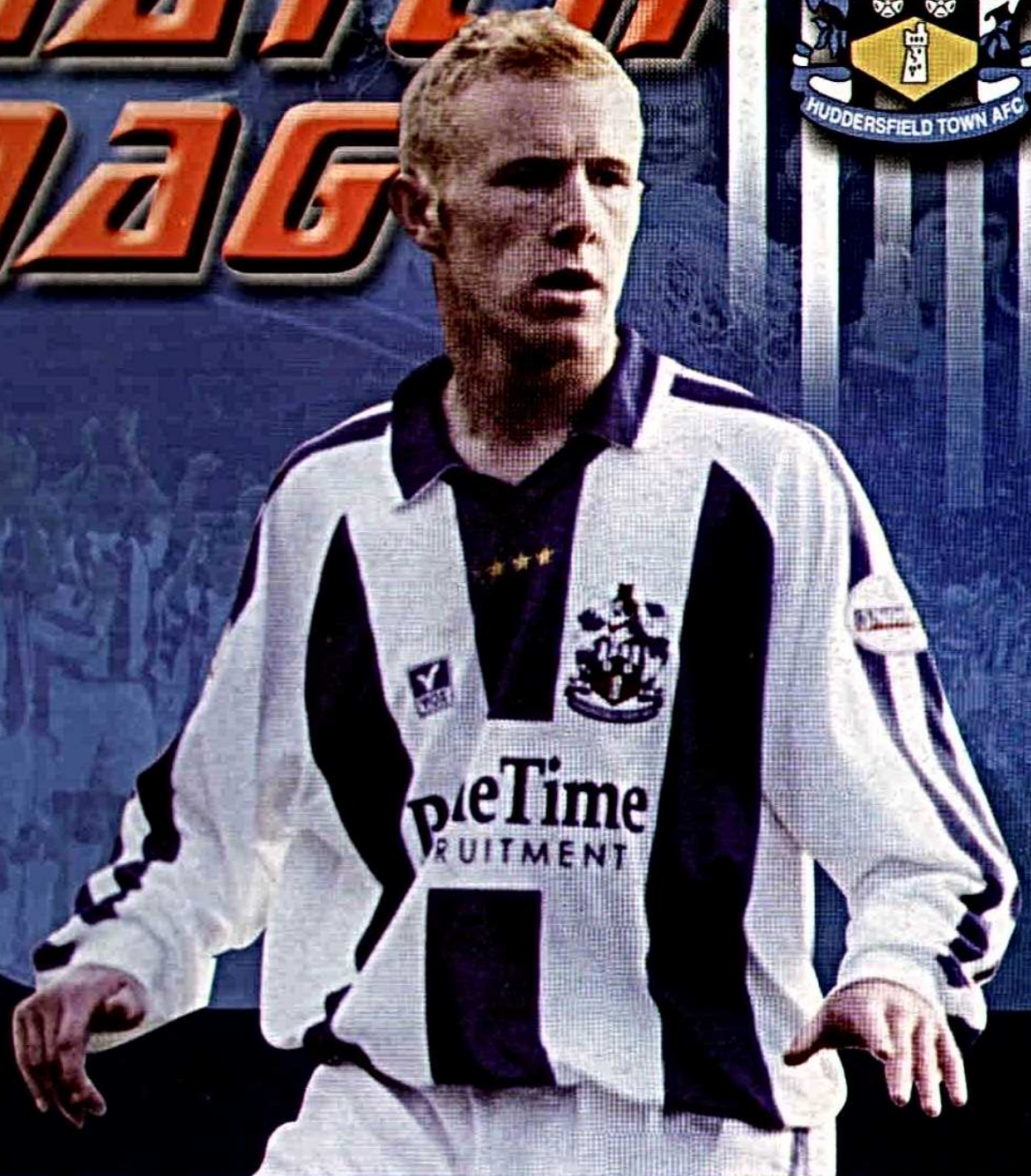

GROUND REGULATIONS

In the interest of Spectator Safety the following conditions apply at The McAlpine Stadium and will be enforced by the Club's stewards, with the full support of West Yorkshire Police:

REMEMBER:

The club has the right to refuse entry or eject any person who refuses to be searched by a steward or police officer. • Any person who fails to comply with instructions from a steward may be ejected from the ground • Any person whose behaviour could reasonably be construed as consisting of a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators may be ejected.

ALSO:

It is a criminal offense, for which you may be arrested: • To throw anything on to the pitch or at players, officials and other supporters • Take part in any indecent or racist chanting, go on to the playing surface at any time • To try to enter the ground with intoxicating liquor, to try to enter the ground whilst drunk • To possess any article, such as knives, bottles, fireworks, smoke canisters, cans and flagpoles which might be used as offensive weapons • To use behaviour which is threatening, abusive or insulting towards another • Persons convicted of criminal offenses will become subject of Exclusion Orders banning them from all Football League grounds.

WADSWORTHS WORDS

Losing a cup tie is always disappointing, particularly if you've performed well as we did at Swindon last weekend.

We were on top in most departments but not in goalscoring and that remains our main problem. Failing to take some of the good chances we are creating is continuing to let us down.

The issue burns brightly in our training sessions.

The players know what is required and with each game we hope our fortunes in front of goal will improve.

Our defensive record this season is reasonably good. Indeed we have conceded less goals than many clubs in the division but our scoring record is poor.

In an ideal world I'd sign a striker or at least bring in a

player on loan but finances won't permit us to do that. There is no point going on about it. It's a fact of life and we have to get on with it. Our training sessions have been very positive and when results go against us we've got to pull together and bounce back.

