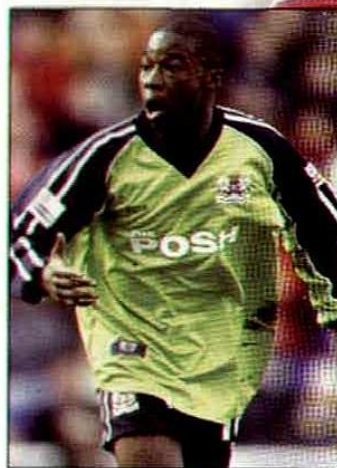

To all our season ticket holders thank you for your most valued support. Season ticket holders play a very big part in the planning of a new season and our pricing structure published yesterday for next season is an

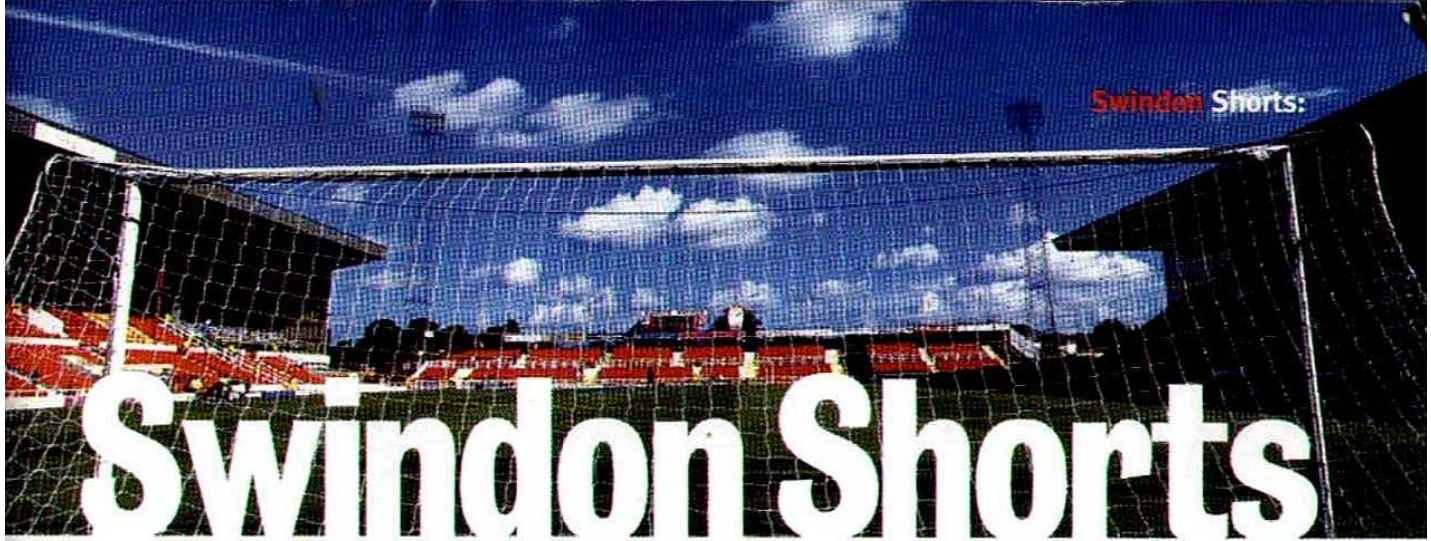

Hello and welcome to today's crucial league match against Peterborough United, our last home match of the season and definitely the most important.

I have spoken about games being 'big' and of great importance many times this season, but with just two games to go this term, today's encounter is the biggest, a cup final if you like. Our recent results have been disappointing to the extent that we have to win today's match, nothing less than three points will do. I have stated that I think 53 points will be enough for us to stay up, a win and a draw would give us that, but in my heart I want 55. I want to win both games and I feel that we can do that, especially as we seem to have returned to some kind of good form with last week's draw. I think we are definitely

capable of the minimum of 53 points that I have said and you would have to say that if we did go down with that amount, we would be very unlucky. Up until the Wycombe game, our performances had been very poor. Having played some of our best football of the season against the top clubs, we seemed to be disheartened by the fact that we didn't actually win any games and so our performances dipped. The Notts County game was particularly disappointing because, having taken the lead, we didn't take the game to the visitors and the passion and commitment appeared to be non-existent. Fortunately the lads put that game out of their system and looked far better as a side at Adams Park last week. The team looked far better and the shape was vastly improved. Danny Invincibile and David Duke

did well on the wings and gave us that extra shape and dynamic use of the flanks. Adam Willis came back into a back three and did a tremendous job and to be honest, I was never worried about losing the game, Wycombe never really threatened our goal. At the other end, we created several chances.

We had talked about getting a good start and we really looked lively from the kick-off, Alexander coming close followed by a great effort from Michael Reddy. Once again we failed to hit the back of the net but we will come good, the encouraging thing is that we are finding ourselves in those goalscoring positions and if you are doing that, you are always in with a chance. Some of the football we played in the first half was tremendous and we enjoyed great periods of possession.



Had it been a boxing match we would have definitely won on points, all the performance lacked was the winning goal, but as the game went on you could see that both teams became more nervous which is understandable.

You could sense that everyone was a bit despondent last week. I was not feeling too down because I am confident that this club will stay up. I am not prepared to give in and neither are my players, if they can show the same kind of effort and commitment that was evident at Wycombe, then with a bit of luck as well we will be ok. I am not unaware of the situation involving other clubs, mathematically, if they win their games in hand then we are in a lot of trouble. But when the pressure is on we all know how difficult it can be to grind out

