





I know this is a game our supporters have been looking forward to since the day the draw was made, and it gives us a great chance to show the whole country that Oxford United are on the way back.

Lincoln

Last Saturday's win was most welcome, of course, as it kept us just behind the pack in the Third Division. What was not welcome was the pitch 'invasion' at the end of the game by so called Lincoln fans. Although I think the

scale of this was exaggerated in the media, I do take very seriously any such problem within and outside the stadium.

The people who caused trouble will be taken to task. Their images were captured on the CCTV system, and have been passed on to the Lincolnshire police. Their response will be as stern as the law allows, and I hope the punishment handed out will serve as a deterrent to others. Our security cameras are as advanced as any in the country, and I am informed that we can capture an image of EVERY fan in the ground every three minutes, which means that we can deal with this incident in the manner it deserves.

Somewhat unfairly, we have come in for some criticism in some quarters for the way we dealt with things, but I would like to thank the stewards for their action, as they did well in difficult circumstances. I would also like to praise our

own fans for not responding to the provocation.

We do take safety issues very seriously and hopefully have learned any lessons that needed to be learned from this incident. As ever, your help and co-operation in making this a place where people want to come and watch football is much appreciated.

Rivalry

Almost the first thing people made me aware of when I became involved at the club was the local rivalry that exists between today's teams. Having sampled the atmosphere and passion of a derby game at The Manor, and at the County Ground, I am well aware of what today's game means to you all.

I can assure you that the players will be giving it their all on the pitch and I know there is no need to urge you to get behind the team this afternoon. Your support has been magnificent all season, and hopefully we can reward you with a win and get ourselves in to the draw for the next round...

The Gaffer: Andy King

Andy's playing career started at Luton Town, signing

professional in July 1974, and his midfield qualities and eye for a goal caught the attention of Everton, who paid £35,000 for his services in March 1976.

An attacking midfielder, King had four very successful years at Goodison, scoring a memorable derby goal against Liverpool among many others, before big money transfers to QPR and then West Brom. After an FA Cup semi final appearance for the Baggies King returned to Everton for a second spell before spells at Wolves, in Sweden, at Luton again, and then assisting Aldershot, Aylesbury, Waterford, Cobn Ramblers and Southport.

After a spell as commercial manager at Luton, Andy went back into management at Mansfield in November 1993, and held that post until September 96.

When Colin Todd took over at the County Ground, he made King his assistant, and he first took over the hot seat when the former Oxford defender moved on to Derby. Although replaced by Roy Evans just before the start on the 2000/1 season, the Evans' reign was short lived and King became manager again in December last year.

Swindon Town football club was formed in 1894 by the Rev. Williams Pitt and was a founder member of the Southern League, although even in the early days the spectre of financial difficulties was never far away. Having earned Football League status in 1920 when they joined the old Third Division South, the club had to apply for re-election in 1933. 1936 and 1937 as they struggled to make their mark.

Confined to the lower leagues until 1962, when they won promotion for the first time, Swindon's greatest moment came in the League Cup when two goals from star striker Don Rodgers gave them a famous win over Arsenal at Wembley. However, the side struggled after the departure of manager Danny Williams, and it wasn't until Lou Macari took over at the County Ground that the club enjoyed happier times again, winning promotion into the old Second Division once more.

Town's next promotion ended in controversy when Ossie Ardiles's side won promotion to the top flight but was immediately demoted because of 'financial irregularities' It was three seasons more before Glenn Hoddle took Town into the top division, playing flowing football along the way, but this proved to be a false dawn as the club was unable to sustain this progress and lasted just one season in the fledgling Premier League.

More recently, Town have been beset with financial problems, and a whole host of rescue packages have been put forward to try and keep the club alive. Currently struggling towards the foot of the Second Division, Town will be looking at the FA Cup as a potential lifeline as they strive to set the club on a sound financial footing once again.



Bart Griemink



A giant keeper signed by Colin Todd on a free transfer in the summer of 2000. Griemink is a former Dutch Under-21 international who spent a successful loan spell with The Robins (as cover for Frank Talia) before eventually joining the club. He came to English football in 1995 with Birmingham and deputised competently for the injured Ian Bennett, playing in the 1995 League Cup semi-final. He then followed Barry Fry to Peterborough United but lost his place to Mark Tyler. Following Mildenhall's departure to Notts County, Bart played every game last season and was one of the most consistent performers.

