
Former Town defender Gareth Hall is set to partner former Birmingham defender Liam Daish at Havant & Waterlooville of the Dr Martens The former international was released last season after making four appearances including one in the cup against Coventry City. In total, Hall scored three goals in 87 games and after failing to gain a contract at both Oxford and Northampton, he looks set to make his debut for the non-league side. Gareth said, "I am coming into a very good standard and there are a lot of ex-professionals at this level." Joint Havant manager Mick Jenkins added: "Gareth played something like 170 games for Chelsea and another 53 for Sunderland as well as loads for Swindon and he can play anywhere in defence."

Finally, former Town goalkeeper Steve Mildenhall is considering a career as a centre forward after scoring for Notts County from the halfway line. A full report of what happened can be read on page 34.

# Treatment






Mark Robinson is still in the treatment room this week. Mark is now entering his third week of rehabilitation after his bilateral hernia (that means that he has had an operation on both sides of his abdominal). He has recovered well and he is now entering a program that includes him jogging and running. He is running twice a day and is swimming too.

James Williams has also has been injured since pre-season with an abdominal strain similar to Mark's. He has been doing a rather complicated set of exercises twice a week and he has now returned to Lilleshal.

Steve Robinson was in the treatment room last week with a dead leg. We didn't want to rush Steve back into the team because of the risk of making his injury worse, but he should be back in training by the time you read these notes. Last week he was sprinting and doing some quick work with his feet and could well be back in the squad.

Gareth Davies injured himself in the reserve game against Bristol City last week, but he travelled to Oxford with the reserves and should be fine. Alan (Young) also played at Oxford having recovered from his groin strain.

Town went some way to enacting revenge against Bristol City with a battling 2-1 win over Shaun Taylor's side at the County Ground.

Once again Roy Evans kept a watchful eye over new signing Paul Edwards, trialist Christian Lee and the fitness of Neil Ruddock. Danny Wilson was also in the crowd, City having an array of young talent on show. It was the visiting side that started the brighter until Brayley's speed led to the opening goal. Having cut in from the left, Brayley was brought down in the area and he stepped up to score from the resulting penalty.

City threw everything at Town's defence but 'Razor' was in fine form and he marshalled the defensive troops, Town holding out until half time. Just before the hour mark City were reduced to ten men, Craig Woodman sent off for a foul on McAreavey. However, City huffed and puffed and Aaron Shanahan caused Town's defence no end of problems.

It was Kayode Odejayi who scored the equaliser when he latched onto a through-ball to stroke the ball passed the advancing McKinney. Odejayi nearly scored a second with fifteen minutes to go, but he could not convert after Town failed to clear three times. However, it was Town that stole all three points at the death when Christian Lee headed home from a Cobian corner, Adam Willis heading the ball back across the area for Lee to head home.






In the late 80's and early 90's, much of Layer Road was closed off following the Bradford fire. Away fans were banned and attendances dwindled, falling short of 1,000 at times. The U's darkest days were confounded when they fell through the Fourth Division's trap door.

Under lan Atkins, the club just missed out on an immediate return to the football league, Barnet pipping them to the Championship. However, one year later, Colchester fought off Wycombe's threat and were promoted despite Ian Atkins' departure to Birmingham. They even won the FA trophy in front of 30,000 for good measure. Under George Burley (who would shortly join Ipswich), the U's became accustomed to life in Division Three. Steve Wignall took charge and in 1996/97 (despite the sale of Mark Kinsella), the club returned to Wembley via the Auto Windscreens Final. Their disappointment following their defeat by Carlisle was guashed a year later when they earned promotion thanks to play-off victories against Barnet and Torquay.

The club was now on the third rung of England's professional ladder for the first time and against all the odds, Colchester more than held their own. Even the sale of Lomano Tresor Lua Lua to Newcastle last year couldn't stop the success and this season, Whitton has taken the club to greater heights. Three wins from four, including a nine-goal thriller on the opening day at Chesterfield have seen the U's sit prettily on top of the pile, Scott McGleish contributing with four goals.






Steve is a man who admits he is still on a learning curve as far as football management concerned. Having taken over the U's after Mick Wadsworth's departure in 1999, Whitton is entering his second full season of league management and in the pre-season build-up, he admitted: "I've been on a number of coaching courses with first team coach Geraint Williams - and we're now on the way to getting our 'A' badge. Geraint has also completed his 'B' badge, so we're continuing on that steep learning curve! It's my second season in charge and I'm learning things all the time - so we're hoping to reflect that in the team's performances on the pitch."

United were a team in chaos after Wadsworth's departure, and slowly but surely Whitton has put together a squad of some note, considering his limited financial resources. The emphasis this season has switched to youth, and the main beneficiaries of this are Thomas Pinault, Kern Izzet and Dean Morgan, who have taken their chances with both hands.

