



What a delight to hear the massed bank of Town fans singing their hearts out after last Saturday's 1 - 0 win at Northampton.


After such a traumatic season to date it is always so warming to see such a hardcore of fans willing to spend their hard earned money travelling all over the country to watch their team play.


Furthermore, Andy King told another Aussie trialist, Clayton Zane, that he would not be joining Town after spending several days with the squad.

I have said for a long time now that we will find it easier to compete if we can get ourselves ahead in games instead of going behind.

Against Stoke we went behind early on and we struggled to get back into the game. In contrast, last week we went a goal up and the

confidence that resulted from taking that lead was there for all to see. When you go a goal up, you tend to find that little extra yard all over the pitch, players have that extra desire and things start going for you.

We played particularly well in the first half and in the second, as you would expect, we had to defend and we did so exceptionally well.



against a good side and in difficult circumstances.

After the Stoke game we realised that we had to change a couple of things and fortunately it paid off.

Malcolm and I had a long hard think about what had been going wrong and when things do work, it can be very rewarding. We wanted a clean sheet and a battling performance with a lot of effort and we got it from the lads. It was such a good feeling to win, I could even enjoy Sunday!

Gary Alexander's performance was exceptional. For a young lad to play as a lone striker like he did is



magnificent. It is a role he revelled in at Exeter and he enjoyed it last week, finding himself in the right place at the right time to get on the score sheet. The nice thing was that several players had broken with him and any of them could have scored, it just goes to show how committed the lads were and I hope that we can show more of that today. But we will not be taking anything for granted. There is still room for improvement and we will be striving to do that against our opponents today.

The draw against Gateshead reminds me of my time at Sunderland - for a long while I stayed in the town and one of my first jobs under Peter Reid was to go and watch a young lad playing for Gateshead against Woking in the Vauxhall Conference. Last week I visited Peter Reid and some of my old friends and enjoyed watching their win against Everton. Another of my old friends, Paul Bracewell (now at Halifax), knows just how tough it will be against Gateshead with the Unibond side getting a tremendous result at the Shay in the last round.

We can't afford to take anything for granted today. You only have to look at results in the last round to see how good some of the non-league clubs are and it shows how the divide between the Football League

and non-league sides is closing. Gateshead are a club with league history and league aspirations and they have a large number of exprofessionals in their ranks. They are a good footballing side and it will be their cup final. We have to make sure that we match their enthusiasm and attitude and we will be striving to play like we did last week.

Finally, may I wish a warm welcome to the Directors, players and supporters of Gateshead Football Club who have travelled a long way to be here today.

Gateshead Football Club 2000/2001



The Tynesiders

Three major transformations in a turbulent, yet occasionally distinguished 70-year history, have created today's visitors Gateshead Football Club.

Originally formed in 1930, Gateshead Association Football Club endured 43 turbulent years of dismissals, take-overs and replacements. In that period the club had spent several years playing league football but were removed in favour of Peterborough United having applied for re-election.

Gateshead Town replaced the previous club but astonishingly history repeated itself when South Shields (who had moved to their ground in 1930 to form the club) moved to Gateshead's International

Stadium and the club went under the guile of Gateshead United. However, after only three years of operation, the club disbanded - the club's third major body-blow in less than 20 years.

The club returned in emphatic fashion under the name of Gateshead FC when they won the North Premier League championship in 1983 with a record number of points and goals. The club then became the perennial strugglers of the Vauxhall Conference until 1998 when they were relegated back into the pyramid of regional football. Having finished 3rd and 5th in the last two seasons, the club are looking to regain their league status.

Giant Killers

Gateshead FC are no strangers to FA Cup giant killing.

The club's finest hour came in 1953 when, after beating Liverpool, they progressed to the quarter-finals where they were knocked out by a Nat Lofthouse goal for Bolton Wanderers. In the 1970's the

Tynesiders accounted for Football League Clubs Grimsby Town and Crewe Alexandra and were two games away from Wembley in the FA Trophy (four times) in the 90's. Gateshead made it to this year's second round having beaten third division Halifax Town 2-0 with goals from Hall and Dalton.

Manager of Gateshead in the summer of 1998, taking charge at the International Stadium after holding a similar position at North East neighbours Spennymoor United.

Matt played most of his football career in Australia, representing Western Australia and featuring twice for the national side after taking out citizenship.


He returned to the United Kingdom at the end of the eighties and spent a short spell at home town club Barryhill before his seven year stint at Spennymoor United.

Here he helped the club to two promotions and 11 trophy wins as both player and Manager.

