What we must do is concentrate on what we are doing and how we go about doing our job. If we go about the game like we did on Wednesday, we can be more than a handful for most teams. Since that game, our thoughts have been on preparing for today's game.

The Boxing Day game against Leyton Orient was very important after a very disappointing performance at Northampton. We went in to the game at The Sixfields Stadium with the same side that beat Gillingham and the performance there showed that you must have a level of consistency if you are going to compete at this level.

It was almost as if we didn't turn up and we are not going to get ourselves clear of trouble if we show that sort of inconsistency. I will take the criticism for a performance like that, but I made them fully aware that the performance was unacceptable and they need to take some of the responsibility for that.

We made everyone aware that it is unacceptable and in fairness to the players, they regrouped and worked tirelessly against Leyton Orient from the first minute to the last. They defended from the front and it

was great to get three goals. because obviously we have found goals hard to come by.

We needed to get after Orient, put them under pressure and I thought we did that well. The main thing was that we worked really hard and things will go for you if you do that. We put the emphasis on that after the Northampton game, they took that on board and got the breaks they deserved.

I was delighted for Sam Vokes to get his goal. He has worked tirelessly over the last few weeks. It was nice for him to get what was a consolation goal up at Tranmere, but to get such an important goal on Wednesday was really pleasing. I was also pleased for Max to get the opening goal. He has had a very difficult time personally and he has struggled to come to terms with everything that has gone

When you are in the position we are in, confidence can be fragile, but after we conceded, we were resolute. We defended in numbers and looked to catch them on the break, and in the end, that's exactly what we did.

Results breed confidence and what we are looking for now is a little bit of momentum. You can play your part in helping to

achieve that and your support on Wednesday was magnificent. It was fully appreciated by everyone and like the Gillingham game, I was delighted to see people leaving the stadium with a smile on their faces.

After today, we make the trip along the coast to Brighton before we have a short break. The opportunity to miss a game next Saturday due to Luton's involvement in the FA Cup is one we will take. There were conversations about arranging a game for that day, but that would not benefit us so a ten day period without one will be vital. We have a number of players out injured and a number of loan players returning to their clubs. Therefore it is a good opportunity to assess what we need to do in terms of personnel as we go in to the second half of the season.

2007 has not been an easy year for any of us and we are doing everything we can to make 2008 a better one. At this time of year, I would like to wish you all a very Happy New Year and once again thank you all for your fantastic support through 2007.



THE ANDERTON ANGLE

Welcome to the last home game of 2007 and today we face a Swindon Town side who have had a few problems off the pitch since we last met them. On the pitch though they have done very well and come down here today after beating Yeovil 1-0 on Wednesday.

We played up at Swindon earlier this season and lost 4-1 and on paper, that sounds pretty comprehensive, but it doesn't reflect how the game went. We had a terrible ten/fifteen minutes in the second half and that was it, game over. We can go in to today though with a lot of confidence after the game against Leyton Orient on Boxing Day where we put in a terrific performance. We desperately needed that result after the game at Northampton and we desperately need a result again today.

Home games are very important for us and it would be nice to finish the year on a positive note. Last year started with a good result at home against Brighton and we had a decent home run after that. We got the first home win this season against Gillingham and backed that up on Wednesday with the win over Leyton Orient and without a doubt, today is huge for us and we want to make it three in a row at home.

It will be a hard game against a side who looked decent against us and I was impressed by them. They have had things not go their way since then, and they lost their manager. However, they recently came from behind to beat Hartlepool and then won at Yeovil, so we know its going to be a tough game for us. We will have to perform well to get anything out of the game.

We've had a few highlights over the last year, but unfortunately not too

many in recent weeks. It has been disappointing and we went in to the Orient game bottom of the league. We showed what we could do on Wednesday though and we have to look back at the start of the year when we had a really decent run at home and do that again. I think we showed what we are capable of and gave ourselves something to build on.

We know we need to make massive improvements, but we are also due a bit of luck. You look through the squad list on the back of the programme and see just how many players have been out injured at some stage this season and not just short term problems either. For myself I have an injury that I thought would be cleared up in three weeks, yet it has just gone on and on. The injuries have been crippling to us and with a small squad, we need all the players fit that we can have. That is something that will hopefully change in 2008.

You look at any team who are doing well and they have got a consistent side and are relatively free of injuries. You only have to look at Reading who had a sticky period, but have come good in recent weeks. This is because they have put out the same team week in and week out and you can see a difference in their results. It can make a massive difference when you have a settled side and that's something we hope we can do in 2008,

Today will be probably the last opportunity for many people to see the loan lads. However it's a shame that they have to go back to their clubs. They have all done well for us and I'm sure their time here will be a really big benefit to them. After the Brighton game, the manager has a few days to look and see what's about and bring in some more players to get us going. They say that things balance themselves out, so hopefully that is true and we can get some consistency next year.

Home games are very important for us and it would be nice to finish the year on a positive note...

Your support this year has been fantastic, and it was nice that you have had two home wins to cheer at the end of the year. With your help, I hope we can make it three today. We were bottom of the league and on the back of a poor result against Northampton, yet you were fantastic against Orient. On behalf of all the players, thank you for that because it does make a difference.

CHERRIES TRAVEL CLUB

The AFC Bournemouth Travel Club will be leaving the Fitness First Stadium at 11.00am. Cost is £14.50 Members and £20 Non Members and bookings are now being taken.

CAR

When you purchase your ticket, you will be given a leaflet on how to reach the two Park and Ride centres, with the Mill Road one being the most convenient for Bournemouth supporters. Your match ticket also has travel vouchers to use the local transport to get you to and from the ground. Take the A338, A31, M27 signposted Portsmouth then the A27 signposted Brighton. There is no parking within a mile of the Withdean Stadium on matchdays. The club operate a very good park and ride scheme at Mill Road and Mitras House. There is a free bus service from there on production of your match ticket. The park and ride is 93 miles from Bournemouth.

