





There is a saying in football that victory breeds confidence and the past couple of week's here at the County Ground have certainly been a major confidence booster.


The much needed victory over Bury in our last League match at home gave everyone a big lift. That was followed by a terrific LDV Vans Trophy win over Wycombe Wanderers. Wycombe boss Lawrie Sanchez put out a near full-strength

side for the game believing he had a chance of getting some success in this year's competition. That feeling was quickly snuffed out by Gary Alexander's two-goal salvo.

The decision to open only the Arkell's Stand on the evening proved popular as it helped to create a great atmosphere in the ground. We did not expect more than 2.000 for the game but over 3,200 turned up which caused some queuing to get in as kick-off approached.

I have received a couple of letters about this and I can only apologise if it caused anyone a problem. About 750 extra fans turned up for the game fifteen minutes prior to kick-off and there was a delay in opening more gates. I have spoken to the key staff at the club and we will endeavour to improve on this as I believe it is unacceptable to ask our customers to have to wait to gain entrance - especially as it meant that many missed the opening goal. I am also aware of a problem in seating everyone once inside and I have again spoken to key staff about a better 'customer care' approach in dealing with this in the future.

The Wycombe victory gives us the opportunity to travel again to Essex on a Tuesday evening for a game - let's hope we do not suffer the same fate as our latest visit when the game against Colchester United was called off very late. The ticket prices for this



game are again very competitively priced at £10 for adults and just £1 for children. I know it is a long way to travel on a Tuesday evening but the lads would really appreciate your support. The run was extended by an


excellent display at Wrexham last weekend and once again I have to applaud the small but very noisy band of Town supporters who made the long trek north.

Today sees us hosting another derby game - this time against Bristol City. The fortunes of both clubs have differed since we last met at Ashton Gate in early September. After a series of postponements we got a much-needed win against Bury, not only did we get three points but we also played very well, battled hard and created chances. To continue that form the following Tuesday in the LDV Trophy was very pleasing.

The side that faced Sanchez's side had changed from the team that beat Bury but the system stayed the same and we showed the same guile and desire, I was especially pleased with Gary Alexander who scored an impressive brace.

Gary has struggled to score this season and as a result he has taken a lot of stick from myself and the fans. At the end of the day the lad is only twenty-one and he has had to come into a struggling side where he has perhaps not been receiving the ideal service.

He has worked very hard on his game and hopefully those two goals will give him the confidence to go and score more goals. He could have scored a couple on Sunday against Wrexham, he didn't get on the score sheet but he did get in goal-scoring positions which is promising. May I wish Danny Wilson, his management team, directors, players and supporters a warm welcome to Swindon today. From all accounts they are bringing a large number of supporters with them, so let's get behind our lads again and continue this good run of form.






Today we welcome old rivals Bristol



Rudyard Kipling must have had Bristol City supporters in mind when he wrote about learning to treat triumph and disaster in the same way.


City supporters - at least those over 35 or so - have had to do just that as City hit the heights of the old First Division for four years in the late seventies, before plummeting to the lower reaches of the old Fourth Division within three years. Since then, City supporters have had their hopes raised (successive Wembley finals in the eighties, promotion to the old Second Division in 1990 and the new First Division in 1998), only for them to be even more quickly dashed (relegation to the new Second Division in 1995 and 1999). It is not surprising then that more experienced City watchers view the

signs of progress in the last twelve months with some caution. But signs of progress there undoubtedly are. After the managerial merry-go-round of the last three years, City seem to have found a gem in Danny Wilson. The current team has a good shape, plays good passing football, can dig in when necessary and contains a good balance of youth and experience. Academy youngsters blooded in the second half of last season - like Simon Clist, Aaron Brown, Matty Hill, Kevin Amankwah and Joe Burnell, all aged 20 or less have secured their places in the squad, where they line up alongside more experienced players like Keith Millen, Brian Tinnion, Tony Thorpe and Lee Peacock.

Meet Danny Wilson




Danny was previously at Barnsley whom he guided into the Premiership for the first time in the club's history in 1997, only to see them relegated after only one season. The side's attractive passing style of play won them many admirers however, and he was appointed as manager at Sheffield Wednesday in July 1998. Wilson took the Yorkshire giants to 12th in the Premiership during his

first season but was dismissed shortly before the club were relegated last season. As a player Danny was capped 24 times by Northern Ireland and won League Cup winners' medals with Luton Town in 1988 and Wednesday in 1991.