Generally our support has been brilliant and that was certainly the case again at Swindon last week. I think Jonathan Worthington has done very well in his first two starts for us and he is just the latest in a productive line of talent to emerge from our Academy. It is a real blow to have lost the services of Nathan Clarke. He'd just come back from a knee injury and to be sidelined by an unrelated injury to his other knee is bad luck. He had a great season last year and kept a clean sheet on his first game back. It is important he stays positive, despite his understandable frustration, and we will look forward to his return in about three months. It was disappointing that our reserve game in midweek was called off as I was hoping to give some of our lads a useful run out. The young lads won their F.A. Youth Cup tie at Hull in a penalty shoot out. Congratulations to them.

Finally get behind us today and enjoy the game.

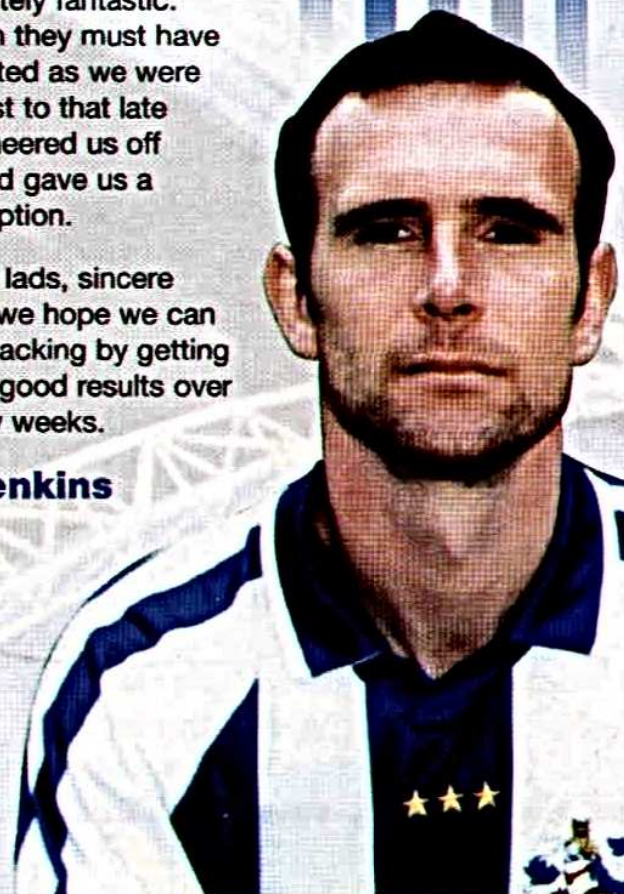

The latest graduate from Town's highly productive Academy is Jonathan Worthington.

The teenager, no relation to legendary Frank Worthington, signed a professional contract with the Terriers at the same time as Nathan Clarke but injuries prevented him from making his first-team debut until this season. He made a brief appearance as a substitute at Plymouth in August but his first start finally arrived earlier this month at home against Wycombe. It was quite a day for the midfielder who was given the man of the match award. "I was a bit nervous before the game," he said. "But once I'd had my first couple of touches I settled down and I really enjoyed it.

It could hardly have gone better for me. There were little things – things that I'm trying to work on in my game, but apart from actually scoring a goal I couldn't really have asked for more. I've been struggling with a little niggle since that game at Plymouth and I've just been waiting to shrug it off and get my fitness. I've been performing fairly solidly in the

reserves and just hoping to get another chance in the first team." Worthington has got plenty of familiar faces to welcome him in the changing room. He said, "when I arrived early in the afternoon I looked around and there were a lot of young faces. It was similar back in the youth team days really, which was nice because it helped me to settle down a bit. It's a big step up from the Academy to the reserves and then the first team. The pace and the physical side of the game is a lot different. There's also a lot more concentration on certain aspects of the game. The experienced players all encouraged me before and during the game and that was a big help. People like Steve Jenkins and Adie Moses who have been at the top for quite a while can give young players like me a great deal of encouragement." Despite some disappointing results Jonathan says the confidence in the squad is good. "We've just got to keep plugging away and the results will come. We're

capable of putting a run of wins together. The league is tight and a few wins will take us into the top half of the table and then we can go on from there. We've played some good football and I think we are in a false position. We work hard and if we can get a bit more success in front of goal we'll climb the table quickly. I was pleased with my performance on my debut but I know I can do a lot better and that I will improve with the added confidence of playing in the first team. I hope I can get a run in the side and play my part in improving our league position."

This was a tight evenly fought contest that looked unlikely to yield more than one goal to separate the two sides.

Town went into the game with a notable absentee to add to their long term injury woes. Michael Tunnacliffe was injured in a car crash during the week and is likely to be sidelined for some time.

The first half produced precious few openings. Danny Clapham and Steven Kenworthy went close with rare

opportunities and goalkeeper Jacob Giles dealt very well with a couple of Bolton efforts at the other end. Academy Director Gerry Murphy said the half-time team talk centred on the fact that the team with the greatest appetite could go on to claim victory and it proved to be Town.

The home side started to get on top after the interval and the breakthrough finally came in the 72nd minute. Greg Kelly's left-wing corner was cleared by the Bolton defence but only as far as Matt Young who played the ball forward to David Murfin and it was his

John McAliskey

There can be no one enjoying playing football more than John McAliskey at the moment. The 18 year old is finally back in action after a 14 month lay off. The big striker - 6 feet 5 inches tall - was sidelined with a stress fracture of his back and he has already celebrated his return with a goal.