Having overcome the fans' initial reservations, Steve is slowly growing in popularity with the Layer Road faithful and the feeling is that this season could be the one where his side establish themselves as something other than relegation favourites in Division Two. Two wins out of have not done any harm.

# JOE DUNNE



# THOMAS PINAULT

One of several foreign players recruited by previous manager Mick Wadsworth, Thomas is a young Frenchman who signed in the summer of 1999 and has his eye on a regular midfield place in the U's line up. His first taste of senior action came as a sub in August 1999, but he had to wait another eight months for his full debut. Spent much of the 2000/1 season on the sidelines, but finally returned to the first team toward the end of the campaign. Born near Cannes in France.







# **Andy Woodman**

Andy began his career as a junior on Crystal Palace's books, moving to Exeter in 1994. Eight months later he signed for Northampton where he became an instant hit, making 197 senior appearances and winning promotion in 1997. After moving to Brentford, he helped The Bees win the Third Division title before joining Colchester on loan in November 2000 and signing on a permanent basis.

# **Gavin Johnson**

Polished left-sided defender who returned to his native East Anglia after a spell in Scotland. Gavin has experience at the top level with Ipswich, plus spells at Luton and Wigan, and has now well over 200 league games to his credit. Won divisional championship medals while with Ipswich and Wigan.

# **Simon Clark**

Boston born central defender who was recruited in July 2000 from Leyton Orient, partly to offset the departure of David Greene. Simon entered league football in 1994, joining Peterborough from Stevenage. After more than 100 games for Posh he signed for Orient in 1997 for £20,000 and was a regular at Brisbane Road before joining the U's.

# **Scott Fitzgerald**

A former Irish Under-21 international defender who started with Wimbledon for whom he made 125 first team appearances before joining Sheffield United in 1995. A year later he returned to the capital and signed for Millwall for £50,000. He made around 100 appearances for The Lions before Steve Whitton recruited him for Colchester in October 2000.

# **David Gregory**

Dependable and versatile midfielder, 31 year old David was leading goal scorer for two consecutive seasons. He had eight years at Ipswich Town, including a loan spell at Hereford, before a short stay at Peterborough. The U's recruited him in December 1995 and he's been a regular ever since and in a variety of roles.

# **Micky Stockwell**

Colchester were delighted to capture the summer signature of this midfield ace who has more than 600 first team appearances with Ipswich Town under his belt. Essex born, his experience and irrepressible energy and enthusiasm proved invaluable at this level as he scored 11 goals and was an ever present in the first team.

# **Bobby Bowry**

Signed from Millwall in July, Bobby was signed to fill the role vacated by Aaron Skelton's departure during the summer. An experienced midfielder, it is hoped his passing ability will provide a spark for the likes of Kem Izzet and Thomas Pinault. His move to Layer Road reunites him with Andy Woodman - the two players previously together at Palace.

# Kem Izzett

Exciting midfielder who joined the U's on transfer deadline day after being released by Charlton. Initially brought to Layer Road on a month's loan, Kem impressed manager Steve Whitton and earned a permanent move. Brother of Leicester's Muzzy, 20 year old Kem has already demonstrated a will to win in his short time at the club.

# **Karl Duguid**

The player's 'Player of the Year' in season 1999/2000, Karl is a speedy front runner who has also served the club at wing-back. This Hitchin born 22 year old bagged a dozen goals last year and established himself in attack after several seasons as a regular on the subs bench.

# **Scott McGleish**

Steve Whitton snapped up McGleish for the second time when Barnet boss, Tony Cottee agreed to let him go in January. His previous spell came in 1996 when he joined the U's on loan from Peterborough. Another successful loan period at Cambridge was followed by a £50,000 move to Orient before Barnet paid £70,000 for his services.

# **Kevin Rapley**

Became the U's third signing of a busy summer after an impressive trial spell. Having fallen out of favour with Notts County, 23-year-old Kevin was signed by Steve Whitton to provide strength in depth up front. Hardworking and determined, hopes are high that he can be the man to score the goals that the U's lacked last season.

# **Dean Morgan**

An effervescent striker who is expected to make a real impact on the U's first team this season. Aged just 17, Dean is rated highly by the backroom staff at Layer Road and if he can adapt to the pace of the first team game, will score plenty of goals.




"We all know it hasn't been an ideal start, but what do you expect when you have so much going on at the club? We all came back from the summer break and settled into a routine and then you have to adjust and prepare yourself for a change with the new management. I think any team would find it difficult getting used to a new manager in such a short space of time. Then again the understanding will come and it is easier to gel with a new management than it is new players, look at how much we struggled last year. Add to that the things going on behind the scenes and it can be very worrying, you wonder whether or not you will have a job to come into each week.

