

eason Ticket prices will be announced later this week and we will have Season Ticket application forms available for distribution at our final home League game of the season against Tranmere Rovers on Saturday, which has been designated as a Family Day. Thanks to the co-operation and assistance of the CUSA and CFU we aim to hand these out at every turnstile and entry point prior to the game. They will also be available in the Ticket Office, Club Shop, Supporters' Club and Harris Suite. The application forms this year will come in the style of a programme-sized brochure and will also include information on all other aspects of the Club. Season Tickets will be on sale immediately and the Early Purchase Discount ends on 12 noon on Saturday, June 8th 2002.

Admission for the Tranmere Rovers fixture has been reduced to just £5 for adults and £1 for concessions for all areas of the ground and tickets are already selling well. We are recommending that supporters purchase their tickets in advance and the Ticket Office will be open again after the final whistle tonight and between 9.00am and 5.00pm until Friday and until 12 noon on Saturday morning. As always, tickets can be purchased over the telephone using a debit or credit card on (01223) 566500.

This initiative will hopefully provide us with the opportunity of attracting new supporters and we hope that our regulars will encourage family, friends and especially youngsters to come and get a taste of live Nationwide League football. This Family Day goes hand in hand with the Nationwide 'Supporters of Tomorrow'

initiative, which is in operation this season. As a reward to Season Ticket holders attending the Tranmere Rovers game, they will be entered into a draw to win a free Season Ticket for the 2002-2003 season.

Last Tuesday's victory and performance against Chesterfield was excellent and the team showed just what they are capable of and it bodes well for next season. However, Saturday's defeat at Wrexham was the complete opposite and I am sure that the players will be hoping to put things right this evening. Wrexham will join us in Division Three next season as their relegation was confirmed after the game due to results elsewhere in the Division, whilst the final two relegation positions remain unconfirmed. Northampton look like having their status confirmed before we travel there on April 20th for our final away game of the season. This fixture has been made all-ticket and we have received an allocation of 850, of which we have already sold over 200. Adult tickets are priced at £12.00 with juniors and OAP's £8.50.

The last few weeks have been and will be a busy time of the season for the groundstaff. Having hosted the Cambs, Invitation Cup last Thursday, the Colts League Finals on Sunday and a reserve fixture yesterday they also have to get the pitch prepared for the Corporate Six-a-side tournament next Sunday and then our final home reserve game next Monday.

Details of pre-season friendlies are still being finalised and will be listed on the website during the summer months.

t was a great performance in our last home game against Chesterfield, and it was nice to get the goals when we had the pressure and had the play. I think 4-1 was certainly a just reflection on the game.

People have been saying 'oh well, the pressure's off now - you're already relegated', but we've put pressure on the boys to go and perform in front of a home crowd. The LDV final was a great day out, but was a little bit too much for us, and we said to them 'have you got it in you to go and perform and to go and turn on a result and a performance', and they did. Obviously the last few days have been much better than previous weeks.

For Tony Scully to get on the score sheet with his head - well, I'm not sure there's been too many of those ... I'll have to go and look in the archive! The four 'front' players all knocking in one each was very good and what the play thoroughly deserved.

decent ground, the pitch was perfect, but the majority of my players didn't show any commitment. I was embarrassed to

be manager of this Football Club on Saturday, and the poor people who travelled all the way to Wrexham must wonder what's going on. I feel so sorry for them.

It was awful defensively. The first goal came we didn't clear a corner and were punished, and the second half for the first 20 minutes it was mistake after mistake. It could have been eight goals and we couldn't have complained. It was an abject, poor effort - there was a lack of effort, we didn't pass, we made too many poor decisions, we didn't do the simple things - and I'm absolutely devastated.

#### AS GOOD AS ANYTHING

I honestly thought we'd got past the situation of performances like that. The worst thing and the hardest thing is to look around your side and you know that on their day they're as good as anything in the Second Division. We've proved that before - we've beaten to Brentford, we've nearly turned Reading over, on Tuesday night they were absolutely magnificent, and maybe it's because they're so young but it's no good playing like they did on Tuesday night for one game then playing poorly for three.

I'm a very, very unhappy man at the moment. We've cracked the whip before and we'll do it again but I just have to apologise to the people who travelled all this way today and once again spent their hard-earned money, and we've given them nothing. Absolutely nothing.

#### PLAYING IN THE RIGHT WAY

We have shown that we can do better and I will continue to work with the players so that we end the season on the right note, so everyone comes back fuelled and ready for the campaign ahead. We will then have a full pre-season to work with them and instil my footballing principles of playing in the right way, at a decent tempo and, hopefully, entertaining the fans at the same time.

We do need people to come and buy their Season Tickets. We're not banging our heads against a brick wall when we say that we do need the season ticket sales because it is going to be a tough couple or three months in the close season.

#### NOT DONE AND DUSTED


It's not done and dusted that Ash, Andy and Lionel won't be here next season. We're still working tooth and nail to try to keep them on board. One or two things may happen. We may well ask for some assistance from outside the Football Club to see if we could help to keep the boys on board and we've all got to battle to keep them - we know that, but it's one of my biggest targets for the summer; something that we'll be looking at when the season finishes.

## SWINDON

o-one could argue that Andy King's job as manager of Swindon Town is an easy one, even if it is his second time around at the County Ground.

King joined Swindon in November 2000 but was sacked eight months later, and replaced by Roy Evans. However, the appointment was short-lived and when Evans resigned in December last year a new board at the Club asked King if he would return to the hot seat.

