Tickets for this fixture are therefore being sold in compliance with item 4 of our Customer Charter, as per "Pre Sold Ticket" games.

Tickets are available to personal callers in to the Club, by telephone or by mail, on the basis of **three** tickets per person per category.

The following timetable is in operation:

1. Season Tickets holders from last Monday 10th October. (Season Ticket holders are reminded that their Season Ticket is their match ticket).

2. Club Members, Members of Lifeline or Bees United from Monday 31st October. 3. Registered Members i.e. Previous booking history with the Club, from Monday 21st November.

Tickets are available for sale between 9am and 5pm, Monday to Friday, from The Bees Superstore, and both before and after the game on matchdays, from the Main Reception within the Braemar Road forecourt.

Season Ticket holders must produce Voucher A from their Season Ticket books **should they require to purchase tickets**, while Members must produce their respective membership cards.

Telephone orders, during which you must give your Season Ticket holder number and/or Membership number in respect of categories 1 or 2, can be made by calling 0845 3456 442. Postal requests, which must include Voucher A from your Season Ticket book and/or a photocopy of your Membership card in respect of categories 1 or 2, plus an A4 self addressed and stamped envelope, should be addressed to Tickets, Brentford FC, Griffin Park, Braemar Road, Brentford, Middlesex TW8 0NT.

In the event that the fixture is postponed for any reason, tickets will be valid, as issued, for the rescheduled date.

elcome back to Griffin Park for today's fixture against Swindon. At the time of writing this article I was yet to appear at the BIAS organized Fans' Forum in Stripes on Thursday night. I hope that the evening provided the opportunity for supporters to clarify some pressing questions regarding the current financial situation of the Club (especially in light of Brian Burgess' comments pitchside during the last home game). The main question on everybody's lips must be 'why the sudden alarm - we thought everything was going swimmingly?' Put simply, my belief is that the budget set for this season was too aggressive across the board, and was overly optimistic in its assumptions as to what was achievable based on historical revenue data. Clearly, with both myself and a new Commercial Manager now on board one would safely assume that both Club organization and commercial success would increase markedly – and Huw and I are committed to ensuring that this is indeed the case.

Huw and I have joined a very capable team, and so we stand the best possible chance of being able to add value to this already successful Club. That said, however, I am conscious that the expectations as laid out in the budget are unattainable in their current forms - and as such the Club is currently carrying out a reforecast exercise, in order that we may realistically rewrite the budget and stand a fighting chance of delivering it. The Board of Directors of both the Club and BU will be receiving details of this reforecast budget very soon, and it will be this information that sets the scene on the degree and timing of additional funding that is required to ensure the BU takeover of the Club can take place by 31st Jan 06, as currently planned.

I hope that everyone has had the opportunity to look at the Nottingham Forest game ticket selling schedule, as recently issued by the Club. Tickets went on sale to Season Ticket Holders on Monday of this week, and there will be clear windows of opportunity for the distinct groups to purchase their tickets, as detailed in the Club's Customer Charter. The game is likely to be highly popular, and as such I would encourage everyone to buy their tickets as soon as possible. General sale to Brentford supporters will only occur if, after Registered Supporters have had their 'window', the away end has not sold out. What better reason for 'registering' as a Brentford supporter, just to ensure that you are known to us, and therefore standing the best possible chance (after STHs, and members of the various different groups) of being able to obtain tickets in the future for games where general sale may not be possible. All you have to do is pick-up a form at the Superstore and return it to us fully completed.

Today's game coincides with the national Kick Out Racism theme. Within the FITC article in this magazine there is a detailed account of the many different activities that our Community Team are involved in. The men and women of FITC ensure that this Club is represented to everyone outside Brentford as a wholly inclusive environment in which to spend your valuable leisure time - and we all have a matchday obligation to ensure that this commendable position is achieved week in and week out. In my very limited time at Brentford I have been staggered at the extremely low level of antisocial behaviour-related incidents that occur at Griffin Park, of whatever nature. It is a credit to all Brentford supporters, new and old, that we collectively do not tolerate any such behaviour.

