

OPENING SHOT

I would like to start off today's programme notes by welcoming everybody associated with Swindon Town Football Club to Vale Park for today's game.

Today is Port Vale's game as part of Kick It Out's annual Week of Action.

It is pleasing to see the whole of football again coming together behind them, illustrating the strong support of the clubs and players.

The theme of the week is One Game, One Community, with the aim of highlighting the positive contribution made to the game by all communities, of all races, cultures and religious beliefs.

All of us within the game, both at the professional and amateur level, including managers, the coaching team, fans and players have a responsibility to spread the message and encourage participation from groups who may feel they are excluded from the game.

Sadly we do not see many ethnic minorities coming to matches despite the number of black players in the game and there is still an obvious lack of Asian players coming through.

It is up to all of us to set a positive example and do everything we can to challenge inequality. I am sure that we can count on all our fans to support the activities the club have organised today to raise awareness of the week of action.

It will be nice to see Billy Paynter again. He's had a couple of clubs since he left us, with Hull City and then at Southend where it didn't quite work out for him.

Funnily enough, we were speaking to Billy before he moved to Swindon, just to find out where he was and what he was up to and what his situation was.

Obviously we weren't scoring many goals and you tend to look at different avenues, and Billy was one of them.

Since he has gone to Swindon he has been on fire and his confidence is high, so in one way it will be nice to see him, and in another, not so nice, because we wouldn't want him doing too well against us.

Our confidence is obviously low and we are fighting at the moment. We are making mistakes and getting punished, and we are not rolling our sleeves up, especially when we are in front, like in the Morecambe game, and at Leyton Orient, when we didn't manage to hang on and fight for that win, which has been most disappointing.

When things are going against you, it is easy to start blaming other people and point fingers, but at the end of the day you have got to stick in there together and work for each other.

We have got to pull together as a group and try to get that support around us. We have got to pull together as a team, we have got to keep working and battling to keep those clean sheets.

Unfortunately, that's not happening at the moment.

We need the supporters behind us. Obviously they are going to be frustrated because things haven't gone the way they would want them to. We can understand that, they are paying their hard-earned money.



CAPTAIN'S CORNER

I haven't had any negative thoughts despite being down at the bottom end of the table. Sometimes I sound like a broken record but we need to stick together, start scoring goals and be a tougher team to beat and I'm sure we'll turn that corner. Dean Glover and Mark Grew have been working us harder than ever on the ground to put it right. It's hard to put a finger on what's going wrong. It's a fine line between winning and losing and it seems to be going the opposite way for us at the minute, but hopefully our luck will turn around. It's not very good off the pitch either, I think I'm rock bottom of the player's fantasy league. It's hard to find some enjoyment out of football at the moment, but I've got to knuckle down, work hard and I'm sure things will come good in the end.

It was very disappointing for all concerned to go out of the Johnstone's Paint Trophy at Morecambe. It was a game we should have won in the ninety minutes. We went out on penalties and it was just another kick in the teeth. We went in at the break two up, but I think we were naïve and started a bit slow in the second half. They got two goals in quick succession and it was tough after that. We still had chances to win the game and probably should have done, but as soon as it goes down to

penalties then it's just about luck on the day. The way things have been going for us we haven't had a lot of luck of late so I think the script was already written. Shane Tudor and Danny Glover both missed from the spot, but nobody is putting the blame on them. It takes a lot of bottle to go up and take a penalty and the pair did that. Danny is a young player with a great future ahead of him and I'm sure he won't let it affect him.

In the Brighton game there were a few mistakes leading up to their goal and I think it sums us up. We let our guard down for a minute and we get punished. The ball drops to one of their lads and it ends up in the back of our net. I really do believe things aren't rolling for us and we are not getting the opportunities at the other end like teams seem to be getting against us.

It was a different ball game at Leyton Orient where we managed to get our noses in front just before the break. They came out second half all guns blazing and overran us in a tenminute spell and the game was put to bed. Mark Grew told us in no uncertain terms what he thought about the performance and we must learn lessons. He's part of the managerial set up and he's only saying those things because he's passionate about Port Vale and he wants us to do well for the club. We are in a lot of trouble, there's no hiding from the fact, and we must find out what we need to do to win games and turn it around.