It was at the start of last season that his back problem was diagnosed. At first he was told to rest for three months but there was no real improvement and he had to be put in a cast. When that was removed the injury caused by over use, still hadn't responded so an operation was carried out. Following the surgery he couldn't even bend down and it's been a very slow and gradual build up to fitness ever since. His patience was finally rewarded when he came off the bench to play as a substitute in Town's F.A. Youth Cup first round victory against Carlisle. He came on as a sub to score the winning goal in the Academy game at Sheffield Wednesday and last Saturday marked a key point in his return when he started a game for the first time, playing over an hour of the win against Bolton. It was a special moment for the prolific goalscorer who first joined Town as a 9 year old when he was playing for his local side Golcar United. John still lives in Golcar and is now hoping to get as many games under his belt as possible for the remainder of the season. "It's been a long time but I'm just delighted to be back," he said. "I'm in the second year in the Academy and just want to play every week now. I feel fairly sharp but obviously it is bound to take a little time before I regain full match fitness."

John has grown up alongside the likes of Joe Walsh, John McCombe, David Murfin and Michael Tunnacliffe and has witnessed their progress in the Academy. He's also taken inspiration from the development of the older boys such as Nathan Clarke, Jon Stead and Jon Worthington who have all made it into the first team. "It's fantastic seeing all the youngsters getting a chance and obviously I want to follow in their footsteps. It would be a dream to play for my home town club," he said. "Despite his height John says he hopes to improve his heading ability and says at present he's a similar type of striker as Jon Stead. "My aim now is to play as many Academy games as possible and then move on to the reserves."

Directions to the Welfare Ground, Emley

Take the A629 Sheffield road out of Huddersfield to the traffic lights at Waterloo; keep left and travel on the A642 Wakefield road for another 2.8 miles. Pass the White Horse on the left and turn right at the top of the hill, signposts Emley, and follow the signs to the centre of the village. The ground is on the right through a narrow opening between two buildings.

INTOWN TODAY SWINDON TOWN



Last Saturday's cup win over the Terriers stretched Swindon's run of improved results.

The only defeat they have suffered in their last seven outings came in the LDV Trophy when they lost to an extra time golden goal at Kidderminster. The sequence of good results began in the same competition in October when they defeated Southend 6-1. That was followed by a 2-1 home victory over Mansfield in the league. A 1-1 draw at

Notts County was bettered when Swindon won 3-2 at Wycombe and a fortnight ago in their most recent league fixture they drew 1-1 with Tranmere. They currently lie 18th in the table – one point and two places above Town.

Andy King's side began the season in sensational style and actually topped the table briefly after winning their first two matches – 3-1 at home to

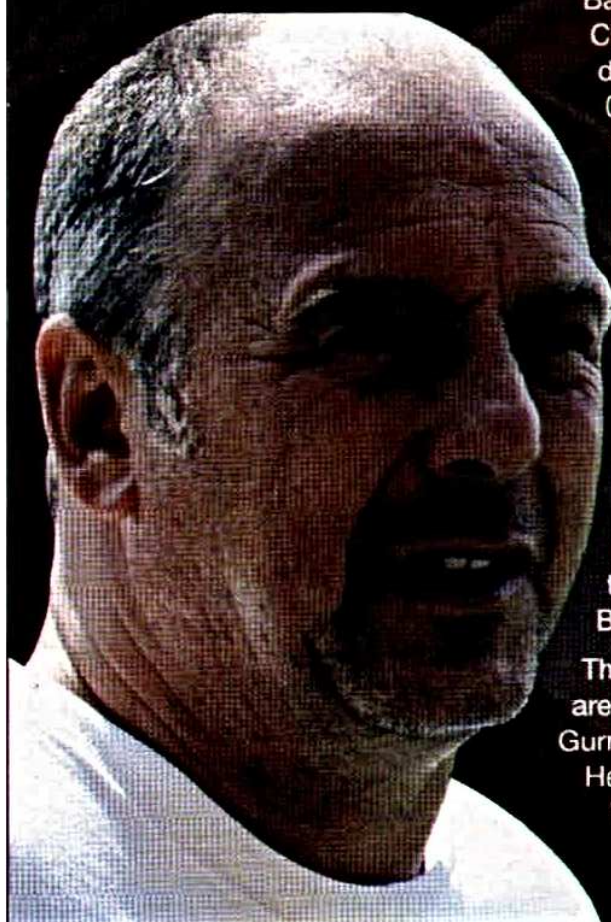
Barnsley and 4-2 at Chesterfield. But after drawing their next game 0-0 at Blackpool, they suffered a dismal run of seven consecutive defeats. After defeating Northampton 2-0 they then went four more games without a win before starting their current run.

This season's leading marksman is Parkin with 11 goals, including a hat-trick in that opening day win over Barnsley.

The club's other goalscorers are – Invincible 4, Davis 3, Gurney 3, Sabin 3, Jackson 2, Heywood 1, Miglioranzi 1, Willis 1 and Young 1.

Last season the club spent most of the campaign in mid-table. Their highest position of 9th was achieved in September whilst their lowest standing 23rd was a month earlier in August. They finished the season in 13th place. Highlights included a Worthington Cup victory at Wolves and F.A. Cup wins over Hartlepool and Hereford before they lost in round three at Manchester City.

The two league games against Town took place in the space of five weeks. In February the Terriers won 1-0 at Swindon with a 55th minute goal from Chris Hay. In March Town completed a league double with a 2-0 success at the McAlpine when Kenny Irons and Leon Knight were on the scoresheet. None of Swindon's goalscorers reached double figures last season – Grazioli and Invincible lead their scoring chart with 8 goals apiece. Former Champion Jockey Willie Carson is now involved behind the scenes at a club which has tremendous financial problems.

ONE TO WATCH SAM PARKIN

21 year old striker Sam Parkin joined Swindon on the eve of the new season and celebrated his debut next day by hitting a hat-trick against Barnsley.

Born in Roehampton he was on Chelsea's books but was loaned out to various clubs. Andy King is an open admirer of Parkin and had been targeting him ever since the youngster completed last season on loan at Northampton.