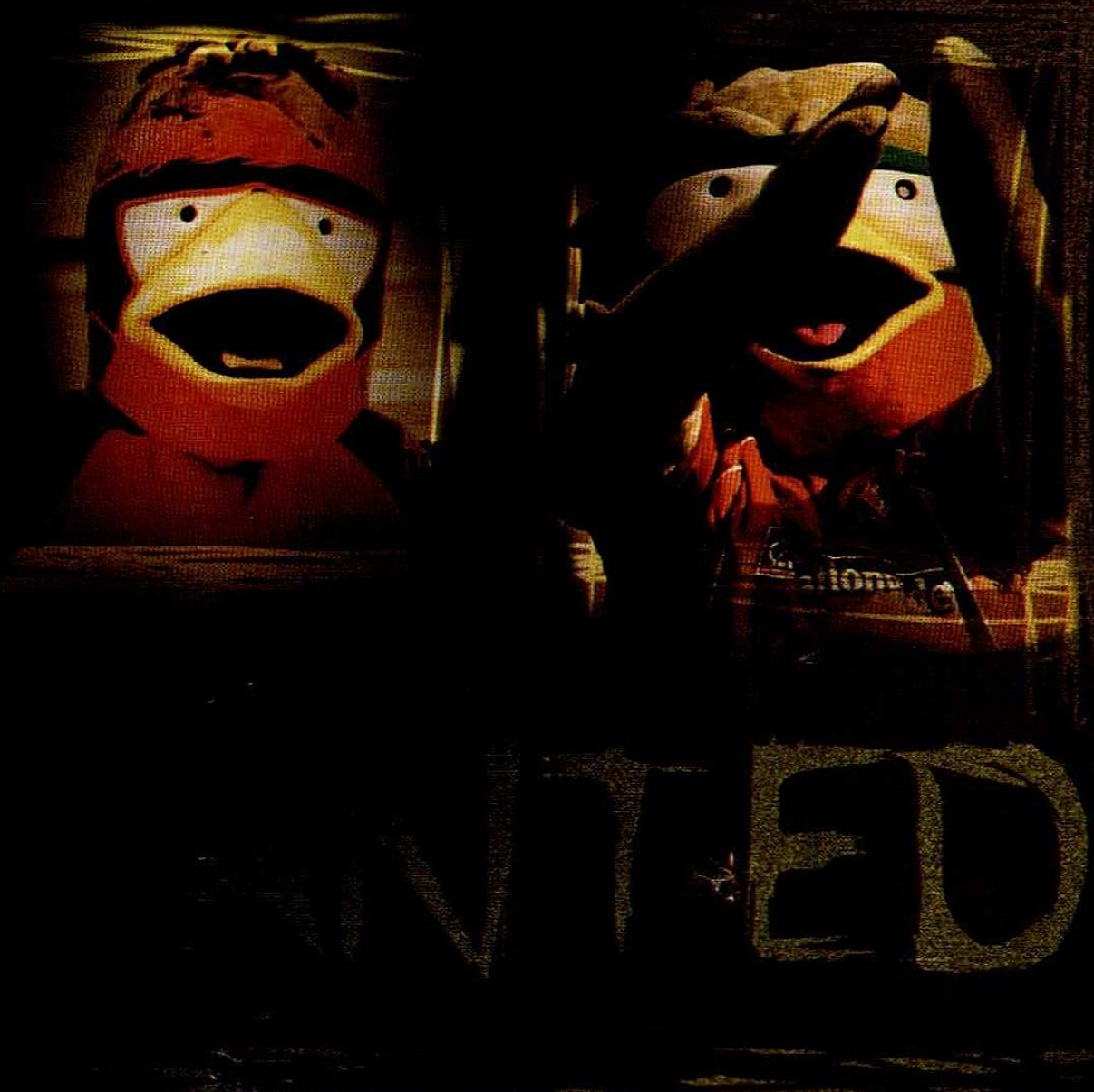
results. There is a long way to go this season and it will go right down to the wire, as I keep saying, this game has so many twists and turns in it, which is why it is the best game in the world. This week we may have the advantage of having some injured personnel return to the side. We are at the most crucial stage of the season and so to not have your full strength side is a bit disappointing. But you can not hide behind that, you have to make the best of the situation and no matter who plays today, it will be our best possible and they will be up for it. Unlike other sides we have had a full week since our last game and hopefully in that time, our players have had time to recuperate. Last week's draw shows just how good our away form has been this season and that is why I do not fear going to Stoke next week at all. On

the other hand, I have said to the lads that we need to show the same composure at home, especially today. To help them we need your full support this afternoon. Our travelling army last week were incredible, like a twelfth man on the field. I have said it before but I can not stress enough how much of a difference it makes with that kind of atmosphere. This afternoon will be a nervous one for all of you, but please shout the lads on to victory.

Finally may I wish today's visiting directors, management team, players and supporters a warm welcome to the County Ground.

Bye for now, let's hope that we are celebrating three points come 4.44pm.

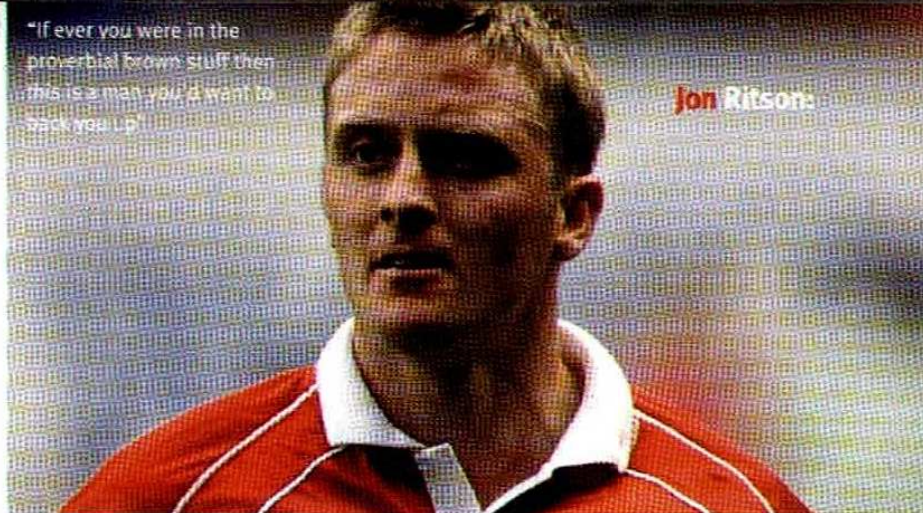

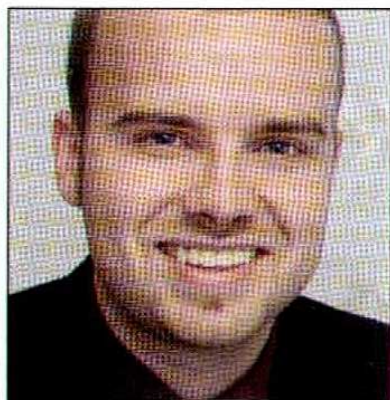

How ironic that Posh's only goalscorer in the last season's Division Three play-off final started life at Barnet (their opponents in the play-off semi-final) under the guidance of Barry Fry, Posh's larger than life manager.

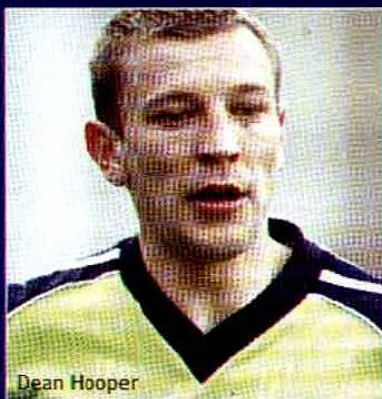
Peterborough's win against Darlington at Wembley had critics talking about immediate relegations and quick returns, they couldn't have been more wrong. After just two games this season the London Road side found themselves in the play-off positions and, although they haven't managed to hold on to their high spot, they have more than held their own with a squad whose players come from lower league backgrounds. Barry Fry, who himself had an illustrious playing career for several lower league clubs,

has enlisted the help of none other than five players with non-league background including Francis Green, once of Town's FA Cup opponents Ilkeston Town. It seems to have worked though, despite just three away wins all season (including the all-important victory against Bristol Rovers two weeks ago), the club has managed to avoid getting caught into the expected relegation dogfight. The 4-0 win last November exemplifies the club's home form, goals from Farrell, Forsyth and two from Leon McKenzie were enough to condemn King's side to their worst defeat of the season. Leon McKenzie could well be the visitor's danger man today, with twelve goals already, he will be looking to extend his tally and distance himself from team mate David Farrell who's on 10 this season.

