



POLICY ON THE THROWING OF OBJECTS FROM THE CROWD

Due to a number of high profile incidents that have occurred at matches in recent months, where players and a match official have been struck by coins thrown from the crowd, Carlisle United would like to remind supporters that the throwing of any object within the stadium is a criminal offence and strong action will be taken against anyone committing such an offence. We encourage supporters to report any misconduct they might witness to the club.

CUFC RACISM POLICY

Carlisle United Football Club wishes to stress that It will not tolerate any form of racist behaviour whatsoever. Anyone using racist behaviour will be ejected from the Stadium and reported to the relevant authorities. If you hear or see racist behaviour at Brunton Park please report it to the nearest Steward and help us to Kick Racism out of Football.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURE

In the event of an emergency occurring at the Stadium the Public Address system will be used to broadcast information and instructions to the spectators. Such broadcasts will be preceded by a threetone chime. When the chimes are heard please be silent, pay attention to what is said and obey any instructions. An example of this alert will be carried out just before kick off and at half time and it will be clearly stated that the announcement is for instructive purposes only.

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

would like to start these notes by referring to two people.

The first is Roy Allen who passed away recently and who was a loyal Carlisle United supporter and sponsor of the club. Roy was a centre stand season ticket holder and attended games with his friend Bill Jackson. At half time we always exchanged opinions on the game so far. I'm sure I speak for all supporters who knew Roy as we pass on our thoughts to his wife and family during what is always a difficult time.

The second person is David Allen who was recently appointed to the board of directors. David Joined the club with Fred Story and has given us financial advice during this time. I am sure David will be a very valuable member of the board and will enjoy his time with us in this interesting but difficult industry.

Back to football and all the news seems to be centred on managers coming and going and, in particular, the England manager. I was asked questions by Sky Sports news in a recent survey on the England manager since his dismissal and gave my opinions. Asked about his sacking, I replied that I thought he should never have been given the job in the first place. I was asked were the recent takeovers of many premier league clubs by foreigners and the lack of home grown players in that league the reason for poor England performances. With regards to the changes of ownership of premier league clubs having an effect, I thought it too early to form hard opinions but I feel that American or Russian owners and the likes will be looking at the investment they have made and I am sure the development of the England team will be the last thing they think about.

The next question asked was the large number of foreign players in the premier league (which is now over 60%) having an effect. I have written before on this subject and feel overseas players should be restricted to a number per team or shortly home grown players will all be in the Championship. Then we will need a Championship manager for England who can pick a team from these players. The Scottish team and indeed the England Cricket team suffered from a similar lack of control on foreign players.

I was asked about a new manager and, whilst I don't know many of the candidates in person, I hope he will be English, after all one of our coaches must be good enough for the job. In my opinion I think Alan Curbishley could be a candidate or Harry Redknapp who would at least be entertaining. I think selection of managers whilst being the most important decision you have to make can be personal preference, but let's hope an Englishman gets the opportunity.

Tonight we entertain Swindon Town who, at the time of writing, could be managerless as Paul Sturrock moves to Plymouth. I wish the directors, players and supporters a warm welcome to Brunton Park.

Before closing I know supporters will, like ourselves, be disappointed at the lack of success in the two cup competitions, but this happens in football. The good thing is we are still showing good form in the league with three wins and two draws out of the last five games. Let's hope the run goes on tonight.

Boardroomconfidential

John Nixon provides exclusive access to the inside info

n this Boardroom Confidential, John Nixon talks about another transfer target:

The player I will discuss now became available to us at the end of June. You can tell by the volume of notes that I have that it was a long, drawn out affair.

It started when an agent called us to say that his player was available, and Neil McDonald confirmed that it was a lad that he really wanted.

He was leaving a Northern team (not in League One) because they weren't renewing his contract. At that time he was looking for a minimum package of somewhere around £100k to £125k, plus a two-year deal as a minimum. On top of that he wanted appearance money, goal and Play Off bonus payments, and a wage increase if we went up to the Championship. He also required us to cover his insurance premiums. That was quite a list of demands!

We started to put together a deal that we were comfortable with, so that we could talk with him some more. He was a forward, he had a bit of form and good history, and he seemed to be keen to join us. The agent had said that he was very positive about it, but that he was also looking at other clubs in the North of England just in case.

We did our sums, presented a figure that we were happy with and, if we're honest, I think the player himself was looking for more at that point. By then, we heard that he was actively talking to another club, so we were in competition for him. The down side of that was that he knew their manager and guite a bit about them. whereas he had never met Neil and he knew very little about Carlisle. Mind you, it was still a very positive situation, and we were very much in the reckoning. Wages wise he had been working at a very good level of around £250,000 a year, in terms of income, so that was a real factor in all of our dealings.

His contract didn't actually run out until the end of July, but he agreed that if he came

to us he would come at the beginning of July and work with us, with a view to us taking over his contract at the start of August. We invited him up here, and Neil was very keen to talk to him and to show him around the set up.

The agent was constantly getting back to me, trying to get the best deal he could, and it all seemed to be progressing at a decent pace ... when all of a sudden a second agent became involved. This took us by surprise, because we had been dealing with one on the player's behalf for a few weeks, and it really set us back.

We discussed it with the player, and it transpired that he had been trying to break free from the London based firm that had suddenly thrown their hat in the ring on his behalf, and he had wanted to progress with the agent that we had been dealing with. Unfortunately he was still contracted to the London firm. What had happened, I believe, is that the player was presenting us with his preferred agent but was, or so it appeared, still contracted to the other one, and they were determined to take the deal on, on his behalf.

On his second visit to see us he came up with one of the London based agents. Talks went very well, and we reached some encouraging agreements all round. With it all looking really positive we then received a call from the Boss of the London firm, and he told us that he was unhappy because he didn't feel that the deal was adequate.

It was all becoming very complicated, because the agent who spoke to us face to face was happy, the player had compromised in some areas and he was happy to sign, and then the senior partner of the firm threw his spanner in to the works. Despite trying to move things onwards from where they were, we found that he did not want to shift at all on the figures that he was talking about and we cut off the negotiations. As far as we were concerned, that was that.

Registration requirement to read Match Reports

I mentioned this in one of my previous articles but, I'm sorry to say, it hasn't quite gone away.

Football League interactive are keen to make the Match Report section of the Official Site an area that readers would have to log in to before accessing the information. Each Match Report that appears gets a massive volume of hits within 12 hours of it going live (scary thought that) so, as you can see, it makes it ripe for a campaign such as this. As I have already stated, both in this column and to the Football League themselves, I am dead against the whole idea of it.

The compromise we have been given is a section of the site called the E-Squad. It is a registration section, and by signing up to it we hope to give you access to things like exclusive competitions, regular newsletters, exclusive interviews and a chatroom (still to be confirmed) where exiles can meet up and natter in real time - imagine how useful that would be when there is a game going on.

