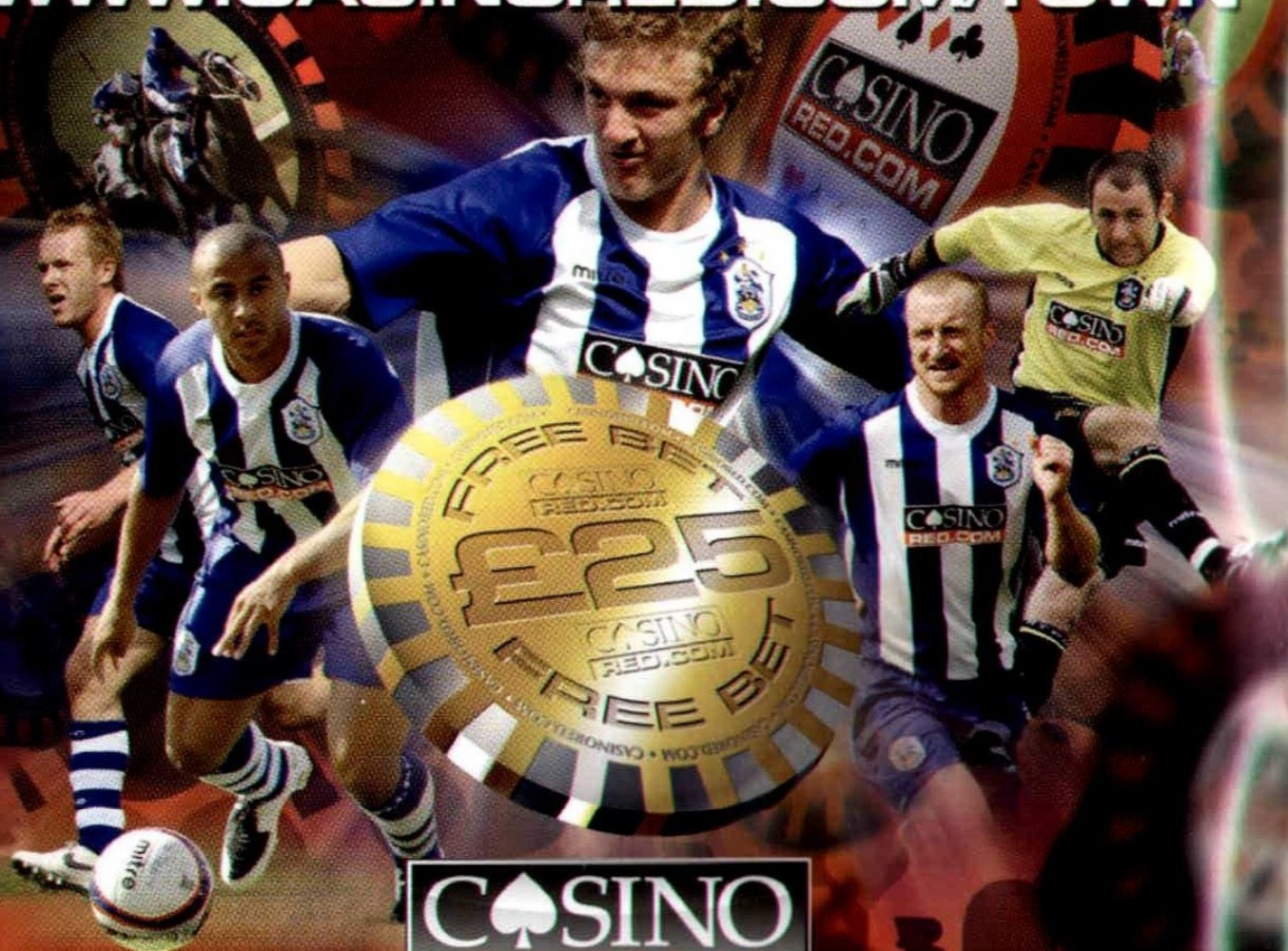

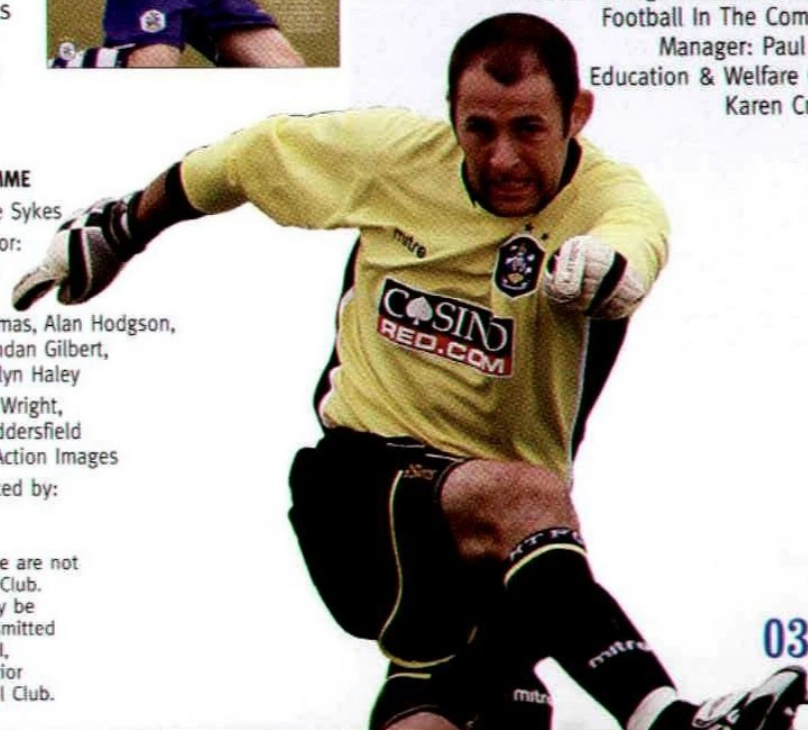

Good afternoon and welcome to the Galpharm Stadium for our League One game against Swindon Town...