Swindon Town will provide us with another tough game they had a great result at home to Tranmere Rovers last time out, so they are going to be well organised. They've got a couple of ex-Vale players among their ranks with Billy Paynter and Sam Collins, who's on loan from Hull City, who will be coming back here no doubt to prove a point. Billy is a strong centre forward and he will do a very good job in this division and score goals.

THE INTERVIEW

Dave McGoldrick joined the club on loan from Southampton in time to make his debut down at Bournemouth – a club where he spent the back end of last season on loan.

He had a successful spell at Dean Court, finding the net on a regular basis, and though he didn't score for the Vale that afternoon, the Valiants did come away with the three points.

He told us: "I wasn't really encouraged to play football as a child, I just started playing at junior school and carried it on from there."

Obviously talented, even at that age, he joined Notts County as a 9-yearold and spent the next few years at Meadow Lane learning his trade.

He said: "I was there from the age of nine until I was sixteen and then Southampton came in for me, which was a good opportunity for me to progress.

They loaned me out to Notts County for the next month after I signed and then I moved down to Southampton. It was the first time I had been away from my family and it was a bit strange at first.

"It wasn't too bad though. There were about twenty of us staying all together at a big place, so it was alright.

"The landlady looked after us all, cooked our meals and did our washing and everything and we got looked after well, so I didn't feel homesick or anything.

"When we got back after training, we were absolutely knackered, so all we used to do at night was chill out.

"I used to go back to see my family every two weeks or so, and when I got my first car I started going back most weekends, so it was alright.

"It was a good experience at Southampton. A lot of good players have come through the ranks there, and the training I did there will do me well for all of my career.

"I had a loan spell at Bournemouth at the end of last season, which went well. They were struggling at the time and I came in and scored a few goals, which was a great experience for me.

I was playing in a few first team games for Southampton when they came and asked me if I wanted to go out on loan, so I had mixed feelings, but they said they wanted me to play every week, so I was fine with it.

"I didn't know any of the lads when I arrived at Bournemouth, but I knew the manager because he used to be with Harry Redknapp when he was at Southampton. I went there, enjoyed it and scored six goals. The fans down there liked me, until I went back there with Port Vale!

"I went back to Southampton in the summer and played a few games in pre-season, and then they decided I needed to go out on loan again, so joined Vale.

I jumped at the chance of coming up here as it meant I could be closer to my daughter. She is five months old now and it means I can see more of her. I want to spend as much time as possible with her and at the moment I see it as a great opportunity to do just that.

"I can see here any day I want to and that is a good thing. She is the most important thing in my life, so it's a good thing to see her whenever I can. I think she is going to be a naughty one, she's bright and she's a little character already.

"There's no doubt, when you have a child it makes you look at life differently. It has matured me a lot and made me realise I have got responsibilities, and I think I needed that.

"I'm living in Nottingham at the moment and drive to Burslem each morning. It's not too far and I have got friends and family there. It is my




home town, so it's not too bad at all. But when you are in football you never know what is round the corner and I could be moving on at any time, so I will enjoy it while I can.


"I travel in every day with Ashley Westwood. He lives north of here, so we tend to meet up at the start of the A50 and take it in turns to drive here for training. I have enjoyed it here so far, despite the results. We are at the bottom, but I am sure we can start picking up results and climb up that table soon.

"I haven't scored as many as I would have liked, but I am sure they will come. Everybody asks me about the goal I scored against Cheltenham the other week. I don't care how they go in, it was a goal at the end of the day and that's all that counts.

"I scored a pretty good goal at Northampton a few days later and that was a good feeling when that one went in. Every goal is good for your confidence, and hopefully I will get a few more now."

SHOT OF THE MATCH


Shane Tudor blasted one in hope as Vale tried to give the penalties the slip, but Drench was equal to it in the second half.



GONE BUT NOT FORGOTTEN

THE EDITOR OF "PROGRAMME MONTHLY & FOOTBALL COLLECTABLE" MAGAZINE LOOKS AT SOME GREAT CLUBS AND FAMOUS GROUNDS NO LONGER WITH US

A regrettable, but regular feature of modern football is the battle of successive clubs against financial meltdown. There is now a well used template for survival, involving investors, administrators, fans groups, and the support of the football authorities. New words have thus entered the football vocabulary – liquidation, receivership, consortium, CVA and others usually associated with the financial, rather than the back, pages of newspapers.

