Rome wasn't built in a day but our cause will be strengthened if we can improve in this area.

I would like to officially welcome the three new summer signings, Carl Muggleton, Kevin Dawson & Chris Brandon to the club. I am confident they will settle in and improve us given time. I would also like to thank the players who have left the club in the close season for the commitment and enthusiasm they have given to the club, I wish them every success in the future.

Finally we came back from QPR empty handed and the disappointment on the players' faces at full time told the story. For 75 minutes we did every right, we should have taken the lead a lot earlier in the first half and could have easily been 3-0 up before a few moments of inexperience and a wicked deflection cost us the game. We can take a lot of positives from the game against a team who I feel will not be far away at the end of the season. Steve Blatherwick suffered a hamstring strain and will be sidelined for a while so I will be looking to bring players in on loan to bolster the squad in the next few weeks.

Tonight's game against Swindon will be a tough contest and I'm sure it will produce more talking points. Hopefully positive ones!

You will know how the team got on at Queens Park Rangers last Saturday and we hope to be building on a positive result from Loftus Road. The pre Season friendlies gave everyone a good work out and although some of the later results might have been disappointing, some of the performances were very impressive. Town were not outclassed in the first halves against either Manchester United or Middlesbrough, both of course sides from the Premier Division, and were certainly the better side against Bradford City. I have only seen one other Second Division side so far, Notts County, and I did not feel that they would give the Spireites too much to worry about. It is always difficult to judge pre season friendlies because of the difference in the opposition. Queens Park rangers were hammered 7-3 by Celtic and then beat Tottenham Hotspur in the next game at Loftus Road. The bizarre variable weather has also had an effect on the pre season, with some matches being either postponed or abandoned, like the Mansfield v Derby game a couple of weeks ago.

Tonight's fixtures see a first ever meeting between our South Yorkshire neighbours Barnsley and newly promoted Cheltenham Town. This will be a tough test for the Robin's following their opening day fixture with Wigan Athletic at Whaddon Road. Blackpool entertain another promoted side, Luton Town at Bloomfield Road after the Hatters opened the season at Kenilworth Road with a local Derby against Peterborough United. Cardiff City, who lost out in the play offs,

Relegated Crewe Alexandra meet Notts County at Gresty Road following the Railwaymen's visit to Northampton Town whilst Barry Fry's Peterborough welcome Oldham Athletic to London Road, the Latics having played Cardiff City at Boundary Park. Division Three champions Plymouth Argyle offer a long journey to Huddersfield Town who met defeated play off contenders Brentford at the McAlpine. Relegated Stockport opened the season at Colchester and tonight host QPR at Edgeley Park whilst County's opponents on Saturday make the cross country trek to Prenton Park to meet Tranmere Rovers. Wigan Athletic and Ian Breckin meet also promoted Mansfield Town at the JJB Stadium, after the men from over the Motorway took on champions Plymouth Argyle at Field III. This was the first of many long journeys, which the Devon side will have to make. Wycombe Wanderers entertain Northampton Town at Adams Park after travelling up to Meadow Lane on Saturday to face Notts County.

The season's excitement begins here, and it is great to Saltergate being developed so that in a few weeks time we will once again have a four-sided ground with a capacity of around 8000. The progress made on the ground in one year is amazing, but we have to ask the question how long will it be viable for the Spireites to continue to play at their spiritual home? Enjoy tonight's match and really get behind the team. Remember that positive thinking produces positive results. Look what a great effect the crowd had on the Athletes at the Commonwealth games, it's no different here!

The Manager

Swindon Town, like ourselves, are no strangers to financial problems, Chairman Willie Carson, the former Queen's Jockey, guided the Wiltshire Club into administration for a second stint during last season and Manager Andy King, like many Clubs at all levels, is having to search high and low for the right calibre players who can be hired on the right level of wages.

It's only nine years since The Robins were in the Premier Division, and whilst they may have lost 5-1 at Southampton, 6-2 at Everton and 7-1 at Newcastle United, not too many supporters would wish that excursion into the top echelon hadn't taken place. They were relegated in their one and only top flight season and they plummeted straight into Division Two a year later but bounced back winning the Championship at the first time of asking.

Four seasons in Division One, all a struggle, ended with relegation back to this level in 2000 and, despite decent County Ground gates, financial scandal and mismanagement has never been far from the Robins' nest. We truly sympathise.