We'll be launching the E-Squad at some point in the very near future. Please, if you are a regular visitor to the Official Site, then we urge you to sign up. Registration to the E-Squad will keep the remainder of the site open to all, something that we have battled to see introduced anyway. Now that we have it, it would be terrible to lose it again. If the E-Sauad sign up rate is low, then we may find that FLI take big chunks away from us, and that's the last thing we want.

at all. I did, however, receive a couple of complaints on the morning after the Grimsby Town replay.

I must admit, the complaints have thrown me off a little bit, because I can't quite understand what they are getting at. This means that our subscribers received a broadcast until approximately 11pm that night. The PTV operator also confirmed that this included a full interview with John Ward.

I have asked the people (x2) who complained to explain further but I have received nothing back, as yet. I would like to get to the bottom of the problem, to prevent whatever it was that happened from happening again but, in order to do that, I need more information.





BILLY PAYNTER Striker


triker Billy Paynter signed for Swindon Town on Friday 31st August for an undisclosed fee from Southend United. The 23year old striker was restricted to just five league starts at Roots Hall after signing a three-year contract with the Blues from then Championship rivals Hull City in August 2006. He also spent a successful loan spell at Bradford City last term where he scored four goals in fifteen league starts - including a stunning strike against Bristol City. Paynter began his career at Port Vale where he scored 30 goals in 119 league starts for the club. He initially moved on loan to Hull in November 2005 before signing permanently for an undisclosed sixfigure fee less than two months later. He has an impressive goalscoring record in League One and hit 14 goals during the 2003/04 campaign and followed that up with 13 goals the following campaign. The 6'0 striker has scored 37 league goals in 150 league starts and adds muchneeded firepower to the Swindon attack







PETER BREZOVAN

A giant in goal at 6'7, Brezovan signed on a year's loan from Czech club FC Brno in the summer of 2006. Brezovan became a fans favourite after performing heroics on his competitive debut against Hartlepool United on the opening debut, saving two penalties from Porter and Humphreys to earn Town all three points. Unfortunately he sustained in the October home encounter with Grimsby Town and missed the remainder of the promotion season. Signed a twoyear permanent deal to stay at SN1, having put pen to paper on his new contract in March 2007 and made a first team comeback in October at Port Vale.

PHIL SMITH

Phil Smith Joined Swindon in late July 2006 from Crawley Town. Smith had made 74 starts for Crawley Town during a two-year stay, which followed a year's spell at Margate where he made 35 starts. Smith was a revelation in between the sticks, which included saving a penalty at MK Dons on New Year's Day and being named the PFA Fans' Player of the Month for December 2006. Started the 2007/08 campaign in good form although was sidelined with a groin injury in late October.

Signed from Watford in the summer of 2005. Due to the departure of Paul Robinson to West Bromwich Albion he was thrust into the firstteam spotlight at Watford and coped admirably, registering two goals - the first of which a 'Goal of the Season' contender at Sheffield United in front of the Sky Sports cameras. He made 38 league starts for Town last season in a variety of positions including right back, left back and midfield.

JAMIE VINCENT

Jamie Vincent arrived at The County Ground in the summer of 2006 hoping to make the left-back slot his own, and by the end of the campaign he had done far more than just that. Made Captain following the injury to Ady Williams in February, Vincent also performed at centre-back and was a rock at the back throughout the campaign. Vincent began his football career as a trainee at Crystal Palace before making the switch to AFC Bournemouth, where he made over 100 appearances between 1996 and 1999. He then made a £500,000 switch to Huddersfield Town which was followed by an £800,000 deal which saw him move to Portsmouth in 2001, Spells at Derby County and Millwall then followed.

MIGUEL COMMINGES


Signed in July 2007, Comminges first came to the attention of the Town Boss during a scouting mission to France towards the end of last season. Born in Guadeloupe, France, the defender has previous experience with Amiens SC and then signed for Reims in 2003 and made a total of 74 appearances for the Second Division side. He has also represented the Guadeloupe national football team.

HASNEY ALJOFREE

Experienced centreback who arrives at The County Ground with plenty of Coca-Cola Championship experience. Previous clubs include Bolton Wanderers, Dundee United and Plymouth Argyle, from where he signed for Swindon on a three-year deal in the summer of 2007. Began the season alongside Jerel Ifil and was made on-field Captain by Manager Paul Sturrock.

CHRIS BLACKBURN

24-year old became the fourth central defender in Town's squad, with Hasney Aljofree, Jerel Ifil and Adv Williams also competing for the central berths. Chester-born Blackburn joined Morecambe in February 2004 on a short-term deal and eventually signed a new twoyear contract to stay at Christie Park. After joining The Shrimps as a midfielder, he was then converted to a defender after an injury crisis. During the 2005-6 campaign Blackburn's impressive performances caught the eye of the England National Game selectors and he was soon included in the England National Game line-up, Blackburn has also had spells with Northwich Victoria and following his return from holiday in India, has put pen to paper on a two-year deal with The Robins.

SOFIENE ZAABOUB

Versatile left-sided player at home in defence or midfield, Zaaboub was new manager Paul Sturrock's first signing as Town boss. Having joined initially on a short-term contract, he has since signed a new deal to keep him at Swindon for another 18 months. He made his debut as a substitute against Carlisle United in the FA Cup and was a trialist at Sturrock's former club Sheffield Wednesday. Previous clubs include FC Brussels, Modena and St. Etienne.

JEREL IFIL

Powerful defender Jerel Ifil joined Town in the summer of 2004 after enjoying three loan spells with Town previously from 2002-04. Jerel became a fan's favourite during his brief stays in Wiltshire and signed on a permanent basis in June 2004, he has now exceeded 100 appearances for the club. In 2006-7 Ifil enjoyed his best season to date in a Town shirt, benefiting from the experienced Ady Williams alongside him at the heart of the defence and he scored the opener against Walsall on the last day of the season, helping Town secure promotion.


ADY WILLIAMS

Named on-field Captain by former manager Dennis Wise in July 2006, Ady Williams brought a wealth of league and international experience to the club. Signed from Coventry Cit, the former Welsh International boasts successful spells with Wolves and Reading on his CV - just the credentials that helped set Town on their way to League Two success. His leadership skills have been there for all to see during the first half of the campaign and his determined attitude has been at the forefront of Town's promotion challenge. A knee injury sustained against Hartlepool United in February developed into a serious setback, which saw the skipper undergo surgery which ruled him out of the remainder of the season. After a summer of rehabilitation, Willo' is now closing in on a return to match action.

BARRY CORR

After impressing during a three-

month loan spell last term, Barry Corr put pen to paper on a new two-year contract in June 2006, signing on a free transfer from Sheffield Wednesday. The Irishman made his debut for the Town reserves against Bristol City on the same day he put pen to paper on the initial loan deal and netted on what was his first appearance in a Swindon shirt. Corr joined The Owls in April 2005 from Yorkshire rivals Leeds United after an initial trial spell with the Elland Road club. With an industrious front man and with a 6'3 frame certainly offers a physical presence in the strike force. He has also gained youth honours for the Republic of Ireland during his time with Leeds and had a loan spell with Bristol City earlier in the 2006-7 season. He made a goalscoring debut, hitting the second goal at Lincoln City on Sunday 25th March to earn a valuable win.



