


GOOD AFTERNOON AND A WARM WELCOME BACK TO THE COUNTY GROUND FOR TODAY'S MATCH AGAINST CARDIFF CITY.

Like you, I am really looking forward to today's encounter because it should make for a fantastic occasion. Not least because we've had a relatively good start to the season so far, as have Cardiff, but also because today's match will give us even more of an indication of how we're going to fare against the anticipated 'top' teams in this division.

Since our victory here against Barnsley on the opening day of the season, we have been extremely pleased to have kept our unbeaten record on our travels. At Chesterfield we showed that we can outplay teams away from home and at Blackpool we proved that we can stop them playing. To be successful in any league you have to be difficult to beat away from home and then try and win your home matches. That's what I'm trying to achieve here and today is a great chance for us to set our stall out and show that whoever comes here, they're not going to have an easy ride. If we can do that then I think we have a good chance of being successful this season.

Having said that, as I'm sure you've heard me say numerous times in recent weeks, I certainly won't get carried away with our decent run of games because you never know what's around the corner in this game. Don't get me wrong, we should all enjoy it while we can and we have performed well in our opening games, but if we get beaten today, all previous form will quickly be forgotten so we won't take anything for granted. Take the Blackpool game for example, having scored seven goals in the previous two games people were expecting us to do the same again and it is not possible to keep that sort of form going.


If, when we don't fire on all cylinders, we can still pick up draws or even knick the occasional win (something we haven't been able to do successfully in my time here), then we will be doing well.

Also, we must be aware that we haven't got the biggest squad in the league. Should we encounter injuries or suspensions at any stage, then that will be when we will truly be tested. Already Matt Hewlett has picked up an injury, and what with some of our players being here on short term deals, we must be aware of what problems may occur in the future.

Todays visitors are one of the favourites for the championship this season, but as we showed against Barnsley, that will not affect the way we approach the game and if we can continue where we left off at home, there is no reason why we shouldn't expect a positive result. The lads remember the two defeats to Cardiff last season, especially the 3-0 at home because it was in front of the live television carneras. So if they're not up for this one then I will be very surprised, but then I would expect them to be hungry in each and every game they play in. Whatever happens, I'm certain it will make for a very entertaining match with hopefully a large home support to cheer the lads on. Your efforts at Chesterfield and Blackpool were magnificent and with Cardiff expected to bring a large crowd today, it would be great to let them know who's at home.

Before I go any further may I take this opportunity to welcome Lenny Lawrence, his coaching staff and his players to the County Ground as well as all the directors, players and supporters of Cardiff City Football Club. Having lost last week, I would expect Lennie to be looking for a quick return to winning ways and so we must be on our guard this afternoon.





Returning to our own situation, we have endured yet another change to the personnel in the playing squad with Sol Davis joining Luton Town. It's a shame to see Sol go, but the lad made up his mind to leave and that is in the past now. If some of the money made from his sale is made available to tie both Miglioranzi and Edds into longer deals at this club, then some good may have come of it. On the subject of money, may I express my delight at the news that we are now out of administration.

Enjoy the game, I'm sure there will be a big crowd this afternoon and a great atmosphere. Let's hope we can keep our good form going.

Good afternoon and a warm welcome to this afternoon's clash with Cardiff. I am happy to report that, with such a big game this afternoon, we only have one or two injuries to report.

Firstly some good news, Andy Gurney, who had been both suspended and injured for the first three games of the season, is fit and ready for selection this afternoon. Andy had picked up a groin strain against Wimbledon in preseason, thankfully he has recovered and he could figure today.

Unfortunately Matty Hewlett will still be absent following an injury he picked up at Chesterfield. Matt had an appointment with a specialist yesterday and is unlikely to figure this afternoon. However, his injury isn't too serious. instead it's a ligamentus injury and he is improving steadily. He is now walking pain free, is working with some light weights and is also swimming. Today's game may have been too soon for him, but he may figure in Monday's squad when the team travel to Brentford.

Chris Collins has a groin/abdominal strain that he picked up in the reserve fixture against Wycombe Wanderers last week. He is also doing some light weights and a variety of stretches and so he should be fine within a week.

Finally we have Keith O' Halloran. Unfortunately Keith has suffered a setback in his rehabilitation and he is going to require more surgery. Unfortunately his fibula hasn't healed properly, but I am still optimistic that he will improve this season.




Good afternoon and welcome to the County Ground for this afternoon's encounter with Cardiff City.

It had been five years since Town won a game on the opening day of the season, a 2-0 win against Crewe in 1997 seeming a mere distant memory to Town's faithful. However, that all changed when Sam Parkin grabbed a hat-trick on his home debut - Town cruising to an enthralling 3-1 victory two weeks ago against Barnsley.

In fact, it was even longer since Town fans enjoyed an STFC player scoring a hat-trick (we make it Chris Hay in the office) but it took the former Chelsea striker just 88 minutes into his Swindon Town career to accomplish that feat. And it could have been four too ...

However, it was far from a one-man show and on the whole the side's performance from front to back was fantastic. A few

> early scares in defence didn't tarnish Town's performance either, although had Mike Sheron's goal been allowed on six minutes, or Kevin Betsy's effort not rebounded off the post moments later- it could have been so different.

As it happened Barnsley took the lead anyway, Chris Lumsdon converting a

penalty after Stefani Miglioranzi was adjudged to have brought down Kevin Betsy in Town's penalty area. However, The Tykes* goal came somewhat against the run of play - Sabin and Invincibile forcing Marriot in the visitors goal into a number of

impressive saves. Fortunately, Town drew level soon after Barnsley's opener - some fine interplay between Hewlett (captain for the day) and Danny Invincibile found Parkin in the box and he turned and slotted home a right-footed shot into the bottom of Marriot's goal.

