



eeBullen

elcome to Hillsborough for this afternoon's meeting with Swindon Town. It was fantastic to enjoy victory in our first home game of the New Year against Wrexham last week. I think that is 13 out of the last 15 points available and it was especially good to do it at home where our form has been up and down.

In the first half we didn't play to the pace we have been doing recently but we came out and lifted

it from the start of the second half. We got the break and obviously the sending off helped. We never took our foot off the pedal after going 1-0 up and kept going for it. We got 'done' in that position against Brentford a few weeks back so it was nice to go and get another three goals. In the end it was very comfortable. At 1-0 they still had a chance and had tried to push an extra man forward. We weathered a storm for two or three

minutes, got our shape back and, once the second goal went in, you could see their heads drop a bit. It was a massive boost to keep a clean sheet. We have looked a lot more solid over the last two or three weeks, everyone seems to be battling their corner and covering each other. David Lucas has been tremendous in keeping us pushed up and collecting crosses, all of which is an immense help to defenders.

Kenwyne is a laid back character who just comes to life at times and not many teams in this league can handle that type of player. He got two against Wrexham and I think he wanted to grab the penalty off Macca, who wasn't giving it up! To have someone of that potential is brilliant for us. I think we owe Swindon one after the two meetings so far this season. It was a travesty that we lost the

first one after being 2-0 up with ten minutes left. The

are above us in third place. We have to put pressure on the three teams above us and see if they can handle it. If we continue the form we're showing, it will be interesting.





Obituaries

We were extremely saddened to learn of the recent passing of two members of the Hoyland branch of the Sheffield Wednesday Supporters' Club:

Thomas Burgin was a founder member of the Hoyland branch in 1946-47, serving as the supporters' club secretary and president. Aged 89, he continued to be a North Stand regular, where he entertained friends with stories of his experiences as a Wednesdayite. Pride of place among his possessions went to an acknowledgement letter of his application for the post of Sheffield Wednesday manager. Thomas passed away on Thursday 30 December. On the same day, the Hoyland branch also lost Michael Moffitt, a 54-year-old they describe as one of the characters of the supporter's bus. He remained a Kop regular for over 40 years until his passing.

Fast Forward

Lightning quick striker Drew Talbot completed his rise from obscurity to a full debut when making his first start at Swindon in the FA Cup.





It's a path that has been trodden lightly over the years, but Wednesday striker Drew Talbot bridged the gap when making his first start in senior football on the ground of today's opponents in November. The 18-year-old completed the staggering journey from Dodworth Miners Welfare's side to an FA Cup first round test at Swindon in

he doesn't know how Smith discovered he had returned to action at Dodworth.

He explains: "Mark had been my previous manager but I don't know how he got in contact with me. I thought that if I played for a local side I might be spotted by a professional club but the next thing I knew I was here signing a contract. It all happened within six weeks."

Once he had his former protégé back under his wing, the

little over a year – indeed, Drew had not even been training with the first team until Paul Sturrock arrived as Wednesday manager, six weeks before that County Ground baptism.

The Barnsley lad was brought back into the professional game by Owls academy coach Mark Smith, who sought out the youngster's signature after he had quit the Oakwell youth team following two broken legs. After a brief sabbatical, Talbot decided the local scene might provide a route back into the professional game – but he confesses that, to this day,

former Wednesday defender set about moulding the wiry frontman into the genuine first-team prospect he has become. Talbot nods: "Mark is a good coach who has shown a lot of faith in me. I'd been out for a bit but he can bring confidence out in players."

Even so, with the Owls starting the season having added Lee Peacock and Steven MacLean to a striking roster that already included Adam Proudlock, Guylain Ndumbu and Jon Shaw, Drew admits his ambitions for the season centred on one or two tasters as an unused substitute.



Sturrock's arrival in September changed all that: "I wasn't expecting to be where I am at the minute. I didn't even dream about making my debut. It's been a bonus since the new manager's come in."