He also played for Bury, Chesterfield, Nottingham Forest, Scunthorpe United, Brighton & Hove Albion and Barnsley in a League career spanning 18 years and 626 appearances (scoring 95 goals) before retiring to become Barnsley's full-time boss in 1997.



9 Peter Beadle



Well-travelled striker who arrived at Ashton Gate from Notts County in a £200,000 deal in November 1999.

Scored ten goals in City's colours last season. Has also appeared for Gillingham, Bournemouth, Southend, Watford, Bristol Rovers and Port Vale.

11 Brian Tinnion

Cultured left-footed midfielder who is currently City's longest-serving player. Has been a major member of the first-team since a £180,000 move from Bradford City in 1993. Has been influential since reverting to a central midfield role under Danny Wilson.

14 Steve Phillips

Goalkeeper who joined City in November 1996 from non-league side Paulton Rovers. A good shotstopper, he made steady progress at Ashton Gate under goalkeeping coach Mike Gibson and earned his first team debut in December 1998. Played a total of 16 games in Division One two years ago.

16 Lee Peacock



Powerful striker who became City's third most expensive signing ever when he arrived from

Manchester City in a £600,000 deal in August 2000. Began his career as a trainee at Carlisle United before moving to Mansfield Town where he was a prolific scorer for The Stags in Division Three.

22 Aaron Brown

Skillful left-footed midfielder who is a product of City's Academy. Made his first-team debut as an 18 year-old in the First Division in December 1998 and is now a regular member of the senior squad. Spent a month on loan to Exeter City in January 2000.

24 Matt Hill

Tough-tackling defender who can play at left-back or in the centre of defence. Progressed through the ranks to make his first team debut at the age of 17 in the First Division. Has featured regularly in the first team squad since the 1999/2000 season.

27 Kevin Amankwaah



Pacy right-back who can also play in central defence. Was spotted playing for Middlesex Youth and has

progressed through the ranks. Made his first team debut in March 2000 and came on as substitute at Wembley in the Auto Windscreens Shield final versus Stoke City.

30 Marvin Brown

England under-17 international, who became City's youngest ever player at 16 years and 71 days old when he came on as sub in a Worthington Cup tie at Nottingham Forest in September 1999. A product of the club's Academy, Marvin is younger brother of City midfielder Aaron.

31 Simon Clist

Attacking central midfielder who joined City after impressing as a trialist in an Academy tour of Holland in May 1999. His impressive form for the reserves last season won him a first team debut in January 2000 and has been a regular in the squad since.



What a difference a week makes, a fortnight ago Swindon had travelled up to London to defeat lowly Leyton Orient, the next we were getting beaten by Fulham's second string.

Goals from Alexander and James Williams secured a victory for the Town at Leyton Orient, a win that continued their impressive season near the top of the table. However, fortunes changed for Malcolm Crosby's side at Motspur Park as they were outclassed by a fine all round performance by the Londoners.

Swindon were forced to field a young side as a result of many of the regular players playing the night before or playing a part in the squad that beat Wycombe Wanderers in the LDV Trophy. Town's lack of experience was exposed by a classy Fulham side including Trollope, Lewis and Wayne Collins, Despite a superb effort from the lads, Malcolm Crosby admits that his side were outclassed, "Fulham had a very strong side and so it was a bit of a mis-match.

Nevertheless the game was a great character building exercise for the lads. They have had to come in several times this season and it was great to see them pit their wits

against such a classy side. At the end of the day we could have done with three or four older professionals but it can't be helped when the first team has midweek fixtures."



Whilst the debate over the Front Garden site continues, there's no doubt the new facility is an important one for the future of the club.




Lets get behind Andy and the Boys this afternoon and shout them to victory, and a six point maximum over Bristol City!!!

One club's loss is often another's gain, none more so than when Town legend and defensive stalwart Shaun Taylor made the short move west to join Bristol City. We took the opportunity to welcome Shaun back to the County Ground.

Are you looking forward to coming back to the County Ground this Saturday?