Chelsea's glut of quality strikers enabled them to allow Parkin to gain league experience on loan elsewhere. He went first to Millwall and scored twice on his debut in a 5-0 win over Oxford. Three months later he went on loan to Wycombe Wanderers and scored twice for them. He turned down chances to join QPR and Luton and moved on loan again to Oldham before enjoying an extended period with Northampton where he netted 5 goals. After his sensational three goal debut for Swindon he netted again in the next match at Chesterfield. His next goal came from the

penalty spot in a win over Northampton. He then netted 6 goals in 5 games against Southend (LDV), Mansfield, Notts County, two against Wycombe and at home to Tranmere a fortnight ago.

GOALKEEPERS



Former Holland under 21 international **BART GRIEMINK** was signed on a free transfer two years ago, after an initial spell on loan.

He first appeared in England in 1995 when he signed for Birmingham. He later followed Blues boss Barry Fry to Peterborough. After joining Swindon he became the first choice keeper and had a spell as captain.

CRAIG FARR, at one stage the third choice keeper at the club, has impressed with his performances in the reserves. After many appearances on the bench he finally made his first team debut this season.

DEFENDERS

Australian full-back **GARETH EDDS** arrived at the club in August. After a successful month on non-contract terms the ex Nottingham Forest player signed a one year deal. The right back played almost 40 games for Forest and is still only 21.

ADAM WILLIS is an experienced central defender who arrived from Coventry four years ago. He struggled to gain

a regular place in the side and was briefly loaned out to Mansfield. He was a consistently strong performer last season and netted a goal this season in a Worthington Cup tie against Wycombe.



ANDY GURNEY was the scorer of last weekend's winning goal in the F.A. Cup tie. In 1999 he moved from Torquay to Reading for

£100,000, having started his career with Bristol Rovers. He switched from Reading to Swindon on a Bosman free transfer last year and scored a long range goal on his debut. He missed only four games last season all through suspension and is now the club captain.

Dubliner **KEITH O'HALLORAN** arrived on a free from St Johnstone in 2000. He began his professional career at Middlesbrough where he made six appearances before moving north of the border. He has become the club's regular penalty taker but missed much of last season after suffering a serious knee injury.

34 year old **NEIL RUDDOCK**, the former Tottenham, Liverpool, Southampton, Millwall, West Ham and Crystal Palace defender is unlikely to play for

the club again as a result of a dispute over finances and his contract. The matter could end going to a tribunal hearing even though the club have reportedly offered him a £100,000 pay off and a testimonial match.



MATTHEW HEYWOOD is a big defender who moved from Burnley. He has been a more or less ever present figure at the heart of the

defence since his move from Turf Moor in January of last year. He has been rewarded with an extension to his contract.

ALAN REEVES who celebrated his 35th birthday this week is a central defender who once captained the side. Before joining the club in 1998 he was with Wimbledon for four years and had previously played for Gillingham, Chester and Rochdale.

CHRIS COLLINS signed professional forms for the club in the summer after graduating through the club's youth ranks.

MIDFIELDERS

JOHNNIE JACKSON has recently agreed to extend his loan spell from Tottenham after making a quick impression with management and fans alike when he arrived at the club in September. He came highly commended by Swindon's former boss Glenn Hoddle and has played for England's under 20 side. Although he has got to make his first team debut for

Tottenham he is expected to do so in the next couple of years. He has scored two goals for Town, both at home against Northampton in the league and Southend in the LDV.

Bristol born **MATTHEW HEWLETT** is an attacking player who was called up to the England under 21 squad in his days with Bristol City. He made over 100 appearances for the Ashton Gate outfit but moved to Swindon two years ago. He has been hampered with a knee injury since switching clubs.

STEFANI MIGLIORANZI is a product of the American college football system and had his first taste of English soccer with a trial at Everton. The 25 year old Brazilian born player was then snapped up by Portsmouth and can play in central midfield or defence. Having joined Swindon in August he scored his first goal for the club in the LDV Trophy against Southend.

Left sided **DAVID DUKE** came on a free transfer from Sunderland two years ago. Born in Inverness, one of his strengths is his excellent crossing.

Argentinean **JUAN CABIAN** is in his third season with the club. He played for Boca Juniors before spells with Sheffield Wednesday, Charlton and Aberdeen. The attacking right back is yet to win a regular place in the Swindon side.

DARREN DYKES is a left-sided midfielder who is beginning to make his mark in the side.

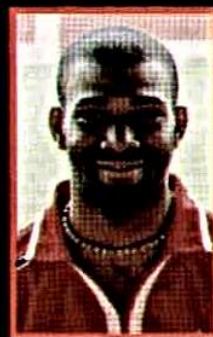
Tough tackling **STEVE ROBINSON** now 27, signed for the club 18 months ago in a

£50,000 move from Birmingham. He was a trainee with the Blues and went on to play over 50 league games for the club. A proposed move from St Andrews to Bramall Lane broke down when he failed a medical.

Teenager **NATHAN EDWARDS** is a product of the club's youth system who made his debut in the LDV Trophy last season.

STRIKERS

JIMMY DAVIS joined the club on loan from Manchester United with a glowing reference from Sir Alex Ferguson. He has risen through the youth ranks at Old Trafford. Although he can play as an attacker he can also perform in midfield. He scored twice for England's under 20 side in the Toulon tournament and has so far netted three times for Swindon.



Frenchman **ERIC SABIN**, now 27, is a flair player with the special skills capable of turning the course of a game. He arrived from

French club Wasquehall and has so far scored three goals this season.



DANNY INVINCIBLE is a 23 year old Australian who signed for the club in August 2000 after being recommended by Harry

Redknapp when he was in charge at West Ham. Despite scoring on his Town debut against West Brom he made a relatively quiet start with the club but then burst to prominence with a spell of five goals in five games. He went on to be the club's top scorer with 10 goals including a vital strike in the final minute of the last game to keep the club in Division Two. The former Aussie under 21 is a huge favourite of the Town fans and is at his best when running at defenders.