Last season saw ex Liverpool boss Roy Evans take over the helm, Swindon have a history of appointing high profile names to the Manager's Hotseat, prior incumbents have included Glenn Hoddle, Ossie Ardiles, Lou Macari, Colin Todd, Steve McMahon and Dave Mackay. Evans left the Club in December last year and he was replaced by the man he'd replaced, ex Mansfield Town boss King.

This summer the Manager has lost last season's equal top scorer Guiliano Grazioli, he of the excellent forearm control technique, to Bristol Rovers, but he still retains a squad of 21 first team players and he'll be hoping to improve on last season's finishing position of 13th.

Swindon's pre season has brought some decent results, they drew at home to both Spanish Club Sporting Gijon (2-2) and Division One side Wimbledon, or is that Milton Keynes, one each was that score, whilst their non league warm up games saw them narrowly beat neighbours Didcot but they knocked Newport (IOW) for six. King took the opportunity to look at plenty of triallists including several overseas hopefuls and he signed Buckingham Town's Darren Dykes whilst ex Portsmouth Brazilian Born, American with an Italian passport Stefani Miglioranzi has joined on a short term contract.

Supporters Trust

As you'd expect at a Club where there have been problems, Swindon supporters have formed a Trust called TrustSTFC who have a website www.truststfc.co.uk Recent activities undertaken by the Supporters Direct backed organisation have included a lobby against the big price rises for County Ground season tickets set by the administrators back in the Spring.

Andy King

Born in August 1956, in Luton, King made his name as a lively midfielder having joined his home town club in 1974. His next stop was Everton, the club with which most people associate him, whom he signed for in 1976 for £35,000. He made 150 appearances for The Toffees, scoring an impressive 38 goals in four seasons at Goodison before joining QPR.

One season with the Superhoops was followed by another at West Bromwich Albion before a return to Everton for the 1982-83 season, where Andy played a further 43 games and added another 11 goals to his tally for the Toffees. A short period with Dutch side Cambuur followed, before Andy returned to England with Wolves, for whom he played 28 times scoring 10 goals.

A very brief spell back at Luton in 1985 (just three appearances) preceded Andy's final move as a player when he joined Aldershot and notched 11 goals in 36 games for the Surrey side. Having retired as a player, he turned to coaching, and was given his first managerial appointment at Mansfield Town in 1993 following George Foster's departure. Having been relegated from Division Two,

Mansfield were low on confidence but King managed to steer them to a mid-table finish in his first season at the helm. The following season saw The Stags in with a chance of promotion back to the Second Division, having finished in 6th place in the table, but they were beaten in the play-off semi-finals by John Duncan's Chesterfield.

The 1995-96 season saw Mansfield drop down to 19th position in Division Three and Andy was replaced at Field Mill by Steve Parkin. Andy spent some time out of management but was still involved in the game, and was working with former Everton team-mate Peter Reid at Premiership club Sunderland as a scout when Colin Todd took him to Swindon as his assistant manager in the summer of 2000.

When Todd got the call from Jim Smith to be his assistant at Derby County, King was given the opportunity to impress chairman Terry Brady, and after four games in charge he was given the job full-time, on November 6, 2000. Swindon struggled to keep themselves out of the relegation zone for most of the season but a win over Peterborough in the penultimate game of their league campaign, coupled with Bristol Rovers loss to Wycombe, ensured their Second Division survival. The great escape act was not enough to ensure Andy King's survival however. Despite his efforts in keeping The Robins up he was replaced at the County Ground by former Liverpool boss Roy Evans in June 2001. But he was not gone for long. Evans left the club before the end of the year, after new owners arrived at the County Ground, and Andy King - who had taken legal action against Swindon with regard to his dismissal - was reinstated as manager on December 20 2001.

Like The Spireites had to for much of last season, Swindon have had to get League approval for new signings after entering administration for a second time, so Manager King has only been able to bring in three players this summer, SAM PARKIN has signed on a two year contract from Chelsea, STEFANI MIGLIORANZI is on a month to month basis after a spell at Portsmouth whilst ex Buckingham Town man DARREN DYKES has been added to the squad after a successful trial.

Third year scholars NATHAN EDWARDS, KEVIN HALLIDAY and CRAIG FARR have joined the ranks of full pro's at The County Ground for this season.