In the light of the gargantuan efforts now made to prop up ailing football clubs, the story of Third Lanark's demise in 1967 seems incredible. One of the oldest Scottish football clubs, formed in 1872, original members of the Scottish League and Scottish Football Association, former League Champions and Scottish Cup winners, the club appeared to be thriving in the early 1960s under the management of former Rangers and Scotland captain George Young.

A settled defence laid the foundations for a famous forward line of Goodfellow, Hilley, Harley, Gray and McInnes to score the bulk of 100 League goals in 1960/61 when the club finished third in the First Division. Dave Hilley (to Newcastle United) and Alex Harley and Matt Gray (to Manchester City) were sold for huge transfer fees, and yet six years later the club went out of business.

Why it happened was partially explained in a Board of Trade enquiry - mismanagement by an unscrupulous owner - but how it was allowed to culminate in the club's death remains surprising to this day. There is no doubt that the eyes of Scottish football were focussed on other matters in the spring of 1967; Celtic won the European Cup and the domestic treble, Rangers reached the Cup Winners Cup Final, Kilmarnock the Fairs Cup semi final, and Scotland became the first country to beat World Champions England, and at Wembley too. The dwindling band of Thirds fans struggled to have their cries of despair heard amid such unprecedented success, and a famous old club was no more.

Third Lanark always issued attractive, if brief, programmes printed red on white paper in the club's colours, with a chatty editorial and some amusing cartoons as page headings. In better years, the programme amounted to 12 pages; otherwise it was just 8 pages, such as the last ever issued by the club, for the First Division match against Dunfermline Athletic on 10th April 1965.

A sign of the problems at the club is that the two advertising spaces, above and below the half time scoreboard on the back page, continued with the "This Space For Sale" message for the 20th and last programme of the season. Many



at the time also recognised that the majority of the advertising space which had been sold, were to businesses controlled by the club's Directors.

There were two pages of text, under the banner "Editor Talking", and with four matches of the season to go, relegation was a fait accompli. No wonder; Thirds won only three, and drew one of their 34 matches to finish with seven points, 15 short of survival (at a time of only two points for a win). It was a miserable way for this famous old club to bade farewell to the Division it had graced for much of its long life.

Searching for something positive to write about, the Editor alighted on the success enjoyed by former player Davie Hilley at Newcastle United, who were on their way to promotion to the First Division. The rewards for this success were a bonus of £1,000 plus a television set for each player. Times have truly changed in football.

Third Lanark spent two more seasons in the Second Division before going into Liquidation during the summer of 1967, but these were programme-less, as well as joy-less, seasons for the long suffering fans at Cathkin Park.





1950

The British intelligence service MI5 was brought into the hunt for the missing atomic scientist Bruno Pontecorvo who had not been seen for about seven weeks. Professor Pontecorvo and his family had arrived in Finland at the beginning of September but since disappeared. There was speculation that the family may have gone to the Soviet Union. The professor had recently left his post as a principal scientific officer at Harwell atomic research station in Oxfordshire and was due to begin a new job at Liverpool University the following January. His disappearance came just 10 months after another Harwell scientist. Klaus Fuchs, confessed in January to spying for the Soviet Union. The Minister of Supply, George Strauss, told MPs the professor had had only limited access to "secret subjects" for some time. But he admitted it would have been possible for the professor to gather information, at Harwell or while he was in Canada, which could be of value to the enemy.

1968

Trouble flared in Grosvenor Square. London, after an estimated 6,000 marchers faced up to police outside the United States Embassy. The protesters had broken away from another, bigger, march against US involvement in Vietnam but were confronted by a wall of police. The breakaway group, led by the Maoist Britain-Vietnam Solidarity Front was almost thwarted by the march organisers who were aware of the plan and feared violence would erupt. Once in Grovesnor Square the protesters formed a human chain and charged at the police wall but failed to break through and, after three hours of stalemate, they all dispersed. In the streets surrounding the square fireworks and other missiles were thrown but no injuries were caused and police considered them to be isolated incidents.

1978

Four people were killed and four others seriously wounded after a gunman opened fire at two separate

locations in the Midlands. The attacks happened on the Bustleholm estate, Wednesbury and later at a service station in Nuneaton, Shortly after 1930GMT a lone gunman went to Andrew Road and killed George Birkett and his son, Phillip, on their driveway and Mrs Birkett inside the house. Their daughter, Gillian Birkett, was seriously wounded. He then rang the bell of the house next door, shooting Judith Chambers who answered and then her husband Joe as he went to her aid. The gunman was then said to have sped off in a Ford Capri, shooting indiscriminately at houses, narrowly missing several people.