LEE PEACOCK

Lee Peacock joined Swindon Town on 20th January 2006 on a free transfer from Sheffield Wednesday. The experienced frontman started his career at Carlisle United as a trainee, but after scoring 11 goals in 52 appearances he made the switch to Mansfield Town in October 1997 for £75,000. It proved to be a productive spell with The Stags with 29 goals in 80 appearances

attracting Manchester City who parted with £500,000 for his services. However, his time at Maine Road was not as successful as he would have liked due to injuries, but his next stop certainly was. A £600,000 move to Bristol City in August 2000 heralded the start of a successful four year spell at Ashton Gate, 54 goals in 131 league starts was the result of his stay with the Robins. Next up was Sheffield Wednesday, who he joined on a free transfer in the summer of 2004. Peacock wasted no time in settling in at Town, scoring on his debut against AFC Bournemouth after coming off the bench in the 4-2 home win. However, he finished the season with just 11 starts to his name after a knee injury ruled him out of the final games of the campaign. Having worked with Manager Paul Sturrock before at Sheffield Wednesday, 'Peacs' has now been moved into a central midfield role.

ANDY NICHOLAS

'Nicho' is now the club's longest serving player after joining from Liverpool in June 2003, where he came through the youth system but struggled to break into the first team. He was a regular in the Under 19's side at Anfield and won many plaudits with his performances at left back, which prompted Andy King to snap up the youngster. After working his way into the manager's starting line up with some hard work in training, he seized his chance to become a regular member of the side throughout the 2003/04 season and managed his first senior goal in a 4-2 win at Stockport in February. Was awarded a new one-year deal in the summer of 2007.

BLAIR STURROCK

Sturrock junior arrived at The County Ground in November 2006 to join up with Physio Dick Mackey for treatment following an injury which ruled him out of the latter stages of the 2005-6 campaign, when he was at Rochdale. The striker joined Dundee United as a trainee before spending time at Brechin on loan. Sturrock then had a three-year spell





on the south coast with Plymouth Argyle making most of his appearances as a substitute. In 2004, Sturrock moved to Kidderminster. then onto Rochdale 9 months later where he hit six goals in fifteen starts. The Scottish striker netted three goals in seven starts during the promotion run in and signed a new two-year deal in July 2007.

CRAIG EASTON

Craia Easton arrived at The County Ground in June 2007 and adds further experience to the central midfield area. The former Scotland Under 21 International joins up at The County Ground with over 300 league appearances under his belt. Easton, 28, started his career at Dundee United where he came up through the ranks to make 162 league starts before departing in the summer of 2004. He then spent a year at Livingston before joining Leyton Orient in July 2005. In all he made 65 league starts in two seasons for Martin Lina's O's.

KAID MOHAMED

Welsh striker with pace to burn, Kaid Mohamed made his first appearance for Swindon Town in the pre-seaosn friendly with Bristol City on Tuesday 31st July, Having impressed the Town management during that display, Mohamed signed a one-year deal later in the same week. Described by Paul Sturrock as 'one for the future', Mohamed came off the bench on the opening day of the season at Northampton Town for his league debut. Signed from Carmarthen Town, Mohamed's last appearance for his former club was a memorable one as he hit two goals in the Welsh Cup Final against Afan Lido, a game which took place 24 hours after Town had secured promotion back into League One with a draw against Walsall.

STEVE ADAMS

Swindon Town signed midfielder Steve Adams prior to the start of the 2007/08 season after a successful trial spell. Adams, who is 27 in September joined The Pilgrims in

August 1998 having been a trainee at Home Park and went on to make 131 league starts for his hometown club before a switch to Sheffield Wednesday in March 2005. He spent two years at Hillsbrough but injury restricted him to just 21 appearances for The Owls. After leaving Hillsbrough at the end of last season, Adams took up Paul Sturrock's offer of pre-season training and he impressed enough during a series of friendly appearances to be awarded a permanent deal which will keep him at Swindon until February 2008.

JON-PAUL McGOVERN

Jon-Paul McGovern joined Swindon Town on Friday 31st August 2007, just hours before the close of the transfer window. A lively winger who can operate out wide or through the middle, McGovern's arrival is a major boost to Paul Sturrock who had been chasing the player for some time. The 26-year old was a key cog in Paul Sturrock's Sheffield Wednesday side which won promotion to the Coca-Cola Championship and made over 60 appearances for The Owls during two seasons at Hillsborough. McGovern began his career as a trainee at Celtic but after one season, he was released by the Scottish giants and subsequently signed for Livingston In July 2003 after a successful loan spell in England with Sheffield United. A promising season for 'Livi' saw Sheffield Wednesday come in for the midfielder who joined Paul Sturrock's squad in time for the start of the 2004/2005 season. The Glasgow-born midfielder has signed a contract until the close of the 2009/10 season.

SIMON COX

Swindon Town manager Paul Sturrock completed his second signing of transfer deadline day on 31 August with the addition of Reading striker Simon Cox, who joined on loan until January 1 2008. The 20-year old signed a one-year professional deal at The Madeiski Stadium in the summer and appeared for the Royals on Tuesday 28 August in the Carling Cup win at Swansea City, Reading-born Cox joined his hometown club at the age of nine and progressed up through the academy ranks before making his senior debut against Luton Town in the Carling Cup in September 2005. Cox spent time in League One last season, scoring three goals in six league starts for Northampton Town towards the end of the 2006/07 campaign.

CHRISTIAN ROBERTS

Cardiff-born striker who joined Town in October 2004 in a £50,000 switch from local rivals Bristol City. He is an aggressive runner and will add much needed pace to the Swindon frontline. Formerly with Exeter City where he scored 18 goals in 67 league starts for the Grecians from 2000 - 2002, 'Robbo' enjoyed a solid season during 2006-7, finishing as top scorer with 13 goals and began the new campaign as an option on the right or left of midfield.





The Robins had the wind with them for the first half and stand in keeper Phil Smith used it to his advantage with just 60 seconds on the clock when he launched a massive kick in to the Carlisle area. Kev Gray, running backwards, had to get his head on it and send it for a corner, preventing Westwood from having to deal with the awkward ball.

Disaster struck in the 9th minute when Swindon broke quickly, using it well. Weston and Evans combined in the middle of the park, releasing Aaron Brown on the Carlisle right. His cross, swirling in the wind, was difficult for Lumsdon to deal with and his powerful downwards header left his keeper with no hope as it whistled in to the back of his own net.

The Cumbrians almost shot themselves in the foot again in the 15th minute when a loose pass from Hawley ran all the way through to Roberts on the edge of the box. A bobble caused him to slice his shot, and Westwood was pleased to see it drop over his bar.

The visitors were getting forward nicely, without producing an end product, in what was an encouraging spell of possession football as they settled themselves down.