Leavers since the end of last season have been GUILIANO GRAZIOLI, last season's joint top scorer, he's now at Ray Graydon's Bristol Rovers, PAUL EDWARDS has gone to Wrexham whilst BOBBY HOWE, JAMES WILLIAMS, PAUL McAREAVEY, BERTI BRAYLEY, BRYAN SMITH and RICHARD McKINNEY have been freed, though of those, only Howe was a regular last season.

Swindon's website last week revealed that NEIL RUDDOCK had been placed on the transfer list, it indicated his wages represented 20% of the Club's player budget. He's not played since Christmas. Town last paid a transfer fee in February 2001, £50,000 to Birmingham City for STEVE ROBINSON, still a vital squad member.

Form Report The Robins Run

Pre season games are notorious as to a form guide in the League, but draws against SPORTING GUON and WIMBLEDON show Swindon Town will be no mugs this season.

The end of last season, with the most recent result first, shows a Robins run of: DDWLLWDL The two wins in the last eight games of last season were at relegated Cambridge United (2-1) and at home to Blackpool (1-0).

Swindon's worst performances last season were 4-0 losses at QPR and of course at Chesterfield in September. Their best days were 3-0 wins at Bury and at home to Port Vale, though a 3-1 win at Reading was arguably their best day of the campaign.

Hotshot

9. Sam Parkin - Very young and very promising forward who joined the club from Chelsea on Thursday August 1, 2002. The transfer followed months of speculation, with Andy King, a huge fan of the player, tracking him for several months. Parkin joined the club from Stamford Bridge where his development was hindered by a glut of international stars. However, whilst at the club he joined several other clubs on loan and it is with them that he built up areputation as a lethal striker.

Joined Millwall in September 2000 and made his debut in the Football League for the Lions in a 5-0 demolition of Oxford United. Netted a brace on his first ever appearance and made it three in two with another against Peterboro at London Road. He then went on loan to Wycombe Wanderers in November 2000 after having a trial with Queens Park Rangers. He also had the option of a temporary move to Luton but decided to join the Adams Park outfit. Scored twice in 13 games for the Chairboys. Went on loan once again to Oldham Athletic before joining Northampton last season. Has scored three goals already in pre-season and could be a hot prospect this year.

Creator

17. Danny Invincibile - Australian midfielder who endeared himself to the fans having been recommended to Colin Todd by Harry Redknapp. Danny subsequently joined the Robins on a free transfer when Todd watched him in a trial game. After a slow start (although he did score on his debut against West Bromwich Albion), Danny showed the club what he was capable of with five goals in four games in October/November in season 2000/01. The former Marconi Stallion, Brisbane Strikers and Aussie Under-21 star would later become Town's top scorer with ten goals, arguably his most important coming in the last home game of that season against Peterborough in the ninetieth minute - a goal that some say kept the club up. Danny is at his most dangerous when he is running at defenders and he was ever present again last season with eight goals to his name attracting a lot of interest from a number of clubs. A crowd favourite, fans will be pinning the sides hopes on his shoulders this season.

The Dangermen

Stopper

19. Matthew Heywood - Heywood failed to break through at Burnley's Turf Moor and, after being alerted as to his availability by former scout Shaun Reid, Andy King snapped him up on a free transfer. What a signing he's proved to be ever-present in the latter half of 2000/01 and missing just four games last year, it is no surprise that he swept the board in last year's Player of the Year Awards. The tall defender has signed an extension to his contract, much to the delight of the fans and he will be looking to show the same strength and commitment as he did last year. Strong in the tackle and good in the air, Heywood could prove to be a great asset to the club - if they can hang on to him. It is no coincidence Town's defensive record improved dramatically following his arrival and he can also play up front if need be too (scoring four goals in total last season)!

Keeper



1. Bart Griemink Giant keeper signed by Colin Todd on a free transfer in the summer of 2000. Griemink is a former Dutch Under-21 international who spent a successful loan spell with The Robins (as cover for Frank Talia) before

eventually joining the club. He came to: English football in 1995 with Birmingham and deputised competently for the injured lan Bennett, playing in the 1995 League Cup semi-final. He then followed Barry Fry to Peterborough United but lost his place to Mark Tyler. Griemink started the 2000-01 season as first choice goalkeeper and even deputised as captain, but ended up on the bench as Steve Mildenhall took his place in goal following Griemink's two dismissals and subsequent lengthy suspension. However, following Mildenhall's departure to Notts County Bart played every game last season and was one of the most consistent performers - he was also in contention for the Player of the Year Award. Having stalled on signing a new contract in the summer, Bart is set to take his place between the sticks once again this time around.

