THE response from the players since I took over little more than a fortnight ago has been everything I could have asked for - and so has that of the fans.

Cards wishing both myself and my assistant Dean Glover well have flooded in and we have received faxes from managers and coaches. There have also been bottles of champagne but we will keep them on ice in the hope we have something to celebrate.

Beating Oldham here was a dream debut for me as a manager. The team looked compact and the crowd got behind us so went to Plymouth in good heart, only to be beaten in about the fifth minute of added time. I fancy Plymouth will gain promotion with the way they play.

Having made one long journey we set off again three days later to Colchester where the efforts of the players spoke for themselves in the 4-1 victory.

It was a win we needed in view of the tough programme in store. I told the players we had to come away with something and they delivered the goods in no uncertain terms, especially after conceding an early goal.


Unfortunately, Steve Brooker picked up a groin strain that is likely to rule him out today but I have no hesitation in playing Billy Paynter

up front again. Billy has been playing wide right of late and has been working his socks off in the team effort, but he played the closing stages at Colchester in attack and looked fit and confident.

From a management point of view it was nice for us to get closer to the players and enjoy the long journey home for things have been happening so quickly we have not had much chance to sit down with them.

The players are buzzing and the victory at Colchester sets today's game up nicely. It is fifth against fourth with three points between us: it is a game we cannot afford to lose and we are really looking forward to it.

I would particularly like to welcome Swindon manager Andy King, who is a good friend of mine. We were together at Aldershot and Andy was a big influence on my career to go on to better things as I rose from playing in the Fourth Division to the First. As a manager he has done



Striker, Sam Parkin, leads Swindon's promotion campaign with 16 goals so far this season.


The tally continues a fine return on the £50,000 Swindon paid Chelsea for his services in the summer of 2002.

Parkin, who had loan spells at Millwall, Oldham, Wycombe and Northampton, made an explosive start to his Swindon career with a hat-trick in a 3-1 win against Barnsley and went on to score 26 goals last term.

His goal rush continued last Saturday as he netted late on in Swindon's 2-0 win over Chesterfield at the County Ground. The win gives the Robins an outside chance of automatic promotion and the 6ft 2in striker believes a strong squad can muscle their way into the top two.

He told the thisiswiltshire website: "We are on a great run and going into every match believing we can win it. We are scoring goals, defending well and we want to keep it going.


"As Bristol City have shown, the front two are catchable. We haven't really been mentioned, as yet, but



are ticking along quite nicely and we are happy to take a back seat in terms of the attention.

"However, I think people are starting to sit up and take notice now and there will be a few more headlines about us."

INTRODUCING




1. Bart Griemink

Giant keeper signed by Colin Todd on a free transfer in the summer of 2000. Griemink is a former Dutch Under-21 international who spent a successful loan spell with The Robins (as cover for Frank Talia) before eventually joining the club. He came to English football in 1995 with Birmingham and deputised competently for the injured Ian Bennett, playing in the 1995 League Cup semi-final.

He then followed Barry Fry to Peterborough United but lost his place to Mark Tyler. Griemink started the 2000-01 season as first choice goalkeeper, and even deputised as captain, but ended up on the bench as Steve Mildenhall took his place in goal following Griemink's two dismissals and subsequent lengthy suspension.

20. Rhys Evans

The promising young keeper joined Leyton Orient on a three-month loan deal last August. He proved to be an excellent shot stopper and showed good command of his area. Rhys was unfortunate to pick up a leg injury, which cut short his period at Brisbane Road and saw him return to Chelsea.



Town manager Andy King swooped for the young stopper in 2003 to give first choice keeper Bart Griemink more competition for the number one shirt at Swindon Town. Since then Evans has been a regular between the posts for Town and has turned in many match saving performances.

3. Grant Smith

Grant, although fully involved in Sheffield United's pre-season games, made just one start in their 2002-03 campaign, appearing as a striker against Wimbledon when things did not go his way. Occasionally on the bench, he was a regular in the Blades' successful reserve side and in March he joined Plymouth Argyle in a loan deal. He debuted in midfield against Blackpool and went on to add four appearances, scoring at home to Brentford. He joined Swindon Town after being released from the Blades and was strongly recommended by Sheffield United boss, Neil Warnock, amongst many others. Since joining in the summer of 2003, 'Smithy' has had little chance to impress with a host of restricted performances in the first team and a blight of niggling injuries.

4. Matthew Hewlett

All at Ashton Gate once tipped midfielder Matt for the top. The former Bristol City player was called into the England Under-21 squad, but a number of injuries curtailed his flourishing career. In the end, Hewlett made over 100 appearances for City, but left them to join Town on a Bosman in the summer of 2000.