An appearance in the Owls 16 came in the Scot's third league game in charge, as an unused sub against his former side Barnsley. The debut came two days later in the draw at Peterborough. Then, when Proudlock joined Peacock and Ndumbu in the SWFC sickbay. a first start came in the world's oldest cup competition.

Drew takes up the story: "I came in and did a fitness test on the Friday, and when we got there on the Saturday I was told I was starting. It was totally out of the blue. I was dead nervous at first - but then I thought to myself, 'It's just another game.' I enjoyed it and I think I did alright for 45 minutes."

Having broken his hand in a car accident just days previously, and with the tie all but lost, Talbot was withdrawn and soon had surgery on the injury. But within days he was back into training to continue the improvements made to his game in the past year. Naturally blessed with lightning pace, the youngster is feeling the benefits of training with more experienced strikers on a daily basis:


"It's improved my game," he reflects. "No disrespect to the younger lads but you pick up things from the likes of Steven MacLean and Adam Proudlock. You learn how to make runs

and if you watch how they play. you're bound to progress."

Having already more than surpassed his original aims for the season. Drew has revised his targets upwards. While he knows it may be a little early for a regular starting role - not least because of the goalscoring form of a certain loan signing - the youth and reserve team predator is now looking to see his name on the scoresheet at first-team level

to cap a meteoric return to the professional game:

"That's my aim is now," he asserts. "I should probably have scored at Port Vale when the keeper pulled off a good save, but by my standards I should be scoring goals from that position." If he continues his startling progress of the past few months, you wouldn't bet against Talbot being quick on the Drew to hit

To rub salt into the wound following that County Ground choker, the Robins promptly dumped Paul Sturrock's men out of the FA Cup at the same venue just over a fortnight later, so Swindon are sure to fancy their chances as the two sides prepare to lock horns once more. The West Country outfit visit Sheffield in decent form too, having clocked up nine points from the last 12 on offer to conclude a largely prosperous Christmas calendar. Swindon did taste defeat facing Colchester over the holiday period but wins against Peterborough, Brentford and Bradford ensured our visitors head into 2005 handily placed for a potential play-off slot in May. Just four points separate sixth-placed Bournemouth and the Robins, who are guaranteed to leapfrog three slots in the table if they emerge from Hillsborough with a maximum return, given that today's fixture is one of just three in League

One this afternoon and the sole encounter that can impact on the top-ten equation. Every incentive, then, for boss Andy King and his side as they seek what would be their 12th league triumph overall of the season and a fifth away from home. On the other side of the coin, if Swindon do at some point fall behind to the in-form Owls, the travelling faithful will hold out hope to the last whistle given that, rather curiously, each of Swindon's ten defeats so far this season bar one have been lost by the slender margin of a solitary goal. Only Colchester have conclusively overcome the Robins through the campaign; the 3-0 thumping they meted out in Wiltshire on New Year's Day serving as our visitors' heaviest home loss for the best part of two years.







Andy King brings his Swindon squad north to Yorkshire for the second time in six days, hoping for a repeat of the victory they gained at Bradford on that last excursion to the White Rose county. A double from Grant Smith ensured the Robins bounced back quickly at Valley Parade after a shock 3-0 home defeat by Colchester provided a farfrom-ideal opening to 2005 for the Wiltshire side.

Town's form over the season indicates that they are equally comfortable with playing at home or on the road – they hold the 11th best records in the division both for playing on home soil and away. Over the season, King has called upon the services of 29 players, a number of whom have returned

to their clubs after loan spells at the County Ground.



Goalkeeper Rhys Evans has been the regular last line of defence with 30 appearances, while defenders Sean O'Hanlon and Jerel Ifil are both approaching the 30-game mark. 



SwindonTown - A Brief History



windon Town were established in 1881 and turned professional 13 years later, but did not become full members of the Football League until 1920. Spending most of their early years in the Third Division, or Division Three (South), their first promotion came in 1963. Relegation followed two years later but the Third Division side upset the odds in 1969 by taking their first silverware. Arsenal were

beaten at Wembley 1-0, to bring the League Cup to Wiltshire.