On that high note may I wish you a very enjoyable matchday. Have a great day with us here at Griffin Park. Kind regards.

he game opened at a frantic pace and Martin **Butler called Stuart** Nelson into action inside the opening minute with a header from a Paul McLaren free kick, while at the other end Lloyd Owusu forced Gary Montgomery to save his header from a Jay Tabb corner. The action continued apace and Burton missed the target with a spectacular scissor kick after a long throw from Shaun Barker dropped to him at the far post, but Burton made no mistake three minutes later

A long hopeful ball forward from Barker dropped on the edge of the home penalty area, Burton out jumped Sam Sodje and Nelson who both went for the high ball and his header rolled into the empty goal. But Rotherham wasted that advantage by handing Brentford an equaliser in the 11th minute.

David Worrell badly underhit a back pass and Owusu seized on it, he rounded Montgomery and was brought crashing down by the Millers' goalkeeper. Referee Barry Knight awarded a penalty and O'Connor made no mistake, sending Montgomery the wrong way from the spot.

That only served to increase the tempo and Brentford could

have got their noses in front four minutes later when a long throw from Andrew Frampton dropped to Darren Pratley on the edge of the box, his shot was blocked and as the ball dropped to Rankin, Colin Murdock threw his body in the way to preserve the equilibrium. Sodje then headed over the bar after Montgomery failed to deal with Pratley's cross from Paul Brooker's short corner.

The end to end action continued with neither team giving anything away in the challenge as the ball was worked from end to end. Despite the high pace of the game there were no clear cut chances until just past the half hour mark when Rankin, Owusu and Tabb combined to release Frampton, who was breaking forward. His near post effort forced Montgomery into a low





save and from the resulting corner Owusu headed over.

Brentford gained the initiative in the rollercoaster game and undoubtedly deserved their second goal. Tabb combined with Rankin to release Brooker; he skipped past the challenge of Murdock and pulled the ball back to Rankin who shot past Montgomery and into the far corner.

The chances continued to come for the home side, Michael Turner headed off target from a Tabb corner and good work from Owusu set up Rankin for a shot from 20 yards which stung the palms of Montgomery. Owusu was again the creator in first half stoppage time when he slipped a ball through to Frampton but Montgomery again denied Brentford, saving at his near post.

The second half had a lot to live up to and despite the game continuing to flow from end to end there was a lack of clear-cut chances. Rankin had a shot deflected wide just before the hour mark and from the resulting corner Turner headed over the bar. Brentford almost presented Rotherham with an equaliser in the 61st minute. Butler read O'Connor's back pass and latched onto it, Sodje got back to stop him shooting but the ball dropped to Michael Keane, who had only Nelson to beat but couldn't do so as the Bees' keeper produced a top notch save.

Brentford could have extended their lead two minutes later when Frampton fed Owusu, who, in turn, slipped the ball through to Tabb; he raced clear and swung a cross to the far post where Brooker was waiting. He seemed set to finish the flowing move with a third goal but Montgomery saved low to his left. At the other end John Mullin shot over the bar.

Rotherham brought young striker Will Hoskins into the game in an attempt to rescue a point but the chances came mainly at the other end. Pratley shot wide, Sodje headed a Tabb corner over and Owusu headed a Frampton cross over the bar. In the last ten minutes the visitors could have grabbed an equaliser when Hoskins raced onto Gregory Robertson's ball but he screwed his shot across the face of goal.

Former Football League Referee Colin Downey gives his opinion on a few of the talking points in the game:

The referee, Barry Knight, from Orpington, is one of the 20 FA Premier League match officials. Each weekend Premier League match officials are also appointed to 6 Football League matches, considered to be among the more important or difficult fixtures e.g. top of the table/relegation/local derby/previous match problem type clashes.

In the 10th minute a straight forward penalty award for Brentford - yellow card not essential for the Rotherham United goalkeeper, as Lloyd Owusu was moving away from goal at the time really in the direction of the touch line (although lining up a turn and shot for goal). I thought Lloyd made it difficult for the goalkeeper, almost inviting him to make a challenge - he did and it was always likely to be an illegal one. What another great penalty kick from Kevin O'Connor!

In the 33rd minute a yellow card for a Rotherham United player, who this time did prevent an opponent from moving forward into some space, with a chance to then cross the ball into the penalty area. In the 34th minute Brentford spectators appeal for a handball against a Rotherham United player Ealing Road/Braemar Road section. Free kick rightly not given – ball hit the hand, not the other way round – if it had been deliberate the player would have claim to another profession, a very skilful conjurer perhaps!

In the 50th minute a loud roar and much laughter as the referee loses his footing and falls to the ground; bit unkind really. In the 80th minute a very correct dropped ball restart following Brentford's sporting gesture to kick the ball out of play so that Deon Burton could receive medical inspection. As the referee blew before the ball left the pitch a dropped ball was required and Rotherham then responded well by kicking the ball towards Stuart Nelson.