I was very pleased with the last performance here against Bournemouth in terms of the way that we shut them out.

They didn't really have a shot worthy of note at all during the game which was obviously very pleasing and the only thing I could really level at the players on the evening was that we should have taken a few more of the chances we created.

On another night, 'Jevro' might have had a hat-trick but he definitely should have had two. However, I'm being ultra-critical there; the main focus of that game was getting the result and we certainly did that. It wasn't the greatest of games, but we're in a results business and although we have to entertain, we cannot always do that. As of late, we have managed to grind some results out and I thought we put in a really professional performance.

We would love to be winning games three or four – nil by playing great attractive football every week, but a lot of the games in this league are battles of mental as well as physical strength. We have certainly made an effort to become more resilient as of late and we have stressed to the players that if you have to launch the ball out of your area to relieve pressure, then so be it. We're still trying to play when we can, but we have certainly been clearing our lines a bit better.

Everything I have just said about the Bournemouth victory also applies to last weekend's game at Yeovil, although I thought we played even better down there. We managed to knock the ball around a bit and we put some good passing moves together in what was another thoroughly professional performance. Again, if I'm being ultra-critical we perhaps should have had a few more goals but I was very pleased with the way in which we saw the game out. Russell Slade changed it around a little in the second-half and they enjoyed their best spell ten minutes after they brought on a couple of substitutes, but Matty Glennon didn't have a shot to save in the second-half. When we had to defend, we did so correctly. Matty made a fantastic save from Owusu in the first-half and Rob Page chucked himself full-length to block a shot from the same player soon afterwards. Other than that, they really didn't trouble us and all-in-all it was a very good performance from us. Rob has been instrumental in us keeping three successive clean sheets since his arrival with his organisational skills; he constantly talks to his teammates and doesn't let people get away with things. However, our improved defence can be attributed to the hard work that everyone has put in; although I wouldn't encourage our front

lads to come charging back over the halfway line, they have done their bit just like everyone else. It's a team effort, but Rob has had a big input.

The January transfer window has now closed, but the loan market has reopened and we're still looking to add to our squad. We're currently looking for another striker who can also play down either flank who is currently at a Championship club, but as ever these processes never progress that quickly and we have to wait on the availability of players. We've recently had a trialist on board – Leon Quarless from Walsall – but at the moment he is not good enough to come into our first eleven and so we will not be taking our interest in him any further. Leon is a genuine left-winger and there is a shortage of left-sided players in football in general and I'm sure he will have no problems finding a club.

It's tough, because every manager I talk to seems to be looking for the same type of player as we are – a genuine left-sided player to give their side some balance or a leader on the pitch and in the dressing room. When looking for players we have to look in a certain niche, depending on the available finances, and sometimes it's difficult to find the right player. I'm not going to bring somebody in for the sake of it and waiting reaps its benefits – Robert Page being a good case in point.

I'd like to give James Berrett a quick mention, as he has been away this week with the Republic of Ireland under-19 team. We all hope that he

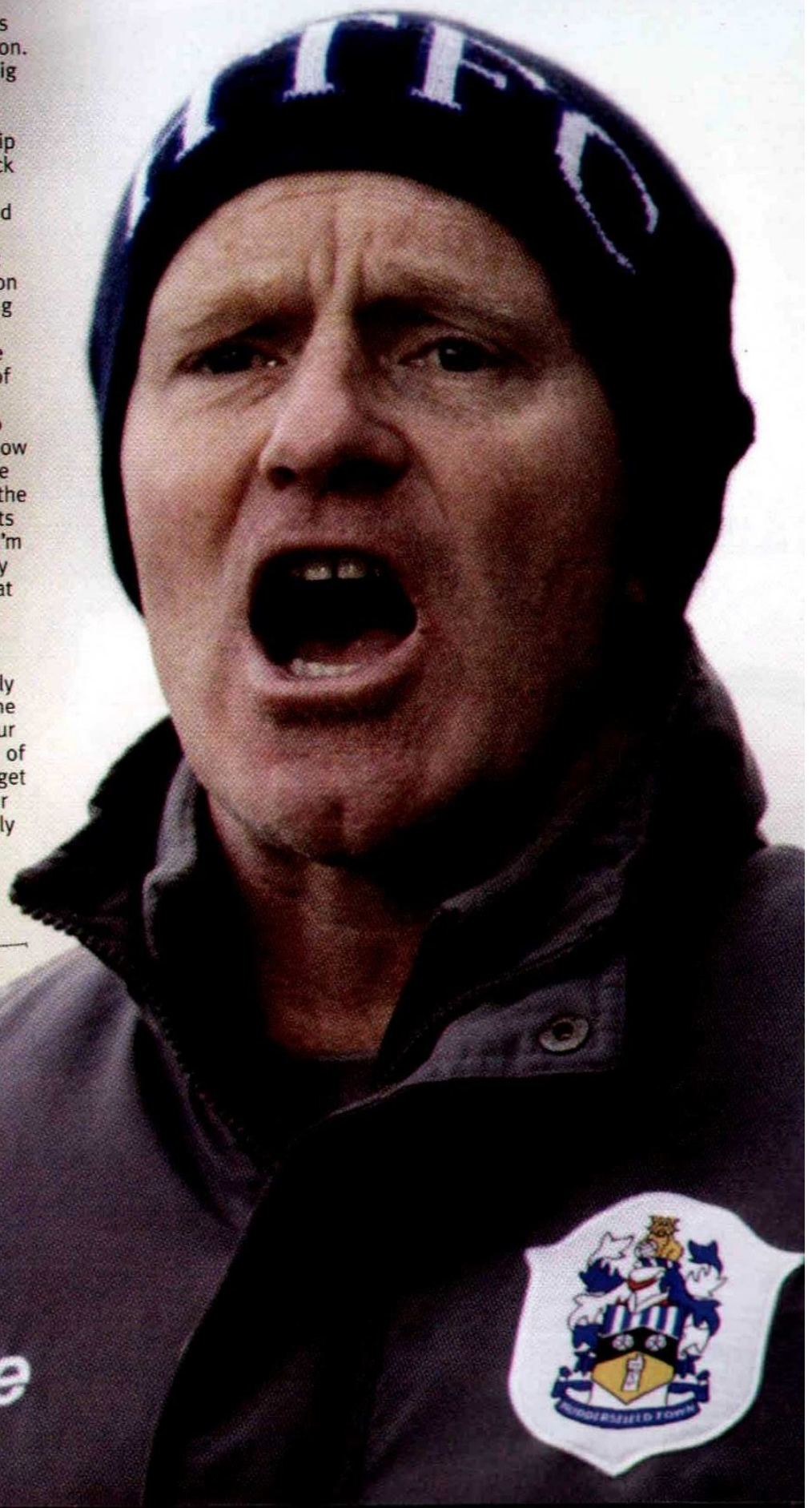
enjoyed his time away and has returned to us in peak condition. Today we have another very big game and I'd like to welcome the coaching staff, fans and players who have made the trip up from Wiltshire. Paul Sturrock left Swindon in a very good position when he departed and the new manager, Maurice Malpas, has come in and kept that momentum going. Swindon sides have a history of wanting to play good football and although I don't know Maurice well, him having spent most of his career in Scotland, he has brought some good players to the club in January and we know they will be a tough test. If we want to continue pushing up the League, we have to take points off the teams around us and I'm a great believer that if we play as well as we can, we will beat any team in this League.