ALAN YOUNG is a Swindon born striker who is still only 19. He played for England's youth team and has been a prolific goalscorer in age group football. He scored on his first team debut in an F.A. Cup tie against Ilkeston.

KEVIN HALLIDAY is just 19 and a product of the club's junior system. He made his debut two years ago in the LDV Trophy and formerly captained the club's youth side.

TOWN 2-0 SWINDON

When the Wiltshire Robins last flew into Huddersfield in the Spring of this year they did so on the back of a 0-2 midweek defeat at Brentford, a side then vying with the Terriers for a top six Play-off spot.

Swindon themselves stood safely in mid-table and were effectively playing the season out under recently appointed manager Andy King. Lou Macari's Town side meantime were lying in 7th position, having just drawn 1-1 at Chesterfield in midweek, and were looking to pick up three more points to maintain their promotion challenge. Having won 1-0 in the corresponding fixture at the County Ground just a month previously, the Terriers hoped to complete the double over the Robins.

The game attracted a crowd of 9,569 of which just 358 had made the long trip north to Yorkshire, and was to develop into something of a dour affair with Huddersfield finding it difficult to negotiate a frustratingly crowded midfield. Swindon's three centre-back system was at last breached after 20 minutes when Danny Schofield set up Kenny Irons who hit a solid 25-yard drive towards the Swindon goal. Dutch 'keeper Griemink seemed to have the shot covered but then lost concentration at the last minute as the ball slipped from his grasp and rolled slowly into the net. There was little else to cheer in the first-half but at least the Terriers went in at half-time a goal to the good.

Huddersfield opened the second-half looking for a second goal to

kill the game and it came on 51 minutes following a neat five-man move. Out on the wing Thorrington and Facey played a swift one-two before Facey squared the ball midfield to Chris Holland. Holland withstood a strong challenge from Hewlett before releasing Schofield whose long cross by-passed the static Swindon back-line and was gleefully headed home by fans' favourite Leon Knight. Irons had a great free-kick turned away soon afterwards and as the match progressed Knight (twice) and Schofield both went close to adding a third. For the Robins only a very late effort from Grazioli, well saved by Margetson, looked like spoiling the home party but at 2-0 the points were safely Huddersfield's.

- Swindon are another club who owe their formation to the efforts of a Victorian clergyman, in this case the Rev William Pitt. In 1881 he helped form a winter sport section for his local cricket club and named the new soccer outfit Spartans FC. Two years later they were to merge with the footballers of St Mark's Young Men's Friendly Society under the banner of Swindon Town FC and in 1894 turned professional on becoming one of the founder members of the new Southern League. Prior to joining the Football League as original members of Division 3 in 1920, Swindon had defeated no less than eleven sides (including Huddersfield Town!) from that esteemed level in FA Cup ties.

- As noted above the first meeting between the Towns of Huddersfield and Swindon came in the FA Cup 2nd round on February 1st 1913 when 17,000 spectators saw the still non-League Robins win 2-1 at Leeds Road. Jimmy Macaulay netted for Huddersfield but Swindon's matchwinners were Freddie Wheatcroft and Robert Brown. Surprisingly over 50 years would pass before the two clubs were to meet again in a competitive match when Len White and Les Massie gave Huddersfield a 2-0 home win in Division 2 (att. 7,718) on November 23rd 1963. In all there have been 28 League and major Cup matches between the clubs to date with Swindon, now definitely established as a Terriers 'bogey' team, holding a distinct 13-8 advantage in wins and having scored 48 goals against Huddersfield's 34.

- There have been several players who have moved directly between the two clubs over the years starting with John Gilligan who briefly came to Leeds Road on loan in September 1976. Roy Greenwood then joined Huddersfield in August 1982, Kieran O'Regan in August 1988, Wayne Allison in November 1997 and Chris Hay in March 2000. Darren Bullock however made the opposite journey moving from Yorkshire to the County Ground in February 1997.