Not too much comment on the referee this time – I thought he had a good match and adjusted to this Football League match which, as usual, was played at a more hectic pace than most Premier League matches.

There is certainly less space for the midfield players to operate and referees have to keep this in mind. I thought he allowed just the right amount of physical play to take place without penalising it automatically, in addition he ran and moved strongly throughout the match to make sure he was fairly close to the action. I thought he did well to spot and take some action against players squabbling in the penalty area prior to some corner kicks. I mentioned 'take some action' – this was by speaking to the players concerned and solving the matter, without the use of yellow cards. Good preventive refereeing and full credit to the players who listened and then co-operated.

"this time round, he's been given the skipper's armband in the absence of team captain Ricky Newman - and he's led the team to fourth place again despite a list of injuries almost as long as his own leg in a last-ditch tackle.

Mind you, he has got 'previous' when it comes to captaining a team - before joining The Bees he had captained Premiership Charlton's secondstring to win the Barclaycard FA Premier Reserve League (South) championship in 2003/04.

"Winning the Player-of-the-Year award in my first year - with a load of experienced players in the team - was an unbelievable feeling, a great honour," he says.

"And captaining the team is just as big an honour. Mind you, I'm not one of those people who shouts all the time - although I do my fair share of talking, I like to show my presence by the way I play."

He was told that after three months, under league regulations he would have to go back to his parent club - and immediately suggested joining the Bees permanently - a move that was welcomed with open arms. Michael signed a two-and-a-half year contract for a small undisclosed fee after a total of just 16 league games. In all, he helped highriding Bees keep 22 clean sheets during his first season.

Now he is getting on for a hundred appearances.

"There are a lot of very good players who can't get into the first team in the Premiership and would do well to follow us," he says. "I think that it's a great move for Oli and Darren - as good as it has been for me."

Southend set a new club record of eight consecutive wins when they beat Nottingham Forest 1-0 last Sunday to go top of the table for the first time this season.

The victory beat their previous best run of seven successive victories, set between October and December 1924, the last game of which was a 6-1 hammering of us.

It has been an amazing start to the season for The Shrimpers, whose other victims in the sequence have been Colchester and Tranmere (both 3-1), Oldham (2-1) and Yeovil (4-1) at Roots Hall and today's visitors Swindon (2-1), Rotherham (4-2) and Gillingham (2-1) on the road.

It is also quite a contrast to their form in the opening five games in which they only won once.

All this earned Steve Tilson, who had a brief two-game loan spell with us in 1993, League One's September manager of the month award.

We will not be testing ourselves against Southend for a while as they are the side we have to wait longest to meet – not playing them until mid-January with the return just a month later, here on Valentine's night.

While The Shrimpers are riding high, at the other end of the table it has been a miserable start to the season for **Tranmere**. Manager Brian Little, who led Rovers to the play-off semi-finals last season, has been given the dreaded vote of confidence by chairman Lorraine Rogers.

"Brian has the experience and the resources and the board and senior management at the club remain convinced that by the end of the season we will be battling it out near the top of the division not the bottom," she told Rovers' website.

"My message to the fans is to give Brian their 100% support while he gets us back on track."

One manager who is not under pressure at the moment is Steve Thompson, who was confirmed as the new Yeovil boss eight days ago after inspiring them to two wins in three games. The next day they beat leaders Swansea 1-0.

Thompson, who took over as caretaker-manager following Gary Johnson's move to Bristol City, was Johnson's assistant during Yeovil's rise from the Conference to League One.

"It's a difficult task to follow Gary, but that would be the same for anyone coming in. I'm willing to take on that challenge," he told BBC Radio Bristol.

"We'll introduce some new ideas and I feel we will make a success of it."

Yeovil chairman John Fry said: "We're very pleased with what he's done, his knowledge of the players, and quite clearly he has the support of the fans."

Kevin Hodges has been named as assistant manager.

Meanwhile Cup action is back on the agenda next week with the first round of the LDV Vans Trophy.

Score Twice After Colourless First Half at Shrewsbury.

