I'm looking forward to the game and so are the players so get behind them tonight and let's keep things going in the right direction.

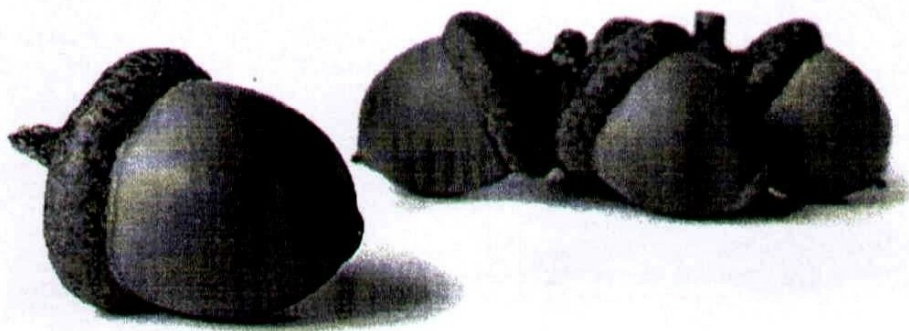

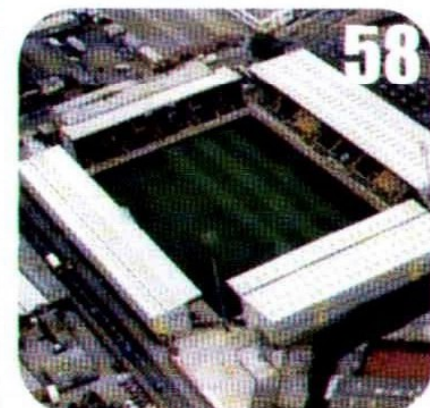
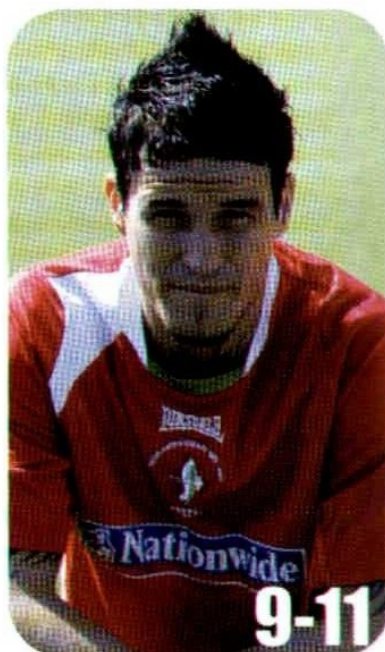

I'd like to start my notes this week by thanking you all for your tremendous support since I took over as manager of the club.

Not only have I received a plethora of letters since my appointment, but your support for each and every game has been magnificent and I cannot thank you enough for this.

I can't emphasise how important your vocal support is to those players out there on a Saturday afternoon. It has been a bit rough at times this season and you have quite rightly voiced your concerns about this, but now you are 100% behind the lads again and that feeds the players with energy and enthusiasm. It also frees them from anxiety and fear and allows them to express themselves in the right way; they can be creative and do their jobs because they know they have your support.

Looking back to last weekend we have to be pleased with the 1-1 draw at Walsall, despite conceding late on. We went there with the full intention to win the game and I believe the manner of our performance suggested that. We created a tempo that realistically only teams at the top can match and we were just unlucky to concede so late on.

Despite this you have to give real credit to the players for a resolute performance against a side that are quite rightly top of the league. They weren't intimidated or frightened by the prospect of going to Walsall and although they'll feel hard done by with the goal in the last minute, they should be proud, as I told them after the final whistle.

The trip to the Midlands followed the excellent 5-0 win over MK Dons in our last home game and we have to be pleased with four points from the last couple of matches. We are now looking at catching Bury, the next team above us in the league and taking their place in the table. We are certainly starting to look up the league once again now and I am acutely aware of just how important it is to bridge the points' gap with our local rivals.

We were bitterly disappointed to lose Kelvin Etuhu during the game against Walsall through

injury and it looks likely to be a serious one. As I write these notes I am not yet fully aware as to the extent of the injury, but no matter what the outcome Kelvin has been a big hit at our club and I hope he's enjoyed being here as much as we've enjoyed watching him play.

I'd like to welcome everyone from Swindon Town to Spotland and I expect it to be another tough game for us today. Swindon are fighting for one of the automatic promotion positions, like MK Dons and Walsall, and they will be looking to bounce back from defeat last Saturday. Obviously they beat us earlier in the season,

but we'll be looking for revenge today and it has all the ingredients of being an exciting encounter.

The fighting spirit we have in the camp is probably the best it has been and it's important to keep that going. Performances of late have been very good and with confidence in the camp high, it means we go into every game at present knowing we can win. This can only be a good thing and come the final whistle today our visitors will know they have been in a tough encounter.

During the course of last week the club was able to announce the signatures of both Nathan Stanton and Gary Jones on extended contracts. It goes without saying that both these players are vital to the welfare of the team and I was delighted that they agreed to extend their stays with us.

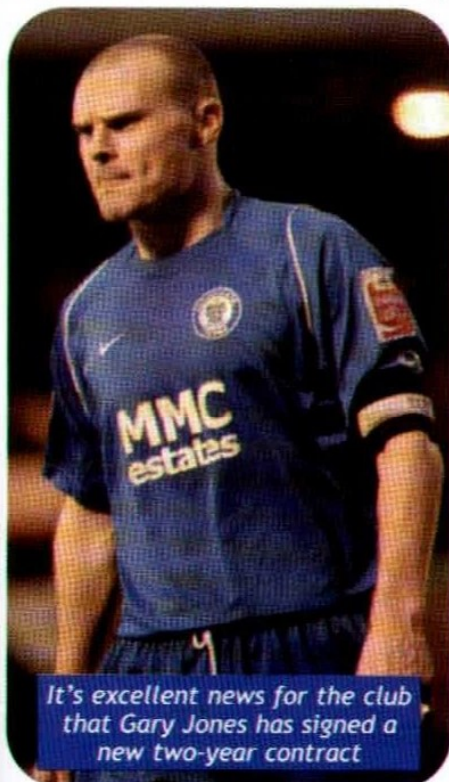

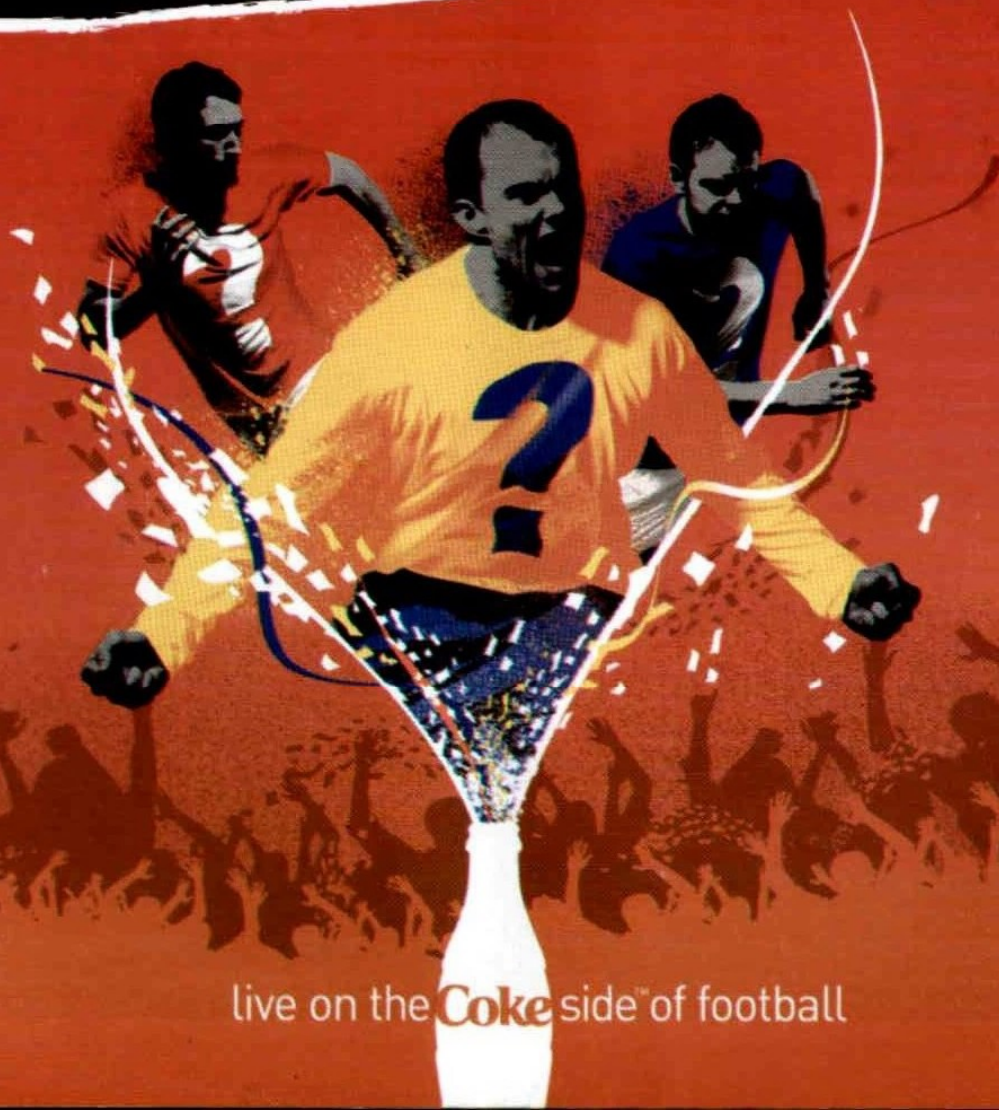

A FAMILIAR face came back to haunt Swindon Town last Saturday, ending their unbeaten league start to 2007.

Hartlepool striker Andy Monkhouse, who left the County Ground for the North-East last month, headed the game's only goal four minutes into the second half to inflict Town's first league defeat since they went down 2-1 at Macclesfield on 23rd December.

The loss also ended an unbeaten home run stretching back to the first weekend in November when Hereford won 2-1 at the County Ground.

Nevertheless, our visitors are still well-placed for an immediate return to League One, standing in second place at kick-off today.

Although Walsall's injury-time leveller against Dale last weekend meant Swindon now trail the leaders by four points, the Robins hold a two-point advantage over MK Dons, who occupy the first play-off slot.

Town have enjoyed a very consistent season, despite having the pressure of being the bookies title favourites hanging over them.

They have also maintained their assault on promotion in spite of the managerial upheaval that saw Dennis Wise and Gus Poyet execute a clause in their contracts to join Championship side Leeds United in October.