Since then King has rescued Swindon from almost certain relegation, taking them from second from bottom in Division Two to a comfortable midtable slot for the run in to the end of the season.

"I feel the players and the season have gone exceptionally well considering the circumstances," said King. "You have to know your own Club and the circumstances within to be able to make those judgements.

"Three points above relegation I feel we've secured our League status with seven or eight games to go so that, on the part of the players, was an amazing achievement."

Managerial changes have not been Swindon's only problem this season. Like many other Clubs in the Nationwide League they must face off-pitch

financial crises just as readily as issues on the pitch.

Swindon have just gone into administration for a second time and the team are struggling to keep the Club alive. But this just makes their impressive performances even sweeter for King.

"We've written history this month," he said. "We're the first Club ever to go into a second administration! Since I've been back I've been under an embargo and I will be until the end of the season. That's made the achievement even greater.

"People don't realise the circumstances. Swindon is a big Club with a history. But we were favourites to go to the wall first,

even before Bury and the rest. They really were severe circumstances that we found ourselves in and our future is still in doubt.

"But it's players' wages that are the greatest cost. It's not the hot dogs, the commercial side or the staff wages. It's the players wages that bankrupt Football Clubs."

Andy King's Swindon side have been in in-consistent form of late, much in keeping with what they have been like most of the season. Comfortable home wins over sides such as Port Vale and Blackpool have ensured the Robins' safety for another season, but they predictably suffered away defeats to Stoke, Huddersfield and Brentford, which prevented them from cementing a place in the top-half.

The Robins notched up a 2-0 win when they played the U's at the County Ground, a similar result would suit them tonight, but they won't be counting on it.

#### THE SQUAD

In goal for the visitors will be Bart Griemink, a giant keeper signed by


Colin Todd on a free transfer in the summer of 2000. Griemink is a former Dutch Under-21 international who spent a successful loan spell with The Robins two years ago as cover for Frank Talia. He came to English football in 1995 with Birmingham and deputised competently for the injured lan Bennett, playing in the 1995 League Cup semifinal. He then followed Barry Fry to Peterborough United but lost his place to the promising Mark Tyler. Griemink started the 2000-01 season as first choice goalkeeper and even deputised as captain, but ended up on the bench as Steve Mildenhall took his place in goal following two dismissals and a lengthy suspension and has played every game this season. One of the most consistent performers, Griemink is currently enjoying a tremendous run of form.

The central defensive pairing will consist of, firstly Adam Willis - a centre back who was revitalised under Colin

Todd. Willis arrived at the County Ground in 1998 on a free transfer from Coventry and was Steve McMahon's last signing for The Robins. He scarcely figured for Jimmy Quinn and was allowed to go on loan to Mansfield after being told he could leave Swindon. But Todd liked the tall defender and gave him a new contract.

Joining him is Alan Reeves. An experienced centre back who is particularly strong in the air, Reeves always causes problems from set pieces and for a brief period last term he was the Club's top goalscorer. In 2000/01 he was told by Colin Todd that he could leave the club, but persuaded the manager to reconsider with some fine pre-season performances. Reeves went on to be a permanent fixture last season and even ended up captaining Swindon in Mark Robinson's absence. Before joining Swindon in 1998, he spent four years at Wimbledon, where he had the tough task of replacing John Scales.

Lining up on the left is Sol Davis, a Young left back who progressed through the youth team ranks at Swindon to make his debut in 1997 just after his 18th birthday. He played in more than half the games in the 1999-2000 season and was a regular again the following campaign. A committed player, Davis' main problem is his poor disciplinary record, which results in frequent suspensions: he was booked 14 times in 2000-01. He is a quick and hard-working player and will no doubt figure in Andy King's







plans this year.

On the opposite flank is Matthew Haywood. Heywood failed to break through at Burnley's Turf Moor and, after being alerted as to his availability by Shaun Reid, Andy King snapped him up on a free transfer. Haywood has signed until the end of next season and has shown in the few games that he's played, just how good a player he is. Strong in the tackle and good in the air, Heywood could prove to be a great asset to the Club. It is no coincidence Town's defensive record improved dramatically following his arrival and he has recently signed a new one-year

Moving on to the midfield quartet, on the right of which will be the versatile Andy Gurney. Gurney joined Reading from Torquay in January 1999 for £100,000 as an attack-minded, right-sided defender who can also play in midfield. He started his career at

hometown Club Bristol Rovers, where he spent four seasons before moving to Torquay for one year and impressing during their surge to the play-offs. Gurney established a regular starting place with Reading in

1999/2000 and figured in the Royals' promotion push last

On the left is Danny Invincible, an Australian midfielder who endeared himself to the fans having been recommended to Colin Todd by Harry Redknapp at West Ham. Invincible subsequently joined the Robins on a free transfer. After a slow start (although he did score on his debut against West Brom), Danny showed the club what he was capable of with five goals in four games in October/November last season.

The central midfield will combine, firstly Bobby Howe. An attacking, skilful midfielder Stephen (who likes to be known as Bobby) often bears the brunt of the crowd's frustration at the County Ground. Howe had a disappointing start to his Swindon career, but recovered to become a regular in their relegation season of 1999-2000 season and was expected to leave

Swindon that summer. But he

impressed Colin Todd in training and pre-season friendlies and earned a place in the team. Nonetheless, he was criticised by fans during poor results last season.