Gareth Edds

A 21-year old Australian who, having joined on a month's loan from Nottingham Forest, has now signed for a year. He played nearly 40 games at Forest before joining Town and has been excellent in the right-back role. He was a consistent performer at the

start of the season but has since had to fight for his place with Andy Gurney. He played for Australia's under 23 side against Leverkusen.

Matthew Hewlett

An attacking central midfielder, Matt Hewlett was once tipped for the top by all at Ashton Gate. The former Bristol City player was called into the England Under 21 squad, but a number of injuries curtailed his flourishing career. Hewlett made over 100 appearances for City, but left them to join Town on a Bosman in the summer of 2000. He was a regular for Colin Todd until being hit by injury once again and went on to play just 26 league games. He has been the midfield general this time around and Town sorely miss his presence when he's injured.

Adam Willis

A centre back who was revitalised under Colin Todd. Willis arrived at the County Ground in 1998 on a free transfer from Coventry and was Steve McMahon's last signing for The Robins. He scarcely figured for Jimmy Quinn and was allowed to go on loan to Mansfield after being told he could leave Swindon. Fortunately Todd liked the tall defender and gave him a new contract. A trainee at Coventry, Willis never made the break through to the Sky Blue's first team but has made the centre-back position his own in Andy King's back four.

Sam Parkin

A very young and promising forward who joined from Chelsea in August 2002. The transfer followed months of speculation, with Andy King, a huge fan of the player, tracking him for several months. Whilst at Chelsea he joined several other clubs on loan and it was with them that he built up a reputation as a lethal striker.

Stefani Miglioranzi

Miglioranzi is the product of the American College football system in which the most promising players are drafted into Major League Soccer. Stefani helped St John's University win the 1996 NCAA Division I Championship and played for MLS team Chicago Fire before joining Everton on trial. They were keen to sign him but no deal came about. Portsmouth then outjumped Liverpool in inviting him for a trial and signed him soon thereafter. The 22-yearold is a Brazilian born American but holds an Italian passport. As a footballer the genes don't come much better. What's more, Miglioranzi is versatile; he can play in defence or as a central midfielder and since joining the club in July, has impressed in the middle of Town's midfield.

David Duke

A left-sided midfielder who arrived on a free transfer from Sunderland in 2000. Unfortunately, Duke never managed a start for the Black Cat's first team. Duke appeared regularly in his first season with the Robins. He combined well with Sol Davis down the Robins' left and is a good crosser of the ball. Duke can also play at wing-back and will want to build on a decent start for Swindon. Consistency is the key for the Scotsman who has shown glimpses of what he is capable of, especially when running at defenders with the ball.

Juan Cobian

An attacking right back who chose Swindon instead of his former club Sheffield Wednesday in the summer of 2000. Argentinian Cobian played for Boca Juniors before moving to Hillsborough in 1998. He was subsequently sold to Charlton and Aberdeen without playing much first team football. He made only three league appearances in his first season for the Robins, with Mark Robinson the normal right back.

Eric Sabin

Few had heard of the young Frenchman when he joined the club last summer, but with Andy King comparing him to Thierry Henry he brought a lot of flair and excitement to Town's front line. Sabin joined Town from French Second Division club Wasquehall who finished 18th in season 2000/01. Sabin contributed with seven goals in 58 starts in France and last season, he didn't get the goals he deserved scoring just five in total.

Danny Invincibile



An Australian midfielder who endeared himself to the fans having been recommended to Colin Todd by Harry Redknapp at West Ham. Danny subsequently joined the Robins on a free

transfer when Todd watched him in a trial game. After a slow start, Danny showed the club what he was capable of with five goals in four games in October/November in season 2000/01. The former Marconi Stallion and Aussie Under-21 star would later become Town's top scorer with ten goals, arguably his most important coming in the last home game of that season against Peterborough in the ninetieth minute - a goal that some say kept the club up.

Matthew Heywood

Heywood failed to break through at Burnley's Turf Moor and, after being alerted as to his availability by former scout, Shaun Reid, Andy King snapped him up on a free transfer. What a signing he's proved to be, ever-present in the latter half of 2000/01 and missing just four games last year, it is no surprise that he swept the board in last year's Player of the Year Awards. Strong in the tackle and good in the air, Heywood could prove to be a great asset to the club - if they can hang on to him. It is no coincidence Town's defensive record improved dramatically following his arrival and he can also play up front if need be too (scoring four goals in total last season)!