Brentford could be considered to have done well to win 2-0 at Shrewsbury but it wasn't one of their three star performances. It was a very valuable away win. If such things could be measured, I've no doubt it would be found that Shrewsbury were on Brentford soil more often than Brentford trod Shrewsbury turf; and Cakebread, undoubtedly, was called into action more frequently than Crossley. But games are not decided by the pressure gauge. It was one of the most uneventful first halves there only being about half a dozen incidents to redeem the 45 minutes from total duliness. Cakebread starred in three of them. Coming into the limelight by tipping a cross drive from O'Donnell over the bar in masterly style, Gerry gave an immediate encore by keeping out a well directed nod from Russell; and only a few minutes later the goalkeeper's instinct put him in the right place to save a diving header from O'Donnell. Efforts by Rainford, Francis and Caven were the highlights at the other end, although it would have needed a stretch of the imagination to put them in the "near thing" category. So it was 0-0 at the interval, with every likelihood of things staying that way until closing time. Cakebread, with another smart tip over the top from Pountney and a full length dive to thwart Jones, saw to it that the Shrewsbury total did not shift from zero. Francis, who has netted many an adroit flick in header in the past season or so, kept the Brentford score at "0," failing ignominiously by butting the ball over the bar when a

right wing centre presented him with a full width view of the target. In the 63rd minute Crossley raced out to the penalty line as Bannister chased a ball towards his own goal, and the keeper, left quessing as to his colleague's intentions, was off balance when clutching the ball. Hustled by Caven, he lost possession, and the winder tapped the ball to Francis, who, from 15 yards out, shot into a completely unquarded net. The goal that folded up the £4 bonus in Brentford wallets and made the result irreversible came ten minutes from time. Hobson upended Francis as the centre forward was tearing through, and the ball was spotted for a free kick quite 30 yards from goal. Shrewsbury did not form a wall. Bristow jumped over the ball. Heath followed up, gave it a tremendous wallop. Crossley, in all probability, would have saved; but in the last ten yards of its flight the ball took an abrupt swerve to the right, entering the net just under the bar and wide of a nonplussed goalkeeper. It was all over then.

Brentford had so much of the early play that goals seemed to be there for the taking, and sure enough, in the eighth minute, they took one. From Bristow a 20 yard pass travelled up to Francis, who raced to the byeline and centred to a spot beyond the far post. Running in Caven aimed hard for goal, and the ball turned into the net off Towers, standing only a few feet from the goal-line. Was it a goal? Mr Stringer the referee confirmed it was despite protests from Gillingham and a flag waving linesman!! That goal transpired to be the all important one of the day. But it shouldn't have been, for the Bees had ample chances to give their "F. and A." columns a boost. And although Brentford generally had the better of the play for the rest of the opening half, Gillingham often did things which made it plain that they had not given up the game as lost. There was the time, for instance,

when Cakebread just got to a right wing centre before Saunders reached it with his head; and there was an even nearer thing when Morgan rounded off a fine run with a centre that McCorkindale chipped to a region just inside a post. Cakebread kept that one out with a full-length dive. There were bright Brentford moments, of course, notably when Caven beat a couple of defenders on the touchline and centred a ball which Parsons nodded goalwards; in the ensuing mix up, Rainford hit the underside of the bar. But the best move of the half - of the whole game in fact - came in the 35th minute, when Cakebread threw a ball out to Parsons, who was standing in his own penalty box. The winger sent it up to Rainford, who shrugged his way past three opponents before delivering a blue print forward pass to Towers. He was in perfect position, but his shot went too near to Brodie. Gillingham came more strongly into the second half, and for a long time the Bees looked anything but certain winners. They had several chances to make things safe, and almost succeeded when Brodie failing to clear properly from a corner kick at the first attempt, turned towards his own net and clutched a header from Rainford, Cakebread dived to keep out a downward header from Saunders. The ball bounced haphazardly almost on the goal-line, between both Brentford backs. Ken Coote managed to kick clear, and Ken Horne managed to kick Coote's boot. On another occasion Saunders missed completely at four vards range. Those bits of excitement, however, were merely commas in a long and tedious sentence; and the game ended with Brentford possessors of one goal and two points.