His colleague is attacking central midfielder, Matt Hewlett, who was once tipped for the top by all at Ashton Gate. The former Bristol City player was called into the England Under 21 squad, but a number of injuries curtailed his flourishing Hewlett made

over 100 appearances for City, but left them to join the Robins on a Bosman in the summer of 2000. He was a regular for Colin Todd until being hit by injury again and went on to play 26 League games; the skilful, passing midfielder didn't open his account for the Club in his first year.

The first of the two front men Swindon is Guiliano Grazioli. Robin's fans had high hopes of London-born striker Grazioli for the 2000-01 season. His form was one of the few positive aspects of a disappointing campaign during previous season. Grazioli's eight goals



from only 11 starts compared well with many of his team-mates and with fellow forwards Chris Hay and Iffy Onuora sold, Grazioli was expected to be the spearhead of Swindon's attack the following season. Instead, after a disappointing start, he largely featured as a substitute and netted only two goals (allbeit with one against Oxford), leaving the striker to prove himself

> again. Grazioli was signed for Peterborough from nonleague Wembley in 1995. His goalscoring record for Fry's Peterborough was impressive: 16 in 23 League

> Completing the Robins line-up is Eric Sabin. Few have heard of the young Frenchman, but if he is half as good as King says he is,

then Town supporters could be in for a very exciting season next time around. Sabin joined Town from French Second Division Club Wasquehall who finished 18th last season. Sabin contributed with seven goals in 58 starts but King describes his style of play as that of Thierry Henry. King was invited to watch the lightning quick striker, but deliberately asked Sabin's agent not to tell him which player he was watching. After just a few minutes, King asked if he was lucky enough to be watching Sabin and he was subsequently snapped up on the 25th June. Has scored four goals this season but his pace is a constant thorn in the opposition's side.

ot many players come and go at Swindon Town, either through loyalty or through the dire financial straits in which the Club have found themselves, and Matt Heywood is hoping he can cement his future at the County Ground for some time to come.

The 22-year-old Heywood signed for Swindon in January 2001, from First Division Burnley, when he was starting to feel his chances of becoming a regular in the first team at Turf Moor were lessening.

"The move was a good one for me," Heywood explained. "I was playing reserve team football at

Burnley and, as happy as I was up there, I just wasn't getting the experience or opportunity that I felt I deserved.

"A new chairman with new ideas came in and that didn't help, and so when Shaun Reid came up to watch me and offer me a trial I felt that it would be a fantastic move for me. And it has been."

When Heywood, a towering 6 feet 4 inches defender, arrived at the Wiltshire Club he inspired a spell of six games with only one defeat and has been hailed by tans as one the best in the back row for many years.

Couple this unwavering support with a contract extension from manager Andy King and you'll find one happy chap, who is as keen as ever to firmly establish his inclusion in the team for next season.

"I've been pretty pleased with my season so far," beamed Heywood. "I think I've been pretty consistent. It's my first full season as a first-teamer and so it's gone very well.

"I just hope that I can build on it next year and continue to develop not only as a player but within the team as well."

Heywood is optimistic that if Swindon can survive their second period in administration then events on the pitch will blossom in accordance, proving that the Club's problems are no match for the squad's determination.

He added: "I was happy to sign and


hopefully, if the situation off the field can be resolved then we can look to build on what is already an impressive squad."



Browse the site and you will see that not only are there specific bets on every U's match, but also on every other football match and a wide range of other sports, from horse racing to golf and motor racing.

The new "Auctions" area has the potential to be another big earner for the Club. We receive money for every new registration and we obviously retain most of the winning bid money for the items placed on there for auction. You can also use that part of the site to list your own goods for auction - why not sell some of that programme collection that is gathering dust in the house?

The many commercial items on the right hand side of the page are income generators, too. Any of these will generate income for the Club and, again, your registration is vital as

each one will earn the Club cash. Every order you place via the "Shopping" section, whether it's less than a tenner for a new CD or £135 for a rally driving experience, will save you money and make money for your Club - and no other shopping site can say that!

Like every supporter, you want to be in the know about what's going on at your Club. With our new mobile SMS service, we can update you with text alerts to your mobile phone; so wherever you are, whatever you're doing, you'll have all the latest news as it happens.

Who were the first supporters to find out that Fred Murray had signed permanently? Who were first to know that Armand One had joined Middlesbrough on trial? The subscribers to our SMS service!

No other football text service comes close. Your official Club SMS service comes direct from the club, so you'll get insights and exclusive managerial comment that no other service can match. Choose from our wide range of SMS alerts and change these whenever you wish. Because it's your Club's official service, your subscription directly benefits your Club and all mobile phone operators are now covered.

Do you run your own business? By registering and using Froghopper, you will not only get your business a web presence, but also advertising within the nationwide Froghopper database. remove Sepp Blatter from world soccer governing body FIFA's presidency." Speaking in the wake of a string of allegations against Blatter, Addo gave his support to Cameroonian candidate Issa Hayatou who will run

head to head against Blatter when he attempts to be re-elected for a second term next month.

Hayatou will be the first person in 28 years to challenge a sitting FIFA president. The 55-year-old has made claims that Blatter offered him £100,000 four years ago to buy his vote for the presidency on the promise that he would only rule the world's governing body for a four year term.

Blatter has come under fire in recent weeks over allegations of financial mismanagement at FIFA and vote rigging by his supporters ahead of the 1998 election. Blatter has consistently denied any wrongdoing during his tenure at FIFA president, and believes he will be reinstated as president despite the allegations.