Town's attacking formation of 4-4-3 was exposing Barnsley at every opportunity. Similarly, Barnsley were able to press Town when the home midfield pushed forward and it made for an entertaining, end-to-end encounter. Barnsley ended the half on top when Gary Jones tested Griemink just before the half-time whistle - the Dutchman comfortably dealing with Jones's shot,

Town started the second half as they finished the first, tenacious in midfield and probing in attack and it took just five minutes for Parkin to double his tally. The tireless work of Robinson in midfield found Invincibile free on the left and. having been given time to cut in, he unleashed a shot that Marriot could only parry, allowing Parkin to tap home from an acute angle in front of the vociferous Town End.


Parkin thought he'd made it three soon after when, following another Edds cross, he headed home despite the oncoming challenge from Marriot. However, the referee adjudged Matt Heywood to be in an offside position and Town had to wait until two minutes from time to ensure the victory. Jimmy Davis, on as a substitute for Invincibile, was welcomed to Division Two with a hefty challenge from Mike Flynn and the Manchester United winger, on loan for three months, went down in the area.

Parkin subsequently stood forward to take the resultant spot kick and he confidently stroked home the ball, sending Marriot the wrong way in the process.

Danny Invincibile and Eric Sabin opened their accounts for the season as Town eased past a poor Chesterfield side at Saltergate. Sam Parkin grabbed Town's fourth to add to his tally and despite not playing as well as they did on Saturday, Town were worthy winners - some superb finishing ensuring their 100% record.

> Town's 4-4-3 formation once again caused the opposing defence all sorts of problems and the three-pronged attack of Invincibile, Sabin and Parkin must be fast becoming the most feared strike force in the league.

> Town started the game with the same line-up that started the game against Barnsley and in the opening exchanges, seemed to be suffering from a hangover from their exertions. Griemink saving well at the feet of Allott after Hurst's shot was parried.

> Just four minutes later Town took the lead. Parkin's shot cannoned off to defenders before landing at Invincibile's feet and the Australian reacted well striking the ball high into the home sides' net. Town could have made it two shortly

afterwards, Sabin breaking free on the right hand side and sending a powerful, low cross to Sam Parkin, Unfortunately, despite making contact with the ball. Parkin saw his effort rebound off the 'keeper and over the bar.

Six minutes from half-time Town doubled their advantage. Miglioranzi broke free and passed to Sabin in the middle who was bundled over. The ball subsequently fell to invincibile and he took great delight in adding his and Town's second.

Three minutes later Swindon extended their lead. Invincibile broke free on the counter attack and hit a powerful cross onto the onrushing head of Eric Sabin. The Frenchman powered his header home and Town went in at half time three goals to the good.

Jimmy Davis replaced the injured Matt Hewlett at half time with devastating effect, the Manchester United winger angling a fierce volley towards the Chesterfield goal before the home side pulled one back. Chesterfield were awarded a penalty when Hurst went sprawling in the box - the forward eventually recovered to take the spot kick himself.

Town's response was emphatic and a minute later, Parkin restored our three-goal advantage. Davis broke on the right and played the ball to Sabin who in turn, released Parkin. The former Chelsea front man's shot was too powerful for Muggleton and the home 'keeper could only help the ball into the back of the net.

Chesterfield bagged another consolation goal following an Edwards' free kick. Bart Griemink palmed his effort onto the bar, but unfortunately for the Dutchman Glynn Hurst was first to react to the ball and he prodded the ball home from close range.


So, two wins in two for King's men and seven goals in the process. Not a bad start to the season, not least because the result left us top of the league for the first time in six seasons.

THE NECK CATCH

In our last issue, Danny showed us how to do a Cruyff turn. This week, after several attempts, he shows us how to catch the ball on the back of the neck. STEP 1

Flick the ball with your preferred foot just in front of your body and above head height. Be patient, this may not happen first time!



STEP 2

If you're having problems keeping the ball up with your foot, then practice throwing the ball at the preferred height.



STEP 3

Bend your body forward, arching your neck so that the ball can rest in between your shoulders. Use your arms to balance yourself, all the time watching the ball.



STEP 4

Use your arms to help balance the ball behind your head and keep as still as you can. Keep your head up at all times.

TODAY'S VISITORS CARDIFF CITY

Cardiff, by their own admission, under achieved for the best part of last season, that despite being many people's favourites to make it two promotions in three seasons. However, the sacking/resignation of Alan Cork and subsequent appointment of former Middlesbrough manager, Lennie Lawrence, brought about an upturn in fortune for the Bluebirds and the ex-school teacher has lost just twice since joining the club.

Results thus far during this campaign would suggest that City will be there or thereabouts come May - but consistency will be the key if they are to fulfil their unquestionable potential. Inconsistency was arguably the club's achilles heel last season and despite winning 2-1 at Oldham on the opening day of the season, Lawrence will be aware that he can not afford complacency - the side close to surrendering a two-goal lead in the dying moments.


With that said, expectations are high at Ninian Park, so much so that only a top two finish will appease the club's ambitious supporters. The summer acquisitions of Gareth Walley, Chris Barker and Gary Croft have merely served to accentuate the expectations, (whilst at the same time, underlying the club's intentions of mounting a serious challenge for the championship) Lennie Lawrence will certainly feel the heat should his side fail to deliver.

Sam Hammam, the club's controversial chairman, will certainly be expecting some kind of reward for his considerable investment. On paper his side look to be by far one of the strongest in the league, but their strength in depth has come at a cost and his squad is probably the most expensive in the division.