Royce Brownlie was then guilty of a glaring miss that could have doubled the Robins lead in the 23rd minute when he slipped beyond Murphy in midfield and surged in to the box. With players in support, and just Westwood to beat, he lost his cool and lifted his effort high over the target.

Christian Roberts was next to send a gilt edged chance way wide of the target when he was sent free by a Paul Evans pass. The big striker rushed his volley and could only acknowledge his wayward finishing

to the rest of his team.

If there is a good time to score then a strike just before half time will fall in to that category. United duly obliged, and it was all started by a teasing pass over the top by Lumsdon that put Gall in to a dangerous area. Smith was out quickly to challenge and he did enough to force the ball away for a corner. The delivery that followed from Lumsdon was perfect for Key Gray at the back post, and he put enough on the header to ensure that it evaded the valiant attempt to clear it off the line, leveling the scores just before the break.

United would create the first opening after the break when Hawley volleyed a first time pass to Gall. His cross found Holmes who nodded it down for Thirlwell, 20 yards out. Under pressure he went for the first time, left footed piledriver, but couldn't keep it down enough to trouble the target.

It was a match in the balance and both Holmes and Hawley were unfortunate in the 52nd minute when a Livesey cross in to the box flew past the pair.


Hawley showed his strength in the 62nd minute when he shrugged off the close attentions of Jack Smith down by the Swindon goal line. He wriggled his way free before picking out Holmes, 8 yards out. His first touch took him away from his marker and he was unlucky to see his shot drift wide as he wrapped his left foot around the ball and sent it across the face of goal.

A series of errors led to the second goal of the afternoon for the Robins, starting with Brownlie leaving two players in his wake with a neat flick out wide on the right. His pass towards Roberts found Livesey off balance, and the defender could only trap it with his arm as he hit the floor. Roberts was on to it like a flash, pushing it out from under his feet and giving himself the chance to stroke a thunderbolt in to the bottom corner beyond the dive of Westwood.

Carlisle kept trying to get forward and Key Gall put a curling shot in to Smith's midriff as the clock ticked down. However, the Robins would deal a killer blow when new arrival Lukas Jatkiewicz slipped Roberts through to notch his second of the afternoon. It was a good finish from the in form striker, who took two touches, beating his man, before blasting it in to the bottom corner.



PAUL Sturrock admitted defeat in his fight to sign players before the loan window closed in November.

The Town boss had several loan players on standby but was not allowed to bring them to the County Ground because of the transfer embargo.

He sald: "I have left everybody in the loop, in the know and nobody has got back to me (about the embargo). I have got people walting to come in, but in the end there's nothing I can do.

Town chief executive Martyn Starnes admitted: "If the window had stayed open a further week we'd have had a much better chance of getting it done, but we've just been beaten by the regulations and the timing unfortunately. We have tried. I went to see the Football League to see if there was any relaxation from their position, but they weren't in a position to move within our time scale. We want to be able to provide Paul with the best opportunities that we can, but sometimes we just can't make it happen."

Sturrock also admitted that the club would not be appealing against the seven bookings dished out to them by controversial referee Lee Mason during the Leeds game.

He said, simply: "We must just get on with it." Town were hit with a £2500 fine from the Football League after the clash at Elland Road, but the manager insists Swindon are not a dirty team.

Sturrock has his own system of fines for yellow cards - with players hit in their pockets for dissent - and he is confident discipline will not become an issue with his squad.

He said: "We've been fined, but I see no point in appealing. In normal circumstances you don't benefit anything, you just lose a bit more money. This game was just a freak. We are not a dirty team in any form or any way. We're not anywhere near the top of the crime count as I call it, so it shows that what we put in place is working."

After watching the video of the Leeds match Sturrock maintains his side were harshly treated, but admits complaining further will not aid his team's cause. He said: "We are going to basically get on with it, but some of the bookings were just stupidity. The first one, when they were pushing each other, should have been just a warning. Two minutes later there's another fracas and he (Mason) doesn't book them. The rest of the bookings were for tackles. When you have 30,000 people shouting and balling it can excite people and I think that's what happened."

Swindon boss Paul Sturrock is hoping the offfield takeover talk at the County Ground does not affect their performances on the field.

Sturrock said: "It's been playing on people's minds. We had a potential takeover before for three or four months, which kept us in limbo, and now this one is dragging on. Everyone at the club has worked so hard and I would be gutted if, due to the circumstances we are in, all of a sudden we go tumbling down the league."

CRAIG Easton admits Town must go 'back to basics' if they want to rediscover the early-season form that dared fans to dream of a second successive promotion party.

Extra width has been the main talking point on the training ground, with Sturrock demanding more crosses from his wingers, and central midfielder Easton accepts his boss may have a point.

He said: "I think the gaffer is right in that we were getting a lot of joy out of that tactic earlier in the season, so if things are not going well results-wise maybe we should go back to basics. We can hit the width a wee bit earlier, but we have to have the possession to do that as well. If we can get into the mindset that as soon as we get the ball, we get it wide or hit the strikers, then we're going to create more chances. Even it's not clearcut something might drop and we can maybe finish that."

Finally, Swindon won the encounter 3-1, ending our interest in the competition for that season. I think such resilience epitomises the spirit of Swindon Town, I expect today's encounter to be no easier, especially if as anticipated at the time of writing, manager Paul Sturrock leaves

the club in order to return to Plymouth Argyle. Managerless clubs are always a threat, Bob Stokoe referred to such clubs as 'loose canons,' I can fully understand what he means.

A bit of an apology now, in my last programme notes I rattled on about book signing sessions that were taking place for my latest addition to the United library, Carlisle Cult Heroes. I am more than a little surprised at the short space of time in which the takeover has been achieved. Whilst I can understand the board of directors optimistically contemplating the input of the financial resource offered by myfootballclub.co.uk


It surprised me that they accepted and went ahead with the deal. Yet when you look at it, it is a wonderful marketing tool, the club has a new website, possibly 20,000 more supporters prepared to donate to the club to ensure its survival and success. That's all in the short term. In the long term, if the entire thing flops people pull out, the thirty five quid membership fee's stop rolling in, then the board of directors get first option to purchase it back from Myfootballclub.co.uk at a reasonable market value of course.

Will it help the club? Who knows in the long term. Certainly, I do know that The Fleet have a limited fan base and a hard core support of around 750. They don't own the ground, it is rented, it requires a major overhaul and there is literally no current investment for this. The local council are in discussion about a 10,000 all seater stadium, but that's donkeys years away and is currently no more than a discussion. For me, I believe football clubs should be run by professionals. football itself by qualified coaches. supporters have passion, but their input is best served from the terraces or in the stands and not in the board or dressing room. I wish The Fleet well but I don't envisage any major surge through the football pyramid happening at Stonebridge Road.