Finally, ITV have found themselves in more hot water this week, shortly after the digital company went into administration, throwing the future of many smaller Clubs into jeopardy. The television company have enraged the Koreans ahead of this summers World Cup after selecting Japanese theme music for their coverage. The Koreans are unhappy about ITV picking a specially adapted version of Un Bel di Vedrema from the Giacomo Puccini work Madame Butterfly because the opera was set in Japan. Hyon Tak Hwang, the press counsellor at the Korean Embassy, said "I do not think it is fair that ITV has chosen music that the viewers will associate very much with Japan. The World Cup is taking place in Korea also and I will be discussing the matter with ITV in the hope of persuading them to change to a more neutral choice of music." While you're at it Hyon, you wouldn't mind asking them to get their chequebook out wou'lld you?

t appears the troubles of escalating players wages and television deals collapsing are not confined to these islands, with the German game in impending crisis following the news the Kirch media group, who own the broadcast rights for the German Premier League until 2004, are on the verge of going bankrupt. The organisation have announced they may not be able to pay the money owed to the Clubs unless a compromise is reached, which could leave many top German Clubs facing financial disaster.

As a result Bayer Leverkusen manager Reiner Calmund has called for widespread reduction of player salaries, telling press, "We have reached the absolute maximum and must achieve a reduction of 20 percent". There is a crisis meeting planned between the media group and Premier Club Chairmen later this month, where a reduction of the television money is expected to be negotiated.

In more cheerful news, Sepp Blatter's days as the president of FIFA appear to be numbered. Farah Addo, vice president of the African Football Confederation has launched a scathing attack this week, declaring that "Africa and Europe will unite to

The remaining ten Clubs were supposed to be safe. It was bleak in Division Three, with eight Clubs being rated as 'Critical': Bristol Rovers, Carlisle, Halifax, Lincoln, Oxford, Swansea, Torquay and York. Another six were rated as 'At risk': Darlington, Hartlepool, Hull, Rochdale, Shrewsbury and Southend.

I'm sure you've all heard the gloom and doom merchants, on both TV and the radio, you know - we're going to have to go part time, regionalised Leagues, become feeder clubs for bigger brethren etc. What I do know, is at the end of this season, there are going to be possibly over a thousand previously well paid players, hitting the reality of the dole queue, and dare I say it, 'The real world.'



Conduct Police/Stewards: The stewards were friendly and under-employed by the small crowd.

Conduct of United Fans: Allocated the centre section of a large stand, there was just over 25 seats for fan - although the ratio looked even higher! This meant that it was difficult to generate much noise, especially as most of the travelling hoards sat some distance from each other!

Conduct of Home Fans: Wigan fans appeared to have a similar

ratio, and with only six singing, plus one sporadic drum, there was little sound in the stadium to disturb anyone looking to catch up on a little sleep - until the p.a. system got going!


State of Ground: Set on the edge of the aforementioned retail park, the JJB Stadium is impressive - until a small crowd turns up, then, the spectators rattle around amongst the sea of blue, white and red seats that surround the pitch.

The stadium was built by the same people who did Huddersfield's, and the similarities and very apparent. With Cantilever stands surrounding the pitch, there is not an internal pillar anywhere in the stadium to block the view. The ends of each of these stands were a little 'blocky', so gave the impression that a 'lego' model of the ground had first been built then placed in an 'enlarging ray' to turn it into the full-sized stadium.

The stadium is shared with Wigan Warriors Rugby League, so the only really disappointing aspect to the ground is the pitch. Rugby League markings were still visible on the threadbare playing surface, which was part artificial.

Officials' Performance: Mr Brandwood was better than his assistants who dozed off a couple of times during the match.

Additional Comments: The p.a. system - or rather 'THE P.A. SYSTEM' - was a little excessive. If you thought those at Reading or Bury were loud, they were but a whisper when compared to Wigan's. I wouldn't say that it was deafening, but for days afterwards the only word I used was 'pardon?'







To mark 50 years as Cambridge United, Kevin Palmer has trawled the archives to find a selection of matches over those years which are, for one reason or another, memorable.

SWINDON TOWN 2 CAMBRIDGE UNITED 0 (Swindon win 3-2 on aggregate) Coca-Cola Cup First Round Second Leg Wednesday, 23 August 1995

The draw for the Coca-Cola Cup brought a collective groan from everybody in amber and black. United, newly arrived back in the Third Division were drawn against the hot team in the Second Division - Swindon Town. It was obviously critical that United took a lead down to Wiltshire in the second leg, but they did so in bizarre circumstances. Ty Gooden had put Town into a second minute lead, but after ten minutes United had equalised through Corazzin. Then after 62 minutes came the controversy. United's Lenny Pack raced in on goal and Steve Mildenhall (Swindon's 17 year old keeper on his debut) brought him down outside the box. Referee Steve Bennett awarded a penalty, but failed to issue a card for the tackle. Both managers agreed it wasn't a penalty, but United's Tommy Taylor thought it should have been a sending-off offence. Inevitably the end result was a goal anyway, Corazzin netting from the spot.

The 2-1 victory for United left the second leg nicely poised. Both teams made major changes, Town bringing in Murray, Thorne and Horlock in place of Robinson, Allison and Gooden with United switching Vowden from left-back to right-back in place of the injured Jeffrey, bringing in Palmer in his place and replacing Craddock with Westley in central defence. Stock and Pack both start-

ed in place of Kyd and Barrick, Steve Butler was injured.