6. Adi Viveash

Viveash started his career here at Swindon and spent two separate brief spells on loan with the Royals in the 1992/3 and 1994/5 seasons. Joined Reading on a permanent deal in 2000/01 and started as the first-choice centre-back. He was excellent throughout, and showed similar consistency at the start of the following season before suffering a groin injury in the cup defeat at York in December 2001.

Last season his first-team involvement at Reading was restricted to a handful of games as a non-playing substitute until the final part of the campaign. He kept in shape with a two-month loan spell at Oxford United, helping the club to their best spells of the season. He even captained the side in the last two league games against Walsall and Stoke City.

6. Andy Gurney

Andy started his career at hometown club, Bristol Rovers, where he spent four seasons, before moving to Torquay for one year and impressing during their surge to the play-offs.


He then joined Reading in January 1999 for £100,000 as an attack-minded, right-sided defender who could also play in midfield. He soon established a regular starting place with Reading in 1999/00 and figured in the Royals' promotion push last year.

Was keen to join Town after their impressive performance against Reading and King snapped him up on a Bosman in the summer of 2001. Crowned an impressive home debut performance against Tottenham with a long-range goal and proved to be one of King's best buys. Gurney missed just four games in his first season and last year made 45 appearances in all competitions.

7. Sammy Igoe

After making his way up through the ranks at Portsmouth, where he began as a trainee, Igoe went on to secure a first-team spot at the south coast club and made his mark with some impressive performances.

He moved to Reading in a £100,000 deal but found it difficult to break into the first team and spent much of his time on the substitutes' bench. Last term, the diminutive midfielder had something of a disappointing season at the Royals, being restricted to just a handful of starts and rarely featured at all at the turn of the year. Igoe left to join Swindon in the summer of 2003.



8. Tommy Mooney

Tommy joined Town from Birmingham in July this year. He joined previous club Birmingham from Watford and, over the course of his career, he has spanned the highest and lowest levels of English football. He was born in

Middlesbrough but he started out at Aston Villa before a move to Scarborough, who were then a Football League club.


After three years there, he moved to Southend United in 1993 for £100,000 but his one season there saw him make 19 appearances for the Shrimpers and a move to Watford soon materialised.

Tommy netted a total of 22 goals, the first time a Watford player had hit the 20-goal mark in nearly a decade.

In 2001 he moved to Birmingham, and enjoyed considerable success, before moving down to a loan at Stoke City.

He joined the Potters for three months, then spent further periods on loan at Sheffield

United and Derby County. Faced with an abundance of talent ahead of him in the pecking order at St Andrews, he looked to the Nationwide teams in search of first-team football. Late on in the summer of 2003, he decided to join Andy King's revolution at Swindon Town and has quickly become a fans' favourite in Wiltshire.



10. Stefani Miglioranza

Miglioranza is the product of the American College football system in which the most promising players are drafted into Major League Soccer. Stefani helped St John's University win the 1996 NCAA Division I

Championship and played for MLS team Chicago Fire before joining Everton on trial.

They were keen to sign him, but no deal came about. Portsmouth then out-jumped Liverpool in inviting him for a trial and signed him soon thereafter.

The 22-year-old is a Brazilian-born American but holds an Italian passport.

11. David Duke

'Duke' will feel slightly aggrieved with the tag of 'Most Improved Player' last season – but he hardly missed a game and rarely put a foot wrong on the left-hand side of Town's midfield. The Scotsman arrived on a free transfer from Sunderland in 2000 having never managed a start for the Black Cat's first team. Duke appeared regularly in his first season with the Robins.

14. Jon Stevenson

Live-wire young striking prospect signed his first professional forms in February 2001 with Leicester City. He was involved regularly from the bench during that season, scoring in their drubbing at Portman Road, and continues to have the making of a fine future player.

Although he looked a fine prospect, he was released by the club in preparation for their return to the Premiership.

15. Andrew Nicholas

Andrew was a regular member of Liverpool's successful under-19 winning team in 2003 and won plaudits with his consistent performances at left back, resulting in a flattering comparison to Anfield legend Sami Hyypia.

At the time, his path into the first team at Liverpool seemed blocked and upon his decision to leave, King snapped him up in the summer of 2003. After working his way into

the manager's starting line up with some hard work in training, the left-sided defender has never looked back and has given a number of solid performances so far.

16. Rory Fallon

A recent signing from Barnsley, the big striker made quite an impression against Town in the past two seasons, scoring on many occasions and catching the eye of Town boss, Andy King.