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

His favourite player is Ziggy and his favourite other team ... come on, you must be joking, there's only ONE United ... is his emphatic reply!



ast week saw the London Branch head for the seaside again with south London's favourite destination, Brighton, next on the fixture list. At the end of November it was a safe bet that the only families using the train for a day out at the seaside were Cumbrian. This may well explain why the seafront at Brighton had its shutters up and looked decidedly winter season. No trip to the seaside should go without a dip in the sea and certain teenagers kept up the tradition even if it was too cold to actually take off their shoes and socks, even after they were soaked.

There was to be no relief from the strong wind and low temperatures at Withdean. At least the long route-march from the station to the ground got the circulation going. Immediately through the turnstiles the first drops of rain fell. Everyone had been soaked the year before and it seemed that despite the forecast a black cloud was still waiting over the away end. Fortunately the shower quickly passed and it seemed that temperatures stopped falling as the sun set.

Across the running track and the end of the athletics stadium stood the distant goalposts, about 200 metres away, on the horizon, were the posts at the other end. When you get a seat in the "gods" at the opera at least you can hire a pair of binoculars. At Brighton the away crowd had to rely upon the PA to find out what was going on. The first goal at that far end was met with an almost universal "Who scored?" as everyone leapt to their feet. At least Joe Garner ran over to the running track after the second one to help the fans in the failing light. Thoughtful of him.

The sending off in the second half was shrouded in mystery. Few saw what had happened as it was in the middle of the pitch, the furthest point from any of the floodlights, and a huge ruck immediately formed. As the culprit made his, literally, long walk the away fans struck up "Who the """ are you?" as they had no idea who had been dismissed. It appeared the PA did not know who it was or did not wish to add to their own player's humiliation.

At the station the visiting fans split into two, those heading home towards London and the others heading for the delights of Brighton. 20 minutes later the latter are still sitting on their train in the station. Why does it sit for 15 minutes when this football shuttle takes only 4 minutes to get to Brighton? The cold wet weather puts a dampener on the fun at the end of the pier.



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

ndy Cook has quietly been getting on with his job over the last few months, and has reaped the reward with some excellent performances in a Youth team that is growing in confidence with every game.

We spoke to him last week, to find out if he is settling over here in Carlisle.

He said: "It's been a good few weeks for the team. We've scored a few goals and we've kept quite a few clean sheets and, I think, we've also been playing some good football. The fact that I have been getting a few goals for myself is neither here nor there. because we all just want to keep winning. It doesn't matter what competition we are playing in, we just want to keep winning."

His goal against Chesterfield ten days ago was a little bit on the special side and he explained: "I got it quite deep and there was a bit of space in front of me. I decided to go on a run and it opened up for me a bit. I had to ride a couple of challenges, and then I had to go round the keeper, and it all came off for me so I was really pleased."

"Eric is telling everyone that he wanted me to take it in to the corner," he told us, "but I fancied my chances, so I went for it. I don't think he minded too much afterwards."

"I've played up front ever since I was really young," he added, "and all I've ever wanted to do is score goals. I started playing for my school, obviously, but I got involved in Sunday League football from a really young age. I was then invited along to the Middlesbrough Development Centre and they then took me in for a trial. Nothing happened with that, but it was an excellent experience for me. Mind you, I was gutted when they didn't take me on, and I did wonder whether that was the end of my chances of getting anywhere."

"I went back to play for Yarm, over in Middlesbrough," he continued, "and it turned out that 'Boro had told Eric about me. I jumped at the chance, to be fair, and there were absolutely no second thoughts at all."



n Austrian Noble prize winner called Konrad Lorenz believed that warlike tendencies in human beings could be ritualised and harnessed, and then peacefully integrated into society.

Human aggression could thus form a constructive and even necessary part of society, and so through evolution war would become a thing of the past and human aggression would be controlled. The ritual he had in mind was sport and in particular the sport of football. He wrote a book in 1963 called 'On Aggression' in which he argued that aggression is so much a part of human behaviour, especially in men, that it could be spent in football and especially in international football games. Thus taking the place of international wars.

Violence is certainly a common feature in most societies. Statistically we know that It is a male characteristic and particularly in young males. In England and Wales more than 90 per cent of violent offenders are male and half of those are between 17 and 24. Lorenz wrote, "a simple and effective way of discharging aggression in an innocuous manner is to redirect it into sport".

That might explain why England lost to Croatia at Wemblev in their final Euro 2008 qualifier. For England had all the aggression of Christopher Biggins in the TV programme, "I'm a celebrity get me out of here". They were limp, ineffective, and forgot that football is actually a contact sport. England looked lost, needed a leader and forgot about tackling in the first half to such an extent that I thought the Croatians might just pass it to them out of pity. The result as we all know is that Steve McClaren lost his job as the England coach and so dissatisfied were the FA with him they gave him more than two million pounds to go away!!! It's tough at the top.

Perhaps one of the areatest international footballing rivals the England team have is the Germans. So it is interesting to see that an ex German national football coach, Jurgen Klinsmann, has declared very strongly that he wants the England job. He describes the role of being the England coach as his 'dream job'. A countryman of Klinsmann 'the Kaiser' himself Franz Beckenbauer strongly supports and recomends Klinsmann becoming the next England coach. So much so that at the World Cup draw recently he sought out Geoff Thompson of the FA to tell him how good a job Klinsmann had done for Germany. Wouldn't that be a turn up if we had a German coach at the helm of England. Maybe Klinsmann could show us the secret of how to win on penalties.

Whilst English premier league managers are falling away and retreating from showing any interest in the national job, apart form good old Harry Redknapp, another foreign coach, the ex Real Madrid, AC Milan, and Juventus coach Fabio Capello has said he, like Klinsmann, is desperate for the job. Capello believes that the problem with the England team isn't a lack of skill, we have that in abundance he says, but the problem is psychological. English players underachieve because of a lack of confidence at international level he believes. It is strange how the likes of Rooney, Gerard, Lampard Ferdinand, Cole, Owen etc lose to much inferior players who seem to make better teams.

As Lorenz points out aggression is a part of life in every human being and so it is vital for the well being of society that aggression is controlled and kept within the values, norms, and laws of society. Likewise when aggression is directed into sport it must be controlled aggression-in sport controlled aggression helps to win matches. Of course no team can win all the time that only happens in fantasy football not the real game on the pitch.

Every team is going to lose sometimes. I quess the trick is to harness the lessons learnt, accept that as humans we have dips and lulls in form and move on to the next game.

As we welcome Swindon Town today we do so on the back of a good draw away at Brighton and look toward continuing our good season in the league.


Against Rochdale we came out on top in most of the games, although we did have a problem with some of the away games suffering from a waterlogged pitch at Salford University.

I came across these quotes from some of the best footballers in the world, on how they learned to play football. I have to say, the quote from Puskas made me smile.


Zinedine Zidane: "Everything I have achieved in football is due to playing in the streets with my friends."

Coats would be piled for posts and the game would get under way. In fine weather it would be as many as 20-a-side, in bad weather a hardened dozen or so made it 6-a-side. We never needed a referee. We accepted the rules of the game and stuck by them. It taught us that you can't go about doing what you want and if you don't stick to the rules, you spoil it for everyone else. Those games prepared us

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

Absolutely not!