4 Graham Pepper

Graham started his career at Newcastle United juniors before arriving at Spennymoor United via a spell at Darlington where he featured briefly in the side that reached the third division play-offs. Joined the Tynesiders in 1998, but has been sidelined much of the last two seasons because of injury.

6 Tony Hall

Central defender, who returned for his second spell at Gateshead from Irish club Kilkenny United towards the end of the 1998/99 season. Hall started his career at Middlesbrough before joining Tranmere and Hartlepool. A time at East Fife preceded his first spell at Gateshead before a return to the Scottish League with Berwick Rangers.

8 Steve Bowey



Highly rated 26 year old left sided midfielder signed from second division Bristol Rovers in March 1997.

Locally born, Steve featured for Army and Combined Services sides during a three-year stint in the services. He was Gateshead's top scorer in his first season with fourteen goals.

9 Steve Preen

Steve is a powerful forward who finished last season as the club's top goal scorer. He joined Queen of the South just after the start of the current season but recently left the Dumfries based club to rejoin the Tynesiders for a second spell.

10 Garath McAlindon

22-year-old striker started his career with Newcastle United before spending three seasons at Carlisle United where he scored 10 goals in 70 appearances. Joined the Tynesiders in February 2000 on loan from Scarborough where he had notched 4 goals in 17 games.

15 David Tremble

David is on his second spell at Gateshead following a run of nine games last season on loan from Conference outfit Scarborough. He is a 20-year-old former Newcastle United junior and played for Cork City earlier in the season before receiving his international clearance enabling his return to the Tynesiders.

14 Paul Thompson

Striker or midfielder who returned for his second spell at the International Stadium on loan from Stevenage in March 1999 before re-signing at the start of last season. The former Hartlepool player featured in the epic FA Cup games against Newcastle United three seasons ago.

12 Simon Bates

Simon is a former Spennymoor United central midfielder who joined the Tynesiders towards the end of season 1999/00.







This game could potentially have been quite difficult for both sides, with the Luton team bus getting caught for five hours on the M4!

Both sets of players have to wait around for long periods and so it would have been easy for either side to get caught out early on. Thankfully we played very well and won the game 4-2. Credit must go to both sets of players because despite the long wait, they managed to produce a very good game. Luton brought a very strong side with them and we also managed to get a strong side together, although we lost three players to injury including Graz (who is receiving treatment) and Steve Cowe, who picked up a thigh strain. Steve scored two before coming off and he played very well, probably the pick of the team if I had to choose somebody. More importantly we played very well as a team. Gareth Hall had a good game in midfield and David Duke adapted to his role at left-wingback.

Overall I think we played quite well defensively although it was disappointing to let in two sloppy goals, especially as we were three nil up and 4-1 up respectively. You always want to keep clean sheets and so it was disappointing to concede two but overall, I think we were very tight as a unit.


To score four at the other end against a team like Luton was particularly pleasing. We are an attacking team and like to go forward in numbers to create chances. During the Cambridge game we didn't really play as well but still managed to create chances, but that just highlights the problem we have as a reserve team. We sometimes lose a bit of impetus because we play one week and then go another two or three without a game. As a consequence I have tried to bring fixtures forward and keep the momentum going of having one game a week. It isn't easy but we have tried to pack in as many games before Christmas as we can, therefore we have played a couple of extra games than other sides, but we are still top of the league. I think it is very important to have regular games to keep the fitness up, but the players have done everything I have asked of them and I have been really pleased. We have only lost three games and in all fairness, I don't think we deserved to lose those with perhaps the exception of Norwich and so we are in a nice situation.

Lightbourne took full advantage of some sloppy Robins defending to climb highest to direct his header beyond Griemink. On 77 minutes Griemink sliced a clearance straight to the on-rushing Lightbourne, who scored with ease.

NOBODY could have left the County Ground at 4.50 on Saturday afternoon unaware of the enormous task which faces Andy King and his players this season.

Stoke were awarded a corner on the left which was swung in by Henrik Risom, Dryden, in an attempt to clear the ball, headed the ball into his own net. Kyle Lightborne got the second from another corner and gave the Swindon keeper no chance with a well-placed header. Twelve minutes from the end Davis passed back to Griemink, but the goalkeeper mis-kicked the ball into the air and it fell to Lightborne five yards away, who smashed it home.

Henrik Risom briefly grabbed centre stage as City rampaged into an early two-goal lead here at the County Ground this afternoon.

It was Risom's left-wing corner in the seventh minute which launched Stoke on their way - the ball striking the hapless Dryden and crossing the line at the far post. Lightbourne doubled the lead in the 11th minute when he applied the vital touch from Risom's corner. The points were safely in the bag when a skewed clearance found its way to Lightborne who couldn't miss the chance to bag his second in the 77th minute.

have a new-look defence but even so, you don't expect to go two down in the first fifteen minutes."