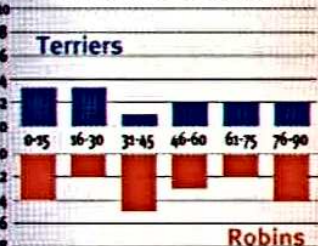

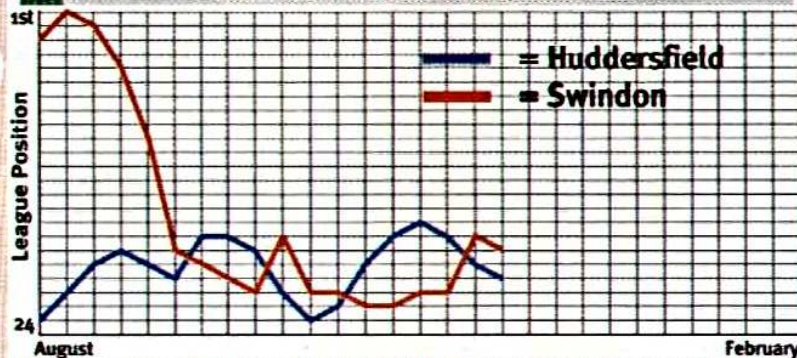

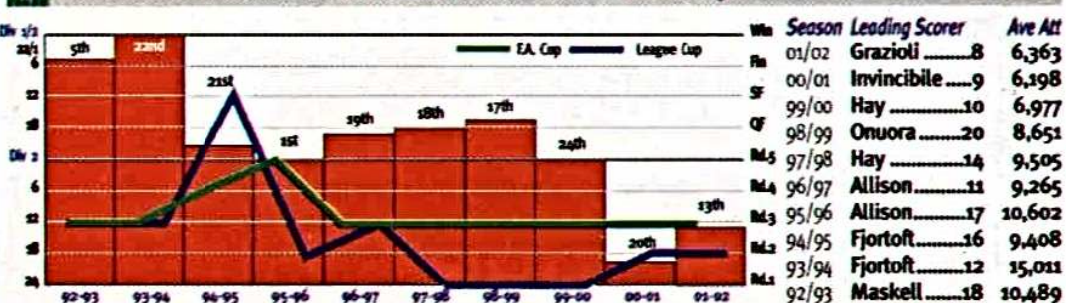

Then there's Leeds United, proud of being Yorkshire's leading club. Yet after the enforced sale of Rio Ferdinand and midst rumours of dressing room upset Terry Venables is having difficulties keeping his smile on his face. Last weeks defeat at home to Bolton ended with fans chanting for El Tel's dismissal. Strange then to think that Yorkshire's most successful sides at present are Doncaster Rovers and Halifax!

AROUND THE WORLD IN ONE YEAR

My name is Paul Thornton, a natural born Town fan living in Salendine Nook, or should I say was until September this year. It was then I left my home and family to tour the world for 12 months, taking in many countries in my travels. Before I left, I contacted the club and spoke to Tony Haigh, about placing updates of my progress in "Match Mag". This is my first two months....

As I write this now, I should be watching England v Slovakia, hoping Town beat Notts County and trying to find the result for Fartown as they play Leigh in the rugby League Grand Final.

However, I am not. I am stuck by the side of the road, just south of Chicago, my hands covered in grease repairing a burst tyre. In 5 years of driving, I've never had a blown tyre, and now I've had two in the same day.

I'm on a year long world tour currently travelling across the USA, then going to Fiji, Australia, New Zealand, Singapore, then overland through Thailand finally flying home from Vietnam.

My last Town match was the home win against Barnsley, and we haven't won a league game since. I've received a fair few emails telling me to come home soon.

I was at Ground Zero in New York for September 11th, which was a pretty emotional occasion. There was deadly silence on the streets of New York from 8:41 while they read the names of the victims out. It lasted until about 12:30, and there were many people in tears throughout.

There was a procession at the end, including New York police, Firemen, Ambulancemen, Steelworkers and quite a lot of British Policemen and Firemen that came over. Everyone was given applause cheers and a generally good reception.

That evening, I went to watch the New York Yankees play the Baltimore Orioles. It cost \$12 for a reasonable seat and everyone got a free T-Shirt, hat and Programme on entry.

The Yankees won 5-4 with a couple of Home Runs, although they were 4-0 up at one point. The atmosphere inside the Yankee Stadium was pretty non-existent because of the day's events, and it was only half-full, even though there was 35,000 people in there. The game lasted about 4 hours, and it was cold to Siberian extents at the end.

Travelling down to Washington DC, although the major tourist attractions (The White House, The Pentagon, The FBI Building) have been closed to the public since September 11th last year. It does give me good reason

to go back in the future though.

I did manage to see the monuments to Washington, Lincoln and Jefferson and also managed to see Congress and the House of Representatives in session at Capital Hill. However, there were more people in the viewing gallery than there were congressmen, as they discussed forest fires and the Iraqi conflict.

Philadelphia was the next port of call, I took in the origins of the USA - where the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution was signed. More interestingly to me, I went to many places where the film Rocky was made - including holding my arms aloft at the Philadelphia Museum of Art where he runs up the stairs.

I then took the 12 hour bus ride to Niagara Falls, which was truly amazing, especially going on the Maid of the Mist boat ride just 50 yards away from the falls. It's something that I think anyone should see in their lifetime if they get the chance. The sheer power of the falls is something words cannot describe.

Continuing to Canada and went to Toronto. I went to see an Ice Hockey game between the Toronto Maple Leafs and the Ottawa Senators. It was a really good game and the Maple Leafs won 3-1 and there was also a couple of fights. It was a really good atmosphere even though it was only a pre-season friendly, but it was a full house with around 20,000 people in there.

Visiting the world's tallest single structure, the CN Tower. The views of Toronto and Lake Ontario were amazing, although when I got to the very top, the lift broke down, so I had to walk down the steps all the way to the bottom! I was exhausted and shaking at the end.

I then went to Boston, and saw where America took their freedom from us Brits. It was really interesting, very nice to see things reminding me of home. I also had a pint in the original Cheers Bar before I made my way back to New York. I met my University friend Nick from Bolton, then we picked up a car heading towards Chicago.

On the way to Chicago, I took Nick to see Niagara falls, then we went to Cleveland. We are both big music fans, so a trip to the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame was one we couldn't miss.

We had originally planned to spend a couple of hours in there, but we were there for 7 and a half hours, and still missed a whole floor dedicated solely to John Lennon featuring hand-written lyrics, guitars and many more.