In General

Well, that's difficult. For example, go and ask all the England fans to go through the two teams, Croatia and England, and match up the players. Who would you want, our right back or their right back? If you do that right throughout the team then, in the end, they'd all pick more English lads than Croatian, so I don't really think that's the problem, no. When I was in the Newcastle Academy there weren't loads of foreign lads. Almost all of the lads I played with were English. That said, I watch TV now, and there is a channel called 'Liverpool TV' and I watch that and an awful lot of their reserves and young lads are foreign. Is that doing us any good? It must be disheartening for the young players and the scouts but if Liverpool are bringing them over then they are probably better than our lads, so what are they meant to do? It's a difficult situation.

You got that here and towards the end of last season you started to really show what you could do. Is that something you want to build on?




You mentioned once that you liked a day at the races. Have you had any big winners recently?

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

here is a time and a place for gambling and taking huge risks.

And almost a fortnight ago at Wembley with the rain pouring and England needing a positive result to qualify for Euro 2008 was neither.

Just what was beleagured boss Steve McClaren thinking? Did he really want to remain as coach of the national team? Or was his teamsheet the equivalent of writing a suicide note?

Only the wildest manager would have selected young Aston Villa keeper Scott Carson to make his debut in the crunch qualifier at home to Croatia. Tottenham stopper Paul Robinson paid the price for some indifferent form but asking the rookie Cumbrian to go out and do the business was always a strategy that potentially had catastrophic consequences.

Unfortunately for England fans, that potential was realised to the maximum as Whitehaven-born Carson virtually threw the ball into his own net to hand the technically-gifted Croats an early lead.

From then, things went from bad to worse. England pulled back the deficit but the sucker-punch was a late winner that ensured they would fail to reach a tournament for the first time since 1994.

Throughout a night of torture, McClaren sheltered under his umbrella from the rain and the furious boos from a disbelleving crowd. He swigged from several water bottles, how he must have wished he was necking something a whole lot stronger.

His bosses wasted no time in delivering the expected axe and less than a dozen hours after their humiliating exit, the ex-Middlesbrough manager was telling us all that he was proud to manage the country and that this group of players were capable of success at the highest level.

I don't doubt his genuine delight at having managed England but in his heart of hearts, perhaps even he knows that the job came a few years to early for him. But I reckon he let the pampered players off the hook as he paid tribute to their ability.

Maybe he was just looking after his future and that one day some of those very players will be under his command at club level. But their role in this shambles can't be ignored.

For years this has been the "golden generation" but that tag is now looking tired and untrue. This group of players have underachieved time and time again and they can't be given any more opportunities to fail.

Some observers will point the finger squarely at McClaren and believe that a Jose Mourinho or a Martin O'Neill could turn this squad into a powerful machine able to compete with the very cream of european and world talent.


And maybe they would. But only following long hours of hard work on the training pitch simply honing the basic skills of passing, control and keeping possession.


Sunderland manager Roy Keane felt Croatia were not better technically than England and while his view is genuine, it is one I simply can't agree with. From my vantage point, Slaven Bilic's team were far more comfortable on the ball and had the football brain to open their hosts up with three passes and a bit of patience.

England could not match that and compounded that inferiority with the mindless tactic of lumping the ball forward to beanpole Peter Crouch and hoping for the best. It was all a bit embarrassing really. Yet one star had no shame and after the World Cup draw paired England with Croatia again in the battle to reach South Africa in 2010, Newcastle United's permanently crocked striker Michael Owen opened his mouth and let his belly rumble.

He told a stunned nation that England would go out and show Croatia just who the better players are, adding that none of the Croat squad would get anywhere near the squad he occasionally features in.

After one of the worst weeks English football has endured for a long time, he would have been better keeping his thoughts to himself and not adding insult to an already serious injury.

tatistically speaking According to the 2001 Census the population of the city of Leeds was 715,402.

At the same time the population of Carlisle was recorded as 100,739 - some seven times smaller. If we are to also add on the population of the provincial towns within a 20 mile radius the figures for Leeds and Carlisle would just about double.

This statistic may not surprise many of you but it got me thinking. Are Leeds United as well supported as their adoring media would have us believe? Whilst they are the new 'big fish' in this league it does grate when pundits and commentators from all the major TV channels and Newspapers fawn over the level of their match day attendances.

At first glance at the attendance figures it would appear they have a point. Thirty thousand people for a league one game is indeed a sizable figure, but let's start putting things into context.

First let us compare their average attendance with our own. Many of our supporters are disappointed that we are 'only' attracting average crowds of 8000. Per head of population this equates to Leeds averaging well over 56,000 in this league - something they could not even muster in the Premiership even if ground capacity had been able to accommodate them - and we consider our current attendances poor!

Many Leeds fans on the message boards mocked Carlisle as a tiny club and referred to the game against them as our biggest game of the season. This may be true buts lets consider those statistics again. With a crowd of approximately 16,500 their boast does appear to carry some weight. It is indeed a sizable figure indeed for a game against more glamorous opposition but this is the equivalent of Leeds United attracting 115,500 for a game against a team they aspire to be - let's say Man Utd. As far as I can see Leeds United have NEVER been able to boast a crowd of this magnitude.

Indeed, back in the eighties when we were in the same league as Leeds (the second tier) and crowds were notoriously low due to hooliganism the same trend is still evident in our average attendances. In 1985 during this period of terrible attendances Leeds pulled in an average of 15,000. Again, taking into account equivalent populations we should have expected no more than

2200 at Brunton Park and yet an average of over 4500 came alona. If by some miracle Carlisle managed to make it to the Premier League I would expect crowds to average at least 15000. Again, this is the equivalent of Leeds attracting an average of 105,000 in the Prem. Per head of population we are far and away better supported than those fair-weather fans at Elland Road.

So how do we compare with other teams in the league? Well going by head of population compared to Carlisle. Northampton should be attracting 15000 rather than 5300. Swansea should be attracting 22000 rather than 10000. Luton and today's opponents Swindon should be getting 11000 through the gates rather than 6500 and Walsall should be getting 13000 rather than the 5500 currently paying to watch The Saddlers.

Of course these figures don't take into consideration distance travelled, away support, location, recent history, glory hunters etc, but these are all factors supposedly acting against Carlisle.

To suggest the crowd are purely from the city in question would be ridiculous but is that not the same for every club? Our supporters from Workington, Kendal, Penrith etc have to travel a damn sight further than most Leeds fans will from their satellite towns. So next time you scan the terraces at Brunton Park and turn to your mate and comment on the crowd bear in mind that, per head of population, we are one of the most loyal, passionate and consistent set of supporters you will find.

Leeds United attracts approximately 4% of the population. We attract approximately 8%.

We are twice as loyal as our Yorkshire neighbours. Some statistics make interesting reading after all don't they? So next time you are watching SKY News and they are salivating over the crowds at Elland Road take comfort from the fact that, statistically speaking, we are much better supported than they can ever dream of being.