Alan Reeves



An experienced centre back who is particularly strong in the air. Reeves always causes problems from set pieces and for a brief period in season 2000/01 he was the club's top goalscorer. At the beginning of the season he was told by Colin Todd that he could leave the club, but persuaded the manager to reconsider with some fine pre-season performances. Reeves went on to be a permanent fixture and even ended up captaining Swindon in Mark Robinson's absence. Before joining Swindon in 1998, he spent four years at Wimbledon, where he had the tough task of replacing John Scales. Reeves has also played for Gillingham, Chester and Rochdale where he was considered one of the best players in the club's history.

Alan Young

At 19 years of age, Young is one of Swindon's brightest hopes for the future. Scoring goals for fun with the youth side, Young more than held his own in the club's second string and marked his first team debut in the FA Cup by scoring against non-league Ilkeston Town in 2000/01.

Craig Farr

A goalkeeper who was an unused substitute for the Robins in the 2000-01 season and will hope the departure of Steve Mildenhall gives him more of a chance. He has impressed greatly when given the chance in Town's second string. Andy King is a huge admirer of Farr and his display between the sticks against Wimbledon in pre-season is a testimony to the lad's ability.

Where Goals Conceded





CUP CLASH

Although this is the first time that Oxford United have faced Swindon Town in the FA Cup, the two clubs have met once before in the League Cup. David Sloan's goal gave the following Oxford United team a 1-0 third round victory over Swindon in front of 18,193 at the Manor Ground on 24th September 1969: Jim Barron, Dick Lucas, John Shuker, Rod Smithson, Maurice Kyle, Colin Clarke, David Sloan, Graham Atkinson, Ken Skeen, Davy Jones, Ron Atkinson. United lost 2-0 to two goals by Steve Robinson on Swindon's last League visit in March 2001.

TWO SPELLS



Former Swindon Town winger Joey Beauchamp had two spells at Oxford United. Signing professional at the Manor Ground in May 1989, he starred as Oxford won at Leeds United in the 1993-94 FA Cup fourth round replay and moved to West Ham for £1,000,000 in June 1994. He joined Swindon for £850,000 two months later and netted three goals in 39 League outings for today's visitors before returning to Oxford for £75,000 in October 1995. Scoring 63 times in 362

League games overall for United, he moved to Abingdon Town in August 2002.


EVER-PRESENT



One-time Swindon Town goalkeeper Jim Barron was everpresent for Oxford United in 1968-69. Moving to the Manor Ground from Chelsea for £5,000 in March 1966, he starred in Oxford United's 1967-68 Third Division title triumph and made 152 League appearances before being sold to Nottingham Forest for £35,000 in July 1970. He joined Swindon in August 1974 and played 79 Third Division games for today's opponents prior to joining Peterborough United in August 1977 after a spell with United States side Connecticut Bi-Centennials.

CUP HERO

Former Swindon Town midfielder Mark Jones was an influential figure as Oxford United reached the FA Cup fifth round in 1981-82. Signing professional at the Manor Ground in September 1979, he helped Oxford United to clinch the Third Division and Second Division titles in consecutive seasons and netted seven goals in 129 League



games prior to joining Swindon in September 1986. He helped them to win promotion in 1986-87 and scored nine times in 40 Third Division outings for today's opponents before moving to Cardiff City in August 1990.

WING WIZARD

One-time Oxford United winger Jimmy Bain featured prominently as Swindon Town reached the FA Cup fifth round in 1951-52. Moving to the County Ground from Chelsea in May 1947, he also featured in Swindon's 1947-48 FA Cup run and netted 40 goals in 235 Third Division (South) games for today's visitors prior to joining Headington United (as Oxford were then called) in July 1954. 

Third Division appearances for Swindon in place of Sam Burton prior to joining Oxford in December 1959. He starred in United's 1960-61 FA Cup run and played 117 Southern League/Fourth Division games before moving to Chelmsford City in July 1963. Fellow keeper Jimmy Glass also played for both clubs.