"I honestly believe that we haven't started too badly anyway. I know that we are not playing as well as we can do at home, but I think after last season it will take a few wins to build up a bit of confidence in front of our own fans. We are so eager to please the supporters because they deserve success that sometimes we put too much pressure on ourselves. You don't get that away from home."

Keith comes across as very confident, not just in his own ability but in the team's chances of doing well. "You say Bristol City are a good side but they didn't outplay us. At times we played the better football and it wasn't until we went a man down that we were stretched, it is inevitable that you will find it harder with a man less. But the more we get used to the gaffer and playing together, the more our confidence will grow and results will come; I mean there aren't many teams that will win at Molineaux, just like there are few teams that will win so convincingly at Bury."

O' Halloran's confidence is equally as impressive as his determination to succeed. Having played against the nation's elite with Middlesbrough, he knows what is required for Town to hit the big time again. 'This club has gone through a lot recently, and I have only experienced the last year or so! You need a bit of stability and with that comes team spirit and confidence. At St Johnstone we had a tremendous team spirit and that helps when you find yourself in difficult positions on the pitch, you work that much harder for each other.







Don't forget that there are still a few new players settling in, not as many as last year but there are some all the same. We have gelled a lot more than last year, we know each other's game and we know each other as people, as mates and that counts for a lot."

O' Halloran's career has also taken him to Cardiff City, just one of the many sides that are looking for promotion to Division One and who have spent money in order to do so. The Bluebirds also know what it feels like to have the weight of expectancy on their shoulders. The club seemed threatened by relegation to Division Three two season's ago, but one year on and they appear to have turned the corner. "Cardiff are a very big club and they should never have gone down. But it just goes to show that when you think things can't get any worse, better times are around the corner. Last year we narrowly escaped relegation and although we thought we didn't deserve to be down there, we were through our own mistakes. Yet just because we had one bad season does not mean that we won't improve this year and I strongly believe that we will be a lot stronger for having gone through that experience."

"Cardiff's strength does show how difficult it is going to be in the league this year, especially for teams that don't have as much money to spend as they do. Colchester are a good side and will be very hard to beat today and the teams that came down will also be very strong, but we have to concentrate on improving ourselves and not worry about everyone else. We have enough ability here to do well in this division.

"We all want to succeed, at the end of the day some of the greatest moments in my career have been playing for Middlesbrough and St Johnstone and so I want to get back to playing at that level again. This year the team has a lot more balance. There is a core of players who form a solid backbone and then there is also competition all over the field. It means that we have to work harder and push ourselves individually, that can only be a good thing."

Keith is certainly confident that Town's fortunes will change this season. If it means winning by the odd penalty here and there then I don't mind and in Keith O'Halloran, we have the best man on the job.

It was a 'Jekyll and Hyde' performance from Town over the bank holiday weekend; a laborious and lethargic performance against Oldham was followed on Monday by a comprehensive 3-0 victory at Gigg Lane.

Town's energetic display can't even be put down to a change in personnel for it was a similar line-up that faced the Shakers. The only change was a starting place for Jo Kaffour who was rewarded for his contribution on Saturday with a place alongside Eric Sabin in Town's front line.

Nevertheless it was some familiar faces in the Bury side that had the better of the opening exchanges. Former Town midfielder Darren Bullock came close with a left foot shot that narrowly missed Griemink's left post before Matt Murphy, formerly of Oxford United, saw his shot deflected by a desperate lunge by Matty Heywood.

Town began to dictate the proceedings in the first half and the midfield began to supply the troublesome pace of Sabin and Kaffour, Duke and Davis on the flanks. Hewlett had two chances to open the scoring, but it was Kaffour who broke the deadlock just two minutes into the second half. Sabin charged down the right hand side before pulling the ball back for the 19-year old to slot home from close range.

Town made it two when Sabin's pace was awarded with yet another penalty, this time he was brought down by Lee Unsworth in Bury's box. Referee Mark Clattenberg had no hesitation in pointing to the spot and O'Halloran stepped up to make it three goals in five games. The home side rallied towards the end and Andy Preece threw on all of his substitutes but he could not influence his side, who found Griemink in fine form in the Town goal. The Dutch keeper had little to do throughout the game but was called upon at the death when he was forced into two impressive saves. David Duke scored Town's third to secure all three points, a magnificent run that started on the half-way line was converted with a fine shot that nestled in the far corner of Paddy Kenny's net.

# VINTAGE RED with Dick Mattick

This week Dick Mattick travels back to the season of 1966/67 and takes a look at the fortunes of both Swindon Town and Colchester United.