The players and the coaching staff have worked hard recently to tighten up and long may the improved results continue. Your support has been fantastic as of late and I hope that you will get behind us in the same manner today, as I know the lads really appreciate it.



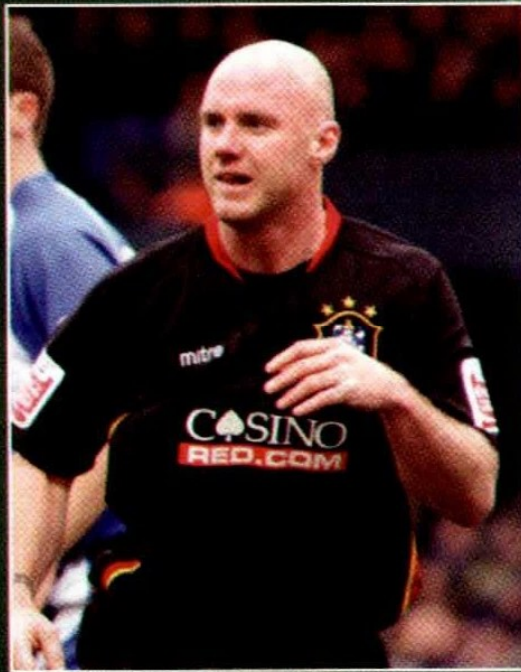

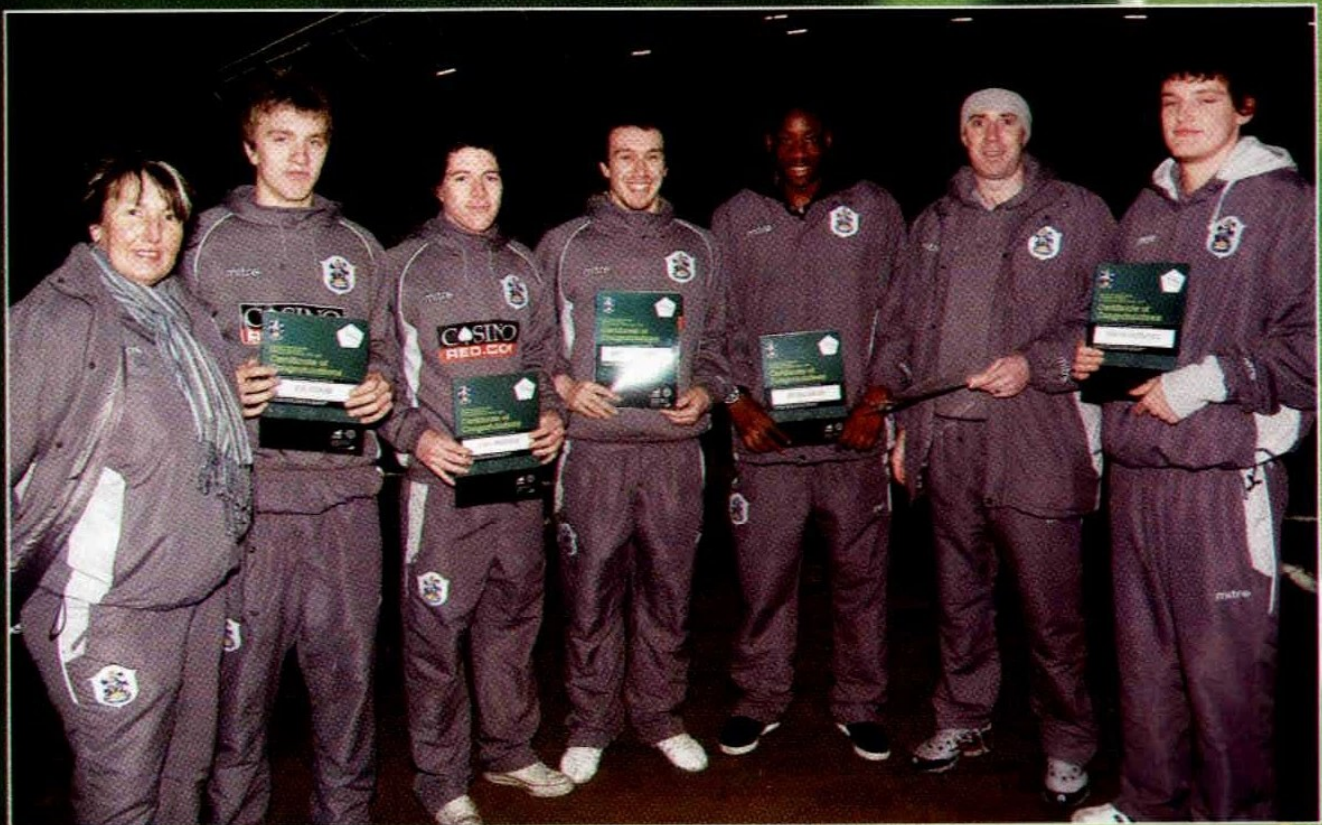
Robert Page

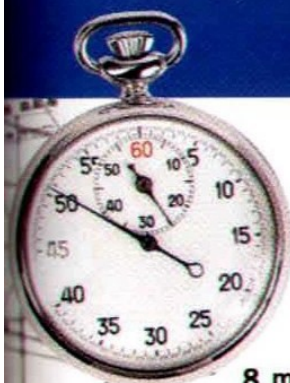
Scholarship Certificates

8 minutes: Matt Glennon kept the scores level early on when he saved well from big striker Lloyd Owusu; the former Brentford striker having received a pass inside the box from midfielder Stiebler.

24 minutes: Town won a penalty midway through the first-half when Yeovil Captain Skiverton handled a Robbie Williams corner at the near post under heavy pressure; up stepped Luke Beckett to send 'keeper Mildenhall the wrong way to give the Terriers the lead.

35 minutes: Stiebler and Owusu combined again to give the Ghanaian another chance to shoot when inside the box, but Rob Page steamed across to make a superb sliding block as the striker pulled the trigger.

51 minutes: Beckett was again involved as Town extended their lead, collecting a header from midfield before dribbling the ball towards the right wing and playing a clever reverse pass infield to find the run of Michael Collins. The young Irish midfielder steadied himself before slipping the ball underneath the stranded goalie from around 12 yards out.

60 minutes: In-form striker Beckett was denied by the legs of Mildenhall on the hour mark after he had shown quick feet to make space for the shot.

65 minutes: Former Yeovil hitman Phil Jevons, who had been on the end of a mixed reception from the crowd at Huish Park all afternoon,



almost scored against his former Club after a great solo run down the left flank but his curling effort from the edge of the box was pushed around the post by the excellent Mildenhall.

In fact, three consecutive clean sheets is a sight seldom seen by Huddersfield fans in recent years; the last time they could enjoy such defensive solidarity was back in the final games of the 2004/05 season.

"It's the first time that has happened since my arrival at the Club - I don't think we've managed back-to-back clean sheets on too many occasions!" Matt admitted. "We seem to have been much tighter defensively from the Brighton game and since Rob Page has come in we've tightened things up even further. We've been playing well and all of us have been putting our bodies on the line; we've done excellently."