The following year saw the club's best ever FA Cup campaign as they made it to the quarter-final stage. However a strong Leeds United side ended the Robins' dreams of glory with a 2-0 win. Consolation came in the form of an astonishing Anglo-Italian Cup triumph, secured by completing a double over Juventus! After briefly falling to the


basement tier in 1982. Ossie Ardiles led the Robins to promotion to the First Division for the first time, eight years later. But celebration turned to protest as the Football League immediately demoted Swindon for irregular payments to players. The club had to wait until 1993 to play their first game in the Premier League as Glenn Hoddle took them up through the play-offs, with a 4-3 win

against Leicester City. A poor season led to Swindon becoming the whipping boys and they were immediately relegated back to Division One. The downward spiral continued despite a League Cup semifinal appearance in 1994-95. and the Robins were relegated to Division Two. They won the Second Division championship in 1996, but now find themselves back in football's third tier.



Today's the Day

Memories new and old in this afternoon's edition of Keith Howard's look back at Owls-related events from this day in history.



recisely 12 months ago today the club announced that they had received a grant of £149,900 from the Football Stadia Improvement Fund to improve spectator facilities on the Spion Kop and to upgrade the CCTV system within Hillsborough.

The Owls Trust also donated £30,000, and from the club themselves, who would fund the balance of the total

New signing...Viv Anderson joined the Owls on this day in 1991 opponents Swindon Town with a cheque presentation by the then Home Secretary, the Rt. Hon. David Blunkett MP.

On this day in 1992 a new sponsorship deal was announced, which would see the name "Mr Tom" emblazoned on the player's shirts, and Wednesday receiving £100,000 from the German Confectionary company Host Schokolade. Players who have made the news on January 8 include Guy Whittingham and Jim Magilton who, in 1999, were both made available for transfer. This was also the day when frustrated club officials decided to send a doctor to Italy to examine the 'AWOL' Paolo Di Canio.

Eight years earlier, in 1991, Viv Anderson joined the Owls on a free transfer from Manchester United, whilst another defender, Greg Fee. returned to Preston North End for a further loan period. Exactly one year previously, Americans John Harkes and Tony Meola arrived at Hillsborough on trial. The former, of course, went on to become the first USA player to feature in a Wembley Cup final, whilst the goalkeeper eventually signed for Watford. Going further back in time on this date, Jimmy Quinn signed from Celtic on a month's loan in 1975, and 12 months earlier goalkeeper Peter Grummitt, joined manager Brian Clough at Brighton in a £7,000 move after a month there on loan. Finally, in 1960, Plymouth Argyle took Jim McAnearney from Hillsborough, and the £10,000 fee included the purchase of striker George Kirby, who left the Owls for the south-west 24 hours earlier.


No fewer than eight of the eleven post-war matches involving Wednesday on January 8 have, not surprisingly, been cup-ties. However, the latest of these, three years ago, was not in pursuit of the FA Cup. but was the first leg of the League Cup semi-final here at Hillsborough, Blackburn Rovers were the visitors and, in a hard-fought encounter, the Lancashire side returned to Ewood Park with a slender 2-1 lead.

In 2000 it was third round FA Cup day. Wolves were our visitors and the game ended all square at 1-1. The Owls were victors after a penalty shoot-out in the replay but TV cameras proved that the Wolves original 'goal', a Steve Sedgley header past Srnicek, did not cross the line, but was awarded on a linesman's flag decision. In 1994, a late Nottingham Forest equaliser cancelled out Mark Bright's goal for the Owls in another FA Cup third round home tie and, once again, Wednesday did better in the replay with a 2-0 victory in Nottingham.

Previously there had been two goalless draws on this date - in 1983 at Southend United in the FA Cup and in 1977 at home to Brighton in the (old) Third Division. Back in 1974 Coventry City defeated Wednesday 3-1 in a replayed FA Cup third round game at Highfield Road, whilst two years earlier Tommy Craig's goal could not prevent Blackpool taking the points in a league match at Hillsborough.