Former Robins Return

Today's visit of Peterborough sees the return of two former Robins to the County Ground.

Dean Hooper may not be so well known, he had a spell at the County Ground in the mid-nineties and eventually joined today's visitors after a successful loan spell. Martin

Williams however, spent nearly half of this season (21 games) playing alongside Gary Alexander. The highlight of his time in the red and white was a brace that earned Town victory against his old club, Luton Town. His other goal came in the 4-1 drubbing of Ilkeston Town in the FA Cup.

One of football's most flamboyant and animated characters, Barry's managerial berth (which followed a playing career that started at Manchester United) came at Dunstable Town where he steered the club to promotion in his debut campaign as player-manager.

Other managerial spells followed with Hillingdon, Barnet and Maidstone before Barry went back to Barnet where he had played.

The North London club were runners-up in the GM Vauxhall Conference three times before finally going one better and gaining a place in the Football League. The club remained semi-professional, but Barry took the part-timers into the play-offs in their first season in Division

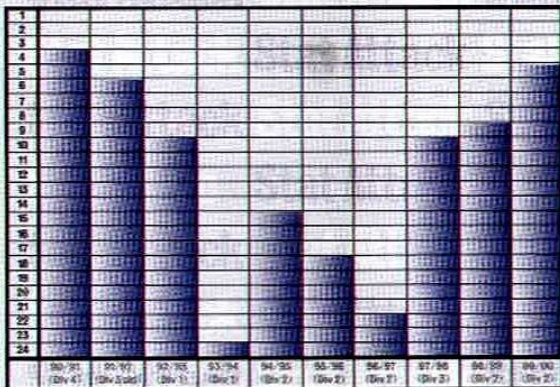
Four and they gained promotion a year later. He joined Southend United in April 1993 when they were seven points adrift at the bottom of Division One. Six wins and two draws later and Fry had achieved safety and by the end of the year, Southend were third in Division One before he was tempted by a move to St Andrews. At Birmingham he achieved an Auto Windscreens Shield and promotion double in the

1994-95 season before taking the club to the semi-final of the Coca Cola Cup in the following season. Alas, league form suffered and after City finished a disappointing 15th, Barry was dismissed. Just three weeks later, in June 1996, he was installed as Peterborough United boss and the rest as they say, is history. A relegation in 1996/97 (largely due to off the field events) was quickly followed by last year's play-off triumph.

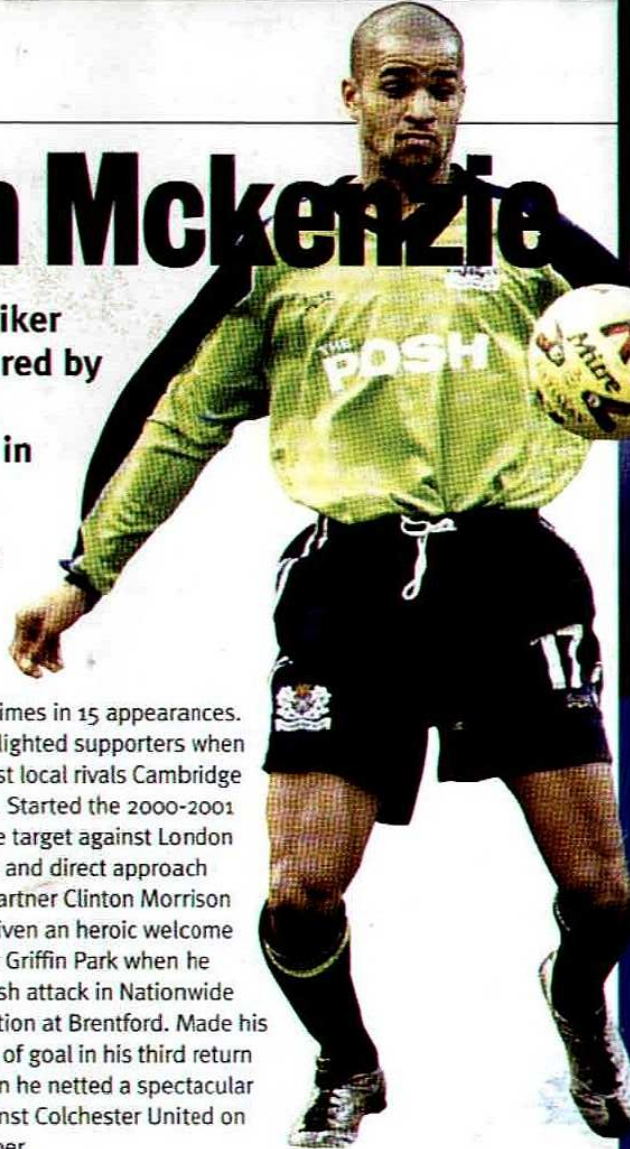

Was given an heroic welcome by the travelling fans at Griffin Park when he returned to lead the Posh attack in Nationwide League Division Two action at Brentford. Made his mark in front of goal in his third return match when he netted a spectacular strike against Colchester United on 28th October.



1 Mark Tyler



Played at Wembley with a pin in his shoulder and pulled off a magnificent one handed save

from Gabbiadini. Norwich born, Mark came through the ranks at Posh and his performances in his first full season earned him a call up to the England Under-20's squad prior to Toulon.

2 Dean Hooper

A passionate performer, Posh welcome back Dean's commitment and determination in the tackle after he was sidelined through injury. Arrived at London Road after signing from Kingstonian in 1998, but he started his career with the Town and had a month loan stint at Posh in the 1995-96 season.

3 Steve Morrow

Signed from QPR on deadline day this season as replacement for Adam Drury who left for Norwich. Started his career at Arsenal where he won the European Cup Winners' Cup, FA Cup and the League Cup in which he scored the winner. A cultured left-footer, Steve has made 39 appearances for Northern Ireland.



David Farrell

Fired Posh into the Play-off final after claiming his first hat trick in the return semi-final meeting with Barnet at London Road.

Can turn a game with a flash of brilliance on his day, and is able to play on either flank where his blistering pace and abundance of tricks terrorise opposing defenders. Was in sparkling form for the majority of last season when he made 36 appearances and scored some magnificent solo goals. David was captured from Wycombe after he had struck up a successful partnership with former Posh player Miquel De Souza in their time together at Adams Park.