The directors didn't hang around when Wise and Poyet departed for Elland Road and very quickly installed Paul Sturrock in the County Ground hot seat, the former Scottish international becoming available after his dismissal by Sheffield Wednesday.

Mr Sturrock was naturally disappointed by last Saturday's events, but decided to take a philosophical view on where it left his team's season.

"We created chances, but didn't score; that's the end of the story," he said. "All good runs must come to an end and I'm sure we will lose a few more games before the season is out.

"We have to get back on the training ground and knuckle down. We need to move on and make sure we are ready for Rochdale."



Robins Squad Check

GOALKEEPER **Phil Smith** has held down his place in the starting eleven since making his league debut in mid-October. The 27-year old arrived at the County Ground from Crawley last summer having played for Margate earlier in his career.

Smith got his chance in the first team when 6' 7" **Peter Brezovan** suffered an injury in the home game with Grimsby in October. The giant Czech, who saved two penalties on his Town debut, is likely to be out of action until the closing stages of the season.

Third-choice custodian **Jon Stewart** joined our visitors in the summer of 2005, but has only been on the bench on a couple of occasions.

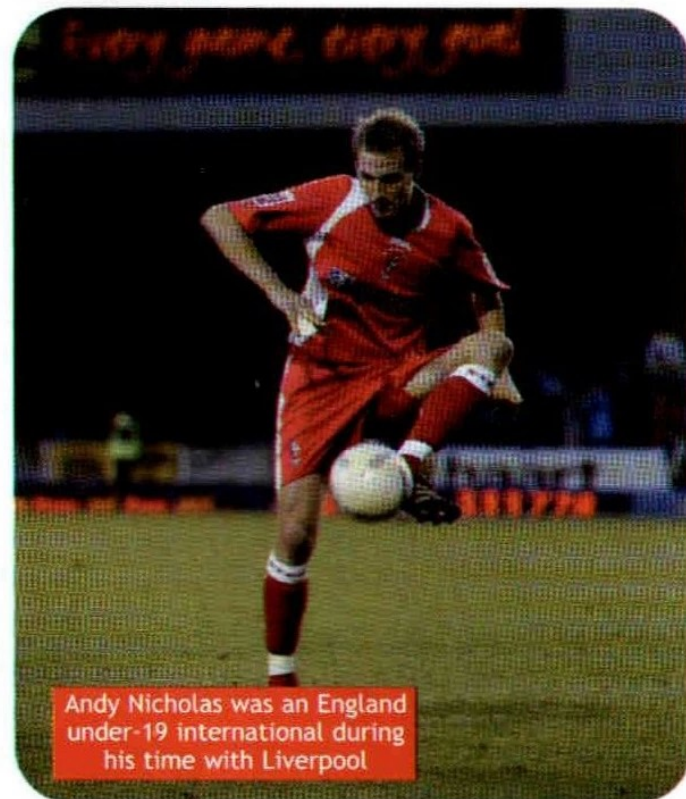
The full-back slots were occupied by **Jack Smith** and **Andy Nicholas** against Hartlepool last weekend.

Smith has been a regular in the Robins' side since moving from Watford in July 2005. Aged 23, he opened his scoring account for the club with a penalty against MK Dons in September.

Nicholas is one of Swindon's longest-serving players, having joined them from Liverpool in July 2003. Also aged 23, he has now clocked-up over 100 league games for the club, although he did have a loan spell with Chester at the end of the 2004/05 campaign.

Ady Williams and **Jerel Ifil** are likely to feature in central defence this afternoon.

Team captain Williams has a wealth of experience from over 500 club appearances and 13 caps for Wales.

The 35-year old started out with Reading in the late-1980s for what was the first of four separate career spells with the Royals. He left them for Wolves in July 1996, but returned on loan to the Madejski Stadium twice in the next four years, before making the move permanent in the summer of 2000.

In November 2004 Williams linked-up with Coventry, before joining Swindon last August.

Ifil is in his third full season with our visitors after three successful loan spells in Wiltshire. Aged 24, he began his career as a trainee at Watford.

Jamie Vincent is an experienced left-back who arrived at the County Ground in August. The 31-year old can name the likes of Crystal Palace, Portsmouth and Derby amongst his former employers in a career in which he has fetched over £1.3 million in transfer fees.

Paul Sturrock's defensive options are completed by **Patrick Noubissie**, a French right-back who was signed on transfer deadline day after impressing the manager during a trial spell.

Michael Pook and **Ricky Shakes** have been regulars in Town's midfield in recent weeks.

20-year old Pook is in his second season as a professional after progressing through the ranks at the County Ground, while Shakes (22) joined our visitors from Bolton in July 2005 in the deal which also saw Dale's Charlie Comyn-Platt move to Wiltshire.

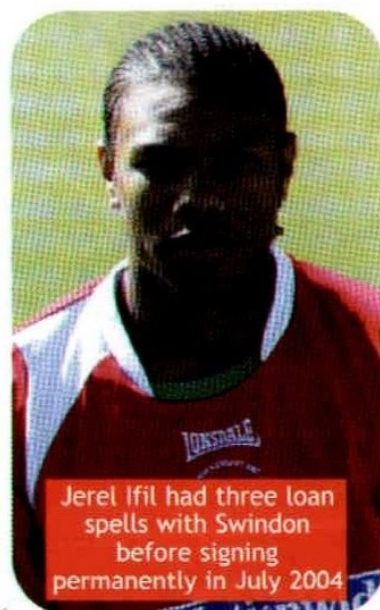
Sofiene Zaaboub and **Michael Timlin** were also in midfield action against Hartlepool last Saturday.

Zaaboub was Paul Sturrock's first signing for the Robins in November, making his debut against Carlisle in the FA Cup. Previously on trial at Sheffield Wednesday, his previous clubs include French outfit St Etienne.

Timlin is on loan at the County Ground from Fulham. A former Republic of Ireland under-21 international, he also went out on loan to Scunthorpe and Doncaster last season.

Former Millwall player **Curtis Weston** became the youngest-ever FA Cup finalist when he appeared as a substitute against Manchester United in 2004, replacing Dennis Wise, who signed him for Swindon last summer.

He was on the bench last weekend, as was **Aaron Brown**, a

26-year old who played over 190 times for Bristol City earlier in his career before several loan spells with basement division clubs.

Paul Evans missed one of Swindon's two penalties against Dale in August, some nine years after he had put one past Lance Key for his first club, Shrewsbury Town. Now aged 32, the ex-Welsh international left Gay Meadow in March 1999 and has since enjoyed spells with the likes of Brentford, Bradford and Nottingham Forest.

One-time Crewe trainee **Gareth Whalley** has struggled with injury since moving to Wiltshire from Wigan in July 2005, while 18-year old **Ben Wells** is still waiting for his first senior start after progressing from the Robins' Centre of Excellence.

Another player still waiting to start a game for our visitors is former Dale striker **Blair Sturrock**. The 25-year old has come off the bench to score twice for Town in the last three games, adding to the six goals he hit for Dale last season.

The son of Swindon's manager, Blair has also played league football for Plymouth and Kidderminster.

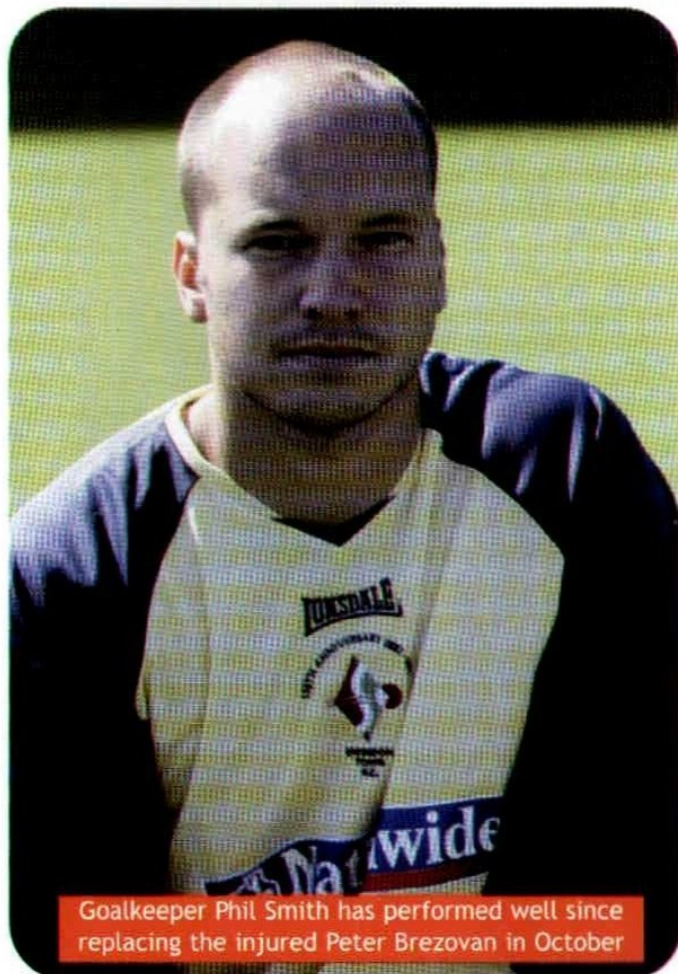
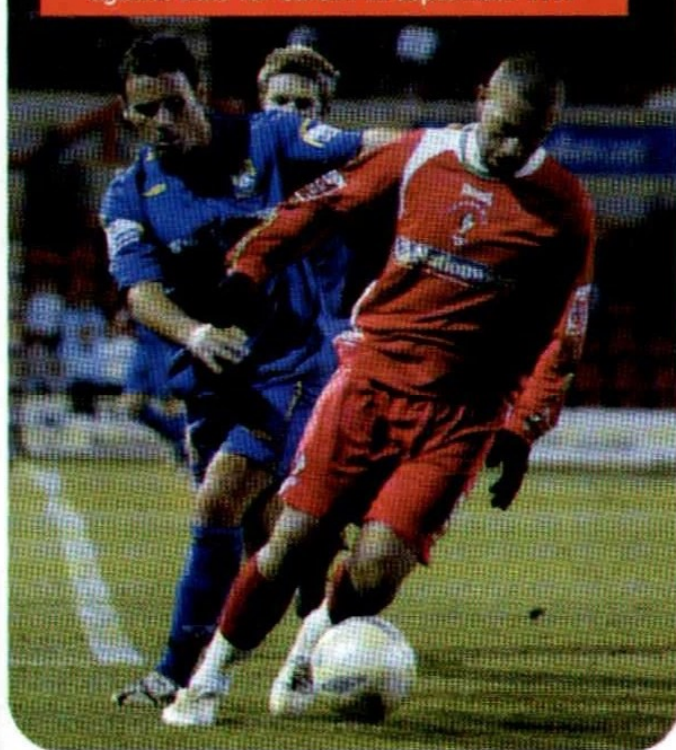
The experienced duo of **Christian Roberts** and **Lee Peacock** have held the fort up front for most of the season.