TITLE TRIUMPH

Former Swindon Town winger Ken Skeen starred in Oxford United's 1967-68 Third Division title triumph. Moving to the County Ground from Trowbridge Town in September 1964, he featured in Swindon's 1966-67 FA Cup run and netted four goals in 14 League games for today's opponents prior to joining Oxford United for £3,500 in July 1967. He

was ever-present and leading marksman in 1969-70, scoring 27 times in 234 League outings before moving to home-town Cheltenham in July 1974. Ex-Swindon reserve defender John Lloyd also featured in Oxford United's 1967-68 Third Division

title campaign.

MANAGING TO SUCCEED

Ex-Swindon Town winger David Moss had a spell as Oxford United's assistant-manager. Initially moving to the County Ground from Witney Town in July 1969, he was Swindon's leading marksman in two consecutive seasons and netted 60 goals in 230 League games prior to joining Luton Town for £110,000 in May 1978. He briefly rejoined Swindon in July 1985 and later assisted Brian Horton at Oxford United before following him to Manchester City in August 1993. The likes of Alan Gibbs, Dave Gibson, Gordon McDonald and Gordon Pembery played for both clubs during the Fifties.

December 6th 1997 United lost their Division One fixture at Swindon by four goals to one. Swindon's scorers were Brian Wilsterman (own goal), Mark Walters (penalty), Steve Finney and Ty Gooden, with Mike Ford replying. Swindon were fifth after the win but won only three League matches over the rest of the season which included a 2-1 reverse at the Manor, Francis, Gilchrist and George Ndah (penalty) being the scorers. Swindon finished eighteenth, six places below United and with only four points more than a relegated club.


December 6th 1992 United had no game, whilst fellow Division One club Swindon lost 4-2 at home to Derby, Mick Hazard and Craig Maskell netting for Town. Earlier in the season, United drew a live televised game at the County Ground, Penney's last ditch strike and Melville's goal replying to scores from Martin Ling and Shaun Taylor. Steve White scored the only goal in the return fixture. Town ended fifth and beat Leicester by four goals to three in the play off final.


December 5th 1987

Jimmy Quinn, with a penalty, netted Swindon's goal in the




JIM SMITH




Jim Smith was United's manager when the club made its most rapid strides forward. During Jim's time at the Manor, United gained the distinction of becoming the only club to reach the top flight via two consecutive Divisional Championships (this remains unique).

The signings of many players were inspired, among them being those of Langan, Aldridge, Hebberd, McDonald, Phillips and Hamilton, Jim had played Division Four football with Aldershot, Halifax and Lincoln before becoming player manager of Boston United at the tender age of twenty eight in 1969. Aged thirty two, he became one of the League's youngest managers when taking over at Colchester, for whom he played in eight League games. He led them to promotion and moved to Blackburn in 1975 and then Birmingham in 1978. Smith's sacking in February 1982 was United's gain and he arrived at the Manor on March 1st 1982. He inherited a squad which included Briggs, Shotton, Brock, Thomas, Wright, Jones, Seacole, Burton, Dovle, Cassells, Fogg, Foley, Jeffrey and Smithers. The team had just enjoyed a great FA Cup run and were fifth in Division Three. Despite Maxwell being in control, top scorer Cassells and Wright were soon sold and United took only seven points from Smith's first seven matches. The signings of Train and Lawrence (loan) began to pay off but Hebberd was no replacement for Cassells at centre forward. Nonetheless,

United took twenty points from eight games and with five games remaining looked likely to go up. After a home draw, the smoke bomb affected loss at Swindon and the succeeding three losses meant that United lost out on promotion. The signings of Biggins and Vinter allowed Hebberd to switch to midfield and, with none of his key players departing, Hardwick signing and both Lawrence and Whatmore returning on a permanent basis, Smith must have been a little disappointed with a repeat of the fifth placed finish. At the start of 1983-84, the team was further strengthened by the arrival of Hinshelwood but it was the signing of the inspirational McDonald which made the most difference. With the maturing Brock, Thomas, Shotton and Briggs all too strong for Division Three and the likes of Hinshelwood, Hardwick, Whatmore, Lawrence, Biggins and Vinter plus the outstanding McDonald and Hebberd, United looked set to do very well. Their superb championship was no major surprise. However, their Cup exploits must have been beyond the wildest dreams of any U's fan. Wins over Newcastle, Leeds and Manchester United as well as draws with Manchester United (twice), Everton, Leeds and Newcastle brought the club into the national spotlight as United became only the second ever club from the lower divisions to reach the Fifth Round of both major domestic cup competitions. The enormous amount of revenue from United's eighteen Cup ties enabled Smith to retain his better



players and to purchase the likes of Rhoades-Brown, Aldridge, Trewick and Charles. However, as with McDonald, the bargain signings of Langan and Phillips were superb. Playing much attacking football, particularly before Hamilton's injury, United became the first side ever to reach the top flight via two consecutive divisional titles (this is still unequalled). Sadly, Maxwell did not have the foresight to keep Smith and 'the Bald Eagle' left for Loftus Road. Less than a year later, his side was thrashed in the League Cup Final by a team who, apart from Houghton, had all been with Jim at the Manor.