In a memorable tie at Elland Road, again a third round FA Cup replay in 1969, the Owls beat mighty Leeds United 3-1, with young left winger Brian Woodall scoring twice and another from John Ritchie. Former Owls manager Howard Wilkinson scored one of his three goals in a Wednesday shirt when Leicester City won a First Division match here in 1966.

Finally, two FA Cup successes to complete the January 8 round-up. Here at Hillsborough, Wednesday struggled to overcome nonleague opponents Hastings United, 2-1 in 1955. One of the scorers that day was young Shiregreen striker Ron Greensmith, who notched his only Wednesday goal. Six years earlier (1949) the Owls beat Southampton by the same score with goals from Jimmy Dailey and Eddie Quigley.



MEETING THE MINNOWS

Mention earlier of the 1955 FA Cup tie against Hastings United, then of the Southern League, who came close to embarrassing the Owls, reminds us of other encounters in the great competition over the years against sides who were not members of the Football League.

Even before Wednesday themselves were elected to the League there had been ties against the likes of Heeley and Staveley in the 1880's, and other early ties brought them up against Southampton St Mary's and New Brighton Town. Then in the last full campaign before World War Two it took two games to dispose of Yeovil & Petters United - the replay in Somerset attracting a crowd of 14,359 - a record which stood for many years.

More recently, and since the fright against Hastings, the Owls have faced six other potential 'banana skins' with Hereford United the next one in 1958. This tie, however, proved comfortable with goals from Froggatt (2) and Shiner easing Wednesday through to the fourth round. Peterborough United, in 1960 then of the Midland League, were the Owls' next victims. A remarkable 51,114 crowd at Hillsborough saw Bobby Craig's brace win the fourth round tie as Wednesday moved on to the competition's semi-final.

Two so-called 'minnows' then stood in Wednesday's path in 1976 with the Owls themselves struggling in the lold! Third Division. However, dreadful league form was set aside briefly as Wednesday beat Macclesfield Town 3-1 and Wigan Athletic 2-0 in rounds one and two at home, before defeat at Charlton Athletic left the Owls to fight to keep out of the basement of the league.

Two years later, and still not yet members of the League, Wigan Athletic gained their revenge in the second round of the Cup, when they entertained Wednesday and won the tie by a single goal. To make the day, Wednesday's team bus was bogged down in the car park mud at Springfield Park and Jack Charlton and his players (including debut boy David Grant) had the ignominious task of pushing the stranded vehicle to a harder surface.

Fortunately, this particular story has a happy ending. Just over a year ago a brave Salisbury City side had no answer on the day to Adam Proudlock. The striker helped himself to a hat-trick - the first by a Wednesday player in the FA Cup since Imre Varadi's against Oldham in 1984-85.



It was honours even in Bedfordshire after a game that showed the best Coca-Cola League One has to offer. Chances came at either end in an exciting encounter, with the Owls drawing first blood when Kenwyne Jones pounced on a terrible mix-up by Marlon Beresford and Curtis Davies to slot in his fourth goal in as many

games. But the lead lasted only a matter of minutes as Steve Howard netted the leveller, 33 seconds after the break, to grab a point for the table-toppers.

Either side could have clinched victory in a pulsating second half but the draw maintained Wednesday's five-match unbeaten league away run.

AcademyLatest

In this edition of Academy Comment, academy boss Mike Rigg assesses the progress made within the youth system over the past year.

This year we have had Ross
Greenwood, Liam Needham, Andrew
Talbot and Rob Poulter all make
their first team debuts, while a few
others have been on the verge of
that. The good thing is that Paul
Sturrock is not afraid to make that
brave decision to throw a young
player in. It would be easy to stick
with the older, more experienced
players as it is sometimes a gamble
putting a youngster on in front of
25,000 fans.