One of Cardiff's most costly imports was 1.7 million-pound striker (and former Town favourite), Peter Thome, who arrived at Ninian Park amid much hype. However, the ex-Town striker has returned just 8 goals from 26 starts and a lot rests on his broad shoulders. Alongside Thorne will be one from Leo Fortune West and Robert Earnshaw, Earnshaw doing his chances of a start no harm with a goal against Oldham on the opening day. The 21-year old also scored on his international debut for Wales and so will be hoping to add to his growing reputation this afternoon.

In midfield are two familiar names, Graham Kavanagh and Gareth Whalley. Kavanagh has terrorised Town's midfield for a number of seasons (firstly at Stoke before joining Cardiff), whilst Whalley joins the Bluebirds from Bradford City.

As for the club's back-line, well, Spencer Prior needs little introduction. The former Manchester City stalwart was a proverbial rock in City's defence last season and he'll relish facing Sam Parkin this afternoon. It would be a brave man that suggests a winner from that particular encounter - the two players sharing over 12' in height and 26 stone in weight! Let the battle commence...





LENNIE LAWRENCE

Lennie Lawrence was appointed as manager of Cardiff City on February 18, 2002, just six weeks after his dismissal from Grimsby Town. He replaced Alan Cork having initially been brought in to Ninian Park as Director of Football by Cardiff chairman, Sam Hammam. Lennie began his professional coaching career at Plymouth Argyle in 1977 and after two years at Home Park, he was appointed assistant to Colin Murphy at Lincoln City. Having helped Lincoln to promotion from Division Four in 1980-81 Lennie left to take a reserve team post at Charlton in 1982. taking over as manager "temporarily" in November. He remained in charge at Charlton for nine years. He left Charlton in Summer 1991 to take up the managerial reins at Middlesbrough before joining Bradford in 1994. After just 15 months at Valley Parade he was appointed manager at Luton where he was surprisingly sacked. After just two months out of the game Lawrence was then snapped up by Grimsby before he joined the Bluebirds.

THE GAFFER THE SQUAD

NEIL ALEXANDER

Neil is a very highly rated former Scotland U21 international who arrived from Livingston during the summer of 2001. Neil is widely tipped to become the Scotland's number one goalkeeper over the next few seasons and he was included in the Squad that toured the Far East in the close season. An ever present last season.

SPENCER PRIOR

Spencer joined his hometown Club. Southend United from trainee in 1989 before moving on to Norwich City. Leicester City, Derby County and Manchester City before making the move to Cardiff in summer 2001. His ability in the air makes him a threat in both defence and attack. A regular in last season's first team, he formed a formidable defensive partnership with Scott Young.

RHYS WESTON

Joined Arsenal in the summer of 1997. A good tackler and strong in the air. Rhys made his first Wales senior squad appearance when he came on from the subs' bench against Portugal at the beginning of June 2000. Signed for Cardiff in November 2000 and was the Club's regular right-back last season.

DANIEL GABBIDON

Daniel signed for Cardiff in September 2000 following a successful loan spell at the start of the season. Daniel is a quality player, with pace, who has played in every defensive position. His performances last season saw him called into the Full Welsh Squad and he gained his debut cap against Argentina at the Millennium Stadium.

GARY CROFT


Gary spent six seasons at Grimsby, making 149 League appearances before heading to Blackburn in March 1996 for £1.7 million. After 40 League games and one goal at Rovers, the versatile defender joined Ipswich Town in September 1999 for an initial fee of £540,000. He represented England at Under-21 level. alongside David Beckham, winning four caps. He joined Cardiff on loan at the end of last season and made the move permanent in July 2002.



Graham became Cardiff City's first ever £1million signing following his move from Stoke City in the summer of 2001, 'Kay' started his career at Home Farm in Ireland before spending five years at Middlesbrough. He moved to Stoke City for £250,000 in 1996. Graham is a natural leader and was last season's joint leading scorer with 15 goals.

WILLIE BOLAND

Signed on a three-year contract from Coventry City in the summer of 1999 on a free transfer. Willie became a professional with Coventry in 1992 on his 17th birthday and he went on to make over 60 appearances in The Premiership. His work rate and consistent form in the midfield engine room last year was rewarded with two separate Player of the Year awards.





Signed this summer after being released by Bradford City. Originally a trainee at Crewe, Gareth made over 200 first team appearances for the 'Railwaymen' before signing for Bradford in July 1997 for £600,000. Gareth is a good passer of the ball with excellent vision and was influential in Bradford's rise to the Premiership. Gareth was a regular during their two-season spell in the top flight and last season played in 25 League games for the Bantam's before ending the season on loan to former club Crewe.



Joined Cardiff City as an YTS player in 1997 and was offered a professional contract after just one year. He had brief loan spells with Middlesbrough in February/March 1999 and Greenock Morton in 2000. Earnie's frightening pace and goalscoring record has made him a regular member of the first team

squad. His form last season saw him making his full Welsh debut – where he was the man of the match and scored the only goal of the game against Germany.

PETER THORNE

Peter began his career as a trainee at Blackburn Rovers before he moved to Swindon Town in January 1995 for £225,000, After a successful spell at Swindon the Potteries club signed Peter for £350,000 in July 1997. He became the Bluebird's record signing in September 2001. Peter was hampered by a spell out through injury last season. A constant threat in the air and good with his back to goal Peter will hope to add to his 8 goals from 23 League starts this season.

LEO FORTUNE-WEST

Signed from Rotherham United for £300,000 in September 2000. Started his career with Stevenage Borough and went on to play for Gillingham, Leyton Orient, Lincoln City and Brentford. Scored on his debut for Cardiff City in a 4-2 win over Halifax Town. Last season Leo scored 11 goals in 42 first team appearances.