TRAIN

The nearest train station to The Withdean Stadium is Preston Park, which is a 15 minute walk away. The 09:50 from Bournemouth will get you to Preston Park at 13.45. The 17.20 from Preston Park will get you back to Bournemouth at 20.25.

FACILITIES FOR VISITING SUPPORTERS

There is a pub, The Sportsman, right outside the Main Stand that serves decent food. Apart from that, there is little around the stadium. Bournemouth supporters will be in The West Stand, which is a temporary seated and uncovered stand that is quite a way from the pitch.

DISABLED SUPPORTERS INFORMATION

There is limited parking at the stadium and this is on a first come, first served basis and you are advised to arrive early. It is full ticket price for disabled supporters and free for one helper. Please call Brighton & Hove Albion for further information.

TICKETS

This match is strictly all ticket and there are no matchday sales. Tickets are now on sale from the AFC Bournemouth Ticket Office. Adults £22.50, Students £18, Senior Citizens £14.50, 10-15 year olds £13. Children under 10 are £1 when purchased with a FULL paying Adult. One Child per Adult, additional children regardless of age are £13.

CAR

Take the A338 to the A31 and then either go via the A338 to Salisbury and continue towards the M4 at Swindon, or take the A31, M27, M3, A34 to the M4 and take the M4 westbound. From the M4 junction, take the A417 signposted Cirencester/Gloucester. When you reach the Air Balloon pub, take the second exit at the roundabout, signposted Stow and then the A435 signposted Cheltenham. Continue on the A435 in to Cheltenham and at the Prestbury roundabout, take the fourth exit on to the B4632 and then turn right in to Whaddon Road for the ground, which is around 100 miles from Bournemouth. Parking is very much at a premium around the ground, but you can use the park and ride which operates from Cheltenham Racecourse, which is well signposted. The Park & Ride starts at 1.00pm and runs every 20 minutes until 2.40pm. After the game, buses leave Whaddon Road at 5.00, 5.20 and 5.40pm.



TRAIN

Cheltenham Spa Train Station is two miles from the ground. A taxi will cost approximately £7 or you can get the D or E bus to the town centre and then the A bus to Whaddon Road.

The 07.50 from Bournemouth arrives at Cheltenham Spa at 12.51 and 18.18 from Cheltenham will get you back to Bournemouth at 23.13.

FACILITIES FOR VISITING SUPPORTERS

Whaddon Road has improved greatly over the years and the away end is a compact new structure that gives good views. The ground is in a residential area, but there are a couple of decent pubs on the Prestbury Road.

DISABLED SUPPORTERS INFORMATION

Disabled supporters can use the main Stand where there are disabled facilities and there are also spaces in the away end. For booking information, please call 01242 573558. Cost is £12 for disabled supporters and free for helpers.



The hosts scored early on through a deflected strike, but a minute later, a good move involving Sam Vokes and Danny Hollands set up Brett Pitman who scored with a sweetly stuck shot for his third goal in four games.

That was about as good as it got for Bournemouth as they had to withstand Northampton pressure and the defence was breached again just before the break. It didn't take the home side long to extend their lead in the second half and they made it 4-1 with plenty of time to go.

Bournemouth did push forward late in the game, but failed to gain any sort of consolation.

WEDNESDAY 26 DECEMBER 2007



Bournemouth put in a superb performance to beat Leyton Orient at the Fitness First Stadium. The side took the lead on 19 minutes after a superb series of passes, with Orient chasing shadows. The final pass put in Max Gradel who got in to the 0's box before sliding the ball home.

Orient did get a corner late on and keeper Stuart Nelson went up for it. However, the ball was cleared to Jo Kuffour and he slipped the ball through to James Henry who completed the job to make it 3-1 and a thoroughly deserved three points.





After instant promotion last season, things looked rosy for Swindon Town as the new season got underway.

Since those early days of the campaign though, financial problems and manager Paul Sturrock returning to Plymouth have hardly been ideal as they faced an uncertain future. There has been some good news coming out of the Wiltshire club recently though because as well as winning their last two games, a consortium has come in to take over at the club.

Tranmere 1-0 at home, but on the road, lost at Swansea and Port Vale.

November was a difficult month that saw Sturrock leave and although progress was made in the FA Cup with a 2-1 win at Wycombe, they had to wait until the end of the month to gain a league victory as Bristol Rovers were beaten at home.

With proposed takeovers of the club very much in the balance, the uncertainty surrounding the club seemed to be taking its toll on the field of play. A nervy 3-2 win over Forest Green Rovers earned them a home tie against Barnet in the FA Cup, but that was followed by three defeats.

CHERRIES v THE ROBINS SCRAPBOOK



JAMIES BACK!



Today we welcome back Jamie Vincent for only his second appearance at The Fitness First Stadium. His previous one was for Portsmouth reserves and his last first team game here, well at the old Dean Court, was on 13 March 1999 when we lost 1-0 at home against Reading. He played in our next game that season in our bid for promotion away at Blackpool and watching him from the stands was Huddersfield manager Peter Jackson.

That game was on Tuesday 16 March and on the Saturday, the Cherries played a vital game at Preston without Vincent as he had signed for The Terriers. We won that day in Lancashire with a fantastic performance and it looked as if the play-offs were a certainty and there was still a chance of automatic promotion. Unfortunately, in the remaining ten games, three were won, three were drawn and four were lost and Bournemouth missed out on the last day. Many people put the failure down to the loss of Jamie and it holds a very good argument. He joined Bournemouth initially in the Great Escape season on loan from Crystal Palace in November 1994, making eight appearances, and it would have been more had it not been for a harsh sending off at Bristol Rovers on the Boxing Day. He went back to Palace, but in August 1996, came back to Dean Court and signed permanently. In the next three seasons, he firmly established himself as the left back at the club and was always destined to play at a higher level.