The most obvious driving force behind Town's recent upturn in defensive form would seem to be the arrival of Page from Coventry City. Ever since the Welsh international joined the Club, Town have not conceded and Glennon was keen to emphasize the impact that his new defensive teammate has made in his short time here. "Pagey has made a massive difference since joining the Club through his experience.

He's 33 years old and he's played at a high level throughout his career. Putting another old head in the back four alongside Frank has really shored us up. However, all of the lads have been working hard."

Glennon's own performances have been a tribute to that hard work. Arguably in the best form of his Town career to date, Matt was linked with a move away from the Galpharm Stadium by the red-tops in the transfer window, with Coventry and Birmingham just two of the clubs linked with the 6'2" Stockport-born custodian. Should Town fans be concerned given that his current deal runs out in the summer?

"I'm definitely aware of the links that have been made in the papers, as the lads remind me about them every day!" Matt joked. "It's been great recently though - we've been winning games and keeping clean sheets, which is what I'm paid to do.

"I'm hoping to sort out my contract at Huddersfield; it's here that I want to stay. I'm very happy here as we have a good bunch of lads and I'm enjoying my football.

"I got on with Peter Jackson

really well, but I get on with the new Gaffer brilliantly too. When you work hard and put everything into your games, you will always forge a relationship with your manager and I'm hoping that we can do him some justice by continuing to win games.

"This season has been full of good spells and bad spells and now we are in a good one, hopefully it can last a bit longer.

"I still think I'm improving as a goalkeeper. This season I feel that I've come on again thanks to the work I am doing in training with Vaughany (John Vaughan, Town Goalkeeping Coach). I'm 29 now and so I'm at my peak with a good few years left; I'm going to keep working hard and hopefully my experience will keep improving me as a goalkeeper.

"I hope that this is now the start of things to come. Three clean sheets and three wins; I hope that is the start of the trend and if we can continue that kind of form until the end of the season, we will still achieve something."

Huddersfield are Matt's ninth professional club and he will soon be making a return to one of his former employees, when Andy Ritchie takes his side up the M6 to face Carlisle United on Tuesday evening.

"I had a good time at Carlisle and I'm looking forward to going back up there, but I'll enjoy my return even more if we win!