- The infamous game on January 1st 1985, Swindon Town 4 Chesterfield 0, was completely out of character with our disciplined Championship winning side that season. It was (much) later revealed that a New Years' Eve Party was mainly to blame for the defeat, ex Assistant Manager Kevin Randall, whilst trying to find some players who were late for the Coach says, "I saw a tramp curled up in the gutter, then I realised it was our player Brian Ferguson!" Fergie started at The County ground but was not surprisingly subbed by debut man John Seasman.
- Swindon won the League Cup as a Division Three side in 1968-69, beating Arsenal 3-1 in the Wembley Final, Earlier conquests included Burnley, Derby, Coventry and Blackburn, Swindon completed a great season by winning promotion as runners up to Watford.
- Swindon's County Ground was watched over from 1958 to the mid 90's by a second hand stand. The Shrivenham Road side of the ground was purchased from the ground of Aldershot Military Tattoo. It was estimated to be 30 years old when Town bought it



Player Profile Chris Brandon

On player that's made an impression in the pre season build up has been summer signing Chris Brandon.

Manager Dave Rushbury had been aware of the midfielder's strengths way before he eventually signed on the dotted line and subsequently Chris's strengths as a skilful player who can break down defences, coupled with what seems to be a very high work rate, has had Spireites supporters looking forward to seeing him in a competitive situation.

The first we saw of him in a Chesterfield shirt was on the tour of Cornwall when he played, as he subsequently has, between the right wing back and the man in the centre of midfield. Since those games at Newquay and Falmouth, Chris has continued to indicate that his acquisition from Torquay United, who desperately wanted to keep him, is a good one for the Club.

Bradford born Chris (26) had a spell as a teenager with Sheffield United but aged 18 he moved into Non-League Football with Unibond League side Farsley Celtic. In the summer of 1995, he joined his home town club, Bradford Park Avenue who were also Division One Unibond men, though neither side were enjoying the best of fortunes at the time Chris was on their books.

Stafford Rangers was the next stop for the 5'7" midfielder, the former FA Trophy winners were languishing in the Dr Martens Midland Division, then he moved on briefly to Lancaster City, back to Stafford before rejoining Park Avenue back "home", 1997-98 saw PA below Worksop but above Matlock in the table and the following season they again finished in mid table but Chris had done enough to satisfy Torquay United Manager Wes Saunders to suggest he could do a job in the Football League.

So, aged 23, the little Yorkshireman at long last made his League debut. With Neville Southallin goal for the Gulls,

Chris helped his new side to a 2-1 away win at Shrewsbury Town and, having finished 20th the previous season, his new side had reached 3rd place by the end of October, indeed it was a winning goal by Brando in consecutive games, 2-1 (H) to Peterborough and 2-1 (A) at Barnet, his first two senior goals, that put the men from the English Riviera in an automatic promotion place, but just 3 wins in the next 14 games saw them drop to 11th, and they ended the season in 9th, much improved on the year before.

Chris's other goals that term came in League wins over Carlisle (4-1), Halifax (4-0) and Mansfield Town, 4-0 the score that day. He also scored in the FA Cup win at Forest Green.

2000-01 was a wash out for Brando, he played at Kidderminster on the opening day but managed just one more appearance as sub that season due to a serious injury but last season he returned to be a regular Gull scoring four more goals in 31 appearances in League and Cup. He played in Torquay's 2-0 loss at Tottenham Hotspur in the Worthington Cup, Spurs included the likes of Ziege, Sheringham, Keller, Ferdinand, Rebrov and Leonhardsen and the crowd was just over 20,000.

Torquay offered Chris terms for this season but he chose to move up to the highest echelons of football he's ever played in and already he's experienced matches against the likes of Middlesbrough and Manchester United!



Over the last twenty vears Chesterfield Football Club has seen many highs and lows. I seem to have been around during most of them but over the last two years or so I think we have seen perhaps one of the highest points and definitely one of the lowest points of those times. I am not going to linger over the past as I am sure that like me you have had your fill of people telling you where we went wrong and how the club was saved etc.

It is my job with the help of the present directors to try our best to stabilise the club over the next few years. This we think we can achieve, assuming the information we are given by the Football League is now going to be correct and the budgets we are working to are not going to have to be altered. You will have heard all about ITV Digital and the Internet monies we didn't receive, well the total we have had to take out of our budget was over £300,000 pounds.