Since leaving, he has been at a number of clubs, Derby, Portsmouth and Yeovil included, but now seems really settled at Swindon and wears the captains armband, The biggest tribute to Jamie from Bournemouth supporters must surely come in the shape of this seasons Dream Team feature in the programme where so many people have chosen Jamie as their

left back. He saved some of his best performances for the Cup run in 1998 that led to Wembley. It was fantastic for a player like him to represent Bournemouth on the hallowed turf.

THE FUNNIEST CHANT?

In September 2000, Britain was a country in the grip of a fuel crisis. With no fuel at the pumps, there was even talk at one stage of cancelling football, but it was decided that games would go ahead. Attendances up and down the country were hit hard as people couldn't risk using their precious fuel. On September 12, Swindon visited Bournemouth with just over three and a half thousand there, even less than when Swindon travelled to Dorchester a year later.

The hardy Swindon faithful went in the Brighton Beach End hoping for a good result, but instead saw Bournemouth put in a superb performance, notably that of Steve Fletcher, who had one of his best nights of his career. He scored twice and should have had a hat trick as he ran The Robins ragged with James Hayter also scoring in a 3-0 win. It was Sean O'Driscoll's first win as a manager. It also prompted some wag on the terrace to start a song that even the players were laughing about when they heard it, one or two started it and very quickly, the whole South End were singing "What a waste of petrol!" I'm sure that no Swindon supporters here today who were at the game that night will find it remotely amusing, but if it was the other way round, they would have done!

YMMIL



There are a number of players who have served both AFC Bournemouth and Swindon Town and one player who. made himself very popular in his time with The Cherries was keeper Jimmy Glass. Jimmy was

at Crystal Palace and had gone out on loan at Portsmouth, Gillingham and Burnley before signing for Bournemouth in 1996.

He went straight in to the side as Neil Moss had left for Southampton and Ian Andrews went back to the Midlands because of family problems. He made an assured debut at Hull City before letting in five in the infamous defeat in the snow at Wrexham.

He did though hold the number one jersey for over two years and was capable of making fantastic saves. He always played with a smile on his face. He was in the same side as Jamie Vincent at Wembley for the AWS Final in 1998 where unfortunately he was given the dubious honour of scoring the golden goal winner - turning a cross in to his own net for Grimsby to lift the

He left for Swindon during the summer, signed by former Bournemouth striker Jimmy Quinn. It didn't go as well as he had hoped at The County Ground and after only 11 appearances, he went out on loan to Carlisle where he made three appearances. However in that short space of time he achieved absolute legendary status in Cumbria. In the final minute of the last game of the season against Plymouth, the score was 1-1 and that meant that Scarborough, whose game had finished, were safe and Carlisle were going in to the Conference. United got a corner, Glass went up and met a parry from the keeper and the rest is history as he was buried under a pile of players and supporters and will probably never, ever have to buy a drink in Carlisle again!

He enjoyed a decent career at Bournemouth, yet he made himself a household name by scoring in his third and last game for Carlisle! He was released by Swindon, not signed by Carlisle and went to a number of clubs. making appearances here and there before settling back in the Bournemouth area. He continued his career at local level though not in goal but up front. After working in a number of local businesses, he is now a local taxi driver and still come to some Bournemouth games. This included The Match during pre-season, where after buying his ticket to watch, he ended up playing for the celebrity side for the final 15 minutes! III

The Cherries had major changes with Mel Machin leaving the managers job and Sean O'Driscoll stepping in. It was a struggle until a certain Mr Defoe signed on loan! It was a long hard season for Swindon who were back in Division Two.



AFC BOURNEMOUTH

AUGUST

Mel Machin handed six players their debuts at Bristol Rovers in the 2-2 draw on the opening day of the season, and that proved to be his final game in charge as by the time the next Saturday came along, Sean O'Driscoll was boss. His first game was a 1-1 draw with Cambridge United and in his first away game, the side lost 1-0 at Luton. In the Worthington Cup, the side enjoyed a creditable 0-0 draw at Norwich.

SEPTEMBER

A poor month saw just one win gained, that coming in a 3-0 win over Swindon at Dean Court. Three points were also gained in draws, but the side went out of the Worthington Cup, losing 2-1 at home against Norwich.

OCTORER

It proved to be a pivotal month, even though the Cherries ended it in the relegation zone. James Hayter hit the headlines by scoring four in a 5-2 win at Bury, but that was the only win. A poor 1-0 home defeat against Notts County saw 0'Driscoll go to Harry Radknapp at West Ham and bring in unknown teenager Jermain Defoe on loan. Defoe scored on his debut, but Bournemouth were still defeated 2-1 at Stoke.

NOVEMBER

With Defoe in the side, form improved dramatically. In the league, Peterborough were beaten 2-1 at home and Northampton 3-0 away with Defoe on target in both games. In the FA Cup, Swansea were beaten 3-0.

DECEMBER

Defoe's remarkable run continued as Bournemouth won three and lost one in December with the striker on target in each game and the side pushed up to 14th in the table. Further progress was made in the FA Cup with a comfortable 3-0 win over Nuneaton. In the Football League Trophy, Bournemouth beat Dover on penalties.

JANUARY

It was another superb month for Bournemouth and for Defoe as the South End was closed at Dean Court and demolished. Defoe made it ten in a row with further goals against Luton, Wrexham and Cambridge United and although he wasn't on target for the first time at Millwall, the side still won 1-0. The FA Cup run was over when Gillingham won 3-2 at Dean Court.

FEBRUARY

Defoe's goals dried up and so did Bournemouth's climb up the table. In the six games in the month, only three draws were gained with Defoe only netting once and the side finished February in 12th place.

MARCH

A good month saw talk of the play-offs being whispered around Dean Court. Wins were gained against Brentford, Bristol City, Bury and Swansea with new signing Warren Feeney on target against The Swans.

