fear into the hearts of all visitors to Boundary Park on their unique plastic pitch. During the four years that followed their promotion in 1994, Oldham, under Joe Royle and later Greame Sharpe were regulars at the foot of the table and always looked destined to go down (a position now occupied by Coventry and Southampton). To their credit, they held out year after year and enjoyed a good cup run along the way.

Delving further into football's intriguing past, one finds Blackpool, now feeling the wrath of Steve McMahon and struggling at the foot of the Nationwide League. A position that is remarkable when

you consider that they were consistent contenders for top spot in the 30's and again in the 60's during the era of Sir Stanley Matthews.

Tonight's visitors Millwall are another club to experience one of their most disappointing periods in recent history. Despite playing in one of the newest stadiums in the division (the New Den replacing its old namesake in 1993), one could understand their disappointment with their present position. Such was the success of the club during the 80's. Millwall formed part of the old Division One and were playing against the likes of Manchester United, Liverpool and Arsenal with Teddy Sheringham and Tony




Cascarino leading the front line. Ten years later the club discover themselves finding it increasingly difficult to achieve such highs, such is the growing gap between the richer clubs and the nearly-rans. But Millwall are not alone. In 1993 under the guidance of Glenn Hoddle, we found ourselves in the remarkable position of facing Liverpool at home early in the season. Forty-two games and 101 goals conceded later, the Town dropped down a league, only to fall deeper into the football wilderness with another swift relegation.


This season's Premiership new boys Manchester City were another club "too good to go down" who struggled to come to terms with one relegation and spent time in Division Two. But if their fall from grace was one of the most eagerly anticipated by the media, then their return to the top flight should be equally charted and an inspiration for us all.

Who would have guessed that in the immediate future, the Maine Road giants would be back in the top half of the Premier League with the former World Player of the Year leading from the front? Manchester City's example must be one which Town must follow, or at least one that we should all believe will happen to our own club.

More importantly, we are not alone in our plight for there is a plethora of clubs "consolidating" in the nether regions of English football. Who knows, one day, Swindon or Millwall could be the dominant force who every one loves to hate showing off their priceless talent in Europe's shop window!



Last month Jon and I travelled out to Faringdon where we had a great afternoon's coaching with the Ferndale Prep school.



Todd Leads by Example

Nick John suggests that some of Town's youngsters should take a leaf out of the gaffer's book...

Any youth or young reserve team players reading this article - take faith in your manager.

Colin Todd firmly believes that if you're good enough, you're old enough. So grab your chance when it comes!

Colin Todd was born in the North-East of England in a hotbed of footballing passion at Chester-Le-Street, just a few miles from his first club Sunderland. Brian Clough, a man of astute footballing insight, was the youth team coach at Roker Park at the time and after Todd made big impressions in the youth side, he went on to make his first team debut at the tender age of 17.

Despite Sunderland struggling, Todd was looking impressive and was soon picked for the outdated England Under 23 side. With Sunderland looking a doomed side he was plucked from the pitfalls of relegation by a certain Mr Clough, who himself had moved on to manage Derby County. The fee was

£170,000, a huge amount in the early 1970's. Undeterred by expectancy, Colin Todd went on to oust the current wing half, Dave Mackay and forge the outstanding central defensive partnership of the decade with Roy McFarland.

Mackay's next association with ourselves at the County Ground was as manager in a short period at the beginning of the season 1972/73. He is best forgotten for his unforgivable transfer of boyhood hero Don Rogers to Crystal Palace. Colin Todd's connection with the County Ground, the previous season was to bring happier memories. He captained the England Under 23's against the Welsh on a wet and windy Wednesday evening - 5th January 1972.

Half-time saw the introduction of Andy Williams replacing David Duke. The second half was played almost entirely in Bristol Rovers half. But Swindon failed to create any clear cut chances. In the 90th minute Swindon got a consolation goal, when new father, Robertson scored from the penalty spot.





We shouldn't be too despondent because there is no way that Bristol Rovers were that much better than us and the score did flatter them so we just have to bounce back and get playing again and hopefully you can stick by us. Obviously I will be hoping to figure in the game but I didn't really have enough time to prove myself on Saturday and I think I am a little way off where I would look to be in terms of fitness.

It has been a while since I have played a string of games and that's all I want to do. For the time being I just hope we can turn that corner and when we do, it should be very exciting!