1982

Three RUC officers were killed by a bomb, planted by IRA terrorists, which exploded beneath their armoured police car. The officers were investigating the report of a robbery in Lurgan near Belfast when the bomb exploded and sent their car 40 yards (36 metres) into a field and caused a crater 60ft [18 metres] wide and 25ft (seven metres) deep. was thought the officers, one of whom was a Catholic, died immediately. The police officers wer driving down a country lane when command wire, linked to a nearby hill, was used to detonate the bomb Chief Constable of the RUC Sir John Hermon said: "My reaction is one of horror and sadness. We have been taking maximum precautions unfortunately not successfully on this occasion."

1977

Former Liberal leader
Jeremy Thorpe denied any
involvement in a plot to
kill one time friend
Norman Scott and
suggestions that he
had a homosexual
relationship with

the former male model. Mr Thorpe responded to questions from the media for an hour after delivering a prepared statement in a bid to clear his name. The former Liberal leader. who was accompanied by his wife Marion, made a point-by-point denial covering all aspects of the affair. He began by talking about his first acquaintance with Mr Scott in 1961 and went on to talk about the alleged plot in which former airline pilot Andrew Newton was supposed to have been offered £5,000 to kill Mr Scott. Mr Newton made the claim in two London evening newspapers. The pilot had been jailed for two years in 1976 after shooting Mr Scott's dog on a lonely stretch of Exmoor, but at the time there was no connection made with Mr Thorpe. But Mr Newton was guoted in the London Evening News, in the presence of his solicitor, as saying that it was a "contract to murder" and he was offered money by a leading Liberal to kill Mr Scott.







Considering things haven't been as delightful on the pitch as many of us associated with Port Vale would have liked, I've decided to discuss the Rugby World Cup instead of football this week. Following the Leyton Orient game last week, we stopped out in London for the night to watch the Rugby World Cup Final in a pub with some Vale supporting Londoners. It was a lovely, rather grand pub with sofas and nice fire in the main 'rugby' room. There was a rather positive atmosphere throughout. The room was mainly filled with England supporters, but about 20% of the spectators were from a South African background and consequently supporting the winners.

Why am I telling you all of this? Well, primarily as a football supporter, I was pleasantly surprised at the way in which the evening panned out among these particular supporters. Supporters were participating in a bit of friendly banter before and during the game, that remained friendly throughout. After the game, England supporters were congratulating the elated South African supporters by hugging and shaking hands. For me, it was quite surreal, but wonderful at the same time. As the evening wore on, England supporters were even seen sipping champagne as offered by the then jubilant and rather tipsy South African supporters.

Aside from support, the sport of football could benefit in some ways from rugby, it seems. Even at the highest peak in rugby, last Saturday, players respected every decision that the referee made. One decision in particular was absolutely crucial and maybe even a turning point to the whole game, and, while England players looked disappointed, we didn't see them rush and crowd the referee shaking fingers and having to be restrained by other players as we so often see in football. Throughout the tournament the referee's decisions seemed to be respected and players continued to simply get on with the game in front of them.

One thing that also stood out as a comparison to football was the TV play-back system. Controversy over football turning to television replays as a means of making a more informed decision has been ongoing for a number of years now. Instances such as the World Cup Final suggests that even this system doesn't eradicate controversy. Since the final, the particular try in question has been at the centre of much of the discussion regarding the tournament, suggesting that even television replays will not always put an end to potential referee human error.



ON THE SPOT

BILLY PAYNTER

There are mixed feelings about the return of Billy Paynter to Vale Park this afternoon - his first visit since leaving the Valiants to join Hull City, initially on loan, in November 2005.

He will be greeted affectionately by the backroom staff who got to know him so well during his time with the club, but at the same time, they all know he could cause his former club huge problems on the field of play.

A popular figure in the Vale dressing room, and still only 23 years old, Billy made his debut as a 16-year-old, coming on as a substitute in a home defeat to Walsall in May 2001.

He went on to make 157 starts for the Valiants. scoring 34 goals in the process, before both he and skipper Sam Collins moved to Humberside.

After an 18 month spell with the Tigers, Billy was on the move again, this time to the other end of the country when he joined Southend United again, initially on a month's loan.

He failed to impress at Roots Hall, where he was limited to just seven starts, but he kick-started his career with a loan spell with Bradford City at the back end of last season, prompting Swindon Town to make a move for him in August of this year.