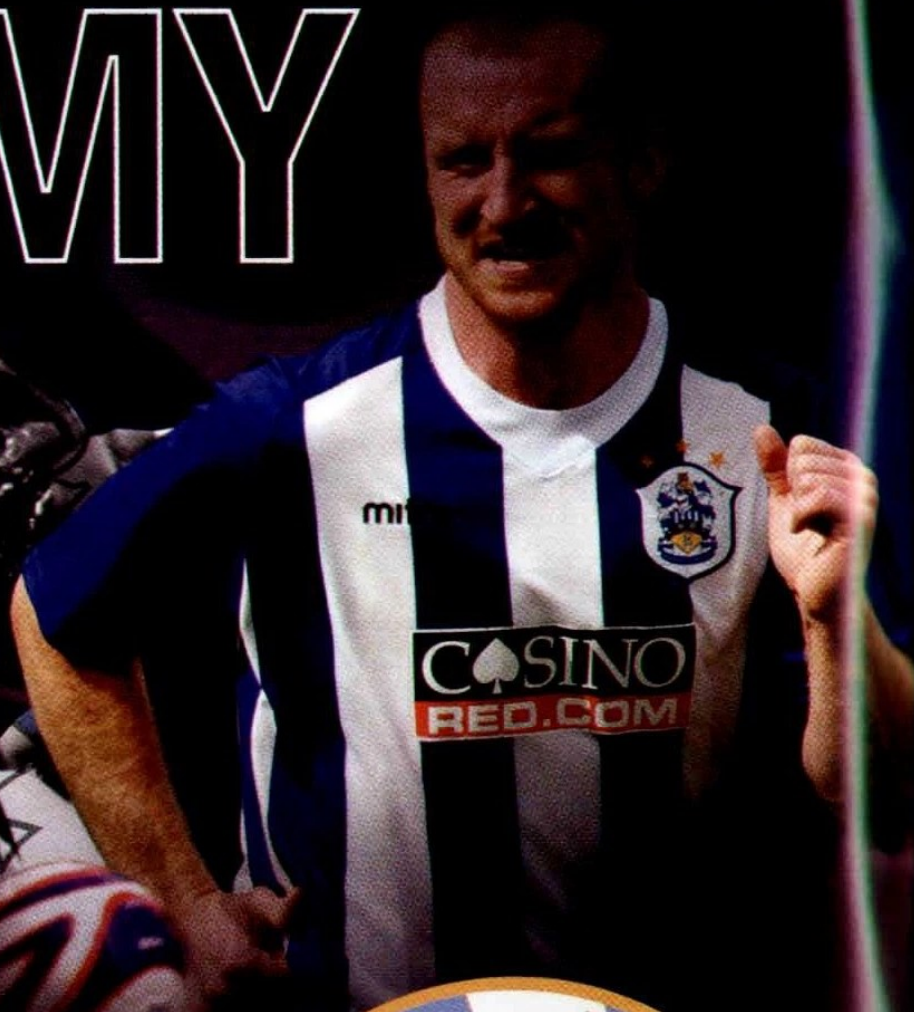

Although this wasn't always the case in my time there, Brunton Park is now a very hard place to travel. They are currently on a club record streak of nine wins at home but hopefully we can end that run on Tuesday night."

One major disappointment for Matt this season was his first red card in Town colours at Southend United in early December. Glennon was adjudged to have brought down Shrimpers striker Leon Clarke en-route to goal but despite the Southend forward penning a letter to protest the goalkeeper's innocence as Town appealed against the decision, the powers-that-be upheld his one match ban.

"I've said this a few times since that decision, but it was absolutely ridiculous. They happily took the money off the club for the appeal and looked at the video but it obviously took them all of five minutes to decide my fate. Then one of the Gillingham lads goes in on Frank with both feet a couple of weeks later and he gets off with it.

"My annoyance with the whole situation was probably compounded by the fact that I missed the Leeds game. Don't get me wrong - I have no problem with Leeds, but it's always a big game for this Club and it's the kind of atmosphere that you want to play in. Added to that, I was on a run of consecutive games carrying over from the previous season where I battled through a few games with a bit of a shoulder issue."

In fact, Glennon had played in every Town game since joining the Club in the summer of 2006 - a run of 71 games.

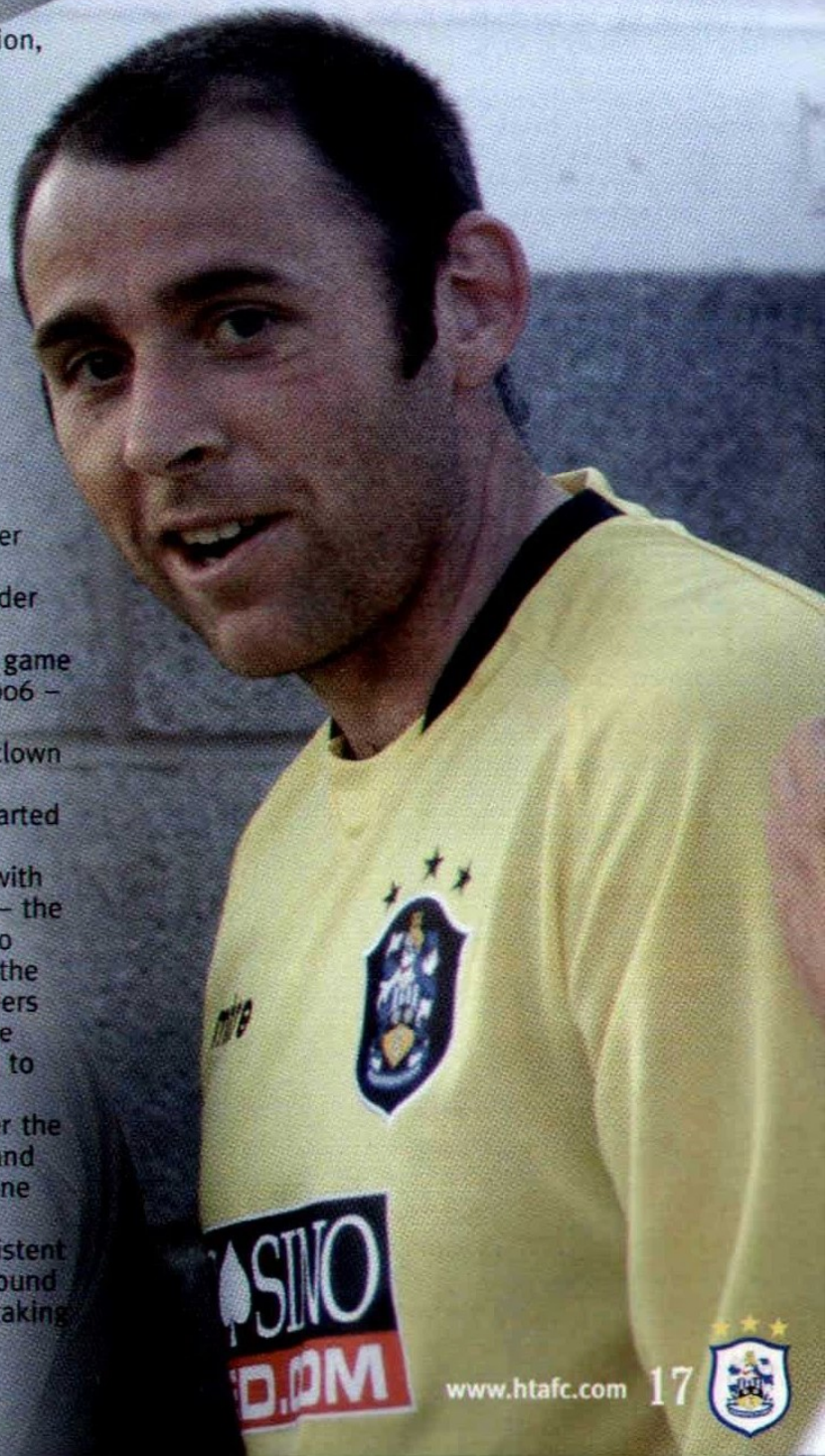
"To play through that pain only for some clown to take my run away from me with a poor decision is hard to take. Since then I've started on another run, but it's not the same."