We must try to stabilise the club over the next few years

A small club like ours cannot afford these shocks (I am being polite now) The playing staff has had to be cut to an affordable level and so have the general running expenses of the club. We think this is worth sacrificing in order that the problems we have just encountered are less likely to happen again in the foreseeable future. This may mean a few disappointments along the way but we very much hope it may not, however as usual we will face them and fight them together (nothing new).

In order to originally get out of administration and to get a start the present board of directors have loaned the club around £600,000, the club has borrowed a further £200,000 from Chesterfield Borough Council and £100,000 has been kindly loaned to us by our President the Duke of Devonshire. This is more

money than has ever been invested in this football club at one time.CFSS have taken over the responsibility of trying to raise the money to pay off the remaining creditors, this is just over £500,000 which has to be paid by September 2004. We as a club cannot afford to borrow any more money so please help CFSS in all their efforts - these next two years will be critical to the future of our football club

I will keep you informed regarding the financial position of the club during the season.

Finally I hope you give us time

to get this club back on an even keel so that we can concentrate on the thing that matters most of allFOOTBALL.



Harris and Burns quit Football League Posts



Football League chairman Keith Harris and chief executive David Burns both resigned at the FL board meeting held in London yesterday. While the departure of Burns had been widely expected.

Harris's resignation came as a surprise. Both men had been under pressure after the collapse of the FL's £315m, three-year TV deal with ITV Digital, the signing of a far less lucrative deal with BSkyB for £95m over four years and the failure of legal proceedings to make ITV Digital co-owners Carlton and Granada pay the outstanding money from the deal. In a statement, Burns said: "I have today by mutual agreement terminated my employment with the Football League. Throughout my 21 months as chief executive, I have worked tirelessly to improve the League's position commercially and politically, to raise and enhance its public image and to ensure fair media representation.

A great deal of progress has been made and I leave behind a talented and dynamic executive team capable of taking the League forward well into the future." Burns pointed out that the ITV Digital contract was agreed by the previous administration and was already in place when he joined the FL. Harris, who pointed out that he was giving "the asylum back to the lunaties", said that criticism of his and Burns' management of the FL had been excessive. The resignation of Burns and Harris was welcomed by some club chairmen, "Millions of pounds have gone west. Their record speaks for itself," Crystal Palace chairman Simon Jordan told Sky Sports. "We need someone with a commercial acumen to revitalise the League," Millwall chairman Theo Paphitis said: "A lot of the chairmen feel the way this was dealt with, knowing full well we did not have a contract that was watertight, was wrong. We voiced our opinion that other measures should have been taken, which the executive failed to do." One club chairman more sympathetic towards Burns and Harris was Brentford chairman Ron Noades. "Neither Keith nor David were

involved in this contract. The problems were with those who were in charge at the time, said Noades. "They will end up looking for another chairman and chief executive and end up with another two people who they will blame for something." Harris had earlier in the morning offered to take up both the

of chairman and chief executive should Burns resign, but a couple of hours later he changed his mind and rejected both roles.

Bradford approved FL place as Richmond Steps Down



At the Football League board meeting held vesterday, Division One club Bradford City was given clearance to return to the FL provided the club can prove by friday that its

finances have been resolved. FL officials had to decide City's fate after a rescue package was agreed last week to bring the club out of administration. City's squad of 19 players had not been paid for several months by the club.

Geoffrey Richmond had earlier confirmed that he is to step down as chairman of the club. Negotiations are underway to make Gordon Gibb, owner of the Flamingo Land theme park in North Yorkshire, who had been connected with a rescue bid for the club, the new chairman, Gibb was appointed as a director of Bradford City Holdings Ltd. and Bradford City FC on Monday evening. In a statement on the club's official website, Richmond said: "Negotiations are ongoing with him and are at an advanced stage with a view to him taking over as chairman of Bradford City FC and becoming a 50% shareholder." Richmond added that the negotiations were subject to a successful outcome of yesterday's meeting at the FL and that these negotiations should be completed on Thursday, at which point he will formally step down as chairman. "I have always said if such a day arrived when I lost the confidence of a significant number of the supporters of this club that it would be the right time for me to walk away," said

Irish FA Cup Sponsorship Deal

The Co-operative Insurance Society (CIS) has signed an extension deal to its sponsorship of the Irish FA Cup. The length of the deal was not disclosed. but it is thought to be a renewal of the previous one-year deal. CIS became the sponsor of the Northern Ireland cup competition last season, when a new regionalised format for the competition was introduced. The new format has been described as a success by the Irish League, with the greater number of local derbies generating increased interest. CIS also sponsors the Scottish League Cup.