Ironically, Martin Foyle had been making his own enquiries about the former Valiant before he decided on a move to the County Ground.

He has since hit five goals in seven games and will be looking to continue at one of his old stomping grounds this afternoon.

MANAGING TO SUCCEED

Football historian **LEIGH EDWARDS** profiles ten leading Swindon Town managers.

SAM ALLEN

Sam Allen gave Swindon Town outstanding service in various capacities. Previously a clerk in the GWR offices, he spent seven years as a Swindon director before becoming their secretarymanager in July 1902. He made several shrewd signings and quided Swindon to the Southern League championship in 1910-11 and 1913-14, also twice leading them to the FA Cup semi-finals. Taking Swindon into the Football League in 1920, he plotted further FA Cup runs and remained in charge of team affairs until becoming secretary only on the arrival of Ted Vizard in April 1933. He held that post until his death on New Year's Day 1946.

BERT HEAD

Bert Head plotted Swindon Town's 1962-63 promotion success. Signing professional for Torquay United in October 1936, the defender moved to Bury in February 1952 and was assistantboss before becoming Swindon's manager in October 1955. He produced several fine players including Mike Summerbee, Ernie Hunt, Don Rogers and Rod Thomas before returning to Bury as manager in August 1965. Appointed Crystal Palace's boss in April 1966, he guided them to the top-flight for the first time in 1968-69 and had a spell as general manager. He was later manager and director at Bath City and died in February 2002.

DANNY WILLIAMS

Danny Williams guided Swindon Town to a promotion and League Cup 'double' in 1968-69. A former wing-half, he turned professional with hometown Rotherham in October 1942 and starred in their 1950-51 Third Division (North) title triumph. He made a club record 459 League appearances for the Millers before becoming trainercoach in July 1960, then was manager prior to taking charge of Swindon in August 1965. Leaving the County Ground in July 1969 to manage Sheffield Wednesday, he then managed Mansfield Town before rejoining Swindon as boss from March 1974 until May 1978. He now lives in Bournemouth

FRED FORD

Fred Ford plotted Swindon Town's 1970 Anglo-Italian Cup final triumph. He was a centre-half with Erith & Belvedere, Arsenal. Charlton Athletic, Millwall and Carlisle United, then coached Bristol Rovers before becoming Bristol City's manager in July 1960. He guided them to promotion in 1964-65 and discovered several notable players, then coached Swindon from September 1967 until his appointment as Bristol Rovers' boss in April 1968. Returning to Swindon as manager between October 1969 and May 1971, he later coached Torquay United. then was Oxford United's chief scout until his death in October

LOU MACARI

Former Scotland international midfielder Lou Macari managed Swindon Town to the Fourth Division title in 1985-86. He won all three major Scottish honours with Celtic before moving to Manchester United in January 1973, featuring in three FA Cup finals including their 1977 triumph. Joining Swindon as player-boss in July 1984, he also quided them to promotion in 1986-87 and Second Division playoffs in 1988-89. He left in July 1989 to manage West Ham and briefly Birmingham before leading Stoke City to the Second Division title in 1992-93. Rejoining Celtic as boss, he later managed Stoke again and Huddersfield Town.

OSSIE ARDILES

Former Argentina international midfielder Ossie Ardiles was unlucky not to lead Swindon Town to the top-flight in 1989-90. Together with Ricky Villa, the World Cup winner made headlines with his transfer from Huracan to Spurs in July 1978. He helped them win the FA Cup in 1981 and UEFA Cup in 1984, moving to QPR in May 1988. Appointed Swindon's boss in July 1989, he plotted their 1989-90 Second Division play-off final success but they were denied promotion due to an illegal payments scandal. He took charge of Newcastle United in March 1991, then managed West Brom and Spurs before coaching overseas.

GLENN HODDLE

Ex-England international midfielder Glenn Hoddle plotted Swindon Town's 1992-93 First Division play-off final triumph. Signing professional for Spurs in April 1975, he starred in their 1981 and 1982 FA Cup final successes and was a finalist again shortly before joining Monaco in June 1987. He helped win the

French League title in 1987-88 and was appointed Swindon's player-boss in April 1991, scoring once in 64 League games while at the County Ground. Moving to Chelsea in a similar capacity in June 1993, he guided them to the 1994 FA Cup final and has since managed England, Southampton, Spurs and Wolves.