APRIL

An incredible end to the season saw Bournemouth on the verge of the top six. Only a home defeat against Reading blotted the copybook as in the other six games, maximum points were gained. In the final home game against Northampton, there were emotional scenes at Dean Court as the old stadium was used for the last time, Bournemouth saying goodbye with a 2-0 win.

MAY

3,000 Bournemouth supporters ended up heartbroken at Reading on the last game of the season. In a fantastic match, the game finished 3-3 with Defoe saying farewell with another goal to end with 18 in the League. Bournemouth were going to finish 6th as Bristol City could only draw at Wigan with Bournemouth 3-2 up, but Reading equalised with minutes left. Stephen Purches saw a goalbound effort somehow cleared off the line in the last minute and that was the difference between the play-offs and 7th place in a remarkable campaign.

SWINDON TOWN

AUGUST

A terrible start to the season saw Swindon finish the opening month just one off the bottom of the table. The opening game was drawn at home against Colchester, but the next three against Reading, Port Vale and Walsall were lost. In the League Cup, they drew 1-1 at home against Exeter.

SEPTEMBER

A first win arrived with a 1-0 success at Bristol City before they travelled to Dean Court, losing 3-0. A 3-2 win at Luton followed that before drawing 2-2 at home against Wigan. In the League Cup, they overcame Exeter 2-1 at St James's Park.

OCTOBER

A busy month started and finished with wins against the two University cities, but between those successes, just one point was gained in the other five games, that coming from a 0-0 draw at Swansea. They finished the month in 22nd place. In the League Cup Second Round, they lost 2-1 on aggregate against Tranmere Rovers.

NOVEMBER

It was another disappointing month where in their four league games, two points were gained with draws against Wycombe and Wrexham. Progress was made in the FA Cup with Ilkeston Town beaten 4-1 in the First Round at The County Ground.

DECEMBER

A win at Northampton and a home win over Rotherham provided cheer and that lifted The Robins out of the relegation zone. The year finished though with defeats against Bury and Reading. In the FA Cup, Gateshead were swept aside with a 5-0 win at home.

JANUARY

A poor start to the month started with a 1-0 loss at Walsall, then Coventry visited and won 2-0 in the FA Cup and that was followed by a 1-0 home defeat against Port Vale. The month finished strongly though with a solid 3-0 win over Bury. In the LDV Vans Trophy, Swindon won on penalties at Millwall after a 0-0 draw and then beat Wycombe 2-1 in the Area Quarter Finals.

FEBRUARY

Despite being unbeaten in five game, Swindon slipped to the foot of Division Two. They followed a 1-0 win at Cambridge with a visit from Bournemouth where they managed a draw. Richard Hughes gave the Cherries the lead with seven minutes left, but the Robins netted with three minutes to go. In the LDV. Swindon went out of the competition after a 2-1 loss at Southend.

MARCH

From looking doomed, Swindon virtually rescued their season with a superb month. Although the last two games against Reading and Rotherham were lost, prior to that they beat Oldham, Oxford and Colchester and gained draws against Wigan, Swansea and Bristol Rovers to lift themselves out of the bottom four.

APRII


It was a very tense month for Swindon, with The Robins constantly checking other results as they battled hard to keep above the drop zone. They won 1-0 at Brentford and beat Peterborough 2-1 at home and gained draws against Northampton and Wycombe.

MA

The Robins final game of the season was at Stoke City and because Bristol Rovers had lost 2-1 at home against Wycombe on 2 May, it meant that Town were safe. It was a close call though as Stoke won 2-1 in front of over 20,000 and Bristol Rovers won 4-0, but by the skin of their teeth, The Robins retained their Division Two status.







The Cherries finally celebrated a home win in the League with the success against Gillingham, a match that saw the return to Bournemouth of stalwart Neil Young.

Since then Neil has enjoyed mixed emotions with the highly disappointing defeat at Northampton and then the excellent turnaround with Wednesday's superb success against Leyton Orient.

Neil got an emotional reception from the Bournemouth supporters, one he was very grateful for, "It's been good to be back and the reaction I got from the supporters was excellent. It was very emotional and did help to give the players a lift. It was good to put the shirt on again, the one I have spent virtually all my career in and it's good to be back playing for Bournemouth again. I was really impressed by the standard of the Conference, there are some good players and now that Weymouth have a few players back from injury, I expect to see them climbing up the table. I'm at Bournemouth again now though and all I want to do is help the side climb the table

Neil has now been back for three games, and is delighted with two of them and brutally honest about the performance in the middle of two important home wins, "The Gillingham game was a quick one and I think we out battled them, and that was what it was all about. We didn't make any mistakes at the back and that is the key now, if we can lock teams out at the back and don't concede, then we always have a chance. That has to be our main priority at the moment. We kept it simple too and in the situation we are in, there is no time to be playing pretty football. That's what we did and the two lads up front in Brett and Vokesy were different class and worked their socks off. It's hard to put your finger on why the same team didn't perform at Northampton. If we can steer clear of injuries, get everyone back fit, I'm sure this squad is strong enough to lift us out of the situation we find ourselves in."

It's not easy for anyone when the run of winless home games went on and on, but now that the side have two under their belts, there is no reason why the side can't turn Dean Court in to a fortress, "There was pressure in the back of our minds, I'm sure there was. But it's always nice to wake up on a Sunday morning and know you've got a result. You can read the reports in the newspapers, watch the goals on the TV and because of that we were all buzzing and we can really gain confidence from that. I think that showed against Orient because we played some decent stuff and importantly, it lifted us off the bottom of the table."

Today marks the last home game for a number of the players at the club as they return to their parent clubs and Neil knows that after the Brighton game, there is a very useful short break that will be beneficial to The Cherries, "It gives us time to regroup. The players who have been out injured are good enough to walk straight back in to the team. With all the players going back, it will change the structure of the team, but we have got the lads here to fill those roles. The loan lads have made a big contribution to the side. The players the manager has brought in have been good and you can tell they have had a good upbringing and play football the right way. They

were always going to fit in here and it will be a shame to lose them as they have been an asset to the club."