Liam Needham...one of several academy players to make their first-team debuts in 2004.

"The under-18's have been on a progressive incline since Mark Smith joined us. We have brought in new players and Mark works the lads hard and is very demanding. That's a good thing, because making the transition from being a schoolboy in youth football to meet the challenges for the first team is a big task. An experienced and intelligent coach is needed to help players make that transition and Mark has done that with limited resources. That is reflected in that the under-18's have won more games than in the last two seasons and their league position.

"Everyone focuses on the under-18's to judge how the academy is doing. But the academy is a seven days a week operation, morning, noon and night, with players from under-9's upwards.

"In the 18 months I have been in charge we have tried to get the structure of the academy right. I was very pleased to bring Tony Daws here in the summer to become assistant academy manager of the under-9's to under-16's age bracket. He was a great acquisition for us, has a wealth of experience and a superb background in youth development. He doesn't just bring his ability in recruiting players but what he does with those that are here.

"Alan Watson has now settled into his role as head of recruitment,

which is one which can't be underestimated. That's what the academy is all about. If we don't recruit the right players, the academy will fail. Alan brings his expertise, not only in knowing football and players through his scouting background, but also his local knowledge. He's a Wednesdayite through and through and goes out wanting the best players to be at Sheffield Wednesday. It is not a contractual issue or a finance driven thing for him, it is about doing the right thing for this club.

"I have gone on record several times about the issues to do with the new training ground situation. The Football League and Premier League have questioned the suitability of Middlewood Road for some time. The new training ground is going to be the lifeline of this club because it will attract players. There is a lot of work going on behind the scenes to make sure the new training ground would be better than the existing one.

"I'd like to end by expressing my thanks and extending best wishes to Sue Beeley, who has recently left us after six years as education and welfare officer at the academy. Sue's hard work in this position was much appreciated and, on behalf of everyone at the club, I would like wish her every success in her new role."

MARATHONS

For many fans the introduction of penalty shoot-outs into the FA Cup has devalued the competition as supporters of a certain age still fondly remember marathon ties involving the Owls. In the only the second season of the FA Cup, Wednesday and Staveley played three times before the Owls marched on towards their first semi-final while the quaint 19th Century tradition of protesting after games meant Wednesday and Notts County played three ties in the 1889-90 season even though every match had ended with a victor! Probably the most amazing Cup campaign in the Owls history came in the final season before the Second World War as Wednesday played eight ties but did not get past the fifth

round! They needed a replay to beat non-league Yeovil Town and then won a second replay at Maine Road against Chester before losing a second replay against Chelsea at the neutral venue(!) of Highbury at the last 16 stage. In post-war soccer the Owls lost a second replay to Preston at Goodison Park in 1957 while First Division Crystal Palace were dumped out of the cup by Second Division Wednesday in a third game - played at Aston Villa - in February 1973. Probably the most memorable marathon was the 1979 tie with top-flight Arsenal that saw Jack Charlton's Third Division battlers take the eventual winners to an incredible fourth replay. After 1-1 draws at Highbury and Hillsborough the teams encamped at Filbert Street, Leicester and subsequently drew 2-2 and 3-3 before the Gunners finally shook off the Owls with a 2-0 win. The last FA Cup marathon before the rules changed saw Wednesday and old cup foes Everton lock horns on four occasions in January 1988, beginning with a 1-1 draw at Hillsborough. The Owls then drew 1-1 in the replay and third game, both on Merseyside, before collapsing spectacularly in the third replay


to find themselves 5-0 down at the break – folklore says the pubs around the ground were packed in the second half as disgruntled Owls fans drowned their sorrows!

MASCOT

The club mascot is a relatively new concept that only really started at Wednesday in the mid-1960's after the successful marketing of 'World Cup Willie'. Secretary Eric Taylor was never one to miss out on new innovations and in January 1967 introduced Ozzie Owl to the Hillsborough scene - he was designed by the company who were responsible for the World Cup - along with a range of merchandise. Ozzie is, of course, now a quite a lively thirtysomething, while he was later joined by troublesome duo Ollie and Baz!