STEVE McMAHON

Former England international midfielder Steve McMahon managed Swindon Town to the Second Division title in 1995-96. Initially with Everton, he joined Aston Villa in May 1983 and moved to Liverpool in September 1985. He starred as they won the League Championship three times and FA Cup in 1989, then reunited with Peter Reid at Manchester City. Appointed Swindon's playerboss in November 1994, he made 42 League appearances and remained in charge until September 1999. He managed Blackpool to promotion in 2000-01 as well as two LDV Vans Trophy final triumphs, since coaching Australian side Perth Glory.

ANDY KING

Former England U-21 midfielder Andy King managed Swindon Town to the Second Division playoffs in 2003-04. Signing professional for Luton Town in July 1974, he joined Everton in April 1976 and appeared in the 1977 League Cup final. He moved to QPR in September 1980, then West Brom a year later and rejoined Everton in August 1982. After spells at Wolves, Luton again and Aldershot, he became Mansfield Town's boss in November 1993. He was assistant-boss at Grimsby and Swindon, where he was appointed manager from November 2000 until August 2001, then again between January 2002 and September 2005.

PAUL STURROCK

Former Scotland international striker Paul Sturrock guided Swindon Town to promotion in 2006-07. A legend at Dundee United, he starred as they won the Scottish Premier title in 1982-83, Scottish League Cup twice and were Scottish Cup finalists four times. He became their coach in June 1989, then St Johnstone's boss in November 1993 and rejoined Dundee United as manager in September 1998. Taking charge of Plymouth Argyle in October 2000, he plotted two promotion campaigns, then managed Southampton. He guided Sheffield Wednesday to promotion in 2004-05 and became Swindon's boss in November 2006.

Port Vale's pioneering Valiants Against Racism campaign has this week embraced the digital age with the launch of the official Valiants Against Racism website







Vale regained the lead on 23 minutes as WILLOCK headed home from a Richman free kick after Willock himself had been fouled with a defender pulling on his shirt some 35 yards out. He rose above the defender twisting his head to direct the ball past the 'keeper's outstretched hand and in to the top corner of the net. Goodlad was forced to get down well, if a little late, at the far post on 38 minutes to push a shot

around the post to maintain the lead. Talbot hit a long range drive with power as the half finished but it flew wide.

The second half began with 5 minutes of continual fouls and free kicks from both teams as the cold seemed to have set in after having a delayed start due to Colin Miles being late out. Bradford were level again after 52 minutes. Lowe was too slow in the full back position to stop a cross and although Talbot tried to clear, the ball was put away by Colbeck for 2-2.

Willock almost put Vale ahead again as he met a left wing cross from Atkinson at the near post. His header hit the far post and came out again with Glover unable to force the ball home and in his annoyance at not getting a corner Glover was booked for dissent. Vale were surprised to go behind for the first time after 64 minutes when there looked no danger. Taylforth had the ball some 25 yards out on the left hand corner of the box. He hit a shot with no







great power and everyone stood still in amazement as it went inside the post with Goodlad making no attempt to stop it. A Glover shot on 67 had power but was straight at the 'keeper but Bradford had realised that shooting from any distance was likely to result in a goal, but they usually shot straight at Goodlad.

A Vale attack broke down on 80 minutes and as the ball came out Talbot hit a stunning 30 yard volley that seemed to be dipping over the keeper and into the net but the goalkeeper took off and finger tipped the ball over for a corner. Glover was booked again and consequently sent off for a late tackle that the defender made the most of with 3 minutes remaining and straight afterwards Talbot sustained a head injury and had to go off as Vale fell to a defeat that had looked unlikely for much of the game.





Port Vale FC support this programme as part of The Prince's Trust Football Initiative in partnership with the Premier League, the Professional Footballers' Association and the Football Foundation, which is celebrating its 10th anniversary.

Another element of the 12 week programme is the community project. Team 184 raised £200 through a sponsored walk and a car wash at Vale Park. The money was used to decorate and revamp animal farm Finney Gardens, making the animal pens brighter with colourful hand painted pictures.

The team's latest project involves taking a group of young people with learning difficulties on a number of day trips, involving the cinema, ten pin bowling and Cheshire Oaks shopping centre. The team raised another £200 through bag packing to make this possible.

So far the team have made a huge difference to their local community and we wish them the very best once they complete their course on 26th October.