THEM AND US

One of the 'famous twelve' forever remembered for giving Swindon their first (and some may say finest) day at Wembley, Frank Burrows, partnered skipper Stan Harland at the heart of defence as Town reached the League Cup Final in 1969, returning triumphant to Wiltshire at the expense of Arsenal.

Frank was signed by Danny Williams in July 1968 from Scuntforpe where he had played 106 times in League matches. Born in Larkhall on January 30 1944, Burrows began his professional career with Raith Rovers and he settled into Town's side swiftly. By the time Wembley beckoned he had already performed in all but two League games since signing for Swindon.

Always a formidable opponent in the air, 6'1" Burrows immediately formed a strong partnership with skipper Stan Harland and made a total of 297 appearances in Town colours and a further six on loan to Mansfield. By the time Frank hung up his boots when his playing contract was cancelled in February 1978, he had started to turn his attention to coaching, assuming the role of assistant manager under Danny Williams. Just why it is that so many managers in England are Scottish is a puzzle, but Frank fitted the mould perfectly. Joining Portsmouth as a coach in 1978 he teamed up with Jimmy Dickinson whom he succeeded as manager in May '79. A year later, Frank led Pompey to promotion to the Third

Division and with Stan Harland also on the pay role, Steve Aizlewood and John McLaughlin were persuaded to move to the south coast as Pompey collected Swindon old boys.

Leaving Fratton Park in 1982, Frank was a coach at Sunderland under Lawrie McMenemy when they won the League Cup, and in 1986 he had moved to his first stint in South Wales with today's visitors Cardiff whom he took to promotion from Division Four in 1988. A return to Porstmouth came in 1990 and then back to Wales and Swansea in March 1991 where he stayed for four years. A second spell at Ninian Park began in February 1998 as the Bluebirds fought unsuccessfully to

retain their Second Division status, but Frank Burrows led the club back to the Second Division just twelve months later. He was replaced as manager by Billy Eyre in December 1999.

When you're looking for a someone who played for a Welsh club, it seems logical to look through the records of those named Evans, so when you find Tony Evans fits the bill it might be surprising to find he was born in Liverpool.

After making six appearances for Blackpool, Tony moved to Ninian Park in June 1975 where he was to play over 120 games during the next three years. City, who had just been relegated to Division Three bounced straight back

the following year and striker Evans finished top scorer with 21 goals. A consolidated League position saw Evans chalk another 15 the following season and in July 1979, Birmingham City who had themselves just dropped into Division Two decided Tony would assist their own promotion attempt.

Twelve months later and mission accomplished, Evans was plying his trade in the top division. St Andrews saw mid table finishes for the next three seasons until a move to Selhurst Park took Tony to Division Two and Crystal Palace. Another year on and he was on the move again, this time to Wolves who were in the process of plummeting from Division One to Four in consecutive

seasons. A four match loan spell at Bolton in February 1985 preceded his move to the County Ground by six months when Lou Macari brought Tony to supplement Town's attempt at the Fourth Division championship.

Tony Evans took to the field in all of Swindon's first nine games that season, a period which saw Town slump to 21st place, so it looks totally justified that Macari picked him on just one further occasion as Swindon corrected the dismal start to take the championship by 18 points. A disappointing way for Tony Evans to bring the curtain down on his career, but there were many high points during his career, starting at Cardiff City.



The Premiership outfit, who lost to Marchester United 1-0 last Saturday, hope to have Koumas signed in time to play today after upping their initial £1.5m bid which was rejected by the Second Division club.

"Koumas is one of several players we are trying to sign," West Brom manager Gary Megson told the Express & Star newspaper. "It would be nice if we could get him in before the weekend."



KINNEAR'S 'KEEPER NIGHTMARE



Luton Town boss Joe Kinnear will give trials to two new goalkeepers this week after losing patience with Carl Emberson. The Hatters netminder has looked out of his depth standing in for the injured Mark Ovendale. And Kinnear blamed him for the 2-1 defeat at Plymouth after Emberson conceded a soft winner. Now Luton's irate manager will take action by bringing in keepers from IFK Gothenburg and Troyes this week as possible replacements. He said: "I've got two new keepers coming in, It's an area I wanted to address anyway, not just because of the goal. I'll look at quite a few keepers this week. I'm not having much luck with transfers."




CURLE SET TO JOIN BARNSLEY

"I've never run away - I'm a strong enough character to fight my corner, that's what you've got to do and that's what I'm asking the players to do. It's not just about kicking and tackling. It's about playing, and we're just not playing at the moment. I think supporters do want commitment, without a doubt, and I think we can give more in terms of that. But the biggest loss for us is the fact we're just not playing, so I've got to look at that and wonder why." Horton's side have so far failed to live up to pre-season expectations and he is set to invite a number of players to play in a behindclosed doors trial match against Crewe.

On-loan striker Paul Furlong suffered a groin injury in QPR's defeat at Barnsley on Saturday, leaving them with problems ahead of this afternoon's home fixture with Peterborough.

Rangers manager lan Holloway may now have to call upon QPR's new Portuguese striker, D'Jailson Vieira, to fill in. "He's been with us a few weeks and is big, quick and strong," said Holloway. "We've got a reserve team game in midweek so we'll look to give him a run out there. We will have to wait and see how he gets on."




Former Swindon stars Gareth Hall and Bobby Howe (left) were on a losing Havant side as they lost their first game of the season to Havant last Saturday.