On a final note, linked with capacities and attendances. I would be interested to know if anyone can answer the following question. Of all the football league grounds in England can any boast a greater capacity of standing terracing than at Brunton Park? With all the new developments I would be very surprised! In this age of Identikit Stadiums and all-seater stands it would a welcome honour to have.





An FA Cup replay way back at the start of January 1984 was one the first away games I attended without grown-ups in tow. It was supposed to be exciting and glorious and all that kind of malarkey, but it ended up nearly putting me off travelling to football games forever.

It all started at Birmingham New Street when one of the older lads in our group came back with a huge grin on his face. Somehow, he was finding humour in the fact that he'd just discovered that there were no trains to Carlisle at the time we would be heading back that night.

We were still on our way to the game at this point, so it was easy to shove this little nugget of info straight to the back of our minds and get on with the business of finding the right platform, but it was still a disturbing revelation. none-the-less.

Next was the slow train to Swindon. By the time we got to our destination, there were less than ten minutes to kick off. Not a problem, even though we didn't have a clue where we were going - taxi, we thought - except there wasn't one in sight. Arriving at the ground 15 minutes after kick off, we then watched a truly horrible display from what was usually a half decent Division Two (Championship) team under the guidance of Bob Stokoe. I have to admit, the whole idea behind the trip was that we were fairly convinced that we'd be seeing off the Robins with some amount of ease. We got that wrong, and we all traipsed back to the station with a 3-1 defeat to mull over.

Back at Birmingham New Street, and after a quick glance at some rather empty departure boards, it started to dawn that someone had already mentioned that there wouldn't be any trains back to Carlisle. 'Did someone say there wouldn't be any trains back to Carlisle earlier?' I asked.

A guard, heading 'home for some supper lads' confirmed our worst fears, but did mention something known as the 'Milk Train.' Due in to Birmingham at 3-45am, it transpired that it was a Royal Mail train, and that the guard on board would usually allow small groups to travel on it, in the one available carriage ... but only if there was space.

Thankfully, we were allowed to get on, much to my relief as I had only a thin sweatshirt over my faded McEwans Younger top, and I was absolutely gibbering by the time it rocked up.

I've had two trips to see us play at the County ground since then, and both have ended in less than glorious defeat. We lost 2-1 in 1996, though I seem to remember it could have been worse, and we lost 3-1 in our most recent visit, this time last year, with a less than convincing second half display that the Robins were only too pleased to punish.

So, as you can see, I've not had a good time when it comes to following us against Swindon Town. Never mind, I'm sure that will all change tonight.

I have to hold my hands up and say that I was there, at Wembley, for the Croatia game a couple of Wednesday's ago.

With a seat adjacent to the dug-out, I was able to watch things unfold for Steve McClaren almost first hand and, it has to be said, it was fairly painful.

His decision to hide under an umbrella was met by some severe abuse from those around me, almost from kick off, and it intensified as soon as the Croats took the lead.

The defining moment of the whole game though, as far as I am concerned, came just after Peter Crouch pulled us level. McClaren strode out to his technical area and started to scream at Jermaine Defoe. Holding five fingers in the air, it became clear to us that he was asking the player to drop deep and make a five-man midfield, leaving Crouch isolated. On top of that, a brief conversation with Beckham saw him move in to a role that can only be described as right back, and the initiative that we had gained was lost.

Just to make it clear, this is only my reading of what actually went on, but those around me were unanimous in their criticism of the tactical switch, and I think it's a fair reflection of what actually happened out on the pitch.

For the record, I was autted, as was everybody else that I listened to on the way out of Wembley Stadium that night, so it rankles a bit to now hear people claim that the fans wanted the defeat. There may have been hostility, but every single one of us celebrated when we drew level, and there was stunned silence when we went behind to that third goal.

Ah well, there's always the World Cup.

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





It's a 484 mile round trip between Brunton Park and the Sixfields Stadium.

Sixfields Stadium was built in the early 90's, with the first match played against Barnet on 15 October 1994. Facilities for away fans are good, with seated accommodation behind the goal in the South Stand. To gain entrance to the Stadium you must buy a ticket from the portacabin outside the South Stand before you go to the turnstiles.

Tickets will be on sale (if not sold out) at the Main Ticket Office from 10am - 5pm tomorrow and Thursday and from 10am until noon on Friday.

Prices are: Adults - £19, 60+ and students with valid ID - £15, U16s - £12, U7s - free, Adult disabled - £13, Junior disabled - £10 with carer free.

Travel

By Bus: The Official Blues Travel departs from Wigton at 7.30am, picking up at Brunton Park at 8am, Penrith Station at 8.20am and Crooklands at 9am. Prices are £17.50 for adults and £15.50 for concessions.

By Car: From Carlisle travel South on the M6, then the M1.

Leave the M1 at junction 16 (signposted Northampton West), then at roundabout take the 1st exit onto the A4500 (signposted Northampton West).

At roundabout take the 2nd exit onto the A4500 (signposted Northampton) and continue forward on to Weedon Road, entering Northampton on the A4500.

At roundabout take the 3rd exit onto the A5076 (signposted Ring Road, M1 South) on to the Northampton Ring Road.

At next roundabout take the 1st exit (signposted Sixfields Leisure) and at next roundabout take the 2nd exit to arrive at Sixfields Stadium.

Car Parking: There is parking right round the complex, but check carefully as some areas are short stay or for patrons only, and clamping is commonplace.

Food and Drink: The stadium is situated in an out of town complex which has a number of bars and fast food outlets. Chevys and the Sixfields Tavern only welcome home supporters and will not allow visiting supporters wearing colours. The Old Orleans is an American themed pub and food outlet, again it may not allow fans wearing away colours, but the food is to be recommended. The Sports Bar in the complex offers the usual fare.

Bournemouth boss Kevin Bond was concerned after keepers Gareth Stewart and Neil Moss both picked up injuries. Bond revealed after his side's 3-0 home defeat by Oldham,

"Gareth dislocated his finger in the warmup, and he was nearly unable to play, he had to have two injections, and in fairness he did well to perform without anyone knowing he'd done it. Neil injured his knee ligaments in training on Friday, and he could be out for a month now." Moss had only just returned to training after he suffered a facial injury against Milton Keynes Dons, and required eight stitches. Also joining the Cherries' long injury list against Oldham was striker Sam Vokes, who was stretchered off with a suspected broken rib.

Bournemouth have signed Queens Park Rangers defender Dominic Shimmin on loan. The 20-year-old completed his loan move - which will run until 1st January - before last Thursday's Football League deadline for loan signings. The former Arsenal trainee has made four league and cup appearances for QPR, but he has not featured for their first team this season.

Cheltenham Town have signed Blackpool winger Michael D'Agostino on loan. The 20-year-old Canadian Under-20 international moves to Whaddon Road following a busy week of loan deals. The Robins previously recruited Crawley striker Guy Madjo, while allowing defender Lee Ridley to join Darlington. "Michael is a player with good pace who likes to take people on, Blackpool have let him join us to get some regular football and they believe he will do a good job in League One," boss Keith Downing told Cheltenham's website.