This is only the second time I have been back to the County Ground competitively, the other being the NSPCC match a couple of months ago when I played, so yes, it is nice to return. I did come and watch the game last Tuesday night (Wycombe) and I am always greeted so kindly by everyone, especially the fans.

Do you still follow results or keep in touch with any of the players?

You have to appreciate that there aren't many players here from my era, only Mark Robinson and Steve Cowe but I do still follow results. I still live in the area and with Paul Bodin at Bath I speak to him. I also keep in touch with Colin Calderwood and Martin Ling a couple of times a year, but that NSPCC match was a great opportunity to meet up with them all and talk about the good old days!

Can you remember your favourite goals?

The goal at Wembley has to be up there! As a child you dream about scoring at Wembley and to actually do it in a game where Premiership status is at stake is something I will always remember, although it wasn't the greatest goal!


Another one came in the 6-4 victory at Birmingham. It was 1-0 to them and I was being treated for a head injury on the sideline, during which time they'd scored a second! I remember coming back on and

making it 2-1, at that score we had a chance. Unfortunately after half time we went 4-1 down and so Glenn (Hoddle) moved in front of the back four and it changed things dramatically. I think Dave Mitchell got a hat trick and we came away with three points!

You spent five great years here, what were some of the highlights?

I joined in 1991 and we had a couple of really exciting seasons: the promotion in '94; the season in the Premiership when perhaps we weren't good enough to stay up, the subsequent relegation and then another promotion.

I played every game in that Premiership season and I think we proved to ourselves that we were good players. We drew about fifteen games and if we had won just five of those we would have stayed up.



How hard was it for you to settle in at Bristol City having played for Swindon?

It is hard for any player when joining a new club to fit in, but you have to try and enforce your own authority. To be honest I don't think it mattered, the Bristol rivalry exceeds this one and so I never really had that much of a problem. I would like to think that I have got the same affiliation with the Bristol City fans now that I had with the Swindon supporters.

Can you describe your role at Bristol City?

I am reserve team manager but I do still have a playing contract until the end of this season. In March last year I aggravated my achilles for the second time but you can never say never! Being reserve team manager is a full time job, I deal with the players in the morning, maybe work with some of the under-19's and, as it stands at the moment, it would

take a massive effort in order to be fit enough to play in the second division. I have a good liaison with Danny Wilson and his assistant Frank Barlow and they involve me with first team proceedings.


Does this mean that you will be making the transition from playing to management?

Time will tell! I have been a professional footballer since 1986 and you always think, do you go into coaching or management? At this present time, I have had a great year under Danny and Frank and I think that one day I would like to become a manager, but that is some time off! Danny and Frank have both certainly been great to work with and you can see that from the transformation in the club's fortunes this season.

So just how far can Bristol City go, do you think that they can get promoted? We had a very poor start to the season that was followed by an unbelievable run of fourteen to fifteen matches that lifted us to the fringe of the promotion places. I think you have to remain positive and, if we can have another good run, we can at least make it into the play-off places. Our ultimate aim is to reach the automatic promotion places.

Will it be difficult sitting on the sidelines for this local derby?

I have had to sit out quite a few, last season's was particularly hard because my brother was playing for Swindon! But it will be a great game, both clubs need the points - albeit for different reasons and I have a great affection for both clubs. At the end of the day there are so many points to be won after this game, I just hope that it is an entertaining game. I do hope that Swindon get out of their position but I will be hoping that Bristol City win today!

I could get in a lot of trouble with my girlfriend if I don't say her! My girlfriend, a fishing rod and a football.





A series of articles by the Editor of PROGRAMME MONTHLY & FOOTBALL COLLECTABLE magazine, describing how programmes have changed over a century and a quarter of Association Football.

The Modernisation of Programmes in the 1970's

As the post 1966 World Cup boom began to fade in the 1970's, alternative pastimes and leisure activities grew in number and with them, the realisation that modern marketing and commercial techniques were needed in order for football to compete.

This brought about a radical transformation in the role and format of matchday programmes. coincidental with the first sponsored football tournaments. Initially, these took the form of brand new competitions as opposed to sponsors attaching their names to established tournaments, as a result the Watney Cup was born, followed shortly afterwards by the Dryborough Cup in Scotland. The Texaco Cup was established in Ireland to link the northern and southern clubs.