SUPERSAMMYPARKIN

HE'S A BIT GOOD, AND EARLIER THIS WEEK WE MET TOWN'S TOP SCORER, SAM PARKIN

When Sam Parkin announced his arrival at the club with a goal in each of Town's pre-season friendlies, he certainly raised a few eyebrows amongst the County Ground faithful. Yet when he went on to bag an impressive a hat-trick on his league debut against Barnsley on the opening day of the season, he caused widespread hysteria amongst the Swindon masses, not to mention his own team mates.

Not since Chris Hay in 1997 (against Port Vale) had we seen a threesome such as Parkin's, yet in just 88 minutes he had smashed a number of records and by doing so, endeared himself to us all.


And that includes Andy King too, for when Parkin notched his first the smile on the manager's face was there for all to see (well, those sitting in the Arkells Stand anyway!) – the long search for a prolific target man seemingly over. Yet whilst obviously pleased over his bargain-buy, King has been cautious in his words when talking about the former Chelsea front man – 'the gaffer' eager not to let the early successes go to his head.

However, upon talking to Parkin himself, you wouldn't believe

that you were in the presence of the league's top scorer and King's influence on him shines through. "The main thing for me was that the team played well as a unit, and that we got that first win under our belts. Barnsley are no mugs and we outplayed them fair and square – that was a terrific start," he said.

Parkin's modesty could be attributed, in some part, to his disappointing season at Northampton last year. Previous to his loan move to Sixfields, the Roehampton born striker had been prolific at both Oldham and Millwall scoring, on average, a goal a game. However, when he moved to join the Cobblers towards the beginning of last season, it all went wrong for him.

"Don't get me wrong, Northampton is a lovely club, but there was just something not right there for me and when your heart is not in it and you're the slightest bit unhappy —your form is bound to suffer. The same thing happened when I was on loan at Wycombe. In the end, I only scored a small number of goals over the course of the season, but the fact that I've nearly matched that amount already here at Swindon speaks volumes about the way I feel about this club."




Despite his modesty, Parkin exudes confidence and as well as acknowledging the role played by his team mates, he is aware that he could not have got off to a better start. He enthused, "Scoring goals is what it's all about for a striker and I was pleased to get a few under my belt early on. The main thing for me was, having got the three in the first game, to score another quickly alterwards to prove that it wasn't a one off. I would go as far as saying that the second game (away at Chesterfield) was probably more important than the first one, but what was also nice about that night was that both Danny (Invincibile) and Eric (Sabin) got on the scoresheet as well. After all, we work hard for each other and so it is rewarding when we can all get in on the act. Hopefully the goals will give us all the confidence we need to go on and score a large number of goals."

Should Town's trio continue in a similar fashion then they certainly have the potential to become one of the most potent strike forces in the League. And whilst Sam may be at the top of the charts for the time being, he is quick to share the plaudits. "Playing with the other two upfront has been a real eye opener for me. Not being the quickest of players myself, their pace is absolutely frightening and it adds another dimension to my game. Their style of play gives me the licence to drop deeper and receive balls further away from goal, something I haven't been able to do for a long time. In return I can offer them a physical presence, someone to cause a bit of hussle and bussle up front and create chances for them."

Today's game will certainly test Parkin's attributes to the limit. In Spencer Prior, Cardiff City have a veritable mountain at the centre of their defence. But when you're scoring goals no-one frightens you and Parkin seems certainly up for the test. "They are one of the few sides in this league with a bit of money to spend and they have gone and bought players with Premiership experience. They are certainly many people's favourites to go up this year and so it will be a tough game. I would certainly expect Andy Campbell to be one of the strikers towards the top of the goalscoring charts come May. But in saying that, we have already proved that we can beat some of the better teams in this league, even when we haven't been on song we've picked up points (Blackpool being a great example) and so we have nothing to fear. Being at home will certainly be an advantage, hopefully our fans will be out in force as a result of our good start and I'm sure we will do our best to please them."

Town's fans have, so far had reason to be cheerful already with, not only Sam's performances, but those of the rest of the side too. Yet their appreciation for Sam's hat-trick at the County Ground was evident with chants of 'Super Sammy Parkin,' and the 21-year old says it has helped him to settle in: "I've always said that being happy is a key part to being successful, and I wasn't happy at Northampton last year. My form suffered as a result, but since I've been here I've only been encouraged by what I've seen. The manager has been great, the players really friendly and the fans absolutely terrific. The move has been a breath of fresh air for me and long may it continue."

Amen to that, and a couple of goals this afternoon will certainly help Town's cause as they look to consolidate at the top end of the table. Sam's previous record speaks for itself and whilst he may have struggled last year, everywhere else he's been he's been nothing short of prolific. Today's encounter will certainly be a benchmark to see how far both Parkin and the club itself has developed, let's hope that at 4.45 there will still be the same smile across Sam's face.

DICK MATTICK BLOWS THE DUST OFF HIS ROTHMANS AND TAKES US BACK TO 1914 AND 1969.

It was against today's visitors that Swindon clinched the Southern League Championship in 1914. Cardiff, who had been one of only two sides to win a league match at the County Ground that season, were held 0-0 at Ninian Park thanks to some brilliant goalkeeping by Len 'the cap' Skiller. The draw secured the title for Town as they pipped Crystal Palace on goal difference. When Cardiff won the Third Division South Championship in 1946/47 they only lost six league games all season. One of these was a 3-2 defeat at Swindon, but the Welsh side got ample revenge in a 5-0 win on their own ground. On Town's run to the fifth round of the FA Cup in 1952, Cardiff proved to be their toughest opposition. The Bluebirds, who were leading the Second Division at the time, held Town to a 1-1 draw in front of 40,000 people. It took extra time back at the County Ground for Maurice Owen to net the only goal of the game.