Lincoln City are safe

Lincoln City has come out of administration. The Third Division club's creditors and shareholders had in June accepted a rescue plan guaranteeing the club's future for the next two seasons, which was yesterday approved by the High Court in Birmingham. The package had asked the club's major creditors to accept a percentage of monies owed and offered smaller unsecured creditors shares in the club in lieu of their debt, "None of this could have been achieved without the incredible response from the public and the extra money committed by the directors," commented Rob Bradley. The club earlier this year raised an estimated £450,000, which included a contribution from the Professional Footballers' Association, Last Friday Bradley revealed that the club had "thankfully" budgeted for the loss of money incurred by the demise of the ITV Digital deal.





ITV Digital's demise shouldn't have been a shock and yet clubs were genuinely surprised when it happened. How many new competitors into a new product arena are an immediate success? Very few is the answer - yet the Football League went for broke on a deal that would never stack up and then was appalled at the fallout that sprung from it.

Administrators have made a small fortune these last few months as clubs have been forced to eventually admit that football generally makes no economic sense. The rainbow chasing is over for many whether it be Lincoln City or Leeds United. A few hundred thousand in debt or, in Leeds case, a whopping £100m the facts are the same. Spiralling expenditure and static income means problems. Bradford City blamed the IIV digital deal for their fall yet Carbone had been signed well before the ITV deal was in place.





Chesterfield FC and Loughborough University today signed a ground breaking agreement that : is set to bring university footballers into the professional game. The deal will enable Chesterfield - a team hit hard by the ITV Digital funding shortfall to secure a full reserve team for the next two seasons.

Loughborough will provide players to represent Chesterfield initially in the Avon Insurance League, with provisions for negotiated transfer agreements, as well as non-contract fees in place for full representation in the Nationwide Division Two side.

Chesterfield have been impressed by Loughborough 's student team that last season won the British University Championships and will represent England in the Student European Cup competition in September. Loughborough has a strong football set up with five coaches working with the squads and an advanced fitness training programme. Loughborough have also introduced a widely praised education programme for footballers that allows released players from top clubs to return to education and pick up degree level study. It is hoped that over time the partnership will provide opportunities for Chesterfield's youth

players to further their education alongside their football. Chesterfield FC manager Dave Rushbury said, "This unique link-up is probably a first in football and we are very excited about all the mutual benefits it will bring."

The Chesterfield Reserves team will compete in the Avon Insurance League Division 1 West, with home fixtures played at Chesterfield's Saltergate ground. Darren Robinson, Loughborough's Director of Football will manage the team jointly with Chesterfield's Assistant Manager Lee Richardson. The students will be registered as non-contract players, playing in Chesterfield kit with a Loughborough Sport logo.

Darren Robinson, Loughborough's Director of Football also commented, "I hope the football community recognises this innovative move and understands the benefits of a potentially great partnership that can address some of the burning issues in football at moment. Both parties have a lot to gain from this agreement. It will allow our young players, who work hard to keep up their education, to demonstrate their skills consistently to reserve team level whilst preserving the benefit of higher

education and developing the foundations for a longer-term future. Chesterfield will also benefit from a regular reserve team side and strong links with the Loughborough Sport set up. "

Loughborough is considered the UK's leading sports institution, with world-class facilities and programmes and over 250 international level athletes studying and training on campus. Some of the university's most famous football graduates, including ex Arsenal and Scotland Goalkeeper Bob Wilson and FA Cup Winner Lawrie Sanchez, still keep in touch with the progress of the current university side.

Chesterfield fans will be kept informed of the reserve team's success with regular match reports in club programme as well as on the Chesterfield FC official website.



In Retrospect

with Stuart Basson

Stuart basson looks back through history with todays opporets and connections between the two clubs.

They served us both. Harry Cousins

"A Robin and A Spireite"



Pilsley-born, on September 25th 1907, Harry Cousins came from North Wingfield Rangers with George Beeson in a deal that cost the Spircites £5

He made his first Chesterfield appearance in the club's first "A" Team game, a 3-1 win

on October 21st, 1981

over Staveley Town on August 28th, 1926. After signing professional forms in October '26, he made his first-team debut at Lincoln on March 19th, 1927.