Today Matt and company will be charged with seeing off the challenge of Swindon Town - the final League One sides that Town are yet to meet this season. Ahead of today's game, the Robins sit just three points above the Terriers and Matt emphasized that Town need to be taking points from the teams around them to stand a chance of a late promotion push.

"We've got a couple of games in hand over the teams that are around us at the moment and we need to make the most of them. Any one team can beat another in this league this season and only Swansea have been consistent - but having said that, we won at their ground earlier this season. We just need to keep taking points.

"This season has not gone fantastically for us and we in a lower position than we feel we should be, but if we keep winning games and go on a little run then you never know. There always seems to be one team that makes a late surge into the Play-Offs and there's no reason that it can't be us this time."

MAURICE MALPAS

Manager

● Maurice Malpas won 55 caps for Scotland and subsequently is a member of the Scotland Football Hall of Fame. A Scottish schools U-15 cap, he signed for Dundee United from Leven Royals in 1979.

Despite making his first-team debut in November 1981, he did not become a full-time player until the completion of his BSc degree in Electrical Engineering two years later.

Maurice soon developed into one of the best full backs in Scotland, a fact recognised when he won the first of his caps in 1984. He went on to exceed 50, thus becoming the only United player so far to enter the SFA's Hall of Fame. In his fiftieth international appearance (away to Norway in June 1992) he was made captain to mark the occasion. Consistently outstanding, his good fortune in avoiding serious injury helped him build the club's all-time record of 617 appearances by the



time he retired from playing in the year 2000. He then assumed full time coaching duties at Tannadice, having been acting as player/coach since 1991. He was part of the temporary management team following the dismissal of Alex Smith in October 2002, but left the club in January 2003.

He initially joined Motherwell as assistant manager to former coaching colleague Terry Butcher, taking over the manager's position in May 2006 following Butcher's departure to coach Sydney FC in the A-League. He left the club in June 2007 after one season in charge. Malpas later became caretaker manager of Scotland's under-21 team in August 2007 but missed out on the permanent position to Billy Stark. In January 2008, Malpas became manager of Swindon Town after the takeover of the club by local businessman Andrew Fitton. He replaced former Dundee United team-mate Paul Sturrock.

PETER BREZOVAN GOALKEEPER

A former Slovak under-21 international, Peter joined Swindon after being spotted by former boss Dennis Wise whilst on trial at Crewe. The giant 6'7" shot-stopper has previously had a trial period with Premiership side Everton and has been a real success at the County Ground, moving to the Club permanently after a successful loan spell.

MIGUEL COMMINGES DEFENDER

French right-back Miguel joined Swindon in June 2007 to add to the already burgeoning contingent of French players in Wiltshire. He has represented his country Guadeloupe at international level and has added some real competition for places in the Swindon backline since moving to England from Reims.

HASNEY ALJOFREE DEFENDER

A former trainee at Bolton Wanderers, Hasney joined Swindon Town in 2007 whilst the club was managed by Paul Sturrock. The Scottish boss had previously managed the Manchester-born defender at Plymouth Argyle, where he had learned of his leadership skills and tough tackling style. ANTHONY McNAMEE MIDFIELDER

Starting at Watford, McNamee was given his debut by then-boss Gianluca Vialli in March 2002 before going on to make over 90 appearances for the Hornets. A tricky and speedy left winger, he joined Swindon in the January transfer window for an undisclosed fee.