Roberts, the first penalty culprit against Dale six months ago, was a £50,000 signing from Bristol City in March 2004. Aged 27, he began his career with home town club Cardiff, before linking-up with Exeter.

Peacock has hit 111 league goals since starting out at Carlisle in 1995. The 30-year old then played under Steve Parkin at Mansfield, before spells with Manchester City, Bristol City and Sheffield Wednesday.

17-year old **Lukas Jutkiewicz** was a junior with Southampton before joining Swindon's Centre of Excellence, while **Andy Caton**, the son of the late Manchester City defender Tommy Caton, has mainly been used as a substitute since joining the Robins from non-league football in June 2004.

ROCHDALE manager Keith Hill takes us on an alphabetical journey through his life and his career ...

AMBITIONS ... *What are yours for the immediate future and in the long-term?* Just to be the best coach I could possibly be; not just for me, but for those I'm coaching. Long term? I don't make plans, I never have. I don't plan on where I go on holiday or what I'm doing next Saturday night. I am a spur of the moment person, so I couldn't tell you long term.

BOOTS ... *What boots do you wear?* I wear Nike Legends because Eric Cantona wore them. He was a legend in my eyes and if they were good enough for him then they are good enough for me.

COMEDIAN ... *Who is your favourite comedian?* David Flitcroft - the guy is a laugh-a-minute. He's high tempo, upbeat and he just fills the place with energy. He makes

you laugh and it always a happy place when he's around.

DREAM ... *What is your footballing dream?* My dream was always to be a Premiership footballer, but sadly I never quite made it. I never had the opportunity to get there and that is why I'm so determined to succeed as a coach.

EXPERIENCE ... *What is the best feeling you've felt on the field during your career?* I won promotion a couple of times, but never had that feeling of euphoria on the pitch when it was actually confirmed. I seemed to always miss out on those games. Perhaps the best feeling is scoring a goal because they were always unexpected coming from a defender. They always give you that rush and that is the best feeling you can have.

FRICTION ... *Who is the most annoying opponent you have ever faced?* Leo Fortune-West. We always had battles from our first game against each other when I was at Plymouth and he was at Gillingham. He broke my nose on that first occasion with a flying elbow and ever since then we had battles; annoying battles, banter battles, aggressive battles, you name it, we had them.

GOAL ... *What is the best goal you have ever scored in your career?* The best goal I scored was for Rochdale against Macclesfield Town at Spotland in September 1997. We won 2-0 and I scored a 25-yard volley with my red boots on. It was from a knock-down by Mark Leonard and it hit the back of the net before the goalkeeper moved.

HOLIDAY ... *Where was your last holiday?* I spent the summer on holiday in America with one of my daughters because my other daughter was sitting her exams and she stayed at home with her mum. We went to see my Dad in New Jersey for three weeks.

IDOL ... *Who is your footballing idol?* I have two if that is okay. Eric Cantona, who I mentioned earlier, and Roy Keane. Everything creative and skill-wise Cantona did, Keane backed it up with tenacity and aggression. If you had two players of that ilk in your side then you couldn't fail.

JOKER ... *Who is the joker in the changing room?* John Doolan. He always gets me with a one-liner when I switch off and he finds it particularly funny.

KIT ... *What's the best kit you have ever worn?* Has to be the Asics stuff at Blackburn. It was the first season they were sponsors and they threw everything at us in terms of kit.

LOWEST MOMENT ... *What has been the lowest moment of your career so far?* Without doubt the day we didn't get that result at Plymouth (above right) on the final day of season 2000/01. It really hit me hard; the very heart of a very good squad was ripped out that day and that hurt like hell.





MUSIC ... *What type of music are you into?* I like every kind of music, it plays a big part in my life. Every weekend myself and my wife spend much of our free time listening to music and we are always getting the latest albums, right through to the more obscure bands.

NUMPTY ... *Who is the least intelligent player you have played with?* Academically, Mark Monington (pictured), without a doubt, but not in a footballing sense.



OWN GOAL ... *When did you last score an own goal and who was it against?* I have scored many, but I remember when I was at Plymouth I had been left out of the side by Neil Warnock for three or four games. Things weren't going too well and he said he was going to put me back in the team.

I was confident we were going to win so I went to the bookies at a time when you could bet and asked him how much for us to win 3-1. He gave me 11/1 so I put £10 on it.

We did win 3-1, but I scored an own goal and the next day when I went to pick my winnings up the bookie wasn't happy! He knew me and knew I'd scored the own goal and at first he refused to pay me, but with a smile on his face he did hand



over the money.

PROFESSION ... *What would you be if you weren't a footballer?* I don't know what I'd have done, but whatever it would have been I'd have put 100% into it. I never do things without putting 100% in; it's not worth doing if that is the case.

QUALITIES ... *What are your best individual qualities?* Loyalty is perhaps something I'd put in that category. I have a small group of friends who I'm very loyal to and of course my family. I have always been a family person; I'm very loyal to them and they are very loyal to me.

REFEREE ... *Who is the best referee you have ever had?* Never remember them.

STADIUM ... *What is the best stadium you have played at?* Elland Road (pictured) in front a packed house against Leeds United. I was 19-years old and captain of Blackburn and we came away with a 1-1 draw. It was a result we fully deserved and I was representing Blackburn as captain and shaking hands with Gordon Strachan, who was one of my heroes.



TEAM ... *Which team did you support as a child?* My dad gave me a football he'd won in a pub raffle that had all the Manchester United signatures and from that moment I was a United fan. I loved them from that day and I love the way they play. Sadly we didn't have a lot of money when we were growing up and I ended up using the ball on the streets. It would have been worth a fortune now.

UNLIKELY ... *Who is the most unlikely player in our team to score an overhead kick?* Jack the Kitman!

VEHICLE ... *What vehicle do you drive?* Because my wife and children enjoy horses, we have a box to ferry them to events, so we have a Cherokee Jeep.

WORLD'S BEST PLAYER ... *Who do you think is the best player in the world?* Paul Scholes (pictured) for me. I love him even though he is a couple of years past his best. He is no big time Charlie; he's down-to-earth and his football over the years has been superb. He never gives the ball away and his intelligence on the pitch is second to none.



XCELLENCE ... *Who is the best player you have played against?* I did play against Paul Stewart when he was with Spurs and England and I was at Blackburn. We had a mammoth cup tie that went into extra-time and my remit was to man mark him throughout the game. Wherever he went I went for two hours and after the game he shook my hand, kissed me and said "You might as well follow me into the changing room!"

YOBS ... *Who are the most intimidating fans you've played in front of?* West Ham fans, without a doubt. I was a sub for Blackburn and when I was sent out to warm up on the sidelines I knew I was going to get dog's abuse. I was called every name you could think of; they described what they were going to do to me and my wife.

It was very tough because when you are playing you don't actually hear them, but when you are stretching on one spot there is little you can do but take it.

ZERO TOLERANCE ... *What pet hates do you have?* Laziness is something I really cannot stand, there is no excuse for it.

Promoting independence and self belief amongst women

THE Dale and literary endeavour go together wonderfully, as author Mark Hodgkinson discusses...

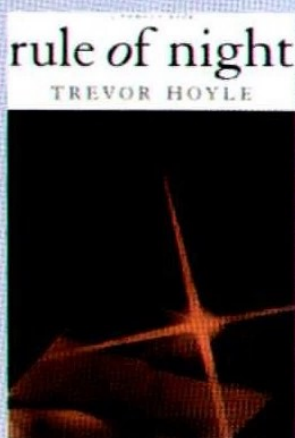
Happiness and success don't make for great stories. No, it's failure and misery we want. Nothing warms the heart more than the thought that someone else has had it worse.

Presumably this must be why Rochdale AFC has had, proportional to its fan base, more books dedicated to it than any other club. Bring it on say the poets and the authors: the defeats, the humiliation, hope under onslaught. Then season it with drizzle, mist, overcoats and gravy.

It all began in triumphant grittiness back in 1974 with *Rule of Night*. Trevor Hoyle made his protagonist, Kenny Seddon, a Dale fan and had him flitting around the town up to no good, and worse. The prose is so rich and vivid that the pages soon appear to smell of fag smoke and mustiness and a time you're glad to have escaped from. It is as well observed as any of the northern writers that preceded it - Hines, Sillitoe, Braine etc - and more authentic than those that followed on, the likes of Irvine Welsh and John King. Yes, that good and forged in Rochdale.

I read *Rule of Night* as a teenager living in the town and it (I might as well admit this...) changed my life. I understood for the first time that where I lived and the club I supported was valid, that it meant something. There was poetry here, in the muck and toil, and if Hoyle could spin gold from it, I was bloody-minded enough to believe I could too.

Derick Allsop was next up with *Kicking in the Wind*. The book was fundamentally a journalistic assignment, with Allsop spending a season with the club, relating its on and off-field travails. Since he obviously focused on the club's personnel of the time, it means the book has dated but still stands as a fine snapshot of life at a lower league football club.



Ex-director Richard Bott proffered his Dale-tinged memoirs in *Three Curries and a Shish Kebab*. Boasting a cover of singular gruesomeness, inside we found a breezy account of Bott's press box frolics. The antithesis of Hoyle's prose, it was a light and frothy and anecdote overload. The clue is in the title.

My first book on Dale was *Life Sentence*, a collection of pieces from a weekly column I contributed to *The Times*. I spent a season with Dale but, unlike Allsop, I was asked only to reflect on what I felt as a fan looking in at the club. My new book, *Believe in the Sign*, is a 'sort-of-memoir.' I have covered the years 1974 to 1982 but tried to contextualise the club's fortunes with my own life and the life of the town. I write about the coming of supermarkets, Ashfield Valley flats, the abduction and murder of Lesley Molseed, the textile industry closing down and our eccentric town artist, Michael Dames.

We might not win as often as most teams but, hey, we've got more books than you.

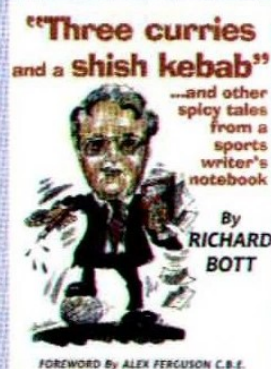

Rochdale supporters David Chaffey and Carl Cavanah give their views on five players with Robins' connections ...