in a defence that was minus its two most experienced players in Kruse and Allen. Brentford's likelihood of reaching the Third Division is fading fast. Yet, despite the result, Bees had looked the better team for most of the game. The defence rarely appeared troubled and it was only the superb optimism of Poskett that managed to break the deadlock. Brentford had the better of the first half exchanges and their skill and accurate passing was only just restrained by the home side's effort and enthusiasm. It was not all one way traffic though, and several times as the ball flew from end to end and both goals came under pressure Hartlepool looked dangerous. Three minutes from half time the home side took the lead with a goal that was so strongly disputed by Jackie Graham that Mr Styles booked him. Hartlepool were awarded a free kick halfway inside the Brentford half which was taken quickly and set Poskett free, moving goalwards. His powerful shot left Bond helpless. The dispute arose because the free kick was taken yards away from where the infrincement had taken place. Seven minutes into the second half Brentford appeared to have equalised when Baldwin netted after McCulloch set him free but the goal was disallowed for offside. Hartlepool again pushed forward and Bond palmed Bielby's 25 vard shot over the bar. From the resulting corner Ayre headed the second goal after the ball had been flicked on at the near post. A dull first half was more than compensated for by a tense, exciting second period and the 7,430 crowd had to suffer several nail biting moments before they were relieved by the final whistle. After the opening 20 minutes both teams settled down and Brentford just gained the upper hand. Graham shot over when McCulloch gave him the chance from a Phillips cross and then in the 30th minute the ball was taken off Allder's toe when he was only eight vards out. After five minutes of the second half Bond was injured in the face while gathering the ball and it took several minutes before he was back on his feet. In the 54th minute, a Kruse header, was cleared off the line by Banks. Southend were now defending in numbers and on 68 minutes Mc-Culloch demonstrated all his skill when he took the ball on his chest, turned inside a defender and shot from just outside the box but the ball went wide. Two minutes later the vital goal came. Phillips crossed into the area from the right and Graham sent a powerful shot goalwards. The keeper could only parry the ball and as the ball slowly trickled along the goalline McCulloch dived to prod it home. In the 20th minute a sliderule pass from Rankin only just failed to find Brooker, who would have been clean through but for a great lastditch interception by Eyres. Five minutes later and it was Brooker's turn to feed Rankin - his floated through ball just too long, and Chris Day in the Oldham goal doing well not to handle outside the box as he



raced out of his goal to collect.

In the 28th minute, Latics captain Andy Liddell fired a cross along the edge of the six yard box which eluded everyone, and from the resulting play, Eyres headed safely wide of the goal. Junior Lewis found himself in space on the left in the 30th minute, and his mis-hit cross nearly deceived Day in the Oldham goal, the ball eventually landing on the roof of the Oldham net.

An injury to Paul Brooker forced Brentford into a change in the 31st minute, Dudley Campbell replacing him and moving up front to partner Lloyd Owusu, with Isaiah Rankin switching to right midfield.

In the 38th minute, Oldham had their best chance of the half. Mark Hughes beat Nelson to a Luke Beckett cross, only to see his header cannon back off the underside of the bar, Nelson doing well to catch the ball as it bounced back up in to the danger zone. Oldham pressed forward, Sam Sodje and Rankin both providing excellent blocks to deny the Latics attack.

Three minutes later Rankin played a long ball to Owusu who clipped the ball past Branston, only to be bundled over in the box by the same player. The referee had no hesitation in pointing to the spot. After a long delay, O'Connor stepped up, only to see his well-struck spot-kick brilliantly saved by Chris Day, low to his left.

The last real action of the half saw an O'Connor free-kick charged down, and Hughes fire over the bar, with Darren Pratley booked in between, for persistent offending.

In the 65th minute The Bees made their second change of the afternoon, Scott Fitzgerald replacing the hard-working Rankin. Just two minutes later, the substitution was to prove inspired. A neat Owusu cross was latched onto by Fitzgerald, who turned sharply, and fired the ball past Day into the bottom left hand corner of the net, for his first goal of the season.

Lloyd Owusu came close to making it two in the 73rd minute, beating Terrell Forbes to Alex

a bit of robins history

This is Swindon's sixth consecutive season in this Division after an eventful time in the 1990s during which they had one year in the Premiership. Town reached the top flight for the 1993/94 season after beating Leicester 4-3 in the play-off final but had a miserable time, setting the wrong kind of records. They only managed five wins during the season, a total since equalled by Leicester, while they conceded 100 goals in their 42 matches - another record. They also went down the following season before bouncing straight back for a four-season stint in the League's second tier before returning to this level once again. Arguably the biggest moment in their history came in 1969 when they pulled off a huge upset by beating Arsenal 3-1 in the League Cup final at Wembley, Town were in the old Third Division at the time and Arsenal had only conceded 18 goals in their 30 League games in Division One at the time, but that proved irrelevant as Don Rogers scored twice in extra-time on an extremely muddy pitch to earn The Robins a 3-1 win.

swindon

Swindon have made a disastrous start to the season and are rooted to the bottom of the table.