Sean Reck v Watford



Achilles Tendon

The Achilles tendon runs from the calf muscles to the heel bone. It is a very strong structure, but does not have a very good blood supply. Therefore any damage to the tendon does not heal easily.

Achilles tendon injuries are often associated with intensive training and hard surfaces. In football the majority of such injuries occur during pre-season.

Total ruptures of the tendon are often associated with individuals who resume intense activity after a lengthy break from exercising. Partial ruptures are more common and can lead to chronic conditions.

Total and sometimes partial ruptures require surgery, or total

immobilisation. Chronic conditions generally require rest and modified activity

Treatment

P.R.I.C.E. Protection, Rest, Ice, Compression, Elevation.

Insert a 1cm heel raise into the shoes. This will decrease the tension in the tendon.

Early mobilising exercises should begin 48 hours after injury. A simple example of this would be to start moving your foot up and down in a non-weight bearing position. Make sure that these movements do not produce pain.

Muscle strengthening exercises should begin as soon as pain allows. The easiest way to do this is with a large rubber band. In a seated position, use the rubber band to provide some mild resistance as the toes are pointed away.

To make this exercise harder, stand up facing a wall. Rise up onto your toes, and then slowly lower your heels to the floor. Repeat these exercises x 20. Once it is easy to perform these exercises with both feet, progress to just the injured side. Do not work through pain.

Stretch the calf muscles and Achilles tendon. To do this, stand with your hands against a wall, and the injured leg behind the other. Bend the knee of the back leg forwards taking your body weight over your injured side. Hold this stretch for 30 seconds, and repeat x 4.

Functional exercises such as running jumping twisting and turning can begin once you are pain free, have full range of motion, full muscle strength and balance is at least as good as the non-injured side.


As a general guideline, if you can hop on the injured leg 50 times without any pain, then light jogging can commence.

Gradually increase the running speed and duration until a full sprint is possible.

Remember that progression is key to a successful rehab programme. Increase the amount you do gradually, and never work though pain.



One of the most welcome sights at the Kassam Stadium in the last couple of weeks has been Jamie Brooks back in the gym and treatment room, putting in the hard work as he fights to get back to fitness. Jamie, or course, spent most of the summer in a serious condition in hospital as he battled a debilitating virus which left him on a ventilator.

Having swept the board at last season's award ceremony, Jamie is now well on the road to recovery and looking to come back even better than before. He told us:

"I'm a long way forward from where I was even a month ago. I'm still doing the same sort of work, but I'm stepping everything up one level, doing things for slightly longer. I'm getting stronger and it's all moving fast at the moment.

"I'm at the club Monday, Tuesday and Friday, have some physio work at the hospital on Wednesday, and have a long swimming session on Thursday, so it's a busy schedule, and everyone is working hard to help me and I appreciate that."

The last time the fans saw him, Jamie was on the pitch waving at them on his return to the ground, and Jamie says that helped to give him a massive lift:

"It gave me a great lift. Actually, if you looked at me a month ago, I was far more frail. I'm a lot stronger now. But that gave me a massive lift, and just being about the place is good for me at the moment. That was great, to know there were so many people rooting for me, and I'll be looking to repay that on the pitch with a few goals as soon as possible. Their support was very important to me, and really helped"


Jamie actually made his debut in a derby game like today's:

"I played in the last ten minutes

at Swindon two years ago when Fordy was caretaker manager, and that was a special day because I am a local lad and it meant a lot to me. I'll be at the game on Sunday, and I'm sure that will be a great occasion."

And finally, although we would all love to see him playing again, nobody is going to rush Jamie back, as he admits:

"I know my own body and I know when things are right and wrong. It's still going to be a while. I'm looking forward to coming back: it WILL happen. Hopefully it's just a matter of time and it's just a case of taking things a step at a time and making sure everything is right."

