

Youth Team news & fixtures by Jonathan Byrne

here have been mixed fortunes for the Grimsby Town Youth side in recent weeks. Aside from booking their place in the Northern Area Final of the Puma Youth Alliance Cup, the Mariners also went down 3-1 to Doncaster Rovers on Saturday 3 March.

An inexperienced Grimsby side had several regular names missing but battled well against a physically stronger Rovers side: "The best side on the day won," admitted Woods, "we did have six Under-16s playing, which is more than I would ideally like to play in one go. They had a good go at it, and it was great for them to get some time on the pitch."

"Between the older lads we had injuries and illness and as you would expect they were a little bit stronger than us. However, it gave those younger lads the chance to see what pace the game is played at, at that level."

In contrast, Saturday's 2-0 win over Chester City at Blundell Park, leaves the young Mariners just one win away from a major, national final. The goals came from the prolific Andy Taylor, and young substitute Jordan Southwell.

Taylor opened the scoring on 65 minutes, when he was left with a simple chance after a spillage by the visiting goalkeeper. Just minutes later and Town had put the game beyond doubt. Southwell's shot from the edge of the box deceiving the goalkeeper and nestling in the net.

A cautious Woods stated: "I'm pleased with the result, and at the end of the day the main thing in competitions like this is to get through to the next round. I was disappointed with the performance though – we never really got going. We did enough to win the game, but not with the quality that I

would associate with my team."

He continued: "We have had a bit of an illness going through the squad recently, which means that two or three of the players haven't trained much in the last few weeks. Generally it was a below par performance, but we are very pleased to be going through to the next round."

For the Northern Area Final, Woods' charges must travel to Stockport, who currently sit atop the North West Alliance: "They had a good win against Scunthorpe," said Woods, "ideally we would like to have been drawn at home, but hopefully a final will bring the best out in my players – they will need no motivation."

Town's Youth boss also feels that the experience of playing at Blundell Park will have helped his players: "It was good experience on the big pitch for the lads," he concurred, "we noted which players coped with the occasion and where they played, and we will be helping the ones that perhaps didn't out."

Another bit of good news to come out of the Youth setup in the last fortnight is young defender Ryan Bennett signing a two-year professional contract. Bennett, 17, had already been handed a squad number at Blundell Park in the run-up to the January visit to Torquay. Now the former lpswich youngster will be looking to complete a marvellous 12 months with ascension to the first team. Woods feels that Bennett has the credentials to go all the way: "Ryan fully deserves his contract," he declared, "he's been outstanding all season at Reserve and Youth team level and we just hope that he continues progressing at the level he has and we hope it's not too long before he's playing first team football."

Bernard Morley in 1987, he was already Chairman of the Grimsby
Town Supporters Sports & Social Club, at a time when it was far more than just a travel club. It was a thriving organisation, in terms of both the sports and the social and Bernard didn't just have a finger in most of the pies; it was usually both hands.

He was already in his sixties by then, but full of energy and enthusiasm and when the position of manager of the Grimsby Town Supporters Sunday League football team became vacant in 1988, he took that on as well. He wasn't just the manager though; he was the Physio, kit man, half-time drinks maker and chauffeur to half the team at times when we were short on cars to get out to Nettleton. It was amazing how many people you could pack into a car in those days without getting nicked by the police.

Not content with being both chairman and football manager, in April 1989 Bernard took over as travel organiser as well. In many

ways it was the worst committee job of the lot, because people would ring up at all hours to book seats, forgetting that it wasn't his full-time job and that he organised the coaches out of the kindness of his heart and never received a penny for doing it. People frequently let him down as well, by booking and not turning up and then there were the 'cloud cuckoo landers', who would ring up and ask if the £10 fare to a London area destination included a match ticket! His patience must have been sorely tested at times, but he only ever threatened to pack in the job on those rare occasions when passengers had got seriously out of order or damage had been done to a coach, usually on a trip to a derby match when the idiots crawl out of the woodwork and onto the bus. Happily he never carried out his threats.