They are also without a permanent manager following the departure of Andy King last month and have put experienced former striker Iffy Onuora in charge for the rest of the season.

Things went wrong right from the start with a 2-0 opening day defeat at Barnsley, which was followed by a 3-2 reverse against Oldham.

When they beat Nottingham Forest 2-1 in their next game and followed that with a goalless draw at Blackpool and 4-2 home win over Yeovil to rise to 14th in the table, their problems seemed to be behind them, but it has all gone wrong since as they have lost their last eight League games to plunge down the table.

Their current miserable run has seen 1-0 defeats at Tranmere, Walsall and Doncaster, a 2-1 reverse at Bournemouth and a 3-1 loss at Milton Keynes while at home they have been beaten by Southend and Port (2-1) and Bradford (3-2).

The only bright spot to emerge has been the form of striker Rory Fallon, who has hit seven goals so far – five of them in the eightdefeat sequence.

There was not even any respite in the Carling Cup as they lost 3-1 at home to local rivals Wycombe in the first round.

All this follows a close-season which saw the sale of prolific striker Sam Parkin to Ipswich for £450,000 after three seasons at the County Ground in which he averaged more than a goal every two games in the League – finding the net 67 times in 124 matches.

King signed Jamie Cureton and Tony Thorpe from QPR to replace him but they have so far only scored once between them in 19 appearances and have fallen out of favour, and that lack of goals is costing Swindon dear to date.

iffy onuora

As mentioned earlier, Iffy Onuora is currently in charge at the County Ground following Andy King's departure.

Onuora had a 15-year career as a striker – playing for Bradford University, where he got an economics degree, before moving on to Huddersfield (two spells), Mansfield, Gillingham (two spells), Swindon, Sheffield United, Grimsby and Tranmere before hanging up his boots last summer. He then had a brief spell as first-team coach under Paul Merson at Walsall before returning to Swindon as youth development manager.

brentford fans help hounslow council's leader give the club a vote of "quiet confidence"

> he Leader of Hounslow Council, Coun. Colin Ellar, has taken time out from a busy schedule to explain the borough's generous offer to lend Brentford a cool half-a-million pounds to help finalise the campaign that will hopefully see the supporters' take-over The Club by the end of next January.

"The loan is part of the overall package worked out by Bees United (the Club's Supporters' Trust) and it



should, first and foremost, mean that there will be the continuity of the Club staying in the local area, run by people with a passion for it," he said after the council had formally agreed the loan in principle.

"I think there is a tremendous community presence with Brentford in this area, especially with the various schemes involving local schools and young people. If things go well, it means the club's huge Football In The Community and Learning Zone schemes will continue - two schemes the Club does very well.

"They are just two of the many things the Club does for the district - and, in fact, I'd go as far as to say that Brentford has one of the best community schemes in the whole country - it certainly adds a lot to the area."

The loan situation, says Coun. Ellar, is that following a series of meetings with Bees United the Council's Labour majority gave the loan its blessing, followed swiftly by Hounslow's Public Executive Committee.

The result is that the Council has now sent a Letter of Intent to Bees United offering the Ioan of £500,000 subject to various conditions. "But a formal decision has been made - the trust now has to get everything together to buy the controlling interest and then the money will actually be handed over," adds Coun. Ellar.

The councillor, who

represents Hanworth Park ward, is himself (among many other duties) chairman of the powerful executive, and has been involved in discussions with Brentford on many issues apart from the loan - -including discussion on a possible move to a new stadium and the quick-fix improvements to Griffin Park in the meantime.

And from what he has seen, he says he is positive about the Club's future.

"Running a football club has changed from the glory days," he explains. "It is much more about business revenues and not just taking money at the turnstiles - and that is something on which Brentford has taken a very realistic attitude. Just breaking even on running costs, as it now does, is a very good sign." "There is the support there, the people in the area are reasonably well off, and if the team continues to do well they have every chance of moving up in the league and attracting more of them. We, as the local authority support that fully - but we must remember that Brentford is a West London team in competition with clubs like Chelsea and Fulham.

"We have seen how people like Roman Abramovich and Mohamed al Fayed have been very generous there - but your sugar daddies are few and far between, so it is very tough for a club like Brentford."