MEGSON

The name of Megson will always be synonymous with Wednesday as Don captained the Owls in the 1966 Cup final and son Gary enjoyed two playing spells at Hillsborough in the 1980's. The former joined from Mossley as an amateur in October 1952 and remained on the staff until leaving to take over as player-

manager at Bristol Rovers in March 1970, after seven goals in 442 first team games for the Owls. During that time he earned a reputation as the club's greatest left-back since the legendary Ernie Blenkinsop and now lives out his retirement after various coaching roles and scouting tenures for his son.

Megson junior arrived for £108,500 from Everton in August 1981 and enjoyed a tremendous first spell, his sparkling midfield performances leading the Owls to the FA Cup semi-final in 1983 and promotion from Division Two a year later. However, Howard Wilkinson sold him to Nottingham Forest in the summer that followed only to be bought back from Newcastle United in December 1985 after his career had stumbled. He took his Wednesday tally to 33 goals in 276 games before joining Manchester City in January 1989 and then carved out a successful managerial career, which was temporarily interrupted in October when he was relived of his duties at West Bromwich Albion.

MERCANTILE CREDIT

As part of the centenary celebrations of the Football League in 1988, the powers that be somewhat inadvisably decided on an 11-a side competition to be staged at Wembley. All the 92 League clubs' records over a certain period were analysed and the top 16 were invited to the famous stadium in April 1988 to play a series of short-time games - the first two rounds consisting of 40 minutes and the semi-finals and final 60 minutes each. In a sparse stadium - the total attendance for the two days was under 60,000 - the Owls eased past Crystal Palace in the first round, after a penalty shoot-out, before a Worthington goal in the next round secured another draw and another success from the spot. A late goal from Colin West helped defeat Manchester United 2-1 in the last four but in a poor final the Owls lost to Nottingham Forest on penalties, after a 0-0 draw, although the £50,000 prize money probably made the knock about worthwhile.

MEXICO


The Central American country is associated these days with luxury holidays and the 1970/1986 World Cups but back in 1967 the Owls actually travelled there for a post-season hexagonal friendly tournament. Their destination was the country's capital, Mexico City, where at the famous Aztec Stadium they faced five teams in an 18-day period, beginning with a 4-1 win over Mexican club Toulka on 4 June 1967. A crowd of 40,000 watched that first game and 5,000 more were present a week later when a Mexican Select XI thrashed Wednesday 5-0 under the scorching sun. Defeats followed to Spanish side Espanol and Italians Bologna before the Owls wound up the tournament with a bad-tempered 1-1 draw with Mexicans from America FC (both sides having a player sent off).

MIDLAND LEAGUE

The competition ran from 1889 to 1982 and for many years was the home for the Owls reserve side, prior to their election into the Central League in 1923. The club first entered in the 1898-99 season - finishing tenth - but resigned after one season only to re-join two years later. The Championship came to Owlerton in 1903, 1906, 1908 and 1923 before Wednesday joined the majority of Football League reserve sides in the Central League. The League folded in 1982 when it merged with the Yorkshire League to from today's Northern Counties East League where the likes of Hallam and Sheffield FC compete.



The Owls picked up a useful point, just before Christmas, with a home draw against high-flying rivals.

Sunday December 12 FA Women's Premier League, Northern Division

Wednesday 1 Blackburn 1

Owls boss Christine McCann hoped that the resounding FA Cup victory over Lincoln in mid-December would serve as a watershed moment for her troops and this league encounter against high-flying Blackburn proved exactly that. Rovers arrived at Staveley in second spot and full of confidence following an excellent opening half to the campaign, but they headed back across the Pennines with only a point, having been made to scrap every inch of the way by a Wednesday side reduced to ten players for over half of the game.