Town's excitement for the season came in the FA Cup, an away draw at West Ham gave Town's fans the opportunity to see World Cup stars such as Hurst, Moore and Peters, whilst also giving them a day out in London.

Town managed to come away with a fantastic 3-3 draw earning them a money-spinning replay at home. However, the financial



rewards were not the only benefit. With the replay looking to be heading for a 1-1 draw (John Sissons cancelled out Willie Penman's long range effort), Don Rogers and then Willie Penman applied a double blow. Round four saw Town dispatch of Bury, a neat header by Keith Morgan and a darting individual goal by Don Rogers enough to tee up a fifth round draw with Nottingham Forest at the City Ground. Town proved that the West Ham result was no fluke earning a 0-0 draw, unfortunately they could not repeat the home success and a late strike by Bruce Walker took the tie to a second replay. The second replay was played at Villa Park and unfortunately many supporters missed the first half but arrived in time to see three goals in the last half-hour end Swindon's cup hopes.

It was remarkable that the team had performed so well in the Cup because they were struggling against relegation in the league. The team contained four heroes of Town's previous promotion season in 1962-63 in Trollope, Morgan, Rogers and Smart along with Thomas, Harland, Penman and Butler who would appear in the team that triumphed in the League Cup in 1969. Ken Skeen and Bruce Walker, goalscoring heroes in the cup run had lost their places to new signings Pat Terry and Bobby Jones. The new signings and the boost of confidence of the cup run saw Swindon climb well clear of danger and finish in eighth spot with 50 points from 46 matches, five positions above Colchester who had 44 points.

Colchester's cup hopes had ended in Round Two with a 3-0 home defeat at the hands of Peterborough, however they did taken a point at the County Ground. Reg Stratton gave them a 10th minute lead until Don Rogers equalised from an Eric Weaver cross. Later in September, United won 2-1 at layer Road to make it 10 points out of 12. Willie Penman had scored the first of his League goals for Swindon before Brian Hall headed in John Martin's cross to equalise. The winner came after 68 minutes when Peter Bullock's free kick was headed home by Kenneth Hodgson.







The 26-year-old suffered a careerthreatening knee injury whilst with Millwall in 1998 but, after an 18-month spell on the sidelines. he successfully battled his way back into first-team contention. His subsequent transfer to Bristol City ended in tears after he was arrested on suspicion of causing grievous bodily having pelted the ball into the stands at Reading and breaking the wrist of a supporter.

'Outspoken' Brighton boss Micky Adams has given highly-rated striker Bobby Zamora a massive vote of confidence, declaring that he is good enough for The Premiership. Two goals from the 20-year-old in seven minutes sealed a shock 2-1 Worthington win over Wimbledon, prompting Adams to heap praise on the £3 million rated marksman. Zamora failed to cut the mustard at the then Second Division Bristol Rovers, but his short stay in the basement division with the Seagulls has obviously done him good.

"I keep telling Premiership scouts that he's good enough, he has destroyed a First Division defence and the boy just keeps coming up with the goods" bragged Adams. "It doesn't worry me that this might mean more bids for him. although it might worry the chairman, but he is not for sale.\*







World Cup Final, 21st June 1970 Aztec Stadium, Mexico City

THE MATCH - After two sterile (and fairly violent) World Cup tournaments, the 1970 Final's in Mexico turned out to be a veritable feast of football contested by a number of very strong European teams, notably England, West Germany and Italy. Italy were only beaten by a brilliant Brazilian team in which Pele rounded off his remarkable career. Italy had some brilliant footballers in their team, Fachetti, Mazzolla, Rivera and Riva and they were organised (particularly defensively) ahead of their era. The flair, invention and skill of the Brazilians overcame this however, and their 4-1 victory was as comprehensive as there has been in a World Cup Final.

Pele opened the scoring in 18 minutes with a powerful header, but





THE PROGRAMME - South American programmes are fairly rare publications and there were no official Mexican publications for either the tournament or the Final. A multi-lingual brochure was published in England by Queen magazine under licence from FIFA and the Mexican FA and it is accepted as the official programme of the tournament. It was also printed in such quantities they can be obtained for little more than £2. Cover price was 6/-, and with decimalisation looming, underneath was "30p".

The typography and page layout of the 68-page brochure signalled a revolution in programme design and the contents were attractively presented in four colour coded, languages. There were two welcome pages; a three page history of the competition; two pages on the qualifying tournament; a page on each of the competing nations listing their squads, with head and shoulder photographs of some of the players arranged in group order with a preceding page on the venues. There were 8 pages in which results and team selections could be entered for the matches. The front cover had the image of the Jules Rimet Trophy, as it transpired in its final competition, in yellow and blue on a red background.