4 Richard Scott



A dominant player who arrived from Shrewsbury during the 1998-99 close season, Scott began his career with

Birmingham, making twelve appearances before moving to Gay Meadow. Richard scores vital goals and has a tireless work rate, a real asset with his complete style of play.

9 Andy Clarke



Started his career under Fry with Barnet and gained Conference 'Player of the Year' and

England non-league honours before joining Wimbledon in 1991/92. A long time target of Fry's, Clarke joined Posh in 1999 and finished the campaign as top goal scorer.

16 Martin Williams



Needs no introduction, Williams joined Posh from Town in January this year and has provided cover in

the midfield area. Prefers to operate on the right wing where he did with Luton and Reading, but can feature in attack where he has weighed in with his fair share of goals.

6 Andy Edwards

Club captain labelled 'Mr. Consistency' by Barry Fry; Andy has been a steady rock since arriving at Posh from Birmingham during the 1996-97 season. A threat in the air and a tough opponent for any attacker, his breakthrough came in Fry's time in charge at Southend and he has remained faithful to his manager since.

10 Jason Lee

Experienced front man that signed in March 2000 following a two-month loan period from Chesterfield. Lee has played more than 300 senior games in a career spanning ten clubs, his most successful spells coming at Lincoln City and Notts Forest. Has given Posh an aerial threat and his goals last year helped them earn promotion.

18 Ritchie Hanlon

An attacking midfielder, Ritchie has the ability to prise open defences with inch perfect passing. Former Chelsea youth product who first joined Posh from Rushden & Diamonds in 1998 following a switch from Welling. Returned to Welling on loan before going back to London Road in 1999.

8 David Oldfield

Australia-born player who started his career with Luton before joining Man City for £600,000 in 1989. He moved to Leicester the following year before re-joining Luton for the same fee. A move to Stoke on a free transfer followed where he was then released to join last year. David has steadied the Posh midfield with his tidy play.

14 Francis Green

A powerful striker who is growing in confidence; Francis forced his way into the Posh reckoning towards the end of 1997. Another player with a non-league background, Francis joined the Posh from Town's FA Cup opponents Ilkeston Town. Can play in a two or three man attack and usually scores having come off the bench.

20 Tony Shields

Republic of Ireland youth international who rose through the youth ranks to break into regular first team action in March 1998 following a string of impressive Reserve side performances. A tenacious player with a clever touch and not afraid to bite into the tackle.

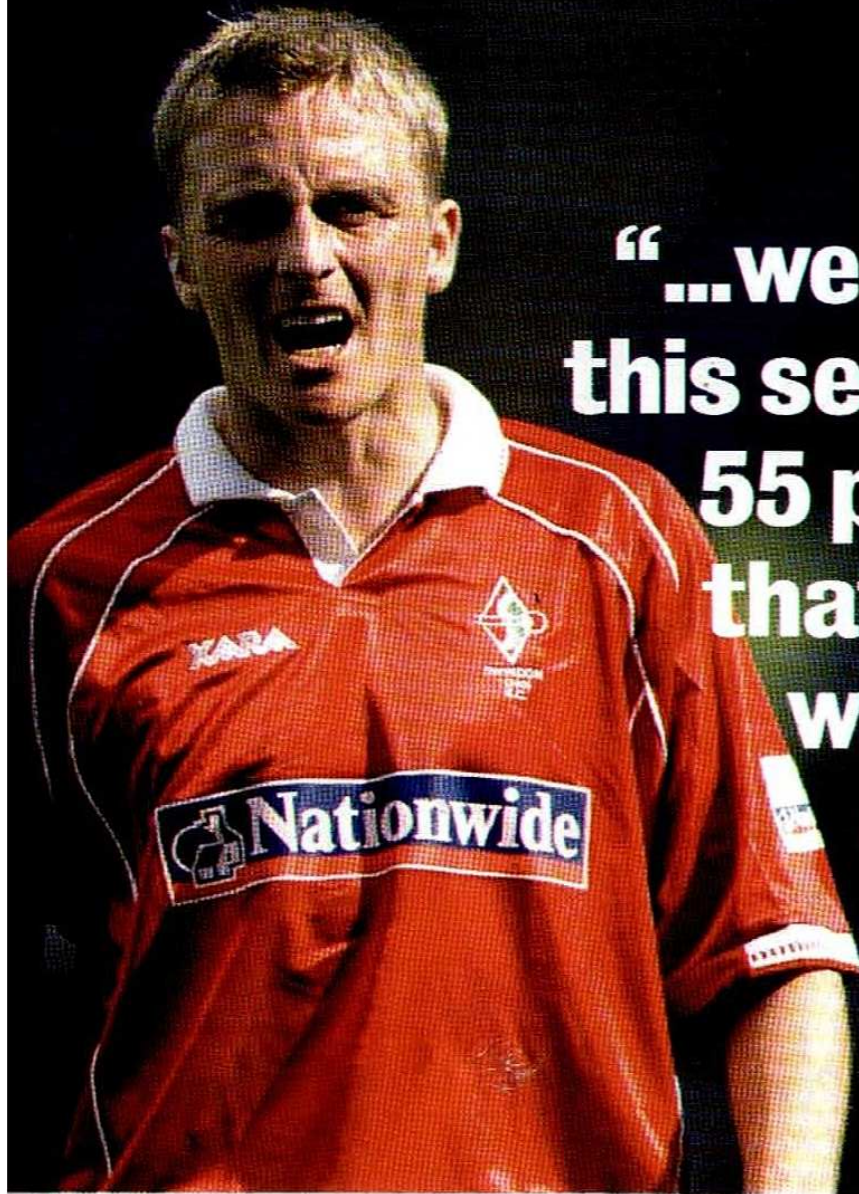

I'm totally depressed that we didn't get the win at Wycombe that I believe we needed to stay up. Even I can see the trapdoor opening to division three.