Bernard tried never to disappoint anyone who wanted to get to an away game, although sometimes there was so little demand for a coach that his trusty Nissan Bluebird made the journey instead. Those car trips could be eventful though and included coming face to face with a double decker bus when we went the wrong way up a one-way street on a rainy night in Hartlepool and even getting lost coming back from a night match at Scunthorpe and finishing up at an abandoned airfield.

The social side of the Supporters Club tailed off, but Bernard continued to organise the travel with as much enthusiasm as ever, right up until the time he became ill. I remember going round to his house last year to pay for some seats for Cardiff on the Saturday after we'd beaten Lincoln. He already had about a dozen coaches full, was

surrounded by piles of coach tickets and the phone never stopped ringing. But with the help of family members, he got the job done and I would imagine that everyone who wanted to go to Wales got a seat on a coach. Most people, including me, couldn't have managed a mammoth task like that at half his age and wouldn't have wanted to, but there he was at eighty years old, still doing the business and always with a smile on his face.


Bernard Morley was someone who got on with everyone, young or old and over the years, thousands of supporters must have crossed his path and enjoyed his company, both home and away. Bernard was liked and respected by all who knew him Of course there were times when someone would step out of line, but he was always ready for it and the sight of an angry Bernard storming down the bus waving his walking stick in a menacing manner was usually enough to encourage improved behaviour. He rarely held a grudge though and the object of his wrath might be banned from the coach for good one week but was invariably back on it the next.

The faces on the coaches were always changing as supporters came and went, but Bernard was a constant, only missing two games in the time I travelled with him, one a cup game at West Ham due to bereavement and the other when he had a hernia operation. Of course, it goes without saying that he was back for the next game.

Bernard will be greatly missed by all who knew him and it is to be hoped that when the new stadium is built, a fitting and permanent tribute to a truly remarkable and wonderful man will be an integral part of it.

n July 2001, Grimsby returned from their unbeaten tour of Scandinavia to face St. Mirren at Blundell Park. The Saints – newly relegated from the SPL to the Scottish First Division – had previously lost 0-2 at Lincoln, and but for poor finishing would have also been well beaten in Cleethorpes.

The 2,416 crowd was perhaps a little disappointing given the inclusion of new £250,000 signing Phil Jevons, only a lack of fitness and bad luck denying him a hat-trick on his home debut. As early as the fifth minute he ran on to a Stacy Coldicott pass with just the keeper to beat, Ludouie Roy choosing to stay upright to force Jevons wide before blocking his shot. A shaven-headed Alan Pouton then lifted the Town fans with a sixty-yard run down the middle of the pitch,

In the run-up to the opening of the new Neighbourhood Study Support Centres, The Mariner took time out to speak to Assistant Study Support Centre Manager Sam Smith and find out about the inner workings of the Study Support Centre. The new centres, which are located in East Marsh and Nunsthorpe, aim to deliver the same aims as the current centre located at Blundell Park, but closer to the heart of the local community.

TM: How did you get started in Study Support?

SS: I was a Primary School teacher and I just seemed to be doing paperwork all the time. I saw an advert and I thought what a wonderful idea to be free of all the constraints and bureaucracy that was becoming increasingly involved in mainstream education. It was a dream job to do some teaching and not be filling in paperwork all the time.

We obviously prepare for the children to come, but we are not over-burdened with assessments and targets. They are important because we have to show evidence that we are offering a service that is valued. It does raise attainment, but in a less formal way and with not so much pressure.

We just enjoy working with the children, and having fun whilst teaching, which is something I think that mainstream education is losing. We have more time to find out who the children are, raise their self-esteem and invest in them.

TM: How important are the smaller class sizes at the Study Support Centre?

SS: They are very important because it means the children get a lot of one-on-one support when it is needed. They don't have to wait for the answers, and our learning mentors are there to encourage to find their own route to the answers.

TM: What are the benefits of one-on-one tutoring?

SS: One-to-one tutoring means we have more time with each specific child and it enables us to find out what makes them work and therefore help them progress. The teachers just don't have time to go to each child individually. We've got to remember that each child is an individual. One of the key points of Study Support Centres is that you have to have a high staff-to-pupils ratio.