Today's featured match was played at Ninian

Park on August 13, 1969. It was Town's second game in Division Two and it included a Cardiff side that included John Toshack, Don Murray and Fred Davies — the latter both ever present the previous year.


The opening 20 minutes were one-way traffic, with the home side romping to a 2-0 lead. Their first came in the 7th minute when Peter King whipped in John Toshack's header from a narrow angle. Then, in the 17th minute, a centre was flicked on by Brian Clark for King to score his second, a diving header from close range. Swindon began to rally and they pulled a goal back just before the half-hour. John Smith tried his luck with a free kick from the edge of the area and, although his effort was blocked. Peter Noble latched on to the rebound to crack the ball home. Six minutes later Town drew level with probably the best goal of the match. Roger Smart won possession in midfield and set Don Rogers away on the left. A speedy run by the winger ended with a cross to Horsefield who, under pressure, brought the ball down and it passed the Cardiff 'keeper.

Town dominated the early stages of the second half whilst Cardiff grew stronger towards the end. Downsborough had pulled off a number of saves for Swindon and two minutes from time the Robins nearly snatched victory when Rogers sent Davies the wrong way in City's goal. Unfortunately, his shot rolled wide of the post. "A fine game and a great result" was the comment of Town manager, Fred Ford, as Swindon got their first point of the season.

A debut hat trick for Swindon Town's new centre-forward aside, the story that most caught my attention in the last couple of weeks can be found at Leicester City's Walkers Stadium.

Former Swindon Town winger and Wembley hero Nicky Summerbee has joined ex-Blackburn and Scotland star Billy McKinlay in signing for the foxes on a non-contract basis. In the pre-ITV digital days this would probably mean a week-to-week contract for players that can boast England U21 and full Scottish caps to their names. However, in this season's crazy world of the Nationwide League this means joining the humble ranks of the Sunday footballer and playing for diddlysquat.

On the opening day of the season, the Leicester City midfield was perhaps symbolic of the problems engulfing the Nationwide as we ride this wave of transition. On one hand you have the McKinley's and Summerbee's grafting away in the hope of securing a permanent (mortgage paying) deal, and on the other you have Turkey's World Cup bench

warmer, Muzzy Izzet. Izzet, who by his own admission can no longer be afforded by the club, is reportedly collecting thirty grand a week, Messrs. McKinlay and Summerbee would probably be happy with a tenth of that in the current climate. Nonetheless, Izzet has become a symbol of the perils of promotion and relegation to the Premiership. It is surely only a matter of time before a cut-price move to the top flight is found for him, with the only likely buyer - Middlesbrough - having their long-term attacking midfield options disrupted by a serious knee injury to their favourite Brazilian - prodigal samba son, Juninho, Teeside beckons.

From players suffering from financial predicaments to one of many struggling clubs. It was interesting to see my red-hot pre-season favourites Wolverhampton Wanderers held by crisis club Bradford City on the opening day of the season. The Bantams, unable to pay their playing staff for over four months, have been forced to release a clutch of players including their mercurial Italian forward Benito Carbone, whose wages alone could have forced the club into extinction. In what many hope

signals a change in player attitudes towards the new financial constraints imposed by clubs in the post-ITV digital era, it is a credit to Bradford that they can raise their game to match a team many predict will runaway with the title this season.


Whether this attitude has worked it's way down to The Den is another matter. After their 6-0 mauling at the hands of Rotherham (four of the goals coming from recent signing Darren Byfield), Millwall boss Mark McGhee had an idea just where the reason for such an opening day catastrophe could be found, he said: "Because the money situation changed so dramatically during the summer, these players got no reward for reaching the play-offs. But then nobody at the club did and I have come to terms with it, although I'm not sure the players have. If they cannot accept that there is no more money on the table then we have to get ruthless and get rid of them."

Thank heavens for the likes of Matty Hewlett, Bart Griemink and co. that signed-up at The County Ground again this summer on greatly reduced terms. If their performances during our opening day of the season are anything to go by, their commitment and professionalism could never be brought into question!

A truly desperate opening day was endured at Selhurst Park for Wimbledon's opening fixture. Having to suffer the embarrassing spectacle of home and away goalkeepers personally retrieving wayward shots from deep within barren stands, a pitiful crowd of 2,476 (boosted according to many corners of the media by 600-odd nonattending season ticket holders) and a 0-1 defeat at the hands of Gillingham, did little to lift the gloom that has descended over SE25 in recent weeks. Outside the ground supporters of newly formed AFC Wimbledon (the S.E Counties team founded by breakaway supporters) converged to disrupt the Don's opening fixture by drawing picket lines and dancing the conga in a sign of protest against chairman Charles Koppel's franchise-like relocation of Wimbledon F.C to Milton Keynes. And what of the country's favourite new non-league side, hardly the most auspicious start boys: eight games - eight defeats! Still, if their crowds continue to average around 4,000 the new Dons will not need too many favors in the new season and beyond.

The sad decline of ex-Manchester United star Lee Sharpe was also noted this week as the twenty-nine year old winger returned to his roots to sign non-contract terms with Exeter City, local rivals of Sharpe's first club Torquay. Sharpe emerged as one of the game's brightest talents before injury and illness disrupted his progress, despite spells at Leeds, Sampdoria, Bradford, Portsmouth and Grimsby.

I leave you to mull over a subject always good for generating debate - Manchester United and former Eire skipper Roy Keane. Is he intent on pressing the self-destructs button in the near future, or has he just pressed it? Never a stranger to controversy, Keane endured a summer of scrutiny following his much-publicised crossing of swords and early departure from Mick McCarthy's World Cup camp. So, what does he go and do? Roy chooses to write the latest in a long line of autobiographies that (as David O' Leary and Jaap Starn might testify) appear to do more harm than good to a career in football. At the time of writing, Keane could be facing a FA disrepute charge and a lawsuit from Manchester City defender Alf-Inge Haaland for his admittance of intent to harm the tough tackling midfielder. Haaland has his claim for a first team place limited since the injury.