Today we face Swindon Town and Neil hasn't got the fondest of memories of the last time the two sides met, "It was my last game before I went to Weymouth up at Swindon and it was a day where a lot of things went wrong. We will be looking for revenge and reverse the result that we had up there. We need the crowd again today and because it's a game over the holiday period, it should be a decent crowd. I know it's been hard for the supporters, it's been frustrating for the players and the supporters.


It's been good to be back and the reaction I got from the supporters was excellent. It was very emotional and did help to give the players a lift...

"You really feel for them because they want to come here and watch a successful team and win games. It was a great relief for us to win our first home League games and you could see what it meant to the crowd. They can be a massive help for the players.

I know supporters were disappointed with the way we played at Northampton, but they stayed with us and gave us excellent support against Orient. It was up to us to give people a performance that they could respond to. 



It has certainly been a roller-coaster ride! As more and more seasons roll by, the task of selecting my 'Dream Team' becomes closer and closer to impossible.

GOALKEEPER - KIERON BAKER

Kieron was first choice keeper when I started watching in 1974. He just seemed to get better and better over the next 3 or 4 years. He made some incredible saves and I seem to remember him saving a number of penalties. I also saw him turn out for the 'A' team on King's Park, playing as a striker! Can you imagine Gaz or Mossy being allowed to do that today!

RIGHT BACK - NEIL YOUNG



Legend. My all-time favourite player. 'Younger' is commitment and passion personified. I'm certain that if it hadn't been for his injuries he would surely have played at a higher level.

As a right back he was one of, if not the best in the Division, marauding up and down the wing on the overlap and steaming into tackles with no thoughts for his personal well-being. He then did a 'Paul Weller' and re-invented himself as an accomplished centre-back. Rarely a game goes by without at least one memorable 'Younger' moment. Hopefully there's plenty more to come, but when he does decide to call it a day it will be a very sad day indeed.

CENTRE-BACK - MARK MORRIS

Our 'Captain Courageous' during the amazing Great Escape of 1994/95. Although not the quickest, Mark was able to get himself out of difficult situations because he read the game so well. Strong and committed, he was a real leader on the pitch and helped to steady the ship during some fairly bleak times. He also had a habit of popping up with some vital goals during the Great Escape.


No disrespect to Fletch, but it was criminal that Mark wasn't crowned Player of the Year that season.

CENTRE-BACK - JOHN IMPEY

I have 2 great memories of John: a sliding tackle in front of the New Stand where ball and opponent went over the touchline, and his momentum caused him to also 'tackle' the poor lad walking round the pitch selling sweets! Also, having scored in front of the South End, John was injured. He just lay there, face down in the mud and raised both hands with thumbs up to acknowledge the celebrations!

LEFT-BACK - JAMIE VINCENT



This was a difficult choice between Jamie Vincent and Chris Sulley. Jamie just edges it for me.

A cultured player with a sweet left foot. Very comfortable on the ball, but also extremely solid in the tackle. Provided assists for numerous goals. And if 'Coxy' didn't get a touch, they would sometimes go straight in for what we used to call an 'accidental' goal! I think we may not have fully realised Jamie's value to the team until he had gone, when we seemed to lose our shape and balance as a team.

RIGHT-MIDFIELD - CLIVE PAYNE

This is cheating really, as Clive was a right-back! But, he was my first ever 'Favourite' player, so I had to find a way to include him! Clive was a really good player in a poor Cherries team.

He arrived from Norwich at a difficult time when many players

were heading in the opposite direction and over the next two and a half years gave everything for the cause but was sadly forced to retire because of injury at the young age of 26.

I was eleven years old at the time and I was absolutely gutted! With today's medical know-how, his career would surely have been extended.

CENTRE-MIDFIELD - IAN BISHOP

The best player I have ever seen in a Bournemouth shirt. Bar none. He seemed to have about an hour on the ball every time he received it! The ball would be coming out of the sky and he would just pull it down as if it had somehow magically stuck to his boot. 'Bish' had superb vision and could really pick a pass, it was like watching an artist at work.

I remember him taking freekicks and corners with either foot, as the situation demanded. His left was almost as good as his right! It was a privilege to have had him in our team, albeit for only one season. Pure class.

CENTRE-MIDFIELD - MATT HOLLAND

At the time of the financial nightmare (never heard that before!) in 1997, Matt was captain. Despite being only 22, he really showed great maturity and strength of character. I will never forget that night at the Winter Gardens. On top of that he was an excellent team player with good all-round ability.

He also performed admirably at centre-back for some length of time. I was delighted that he has gone on to have such a great career, he has been a credit to himself and to each club he has played for.

LEFT-MIDFIELD - GARRETH O'CONNOR



In my opinion the most naturally gifted footballer we have had on the playing staff in the last ten years. At his best Garreth must have been almost impossible to defend against.

Despite having no real pace, he could go past full-backs almost as if they weren't there, both on the inside and the outside. Scorer of some superb goals and packs a fierce shot with either foot. Great first touch.

STRIKER - LUTHER BLISSETT

When we signed Luther I think a lot of Cherries fans were in shock. We were used to Harry picking up 'unknowns' and now we had a name that everyone knew. Luther was fantastic for us.

He could make a goal for himself out of absolutely nothing, and frequently did! I remember one game against Ipswich where their fans were giving him terrible abuse, but Luther had the last laugh by scoring a hat-trick. A great player for us and a really nice guy too.

STRIKER - TREVOR MORGAN

Cherries fans were divided regarding 'Chesty'. Many loved him, the rest just didn't. Became something of a cult hero. He had a very good goalscoring ratio, both for us and his numerous other clubs. A somewhat ungainly looking player, but nevertheless very effective and deceptively skilful with the ball at his feet. Of all the strikers I have seen I would say that he was the best finisher when played through, one-on-one with the goalkeeper.