Andy King reflects on his side's defensive frailties following the poor 3-0 home defeat by Stoke City.




"We had some chances early and took them, after that we could afford to sit back a little bit but the third goal really killed it


This week we have Michael Scott 'Showing His Colours' in Peru.





Matches from Memory

Grantham is perhaps more famous as the birthplace of a grocer's daughter than for its football team, but twice in the 1960's, Grantham were to face Swindon in the FA Cup.

In 1965 Swindon had enjoyed a comfortable 6-1 win and, when they travelled to Lincolnshire for a second round clash three years later, they were firm favourites.

Flying high in the Third Division, Town were also just one step away from Wembley in the League Cup competition.

A midweek match in this competition had left Swindon with a number of injuries that led to a re-shuffle of the team. Don Heath's injury led to Don Rogers switching from left to right wing, while an injury to Peter Noble led to the inclusion of Willie Penman. Perhaps the most famous name in the Grantham line up was Terry Bly, who had set a Fourth Division record with 52 goals in a season for Peterborough earlier in his career.

The height of Grantham's ambition appeared to be a lucrative replay at the County Ground and with Swindon seemingly suffering a hang over from the Burnley match, it looked as though they might well achieve it. Despite having the advantage of the slope and nearly all the play, Swindon failed to score in the first half.

This was largely due to the excellent form of goalkeeper Chris Gardiner, who had been discovered playing park football a year before. The 20-year-old dealt competently with a stream of crosses from both right and left as well as some testing shots. The nearest Swindon came to scoring in the first period was when Frank Burrows headed a John Smith

corner goalwards but the diving Gardiner clung on to it at the second attempt.

The second half was just over ten minutes old when Willie Penman gathered the ball on the half way line and a brilliant run saw him ghost past four defenders and smash home a shot which gave the keeper no chance. However, Swindon's joy was short lived as a linesman's flag caused the referee to reverse his original decision to allow what seemed a perfectly fair goal.

Don Rogers switched to the left but with Swindon increasingly desperate to avoid the further fixture that would result from a draw they at times seemed over-anxious, highlighted when Smith's cross was missed by Gardiner only to bounce between the legs of Jones and Penman and out of play when a little composure might have brought the all-important goal.

The gallant resistance of Grantham's 'gingerbreads' was finally broken in the 84th minute when a Rogers' cross was flicked on by Roger Smart



to Chris Jones who smacked it home. A second goal followed a minute later when a fierce shot by Rogers was blocked by Gardiner, but fell to John Smith who sealed Swindon's victory.

Swindon's FA Cup run was to end in the following round with a 2-0 defeat at home to Southend, but the League Cup was to be won by Town as was promotion in the club's most successful season.



After a distinguished professional career spanning over 15 years and nearly 500 first-team appearances, former Town defender Jon Gittens now plays for non-league giantkillers Nuneaton Borough.

Jon could be in action today for Nuneaton as they line-up against another Second Division club, this time away at Bournemouth's Dean Court. Today's game comes as a result of their 1-0 shock defeat of our opponents two weeks ago, Stoke City. After an impressive 0-0 draw at the Britannia Stadium, the Nationwide Conference side pulled off one of the shocks of the round with a late winner from Mark McGregor.

The vastly experienced defender, now 36, played in the Premiership for Middlesbrough and in the old First Division for Southampton. But he is best-known for success here at the Town under the management of Lou Macari and later, Ossie Ardiles.


It was Lou Macari who signed Gittens from the Saints in 1987 for a bargain fee of £40,000. He eventually went on to play nearly 160 games before he was sold back to the south-coast club for ten times the fee four years later.

Born in Birmingham, Gittens' career started at local club Paget Rangers before he was spotted by Southampton. His first spell at the Dell lasted for over two years before he switched to the County Ground for the first time. It was here that he established a reputation as one of the strongest defenders outside of the top flight his composure and awareness the trademark of his game.

Following his four years at Swindon, his progress was monitored by many of the big clubs and so it came as a surprise when he returned to his former club Southampton in 1991.

In 1992 he moved to Ayresome Park and spent a year with Middlesbrough before joining Portsmouth on a free transfer. After nearly 100 appearances for Pompey he joined Torquay in 1998, and finally Exeter two years later before he was released by boss Noel Blake.

Gittens, having joined Nuneaton last summer, was a regular at the club up until a couple of week's ago when he was left out against Hednesford Town. But with his experience and defensive capabilites, it can only be a matter of time before he is included again, maybe even today against Bournemouth.