Suddenly, more programmes were being made available for collectors. European ties had been added to the ... normal domestic staple diet in the 15 years since 1955, and now came

additional tournaments and intercountry fixtures such as Wolves v Derry City, Airdrie v Ballymena United, Motherwell v Spurs and St Johnstone v Ipswich. The brewers Watney broke new ground with programmes for their pre-season tournaments, which were stylised and published on behalf of the sponsors, rather than the home club.

Similarly, Texaco provided a common style of outer pages for their tournament programmes, although the host club was left to its own devices with regard to internal pages. One or two clubs, perhaps slightly pretentiously, began to call their programmes 'match day magazines', and they were certainly increasing in size - and cover price.

Gloss paper became widespread; print techniques improved with the move away from letterpress to litho, and photographs became a more prominent feature. Colour began to creep in, spreading from the First Division down through the leagues as

the decade progressed. Coventry City, programme pioneers in the 1960's, continued to explore new avenues in the 1970's. They took the 'magazine' concept quite literally by producing a very large page-size programme, even bigger than today's brochure sized cup final issues, which featured 'lifestyle' articles loosely related to football to complement the standard contents.

An example of this was the back page - full colour photograph of a 'glamour girl', posing chastely. It is interesting to note that few, if any, clubs followed this 'laddish' route, and certainly not in the last couple of decades.

















We also lost our composure and allowed them back into the game, but you learn from your mistakes and we will be looking to put that right today.


Let's club together and really have a go at City today and collect another three points.

Joe Kinnear has turned his back on bottom club Oxford citing health reasons.




Hats Off For Dryden



Matches From Memory

It was perhaps the day that Bert Head's babes came of age.

Earlier in the season they had battled out a draw at Ashton Gate but now Town had to meet them on a muddy surface at the County Ground where strength would be important. Many felt that this would work against the young Swindon side.

Swindon won the toss and elected to kick towards the Stratton Bank such was their tradition at this time. This saved wingers Arnold Darcy and Mike Summerbee a boot change as the section of the ground near the old Shrivenham Road Stand was still hard and required rubber soles whilst most of the pitch was taking a long stud.

City, managed by Fred Ford (who was later to become manager of Swindon) looked the stronger side. A centre from Tait on the right wing beat the defence but City's former England international, John Atyeo, just failed to reach it. Despite the difficult conditions, Swindon continued to play some good football but it was Tait who again threatened with another cross that Ken McPherson headed clear.

Mike O' Hara scrambled a shot away from right back Briggs but, with 35 minutes gone, City finally took the lead. Although only from a narrow angle, Williams's shot seemed to deceive O' Hara and went in off his shoulder. Hunt's header was cleared off the line and Swindon won three corners in quick succession, but at half time the visitors were still hanging on to their lead.

The second half was only a minute old when a long ball from Connor was neatly headed won by Atyeo and driven home by Clark. After such a blow, experience might have brought pessimism but the enthusiasm of youth saw Swindon ignore this setback. After 54 minutes they got the break that brought them back into the game. Centre forward Jack Smith appeared to have lost control of the ball when he collided with Thresher and referee Pickles awarded a penalty.

Ernie Hunt, as on every occasion he was called upon during the season, slotted home the penalty. Just over ten minutes later Town were level. Bobby Woodruff hurled in a long throw that was flicked on by Hunt to Morgan. The Town's skipper saw his effort blocked but rebounded to Summerbee whose shot took a slight deflection leaving Nicholls helpless as it flew into the net. As the game drew into it's closing



stages both sides had changed. O' Hara made amends for his earlier error saving well from Derrick, Eight minutes remained when Swindon were awarded an indirect free kick inside the penalty area. Hunt drove it in to a crowd of players and Smith got the vital deflection that gave Swindon a 3-2 win. The victory left Swindon sitting on top of the table and with the A team registering an 11-0 victory over Chippenham Town Reserves, with four goals for Roger Smart and five for Dick Plumb, the Football Pink made happy reading that night for all Town fans.



This week's number five is Stuart Pearce, aptly known by many in the game as 'Psycho.'

There are many who watch the beautiful game that would suggest that football is becoming more of a non-contact sport, with continental players in particular guilty of the most heinous crime, diving. Fortunately Stuart Pearce is not one such player and is definitely not one to shirk a tackle, footballers around the world, and in England especially, have incurred the wrath of Pearce's fearsome tackles.