MOSES ASHIKODI STRIKER

Another player with Watford links, Moses joined Swindon on loan in the January transfer window. 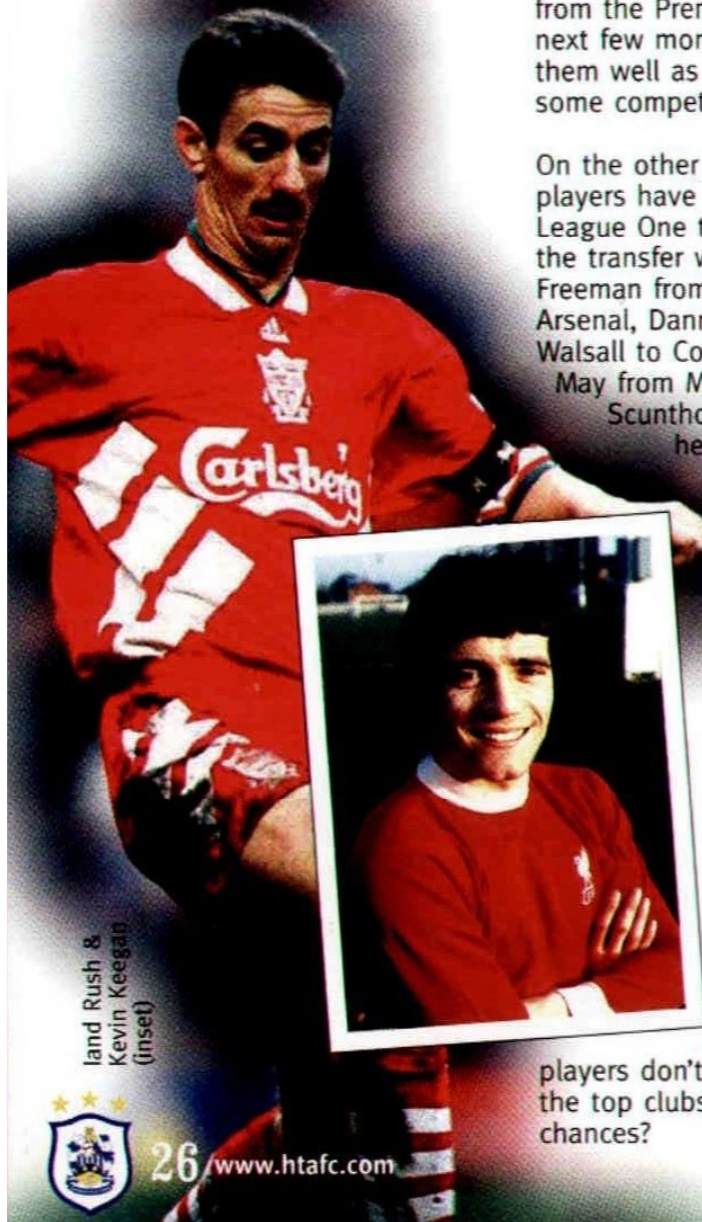
Scunthorpe hardly made headlines. This

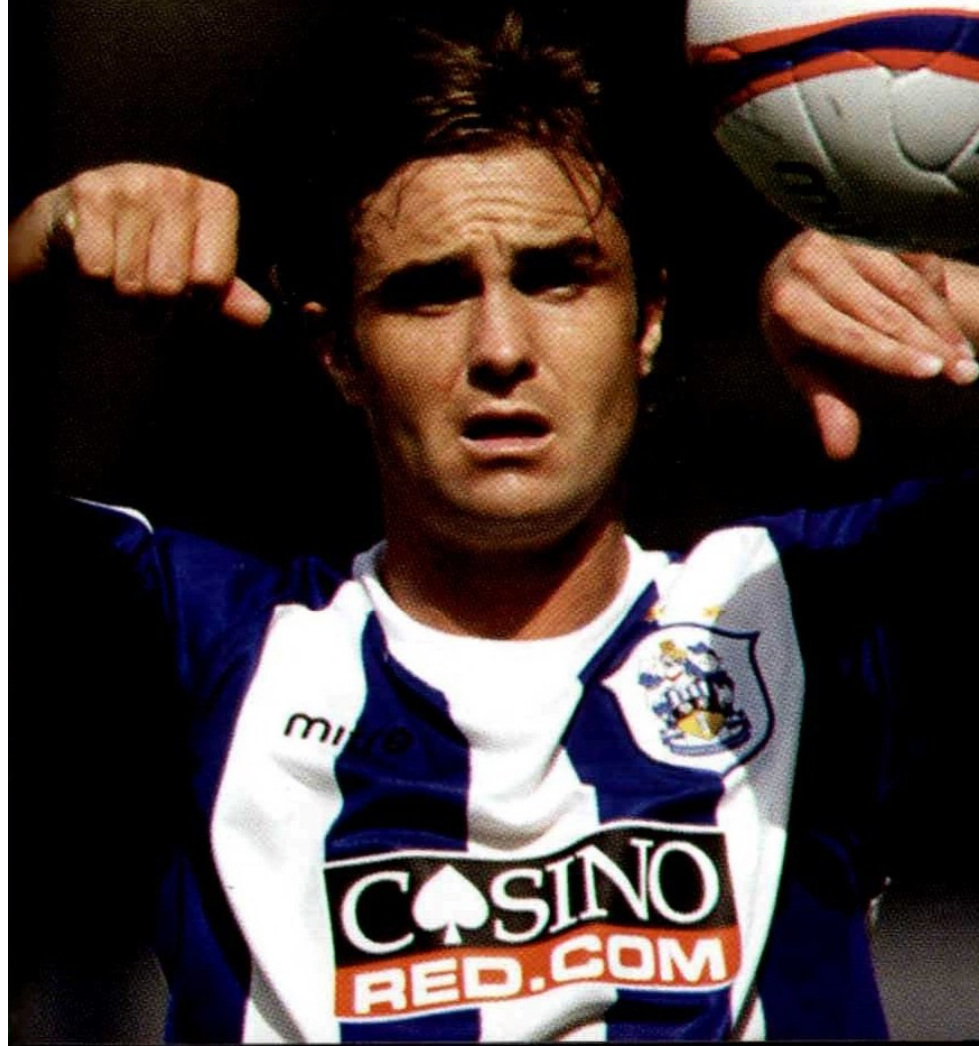

● John Dungworth's second-string slumped to defeat against a Coventry side boasting a few experienced players at the Galpharm Stadium last week, but the scoreline could have been quite different if Town had managed to capitalize on a decent spell of pressure just after the interval.