He joined Barnsley as a professional in 1999 after moving up through their trainee programme. Last season saw him score his first-ever league goal, against Blackpool and he quickly followed that up the week in a game at Stockport.


King had become a keen admirer of the striker by that point and Town eventually agreed an undisclosed fee with Barnsley to bring him down to Wiltshire. However, with Parkin and Mooney in such good form, he has found it difficult to gain many first-team chances but looks a superb prospect for the future. Has so far come off the bench to good effect and managed his first goal for the club against Plymouth in December.

17. Brian Howard

The youngster joined Town from Southampton in 2003 having played for the Saints' reserves for two years. The 20-year-old left-sided midfielder even turned down a late move to go to Chelsea, choosing instead to opt for some first-team football under Andy King.

He has been a regular member of the England youth set-up and was unlucky to not be included in the Under-20's side that went to the FIFA World Youth Championships.

The left-sided midfielder has proved to be a revelation on the flanks this season and should regularly be getting a pat on the back from the Town forwards as he continues to put chances in front of them. Capable of scoring his fair share of goals, including important away strikes at Brentford and Notts County, he also possesses a superb dead-ball technique set-pieces, specially from corners.



19. Matthew Heywood

It has been another consistent year for Town's most effective defender and, after a slow start, he returned to the kind of form that saw him clean up in the 2001/02 Player of the Year Awards.

Originally, Heywood failed to break through at Burnley's Turf Moor and, after being alerted

as to his availability by former scout, Shaun Reid, Andy King snapped him up on a free transfer.

Was an ever-present in the latter half of 2000/01 and has now missed just four games since. The tall defender signed an extension to his contract, much to the delight of the fans, and he has shown the same strength and commitment this season.

21. Ben Martin

Manager, Andy King, signed Martin, a massive 6' 7" centre-back, in August 2003. After impressing King during a scouting mission last season, he trained with the squad towards the end of last term and signed a one-year deal with the Club.

He has so far had a loan spell at Lincoln City, where he didn't manage to get into the first team action, and recently decided to join Farnborough Town on loan in a bid to get more football under his belt and will hope to figure in manager Andy King's future plans.

22. Alan Reeves

Before joining Swindon in 1998, he spent four years at Wimbledon, where he had the tough task of replacing John Scales. Reeves has also played for Gillingham, Chester and Rochdale, where he is considered to be one of the best players in the club's history.

Town's veteran defender enjoyed another fine season in 2002-03. Although initially not a member of the side, he forced his way into contention as the team hit some poor early-season form and, his uncompromising and committed displays helped the Robins turn their fortunes around.

He has now made well over 400 league appearances and was rewarded last season with a playing/coaching role that has seen him turn around the fortunes of Town's reserve side. He continues to back up the Swindon defence, when called upon and has so far continued with some sterling performances this season.

25. Steve Robinson

Tough-tackling and energetic right-footed midfield terrier signed from Birmingham City for £50,000 in February 2001, he was an automatic choice for the Robins for the remainder of that season and, more recently, signed a two-year extension to his contract.

A former Birmingham trainee, he broke into the Blues team under Barry Fry but has constantly been dogged by injuries that have limited his first-team chances. He made over 50 league starts for the Blues, but almost joined Sheffield United in 1999, only to fail the medical.

LOOKING BACK AT SOME OF PORT VALE'S GREATEST GAMES



SEASON 1958/59



Due to a reorganisation of the leagues, Vale found themselves suffering two successive relegations and became founder members of the new Fourth Division. Also, after 22 years of having black and white colours, a new strip was unveiled, amber and black stripes, with black shorts. It lasted five years.



The season started badly as, on the opening day to Northampton, the visitors took the lead in the first minute, with Andy Woan claiming his place in history with the new division's first goal. Woan went on to complete a hat-trick as Northampton won 4-1; Roy Sproson was subsequently dropped.



Vale could do no wrong away, beating Hartlepool 5-1 (it took them until last month to get their revenge) and Watford 4-0 and they won 7 and drew 2 of the first nine games on the road. At home, it was a different story though, no wins and just two draws from the first five.



In September, floodlights were switched on at Vale Park for the first time in a friendly 5-3 victory over West Brom, when a five-figure gate braved the pouring rain to witness the new innovation. The first league game

played under them was against Southport and Vale won 4-1 to claim their first home win. Thirteen wins and four draws from the remaining seventeen home games showed that the bogey had been well and truly lifted.



In October, Shirley Bassey made a surprise appearance at the home game v Oldham as a guest of manager Norman Low, the sly old fox. She was appearing at the Theatre Royal in Hanley at the time, but the game ended goalless, the only time that Vale failed to score at home all season. I don't think she has been since, somebody ought to tell her that it isn't always 0-0.