One of the many 'tactics' and 'skills' that you were taught when you were younger was to never pull out of a challenge so as to not injure yourself, few would be forgiven for doing so at the sight of 'Psycho's' thighs approaching you at tremendous velocity! But Pearce

makes it into this week's top five with an extraordinary effort of bravery and/or stupidity when, in 1999, he played on in a game for West Ham against Watford in the Premier League despite having broken his leg. One would have thought the pain of breaking one's leg would be enough to reduce a man to a useless heap on the floor, let alone walking. Still, after Pearce finally realised that something was wrong, he would not be carried off the pitch like you or I, no, he walked off.

Paul Ince England

Paul Ince can arguably be put into the rather dubious category of footballer's called soccer's hard-men alongside the likes of Roy Keane, Martin Keown and Luc Nijholt.

A ferocious temper and tremendous tackles has characterised Paul Ince's game over the years and it has won him few friends on the opposing terraces. At West Ham, Liverpool, Manchester United and Middlesborough Paul Ince has collated a large number of yellow and red cards with his over-zealous enthusiasm. Nevertheless the whole nation got behind him when he pulled on an England shirt in a game that Hoddle's side had to win or draw to qualify for the 1998 World Cup in Rome.

Hoddle had rekindled the nation's flagging chances of qualifying for Europe but required at least a point against the Rosinarie, a tough assignment when you consider that England had lost the corresponding fixture by two goals to nil at Wembley. The night will live long in the annals of English football history for the side's determination, characterised no better than by Paul Ince. He felt that he had a point to prove having played in Italy and that he did with a display of courage that will always be remembered that included a clash of heads followed by Ince playing the rest of the game with a blood soaked bandaged head.



Bert Trautmann Manchester City

Bernard Carl 'Bert' Trautman played in two consecutive FA Cup Finals for Manchester City and came away from the second, in 1956, with a winner's medal and a broken neck!

With 17 minutes of the match remaining he came out of his goal and bravely dived for the ball at the feet of Birmingham City's Peter Murphy. The ensuing 'comingtogether' of the two players resulted in his now historic injury. However, he completed the game, collected his medal and joined in the team's celebrations late into the night at the Cafe Royal in London. It wasn't until he was X-rayed three days later that the seriousness of his injury was diagnosed and he was sidelined for 7 months.

Bert had arrived in England in ignominious circumstances in 1945 -

as a German prisoner of war! After the cessation of hostilities he chose to remain here and joined St Helens FC and then, in November 1949, moved to Manchester City where in 14 seasons he endeared himself to not only the Maine Road faithful, but to the whole of the nation. In his later off-field career he achieved astonishing european and world-wide successes with Juventus, Inter Milan and Bayern Munich. Voted 'Footballer of the Year' in 1956 and included in the Football League Centenary 100 Players, Bert, now aged 78, lives in Spain but regularly visits the north-west. In October of last year he attended a Gala Dinner held in his honour in Manchester's Piccadilly Hotel. A true gentleman and a much-cherished footballing legend.



Terry Butcher England

At the time when England played Sweden in 1989 in a World Cup Qualifier, Terry Butcher was playing for Rangers and was repeatedly bringing the game into disrepute.

His latest misdemeanour was kicking in a referee's door at Pittodrie following a game in which Rangers had defeated Aberdeen. A tackle in the game had incensed the England and former Ipswich stalwart who luckily would not have to face any further action.

In the same year Butcher became a cult hero for his display of bravery in a game against Sweden in the 1989 World Cup qualifiers. Late in the game, Butcher collided with Swede Ekstrom but instead of going off, simply bandaged his head and played on, continuing to head the ball at will.



Shaun Taylor
Swindon Town

Returning to the County Ground today Town legend and crowd favourite Shaun Taylor, better known by many as 'Ooh Shaun Taylor', was never afraid to put his head in where it hurts.

Taylor is a supporter's dream in terms of a central defender, good in the air, superb in the tackle, committed and he even popped up with the odd goal. In fact, in the promotion season of 1993/4 Taylor notched several goals (earning him top spot in Town's goal scoring chart earlier in the season), a lucrative source for goals that strengthened Town's already impressive strike rate via Maskell, Mitchell and White.