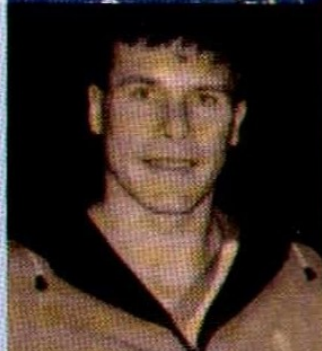
Swindon supporter Nigel Bennett gives his views on five players with Dale connections ...

DAVID COLE - As you will read elsewhere in today's programme, Cole was in the last Swindon team to play at Spotland 21 years ago, partnering Colin Calderwood in the centre of their defence. He had played all of his career in the south-west, with the likes of Swansea and Torquay also figuring on his CV, so his move north to Dale in the summer of 1989 was somewhat surprising. Fans were divided on his ability, as good performances were interspersed with stinkers, but all-in-all he enjoyed a reasonable Dale career. He lived near to Fothergill & Harvey's factory in Littleborough when he was with the club and struck a goal sponsorship deal with a group of Dale fans who paid him something like £5 per goal. Fortunately Coley only cost them £35 in his two seasons at Spotland!



DAVID COLE - Cole joined the Robins from Swansea in February 1985 and made a total of 79 appearances, scoring three goals. He played 44 times during the 1985/86 championship campaign, before moving onto Torquay United in January 1987 following a loan spell in Devon.

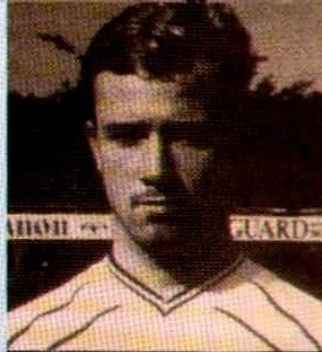
MICKY FRENCH - I had only read French's name in the *Rochdale Observer* as he was playing for Dale in the season I started watching, 1982/83. I thought it was rather an exotic name for a Dale player, although I was familiar with it from perusing Rothman's Football Yearbook. French was with Aldershot for a while and they were the first team alphabetically, so their pages were often looked at first. He was one of two Dale players sent-off in a fiery FA Cup tie at Altrincham, but his greatest moment in a Dale shirt came in March 1983 in Jimmy Greenhoff's first game as manager. Dale won 4-1, French scored a hat-trick and was then released two months later.



MICKY FRENCH - A former England youth international, French joined us from Brentford in February 1977, made a grand total of 11 appearances, before leaving for Doncaster Rovers in July 1978. He scored his only goal in the final game of the 1976/77 season against Portsmouth.

SIMON GIBSON - The kindest description I can give Gibson is that he was a bit of a 'clod-hopper'! I haven't got a clue if that's spelt right, but it means he was a clogger, a typical 1980s lower-league centre-half.

Vic Halom brought him in from Preston, paying £5,000 for his services. He was going to be understudy to John Bramhall and Keith Hicks, but when Hicks suffered an injury on the opening day, Gibson got his chance. However, he soon became injured as well and left Spotland later in the season having made just five inauspicious league appearances for the club.



SIMON GIBSON - Gibson came from Chelsea in October 1983 and made his league debut against Colchester that month. A man mountain, he made 37 appearances, netting five times, from the back, but the following season he played just four times before leaving for Preston. He made his final appearance in an FA Cup tie at Dagenham, where he allegedly upset manager Lou Macari with the energy he put into bursting all the balloons that were on the pitch!

ALAN McLOUGHLIN - Dale signed Alan in December 2001 as we looked to cement our promotion credentials. He got off to a poor start and didn't look a good signing, but a superb performance at Halifax (the one with the last minute Paddy goal) became the turning point. From then until the end of the season he was very impressive, but it was short lived, though, as John Hollins released him to the surprise of a few Dale fans. He signed for Forest Green after leaving Spotland.



ALAN McLOUGHLIN - McLoughlin rose to fame during his time at Swindon. Although initially loaned to Torquay, he returned to play an important part in a number of campaigns, including scoring the only goal in the famous victory over Sunderland in the Division One play-off final at Wembley. This should have seen Swindon promoted to the top flight for the very first time, but a subsequent demotion prevented this from happening.

Alan left the club for Southampton for around £1million after making 106 appearances and scoring 19 goals.

ALAN REEVES - My favourite Dale defender of all time. Absolutely immense. We signed him from Chester City in 1991 and he stayed at Dale until September 1994. During that time Reeves became an absolute hero to Dale fans for his consistently superb performances, to the point where we knew he'd be heading for a bigger club and better opportunities. Sure enough, in 1994, the offer came in and he left Spotland for Selhurst Park to join Premiership Wimbledon for £300,000. It was weird having to collect his sticker for my collection, especially as I was aged 36 at the time!



ALAN REEVES - Reeves became something of a cult hero at the County Ground, with cries of "Reeeeeeves" echoing across the terraces. A whole-hearted and committed player who played 208 games for Swindon, more than any other club during his long career, as well as scoring 12 goals, including one which was the winner at Ashton Gate against local rivals Bristol City. As his playing days drew to a close, he moved into management, spending time at Swindon with the youth team, then as assistant to the first team manager.

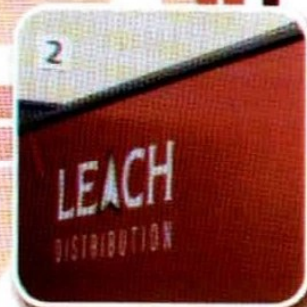

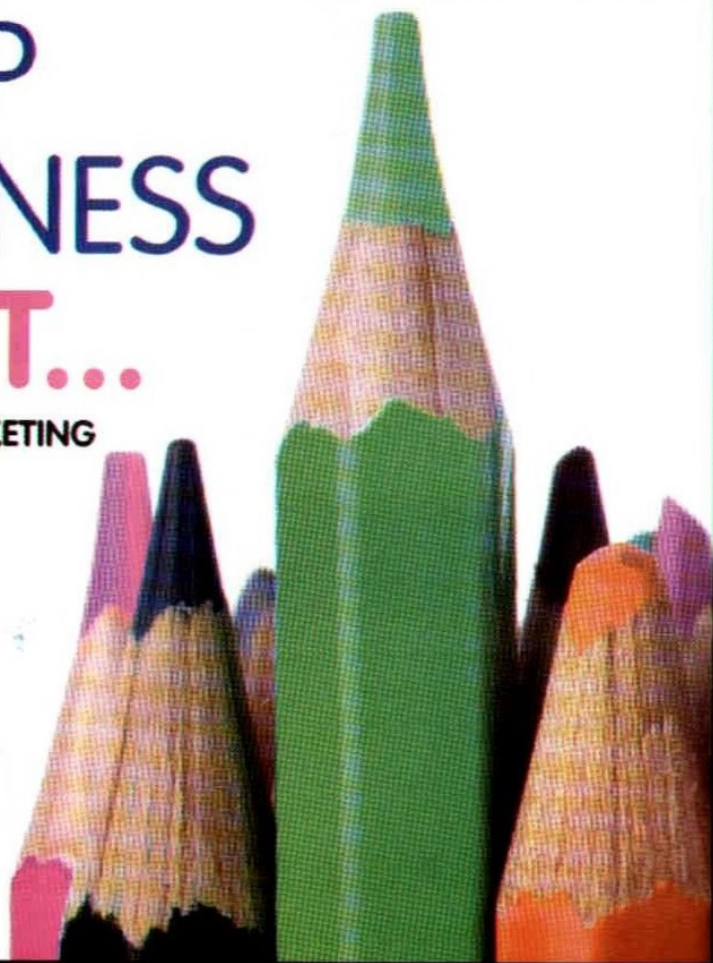

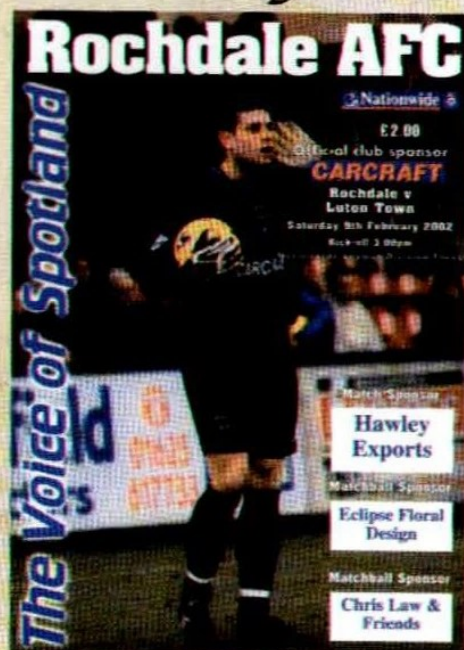

Nine other players were booked by the Premiership official who struggled to keep a lid on an encounter that always threatened to boil over.

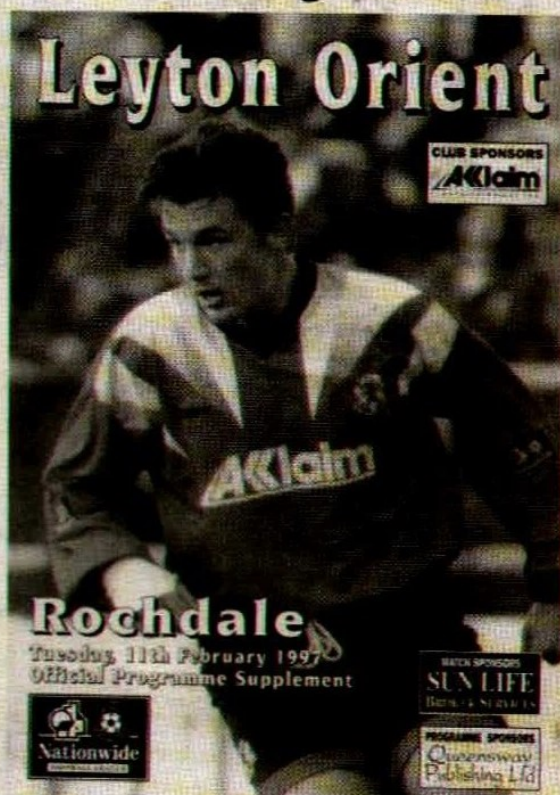

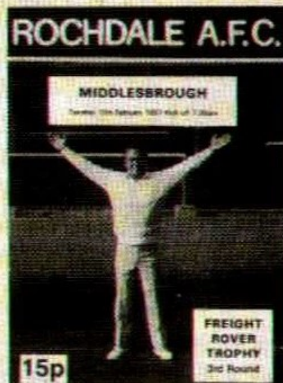
There couldn't have been two greater extremes ahead of this Freight Rover Trophy tie at Spotland.