Vale went top for the first time in November, beating previous leaders Exeter City 5-3 at Vale Park. It was certainly a goal-laden time, as on Boxing Day it was Gateshead's misfortune to travel to fortress Vale Park and go away with an 8-0 spanking. It is still our record Vale Park score and has only ever been bettered by a 9-1 win over Chesterfield in 1932. New striker, Graham Barnett, notched a couple as the goals were shared out, and we also had a new face, Ken Hancock in goal.



The goals continued to flow but over Easter, (three games in four days - no chance of that nowadays) we struggled against Crewe, losing 2-0 at Gresty Road and only drawing 1-1 at home. A 4-3 win at Exeter in between with two late goals kept the points ticking over though.



Almost 21,000 turned up for the home game against Coventry City to see us belt them 3-0 to virtually seal promotion. It was four up in those days, no play offs, and promotion was actually clinched in a 1-1 draw at home to Darlington. To win the title though, we needed to win our final home game v Millwall. We duly did 5-2 and the usual pitch invasion followed, not of the kind normally seen at Millwall games though.



By winning the inaugural title Vale earned £300 talent money, just to illustrate how long ago it was, and it was also the last time that we did finish at the top of the pile in any division.



Vale scored a club record 110 goals, but remarkably no hat-tricks were recorded. Jack Wilkinson was top scorer with 23, followed by Stan Steele on 21 and Graham Barnett who scored 20 in just 22 appearances.

LEIGH EDWARDS REFLECTS ON THIS WEEK DOWN THE YEARS...

1947

Port Vale were without a match on 22nd February 1947 as freezing conditions caused widespread postponements. Goals by Billy Pointon and Don Triner had given Port Vale a 2-1 Third Division victory at home to Bristol City five days earlier and Gordon Hodgson's side did not play again until winning 2-0 at Reading three weeks later.

Jimmy Morgan, Fred Leamon and Ken Wookey scored in Bristol Rovers' 3-0 Third Division (South) win at home to the following Swindon Town team: *Sam Burton, Bill Lloyd, Albert Young, Bob Shanks, Jimmy Ithell, Eddie Painter, Billy Stephens, Billy Lucas, Maurice Owen, George Paterson, Gordon Williams.*

Albert Stubbins scored to give title-chasing Liverpool a 1-0 win over Huddersfield Town at Anfield Jack Rowley netted twice in Manchester United's 3-0 victory at home to Blackpool Goals from Frank Baker, John Jackson and Johnny Sellars gave high-flying Stoke City a 3-1 win over Arsenal at the Victoria Ground.

1954

Goals from Ken Griffiths and Dickie Cunliffe gave Freddie Steele's title-chasing Port Vale a 2-2 Third Division

(North) win at home to Chesterfield on 27th February 1954: *Ray King, Stan Turner, Reg Potts, Albert Mullard, Tom Cheadle, Roy Sproson, Colin Askey, Albert Leake, Basil Hayward, Ken Griffiths, Dickie Cunliffe.*

Ken Lambert scored to give Maurice Lindley's Swindon Town a 1-1 Third Division (South) draw against Leyton Orient in front of 12,466 at Brisbane Road: *Sam Burton, George Hunt, Terry Elwell, Jimmy Cross, Garth Hudson, Jimmy Johnston, Ken Lambert, Ray Sampson, Maurice Owen, Roy Onslow, Micky Bull.*

Strikes by Bill Slater, Peter Broadbent and Dennis Wilshaw gave leaders Wolverhampton Wanderers a 3-2 win at home to Newcastle United Title rivals West Brom triumphed 2-0 at Huddersfield Town with goals from Paddy Ryan and Johnny Nicholls Tottenham Hotspur defeated Arsenal 3-0 at Highbury.

1961

Bert Llewellyn, Cliff Portwood and Stan Steele netted to give Port Vale a 3-2 Third Division win over Grimsby Town at Vale Park on 25th February 1961: *Ken Hancock, David Raine, Selwyn Whalley, Harry Poole, Peter Ford, Terry Miles, Brian Jackson, Cliff Portwood, Bert Llewellyn, Stan Steele, Harry Oscroft.*

The elaborately named Enoch Showumni put his previous claim to fame in the shade last weekend when he fired a hat-trick to force improving Luton into the play-off places.

University graduate, Showumni, who doubled for Patrick Viera in the Nike advert for the 2002 World Cup, grabbed the limelight himself in only his fifth start in league football.

Brentford had no answer to the 6ft 5ins youngster, who Luton snapped up from Willesden Constantine of the Middlesex County League, and manager, Mike Newell, promises there is much more to come.