Taylor used to wear a gumshield and with good reason, many fans would wince with fear as he dived to head the ball clear or would go up for headers from which the majority of us would shy away from. Two particular headers (both goals) stick

out in my mind and which have earned him a first place spot.

The first came at St Andrews in Easter 1994 in an enthralling game in which Swindon won 6-4 (having been 4-1 down.) Having left the field to receive stitches on a gash over his left eye, he returned to score with a severe header which pulled the score back to 1-2. The second (his thirteenth of the season) and perhaps more memorable, was the header at Wembley in which he risked life and limb to reach a loose ball and put the Town three up.

Not the home tie that Town were looking for, King's side face a tricky trip to Essex to face Third Division promotion hopefuls Southend United.







Southampton manager and former Town hero Glenn Hoddle has, in recent days, begun voicing his opinions on his controversial removal from his role as the England boss and his lofty ambitions for the future.

He firmly believes that he was treated over-harshly by the powers-that-be at Lancaster Gate and cites the FA's recent whole-hearted and overt support for Kevin Keegan in his recent legal embroilments. Hoddle said: "There was a time when I was England coach that I had 21 writs pending and I was left out on a limb. It was pathetic". However, he thinks that the FA learnt a salutory lesson from the huge storm that surrounded his exit and that their alliance with Keegan proves his point.

But don't let's forget that Hoddle was sacked by the FA two years ago for a 'serious error of judgement' by making public some of his metaphysical beliefs, particularly those relating to the disabled and their 'previous lives'. There can be no doubt that his comments certainly were a serious error of judgement and caused outrage throughout the land, but he considers that it was not a valid reason for his sacking. Hoddle's firmly-

held opinion is that managers should be judged solely by results, not by personal beliefs. He went on to say that anyone concerned with football, throughout the whole spectrum - from fans to chief executives - would say: 'I'm not interested in what he said, or didn't say, or what his creed and colour are etc. What he achieves on the pitch is the only thing that matters to me.' He claims that he was not judged by that criteria and points out that he was sacked on the back of losing only 7 matches out of 28 in his three-year stint.

His successor wouldn't agree with him on that point though, the loss to Sweden and the pathetic draw with Bulgaria at Wembley left Keegan trying to push water uphill in his attempts to qualify for Euro 2000.


However, his enforced sabbatical seems to have resulted in him becoming more aware of the power of the media and he would appear to be becoming more open and considerate to the people who once reported him to be aloof and disdaining, arrogant even, during his spell as England's supremo. He still nurtures international ambitions, even a reappointment to the England role, but

not whilst the hierarchy that sacked him remain in office. Perhaps he will eventually go abroad as he is quoted as saying; "Somewhere like the USA would be a great challenge one day". Time will tell.

If last Sunday's game between
Newcastle and Southampton had
gone ahead I would have loved to
have been a fly on the wall in the postmatch directors' bar. Sven-Goran
Eriksson was due to attend and I
wonder what advice he would have
recieved over a few beers from the exEngland managers of the two clubs!

Finally, a salutory thought for all concerned regarding the venue for the FA Cup Final. Fans who travelled to, or attempted to travel to, Cardiff by rail for last Saturday's Rugby international report horrendous delays and cancellations to services because of the chaotic situation engulfing Railtrack. I'm not going to take sides on the matter of which are the best-behaved set of supporters between the two codes, but I don't think that Cup Final fans will take too kindly to missing the kick-off - or even the whole game. Fingers crossed.

The Wanderer



"Form is temporary, class is permanent." That's what a good friend used to tell me when I returned home after another unsuccessful afternoon in front of goal.

Ok, so it was Wednesday afternoon college football and not on the professional stage but the sentiment was still nice to hear. I now play lower, lower league football and I often recite his words for comfort when I'm wading through another sticky patch of form. I also tell myself that even Pele and Diego Maradonna must have had similar thoughts when they've not been scoring goals for their team.

Last weekend Robbie Fowler scored twice against West Ham and in doing so, re-emerged as one of the countries most gifted natural goal scorers. He had been low on form and confidence since returning from injury at the start of the season and with the new arrivals of Jari Litmanen and Emile Heskey at Anfield, it looked as if the former Kop idol was on his way out of the club. Like any world-class forward

he answered his critics in the best way possible, by hitting the back of the net.