Coun. Ellar - Paddingtonborn but raised on Wearside as his light Durham accent indicates ("I had a London accent when I was three!" he jokes) - says that despite

The reason, he insists, is that the supporters are getting more involved. "Not only me personally, but we as a council have been encouraged by Bees United, because it means the grassroots fans are having a greater say in running their own club. I like that," he continues. everything, he is "quietly confident" that the Bees will eventually be able to relocate to a new stadium. "It will be to everyone's advantage," he insists. "The council has continued to work with the Club over projects like Lionel Road. We have regular meetings, and a lot of the debate is about future development partnerships with us working together.

"We have always had the best interests of the Club at heart, and we are adamant over the provisions of keeping it in a new stadium within the borough. We like to think that over the next few years we will all be able to realise that ambition - but these projects are not easy, and it is a very time-sensitive issue."

The main reason for Coun. Ellar's obvious optimism, though, is the support the Club is getting from its ordinary fans through the Supporters' Trust. "It has become easier dealing with the fans direct through the Trust" he sums it up.

"Thanks to them, the Club has been able to work with us in a sensible way, and I am confident of the future on the business side. From what I have seen, the input from the fans has been a very positive feature and there is now realism at the Club about the financial position.

"Brentford has a good business plan and vision for the future, and I am quite optimistic. I think you can see the potential for a happy ending - although I repeat, it takes a long time and there is nothing as uncertain as football."

"But I see a better, a rosier, future for the Club and its supporters."

Who's who part seven

1932-33 DIVISION THREE (SOUTH)



JOE JAMES (243 league appearances - 2 goals)

Joe James was a one club man whose days at Griffin Park began as an assistant groundsman, a job he was offered after impressing Harry Curtis in a friendly game for the Bees in August 1928. Twelve months later he forsook that role and turned professional, spending the next four years as understudy to first choice centre half Jimmy Bain. Joe was one of the mainstavs of the reserve side that won the London Combination Championship in 1932 and 1933 - the only time in nine years the all conquering Arsenal were deprived of the trophy - a success underpinned by a stupendous home record which saw the stiffs win 43 league games on the trot at Griffin Park. Joe also shaped well in the games he was called upon to cover for Bain, ten in all, and stepped comfortably into his boots when father time caught up with his mentor. The major breakthrough came in October 1933 and from then on until War broke out in September 1939 Joe was absent in only 14 of the 247 league games Brentford contested

, a period which earned him the title of the best uncapped centre half in the country. He went on to play in more than 150 games for Brentford over the next four years, skippering the side to success in the London War Cup Final at Wembley in 1942 with a 2-0 victory against Portsmouth. Joe took his curtain call in a 5-3 defeat at Charlton in February 1944, during which he sustained a broken wrist and decided to call it a day. A definite candidate for Brentford's best team ever.

DUNCAN McKENZIE (154 league appearances, 10 goals)

Duncan started his professional career at Albion Rovers for whom he was an ever present in 1931-32 before Brentford stepped in to pay £350 for his signature. He played centre half for the Second Division side which took the eventual winners Celtic to a replay in the quarter finals of the Scottish Cup that season but soon converted to wing half when he moved south Duncan was limited to 13 league games in his first two seasons on the payroll, by which time Brentford had moved up to the Second Division. He then became an important cog in the team that took the Second Division title in 1934-35 and missed few games as the Bees challenged consistently for top flight honours over the next three seasons. Duncan was suspended for two games in November 1935 after being sent off in the 2-1 defeat at Manchester City. but was an ever present the following season. International honours came his way when he teamed up with Bobby Reid in Scotland's 1-1 draw with Ireland at Aberdeen in November 1937, but despite having a good game by all accounts, he never got the call again. Following a series of poor results in the early part of 1938, Duncan made way for Buster Brown, a move that prompted him to ask for a

transfer. There were a number of takers and soon afterwards he moved to Middlesbrough for £6000. That was not the last his adoring Brentford public saw of him as he returned to make almost 150 guest appearances during the War, the highlight of which was the London War Cup success in 1942. Duncan subsequently emigrated to the USA and for many years lived in San Diego.