TM: Does the Study Support Centre have to strictly stick to the National Curriculum?


SS: We don't have to deliver all the things that the schools have to deliver. We do English, Maths and ICT, but it is more topic focused around football. If you can relate skills to real life then the children will value them more, and that's what it's all about.

Educational demands are really forced on the children, which limits their progression. They are forced more to do English, Maths, ICT and performance tests, instead of learning for learning's sake.

The structured way that schools have to operate, no longer meets the needs of the consumer, which are the children. They need something that is more stimulating and relaxed in order to learn more.

TM: Is it fair to say that football really is a universal language?

SS: Yes, football does inspire and motivate the

children to learn. We look at all those types of things, not just the game itself, but supporting each other, working as a team - the team spirit. I think society needs to look at because we are losing those types of values. Football media is probably one of the areas that is retaining it.

In schools now they are not allowed to play competitive sports because it's seen not to help children's self esteem. However I think that a little bit of competitive sport gives them more motivation to learn.

TM: Do the children have to be interested in football to enjoy the benefits?

SS: They don't even have to be interested in football. We do other activities as well, not all based around football, but the ideas of team building, self esteem, motivation, transferable skills that they can take back into the classroom. They can play games and have fun together and it proves that learning can be fun.

TM: How hard is it to find the balance between fun and learning?

SS: The key is finding that fine line between learning and fun. We're not a Youth club; we're not there just to play games. We look at strategies and how much everyone enjoys being involved and being together. We encourage team spirit and cheering each other on. They may be playing games, but they are learning as well.

TM: Why do you think the Grimsby Town Study Support Centre has been so successful?




SS: The staff - the learning mentors and the whole ethos it creates - that's the most important thing. It's a safe working environment and the atmosphere is its main strength.


TM: What are your thoughts on the expansion of the Study Support Centre?

SS: It's positive, it shows that this centre is doing its job and to open two satellite centres shows we are making a difference. We were looking at a three-year rotation for schools to use our service and we felt that was ridiculous.

It is testimony to Oliver (Cowling) our Study Support Centre Manager that he has sought funding for two other centres so that we don't have to go through that three-year rotation - we can now see children in the daytime, weekends, evenings, whenever really.







ntil recently referees have not been encouraged to get themselves a high profile by putting themselves forward to be interviewed by the press. Now all of a sudden we regularly hear that referees have given a view on contentious decisions to explain what they did and more usually what they didn't do something.

Hecently Graham Poll provided imple evidence as to why this hasn't been encouraged when he gave as his reason for not giving a penalty that he was busy looking at the feet rather than the body. Not surprisingly Poll has been ridiculed in some quarters and in truth he must be wishing he'd given his answer a little more thought before he made the statement. In reality the referee cannot win. We often make

mistakes but mistakes that are genuine rather than malicious. However it is these that get noticed and attract the questions rather than the excellent decision that goes unnoticed. One side will agree and the other will disagree and no matter how sensible the referee's decision sounds they will never agree so we must be careful not to take it down a dead end which will only end in tears or a yellow card for Dissent.


In Poll's case his statement that he could only see half the player's body raises the age-old issue of the best position. As a player we would expect to be where the ball is so that we are in a position to make a challenge for the ball but if the referee is so close the danger is that we cannot see what is happening. The referee has to adopt a wide field of vision and this can cover as much as 100 yards at its

widest and within that an incident right at his feet is very difficult to spot. This encompasses the distance starting where the ball has come from right through to where it is going via where it is now. It doesn't take much imagination to realise that if we are too close to the action not only do we have to ball watch so as not to get in the way but we are too close to where the ball is now and to spot any incidents.

So there were two lessons for aspiring referees. Think about your position as a referee and not as a player and don't get into discussions you can't win. That is not to say that we become aloof and distant from players. A polite enquiry and a polite but brief explanation can avert dissent but we need to read the situation and if a player is gunning for a fight or an argument then we should steer well clear of trouble.