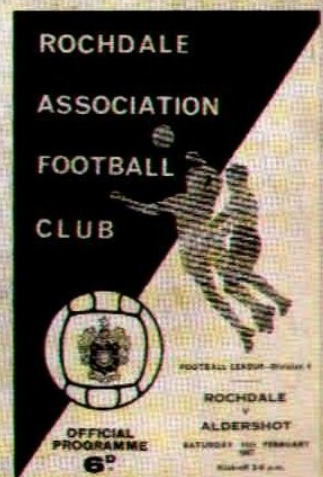

ROCHDALE'S season may have seen a change in fortune, but for one Dale player the campaign has far from improved.

It has been very tough for defender Mark Jackson, who has struggled with more than his fair share of injury problems this term. But 'Jacko', who has made just seven appearances this season, hopes the end of his injuries are in sight.

"It has been one of those seasons that all footballers don't want to have," he told us earlier this week. "I've had more than enough problems, despite going through the summer and pre-season training feeling great and looking forward to the new campaign. I really thought this season was going to be a good one for me.

"Unfortunately I have picked up problem after

problem and that proved to be the story just the other week when I'd just got back to full fitness after my foot injury. I was back in full-time training and even managed to get a few reserve games under my belt and then I went and tore my cartilage.

"I seem to have picked up one injury after another; every footballer has a season they would rather forget and it looks like this season I'm having mine."

For Jackson the very thought of sat watching a game is bad enough, but day after day in the gym or resting at home has him climbing the walls.

"When you are a footballer you just want to play and I'm no different, I hate being sidelined. Going to the gym every day is nothing like training with the rest of the lads, while watching from the stands is even worse.

"But I will stay focussed, stay strong and keep working away to get myself back.

"I have had the operation now and with keyhole surgery I should be back training with the first team in around five weeks."

When the battle to regain fitness ends, the 29-year old will begin fighting a war on two fronts, with a place in the starting eleven first on the agenda.

"The lads are doing well at the moment and I know it is going to be a challenge to get back in the side, but I'm certainly up for that challenge. I challenge myself all the time, but what the future holds for me I'm not sure."

That future is the second fight Jackson has on his hands with the summer bringing the end of the defender's contract. Players have to play and with the season coming to a close Jackson knows time is running out.

"I'm under no illusions as to what the future holds for me because the problems I have had have kept me out of the side and I've slipped down the pecking order. I'm out of contract in the summer and not playing at the moment, but I've spoken to the manager and he said to just keep focused on getting fit and for now that's all I'm doing.

"Hopefully I'll get the chance to put my case across before the end of the season."

No home comforts for sloppy Town

Dale sealed the game on 66 minutes when Town's left side was again exposed as Mocquet crossed and Rundle had time and space to hammer past Barnes.

When it looked as if it couldn't get any worse, it did just seven minutes later.

A corner was played harmlessly to the near post where Peter Till, thinking it was going into the side-netting, let it go.

It didn't. Instead the ball dropped into the goalmouth where Ramsden was able to force home.

TODAY'S topic matter is borne out of frustration at the events of last Saturday at Walsall.

Regular football travellers will empathise 100% with today's article, whilst the authorities who care to glance over its content will invariably scratch their heads and wonder what all the fuss is about.

The situation arose last Saturday when Walsall decided to house the travelling Dale contingent in a small side section of the Bescot Stadium, whilst leaving the traditional large away end completely vacant.

The section allocated to us had around 600 seats in it and despite Rochdale having a good hardcore of 300 away fans, they chose to use this cramped end bit of the stand to accommodate us. Fair enough on the face of it.

But, Rochdale had just beaten MK Dons 5-0. We have also had a couple of 4-0 results recently as our bid to beat the drop gathers momentum following a change of management. And, given that Walsall haven't hosted Dale since 1995, there will be a lot of Dale fans who have yet to 'tick' that ground.

You would therefore presume that our hardcore following might double in these circumstances, which would render this 600 seat corner too small to cope.

It is a little known fact amongst football supporters that the capacity of any seated area falls by ten per cent if that area is sold on an 'Unreserved Seating' basis. Therefore the legal capacity of this corner would have been nearer 500 if my guesstimates are correct.

Walsall had the chance on Friday to decide to open the big end instead. There is an equation Scrutator likes to use when estimating the size of an away following. Multiply the number of people who are travelling on the supporters coaches by 4.5 and you will never be far off the number of total fans who travel.

It is possible the Walsall officials were given duff information by Rochdale officials on the estimation of numbers travelling. It is wrong, however, to rely on such officials, who are probably not footballing folk, to provide such data.

Most galling of all, though, are the motives used by Walsall when choosing to squeeze us all into this tiny corner.

All football clubs do it, including the two at Spotland today. Clubs can only charge away fans the same as home fans for 'comparable accommodation'. This means that away fans often find themselves shunted into an end corner of a main (or side) stand and are then charged top price equivalent for covered side view seats, even though, in Walsall's case, the view is appalling, with posts obstructing the view, not to mention 500 fans straining to catch a glimpse of the action when play ventured down the far end.

Therefore, Walsall happily charged us all an extra £2 for the dubious privilege of being cramped into this corner, without a seat and also without a good view. The club prostituted itself to the pound sign instead of upholding the basic rights of the common football fan. And they then had the gall to equalise in the third minute of stoppage time! The footballing Gods must have been having a Sabbath Day last Saturday!

Swindon also moved Rochdale onto the side earlier this season, but they ensured sufficient space was granted to our small following that day. And, we also had a better view perched up high, compared to the open bucket seats strapped onto the shallow terrace behind the goal.

Rochdale, too, give the best stand at Spotland to the visitors. It's not because we like visitors, it's because visitors have to pay main stand prices

to get in. Indeed, we were one of the first clubs to do it I think.

Stockport also have a fan rotation thing going on, although they used their rotation in reverse with us. Last season we were put on the open end instead of the side as Jim Gannon didn't want 500 travelling Daleys to whip up a good atmosphere in the Edgeley Park pop side. Gannon was using his loaf to help Stockport's home advantage count.

This is why I continue to find it bizarre that Rochdale don't do likewise. Not only do we give opposition fans the best stand, we give them the best seats in this stand on the halfway line. These fans should be 'netted' into an end block near the Sandy Lane or WMG Stand so that players don't run out to the sights and sounds of 400 travelling supporters.

No doubt our powers that be can hide behind red tape and a handbook of rules and regs, but if Spotland is going to stop being the orchard where schoolboys can lean over and pinch apples, we are going to have to be a bit more hostile. If that means putting Swindon fans, for example, in the corner and charging them full whack for it, then do it.

Walsall taught me (yet again) that it's dog eat dog out there and little old Dale should start standing up for ourselves with a bit more grit and commonsense, even if it ultimately means adopting the moral lower ground. If the moral lower ground can help put a few points on the board, then it has to be done!

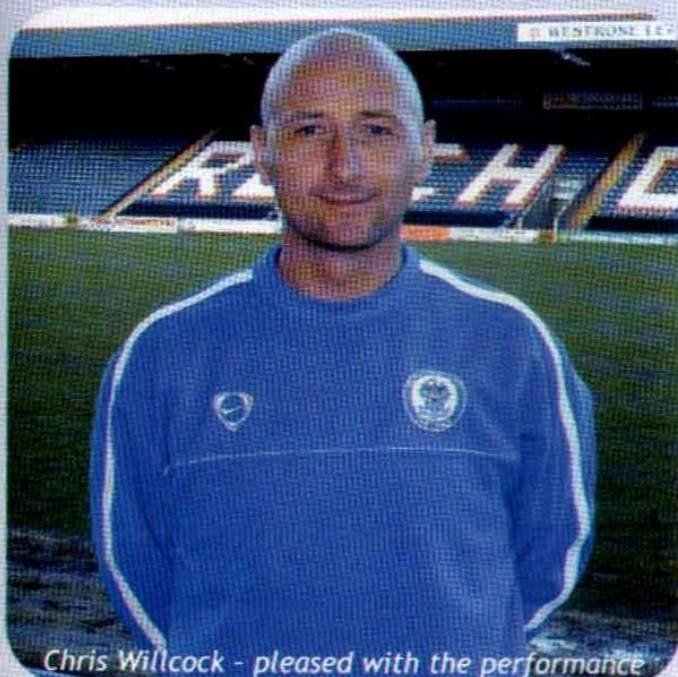

ROCHDALE hadn't won for eight matches, but the visit to Spotland of struggling Scarborough looked to give them a good chance of breaking that sequence.

The teams had drawn 1-1 at the McCain Stadium less than three weeks earlier, but with Dale's play-off hopes becoming a distant memory, another draw was the least we wanted from this meeting.

Poor weather meant this was only Dale's second home game in the space of two months.

Both home Christmas fixtures had fallen foul of snow and ice, while the scheduled game against Torquay on 27th January was called off when a heavy Friday teatime snowfall brought the town to a standstill.

And I should know - I was stuck on St Mary's Gate for almost two hours!!

These postponements had cost the club lost revenue, although they came early enough to stop the pies being delivered, so at least they weren't wasted!

However, the match programmes had been printed and delivered, so money would be lost there as sales would be much lower when the games were eventually played.

Bearing this in mind, Commercial Manager Steve Walmsley made a bizarre decision in the days running up to the Scarborough match.

Rochdale had again been hit by snow and a postponement seemed very likely. Walmsley decided that he didn't want to waste any more money, so he cancelled the printing of the match programmes.

This was a massive gamble and one which backfired, which was mightily funny for all those who weren't keen on Mr W.

The weather became much milder on Thursday night and into Friday, so much so that the snow on the pitch all melted away and left the surface underneath perfectly playable. Match on!

However, the club had to produce something, so a four-page A5 booklet was hastily prepared, featuring manager's notes, profiles of the Scarborough squad and their 'Star Visitor' Andy Ritchie, together with the teams and match officials.

It was a total embarrassment and led to Dale being fined by the Football League as the club has a contractual obligation to produce something featuring all associate sponsors. In addition, I imagine Walmsley was inundated with complaints from those companies who had paid for adverts

in the programme.

Unfortunately, Walmsley's actions were symptomatic of what had happened at the club since we were drawn to play Liverpool in the FA Cup.

The team's form was awful, crowds had dropped alarmingly and now we couldn't even produce a proper match programme!

In view of all this it was no surprise that the team suffered yet another defeat in front of their lowest gate of the season.

A look at five figures from our opponents' history...