The confidence of winning matches would build and before you know it they could be challenging for the play-offs. It would be fantastic for this club to taste success again after so many years of struggle. Isn't it easy to get carried away. Good job these managers are there to keep our feet on the ground.







Football Programmes Down The Years:











A series of articles by the Editor of PROGRAMME MONTHLY & FOOTBALL COLLECTABLE magazine, describing how programmes have changed over a century and a quarter of Association Football.

No. Wembley - and the advent of Big Match Programmes

We have previously noted that the FA were reluctant to get involved in programme production for FA Cup Finals, but that changed in 1923 when Wembley opened, albeit the publishers of Cup Final and International issues from that venue were the stadium authorities themselves, with FA approval.

The scale and design of these programmes matched that of the venue. For the first time, colour appeared on British programme covers, and the contents were more substantial with more photographs.

Wembley opened with the famous 1923 Cup Final, and the programme for that fixture comprised 28 pages, the most pages published to that date. It should be noted, in passing, that this truly is the "Penny Black" of programme collecting - it is the most famous item, but by no means the rarest nor most expensive nor coveted.

Host clubs continued to issue programmes for Cup semi finals and international and representative matches played at their grounds (until the 1950's the majority of England international matches were played on club grounds). Hitherto, the clubs had merely issued similar, if not identical, programmes to their standard League issues, but the example shown by Wembley spurred them into making a special effort for the big games entrusted to their care.

An example of this is Chelsea, who maintained the same four or eight page, blue print on white paper, programme style until after the Second World War. In October 1934, they staged the English League v Scottish League match at Stamford Bridge and issued a special programme comprising the normal 8 pages, but with photographs on the centre and front pages, and red print as well as the standard blue on the front cover. The price remained at

the standard 2d. Wembley programmes were not only the first to use full colour, but they also saw a rich variety of programme designs. All of the pre-Second World War covers relied on sketches and graphics, with photographs used sparingly, and some of the full colour sketches were very attractive indeed. The example set by Wembley ensured that, from then on, big match programmes would invariably fit the occasion they sought to represent, and programme buyers could anticipate something superior to the normal League fare.


























Micky Hazard always knew his way around the football pitch; call it a great sense of direction. Hence why the little Geordie now finds himself as a cabbie (rumour has it) - in London.

It would appear as though the little Geordie has adapted his skills in a new walk of life, opting instead for a black cab instead of the old leather football boots.

But if being able to tell a good story is part and parcel of the job, then there is probably no-one better than Micky Hazard, who certainly has a few footballing tales to tell, especially from his days at the County Ground.

Micky Hazard joined the Town in 1990 from Pompey shortly after the play-off final. Three years later he was reunited with his old pal, Glenn Hoddle, whom he had shared many happy memories with at Spurs. At Spurs, Hazard was a cup winner both home and abroad, perhaps his greatest moment a UEFA Cup win in 1984 in which Spurs won on penalties.

His time at Swindon was very settled. He appeared both happy here and also played some of his best football. Described as a gifted creative player, Hazard had the ability to spray pin-point passes around in the same vein as his playing partner and player-manager. One football magazine in 1992 even listed Hazard at the top of their midfield list for the season of 92/93.

Micky played an instrumental part in Swindon's promotion season. Having turned down a move back to his native Sunderland, he went on to orchestrate the Town midfield. Yet, such was the competition for places, that he had to settle for a place on the bench towards the end of the season.

Still, Hazard's talent was recognised by other players in the division and he was included in the PFA Division One team. Even Ossie Ardiles, who at the time was managing West Brom, wanted his' services at the Hawthorns but a rumoured deal of £100, 000 did not materialise. Hazard made his footballing debut

in 1980, but it is testament to his enthusiasm and commitment that he was still playing at a high level at the age of 34. It is amazing to think that during our promotion season, he had been on top of his game at the highest levels for over thirteen years exerting a great deal of influence and bewildering opposing defences with laser-like passes."

Hazard, like many players approaching the end of their careers, has turned his attention to life outside football. But the old pass master is still plying his trade as part of the Tottenham Hotspur Senior five-a-side team. Along side the likes of Clive Allen and Glenn Hoddle, Hazard is still proving that he was, and still is, one of the most skillful players of his generation, certainly one of the most impressive midfielders to don the red and white shirt.

You can watch Micky Hazard at next week's Charity game, we will certainly be expecting the Geordie to be floating around the middle of the park, bossing the youngsters!