"It's gone really well for me," admitted Ciaran, "I came in for the Walsall game and I was a bit surprised to receive the opportunity because I hadn't been involved a lot before that. I thought I did well and I've taken it on from there."

The former Lincoln midfielder admits that patience and hard work was the key over the winter months: "I've been patient for my opportunity." he stated, "and obviously I've shown the manager what I am capable of. It just seems to have got better and better for me."

Toner had another good spell earlier in the season, under previous manager Graham Rodger, and feels an untimely injury was his downfall, when the new regime took the reigns in early-November: "The unfortunate

thing for me was that when the new manager (Alan Buckley) came in I missed a week's training. It's always difficult because everybody starts with a clean slate really. It was a case of a missed week, and people coming in and doing well."

He continued: "These things happen in football all the time, it is just a case of keeping going and working hard. I feel my attitude has always been spot on, it's not a case of throwing my head up or sulking, it's a case of doing it for yourself. I feel I've been working hard, and it's about keeping yourself right, because when the opportunity comes you've got to be ready."

Toner has not always been known as a left winger, but any new Town fans visiting Blundell Park in the past few weeks can be forgiven for thinking that he's played his whole career there: "I've spoke about positions before, but I'm just happy to be playing. The more games I've had out there, the more comfortable I've become. I suppose being comfortable with both feet helps a lot and it gives you different options in the areas you get into."

He went on: "I've been really pleased with what I have done and I think it's gone really well for me. I'm happy that I'm a part of a good run that we are having at the minute."

With seven goals to his name already this season. Toner is in the running to be the Mariners' top scorer for this campaign - he admits that he is pleased with his return so far: "I think that it is a pretty good return from midfield," he stated.

Toner's goals have been of the spectacular variety in recent weeks, as he looks to take a clear lead in the Goal of the Season stakes: "I've had a few penalties, and not necessarily tap-ins, but I've been fortunate that the one or two chances a game I have been getting have gone in."

"It's the same for any footballer that the higher you go up the more clinical you've got to be. It's very pleasing for me to get a few goals, and hopefully I'll have a few more by the end of the season."

After a terrible run in late December/early January, the Mariners have strung together several good wins of late, and have their eyes set on a top half finish. Ciaran discussed the upturn in the Mariners' form: "I don't think it's a different approach. I think you just get to a point where you sit down and realise what situation you are in, you say to yourself 'are we going to go to the end of the season and go down without a whimper, or are we going to kick ourselves up the backside?' We've rode our luck sometimes and it shows that sometimes that it what you need.

He continued: "Last Saturday's win (at Hereford) showed we can grind out a result. It was a difficult pitch, not a good surface, but it is testament to our attitude that we got a good, battling result. That's the significant change - previously

If we had gone 1-0 down we would have really struggled to get back in the game - we are more resolute, and when we win, we tend to get a few on the bounce."

With two Northern Ireland caps to his name, Ciaran admits that a recall isn't in his thoughts at the minute: "I don't really think about It to be honest. First and foremost is Grimsby Town and I need to be thinking about playing consistently well. I'm not expecting to feature because I'm no different a player than I was before, and there are a lot of good players coming into the Northern Ireland setup. Of course it would be nice if it happened, but it's not going to bother me if it doesn't."

With Ciaran's current deal expiring in the summer he is hopeful that he has done enough to convince manager Alan Buckley to extend his contract in the summer: "I've not heard anything off the club yet," he revealed. "but at the moment I suppose we are not mathematically safe. We've had a great run, and you might say we are realistically safe, but you can never tell."

He concluded: "When the club are not sure on their position then I can understand that they don't want to commit themselves to anything. I'll just keep playing and wait and see. Things like this usually take care of themselves, and if you are playing well then you will get the rewards - but we will just have to wait and see."

WEMBLEY WINNER

Former Grimsby midfielder Steve Foley featured in Swindon Town's 1989-90 Second Division play-off final triumph at Wembley, only for the Robins to be denied their place in the top-flight after an illegal payments scandal. Moving to Blundell Park from Fulham in August 1984, he scored twice in 31 Second Division games for Grimsby prior to joining Sheffield United in August 1985. He joined Swindon in June 1987 and netted 23 goals in 151 League outings before reuniting with Lou Macari for £50,000 in January 1992.