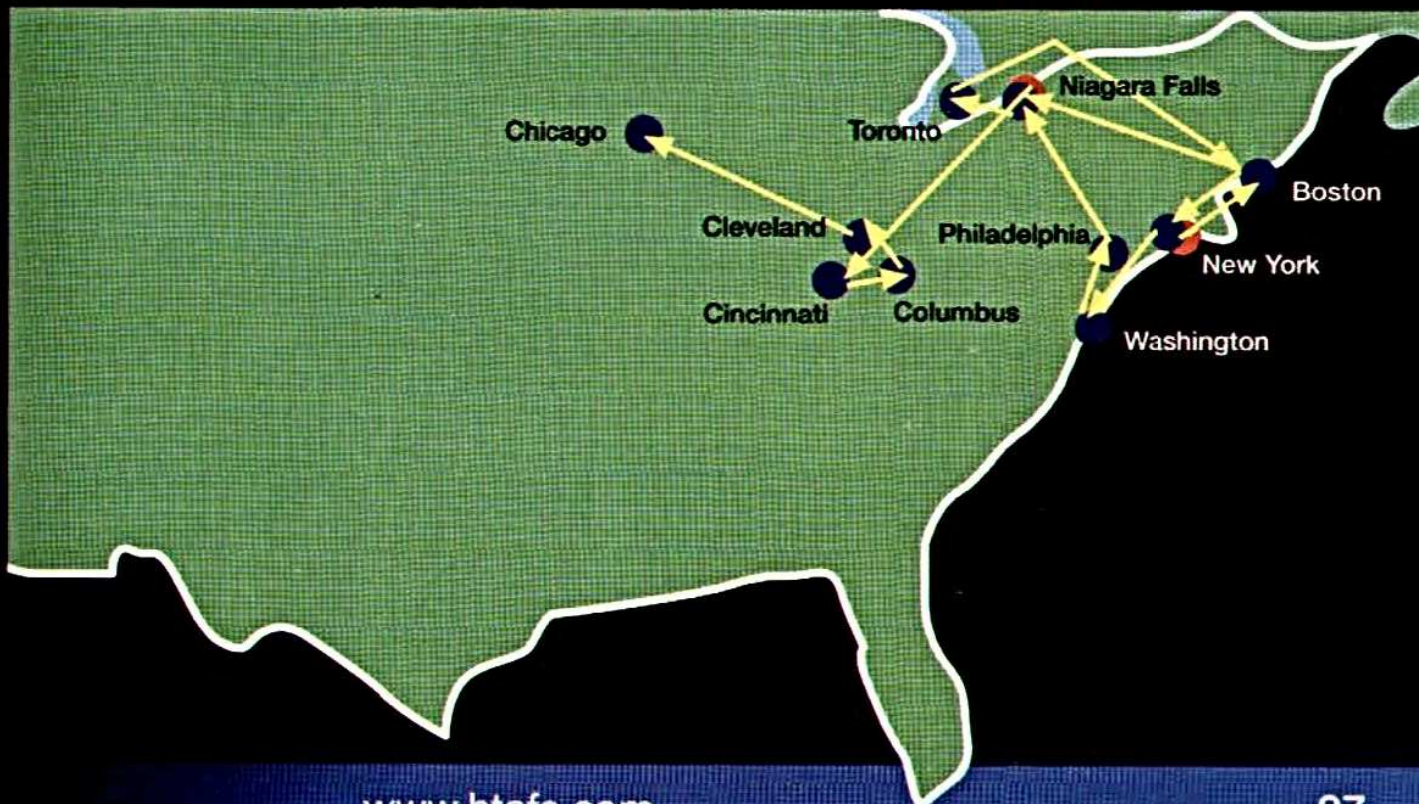
We then carried up to Chicago, which is where we are now fixing this tyre and we should hopefully be their soon. Let's hope Mick and the boys have more luck than we're having!

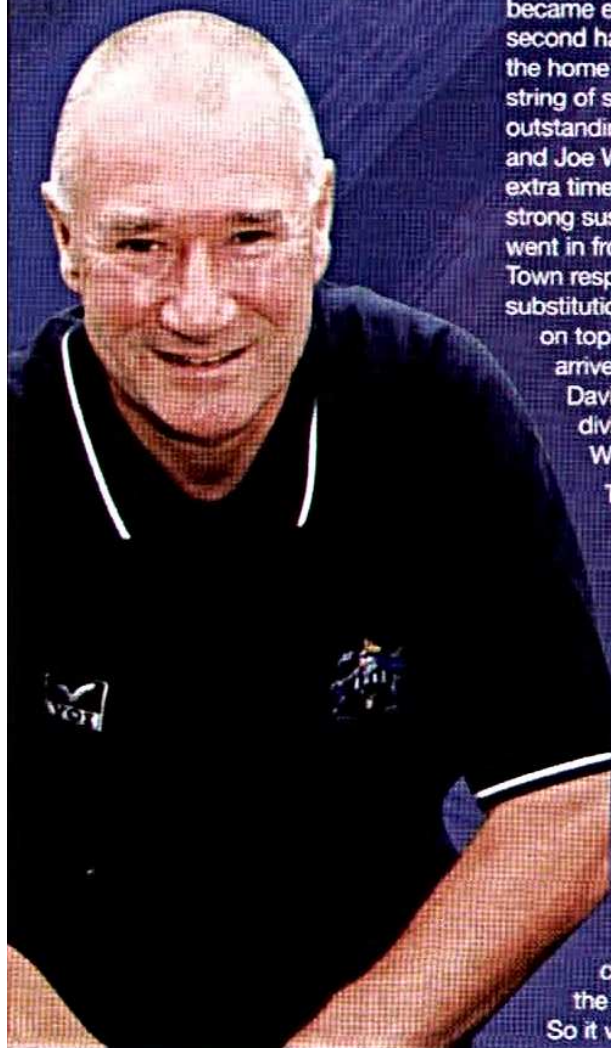

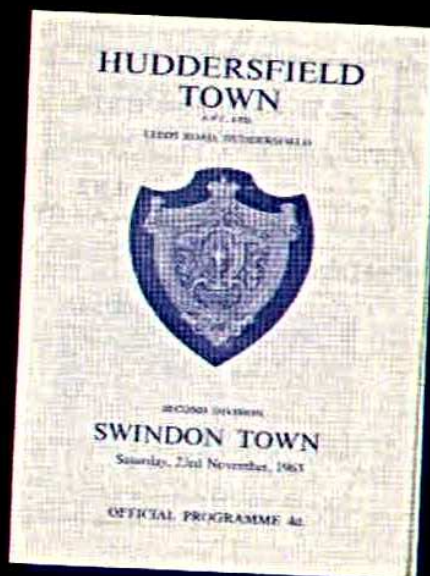

Twenty years ago Town travelled to the County ground in rather sombre mood, still in the relegation zone and with not a single away victory since January 2nd, they needed points to ease real, if not exactly dire, relegation worries, as indeed did their opponents. The lowly placing of the two protagonists was reflected in the gate of just 3,872, and those stay-away Town fans missed an absolute treat. Their team emphatically underlined the character and commitment that was a characteristic of manager Mick Buxton's teams.