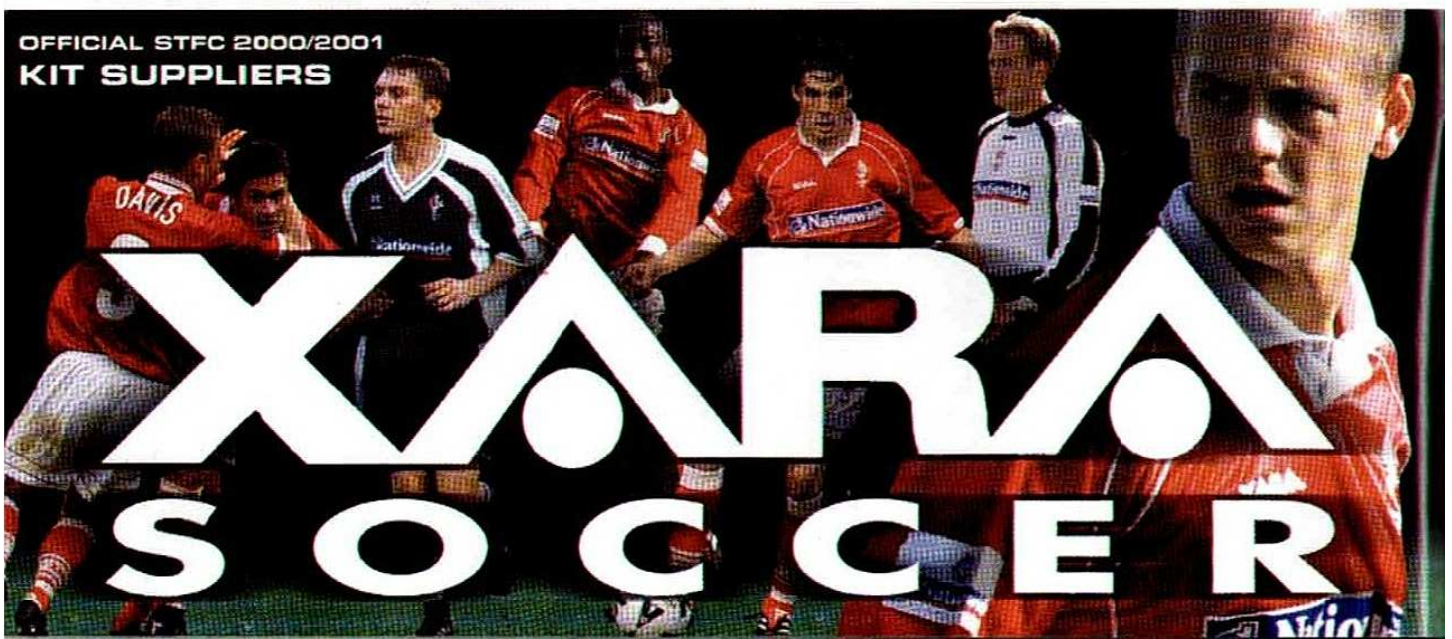

Q: Who has been the greatest influence on your career?

There have been so many and I am very lucky to mention four people, who, to me have been great influences on me and on the game. As a young Spurs supporter, Bill Nicholson was a great man and really inspired me to play football. After that, there was Colin Harvey and Howard Kendall, both great midfielders and then Bill Shankly. He said things that have stuck with me all my life, taught me how to appreciate the values of the game. But you never stop learning; even today's players influence me, opposing managers. I will always keep learning.

Q: How do you relax away from the game?

I don't! No, I like to spend time with my family when I can and play a bit of golf.

Q: Most memorable goal?

The one that sticks is my most famous, not the best. It was for Everton against Liverpool in 1977 and I scored the winning goal that broke a deadlock of seven years of Everton not beating Liverpool.

Q: Best player ever played against or with?

There are three players that stick out: Tony Currie was certainly the most gifted and talented player. But Andy Gray and Peter Reid were also good, for although they may not have been as gifted as Currie, they made up for it with their passion, competitiveness and determination. The best I played against was Johan Nieskins, another midfielder who I played against directly. At the time he was playing alongside Johan Cruyff in the fabulous Dutch side of the 70's.

Q: Best and worst moments in your footballing career to date?

The best is easy, fulfilling a dream by being involved with the game of football. The worst, well there have been a few. I have lost a cup final, semi-final, been sacked as a manager etc. I think the pitfalls

of being a manager; having the burden of the club on your shoulders is the worst. Even not playing when I was injured, Swindon losing in big games against Port Vale, Luton and Notts County this season.

Q6 What is the last football match you paid to watch?

I have just bought a ticket for the FA Cup final if that counts! Before that, I took my nieces to watch Southend v Luton about five years ago. It makes me appreciate supporters and their opinions because of the money involved in watching these days.

Q7 What is the most bizarre tactic an opposing player has used to put you off your game?

Tommy Smith once said to me that he'd break my legs! But I think being intimidated is the worst thing. In games against Liverpool in the 70's I was playing against the likes of Souness, Case, McDermott and Kennedy and that was frightening. Then of course you have the spitting etc, one of the worst things in football in my opinion.

Q8 Who is your hero and why?

When I was a kid I was living in Luton and a Spurs supporter, my dream was to score goals and so my hero was Jimmy Greaves, a fabulous player and arguably one of the greatest forwards at the time.

Q9 Most embarrassing moment on or off the field?

On the pitch my most embarrassing moment came with Everton in a semi-final against Aston Villa. We were 2-0 nil up from the first leg and with 17 minutes to go in the second, I passed the ball back to Neville Southall only for them to score. That was the hardest 17 minutes I have played in because that actually scared the life out of me.

Q10 What has been your strangest encounter with a football fan?

There have been so many, you always get criticism and to be criticised when people don't know the ins and outs of the

situation is very frustrating. The Nyarko incident last weekend baffled me, if he can't take criticism from one person, imagine him as a manager; getting it from thousands of supporters!

Q11 Any annoying habits of any of the lads you can tell us about?

When they don't play as well as I know they can do! The only annoying thing is that they sometimes don't have the belief in themselves that I do.

Q12 If you weren't a manager what would you be?

I haven't got a clue! When I was younger I was an apprentice at Spurs but they didn't offer me professional terms and that was devastating. After that I spent a short time as a metal worker before Luton signed me up. I have dabbled in Sales, Insurance, and Event Management and even ran my own company.

Q13 Ultimate ambition as a manager?

To be successful; firstly with Swindon Town and staying up, and then ultimately by managing the best players and winning things. You have to be ambitious and I believe that if I work hard and get a few breaks, that I'll succeed, I bet Martin O'Neill didn't expect to be celebrating a treble.

Q14 If Swindon could sign any player in the world, who would you most like to play alongside?

That is easy, Roy Keane or Patrick Vieira. They are not the most obvious choices, but seeing as I was a midfielder, they are the two players at the moment that typify my desire to win.

Q15 Do you have any other hidden talents other than football we should know about?

Golf, although I am not very good! I am very competitive though and those that know me will know that I will cheat to win!

Q16 Favourite sporting moment/memory?

Just being around at the same time as great people. I never witnessed Dixie Dean who everyone used to talk about, but the United team now are very good, as were Liverpool in the 70's. I also remember the 1966 World Cup. Outside of football, witnessing Tiger Woods, the greatest sportsman of our time.

Q17 If you won the lottery, what would you do with the money and why?

Buy a football club. But I would have to win enough so that we could buy good players. It's the players that make a football club.

Q18 You're on a deserted island and you can take three possessions, what are they and why?

I would have to take a companion, inevitably a football, maybe a seven iron. Definitely a bar. That's a tough question.

Q19 If you were on 'Who Wants to be a Millionaire' and you had to choose one of the players as your 'phone a friend', who would it be?

Well, this bunch of lads isn't the brightest I've ever worked with (only joking!) I can't really say because I don't really know their backgrounds all that well. Before here I would say Iffy Onoura because he had a degree, he was a late starter in football and was very well educated.