United's gameplan was straightforward. Taylor detailed his midfielders to shackle Swindon's playmakers, with new boy Stock given the awesome task of keeping tight reins on playermanager McMahon. With the midfield concentrating on stopping rather than creating. Taylor was aware there might not be many goal attempts from his men and he predicted that they would sneak a goal from a set piece, with Westley being the main target in such circumstances. To

McMahon was confident, understates it somewhat and he was convinced that his side's extra class would tell.

The first half went Cambridge's way. Sure enough they only had brief glimpses of the Swindon goal, but more importantly they frustrated the home side and restricted them to just two clear-cut chances. Barrett reacted quickly to foil an O'Sullivan header, then Thorne cursed himself as he aimed a header wide of the post when a goal seemed inevitable. With United having successfully protected their one-goal cushion, all the manager could do was to say 'more of the same, please.'

Swindon were being urged on continually during the second half, because the manager was in the middle of the pitch and he watched future-U's striker Finney come agonisingly close twice within the first two minutes. With the rookies of United visibly gaining confidence as the game progressed, they took advantage of Swindon's growing desperation by mounting a few attacks of their own. Though the home goal never seemed to be in any real danger, it was enough to tie up the red defence and prevent them surging forward as often as they would have liked.


With twenty minutes remaining, McMahon decided it was time to play his trump cards. Hooper and Beauchamp entered the action and immediately went out on the wings in order to stretch Cambridge's overworked midfield. It worked a treat. McMahon kept calming his men down, trying to instil patience into what was becoming an evermore-frustrating experience. They did so, and with new outlets for the man on the ball they were able to switch the play from short balls to long balls to confuse the men in amber.

The breakthrough came after 79 minutes. Finney sent over what appeared to be an overlong cross, but Beauchamp managed to head it past Barrett from an acute angle. Now it was all square and suddenly United were hanging on for extra-time. They almost snatched a dramatic win after 85 minutes when Thompson had a header from a corner cleared off the line, but the match entered stoppage time with the aggregate score at 2-2. With extra-time looming, the home side launched one more attack, which won them a corner. Beauchamp sent it over and Horlock threw himself at the ball and sent a power header past the startled Barrett. Heartbreak for the U's fans who had made the long trip, but it seemed unlikely that 30 minutes of extra-time would have changed the outcome.

Swindon went on to lose 2-5 on aggregate to Blackburn in Round Two, but made up for it by running away with the Second Division championship. United performed their usual party trick of a promising start followed by a mid-season collapse, ending up in the wrong half of the Third Division. Imagine everyone's faces when the FA Cup draw was announced - Swindon at home to Cambridge. This was a one-sided game that ended up 4-1 to the Robins, but Swindon had all the luck in the cup that year, with five successive home ties, their luck running out in a replay at Southampton.



SCOTT BARRETT: Experienced goalkeeper who made 119 League appearances for Cambridge prior to joining Leyton Orient on a free transfer in January 1999. He featured in the 1998-99 Third Division play-off final and contested a first-team slot with Ashley Bayes as they reached the play-offs again last season.

COLIN VOWDEN: Versatile defender who made 30 Third Division appearances while at Abbey Stadium prior to joining Kettering Town in July 1997. He was voted their 'Player of the Year' in 1997-98 and moved to Conference League rivals Dover Athletic in June 2001, then joined Cambridge City in February 2002.

LEE PALMER: Versatile left-back who also featured in a central defensive role and his sole goal in 31 League games came in Cambridge's 3-1 win at home to Colchester United in August 1995. He was loaned to Woking prior to joining Dover Athletic in July 1997, then moved to Folkestone Invicta in March 1999.

DAVE THOMPSON: Central defender who scored twice in 44 League outings while at Abbey Stadium before moving to Yeovil Town on a free transfer in January 1998. He joined Chesham United two months later, then moved to Cambridge City in March 1999 and subsequently played for Soham Town Rangers.

SHANE WESTLEY: Experienced central defender who made three League appearances for Cambridge before being sold to Lincoln City for £7,500 in October 1995 where he was appointed team captain. He subsequently assisted John Beck at Sincil Bank and had a spell as Lincoln's manager until November 1998.

MATT JOSEPH: Versatile central defender who scored six goals in 159 League outings while at Abbey Stadium before following Tommy Taylor to Leyton Orient for £10,000 in January 1998. The Barbados international starred as they reached the play-offs last season and has twice been their 'Player of the Year'.

RUSSELL STOCK: Young midfielder whose sole goal in 17
Third Division games clinched United's 2-1 win at Hartlepool in December 1995. He joined Kettering Town in August 1996, then had spells with Cambridge City and Diss before moving to Eastern Counties League side Wroxham in November 1998.

CRAIG MIDDLETON: Former Coventry City midfielder who scored ten goals in 59 League outings while at Abbey Stadium prior to joining Cardiff City on a free transfer in August 1996. Following a loan spell at Plymouth Argyle, he moved to Halifax Town for £25,000 in March 2000 and helped to avoid relegation.

DAVID ADEKOLA: Nigerian international striker who scored once in five League games for Cambridge prior to joining Bishop's Stortford in November 1995. He then played for German side Preussen Munster, Brighton, Bishop's Stortford again, Billericay, Slough, Walton & Hersham, Chesham and Hendon.

CARLO CORRAZIN: Canadian international striker who was leading marksman in two consecutive seasons and netted 39 goals in 105 League outings prior to joining Plymouth Argyle for £150,000 in March 1996. He moved to Northampton Town in July 1998 and has been with Oldham Athletic since July 2000.