"We really showed what we were made of today," said a proud McCann



after the contest. "We have had some odd results over the season so far when the balance of play hasn't always been reflected in the scoreline, but this time a draw was a fair reflection. I was really pleased with the way that the girls kept their heads up after the sending off, and against a team doing really well in the league table too."

The straight red card shown to Owls striker Rachel Booker was the main talking point of the afternoon. The referee took exception to some choice words from Booker five minutes shy of the interval, which handed the hosts an uphill battle facing one of the most adept sides in the division. It was testament to Wednesday's determination and character that they rose above the numerical disadvantage and, despite the loss of the experienced Booker, the Owls continued to take the game to Blackburn and could have emerged with all three points.

"Full credit goes to the girls for standing up to Blackburn," McCann continued. "They've proved themselves as one of the best sides in the Premier Division this season and must have fancied their chances when Rachel was sent off. But they finished the game on the back foot and on another day and with a bit of luck, we could have sneaked a win at the end." The loss of Booker still served as blow to Wednesday, though, as the busy frontline was deprived of its main spearhead. The Owls had dominated the attacking side of the game prior

to the red card incident and spent much of the first period camped in the Rovers half. Ironically, the breakthrough came just before half time, just minutes after Booker had received her marching orders. Beth Gingell fired a superb cross to the inform Cheryl Mahwood, who headed home her third goal in two games with some aplomb to give Wednesday a fully deserved lead. The Owls continued in a similar vein in the early throes of the second 45 and carved a fair few half-chances, although Blackburn did respond in kind at the other end of the field. The next goal was always going to be crucial and Rovers made the breakthrough; Andrea Bell levelling with an exquisite lob over Claire Wallhead just after the hour. Far from allowing the visitors to build on that boost, Wednesday went all out for victory and twice went close to snatching the points, but both managers agreed that each side deserved a share of the spoils, and McCann saw enough in her reduced ranks to stay convinced that SWFC's mid-season blip would be fully countered in the New Year and beyond.


It was Sturrock who originally brought Jones to these shores last summer. Given the two's previous association, a reunion was always a possibility, and so it proved.




When asked to expand upon his international aspirations, it soon became clear that Kenwyne has a burning desire to succeed on the biggest stage of all.

I have only been out of the squad once for the qualifiers so far so hopefully I will be selected. It is always down to the manager, though. The likelihood is that Jones will be on the plane back to his homeland, where he grew up with more than a keen eye cast in the direction of English football. But the name of SWFC still warrants more than the odd mention, as Kenwyne confirmed, before he closed with a line that - how shall we say - works both ways.

"I was aware of Sheffield Wednesday when I was growing up, they are a very big club," he explained. "I wouldn't say I was a follower of Sheffield Wednesday, though...but I am very much a follower now!"

There were plenty of former Wednesday players in the headlines over the holiday period. Francis Hall summarises the Christmas action from an SWFC perspective.

he festive flurry of games that is the Christmas and New Year period not only proved extremely fruitful for the current Wednesday side, but also saw a number of former Owls hit the headlines in the Championship.

One-time SWFC frontman Richard Cresswell took his goals tally to 15 for the season with a hat-trick in Preston's victory over Sunderland. The 27-yearold endured a lean 2003-04, managing just three goals, but has regained his scoring touch this term and started 2005 in style. His New Year's Day treble against the Black Cats was his second three-goal haul of the season - the first coming against ex-Hillsborough teammate Kevin Pressman in an October League Cup win at Leicester.

Also in possession of renewed scoring ability is erstwhile Owls loanee Leon Knight. The diminutive striker bagged his first strike in 11 games and only his third of the season in Brighton's 2-1 win over Watford last Monday.

Proudly sitting at the Championship summit as part of the Ipswich side topping the division is Shefki Kugi. Indeed the Finn has been singled out for praise by manager Joe Royle for his role in the Suffolk side's assent to top spot and netted twice over the holiday period, including the only goal in their victory over Stoke. Town are neck and neck with second placed Wigan in the battle for superiority at the top of the table, with Ipswich currently two points ahead of Paul Jewell's men.