Q20 What would your advice be to any young players hoping to pursue a football career?

Enjoy your time as a player. People used to say to me when I was 18 to enjoy it whilst I could and I used to laugh it off. Now I know what they mean! I miss it so much, every morning I just want to kick a ball. My advice would be to learn every day like it is your last and always try to better yourself. Look at Tiger Woods; if he shoots a 62, he will still go back to the practice ground. Keep going when you get knocked down because what one club thinks, isn't the same as another.

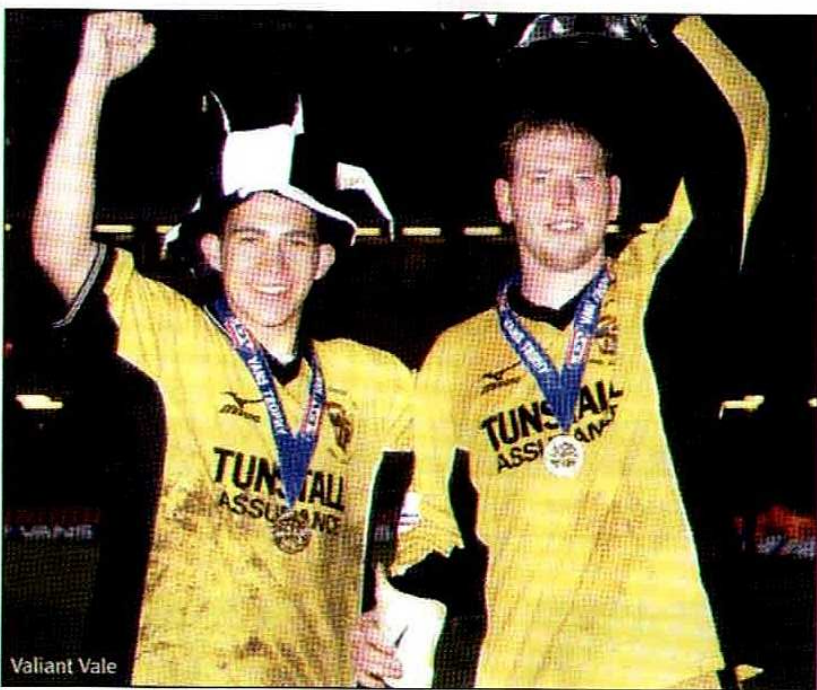
Swansea to Bounce Back

"It was just unfortunate but he is a good kid."

Matches From Memory

1978 VS 

Only a week before goals by Archie Styles and Bobby Doyle had knocked Swindon out of the League Cup in a Third Round reply. This, and the fact that it was Town's third home match in eight days, may have contributed to the fact that only 4,352 turned up to watch.

Bobby Smith's Swindon side had been hard hit by injuries and the loss of Andy Rowland with a swollen knee saw the return of Bobby Williams after a five game absence with ligament problems. The defeat by Peterborough had also led to changes with John Trollope recalled from the coaching staff due to an injury crisis; Russell Lewis and David Cunningham all left out of the team from the previous match with the Posh. It was Swindon who were quickly into their stride with Ray McHale master minding the Town midfield. It was an intelligent switch of play by him that led to Swindon's opening goal after seven minutes. Left back, Andy Ford's cross was headed onto the bar by Chris Kamara and as the ball dropped down Chic Bates was on hand to stab it into the net.

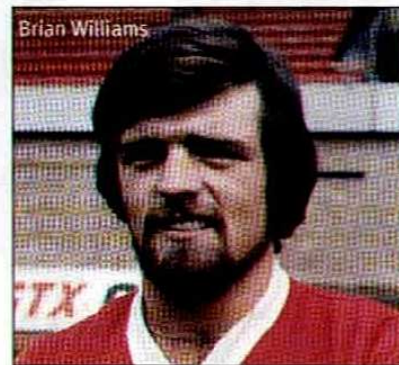
Swindon dominated the rest of an ill tempered first half with the pace of Ian Milled and the darting runs of Williams causing the visitors defence problems. Totally against the run of play the Posh struck a huge psychological blow. Bobby Doyle found Billy McEwan whose shot

struck town keeper Chris Ogden and spun off into the net.

Swindon continued to dominate though and took the lead after 61 minutes. A cross by Miller was flicked on by Bates and Roy Carter, who had squandered a golden opportunity minutes earlier, made no mistake in slotting the ball over the line. Keith Waugh in the Peterborough goal was in brilliant form and stopped Town increasing their lead when he managed to smother the ball as Williams looked like capping his excellent display with a goal. Swindon missed several more opportunities and left many fans with a sinking feeling that United might repeat their first half trick by snatching a point with a late goal but with five minutes remaining Swindon got a deserved third goal. Kamara crossed and Chic Bates was on hand to shoot home. This result left Swindon in 7th position and although by the end of the season they had moved up to 5th it left them



three points adrift of the last promoted team Swansea. Swindon's home record had been excellent with 17 games won and 44 goals scored and only 14 conceded but their away form which saw them lose 10 matches cost them dear. Peterborough had an even more disappointing season occupying 21st spot at the season's end and going down with Walsall, Tranmere and Lincoln.