Match Report



A late penalty from captain Andy Crosby gave United all three points last Saturday as they overcame and overtook Lincoln in the League.

After an even first quarter, United started to get on top as we approached the half hour. Savage had a shot deflected narrowly wide, McNiven's splendid left footed curler was pushed round the post by keeper Marriott, and then a Hunt header was scrambled away after bouncing back off the far post.

A 'crude' challenge from Gain on Basham caused a commotion, with players squaring up to each other and Gain rightly becoming the first player in to the ref's book, and Basham then had a decent shout for a penalty turned down when he appeared to receive a shove in the back as he homed in on a left wing cross.

The U's started the second half on top again, with a Bound free kick saved by Marriott and then Savage cutting inside after a sweet pass from Ford and drilling in a shot which Marriott pushed just beyond the outstretched foot of Oldfield as he followed in.

With rain pouring down and the pitch becoming increasingly treacherous it became more and more important to time challenges perfectly, and Savage and Futcher both found their way into the book for fouls, with the visitors in fact ending up with seven players on yellow cards as their physical approach overstepped the mark at times.

With sixty five minutes gone it was time for the power of Jefferson Louis, and the big striker had a great chance to score immediately as he raced on to a deep McNiven cross, but headed up and over rather than directing the header down from six yards.
















Welcome to the game today in what should prove an exciting and I'm sure eventful day, as all derby games turn out to be. Not only are we the hosts for our opponents today but the television cameras will be here to capture and analyse every moment of the game, as well as the atmosphere and passion in the stands. With this in mind, please do not put the club's reputation at risk by entering into any idiotic behaviour, which could result in a fine for the club as well as a ban from Oxford United games for yourself. By all means get behind the team and be vocal, but also be sensible with it!

Vital Income

This game today, and the cup runs we've have achieved this season have provided vital income to the club during a season in which numerous teams are finding it increasingly difficult to remain solvent. We've all heard the reasons that are given for the decline of lower league football i.e ITV Digital collapse, Bosman transfers, increase in player's wages etc and it becomes apparent that the Premier League's view is " We've got the money, how can we keep hold of it? " whereas the Nationwide League's view is " We've got no money, how do

we get hold of any? ".

Reason for decline?

In my view, one of the reasons for the decline of modern day football is the influx of foreign players a few years ago who were at the end of their careers and were looking for a big pay day to round things off nicely. I'm not talking about Ossie Ardiles or Arnold Muhren or players like that who were introduced to English football and, in my opinion, improved the standard of the game, but the older players particularly from Italy who fancied the idea of living and playing in England as a swan song.

Not only did their arrival spark the increase in player's wages. Understandably, English players wanted to bring their wages in line with the new faces and therefore it spiralled out of control until we reach a situation in which we now find ourselves.It also restricted the opportunities given to young home-grown players. We moan about the England team not having a left-sided player worthy of note, but this may have been avoided if younger players were given a chance at bigger clubs rather than sitting rotting in the reserves at the expense of an ageing foreigner earning 10 times more a week!

Impact

The impact this has had on the game is not only restricted to the Premier League but has filtered through into the lower leagues and influenced clubs

and players here also. I believe the number of players out of work at the end of the season would be dramatically lowered if there was a limit to foreign players at each club. This would also allow the home-grown talent to appear, leading to clubs having vital assets they can sell if needed, as well as teams having the foundation of good youth players regularly coming into the side to ensure that clubs can have continuity in their playing staff.

More Selfish

By no means am I of the opinion that foreign players should be banished into the wilderness but for the game in Britain to survive its current crisis, and to go from strength to strength, we must become a bit more selfish and worry about OUR players and OUR game! If you look at the Scottish leagues they must have a certain numbrer of players under the age of 21 in the squad for each match, therefore ensuring the development of these players and giving them vital experience and incentives. They haven't reaped the rewards for this idea yet but I'm sure they will in the long run. I'm not saying this is the answer to all the problems but if we can address different issues separately and it means avoiding a repeat of the troubles we are now encountering, it'll all be worth while won't it? Here endeth the lesson!





Continuing our look at the Club's Youth Development policies, we sat down with Youth Development Officer Les Taylor to find out how it all works.

First we asked Les how and at what age Oxford United became involved with youngsters: -

"We become involved through our Soccer Courses with youngsters. These courses are open to boys and girls from the age of four years up to thirteen. Most of the youngsters come on a regular basis and they receive coaching from professional coaches who give them the basic skills to go along with their natural ability.