Kinnear Joins the Manor

Arsenal had to play 40-year-old John Lukic in the Champions' League game against Lazio this week while David Seaman and Alex



COLCHESTER UNITED boss Steve Whitton has made his third signing of recent weeks by adding Millwall defender Scott Fitzgerald.



The second half was only three minutes old when winger Thom curled a shot over the defenders to give Swindon the lead. The Robins increased their lead five minutes later when a clever run by Bertie Denyer set up Morris who had no trouble in angling his shot wide of the keeper. There was some amusement in the crowd when Morris, looking for his 12th goal of

the season, tried a shot from 40yards. This went well wide but two more efforts by swindon's leading marksman of all time went very close. The Adver reporter felt both teams had done well to produce a spirited match although the strong wind meant that good football was limited and the closing stages were somewhat boring as the Millwall backs were just kicking for touch. The final minutes produced a third goal for swindon by Denyer who beat three or four men before shooting home. The victory left Swindon in second place in the league just behind Bristol City who clung on to top spot by virtue of a 5-0 victory at Eastville in the Bristol derby match. Millwall were left in sixth place on 12 points.


scored 47 goals during the season which is still a club record.





Midfielder Hewlett Sidelined...



Matty Hewlett has now had the anthroscapy on his left knee.

The cartilage was trimmed and the joint cleaned out. It was what we expected and he'll probably be out of action for 6 to 10 weeks. He seems fairly comfortable and has gone home to rest for a few days but he still has a few exercises to do to keep it moving.

What happens is that the meniscus sit on the tibia and that is what the femur swivels on and acts like a shock absorber. Sometimes if there is a severe rotary movement, together with some force upon the knee, usually by a players boot, it can just nip them and they can become torn. The knee is a relatively unstable joint anyway just by the way we are made and if you nip or tear one of these cartilige it can sometimes become locked and you

can't get the knee fully extended. It is a situation that is very difficult to leave with professional footballers. Now it is better to get straight in there and trim it up and rehabilitate it by way of leg strength. There are extremely good recovery rates now and they certainly don't take out the entire cartilige like they used to, they just trim the effected part up and then get their quadracepts and other muscles that work on the knee nice and strong.


It will be Monday (23rd) or Tuesday before we start working on him. We'll start in the swimming pool and go from there.

Last week's game against Swansea at the Vetch Field was the first game Hewlett has missed since the start of the season and his battling presence was sorely missed. Todd said "He has been one of our better players this season and it's a blow for us." You make me feel naked Undressing me with your eyes You make me feel naked Ohhh, hypnotised








Notts County have, like us, rung the changes throughout the club in order to improve on last seasons disappointing season.


Someone must really upset the bulky Serb before he sets foot on the field because he seems to spend his entire career attempting to exact revenge on anyone who stands in his way. Patrick Vieira was the unwitting victim on Wednesday and although none of us would count dear old Paddy as an angel he was certainly the innocent party in this unsavoury Champions League encounter. Racial abuse from the crowd is deplorable in any context but when an opposing player

initiates the majority of the insults and comments then it is completely inexcusable. Patrick Vieira later claimed that 'You could see in his eyes that he was really thinking about what he said' and having viewed Mihaijlovic at close quarters during his calamitous Euro 2000 campaign it is not hard to believe.

Against Slovenia, Yugoslavia were 3o down and seemingly out, following Mihaijlovic's dismissal they fought back to draw a pulsating game 3-3. Certainly it seems that this talented footballer is more a danger to himself than the opposition and his performances during Euro 2000 certainly seem to bare this out. One can only hope that UEFA take the correct action after the incidents in Rome and come down hard on a player that many admire for his technical capabilities but abhor for his outwardly aggressive manner. Not that Mihaijlovic was the only

guilty party in Wednesday's Roman war. Gilles Grimandi was also caught aiming a punch at Diego Simeone and judging by the result, the combative Argentinean was left needing six stitches to a head wound, Grimandi could very well be France's best chance of a boxing medal in Athens 2004. 

Bournemouth will be boosted by the news that the Borough Council has pledged their support for a new stadium. Not only that, but skipper Eddie Howe returns for tonights game.








Jocky Scott has a selection headache. Big Norwegian Anders Jacobsen is the main cause of his problem, having impressed after originally coming in as a cover against Bury.