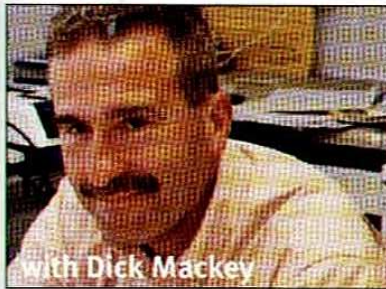

There have been players who have been nursing minor injuries for a

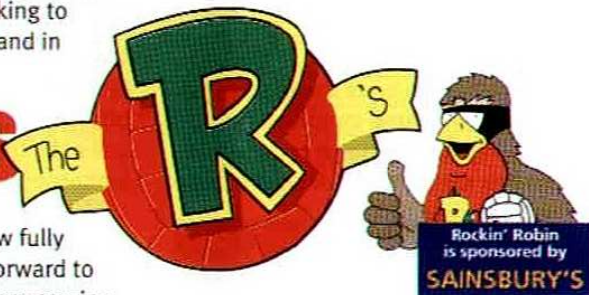

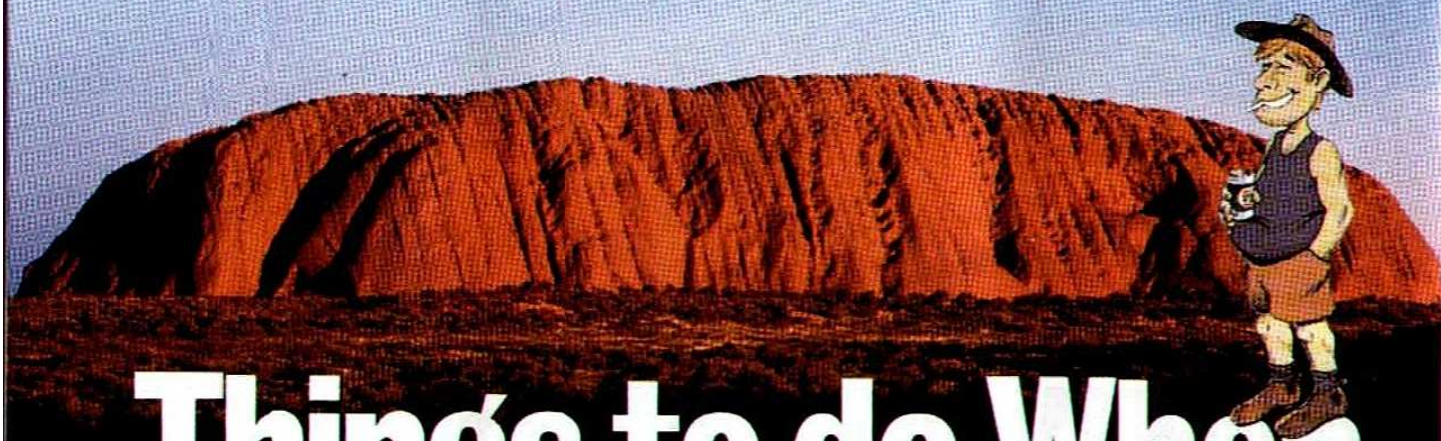

This one is strictly for those who simply just cannot face three months without any footie.

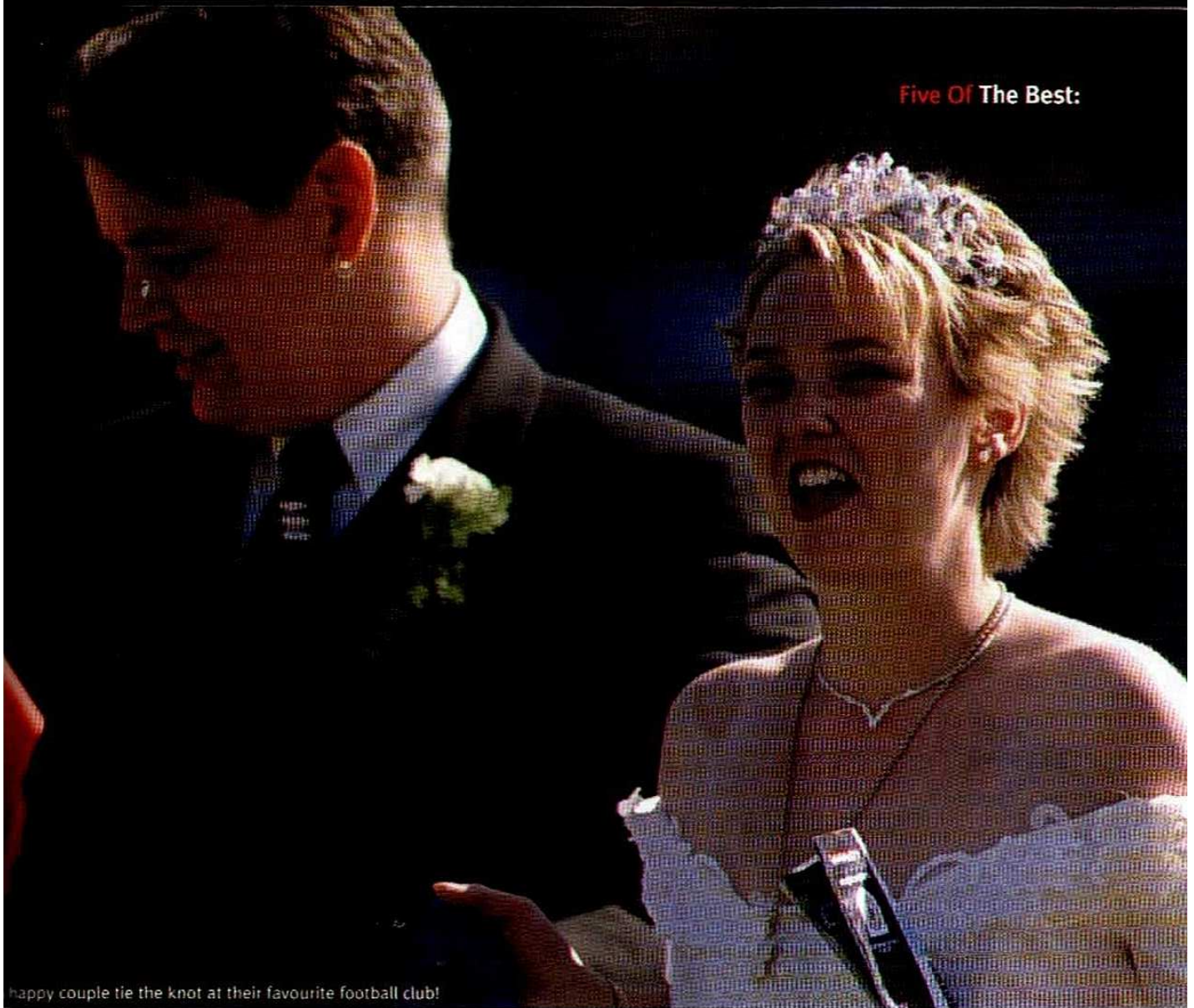
Some of them are even driven to contemplate self-disembowelment

That's Football

This is a very tricky article indeed to write for the last STFC Matchday Magazine of this term.

At the time of writing there are two matches to be played and what the outcome of the season will be is pure speculation and, not being a gambling man, I'm not going to speculate. Suffice it to say that these are twitchy times at clubs the length and breadth of the land, many promotion and relegation issues have already been settled but a lot of them will go down to the last games - not a situation for the faint-hearted. The next week will see delirious celebrations carried out as well as much wailing, wringing of hands, gnashing of teeth and howling for managers and directors heads. But, that's football isn't it, promotions and relegations may well be confirmed in the very last games but don't forget, there were 40 odd others played before them - and that's really where these matters were decided.