The east stand is called The Antich Stand and has a large single tier, housing the home fans.

The Pink Link Stand Ithe South Stand) which houses the visiting supporters, is identical to the east stand. This stand can hold 4,000 fans with excellent views of the pitch. But despite the Yorkshire winds which whistle around the open corners of the ground, and the fact that to get to both the refreshments and the toilets means going back out in the open, The Galpharm will always hold fond memories for the 4,000 fans who attended the final match of the season in 1998. The result ensured the Vale stayed up whilst Stoke City were relegated!

BEST CHIPPY/PLACES TO EAT:



There are a number of chippies around the ground, the closest being Ingham's Plaice 6. To find it from the ground simply turn right onto St Andrews Road [B6432], proceed for about 350 yards and then continue straight ahead onto Galloway Street where you will find the chippy.


IN A LEAGUE OF OUR OWN

AHEAD OF THE GAME

In season 2005-2006 Crewe were relegated from The Championship. As they had spent only one season below the second tier in the last nine years, still possessed their long-serving Manager and had two quality strikers, hopes were high that a return to the Championship would be on the cards quite soon. Two points from the first four league games represented an inauspicious start to the new campaign but four victories in the next five propelled them to 7th spot. For a while after that form was inconsistent with a pattern of win a few and lose a few being the order of the day. This was followed by a winless run of seven games leading up to the New Year, leaving the Alex in 17th position with everyone connected to the club growing nervous about the prospect of a second successive relegation. A superb February saw them win four in a row to banish any negativity in the camp but results for the rest of the season were only sufficient to keep them ticking over. When the season ended they were in 13th place, below Vale on goal difference, much to the chagrin of the fans of the South Cheshire club. The Alex did, however, have the satisfaction of winning the JPT Quarter Final tie by 3-2 at Vale Park, a game not without controversy. Varney found the net 17 times in league games [25 in all] and Maynard netted 17 [19 in all] in league games, making them similar to Vale in having two prolific strikers.

Ordinarily, I mention the players moving in and out of a club next but the most notable change was at a higher level in the club. Manager Dario Gradi had been at the helm since 1983 but finally handed over the reigns in May to Steve Holland, officially as First Team Coach. Holland has been brought up in the Gradi tradition. Gradi is still part of the set-up at Gresty Road, officially as Technical Director, assisted by Neil Baker so perhaps the change is not as dramatic as it might seem. It is hard to imagine Dario not being part of the Crewe scene and we still hear his voice on local radio.


Since the end of last season the major outgoing has been Luke Varney to Charlton for £2m plus the usual clauses. Other outgoings have been the precocious Billy Jones to Preston for a tribunalfixed fee, Paul Bignot to Kidderminster, Cavell Coo to Altrincham, Michael Higdon to Falkirk, Darran Kempson to Shrewsbury, Darren Moss to Shrewsbury, Jon Otsemobor to Norwich, Ritchie Sutton to Stafford, Lee Bell to Mansfield and Pavol Suhaj to Stafford, Since the start of the season David Vaughan has also moved on. In have come Colin Daniel from Eastwood for an initial £20,000, Billy Jones (not the same one!] from Exeter for £65,000, Steve Schumacher from Bradford City, Daniel O'Donnell from Liverpool, Eugen Bopp from Rotherham and Chris McCready



from Tranmere, returning to his previous club. Most well-known signing to Vale fans has been ex-Vale George Abbey. Striker Lee Barnard has also arrived on loan from Spurs and he has shared most of the goals with Roberts,

Results so far have been disappointing, though not quite as bad as those of the Vale. At home they have beaten Brighton 2-1, Huddersfield 2-0 and then Luton 2-0 last Saturday, drawn with Millwall 0-0 and lost to Levton Orient 0-2 and more amazingly strugglers Bournemouth 1-4. Away they have yet to win but drew at Bristol Rovers 1-1, Swindon 1-1 and Tranmere 1-1, losing at Doncaster 0-2, Oldham 2-3 and Southend 0-3. In the Carling Cup they made an early exit when losing 0-3 at home to Hull City. They also lost away to Chester on penalties in the JPT.

Before the season began fans of the two clubs will have anticipated this fixture as being of great importance in addition to having the usual significance as a local derby. Few will, however, have expected this to be a game which mattered in the fight against relegation. It is early days yet, of course, and at the time of writing I do not know who will be in charge of Vale but whoever it is he will wish to win this one.