LENNY PACK: Young midfielder who made 15 League appearances while at Abbey Stadium and had a loan spell at Baldock Town prior to joining Kettering Town in August 1997. He subsequently had a spell with Diss Town prior to rejoining Baldock in July 2000 and is currently playing for Woodbridge Town.

#### **DANNY JACKMAN**

Worcester-born Danny Jackman joined Cambridge United in February on loan from Aston Villa, and he has recorded nine appearances and scored one goal, the equaliser in the 2-2 draw at Bournemouth last month.

Danny has a 16-year-old sister and a ten-year-old brother who is following in his footsteps by being on the books of Aston Villa. Danny was spotted playing for Worcester Colts Sunday League team and joined his favourite team Villa when he was 12, although he admits that he also has a soft spot for Chelsea as he has relatives who support the London Club.

#### **VERY GOOD PRO**

His favourite player as a boy was Gary Lineker - "he was a good role model" - but as he grew up he admired players like David Beckham and Roy Keane. Closer to home, there are several players at Aston Villa who have inspired him and given him advice, as he explained.

"I admire Paul Merson, he's a good person to talk to because he's been through a lot. He will talk to you and he's a very good pro now. Steve Staunton is another good pro and he's very experienced and still going strong - he'll be going to the World Cup this year.

"Another good pro that I really got on well with is Gareth Southgate, one of the best defenders in England and one of the best pros I've come across. You look up to people like that, him and Ugo Ehiogu who I was good friends with when he was at Villa."

#### **BIGGEST ADJUSTMENT**

After progressing through the schoolboy ranks at Villa, Danny was offered a three year YTS and he was still eligible to play for the youth team this season.

Speaking highly of Villa Under-17s coach Tony McAndrew, Under-19s coach Gordon Cowans, and reserve team manager Kevin McDonald, Danny added, "I've been playing for the Under-19s when they've been struggling for players but this is my first full season in the reserves. I was just expecting to play reserve team football all this year but when Cambridge came in it was unbelievable, I didn't expect it at all."

Admitting that Villa reserves have struggled this season, Danny says the pace of first team football has been the biggest adjustment in Division Two: "It's the same sort of job and you get on it with, wherever you are, but I found that the pace of football here is a lot quicker. It's not as physical as I thought it would be. I thought I would find it hard but I can look after myself pretty well, so the pace of the game is the biggest difference.

"They try to get it down and play it about a bit so that's nice, rather than lumping it forward, and they're a good bunch of lads as well; they've made me feel very welcome. I've settled in well and I've made a lot of good new friends. I'm one of the youngest in the first team, apart from David Bridges and Aggy Revell, so it's a very young and inexperienced team."

#### **BODES WELL FOR THE FUTURE**

Despite the disappointment of relegation, Danny believes the youth of the squad and the experience they have gained this season bodes well for the

future.

"I think they'll do very well next season if they keep most of this side together and let the manager get things sorted. If they can keep the management here, they've got the right sort of ideas and plans for the future and the way they're trying to play.

"I think they're trying to do things the right way and they've showed a lot of faith in the youngsters, and of course the younger lads are going to make mistakes, but this season is a learning curve and puts them in good stead for next season. They'll be wiser for a season in League football."

Danny himself is a versatile and naturally left-footed player, able to play anywhere down the left flank, and he has enjoyed his role at United on the left of midfield.

"I play left-back for the reserves at Aston Villa but I do get forward a lot during games, and for the 19s I play up front sometimes, or left wing," he explains. "I joined Villa as a striker and I would call myself more of an attacking player than a defensive player because I like to take the game to the other side and make them defend rather than me!" he smiles.

At just 5ft 4ins tall, Danny is aware that he is not the most frightening figure for an opponent to face, but he finds that can be an advantage. "A defender looks at me and thinks I can be pushed off the ball quite easily but I can give as good as I get and my pace helps, too."

#### **ENJOY A RETURN TO THE ABBEY**

Danny has been receiving treatment on a shoulder injury but he returned to training on Monday and hopes to be involved in the final three games of the season, before returning to Aston Villa to see what his future holds. He is under contract for another two years, but would enjoy a return to the Abbey next season if the Clubs agree on a further loan.

"It would be nice to come back next year if things are going well," he adds. 
"I'll have had experience of playing in a struggling team and hopefully they'll do well next season and I think the manager wants me back. If the management can get a good pre-season into the players, a great start can set you up for the rest of the season.



#### OXFORD UNITED UNDER-19S 3 CAMBRIDGE UNITED 0





## ni koed kool RESNIA

Former U's Secretary Steve Greenall continues his behind the scenes reminiscences in his own gregarious column.

When Nigel Pleasants became Secretary in late 1989, you might have thought that his first job would to bring some of his vast footballing experience to bear. He'd been secretary at Norwich City, during the reign of their former Chairman, Sir Arthur South. Robert Chase, a name I came to hear almost every day of my two years at Carrow Road, had swept to power, and had set about a complete overhaul of many of the positions there. Nigel became a victim of this, and before joining United, had been running a pub in Norfolk.

Now Nigel had been used, at Norwich, to having a number of assistants to whom he could delegate and share the work. He quickly found at United that he'd be doing much of the work on his own, and if he were to admit the truth, he found it all a bit bewildering, apart from the true Football administration, at which he excelled, and brought about sorely needed control. One thing I'd have to say though, was that Nigel wasn't the most tidy of chaps, and his office at best resembled a major accident in a paper mill!