SHRIMPERS NEXT AT FITNESS FIRST

With the scheduled home game against Luton on 5 January postponed because of the Hatters' FA Cup progress, the next visitors to the Fitness First Stadium will be Southend United, who arrive for a League One match on Saturday, 19 January.

A quirk of the fixtures means that by then, Bournemouth will have played 25 of their 46 league games without meeting the Shrimpers - and will then play them twice within a month, as the return match at Roots Hall is on Saturday, 16 February. Southend only drew two of their first 20 league games, but went into the festive period having won four and drawn one of their last five league and cup games at home. They have been less successful on their travels, recently losing at Nottingham Forest, Luton and Swansea, with their last away win before Christmas coming at Northampton on 3 November, Boss Steve Tilson has recently allowed striker Richie Foran to extend his loan spell at Darlington for a second

HINSHELWOOD RULED OUT FOR SEASON

On Tuesday, the Cherries visit Brighton for a south coast derby on New Year's Day. The Seagulls have a kinder festive fixture schedule in terms of travelling than some other teams in the division, with away trips to Millwall on Boxing Day and Yeovil today, while their home games over Christmas are against Gillingham and Bournemouth.

However, one player who will not be doing any travelling with the team for the foreseeable future will be Adam Hinshelwood, who has suffered a setback in his recovery from cruciate knee ligament surgery. The injury-plagued defender only made it on to the pitch for one minute of playing time during the whole of 2007, coming on as an 89th-minute substitute against Gillingham in September. He has

now learned that he will miss the whole of the rest of this season, and physio Malcolm Stuart explained: "What we're now looking at is him returning fully fit at the end of a four to six-month period." Meanwhile, manager Dean Wilkins stated after their 3-0 win at today's visitors Swindon before Christmas that midfielder Dean Cox was left out of the squad for that game because of a breach of club discipline.

CLUBS PREPARE FOR FA CUP THIRD ROUND

While the Cherries take a break next Saturday because of Luton's FA Cup involvement, 11 clubs will be flying the flag for League One in the third round, which contains 64 clubs - including the 44 Premier League and Championship sides who enter at this stage. Luton went into administration in November, but the administration in November at big pay day when they host Liverpool at Kenilworth Road.



Swansea are the only League One representatives facing non-league opposition, in the shape of Havant & Waterlooville. Likely to be in goal for the Hawks is former Cherries keeper Kevin Scriven, who joined them from Farnborough in the summer.

Former Bournemouth striker Warren Feeney is nearing the end of his initial loan spell at Swansea from local rivals Cardiff, although his immediate future was thrown into question when he was stretchered off with an ankle injury after scoring the first goal in their 3-0 win against Southend on 15 December. With the ankle heavily swollen, the Northern Ireland international is set to be sidelined for at least four weeks and has returned to his parent club Cardiff for treatment.

Swansea and Cardiff had previously held talks about making the loan move permanent, but a Swans spokesman has said that no decision will be made until 1 January when the initial loan expires. Meanwhile, midfielder Matty Collins has returned to the Liberty Stadium after a loan spell at League Two





strugglers Wrexham, while fellow midfielder Darren Way - who is on loan at Yeovil and featured in their recent game with Bournemouth at Huish Park - is also preparing to return to Swansea when his loan spell expires on New Year's Day. He said: "I have unfinished work to do at Swansea and I've got to push myself into the team."

DEADLINE SET FOR LUTON SALE

Time is running out for any prospective buyers of Luton Town, whose administrators have set out a timetable for the club to be sold. Any interested purchasers have until 31 December to sign confidentiality agreements over information in the sale packs, and when they provide proof of funds, they will receive more detailed information about the club's finances.


The final deadline for bids is 1500 GMT on Thursday, 3 January, and talks will begin with a preferred bidder the following day, with creditors to be advised of the offer by 14 January. After a creditors' meeting in early February to approve any offer brought forward. the sale should be completed by March if all goes well. Meanwhile, Luton have pleaded not guilty to the charges they were handed by the Football Association in November (see Oldham programme for details), in connection to alleged breaches of rules relating to player transfers and contract renegotiations. The club announced in a short statement that its administrators had submitted the plea after taking legal advice. The Hatters travel to Port Vale today in a bottom-of-the-table clash.

TOWNSEND BLOW FOR CHELTENHAM

Cheltenham defender Michael Townsend will be sitting out their festive fixture programme, which included a trip to Swansea on Boxing Day and a visit to Tranmere today. Townsend has been diagnosed with labyrinthitis, an ear problem which affects balance, and sports therapist Ian Weston explained: "We have taken the decision to leave him out until the new year. That will allow Michael to concentrate on getting himself right." Without Townsend, an Andy

Lindegaard goal helped the Robins to a crucial 1-0 victory over fellow strugglers Luton before Christmas, while manager Keith Downing has extended Charlton midfielder Dean Sinclair's loan for a third month. He said: "Dean's performances have been really important for us and he has done exceptionally well in the time he has been here."

SODJE WILL BE MAN IN THE MASK



Gillingham defender Efe Sodje has been a very recognisable figure around the lower divisions in the last decade. Having played for Stevenage, Macclesfield, Luton, Colchester, Crewe, Huddersfield, Yeovil, Southend and now the Gills, fans will be familiar with the bandanas he always wears in club colours, with "Against All Odds" written on the front in capital letters.

Sodje was injured in Gillingham's 2-1 defeat at his old club Yeovil last month in a clash of heads with Glovers striker Lloyd Owusu, and was taken to hospital with a fractured eye socket, which also required five stitches. But having sat out their pre-Christmas games, including the Gills' defeat here at the Fitness First Stadium a fortnight ago, he has decided to play with a protective mask rather than have surgery, as he has been told that there is a 1% chance he could be left blind if an artery by the fracture is accidentally cut. Boss Mark Stimson said: "Even though he will have a protective mask, I don't believe he will feature during the festive period." Meanwhile, defender Duncan Jupp has left Priestfield by mutual consent, while youth team manager Scott Fitzgerald has also left Gillingham to take up a similar position at Millwall.