Showumni joined the Hatters after completing a business degree at London South Bank University and Newell said: "He's getting much fitter and I always knew it would only be a matter of time before he started scoring.

"Enoch is getting more comfortable with the lads and settling in well. We are all delighted he has got a hat-trick so soon and this is bound to do his confidence the world of good."

Sixth-placed Luton, unbeaten in eight league games, have taken 10 points from their last four and could cement their position, as they have two matches in hand on all the teams above them.

But Newell insisted: "I'm not getting carried away yet. Our success or otherwise will depend on us steering clear of injuries and suspensions. What you see is what we've got and we really need to add to the squad."

Showumni's treble was actually bettered, by on the day, by Paul Heffernan, who breathed new life into Notts County's bid for safety by bagging all four goals in a 4-1 victory over Stockport.

The 22-year-old Dubliner is averaging close to a goal every two games in 62 league starts for County - and his latest feat had the Meadow Lane historians reaching for the record books.

It took some time to discover Heffernan had become the first Notts player to score four in a game since Jimmy Jackson did so in a 5-1 win over West Ham on New Year's Day 1955.

More importantly to County manager Gary Mills, the three points against relegation rivals Stockport were "absolutely vital" after his side had picked up just one point from their previous four games.


Notts are still five points adrift of the safety mark, but Mills insisted: "This has put us back in with a shout. We've just had a run of playing against the top six teams and this started a run of games against the bottom six."

Form teams, Bristol City and Swindon Town, continued their outstanding runs, with the former now rattling off 11 successive league victories since they were beaten in an FA Cup replay at Barnsley on December 16.

Luke Wilkshire's third minute goal proved sufficient to beat Wrexham at Ashton Gate as Danny Wilson's side maintained pole position - a point clear of Plymouth.

Today's visitors, Swindon, who have stormed up the table with an impressive sequence of seven wins and two draws, are threatening to put daylight between the top four and the rest.



battle, with Holmes being the centre point of Vale's probing. Neither team looked likely to score again until just after the half-hour, when Hibbert won a corner which, when taken, caused confusion in the penalty area and Robinson had two efforts blocked before it was finally cleared.

Hibbert was again prominent when he initially tried to control the ball before shooting, but was robbed at the last minute. He then held the ball up for Cardle to send in a dipping volley that dropped just over the bar, as the half came to a conclusion.

The second half was only two minutes old when Vale extended their lead, as Doxey put Winters through on the 'keeper once more.

Although he rounded the 'keeper, he had been pushed too wide to shoot, but he pulled the ball back and Hibbert crashed the ball home from 12 yards.

Vale were now well in command and it wasn't too surprising when we went 3-0 up after 65 minutes.

Hibbert had collected a through ball and, after

beating two players, had seen his shot blocked to concede a corner.

The ball was swung to the near post, where Booth out-jumped the defenders to get in a back-header, which flew into the net at the far post.

Vale almost added another two minutes later, when Hibbert met a cross from Orpe, but saw his effort rebound from the base of the post. Cardle then saw a shot pushed just wide of the upright.

With ten minutes remaining, the Latics pulled a goal back. A cross to the far post saw some indecision, as no one went for the ball, though there was a clear shout of "Keeper", and the ball was bundled home off an attacker's knee.

The home side suddenly saw a chance to salvage something from a game in which they had only been involved spasmodically, but Vale closed it down well and survived with reasonable ease.



The side which most folk expected to win conceded the first goal, only to go on to win the game by two goals to one. Little did we know that there was to be a repeat performance that afternoon.



at Vale Park is certainly raising a few eyebrows amongst the rest of the League.

"Too inexperienced" is the phrase I've heard repeatedly, but to the doubters, I ask this question: Who gave Phil Parkinson or Chris Coleman a chance, when Colchester and Fulham respectively gambled on them?

Already, in his first two games, Foyle has demonstrated a tactical awareness and balance to the team that has beaten Oldham and stifled Plymouth until the last ten minutes. Maybe more concentration was needed on that occasion, but the important thing is Foyle had analysed the opposition and exploited their deficiencies.

Swindon Town, it's important that Vale approach them in the right way, and capitalise on their excellent home form. Away from home is obviously something that needs to be worked on, but turning defeats into draws would be enough at this stage to at least grab sixth place.

Best of luck to Martin Foyle and the rest of his staff, and who knows? Maybe this time next year Foyle will have the best experience he'll need: A promotion campaign behind him.



We ask all spectators to remain where they are and to listen very carefully to the message. If it affects your area, please comply to instructions immediately.