Lisa Wade, another great long servant, used to recall to me, Nigel's catchphrase. "It don't matter, do it? We'll do it tomorrow!", From what I can tell, whatever "it" was often didn't ever get done! Nigel was a 'big club' man, and made no
secret of the fact that he'd like to get back to such a Club. What's more, David
Ruston noted, at the time of Nigel's resignation, that whilst Nigel had many good
qualities, the running of a small Club needed someone with a broader knowledge.
Which may lead you to ask, how the heck did they ever offer the position to a
bloke who was not from the area, who had been an accountant all his life, and
had been covering United for ClubCall, as well as CN-FM (now Q 103).

Well, that was how I came to be asked if I was interested. I can remember Req.

Smart sounding me out for the positions, and saying, "don't tell anyone we've spoken". A day later, John beck asked me, at the end of our weekly ClubCall chat "has the Chairman spoken to you about any jobs?" So much for 'best kept secret'. From what I learnt earlier, most of the office knew they wanted me to go there. I also later learned that because of my then employer - Homepride - my nickname among the staff was "BreadHead".

I'd had a couple of interviews, including one with David Ruston at his office, and lunch with Reg at the Ancient shepherds in Fen Ditton, which at the time was about the closest it got to United having a staff canteen. Ten minutes before the first game of the 1990/91 season, I told Reg I'd join him, with Nigel Pleasants by then on his way to Elland Road.

Years on, I can vouch for what I said to Ailsa. It Is a real job, and I was proud to do it; equally as proud when my number two filled the seat I'd kept warm for eight years. Keep going Pinch; you've only got four and a half years to beat my record.



## Programmes of IHE PAST

A series of articles by the Editor of PROGRAMME MONTHLY & FOOTBALL COLLECTABLE magazine describing how programmes have changed over a century and a quarter of Association Football.

#### 24. - GLORIOUS TECHNICOLOR

Nowhere has the advances in modern print technology been seen in matchday programmes than in the widespread use of full colour printing. It is now very unusual to see a League match programme (in England) that does not have full colour reproduction on every page, but it is only in the last 20 years that such Technicolor coverage, previously the exclusive prerogative of magazines, has spread.

The first full colour to be seen on programmes was at Wembley Stadium. The first match there, the 1923 FA Cup final between Bolton Wanderers and West Ham United, sported a full colour cover, albeit in design only and not in photography. For a number of years Wembley persisted with this style for Cup Finals and England v Scotland matches, the full colour sketches of the stadium, players and match action making up in glorious Technicolor what they lacked in art appreciation.

The 1930's saw full colour abandoned by Wembley, to be replaced by mono- or two-tone designs, some of them in the art deco style of the period. Sketches of the stadium and match action re-appeared after the war, but the colouration was,

at most, three colour - usually a green background with blue and red detail, along with black print. One or two Clubs came close to full colour, also featuring three colours in their cover designs. Wolves were notable in this respect, with their old gold complemented by the other colours of the Club crest; and Banbury Spencer of the Birmingham Senior League had full colour printing in their cover sketch in 1958/59 season.

Full colour photographs first appeared in Club programmes in the late 1960's, initially as inserts (at West Ham) and then included on a four page spread which was

obviously printed separately from the rest of the monotone issue. The major Clubs, with their huge print runs, were to the forefront of this development - notably Chelsea and Arsenal.

In the 1970's, full colour was still in its infancy, although most Clubs had incorporated a number of colours in their front-page design, and occasionally throughout the issue. Initially, colour was confined to the front-page photograph - which sometimes changed with each issue, and more often did not for the entire season. A national advertiser was invariably on the same sheet (i.e. on the back page) thereby assisting with the considerable extra cost. The Scots were slow to embrace full colour in their club programmes, and indeed the honour of the first in that country fell to lowly Albion Rovers in the late 1970s, albeit the cover design and background stadium scene were of little artistic merit.

Today, we take full colour photography and design very much for granted, and indeed developments in recent seasons have seen laminated card covers, and (notably with Sheffield Wednesday) partially laminated cover designs, which add to the aesthetic quality and attraction of those splendid productions.

ark Stephen has been a lifetime supporter of the mighty U's, and funnily enough it mirrors exactly how long we've been members of the Football League! Although now a regular in the Habbin, he was one of the original members of the 'Tick-Tock', following graduation from the er..um..'infamous' Allotment Enders of the '70's.

Mark, even now, continues to do his bit for the furtherance of our Club, and is one of the great helpers of 'Bomber' and his Unofficial CU Supporters Club coach members in sponsoring matches, the Huddersfield one being the latest. He is also hoping to see his brick emblazoned with Mark 'Tick Tock' Stephen in the wall at the new North End development eventually.

He's witnessed hundreds of players and maybe a dozen managers in his time, but Ron Atkinson is the one who impressed him the most' "Going on TV

as a pundit shattered my illusions of him unfortunately."

On the playing front, Kevin Dearden in the 'keeper role, was who Mark remembers as having a brilliant loan spell here for 15 games in early 1989. He wants younger

fans to discount the "larger" version seen with Brentford and last season with Wrexham. 'Wolfie' Smith took his plaudits as his ace defender adding "we could do with him right now!" He looked upon mid-

fielder Micah Hyde, still strutting his stuff at Watford, as: "simply class." Mark, always one not to toe the line, regarded his choice up front Alan Biley as "The true King of The Abbey."