SKILLS, THRILLS AND LEARNING THROUGH FOOTBALL





FANS HEAD TO HEAD

IT'S EARLY DAYS, BUT HOW HAPPY HAVE YOU BEEN WITH THEIR FORM?

Swindon: 7 points out of a possible 9 and bagging 7 goals too! It's been an impressive start. There is a long way to go, but a positive start is a good start, it brings confidence to the team and hopefully a few more people through the turnstiles.

Cardiff: A bit disappointed really, particularly as they started favourites for the league, but they always start the season slowly. Had to hang on for an away win at Oldham, failed to impress against 10 men of Port Vale after a good opening quarter and lost dismally at home to Northampton on Saturday.

WHO HAS IMPRESSED YOU FROM YOUR SIDE?

Swindon: The whole team. With the new boys coming in it has added quality and competition that it seams we were lacking last term, it's been encouraging that all the goals have come from the forwards, something we lacked last year. And although I was not there I'm lead to believe that Bark Griemink put in a fantastic performance against Blackpool.

Cardiff: - Andy Legg is still the best player at the club despite all the big money signings of the past two years. Totally committed, outstanding work rate and skills - scored a great goal against Port Vale from outside the box.

AND THE NEW FACES HOW HAVE THEY FITTED IN?

Swindon: Very well it seems. Parkin's got off to a great start, contributing a lot more than just goals to the side. Migliorand had a fantastic second half against Barnsley, really controlling the midfield. Gareth Edds has looked solid throughout and I'm looking forward to seeing more from Jim Davis and Darren Dykes.

Cardiff: Croft has been the most impressive of the summer signings, composed and assured on the ball, although a bit reluctant to go forward. Barker and Whalley also seem useful additions to the squad.

WHAT DO YOU KNOW OF THE OPPOSITION?

Swindon: I saw Cardiff at the County ground last season and they were very impressive. Kavanagh is always dangerous, 15 goals from midfield proves just that, and we all no what Peter Thorne can do on the day, but our defence is looking as solid as ever at the moment, even without Gurney. Cardiff were surprisingly beaten at home by Northampton last weekend - let's hope it's the start of a bad run.

Cardiff: A strong start to the season despite being rated at 50/1 outsiders by the bookies at the outset. Unbeaten after 3 games and scoring goals through Parkin and Invincibile - who looked a good player against Cardiff last year.

HAS YOUR PREDICTION CHANGED FOR YOUR SIDE'S FINAL LEAGUE POSITION ON THE BACK OF THE LAST THREE GAMES?

Swindon: No. In the second half of last season we produced some fantastic football (and results) at the County Ground. I felt that Andy King would be able to build on that, and with the signings he's made we are going in the right direction. Pushing for the playoff's come May I think.

Cardiff: No - The bluebirds will be in the play-off places at the end of the season and hopefully get automatic promotion

HOW WILL YOUR SIDE GET ON THIS AFTERNOON?

Swindon: It's going to be a very tight game. I don't want to make any predictions as I'm normally wrong, but I will be having a few quid on 'Super Sam' to be opening the scoring.

Cardiff: The Bluebirds seem to play better away from home. They will always score but unfortunately usually concede something as well. It won't be a repeat of last years 3-0 away win - my money will be on a 2-2 draw.

Football is a bitter-sweet game but I think it's fair to say we have had an overdose of the bitter at the County Ground in the last few years (and I'm not talking alcohol here).



As for today's visitors, they will be looking to bounce back after a disappointing home defeat by Northampton Town. Having spent a fortune to try and make it into the 'big

time' Cardiff fans were gutted to lose out in the play-offs last season. Get in the net!



My one concern though is that clubs like Swindon will suffer more greatly than ever before should they have suspensions or lengthy/numerous injuries. In a season which has seen a major exodus from professional football, due to cash crises all round and the new transfer window, squad numbers are now smaller, and I fear, for men like King, that each season they will continue to decrease.

There are 600 players currently unemployed; contracts not renewed during the summer. Ronny Johnsen cannot even get a game - unless he plays for free like Nicky Summerbee and Billy McKinley. No doubt Chairmen all over are rubbing their hands with glee at the prospect of Spurs faithful Chris Armstrong turning out for free.

On a serious note, how long can our Nationwide clubs sustain the levels of wages they pay with the major cashflow issues ever present in the game? First day of the season saw record attendances at Nationwide grounds across England, however the majority of clubs still need to significantly increase their crowd size. Of course, clubs don't want to just accept your turnstile cash. In order to somehow make up the huge shortfall in projected revenues expected from TV, clubs want to maximise your spending. Buy a hot dog, or three, get the home and away full kits, perhaps purchase extra socks, key-ring?...and look forward to the day average players earn average wages.

Just in case we were thinking this was an English problem, let's not forget that

huge Italian clubs, with fanatical local support, such as Lazio and Sampdoria, are in severe difficulty. Television deal gone wrong? Perhaps. That's this year's excuse. Could it not be that clubs have become too dependent on TV's major cash injections and egotistical chairmen have become lazy in their management of huge budgets?

The beautiful game the world over needs to grow up and realise that, like it or hate it, it's no longer a sport but an important local business. How many companies do you know wouldn't make redundancies in troubled times? Perhaps profit related pay would be an interesting way to motivate players?