GLENN HODDLE

The former England boss started his managerial career at the County Ground in 1991, but only stayed for two years before being appointed gaffer at Chelsea. During these two years he narrowly avoided a play-off spot in his first full season, before going one better a year later and actually tasting promotion via the play-offs. This promotion ensured the club enjoyed Premiership football, albeit for only 12 months. Hoddle remained registered as a player throughout his stay with the Robins, making a total of 64 appearances. In his heyday - he was 34 when he started playing for Swindon - he was a naturally-gifted midfield player who made 53 appearances for England and most people will agree that he was one of those players that fans would pay good money to watch.

OSSIE ARDILES

The Argentinean is another former Swindon boss with roots at White Hart Lane and Hoddle actually replaced him in 1991 when he left to takeover at Newcastle United. Life at Swindon started in 1989 and in his first season with the club he led them to play-off final glory at Wembley, beating Sunderland. However, financial irregularities led to the Robins being demoted and such was the strain on the club, Ardiles only remained for another seven months before moving to the North-East. Despite this, the blend of football seen during his reign endeared him to the locals and he will always be fondly remembered in Wiltshire.



ALAN McLOUGHLIN

There aren't many players who can say they've donned the red of Swindon and the blue of Rochdale, but McLoughlin can. A former Manchester United junior, 'Macca' forged his career in the game at Swindon in the late-80s as an attacking midfielder, which prompted Southampton to pay £1 million for him in 1990. He then moved along the south coast to Portsmouth in 1992 and once again established himself as a goal-getter of some repute. By the time he arrived at Scotland in 2001 he was 34, but he was still a good player and was instrumental in us reaching the play-offs that season. He made 20 appearances for Dale, before moving back south to sign for Forest Green Rovers.

PAUL BODIN

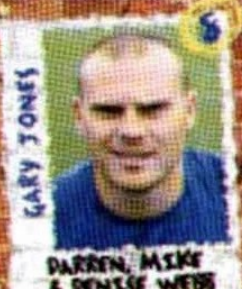
I was always weary of the marauding left-back as his haircut and dubious moustache gave me the impression he was stuck in the 70s; he was what you'd call a modern-day Paul Calf. Anyway, enough of his appearance and we'll move onto his abilities on the football field, which is of course the reason you're reading this article in the first place. Signed in 1988 from Newport County for £15,000, Bodin made 119 appearances in three years before a £500,000 move to Crystal Palace. Within less than a year he was back at the County Ground, for less than half the price that took him away in the first place I might add, and this time he remained for four years making over 150 appearances in the process. In his two spells with Swindon Bodin notched up 40 goals, including the winner from the penalty spot in the play-off final win.



CHRIS KAMARA

The Sky Sports' pundit had two spells with the Robins early in his career. His first spell commenced in the late-70s when the club paid £14,000 for him from Portsmouth and he made 147 appearances before moving back to Fratton Park in the summer of 1981. After a brief spell with Pompey he was sold to Brentford, but then rejoined Swindon in 1985. Initially he struggled to cement his place in the team and this wasn't helped the following season when he was suspended by the club having broken a Shrewsbury player's jaw after the final whistle. After refusing a new contract, Kamara later signed for Stoke, before finishing his playing days with Leeds United, Luton Town, Sheffield United and Bradford City.

There are plenty of pictures from recent matches and the reader never gets the impression of page-filling, which is always a bonus.

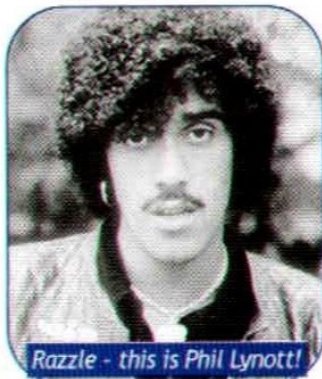




Razzle later asked who The Beatles were and confessed he had never heard of the Rolling Stones, Madness, Take That and Status Quo.

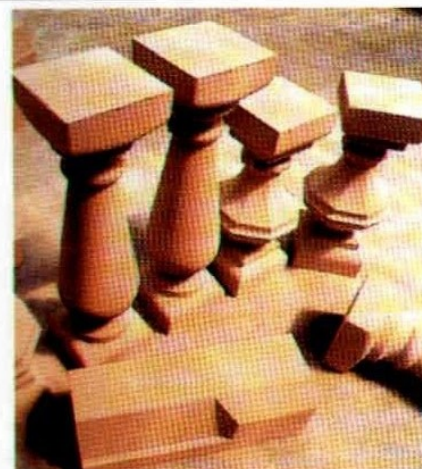

AS with MK Dons' visit to Spotland a fortnight ago, Swindon's rare sojourn to this part of Lancashire gives us an excuse to take a walk down Memory Lane.



It's hard to believe that it's just short of 21 years since the Robins last appeared on this ground.

Saturday 8th March 1986 was the date when manager Lou Macari brought his league leaders to Spotland on the back of six consecutive wins.

The last five of those wins had all been away from home, with Swindon also managing to keep five clean sheets.

It's fair to say they really were in their best form of the campaign.

In stark contrast, Dale had won just

once in their last 12 league and cup matches - and that victory had come way back on New Year's Day.

If ever there was an away banker, this was it, but had the final score reflected the way the game panned out, Dale would have been comfortable winners.

As the old saying goes, 'At least Dick Turpin wore a mask', although on this occasion he was wearing all red with white pinstripes!

The Robins were outplayed from the first minute to the 77th minute, in which time Dale took the lead, looked likely to add to it every time they went forward and never looked in danger at the other end.

But then, cruelly, when Peter Coyne made a rare foray into the area he was felled by Keith Hicks and Colin Gordon converted from the spot.

This goal gave the visitors new life - many would say it gave them some life - and two minutes later Charlie Henry beat the offside trap before lobbing goalkeeper Dave Redfern, who had stayed on his line.

These strikes cancelled out Dale's 56th minute opener from Ronnie Moore.

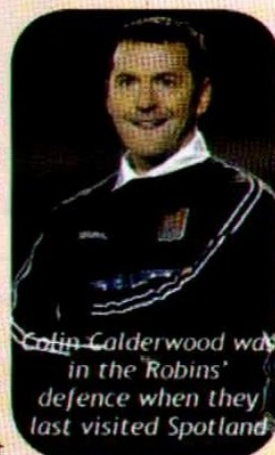


Swindon had Chris Kamara in their midfield in this game

It was a great move which led to the goal, with Ian McMahon and Steve Taylor doing brilliantly to create the opening for Moore.

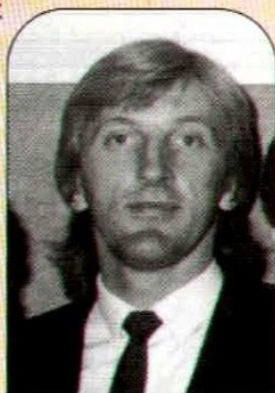
His shot hit the knees of goalkeeper Kenny Allen, but rebounded into the net - the first goal Swindon had conceded in 594 minutes of football away from the County Ground.

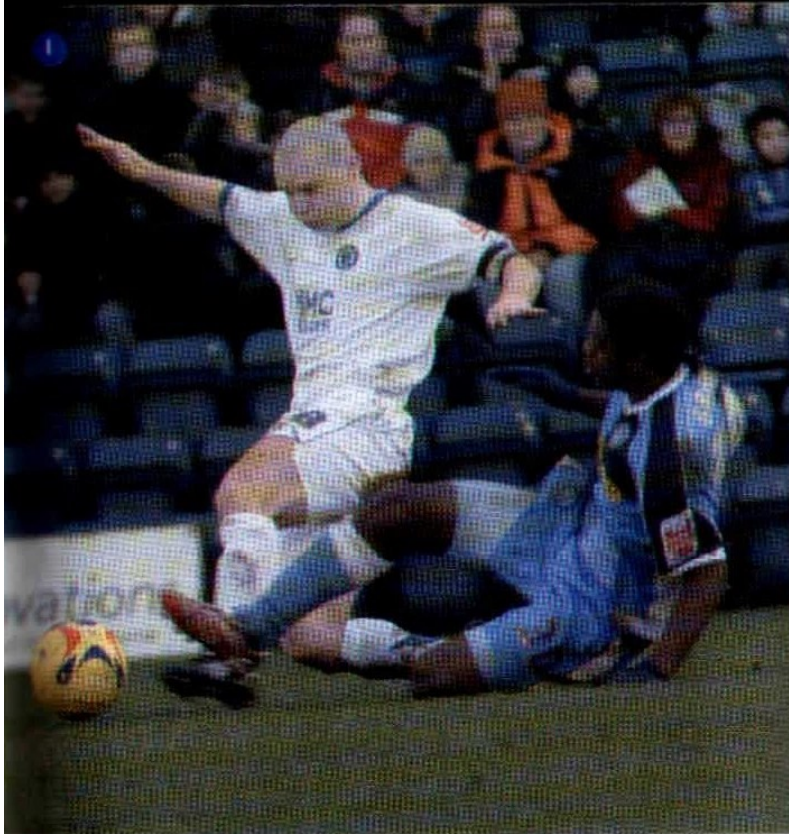
Ronnie Moore scored Dale's last goal against Swindon 21 years ago

They went on to clinch the Fourth Division title with 102 points - a record for Division Four and one which is yet to be bettered in the basement league.

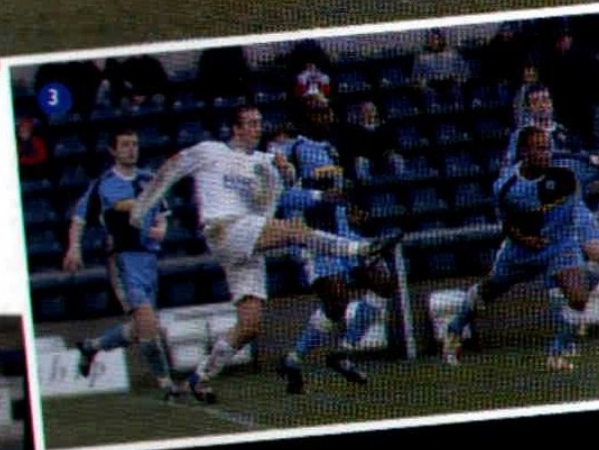

THE Football League was celebrating its 50th season and as part of the celebrations, Dale played two Jubilee games against Halifax before the real action commenced.

We lost 4-1 at the Shay, but won on aggregate after a 5-1 victory at Spotland. However, this didn't set the tone for the new season as the first three league games were lost, including a 7-1 thrashing at Rotherham, Dale's worst ever opening day result.