Swindon Town 2000

Leapfrogging it's way ahead of Italy's kit of the 80's is Town's new, dark blue away strip.

. Having just been released in time for Christmas, the blue and white strip is arguably (in my opinion) one of the best away kits the club has had in recent years. Worn for the first time at Port Vale, this strip ranks alongside all of the classics, despite having none of the usual attributes that a retro kit possesses: simplicity, plainness and figure hugging. Instead, it is an amalgamation of dark blue and white in a similar design to the home kit, but with a wider strip of white over the arms that provides a nice, stark contrast.

Swindon's away kit has come a long way in the last decade. In 1993's promotion campaign Town sported a green and white montage design

before the Brazil coloured yellow and blue strip made an appearance, bringing us little luck in the Premier League. Under Steve McMahon the club changed colours again with a Wycombe look-a-like blue and black halved shirt. Last season's away shirt is nearer the mark of this year's colour and Town have stuck with the dark blue.

Ajax 1970's

The Ajax shirt of the 1970's epitomises the popular collection of 'retro' shirts.

It is plain and simple, something we like in a shirt as you may notice over the next couple of pages! There is something about plain white shirts that creates a

'no-nonsense' appearance aka Leeds, Spurs etc (or perhaps it was the likes of Bremner and Mackay in them), but the Ajax shirt has the classic red band that runs down the middle of the shirt to provide its authentic look.

Most of the shirts featured in this article were worn by their respective clubs in the most successful period in their history. Ajax are no different. In the strip pictured here, they won the European Cup three years in a row, the Supercup in 1972 and the World Club Cup in the same year.





3 Juventus 1974

Believe it or not, the black and white of Juventus was based on Notts County's strip when the club's president went to watch them but, somewhere along the line, they managed to make a better job of it.

When Juventus were inaugurated by a group of students, the club colour Was red. Now, the black and white stripes have become synonymous with Juve and Italian football.

The Juve kit is everything that Newcastle et al isn't, classy and stylish - the reason being that the stripes are thinner and there are more of them which just looks better than fewer, thicker stripes. The only problem being that when a number was placed on the back, that it was difficult for commentators and suppporters

alike to distinguish who was who. There is no mistaking Michel Platini though, who is seen here modelling the kit in league action.

Juve were another club to win pretty much everything, from the European Cup to the Super Cup in 1984 and 1985.

Brazil 1970

There is something about the yellow and blue of Brazil that creates a sense of awe and bewilderment whenever you see it.

But the reason for the inclusion of the 1970 strip in this week's five of the best is because it is the first Brazilian kit to be seen on colour television and was also worn by, arguably, the greatest Brazilian side of all time. The 1970 World Cup was the first major football tournament to be shown on colour television and the impact of Brazil's kit was remarkable. Even to the present day, the associations with the yellow and blue are numerous; flambouyancy, dedication, skill etc.

Brazil have stayed true to tradition throughout the years, but the difference between today's strip and that of Pele's era, is that there are no commercial tags emblazoned across the front - 'simplicity a virtue', shall we say.

Such was the impact of this kit on world football that it was copied by many teams including ourselves in 1994 (away kit) and Crystal Palace (away strip) - not quite with the same effect but still, there will always be a shiver sent down the spine when the colours appear from the players' tunnel.

This particular year and subsequent World Cup highlighted a large number of popular kits such as Italy's, but none had the impact or presence of Brazil's 'golden' shirt.

Holland 1974

This week's winner is the Dutch kit as worn by Johan Cruyff (pictured right) in the 1974 World Cup (notice how all of the best kits have come from the same era!).


Orange is just one of those colours that doesn't appear on football kits for one reason or another and there are very few clubs who have carried it off successfully.

In the 70's Holland were a major footballing force and so the orange kit was, and still is, seen as a foreboding sign and encapsulated the slogan, 'Total Football" that was attributed to the football masterminded by Cruyff and his team mates.

Once again, like Brazil's, the kit of 1974 was simple, with no Nike logo's to be seen and instead, a large Dutch emblem - slightly more sentimental and patriotic than a tick. Holland went on to lose the final in 1974 to Germany having beaten Argentina in the semi-final but, if there was a competition for the greatest kit, they would have won by a mile.

Furthermore, such is the nature of the fans in Holland, that when any Dutch game is televised, all that can be seen is a sea of orange throughout the stadium that can only help to intimidate the opposition, and the oppositions' supporters - no other kit in the world has the same effect.

With the advent of Euro 2000 being held in Holland, the Dutch national side reverted back to a similar, more traditional kit. Although a brighter shade of orange, Holland moved away from their 'busier' designs back to the plain and simple orange and black - one of the defining images of the tournament.