At the very highest club level the burden of scoring the majority of your team's goals is a heavy one. In any other profession such pressure could be regarded as damaging to the employee's psychological well being. Perhaps this is where the top professionals earn another portion of their large pay packet but it may also offer another reason why the very top teams are now recruiting such strength in depth to bolster their forward line. Liverpool have Fowler, Owen, Heskey, Litmanen and Barmby. Arsenal have Henry, Wiltord, Bergkamp, Kanu and Ljunberg. And Manchester United have Cole, Yorke, Solskjear, Sheringham and Scholes.

It seems as though the big clubs now recognise that the massive psychological as well as the physical pressure of modern football is too much for just two 'big-name' strikers and to get the best out of arguably their most talented players, the

burden must be shared.
Confidence is a big thing in football and should not be under-estimated, especially where forwards are concerned. A few games without a goal and the inner demons start sewing the seeds of doubt in the mind. It can only compound a player's lack of confidence and they get stuck in a rut of form. Our very own Gary Alexander has gone through this. Alexander proved last season that he was a natural goal scorer hitting 19 goals for Exeter City but found it hard to get off the mark for his new club.

How many times have you heard pundits saying, "he just needs one to go in off his back-side and he'll come through"? It didn't quite happen like that but a double strike against Wycombe was hopefully the bit of luck he needed and a glut of goals for our young striker will not be far away. As for my own goal scoring problems, I think it's going to take a lot more than my friend's words of comfort to get me firing again but as my back-side is my biggest asset, I've always got a chance!



In a series of new articles we take a look behind the scenes at Swindon Town Football Club and interview members of staff who work off the field.

How and when did you join Swindon Town?

I was working at British Gas at the time and saw an advert in the Evening Advertiser. I have always loved football and I have always followed Swindon so it seemed like a good idea! I filled in an application form, was asked to come in and thankfully I got the job. I came just in time for the Stockport game in 1996.

What do you do?

Well there is a lot more to it than just selling tickets, obviously it is a major part of the job - selling to customers, taking phone bookings and recently, having to tend to internet bookings as well which keeps us busy. After that there is a lot of other office work to be done, tax returns, accountancy reports that have to be sent back to the football league within ten days and

the organisation of complimentary tickets. There is a lot of administration to be done, but we all enjoy it because it is football related and we get on so well.

Describe your average day?

Well take today for example, I'm doing the match returns for the Wycombe game from last Tuesday night. What we have to do is count the unsold tickets and wipe them off the system and that gives us a report of what was sold and what was issued. From that we take off what was unsold and the value of those tickets and split the rest up into where the tickets were sold, Nationwide Stand or Town End etc. We basically have to work out the net gate receipts, costs and expenses including things like stewards.

We also have to try and keep the customers updated with the situation regarding ticket availability in the run up to home games such as how many tickets are left. We also have to get in touch with travelling supporters via their club. Take today's game for example, we

had to send off about 3,000 tickets, that is quite a lot more than usual because of it being a local derby.

What do you do on Matchday?

The worst thing about this job is that we don't get to see the games! Despite selling tickets weeks in advance, we stay open until half-time on match days selling on the phone and on the gate. We also get a lot of enquiries because we are the only office to be open on Saturdays; "Is the game on? Is it all ticket?" for example. It gets really busy at about one o' clock and then there are people who have lost their tickets. want to upgrade their tickets or haven't received them. There are plenty of jobs that need doing during the 90 minutes and after the game so we are very lucky if we get to catch the last quarter of an hour! Weekday games can mean we work especially late, we are normally here until ten or after.

Most memorable moment at Swindon?

Well, I joined in 1996 during the championship winning season, so I suppose that that would have to be the highest moment. Pre-season this summer was also quite exciting. With the new manager and new chairman, season ticket sales were very high and everyone at the club was really optimistic. But I really enjoy my job so I am quite lucky really, I actually enjoy having to come into work on a Monday so that has to be a good thing?

Lowest point at Swindon?

It is a shame to see the side struggle on the pitch, but I think to see so many people come and go is the saddest thing. I mean since I've been here the club has had four managers, but in the ticket office so many people have been and gone.