Former Owls gaffer Jewell's side have recovered from their defeat at Portman Road and disappointing Yuletide losses to Burnley and Derby with victory in their last two fixtures. The Latics outbattled Sheffield United at Bramall Lane on New Year's Day to register a 2-0 triumph before sinking Glenn Hoddle's Wolves by the same scoreline last Tuesday. One encouraging factor is that they have a superior goal difference to Ipswich which, if maintained, could be crucial if the sides are still battling it out at the death.

Sheffield United will have both teams in their targets as they chase the leading pack. The Blades are in fifth place, five points behind Wigan, and the defeat by the Latics was the only blip in a festive spell which spawned three wins from four games. United swept aside Coventry, Leicester and West Ham with their former Wednesday contingent showing up among the goals. Alan Quinn drove home their second in the defeat of Leicester and Leigh Bromby rocketed in from 20 yards to cap an impressive Blades triumph at West Ham last Monday.

Amidst the goals, the nonscoring odd man out was Derek Geary, although the ex-Owls full-back had a significant part in United's opener at Upton Park when his shot was deflected in by Tomas Repka.


"In setting our policies for what is and what isn't acceptable behaviour we have to tread a fine line to uphold the rules while satisfying supporters from a wide range of different backgrounds and perspectives.

On one hand, everyone at the club understands that people don't come to a football match to sit in silence as though they are at the opera. We know football is a passionate sport and - rightly or wrongly - at times there will be some swearing and cursing as people become emotionally involved in the game. We're all human beings and sometimes we say and do things we wouldn't normally

contemplate, and may possibly regret in the cold light of day. Balanced against that, we want to make sure Hillsborough continues to be a place where all Sheffield Wednesday supporters want to come and support the team - whether they be male or female, children or senior citizens, black or white, While things do happen in the heat of the moment at football matches, we don't want any Sheffield Wednesday supporter to have to endure persistent foul language, racial abuse or obscene gestures while watching the team. We will

take action against people who we become aware are involved in this sort of behaviour. Sometimes this will happen on the day of the game. Other times we will monitor their behaviour, gather evidence and then act at a future date. Our action can range from an initial warning to a ban from the ground."





Played In Liverpool 0-2 Wednesday Division One (old), 29 September 1984

This was our first season back in the top flight but we had actually played Liverpool in the League Cup the previous season, drawing 2+2 at Hillsborough before losing the replay. I always remember our fans singing, "We'll be back, we'll be back" to the Liverpool supporters - and we did go back in the early

part of the following season and turned them over 2-0. Liverpool were the team of the 80's and they had the likes of Dalglish, Hansen and Lawrenson in their side that day. To go there and win by two goals showed just how far we'd come after being in Division Three just four years beforehand. Imre Varadi rolled the first one in from the touchline after Grobbelaar went walkabout and then Gary Shelton got the second in front of the Kop.

Arsenal 3-2 Manchester Utd FA Cup final, 12 May 1979

I got the tickets for this game from a couple of the lads at Arsenal, and what a match it turned out to be! We had played them in the third round of the competition in a tie that turned into a marathon. We were only in the Third Division but, after draws at Hillsborough and Highbury there were three more games at Leicester City before we lost 2-0 in the fifth match.

Over the course of the games I got to know a few of the Arsenal lads well so I blagged some tickets for the final for my mates and me. The Gunners were two goals up and cruising at half-time but United scored two in the last five minutes and everyone thought it was going to extra-time. Instead, Arsenal went straight up the other end and Alan Sunderland won the Cup with virtually the last kick of one of the best FA Cup finals in history.


Watched On TV

It was a game full of outstanding individual talents and some of the goals were different class. Socrates scored through the goalkeeper's legs after Zico had produced an amazing turn and slipped a pass into his path but Paolo Rossi got a hat-trick to take Italy through.

Brazil should really have won the competition that year, and some say they were the best team never to win a World Cup but, as it was, it was the Italians who went on to get the glory.