Crewe Alexandra have signed



Manchester United youngster David Gray on loan. The Scottish born defender has been brought in as cover for the injured George Abbey. Gray, 19, is a regular member of Brian

McClair's reserve side and his only firstteam appearance came against Crewe in last season's Carlina Cup. Gray, played right-back that night before being substituted. Meanwhile, Wolves manager Mick McCarthy has agreed to allow midfielder Elliott Bennett to extend his loan spell at Crewe until the new year. Bennett signed for the Railwaymen on a onemonth loan in October but will now stay on at Gresty Road until 3rd January. His last match would have been the trip to Nottingham Forest. The 18-year-old, who has made two appearances for Wolves first-team, scored the winning goal for Crewe against Port Vale on 6th November.

Gillingham have also completed the signing of Reading defender Adam Bygrave on an initial month's loan, the 18year-old is a regular in the Royals reserves side. Boss Mark Stimson told his club's website, "Adam is a player I rate highly and I've watched him a number of times for Reading's reserves. He has all the aualities needed and I think he will do a good job for us." Meanwhile, Grays Athletic midfielder Stuart Thurgood has also joined the club on a month's loan with a view to a permanent move. Grays boss Justin Edinburgh said, "How can I stand in the way of a player who has been so good for the club and captained the club

Akinfenwa has previously played for Barry Town, Boston United, Leyton Orient, Doncaster and Torquay, scoring 32 goals in 109 league appearances.

Northampton Town have signed Ipswich's former England Under-19 forward Dean Bowditch, 21, on a month's loan. Bowditch has previously had loan spells with Burnley, Brighton and Wycombe, scoring 12 senior goals so far. Cobblers boss Stuart Gray said, "We are very grateful to Ipswich for letting him come out on loan to us. Dean is a forward that looks to get in behind defences with his pace and he will give us that little bit of extra quality in the final third."



Meanwhile, Cobblers winger Sam Aiston has signed for Wrexham on a one-month loan deal. Aiston, who began his career at Newcastle, has fallen down the pecking order under Stuart Gray this season. He has not started a game for The Cobblers and has already been sent out for a loan spell at Burton. The 30-year-old is now heading

out to Wrexham to help Brian Little's struggling side as they look to climb the League Two table.

Tranmere Rovers have signed young Blackburn left back Andrew Taylor on loan for a month. Taylor is a product of Blackburn's youth academy and has played for England at Under-19 and Under-20 level. The 21-year-old has spent time on loan at QPR, Crewe, Blackpool and Huddersfield playing 20 games in total. Tranmere boss Ronnie Moore said, "This is a great signing for the club. Andy is a talented attacking left back who we've been monitoring for some time." Tranmere have also signed Bristol City winger Jennison Myrie-Williams on a month's loan. He had a three month loan stint at Cheltenham earlier this season and scored once in 13 games for the Robins. Ronnie Moore told his club's website, "He is left footed and will bring balance to our side."



Yeovil Town have completed the signing of Aston Villa forward Zoltan Stieber. The 19year-old has agreed a deal which will see him move to Huish Park on loan until 1st January as Villa manager Martin O'Neill bids to increase Stieber's first-team experience.

Stieber has been with Villa since May 2005 and has been a regular in the youth and reserve-team set-ups. However, he has yet to break into O'Neill's first team and he will be keen for opportunities in League One with Yeovil. The Hungarian can play either on the left wing or in attack and netted twice for Villa's reserves last season in 13 appearances.



MORTON'S NEUROMA

A Morton's neuroma, or interdigital neuroma, is a painful condition which involves a nerve on the plantar aspect (bottom) of the foot. Occasionally a neuroma develops following a bruising injury to the sole of the foot, such as might be caused by jumping onto a rock or other objects, but in general, the origin of the condition is unknown.

The nerves located on the bottom of the foot between the metatarsal heads (the bone of the toe closest to the foot) supply feeling, or sensation, to the toes. One of these nerves may become irritated by the ligament located above it, causing it to become thickened and painful. Generally this problem occurs most often between the third and fourth toes, but it can occur between the second and third toes as well. It is uncommon for a neuroma to be located between the first and second or fourth and fifth metatarsals. Rarely is there more than one neuroma in a foot.

SYMPTOMS:


The symptoms of a Morton's neuroma are classic in nature. The patient complains of a burning, tingling, slightly numb feeling (dysesthesias) which radiates out to the toes on either side of the interspace that is involved.

For instance, a Morton's neuroma of the third interspace will result in pain between the third and fourth toes, and a neuroma in the second interspace will cause pain between the second and third toes. The symptoms are usually aggravated by wearing shoes, particularly those with high heels. Symptoms are relieved by walking in flat, wide shoes or going barefoot. Rarely will the patient experience pain when sitting or laying down.

DIAGNOSIS:

The physician will make the diagnosis of Morton's neuroma based upon the patient's symptoms as described above in an interview, or history, and a physical examination.

The physical examination will reveal exceptional tenderness in the involved interspace when the nerve area is pressed on the bottom of the foot. As the interspace is palpated, and pressure is applied from the top to the bottom of the foot, a click can sometimes be felt which

reproduces the patient's pain. This is known as a Mulder's sign.

Because of inconsistent results, imaging studies such as MRI or ultrasound scanning are not useful diagnostic tools for Morton's neuroma. Thus the physician must rely exclusively on the patient's history and physical examination in order to make a diagnosis.

TREATMENT:

Non-Operative Treatment:

Most patients symptoms subside when they change footwear to a wide soft shoe with a metatarsal support inside to relieve the pressure on the involved area. If this treatment fails, a cortisone injection into the nerve is occasionally helpful.

Operative Treatment:

When conservative measures are unsuccessful, surgery can be a good choice in the treatment of Morton's neuroma.

The operation for Morton's neuroma does not require an overnight hospital stay. The anesthetic used is an ankle block, which completely numbs the foot during the surgery.

- The physician removes the neuroma from an incision made on the top of the foot between the involved metatarsal heads.
- The nerve to the interspace is exposed and cut next to the metatarsal heads.

What types of complications may occur?

The main complication resulting from a neuroma excision (removal) is a recurrence of the neuroma. The nerve itself doesn't return, but whenever a portion of a nerve is removed, the stump will form a little bulb known as a traumatic or stump neuroma.


If this traumatic neuroma is located beneath a metatarsal head or becomes quite large, it may become painful several years after the initial surgery. Most studies have shown that although 80% of patients do well after the removal of a neuroma, 20% will have some degree of nerve pain following the surgery.

Occasionally after surgery, the patient will have an area of numbness on the bottom of the foot which is described as feeling like a wrinkle in the sock. This discomfort usually disappears in time.

The patient's foot remains in a surgical dressing for three weeks to allow the tissues to heal.

During this time the patient walks in a stiff postoperative shoe.

It usually takes about two months for the patient to comfortably resume usual activities.

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


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