"In line with Premier Division clubs, we can't register boys until they are nine years old. There is a gap between the ages of seven and nine years old when they need a games' programme and we can't provide it. So we point them in the direction of local boys clubs and many go on to join those clubs. Further down the line we see those boys in the matches for their clubs and give them an opportunity to come back to us. So many of the boys in local football clubs started with us on our Soccer Courses."

We then asked how what input we could make to boys clubs.

"At the beginning of the season, Soccer Course Director Mark Jones

writes to all the boys clubs in the area asking if they would like to attend a match. This is a facility we offer to schools and it is widely taken up by them. But to date, clubs have not been keen to respond. However, I am always open to suggestions and I would welcome input from boys clubs. They only have to pick up the phone.

"We believe boys should be given an opportunity to have a career in professional football. If there are any suggestions from managers who might read this page I'd love to hear them. I can count on one hand the number of recommendations I get from them.

I understand that managers are reluctant because they may eventually lose their best players. But most managers would see it as a feather in their cap if boys they had eventually made the grade.

Finally we asked Les about the thorny issue of compensation.

"If we are approached by another professional club for one of our registered players, there is the possibility of compensation. People imagine that we get thousands and thousands of pounds but the compensation is directly related to the financial input from Oxford United into that player's development up to the time of their departure. In reality this is not a large amount of money. So you might have a player with the potential to play in our first team, going to a Premier League club for very little. For us the loss of player is massive but what is a small compensation payment to a Premier club? So the compensation issue has really been blown out of all proportion."

Editor Chris Williams talks to Barry Davies

With the BBC cameras here today for Match of the Day, we had a distinguished guest in the press area last week when Barry Davies prepared for the game by watching the win over Lincoln. Barry, who will be commentating this afternoon, told us that doing the homework is an important part of a commentator's game:

"It's a required part of the job. It always surprised me when we did more regular games, that managers would often say 'what are you doing here?' when we went along to midweek games, and I would say 'like you, we have to do our homework.' Even so, It's a luxury for me to see a side in advance."

Over the years, Barry must surely be well ahead of the 92 club?

"I really can't guess how many grounds I've been to, but I've been to a great number of lower league games now. Remember that we used to cover five lower league games each season as well. I started doing Match of The Day in 1969, and before that I was doing it for ITV, so I have been doing it for a few years!"

And has his approach to the game changed over the years?

"The approach is still basically the same. I'm lucky in that I have a bit of a photographic memory. If I see a player from a photo and then in the kick about before a game it usually stays with me. But on the other hand it has a curious effect on me at other times when I simply can't remember the name of a player I've known for years! I cover quite a few different sports and events, and there are a lot of names and faces to remember."

So has it ever gone spectacularly wrong?

"I haven't really frozen yet, thankfully. I'm not one of those people who gets terribly tense about things, I accept that I'm paid for a hobby and don't feel under big pressure, but my one concern is that a surname will be given the wrong christian name, or that someone who has been playing on the centre court at Wimbledon is suddenly playing left back for whoever! I have only ever done that once, when I was talking about Chris Sutton and I confused him with the Derby goalkeeper of that time, Steve. Kenny Dalglish, being Kenny, reminds me of that all the time, and even managed to put it in his book!

We asked Barry what he was looking for at the Lincoln game:

"I've had a tour of the club, because it is totally new to me, and I shall go on the website in the week and find out more information, but I'm looking at formation, style of play, subs who come on and so on. Trevor Brooking will be co-commentating with me, and I'm sure he will be doing the same."

And finally, after all these years, does he still get excited about the games?

"It's never been just a job of work. I get excited and disappointed about things in the same way that a supporter does, with the main difference that it doesn't affect me if team A loses or team B wins. I do get involved, and if a team is not getting the rub of the green then people may think I'm leaning towards that team in my commentary, and that is one of the main criticisms: that I'm biased. I'm sure that as soon as I say one thing in support of Swindon today then Oxford fans will accuse me of bias, and vice versa!"