LEADING MARKSMAN

One-time Swindon Town inside-left Ralph Hunt was Grimsby Town's leading marksman in 1959-60. Moving to Blundell Park from Derby County for £2,000 in July 1959, he formed a lethal striking partnership with Ron Rafferty and scored 39 times in 53 Second

Division games for the Mariners prior to joining Swindon in an exchange deal involving Welsh U-23 international Freddie Jones in July 1961. He netted 13 goals in 21 League outings for today's opponents before being sold to Port Vale for £3,200 in December 1961.

IN SAFE KEEPING

Swindon Town's former loan goalkeeper Paul Crichton (pictured above for Town against Chelsea in the FA Cup) was ever-present for Grimsby Town in 1993-94. Moving to Swindon on loan from Nottingham Forest in December 1987, he made four Second Division appearances as cover for Fraser Digby while at the County Ground. He joined Grimsby in July 1993 and played 133 First Division games before following Alan Buckley to West Brom for £250,000 in September 1996. Fellow keeper Norman Oakley moved from Swindon to Grimsby in September 1966, making 15 League appearances for the Mariners.

PROMOTION SUCCESS

Former Swindon Town outside-left Freddie Jones featured prominently in Grimsby's 1961-62 promotion success. Moving to the County Ground from Brighton for £2,000 in December 1960, he gained Welsh U-23 international recognition and scored once in 18 Third Division games for Swindon prior to joining Grimsby in an exchange deal involving Ralph Hunt in June 1961. He created numerous goalscoring opportunities for Ron Rafferty and netted nine times in 58 League outings for the Mariners before being sold to Reading for £3,000 in July 1963.

ENGLAND INTERNATIONAL

England international midfielder Neil Webb (inset) played for both Swindon Town and Grimsby Town during his illustrious career. Capped 26 times by his country, he moved to Swindon on loan from Nottingham Forest in October 1994 and made six consecutive First Division appearances while at the County Ground. He briefly reunited with his former Forest teammate Brian Laws at Grimsby on a noncontract basis in August 1996 and played four First Division games for the Mariners prior to joining Aldershot Town two months later.

TITLE TRIUMPH

Former Grimsby inside-forward John Burkinshaw featured in Swindon Town's 1910-11 Southern League title triumph. Moving to Blundell Park from Kilnhurst Town in February 1908, he scored three times in five Second Division games for Grimsby prior to joining Rotherham County in May 1909. He joined Swindon in June 1910 and netted 15 goals in 45 Southern League outings before moving to Sheffield Wednesday in June 1913. Ex-Mariners Alf Dean, Billy Reynolds and legendary manager Herbert Chapman also played for Swindon in the Southern League.



ormer Scottish Under-21 International Lee Peacock joined Swindon Town on 20th January 2006 on a free transfer from Wheffield Wednesday. Peacock is a striker of some repute in the Football League, and he is known to use his height and strength to great effect. Having scored well over 100 goals in his career, League Two defences will know they have been in a game when they step onto the field with the former Manchester City striker.

The experienced frontman started his career at Carlisle United as a trainee, and came into his own during the 1996/97 season, when a free scoring Cumbrians side won promotion to Division Two. Peacock was part of a striking line that included future Premiership stars Matt lansen and Allan Smart, and he weighed in with ten goals during the campaign, and also picked up an Auto Windscreens Shield modal for his part in Carlisle's dramatic conalty shootout win over Colchester in 1997

United struggled with the higher division though, and after scoring 11 goals in 52 appearances he made the switch to Mansfield Town in October 1997 for £75,000. Peacock initially took time to settle at Field Mill, but in his second season with the Stags he hit the ground running, amassing 19 goals in Division Three, including a hat trick in a 5-0 demolition of Barnet on 20 November

Peacock continued his good form into the 1999/2000 season, including scoring the winner in a League Cup First Round Second Leg tie against Nottingham Forest. It came as no surprise to learn that the scouts were flocking to Field Mill to see the Paisley-born striker in action.