ERNIE MUTTITT (92 league appearances, 24 goals)

Ernie cost a bumper fee when signed from Middlesbrough in October 1933 and although ostensibly a left winger he became an important member of the squad for his ability to slot comfortably into a variety of positions. Ernie was one of the "famous five" who moved south from Avresome Park in the early 1930's - Jack Holliday, Billy Scott, Bert Watson and James Mathieson were the others, all of whom made a tremendous impact on Brentford's rise to the top. Muttitt joined Middlesbrough from South Bank in April 1929 and made a dream debut scoring the winner in a 2-1 victory at Arsenal the following November. He went on to play 20 First Division games, but became a victim of the Teesiders embarrassment of riches and when the opportunity arose to join Brentford he didn't need to be asked twice. Despite a long spell of reserve team action which kept him out of the Bees' First Division side from May 1937 - November 1939. Emie chalked up almost one hundred senior appearances and proved his versatility by playing with distinction in forward and defensive positions. He played a further 100 war time games for Brentford and also had the honour of guesting for another eight different clubs .He remained at Griffin Park until 1947 and then joined Dover who at the time were managed by former team mate George Poyser. Emie lived opposite

the ground in Braemar Road from 1942 and after leaving the game became a regular on the terraces for many years.

GEORGE ROBSON (124 league appearances, 32 goals)

George began his career at home town club Newcastle United in May 1925 but unable to break into the first team joined West Ham United two vears later. He made his debut in the final fixture of the 1927-28 campaign, ironically against the Magpies, but made only the occasional appearance before crossing London to Brentford in February 1931. Highlight of his time at Upton Park came when he scored five times in the reserves 13-2 thrashing of Fulham in December 1928. At Brentford he was more noted for a midfield role. but still found the net at an average of a goal every four games, prompting Harry Curtis to offer the view that George was his best ever signing. Praise indeed considering the quality of many of his other dealings in the transfer market. Robson lost his place in the Bees First Division line up soon after the double signing of Dave Richards (Wolves) and Dave McCulloch (Hearts) and in the switch round that followed he was deemed surplus to requirements and allowed to take McCulloch's place at Hearts. George later became a member of West Ham's scouting team, a position he held until 1971.

BILLY SCOTT (274 league appearances, 83 goals) If asked to select likely candidates

for a best ever Brentford side, Billy Scott's name would be one of the first up for consideration. Billy was signed from Middlesbrough in the summer of 1932 in that now famous deal which also involved Jack Holliday and Bert Watson as Brentford set off on the road to the top flight. He had been at Ayresome Park for almost five years but the quality there meant he struggled to make his mark. It was a very different story at Griffin Park as over the next five seasons he missed just five games by which time the Bees were an established First Division outfit and Scott was talked of in terms of England material. After acting as twelfth man for the England v Anglo Scots game at Highbury in May 1935, Billy received the call to arms in the International against Wales in October the following year. It followed a superlative performance in Brentford's 4-0 win against Manchester United seven days earlier when amongst the crowd were England selectors Everton Chairman Mr. Cuff and FA Secretary Stanley Rous, A Welsh side including Brentford's Dai Hopkins and Dave Richards won 2-1 and Scott never played for his country again. The same afternoon Brentford went down 2-0 at Grimsby, only the fourth time Scott had been absent in 178 games. Billy was at the peak of his powers at this time, a newspaper describing him thus: "Scott is essentially a strategist and roamer of the Alex James brand. He engineers the most original moves and by his unorthodoxy is a constant source of worry to the

opposing defence. He is also capable of dribbling the ball at high speed and is one of the cleverest men at evading a tackle, another of his specialities being "snap" goals." An insatiable appetite for work and the fact that he never gave less than 100% certainly endeared him to the fans and if there had been a "Player of the Year " during his time then he would have regularly captured the honour. Billy remained a force until the outbreak of War saw him return to his native North East where he guested with distinction for Hartlepool and Darlington. Hostilities over, he continued to feature in Brentford's plans but father time was catching up with the old warrior and he left the First Division stage following the match against Aston Villa on 1st February 1947, just ten months short of his 40th birthday. Billy had 21 games for Aldershot the next season before serving briefly under George Poyser at Dover.

What's the ground like?

"The ground is undergoing complete renovation. What you can see in the photos is that half of the ground has been renovated or rebuilt and the other half has not. There currently is one huge L shaped stand that extends along the pitch and behind a goal. At the other end there is a very old mainly wooden stand with terracing space below and covered terracing alongside the other side of the pitch. Nowhere in the world have I come across such a contrast of old and new, and I prefer old. Sure, the new stands are good, comfortable and clean, but I could show you 20 other stands and you would not know which ground it was. Whereas if I showed you the old side of the ground you would know instantly. Put simply, another piece of the football fabric character has gone." - *Chris Bushe, www.footballgroundz.co.uk*