A LOOK BACK AT 2007

Looking back over the year, we once again saw a lot of lads leave and once again, they have gone on to a decent level of football.

We produce a lot of players who go on to play in local senior non league sides. It can be frustrating when we get lads blocked coming to us from local non league sides to come in. If they come to us and don't make it to the professional ranks, they will go back as better players and more prepared for the rigours of non league football to a degree. We do work extremely hard and a lot of nonleague sides from Salisbury to Bashley, Poole to Christchurch. Eastleigh and with Adam Mills, all the way East in Lowestoft and Curtis Allen in Northern Ireland, have all benefited from the AFC Bournemouth youth scheme and that is a testament to what we do.

The important thing is that if they leave us, they don't just leave as better footballers, but also have a good educational background. We regard our association with Brockenhurst College very highly and the organisation is supported greatly by the college and if they weren't supporting us, we wouldn't be here. The parents of the boys have belief in the fact that their sons are getting an education whilst they are here and that will stand them in good stead for the future.

As players go out, players step up and it is good that so many of the lads we have now in the Under18's have come through the system here. It has been a difficult start for them as because of events at the club, we have never been able to play a settled side. We have played Plymouth twice this season and they had the same starting eleven and five on the bench in both games and that gives them consistency in their performances. and that is why they are winning games and progressing in cups. When you look at us, we played a big game in the FA Youth Cup and we had lads coming in who hadn't been involved for some time and it does cause a little disruption. It means

that we lose a little bit of consistency in our game, but that is what we are and the lads have to deal with that.

Because of this, we have had a lot of opportunities to move lads up and down with Under 16's coming in to the Under 18's and also being exposed to reserve team football and Under 18's exposed to first team football. In many respects, this can only enhance the overall understanding of what is required to become a professional footballer. The standards here increase quickly as soon as a player walks through the door and we need to temper that with the ability to withstand that type of pressure.

The main focus of the youth set up here recently is Sam Vokes and many people forget that he is still a part of the youth set up here. I see Sam at the training ground with the first team and it's easy to forget sometimes that he is one of our lads. His attitude to maintaining his college attendance and putting himself out could easily be put to one side, but he remained fully focused on it and that is a credit to him.

We have also had Josh McQuoid who has made a number of first team appearances this year and it is always fantastic to see one of your lads in the first team, it's a great lift. As well as Josh, we have also had a number of our lads involved on the bench and have been in and around the first team environment which is also a big boost.

Most of the players have been involved in the reserve team this season and it was good to see a number of professionals playing in the last game as well, because that was a massive boost to the lads who are making that step up. Our lads want to play at the highest level they can, but to have less in the reserve team, with a number of professionals helping them can be more beneficial. Being around professionals is a huge learning curve

for them and in that situation, the penny can drop. The ideal scenario would be for a couple of lads to step up when they are ready, playing alongside professionals because that would give the most benefit. We have had situations this season when we have had eight or nine youth team players in a reserve side, like when we played against Bristol City. City virtually fielded the side that got them up to the Championship, and is that good exposure or laving them bare? It is difficult then to be above their game and catching the eye against that quality of opposition. In the same breath it is needs must because they there were no other players available, but the Bristol Rovers game, regardless of the result, was far more beneficial. The more they hear from the professionals. which is consistent with what I'm telling them, the more they learn.

Overall, I look at the year as a mixed bag in some respects. The opportunity to go and train and travel with the first team has been excellent. We have had more training time with the first team than ever before since I've been here, which is a great benefit to the players. We have had a challenge with the first years who came in. It is a massive change from Under 16 to full time Under 18. It has taken them a while to adjust to the discipline of that and the attention to detail, which is something they won't do as much when only training two nights a week. There have been a lot of variants, some of which has been pleasing, some of which have been frustrating. We now are in the Christmas break. which is the first natural break the lads have had since July, it gives them time for reflection. We have said all along that all the players have potential, but potential means nothing unless you can tap in to all the support you can get. Some players have more talent than they perceive. but they need to listen to coaches and managers.

One thing that has been very good for them this season and a real plus is the lads taking the responsibility of selling the 50/50 tickets at first team games. The income from these tickets goes directly to benefit the youth team and nothing else. They have got to know supporters and seen the passion supporters have for this football club and also, supporters have met the youth players.

We are tucked away at Brockenhurst during the week and at reserve games, the crowds aren't the biggest, so it is good to see them on a first team match day and it is a good way of raising their profile. We had an article in the paper the other day about the whole youth system here and the lads who have been out selling the tickets have spoken to supporters who didn't realise just what depth the youth system has here. They are now making their mark in a great way and supporters now know that we have a large system in place.

I would like to thank everyone who has supported us by buying the 50/50 draw tickets on behalf of the lads. We are building that money up now to be able to do something substantial with it. It would be easy to fritter it away on bibs. balls and cones, but we would like to use your money to build something substantial for the lads at some point in time. It has been very well received and will be very well used.

Finally, on behalf of all the coaches and all the players, may I take this opportunity to wish you all a very Happy New Year.

2 - The round in the FA Cup that Bournemouth met Swindon in the Cherries greatest ever FA Cup run. Bournemouth had beaten Burton Albion 8-0 in the first round and travelled to Swindon on 8 December 1956 and won 1-0 in front of a 17,410 crowd.

Bournemouth beat Accrington Stanley 2-0 in the Third Round before going on to meet the top three teams in England at the time. Boscombe won 1-0 at Wolves in the Fourth Round, beat Tottenham 3-1 in the Fifth Round and were unlucky to go out at the Quarter Final stage against Manchester United, losing 2-1 in front of a record 28,799 crowd.