Mark relayed some of his memorable matches to me, reckoning his favourite was the 2nd Leg of the Division Four Play Offs at Maidstone on the 16 May 1990. "It was the start of a few glorious years." He remembers vividly Steve Fallon's 40 yarder at Gillingham on John Docherty's managerial debut in January 1978. He also feels he has a claim to fame of being only one of 13 fans braving Southport just after our FA Cup demise to Leatherhead 'Lip' Kelly in November 1975.

Mark, after all these years, obviously still loves our Club intensely, and so one tends to listen to what he has to say. When questioned about his likes/dislikes he was quite forthright. "Although I love The Abbey, and we're easily the greatest Club, it's still a bit of a shed!" He was also critical of the P.R at the Club, when comparing his experiences at the Huddersfield game with a similar sponsorship last season. He feels we should have took greater advantage of our first appearance at The Millennium Stadium. One of his pet hates is when with no colour clash with the home team; we on our away trips still wear blue as opposed to amber and black!

This year we will also be joined by a team of United players to include Paul Wanless and John Taylor.


The cost of the event will be £27.50 for CFU members and £30 for non-members to include the green fee, food and prizes.



## **Division Two Round Up**

#### **BRIGHTON BREEZY**

Well, let's start off by openly admitting how wrong I was. Last time, I told you to expect Brighton to falter, with one-man goal frenzy Bobby Zamora out with a dislocated shoulder, but no - they go and prove me wrong! Brighton regained top spot over Easter, racking up a 2-1 win against Bristol City and a 4-1 win at Colchester, where Richard Carpenter, Wayne Gray and Paul Brooker all hit the onion bag in the first half an hour. Even Colchester keeper Simon Brown registered an own goal in the last minute to help the Zamora-less Seagulls. Then this weekend, Zamora made an unexpected return at Peterborough, missed a third-minute penalty yet still cracked in a half volley

to win the game.

Brighton's success came at Reading's expense, who have now drawn seven of their last nine games. Their latest results were a 3-3 humdinger at Bristol City (which saw three goals in the first 15 minutes, including two penalties), a 0-0 with Northampton, in which the Cobblers failed to register a single shot on target, and a 2-2 draw at Tranmere. This last point may have taken Reading back into the second automatic promotion place, but it also quaranteed Brighton promotion - so congratulations to them. In fact, Brighton's achievement is all the more impressive when you con-

sider that four years ago, they'd come 23rd in the Third Division for the second year running and looked like going out of business. Now Peter Taylor can look forward to playing ex-Seagulls boss Mickey Adams and his relegated Leicester side in Division One next season!

#### KINGHT KNIGHT LEON

Behind the front two, Brentford still have the best chance of an automatic promotion spot, after beating promotion rivals Stoke 1-0, taking them to third place, and also overcoming fellow challengers Huddersfield 3-0, moving them into second for a day. Huddersfield themselves are stuttering, drawing against Wrexham and Oldham, and have now lost their goal-scoring talisman Leon Knight for the foreseeable future. The diminutive striker was sent off against Oldham, and now faces a three-match ban for the red card, another two-game suspension for a disrepute charge, and is only one booking away from another suspension. Won't see him again this season then...

The form team of the moment are still Cardiff, whose 23 points from the last 27 possible might well be enough to claim a play-off spot. Their three latest wins - over Chesterfield, Port Vale and Colchester - suggest the Bluebirds could join even Brighton in cruising straight through from the Third Division to the First.

Bristol City got a single point from their Easter programme, having played the top two, but at least won at home to Bury to resurrect their slim hopes of a play-off place. One of their two goals, both scored in the last five minutes, came from wingback Mickey Bell, his fifth in seven games. Meanwhile, QPR are making a late rally with identical 3-2 wins over Tranmere and Notts County

- coming from behind to strike a late winner each time - and a 1-0 victory over Swindon. With Brentford due to face Reading on the last day, and Bristol City at home to Stoke, there's every chance the final places won't be decided until the final whistle on the final day, so Rangers can't be counted out quite yet.

#### THE LATE, LATE SHOW

As expected, the first team in the Division to fall through the trapdoor was Cambridge United, despite a point from a 2-2 draw at Oldham. Ian Ashbee and a Luke Guttridge penalty looked like sealing that elusive away win, but at the end of each half, Dean Holden grabbed late equalisers - the second coming in an desperate goalmouth scramble in the 97th minute. What a way to get relegated!

Still, with the pressure off and only pride to play for, United turned on the style last week at home to Chesterfield, registering a 4-1 win, their best of the season. Kitson, Tudor, Youngs and manof-the-match Tony Scully all had the pleasure of getting on the score sheet.

Wrexham, despite losing 3-0 at Blackpool, gained a stay of execution over Easter thanks to other results, then faced Cambridge this weekend. The Red Dragons raised their game and whooped the Us 5-0, with Lee Jones, on a week-to-week contract, getting all five goals. This time, however, other results

conspired against Wrexham so despite their emphatic win; they will also be in Division Three next year. What a way to get relegated!

#### SHAKEN, NOT STIRRED

Relegation battlers Bury - not called the Shakers for nothing - had a wobbly old Easter, losing to Northampton, battling to beat Brentford 2-0, thanks to a Chris Billy brace, then slumping again at Bristol City. They are now three points behind Notts County and safety, and their main hope of survival rests on the fact that the Magpies face Cardiff and Huddersfield in their two remaining games. However, Notts County are on an amazing run,




having registered six wins in eight games, so it seems that the Us might be facing Bury next season after all - along with Bournemouth. The Cherries followed up losses to Notts County and Colchester with a 0-0 draw with PortVale, and now need a small miracle to avoid relegation.