Town, very much understrength, strung five across midfield and it was their endeavour on which the performance lingered. The goal from which Swindon never recovered came in the 66th minute and must be one which man of the match, 18 year old Tim Hotte recalled for many a year. Hotte, Bradford born but signed from Arsenal the previous September, latched on to a Micky Kennedy pass and blasted the ball into the roof of the net from an acute angle, giving keeper Allan no chance.

Keith Hanvey had put Town ahead on 25 minutes with a header from Hotte's cross but Swindon equalised seconds before half-time, Mike Carter crossed from the left and Paul Rideout got the decisive touch from close range.

Hotte (73 minutes) made it 3-1 and Cowling, receiving a pass from Brian

Stanton calmly clipped a shot wide of the stranded goalkeeper. Kennedy completed the rout in the final seconds of the match when he struck a glorious 25 yarder which totally bemused Allan in the Swindon goal.

and **Keiran O'Regan** who could still get into the town team!

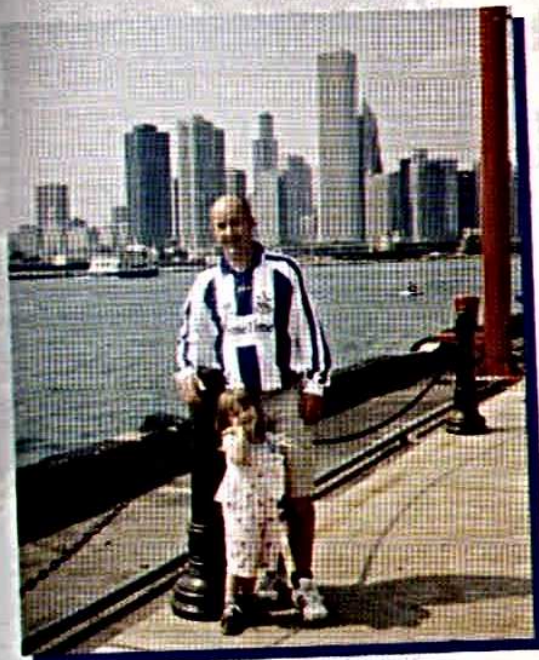

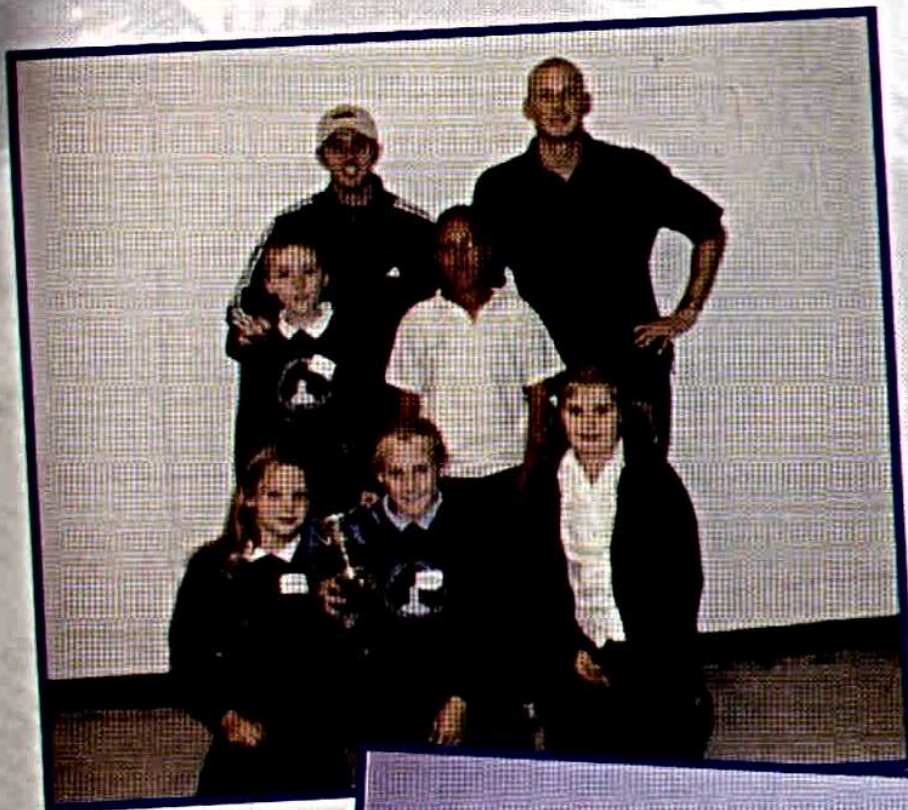

Acknowledging both the responsibility of the club, as members of the FA, and that of the Stadium Company to assure good crowd behaviour at matches we have to address the difficulty of persistent standing of supporters in seated areas throughout a game.

Whether we like it or not the days of standing on the terraces will soon be a thing of the past. With the advent of new and refurbished stadia throughout the Football League there are now very few standing areas remaining. Following the Hillsborough disaster and the Taylor report major changes have been made and there is a legal requirement regarding standing which applies to all football grounds. Authorities are enforcing this requirement for the benefit of the safety of all supporters.

Enforcement of this ruling will be carried out at all grounds and an eviction policy will be in place for those who do not adhere to the ruling we would ask that our supporters observe the ruling both at the Alfred McAlpine Stadium and when travelling to away games.