4 - The number of goals that Swindon have scored against Bournemouth in each of our last two visits to The County Ground. On 21 January 2006, Bournemouth clawed back a two goal deficit, only to concede two late goals. This season Danny Hollands equalised The Robins early opener, but three second half strikes condemned Bournemouth to defeat.

17 - 17 years ago Bournemouth came back from a two goal deficit against Leyton Orient thanks to Paul Miller and Shaun Teale goals to earn a 2-2 draw.

54 - The number of first team appearances made by Jimmy Quinn for Bournemouth. Jimmy started his professional career at Swindon after signing from Oswestry Town in December 1981. He then went to Blackburn in 1984 before returning to Swindon. After spells at Leicester and Bradford, he signed for Bournemouth in the summer of 1991 and missed just three games that season and was top scorer with 24 goals. He left Bournemouth during the following summer and signed for Reading where he enjoyed fantastic success and in the 93-94 season, scored 35 goals. He then became joint manager at Reading before signing for Peterborough as a player. In October 1998, he went to Swindon for a third time, this time as manager in very difficult times at the club.

Although aged over 40, he continued to play and after leaving Swindon, played for Northwich Victoria, Hereford United. Hayes and Highworth Town. He then had a spell at Northwich as manager and then moved to Shrewsbury and helped them to promotion, making 15 appearances for them despite being 44. He resigned at Shrewsbury in October 2004 and went briefly back to Peterborough as assistant to Barry Fry and was then appointed as manager of Norwegian Division Three side Egersunds. He returned to England and became manager of Cambridge United, where this season he is enjoying a great deal of success in the League and he has also led them to the Third Round of the FA Cup.



69 - The number of miles between The Fitness First Stadium and Swindon Town's County Ground.

97 - The number of times that Bournemouth and Swindon have met in the Football League. Bournemouth have won 37 of these matches, Swindon have triumphed on 35 occasions and 27 have been drawn. The first meeting was the first ever League match for Bournemouth & Boscombe Athletic on 25 August 1923, with Swindon winning 3-1 at The County Ground. The first ever Football League match at Dean Court was also against Swindon a week later with the Cherries gaining their first league point in a 0-0 draw. Swindon's biggest win over The Cherries came in January 1926 when they won 8-2 at The County Ground whilst the Cherries 7-0 win over The Robins in September 1956 is Bournemouth's record League win.

138 - The number of first team appearances made by current Swindon captain Jamie Vincent for Bournemouth.

770 - The number of League appearances made by John Trollope for Swindon Town from 1960 to 1980. That is the record number of appearances made by any player for one club and it is an achievement that saw him awarded the MBE. At one time, he was ever present for seven seasons and played in 368 consecutive League matches, only missing one when he broke his arm. He was manager at Swindon from 1981 to 1983 and has since been assistant manager to Lou Macari and has also been in charge of the youth team. His son Paul is the current Bristol Rovers manager.

19495 - The largest attendance at Dean Court to see Bournemouth against Swindon in a League match. That attendance was set in the 1948-49 season with Bournemouth winning 3-0.

20051 - The largest crowd to see a Bournemouth v Swindon match was 20,051 at the County Ground on 7 April 1947, with Bournemouth & Boscombe Athletic winning 3-1.

32000 - The record attendance at Swindon's County Ground. This was set in January 1972 for an FA Cup Third Round tie against Arsenal.

SAM VOKES A GREAT FEELING

It has been a quite incredible year for Sam Vokes and he finishes it on a high with a starting place in the side. The 18 year old also grabbed his first home goal for the side on Wednesday as they gained a vital three points against Leyton Orient.

It was Sam's persistence that got him the goal and it was something that the manager had told him to work on, "The gaffer has told us to put pressure on people and as the defender has tried to head it back, I just got in and put it over the keeper. It was a massive goal for me to get as it was my first one at home. It was good to score in front of the North Stand, but apparently you aren't allowed to celebrate goals with your own supporters, because I got booked for that! It was a great feeling though."

That game came after a completely opposite performance at Northampton, although Sam doesn't want to dwell too long on that night, but would rather look forward. "We were very disappointed at Northampton after we'd played well here against Gillingham. It was good spirit from the boys to bounce back from a terrible performance and we don't want to look back, but look forward now to the rest of the season. starting today against Swindon. It's a massive game for us today and we will be going all out to make it three wins in a row here. If we can get a good run going it can be really good for the club because we can get more supporters in. The supporters were brilliant on Wednesday, really got behind the team right from the start and I think it

showed in our performance that we reacted to that."

Sam obviously grabbed the headlines after his first senior home goal against Orient, but he readily agrees that it was a terrific team performance, "It was a great team effort. We got behind them early and got on the front foot. It was important to get the first goal and it was a good goal to get. The manager said he counted 28 passes leading to that goal and that lifts the crowd and there was a real buzz about the place because you could sense that they appreciated how well we were playing. We did what we did best and were keeping the ball, waiting patiently to play the right ball rather than lumping it."

It wasn't entirely plain sailing though as The O's did hit back midway through the second half, but the side showed great composure to ensure there was no way back for the play-off hopefuls, "We never gave them a sniff. We've been there many a time when for the last ten, fifteen minutes after conceding everyone is on edge. We spoke about that in training because at Northampton we never really got in their faces and didn't press them. We did that against Orient from the front to the back and never let them really get any head of steam up. The only time they really pressurised us was in

the last minute and that led to our third goal, so we were really pleased with that. I think all of us were really pleased that we put in a performance like that for the supporters who went to Northampton. They didn't deserve to see such a poor performance there and it's good they saw a better display from the team"

With half of the season completed today, Bournemouth have certainly proved that they have what it takes to get out of trouble and Sam believes that the side are capable of doing that, "I believe we've got what it takes, but we have to do that consistently. Today's game and the one at Brighton on New Year's Day are massive for us. We need to be picking up points in both of these games and then we'll be flying going in to 2008."