25 YEARS AGO

Town started their Division Three campaign on August 20 1977 with a 1-1 draw at Hillsborough. Over 12,000 saw the match in which Chris Kamara made his League debut for Town, whilst Town skipper Colin Prophett returned to one of his former clubs. Sheffield Wednesday, managed by Len Ashurst equalised through a Tommy Tynan goal. Swindon's first home game of the season came three days later when Peterborough were the visitors. Another new recruit saw his name added to the score sheet when Chris Guthrie opened the scoring for Town, with Ray McHale adding the second in a comfortable win. A gate of 7,124 watched, and Town will be hoping to beat that figure today against Cardiff. Not playing that day, but making 27 appearances for Posh that season was striker Jack Carmichael, who would have a brief spell with Swindon in 1980. Nationally, on August 16 Ron Greenwood is appointed as caretaker manager of England after the July resignation of Don Revia. The opening day of the season sees Lou Macari score a hat trick for Manchester United whilst on August 24, Second Division Cardiff's lowest ever attendance against opposition of League status.



THE NAKED CHEF

In the second of a new series of articles, Town's resident chef takes you through another of his recipes.

NO. 2 TURBO'S BACON SPAGHETTI

- 1. For a serving of four, you'll need a pound of bacon, a pound of spaghetti, 3 cloves of garlic, 5 tablespoons of olive oil, salt, pepper and 2 tablespoons of grated parmesan cheese.
- Cook the bacon on the grill until crispy. Frying it is not healthy, but whatever you do, don't burn the bacon - it'll spoil the taste.
- Prepare the spaghetti according to the guidelines. Make sure to add a drop of oil to the water so that it doesn't stick to the pan. To make sure spaghetti is cooked, throw it against the wall if it sticks it's cooked!
- Process the garlic and add it to the olive oil.
- Toss together the spaghetti, bacon and oil/garlic mix on a low heat until piping hot.
- Add salt, pepper and cheese for taste.
- For an extra bit of taste, why not break up a few ready salted crisps and sprinkle over the top.

Departure times are as follows: Wootton Bassett (Coped Hall Bus Stop) 11.00 am, West Swindon (Ashington Way) 11.15am, County Ground 11.30am, Ermin Street11.45am. Coach Fare: £9.50 per adult, Under 15's £8.50. Supporters club members receive a £1.00 discount.

BY CAR: Leave the M4 at jucntion 3 (A312 – signposted Feltham) and at the

roundabout, take the third exit. You'll eventually reach the Waggoners roundabout on the A312, take the first exit A4 (signposted London). Stay on the A4 until you reach the junction with the B455. Leave the A4 here and take the third exit (signposted Brentford). Griffin Park is on the right hand side on Braemar Road.

PARKING: Head back up the A4 (s/p The West, Heathrow A4, M4). Keep in the two right-hand lanes (s/p Staines, Hounslow A4) and go straight on for 1.5 miles, to junction/lights. Here, turn left (s/p Brentford A3002) into Boston Manor Road. Somerset Road, which leads to one of the best parking areas, is on the RHS after 1.0 miles.

BY TRAIN: Trains from Swindon to London run every half-hour. Unfortunately you will have to change at either

Paddington or Waterloo. South West trains run from Waterloo and Vauxhall to Weybridge via Brentford. From the station head up to the main road and turn left. Take first main left turn into Windmill Road, and first right (s/p Methodist Church) into Clifden Road. After 0.2 miles turn right into Brook Road and away turnstiles are on the LHS. Call 08457 48 49 50 for the latest information. Alternatively you can make you way to the ground from Gunnersbury tube station (1.3) miles from the ground) on the District Line. From here, exit station into Chiswick High Road and turn left. After 0.3 miles, at Chiswick Roundabout, take 2nd exit (s/p. S. Circular A205) into Chiswick High Road, which becomes Kew Bridge Road.

BY BUS: The E8 is a frequent service from Hanwell along Boston Manor Road, while the E2 runs from West Ealing along Windmill Road.

When Stockport finished eighth in Division One in 1997, and with Gary Megson at the helm, few would have predicted their current predicament – the side currently in the bottom half of Division Two.

Megson has since been and gone (and is now managing in the Premiership with West Brom), as has Andy Kilner and at the moment the Hatters are currently under the guile of former England international Carlton Palmer.

Last year was a proverbial disaster for County and Palmer, the side going eight games without a win (winning just one in their first 18) at the start of the season and confirming their relegation at an early stage.

As a result, many have tipped County for an immediate return to the First Division, but it has been somewhat of a slow start for Palmer's boys this time around. An opening day defeat at Colchester was followed by a 1-1 draw with QPR and at the time of writing

Stockport currently occupy the bottom half of the table.

Hopes this season will be pinned on three central figures. Luke Beckett, who joined the club from Chesterfield last season, was last year's top scorer with 7 and he has already opened his account this time around with the opening goal against QPR. Ben Burgess, another centre forward, has joined the club from Blackburn having spent the majority of last season on loan at Brentford with devastating effect. The burly striker was a target of Andy King's before Palmer snapped him up in July this year and his physical presence will, no doubt, have to be contained if Town are to succeed next Saturday. Stockport's other star is one for the future. Robert Clare, a 19year old centre half, has impressed everyone at Edgeley Park and has been outstanding again so far this year.

With the fans behind the manager (eventually) and a chairman with every confidence in his players, one assumes that it will only be a matter of time before Stockport start to assert their authority on this division. After all, the club is no longer a minnow and in this league, I would go as far as saying that they are one of the so-called 'bigger' clubs. Hopefully they will have to wait until after our encounter until they register their next win and you never know, the longer the club goes without a victory, the lower the confidence gets. As we know to our cost, relegations can take their toll...