Manchester City won the race for his signature, paying £500,000 for the player, but Peacock found a lot of competition at Maine Road, although he did play in City's 2-1 win over the Mariners on 28 December

After City's subsequent promotion to the Premiership, Peacock was sold to Bristol City for a fee of £600,000 where he regained his scoring form, with 15 goals in his first season with the Robins. The following four seasons would see Lee hit the 15-goal mark, and often surpass that, but City seemed destined not to win promotion from Division Two, especially after a heartbreaking Play-Off Semi-Final defeat to Cardiff in 2002/03, and a Football League Trophy win over former club Carlisle in the same season proved to be little consolation.

Perhaps the time had come for a change of scenery, and Peacock moved from Ashton Gate in the summer of 2004, moving north to Hillsborough, home of Sheffield Wednesday. Although not reaching the prolific levels of his time with the Owls, he more than played a part in their Play-Off success of 2004/05.


Obviously inspired by the disappointment suffered at Bristol City, Peacock returned to form for the end of season bonanza, and scored the all-important first goal in the away leg of the semi final against Brentford, a goal that put the South Yorkshire side with in real touching distance of the Millennium Stadium.

As Sheffield Wednesday acclimatised themselves back to life in the Championship, Peacock found himself amongst the goals, but was surprisingly allowed to leave on a free transfer in January 2006, joining Swindon in their fight against relegation from League One.

In truth, problems off the field at the County Ground probably proved to be the Robins' downfall, and they ultimately succumbed to the drop. There was a clean sweep at the club in the summer though, and the managerial team of Dennis Wise and Gus Poyet brought with them fresh ideas and impetus.

Results on the pitch showed an upturn as well, just two defeats in their opening 15 League games, saw Swindon up amongst the early challengers. Peacock was again amongst the goals - the winner on the opening day at Hartlepool, a brace against Chester, and a goal in the corresponding fixture at the County Ground, as the Mariners were defeated 3-0.

With nine goals already this season, Lee, not unlike his side, is playing some of the most consistent football of his career. In his Paul Sturrock, Peacock has a manager that he is familiar with, and who knows what it takes to get a team out of this division. Sturrock also believes that Peacock could be transformed into a defender or midfielder, with the player himself also keen on a positional switch. However for the time being, the tall, athletic striker is just concerned with firing more goals to confirm Swindon's position in the top three come







Ifil has enjoyed a solid first half of the campaign. benefiting from the experienced Ady Williams alongside him at the heart of the defence.

ADY WILLIAMS

Named on-field captain by former manager Dennis Wise in mid-July, Ady Williams brings with him a wealth of football experience.

Signed from Coventry City in pre-season, the former Welsh International boasts successful spells with Wolves and Reading on his CV and has just the credentials that could set Town on their way to League Two success this term.

His leadership skills have been there for all to see during the first half of the campaign and his determined attitude has been at the forefront of Town's promotion challenge.

'Pooky' signed a professional contract ahead of the 2005-6 season and was a consistent performer for the youth team and reserves prior to joining the professional ranks.

With a keen eye

for goal, Pook's best effort to date is a 25-yard thunderbolt in the Carling Cup First Flound against Wycombe Wanderens.

An energetic 'box-to-box' midfielder, Pook is now very much part of the first team squard and has now made over 50 appearances at senior level.

CURTIS WESTON

Another summer signing, Weston joined from Milhvall where he became the youngest ever FA Cup finalist ever at 17 years and 119 days, coming on to replace Dennis Wise in the 2004 final against Manchester United.

A busy midfielder who likes to get amongst the goals, Weston has impressed with combative central displays, showing pace, aggression in the tackle and awareness. The 19-year old has been in outstanding form so far this term.

STRIKERS

CHRISTIAN ROBERTS

Cardiff-born striker who joined Town in October 2004 in a £50,000 switch from local rivals Bristol City. He is an aggressive runner and will add much needed pace to the Swindon frontline. Formerly with Exeter City where he scored 18 goals in 67 league starts for the Grecians from 2000 – 2002.