Coack Mike Ford told us:

"Then for the next twenty minutes until half time we were the better team, passing the ball around well and keeping it better than they did, and that should give the lads a bit of confidence. I thought this week, by way of a change, I'd have a talk with someone who is familiar to all of you, but rarely gets a mention. Jon Edmunds, known universally as Woosie, is a familiar figure on the touchline and in the dugouts at United matches, and, as he explains, his involvement is part of a long family tradition:

"My granddad, Maurice, has been involved with the club for over forty years in one role or another, he's here on a matchday, and still helps at the reserve games. He used to have players as lodgers, so when I was just a lad I'd get to meet players like George Lawrence. And my dad is a season ticket holder still. He was actually one of the first four ball boys at the Manor: they had to patrol one side of the pitch each!

"I'd always been a fan, and came along on work experience six years ago, and am still here! I originally came to help John Clinkard, then Neil Reynolds, and now Neil Sullivan, but I have also been helping Ken Ridley with the kit, done a bit of coaching with the soccer courses, been physio for the centre of excellence teams, cooked the meals on the first team bus,

and even done a bit of maintenance too."

So why 'Woosie'?

"It came from Phil Whitehead on my very first day of work experience. He seemed to think I looked like the golfer lan Woosnam, and the name just stuck"

Woosie's involvement on the bench takes many forms as well, with one or two memorable moments:

"There was the game last season at Lincoln when we had two red cards and Wayne Hatswell needed a 'minder' down the tunnel and I got volunteered! I think it's safe to say Wayne was slightly angry, so that was a nice job!

"But those moments are very rare. Usually it's a great experience to travel with the team everywhere, and to work with the players every day."



Woosie has also had a new role at the club in the last couple of weeks:

"With the gaffer being banned from the touchline, I've been the runner from the stand to the dug out. Last week we had a radio link and I was passing messages to Fordy from the manager. Today I believe Ian is going to be closer to the dug out and I'll be running back and forward with messages, so that will keep me involved."

Popular with everyone at the club (he says), Woosie says that he watches the matchday programme with interest every week:

"I have to check whether Crozzer is going to drop me in it, or whether I'm going to get stitched up on any other page. I get the blame for most things, although I deny strongly that I was responsible for getting the team lost on the way to Orient: that was Ken! I've been here for six years now, and loved every minute, although working with Shrek is a strain at times."

BBC Sport's Ray Stubbs and Mark Lawrenson have both played in the FA Cup, albeit at slightly different levels.

Ray scored for Oswestry Town in a qualifying round against Northwich Victoria, while Mark won the trophy as a Liverpool player in 1986.

But despite their very different careers (Runcorn offered £900 for Stubbs' services on the day Lawrenson joined Liverpool for £900,000) both agree that the tournament retains a special place in the football calendar.

"The FA Cup has a life of its own every season," said Ray.

"Even though you know there will shocks, giant killers and butchers, bakers and candlestick makers who Match of the Day on BBC will once again bring you all the magic and action from the FA Cup - from the first kick involving the non-League minnows to the giants of the Premiership.

become instant heroes, it's a story you never get bored of."

Mark was on the wrong side of a cup shock in December 1975 when his team Preston North End were knocked out 3-2 by non-league Scarborough - and it's a memory that still hurts today.

"Credit to Scarborough because they deserved to win, but the match should never have gone ahead, it had snowed heavily the day before and the pitch had frozen," said Mark.

Happier memories - for both Mark and Ray - come in the form of the 1986 final between Liverpool and Everton.

"Every kid has scored the FA Cup winner as youngster in his back garden," said Mark.

"To actually win the competition

and walk up the steps at Wembley is one of the memories I'll always have. At the time you never really take it all in and it doesn't sink in until much later."

Ray was in the tunnel before the match as the players walked out in his capacity as a reporter for local radio in Liverpool.

"I covered a lot of finals in the 1980s but the 1986 final was special. Looking at the teams, in the red and blue, lining up before the game bordered on the emotional," he said.

Mark, of course was manager here at Oxford before he embarked on his broadcasting career, famously arriving on the Manor Ground pitch via helicopter with chairman Robert Maxwell. Mark took over the reins of a struggling United side from Maurice Evans in March 1988, but was unable to prevent the U's from slipping out of the top division. Lawrenson was responsible for signing current United assistant manager Mike Ford, but after a solid start to the 1988-9 season the transfer of Dean Saunders to Derby proved too much for the former Eire international, and a parting of the ways became inevitable.

After a spell locally at Thame United Mark had a further spell in management at Peterborough before establishing himself on TV and radio. We hope he enjoys his first visit to the Kassam Stadium today.