A two-footed player, Harry's versatility overshadowed his ability and led to his being regarded mainly as a useful deputy to the halves, but when Horace Wass moved to a full-back berth, Harry took the opportunity to shine in the '30-1 Third (North) championship side. His mild manner and friendly smile hid a determined edge to his game that made him entirely comfortable in a defensive role, but he lost his place to Johnny McIntyre as the team struggled in the higher sphere.

Granted a free transfer at the end of the '31-2 season, he embarked on a Swindon Town career that continued beyond the Second World War. Harry made 240 League appearances for the Robins - a figure that might have risen to around the 500 mark, but for the war. Harry settled in the Wiltshire town and died there

Points from the past:

5th August 1970:

The penalty shoot-out gets its first use in competitive football at the end of the Watney Cup semi-final between Hull City and Manchester United. United win 4-3.

8th August 1953:

Alloa Athletic lose their opening fixture of the '53-4 season 10-0, to Third Lanark.

12th August 1982:

Chesterfield FC sell Phil Bonnyman to Grimsby Town for £80,000. The club will see only £65,000 of this, though, once other expenses are deducted.

13th August 1945:

An emergency meeting of the Board resolves that Mr RE Brocklebank be appointed to succeed Mr · Norman Bullock as Chesterfield's Manager, at a salary of £600 per annum.


21st August 1965:

Charlton Athletic's Keith Peacock comes on as a substitute in the Addicks' match at Bolton, and thus becomes League football's first sub.

On the same day, Barrow's Bobby Knox becomes the first substitute to score a League goal.

21st August 1979:

The last time before tonight that Chesterfield open their home League campaign with a night match. Barnsley are the visitors, and goals from Moss and Walker give us a 2-0 win in front of 7,706 fans.



Roger Woodhead is in charge of legal affairs and the development of the Supporters Club, Danny Kelly is responsible for ground maintenance and improvements, whilst Ernest Brocklehurst is match day director. The Commercial Lottery and Social Club affairs are in the hands of Vice-Chairman Mike Watterson and Derrick Wright.





A series of articles by the Editor of PROGRAMME MONTHLY & FOOTBALL COLLECTABLE magazine describing the different varieties of programmes that can form a collection

Setting the Scene

The very fact that you are reading this programme puts you into one of the four categories of programme collector potential, latent, casual or confirmed. The purpose of this scries of articles is to convert those programme buyers from the first two categories into casual or confirmed collectors by describing the different types (sets) of programmes, and by highlighting the pleasures that can come from collecting football programmes.

A collection can be of any size, however modest or impressive, and can cost as much or as little as you want to spend on it. There are no barriers to entering the programme buying market therefore, where you will find avid collectors from all walks Subscribers to "Programme Monthly", for instance, include solicitors, accountants, actors, schoolboys and girls, students, housewives, farm labourers, factory workers, teachers business executives - and an MP from Mauritius. So it's not simply a case of "You've bought the programme - now wear the anorak !

"What do I collect" is not usually a question which arises in the early stages of a programme collection, which is first formed by the accumulation of programmes from various sources, mostly from the first few years of attending football matches. If the collecting "bug" bites, then anything and everything will be voraciously added to a collection, and it is only when ambitions are limited by the availability of funds, that thought will have to be given to specialisation.

The composition of each collection is unique to its collector, so there are endless variations of collecting themes, but there are accepted basic building blocks, and these will be described over the course of the season in this series of articles. As well as describing the "sets", and the pitfalls and pleasures to be encountered en route, we will try to point out what to look out for in terms of value and collectability and perhaps give existing collectors - and those who accumulate programmes but don't consider themselves to be collectors - some ideas towards widening their horizons and deriving more pleasure from the habby

Most casual collectors will have a handful of "landmark" programmes in their possession - cup finals and semi finals lif their team has been fortunate enough to aspire to these heights), internationals, testimonials, special fixtures, major cup ties - each of which provides an interesting and achievable set The regular supporter may make a point of buying a home match programme; those who follow the team away from home will take this a stage further, and the more committed fans could extend this to friendly fixtures, foreign tours - all without leaving the confines of your favourite club. To expand horizons, you could go back in years, setting an earliest date (1950, 1960, 1970, 1980, for example) and collecting programmes back to that starting point.

Someone with a wider interest in football could collect other clubs, other leagues (perhaps venturing into non-league), other

countries - the possibilities are endless, and each will be covered over the course of the coming season.