V Rotherham United Football Club

Bullock is not the only man to be catching the eye with goalkeeper Paddy Kenny receiving attention from Arsenal, Everton and Liverpool. If Manager Andy Preece can keep hold of his star players then the club could experience exciting times, with an alleged take-over on the cards by a Norwegian businessman. An injection of cash would be appreciated by Preece who has also had to manage on a limited amount of money. Town should also cast a wary eye over striker Adrian Littlejohn, having scored two in the last three games.

A series of articles by the Editor of PROGRAMME MONTHLY & FOOTBALL COLLECTABLE magazine, describing how programmes have changed over a century and a quarter of Association Football.

No. 13 Post War Penny Dreadfuls

The rationing and restriction of wartime that had forced clubs to abandon their 16-24 page programmes in favour of single sheet/4 page pullouts, provided ample excuse for those clubs to continue neglecting their programmes in the 50's.

Even Tottenham Hotspur, a club with a big stature, persisted with a 4 page (folded - albeit large sheet) programme up to and including their double winning 1960-61 season. Furthermore, there were no advertisements in the Spurs' (or any other London club) programme, therefore its content was no worse than the advertladen 8 or 12 page programmes issued by other clubs - highlighting the general poor standard and reluctance of clubs to improve their programmes when paper shortages and rationing were lifted.

Another successful team of the decade, Wolves, went through the 1950's with no more than 8 page

programmes. Nevertheless they were brightly coloured and contained a substantial article by a journalist in the centre pages but in modern eyes, this programme was considered to be inadequate, especially coming from such a major force in the game. Sheffield Wednesday issued only 8 page programmes in 1950 and - typically were still doing so ten years later.

Yet this unsatisfactory state of affairs was not just applicable to the well-supported clubs of the First Division, but also the perennial strugglers in the two regionalised Third Divisions. Irrespective of crowd attendance, the poor standard of football programmes was widespread and existed from the lower regions to the higher echelons of football hierarchy. The massive crowds who watched championship winners such as Liverpool, Portsmouth, Tottenham and Wolves were subjected to no better programmes than those issued by York, Accrington Stanley,

New Brighton, Bradford City and Halifax, who in the same period had to apply for re-election to the League. Programmes were in a vicious circle - few supporters bought them because they were poor value for money and because of low sales, clubs refused to devote more time and expense to what seemed to be more of an obligation than a benefit. Indeed, many, including programme buyers, regarded their worth in terms of the team selections and half-time scoreboards. Little wonder that few other features were included by the vast majority of League clubs in the 1940's and 1950's.

As always, there were oasis in this desert of mediocrity, notably some first class programmes from a couple of London clubs, which will be explored in the next instalment.







Sadly, football lost another legend last week with the demise of Len Shackleton at the age of 78. He was a truly larger-than-life figure in the game during the 'golden years' of post war British football alongside other greats of the time such as Stanley Matthews, Jackie Milburn and Tom Finney.

Leonard Francis Shackleton was born in Bradford on May 3rd, 1922. He began his career on the ground staff at Arsenal and signed professional forms for Bradford Park Avenue in December 1940. He moved to Newcastle for £13,000 in October 1946 and, in February 1948, he signed for Sunderland for a then record fee of £20,050 - a move that would bring civil war to the northeast these days. Just imagine the reaction today if Alan Shearer was transferred to The Stadium Of Light!

An injury ended his career in 1957 but by then he had become a colossus bestriding the British game. A wonderfully gifted inside forward, on his Newcastle debut he scored six goals in a 13-o win over Newport County and the legend was born.

His enormous sense of humour endeared him to the nation and stories, many probably apocryphal, about his feats and antics abound but many are authentic. Such were his ball-skills that he would pass it to a colleague by rebounding it off a touchline flag pole. On one occasion he asked to take a penalty and, with his back to the goal, back-heeled the ball into the net. On another, when in possession of the ball in midfield, he sat on it! When the referee asked him what was wrong he replied "nothing", got up and carried on. Famously, he caused a

huge furore when his autobiography
'The Clown Prince of Soccer' (as he
was known throughout his career)
was published, for it contained the
headline "The average club
director's knowledge of football"
at the top of a blank page!

In all he made 384 league appearances scoring 128 goals but, astonishingly, he only played for England on a meagre five occasions. Presumably the powers-that-be did not appreciate his sparkling wit and his antics on and off the field. A true Corinthian, we will not see his like again. The game is becoming cynical, egodriven and obsessed with greed. He will be sadly missed, especially by those of us who had the privilege of watching him play.