With six goals in 22 starts for the Robins so far, Roberts will be keen to play a big part in Town's 2006-7 campaign and his appointment as Vice-Captain seems to have invigorated the frontman who scored two against Carlisle United in the FA Cup First Round in November.

LUKAS JUTKIEWICZ



'A boy in a man's frame' is how manager Paul Sturrock described the powerful striker, and few would disagree.

Southamptonborn, 17-year old Jutkiewicz spent time with The Saints

before joining Swindon's Centre of Excellence and won the Golden Boot Award at the Milk Cup in 2004.

He then made his senior debut off the bench at Swansea City towards the end of the 2005-6 season and scored three goals in Town's preseason campaign and after impressing over the Christmas period alongside Lee Peacock, is now very much part of the first team picture.

WITH SWANNY FROM THE PONNY

t was with great sadness that the death of Bernard Morley on Monday 5 March was announced last week and no one who follows GTFC needs any introductory preamble from me to describe the man whom Macca so aptly dubbed "a lovely fella and in many respects Mr Grimsby Town".

A trawler was late and the owners called on the A Team" – they always worked together to unload the catch. Both told me they had the time of their lives shooting the breeze and acking the fish in ice throughout the long feezing night just to enable them to watch lown's home game the following day. A simple story but it encapsulates many of the semendous timeless qualities for which lenard stood throughout a long and wonderful life; honesty, endeavour, team work, friendship, making the most of difficult ocurristances and of course unstinting apport for his beloved Grimsby Town.

He worked for many years for the FMA and though not a big man physically (he was in every other way which matters) his wiry frame could lift 9st cases of fish with ease and his habit of cutting the sleeves from his work clothes revealed, in his prime, forearms the size of Popeye's. My efforts as one of the committee members of the Away Travel Club of which Bernard was chairman for 20 years, taking all bookings and organising at least one coach to every away game in that time, brought me closer to the man who recommended players to the club, served on the ground's safety committee and yet who was known to generations of fans whom he introduced to the Mighty Mariners as simply Bernard or Bern.

He was a great communicator and he was at ease with everyone from the young fan who, after nervously boarding the bus for his first away game would soon be smiling and relaxed after a chat with Bernard, to ex-England Manager Sir Bobby Robson of whom Bernard and former Town director Tommy Wilkinson were guests at a game at Ipswich. Sir Bobby's primary concern was that Bernard hadn't forgotten the distinguished manager's Grimsby haddock; he hadn't of course, Bernard never forgot anything of importance to others.

Humour was an ever present quality through his anecdotes and jokes and at the next of this his last seeson

his reply to the question on our membership form "Age" was simply "unknown". His trademark walking stick was in later years. Bernard's sceptre, his symbol of authority as chairman. A couple of years ago in bad weather the coach door kept opening en route and to acke. Janice from standing and holding down the switch Bernard who loved singing – he was known to us in his pork pie hat as "Bing" (have you ever noticed that he and Bing Crosby were never seen in the same room together – I think we should be told the truth) – simply reached out and held down the switch with his stick as he lurbly sang "When I'm Clearing Windows".

As our members know however virtually all of our away trips run very smoothly as the photographs that accompany this article illustrate – a wonderful pre-season tour of Ireland, which the Away Travel Club organised in 1999 at the luxury Beech Hill Country House Hotel in Londonderry. I am grateful that the games preceding and following Bernard's death were victories against Bury and last week, at Hereford where in tribute, 850 or so Town fans sang with genuine sprrow and affection "There's only one Bernard Morley". How right they were and though with Bernard they broke the mould his legacy will be not only the generations of Town fans whom he introduced to his beloved GTFC and for whom he provided away travel facilities for many years, but also his warmth, generosity, kindness and the deep and abiding affection with which he will always be remembered. We have all lost a true and loyal friend and an absolute gentleman in all respects and I urge you all to get behind the boys in his memory as we welcome Swindon and their fans to BP today. Rest well my dear friend and as you encouraged all Town fans for more than 80 vears - UTM!