Poor old Manchester United. European Cup semi-finalists, albeit losing ones, have romped away with the Premiership with weeks to spare but two defeats at the hands of Liverpool and Bayern Munich

followed by a tardy home draw against the blue half of Manchester sees them being taken to the cleaners by the national media. They are now being pilloried as 'past it' and 'over the hill' etc. etc. Don't you believe it, the signing of Ruud van Nistelroy from Eindhoven is virtually done and dusted and Sir Alex already has his beady eye on at least another two ace players. There are bound to be comings and goings at Old Trafford through the summer, as at all League clubs, but they are, and will be, short odds favourites to lift the Premiership pot again next season. On the down side, Roy Keane's vicious assault on Alfie Haaland last Saturday was a desperately poor PR move for the club. There is no doubt in my mind that it was a calculated attempt to cause serious injury to a fellow professional and possibly end his victim's career. There's been bad blood between the two of them for some time. Three years ago, when Haaland was at Elland Road, Keane attempted a similar attack on him but merely succeeded in inflicting serious damage to his own knee ligaments which resulted in him being side-lined for almost a year. If revenge was his motive then he needs to seriously reflect on his

perverse attitudes and priorities and he's got plenty of time to do that, having been handed a four-match ban which will run into next season. If referee David Ellary (who has sent Keane off on three previous occasions) cites him for the abusive verbal assault as Haaland lay on the pitch receiving treatment, he could well find himself in trouble with the FA and with even more time on his hands. Saturday's sending-off was Keane's eighth since April 1995 and his second this season. It's blatantly obvious that when the red mist comes down he becomes blind to the consequences of his vicious behaviour. Captains should lead by example and be role models for aspiring youngsters trying to get into the game. They should not be mindless, petulant and vindictive thugs hell-bent on dishing out serious physical damage to their fellow professionals.

Enjoy the summer break and refresh yourselves for the next campaign. Come August, hopes, confidence and aspirations will have risen through the roof and sights set high - because next seasons are always going to be good ones!

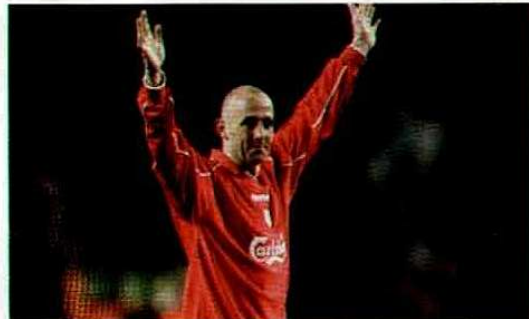

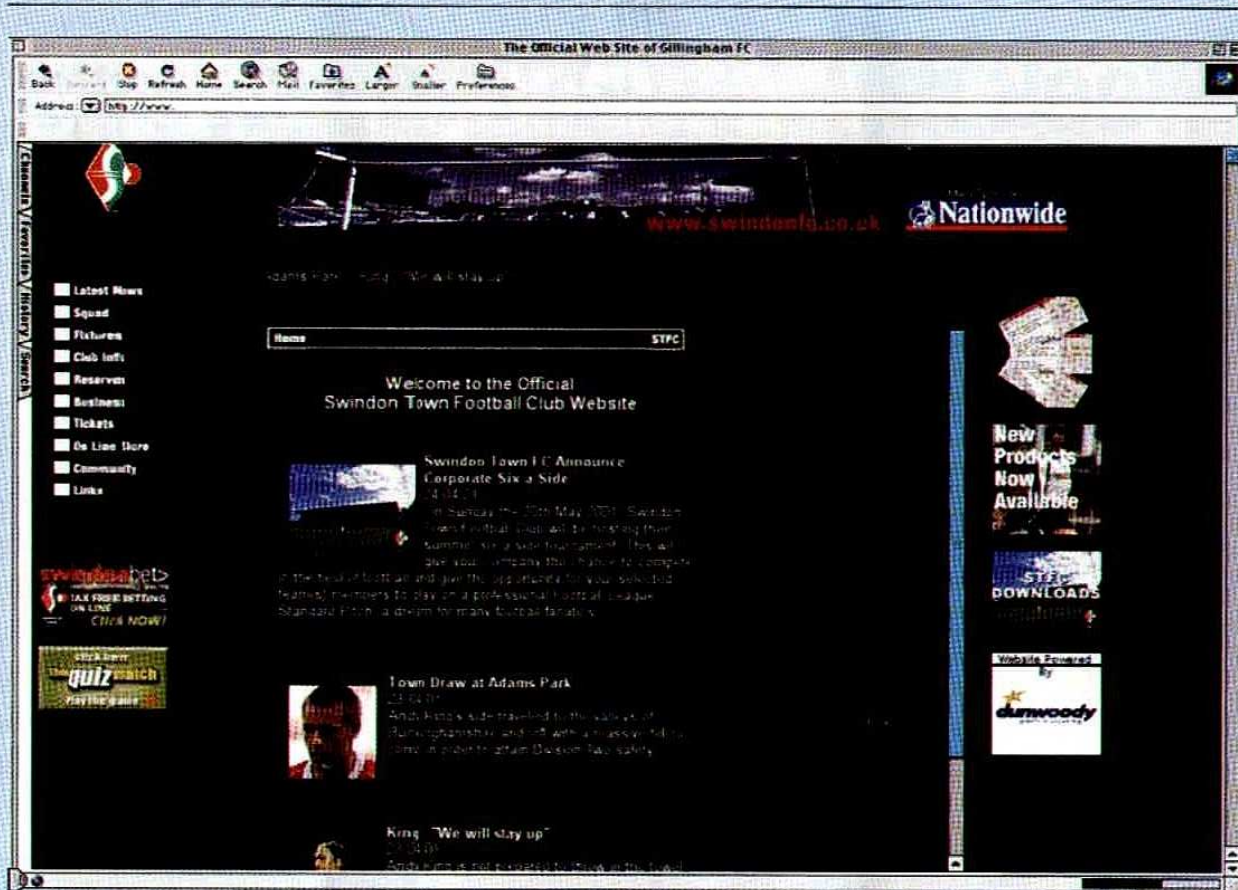

The Blues edged nearer Division Two safety with a point against a Swindon Town side desperate for points to avoid the drop to Division Three.

Wycombe had to survive an early onslaught from the visitors but then looked the side more likely to take all three points. In front of the largest League gate of the season, it was the visitors who went close in the third minute when Alexander saw an effort blocked by Paul McCarthy. Two minutes later Reddy should have opened the scoring but he blasted over from six yards after Alan Reeves sent in a free-kick from the right. However, Wycombe finished the half on a high. Senda should have done better from Bulman's through ball on 42 minutes and in first-half stoppage time. The visitors had a 'goal' ruled out for offside four minutes into the second-half when Alexander had the ball in the net after Alan Reeves' shot had been saved. In the 64th minute Whittingham nearly converted from Bulman's stab into the six yard box.



Andy King's side travelled to the valleys of Buckinghamshire and left with a massive hill to climb in order to attain Division Two safety.

More than 1,300 vocal Swindon fans basked in the sunshine at Adams Park knowing that only a win would do. Reddy crossed from the left-hand side early on but Alexander's shot was blocked, Reddy himself had the greatest chance of breaking the deadlock, but the Irishman could only blast over from close range on three minutes. Town played attractive football and looked far more dangerous than their previous games. Reddy was a constant threat and he came close several times in the first half. In the second half Town started in a similar fashion and laid siege on the Wycombe goal, Alexander eventually slotting the ball home from close range only for the goal to be disallowed for off side. Another one of those days it seemed for King's side and as the game drew on, the home side started to stamp their authority as Town's players began to tire.