Some respite came in the form of home draws with Doncaster and York, only for the return with Rovers to finish in a 5-0 defeat and the trip to Wrexham also ending pointless.

With Dale next to bottom of the table, it was no surprise when manager Sam Jennings stepped down, although ill health had also contributed to his departure.

Extrovert captain Ted Goodier was appointed as acting manager and his impact was immediate as Dale hammered Gateshead 5-2 at Spotland.

They were beaten at Hartlepoons a week later, but responded with another fine home performance to blitz Darlington 6-1.

These results set a trend as Dale won their next three home games as well (New Brighton 2-0, Chester 5-2 and Hull 4-0) only for the intervening away fixtures to all end in losses.

Late November brought the now customary first round FA Cup exit, although the 7-3 defeat at the Shay was a totally unexpected result, if not outcome.

Nevertheless, that was Dale's eighth consecutive away reverse, but they ended that sequence in style with a 5-0 win at Accrington in early December.

Dale's impressive home run had also come to an end by this time when Stockport recorded a narrow single goal victory at Spotland.

However, Dale bounced back in their next home match with a 2-1 win over runaway leaders Barnsley, only for Rotherham to make it a bad start to the festive season when they were 1-0 victors at Spotland on Christmas Eve.

The Boxing Day trip to Southport brought a 4-1 defeat, but Dale gained substantial revenge 24 hours later when the Sandgrounders went down 5-0 at Spotland.

New Year's Eve saw Dale win 2-1 at Oldham, their first

ever league victory at Boundary Park and then a fortnight later they chalked up a most remarkable 7-0 triumph at York, the club's biggest away win in the Football League.

This result persuaded a higher than average crowd to turn up at Spotland for Wrexham's visit the following Saturday when, not surprisingly, the teams drew 0-0!

However, the next six games produced 31 goals, with Dale netting 17 of them. Unfortunately they only won one of those matches - a 2-1 success at Darlington - while losing three, including high-scoring home defeats to Hartlepoons (3-4) and Halifax (4-5).

Jimmy Wynn hit five goals in those two games as he continued his exploits of the previous two campaigns. He actually went on to score 30 goals in all competitions, making him the third-highest scorer in the division.

Jennings' contract as Dale manager ended in March, when Goodier signed on for a further two years at the helm.

This permanency prompted an upturn in form, especially at Spotland, where Dale won consecutive games against Lincoln (4-0), Crewe (5-0) and Accrington (4-1).

Unfortunately away form was still poor and the 2-1 win at Stockport in early April was Dale's only victory in their last seven fixtures on the road.

The season ended as it had began - with a heavy defeat - and the 5-1 loss at Carlisle meant Dale finished in 15th place on 39 points, their highest tally in nine years.

Around this time war clouds were gathering, although football clubs carried on regardless through the summer.

Third Division clubs (North & South) were even proposing a four-up, four-down system with Division Two, but more sinister world events began to dominate everyone's minds.

This two season series chronicles 100 years of football at Spotland

ROCHDALE manager Ted Goodier made many changes to his squad over the summer, putting together a group of players that certainly impressed an eminent publication.

The Topical Times Sporting Annual predicted that Dale would be the season's surprise packet, saying 'They are powerful and constructive at wing half and goalful in front'.

That prophecy didn't ring true when Dale lost 2-0 in the season's opener at Doncaster, although they recovered to record consecutive 1-0 home wins over Wrexham and York.

However, at 11 o'clock in the morning following the York game, the Prime Minister announced that war was declared as from 5pm that afternoon.

Professional football was suspended with immediate effect and compulsory military service for all men aged 18-41 came into operation, but, after several weeks of inactivity (the 'phony war'), the football authorities organised regional leagues to fill the void.

Dale were placed in the North West Division where they began with defeats to Barrow and Southport, before thrashing Accrington 5-1 at Spotland.

They then lost to the likes of Bolton and Burnley over the next month, but with matches only taking place on Saturdays and regular postponements an unavoidable feature, the season became rather disjointed.

Indeed, after beating Oldham 3-0 at Boundary Park two days before Christmas, Dale played only eight more games by the end of March, drawing three and losing five.

They eventually won their first game of 1940 when Carlisle were defeated 2-1 at Brunton Park on 6th April, but the remaining five fixtures brought only one victory as Dale stuttered to a ninth-place finish out of 12 clubs.

The War League Cup, which took place in April and May, before the league campaign had even ended, saw Dale enjoy their best form of the season.

They progressed through ties with Accrington and Bury to face Everton, but sadly the run ended here with a 7-5 aggregate defeat.

As the league season came to an end in early June, the Battle of Britain was taking place, although the attitude of the public was that Saturday afternoon football was good for morale and still had a place in society.

1940/41

The regional competitions were extended for the new season and Dale found themselves in the North Regional League.

They opened with a 3-1 home defeat by Manchester United and then lost three of the next four matches, including a 7-3 hammering at Bury.

The bad start ended when Preston were beaten 2-1 at Spotland in early October and although North End went on to lift the title at the end of the season, the return fixture at Deepdale on 9th November was watched by just 300 spectators.

Dale went down 5-0 that afternoon, but recovered to win their next six games, the most remarkable of which came when Southport were trounced 10-0 at Spotland at the end of November.

1941 began with a double-header against Manchester City, the two games also doubling up as Lancashire Cup meetings.

Alas, Dale were thrashed 9-1 at Maine Road and then 6-1 at Spotland a week later, with City's Jimmy Currie scoring five in each game.

Dale bounced back to score five in each of their next two outings, before suffering the club's worst ever result when they slumped 11-0 at Huddersfield.

That hammering knocked confidence so much that Dale won only one of their last seven games to finish 30th out of 36 clubs in a division where goal average decided final positions.

However, fixtures were so irregular and teams had played such different amounts of games (Burnley 35 compared to Bolton 16), that any sort of stature attached to this league was tenuous to say the least.

JOHN DOOLAN felt as though he had a point to prove to the Rochdale faithful this season so *The Voice of Spotland* asked him if he felt he'd achieved his goal yet.

"I'd like to think so, but I'm not so naive as to say that's it, I can stop working hard now as my job here is done; far from it. I said in the summer I wanted to try and prove a few people wrong and I think my performances this year have helped me to achieve this. I certainly think my relationship with the fans is much better now and I've got to say I really enjoy it here."

Such has been Doolan's influence on the team this season that exclusive news we have obtained about a clause in his contract meaning an extension into 2008 will be met with great enthusiasm. The clause has been activated because the 33-year old has played a certain number of games and he admits he can't wait to sign it.

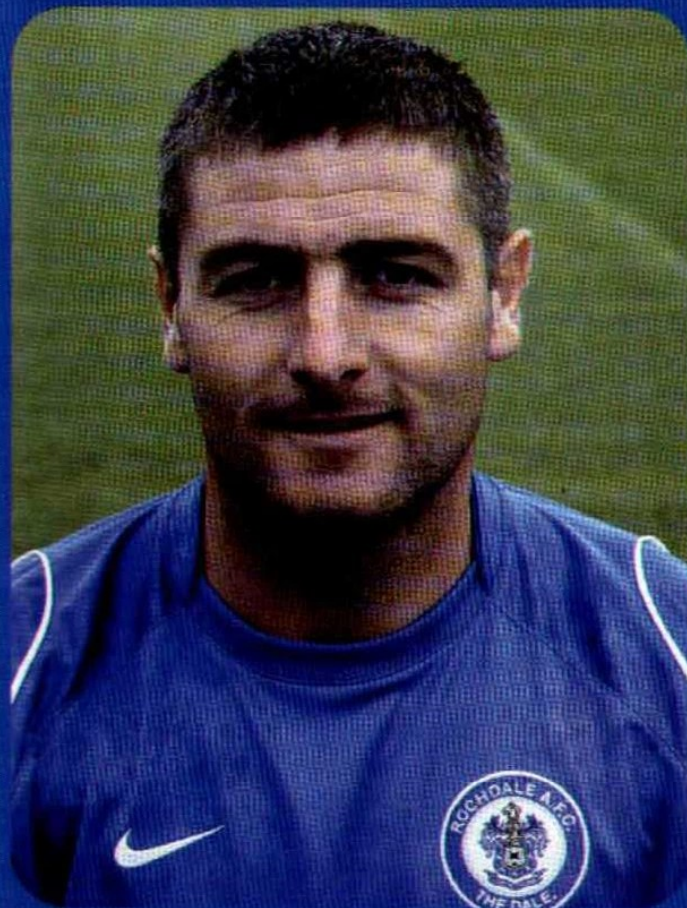
"I haven't said anything to the gaffer or the Chairman yet because they've had enough to think about recently. As I've said, I'm delighted with the way things have gone personally this season and when the time is right we'll all sit down and get it sorted. It's all in the contract I signed last January so nobody has anything to worry about, so for now we'll just carry on trying to climb the table."

"Looking ahead what it does mean is that the gaffer is starting to tie down some of the lads who will form part of the spine of his team next season and that is really important. I think he has a few other names in mind as well, but with me, Jonah, Rory and Nathan - plus the likes of Duggers and Glenn Murray in attack - we have a good nucleus already which I'm sure we'll add to in the summer."

"Between now and the end of the season we must look to try and build for next term without ever taking our eye off the league this year of course. We all know we need to improve our home record and this is our main goal before May. Four home victories isn't good enough, but we've been playing some good stuff of late at Spotland and Swindon will come here today knowing they will be in for a hard game. We are full of confidence after the result against MK Dons and it will be a good game to watch, that's for sure."

With over 500 senior games to his name now, Doolan is undoubtedly the senior professional on the club's books. Whilst the statistics may show this, you'd never have guessed it from his performance here two weeks ago, but what exactly does the man himself see as his role within the team?

"I've formed a decent partnership with Jonah in the middle of the park, but as you say my experience in the league means I need to offer help and advice to those around me as well. Personally I still think I've a lot left in this old tank of mine, but I'm always trying to speak to the younger lads whenever possible and I think it works well. We have a relatively young side here now, but if we can mix this with the odd older head like mine then it's a good blend."



"As for the MK Dons game, I actually didn't make that many surging runs forward; all I did whenever I crossed the halfway line was to make sure it counted. It's always nice to lay on a few goals for the other lads, but I just hope they remember whose cross it was that put it on a plate for them! Somehow though I don't think they will."

The popular Scouser has played in every game since new boss Keith Hill took charge of team affairs. His appointment has seen an upturn in the team's fortunes of late, but what would Doolan say the reason behind this is?

"I think it's because Keith is very thorough. No matter who we are playing no stone is ever left unturned and every aspect of the game is planned for. He's got a good appreciation of what the lads want and what he wants as the boss and this creates a good balance. His training is all geared towards the match that weekend and we've a really good atmosphere amongst us."

"In the dressing room last Saturday we were all really gutted to only come away with a point at the league leaders, which is a sign of how far we've come. Although it felt like a defeat it was a really good point in reality and we shouldn't forget that."

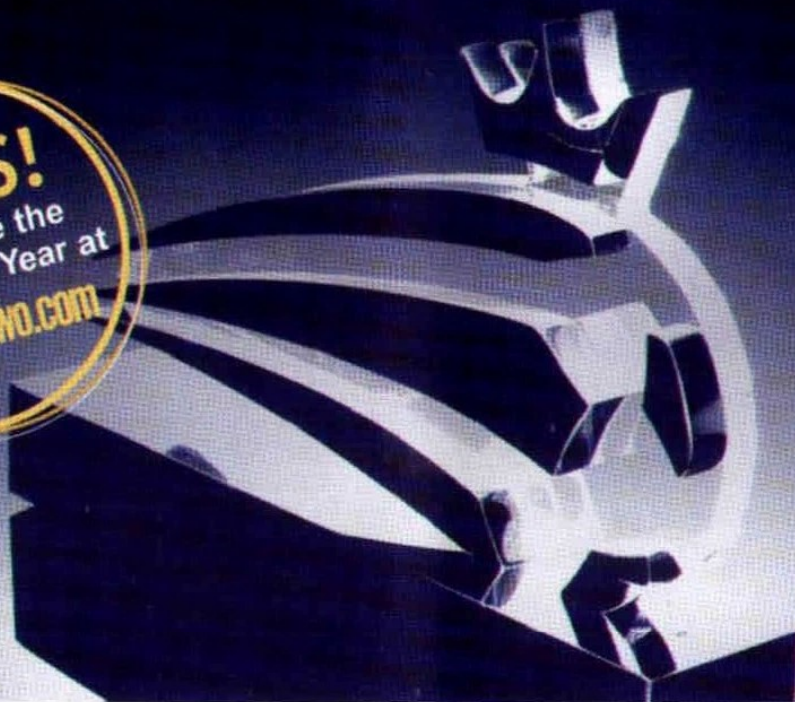

IT'S AGM TIME!

Each year, the Dale Trust board is required by its rules to call an Annual General Meeting, where the actions of the last financial year (1st July 2005 to 30th June 2006) are laid before adult (voting) members to discuss and vote upon. As usual, there was a reasonable turn out on a bitterly cold evening. Members were happy with the way the Trust is moving and for those unable to attend, we include brief extracts from the reports given. Other news from the event, such as the make up of the current board has been reported in the *Rochdale Observer*, but here we go into greater detail.

CHAIRMAN

Firstly, the Chairman's report. Scott Goulding gave the members a review of the year, summarising the Trust's activities and finished off by saying: "Having met up and spoken with other club's Trusts at various events, we should be very appreciative of what we have here at Rochdale. Some of the things other fans have had to do to ensure their clubs survival are frightening. We as fans, however, shouldn't be complacent. We need to do all we can to ensure our Rochdale is safe and secure for many years to come. Building a solid Supporters Trust that is ready and able to act should the need arise is crucial. But it's not all negative - if we can help by doing something towards the quest for promotion/survival then we will. How the Trust grows and prospers is down to you."

SECRETARY

Scott announced that as the then Company Secretary Warren Briertley unfortunately had to resign due to work commitments, the newly-appointed Secretary would be May Bishop, who many of you will remember from her work in the days of the old Supporters Club. Warren was able to return for the evening and gave us a report of activities that took place on his watch. He said: "In many ways 2005/06 has been the most successful season for the Supporters Trust and the hard work of the Trust board, other volunteers and the support of the fans is beginning to show that an established Trust working in co-operation with the club and community can have a positive effect. This has certainly been the case in 2005/06."

success is in a healthy membership base and in this respect Rochdale Supporters Trust has continued to succeed with its membership passing over the 400 mark. I would urge for all fans that haven't renewed or joined for 2006/07 to do so.

"On the field the continuing story was postponements and the lack of real investment in the playing surface meant that the club suffered the burden of games being called off. It was obvious to all that something had to be done to address the situation and together with the Hornets Nest Egg, the Trust launched an appeal to raise a substantial donation towards the cost of the repairs. Over £6000 was raised by the two sets of fans and showed what you can achieve by working together.

"As a result, the stadium company has decided that both of the Supporters bodies can have a representative to sit on the Stadium Company Board. While this is a non-voting position it does mean that fans can have a positive input into future decisions regarding the Stadium and ensure that all parties act in the interests of both clubs. The Supporters Trust will elect its representative tonight."

Later in the evening this election took place and as has been announced elsewhere, Ian Bailey won the ballot.

TREASURER

Then, the money. Treasurer Steve Ashworth presented a fully audited set of accounts (copies are available for members at the Trust table in Studs). He revealed: "The main reasons as to why we've had such a good surplus on our activities are our third 'Curry on up the Dale' night, which made a profit of almost £2,000, and the calendar we published for 2006, which made a profit £1100. The two grants we won during the last financial year have helped us to promote the club amongst the youngsters of the town and we must thank United Co-op and Awards For All for their assistance, totalling more than £8,000 in these projects.

"As mentioned in the notes at the beginning of the accounts, members have approved substantial expenditure towards benefiting the club this year. In two-and-a-half years, we've been able to do a great deal towards supporting the club, purchasing a stake in it on behalf of supporters, and fulfilling our aims within the wider Rochdale community. We've a good pot of 'rainy day' money should, heavens forbid, the need arise to assist in any crisis at the club and enough working capital to keep us ticking over and investing in other projects such as another Curry Night to keep us solvent.

"Overall, the Trust's finances are in a healthy position."

The accounts were moved, seconded passed as acceptable on a unanimous vote and are now with the Financial Services Authority for their inspection and approval.

The evening also involved the prize draw following on from the Pitch Appeal. Dale Trust were pleased to welcome Hornets Nest Egg Chairman Jim Stringer along. Jim and his colleagues have made a great contribution towards making sure the hallowed turf is now more fit for purpose than it had been for years.

Dale players Clive Moyo-Modise and Lloyd Rigby turned up to make the draw, under the watchful eyes of both Chairmen. Lynn Heath of Whitworth won the holiday prize. The laptop computer was won by the regulars who travel to Dale matches on the official club coaches! They made a contribution from profits made on brew money etc over the season. We are informed that this group have very kindly donated the prize back to the Trust to be auctioned for Trust funds at a later date.



All told, a successful evening, but the democratic process doesn't stop there! Dale will be hoping it's case of Lucky 13 next Saturday as our 12 previous league visits to Meadow Lane have brought precisely no wins! We also lost there in an FA Cup tie in 1996! On the plus side, we have drawn more games at Meadow Lane than we have lost!

OUR LAST VISIT

Our last visit to Meadow Lane was back in April when we drew 1-1 thanks to a late Rickie Lambert penalty. Notts County had gone 1-0 up about 10 minutes earlier as Dale looked to keep their heads above the relegation zone.

THIS SEASON

I for one had Notts County down to be one of the relegated teams this season, but they've proven me very wrong and are in fact one place outside the play-offs. They've been a bit inconsistent according to a fan of theirs I know, but overall it's been a good season.

Last Saturday they battered high flyers Lincoln City 3-1 at home, which followed a 5-2 thrashing of Torquay a couple of weeks ago. They also enjoyed a good Carling Cup run which saw them beat Premiership side Middlesbrough and Championship side Southampton, before being knocked out in round four by Wycombe Wanderers.

THE GROUND

Although the ground comprises four separate stands, it is very smart looking.

Both sides are single-tiered stands, the larger of which is the Derek Pavis (Main) Stand, named after the former Chairman who oversaw the ground's redevelopment.

Away fans are housed in the large Kop End, containing 5,400 seats. Again this is a newish stand, with excellent facilities.

The other end is the smaller, covered Family Stand. This has one sizeable solitary supporting pillar, which may affect your view as it is situated right at the front of the stand in the middle. This stand also has a small electric scoreboard on its roof.

How to get there

Take the M62 eastbound, then the M1 southbound, exiting at junction 26. Follow the A610 to Nottingham and when you come to the traffic lights at the roundabout take the third exit.

Continue through two sets of traffic lights and at the next roundabout go straight on (the Gateway Hotel is on your left). Go through a further five traffic lights and at the main junction (Trade Kitchens on your right) turn right onto the main ring road and follow the signs for football traffic.

Once you go past Nottingham Forest's ground on your left, carry on over Lady Bay Bridge and turn left at the bottom onto Meadow Lane. Carry straight on and the ground is in front of you.

Pre-match

Last time I was there we had to trek all the way into town to find a decent pub as the one nearest the ground, the Trent Navigation, was absolutely horrendous. We went in, ordered our drinks, drank half of them, looked at each other and just headed for the door. I'd avoid it if I were you.

The pub we found was excellent, if a little pricey, but if you go left when you get to the main entrance to the ground, head over the bridge and onto the main road, the Casa Bar is a few hundred yards on your left.

PRICES

The prices for this game are: Adults £16, Senior Citizens £10, Students/Young Adults £9 and Under-16s £5, although I'm not entirely sure what classes as a young adult, so you'd be best checking at the turnstile.

Notts County's matchday programme costs £2.50.

WHAT IS NOTTINGHAM FAMOUS FOR?

The obvious answer is, of course, Sherwood Forest, where Robin Hood used to roam. Allegedly.

Nottingham also has the three oldest pubs in Britain, those being Ye Olde Trip To Jerusalem, The Bell and The Salutation, although I'm not sure in what order.

Nottingham is also the home of one of the most famous football clubs in England, Nottingham Forest. I'm sure any County fan will hate me saying that, but it's true and under the leadership of the late, great Brian Clough they won the European Cup (Champions League as it is now known) twice in consecutive years in the late 1970s. They are also who we sold arguably our best ever player to, Grant Holt!

Some famous people from Nottingham include William Booth, who founded the Salvation Army, Harold Shipman, the serial killer, DH Lawrence, the author, Janet Duvitski, who played Jane in Waiting for God, Hollywood star Donald Pleasance, Richard Beckinsale, who played Lennie Godber in the excellent Porridge, Su Pollard, from Hi-De-Hi, Matthew Thorne, from the Catherine Tate Show, Dale Winton, the wooden looking National Lottery presenter, Torvill and Dean, the ice skaters, former Chancellor Kenneth Clarke and footballers Andy Cole, Jermaine Pennant, Jermaine Jenas, Chris Sutton, Steve Hodge and our very own legend, Nathan Stanton.