Former Charlton Athletic forward Donovan Simmonds netted a brace either side of half-time for the Sky Blues before left-back Aaron Griffiths scored the goal of the game with a blockbusting 30-yard drive with only two minutes remaining. Town's side included a trialist - Walsall youngster Leon Quarless. The Liverpoolian played on the left side as part of a front three alongside the central Andy Booth and Danny Racchi and could have scored twice; shooting straight at the 'keeper when well placed before the half-hour before spurning a golden opportunity at the far post with only a minute of the first 45 remaining. Booth played the whole of the first half as he completed his comeback from a back injury and the game also provided valuable time on the pitch for several of his team-mates, the Reserves not having played for over a month up until this fixture.

Coventry's opener came after 26 minutes when Dutch winger Ellery Cairo played a ball across the Town box that allowed Simmonds to tap home at the far post before the Terriers pressed for an equalizer, with Quarless and Berrett both going close. Simmonds' 70th minute goal killed the game off

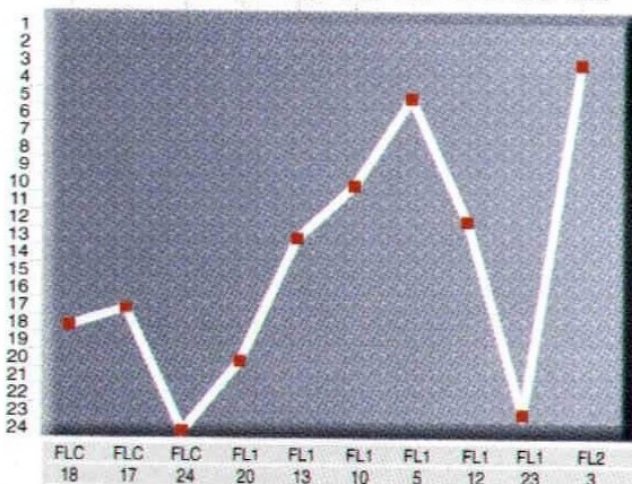

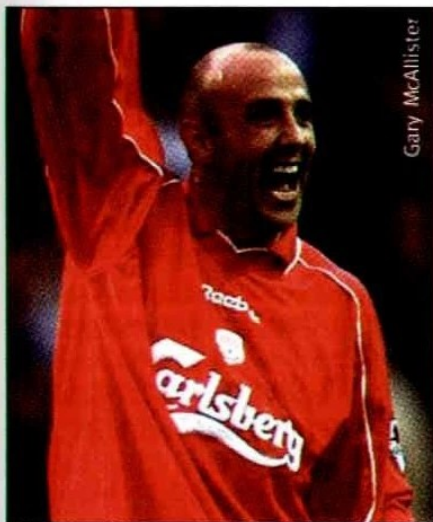

In other news, former Town player Craig Armstrong has rejoined **Cheltenham Town** following his January release from **Gillingham**, with manager Keith Downing citing the midfielder's great experience as a major asset in the club's fight against relegation. Armstrong is currently involved in a media battle with former boss Mark Stimson after he said that the new Gillingham boss was 'the worst man manager he had encountered in his career' - saying that Stimson hadn't spoken to him once after dropping him over Christmas. The former Stevenage manager replied angrily, saying,

"It will be interesting when he comes to pick his cheque up."

Brighton new boy Glenn Murray, signed from Rochdale for £300,000 in the transfer window, made an instant impact at the Withdean Stadium by scoring twice in their 3-0 victory over **Crewe Alexandra** but unselfishly credited his experienced strike-partner Nicky Forster as a major contributor.

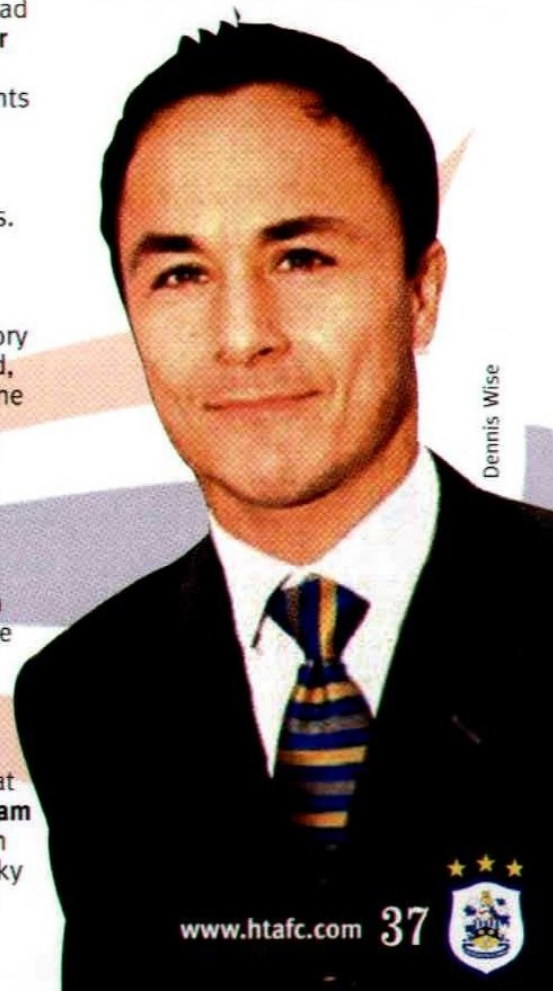

Finally, goals from substitutes Blair Sturrock and Adebayo Akinfenwa saw **Swindon** and **Northampton** share the spoils at the County Ground.

The 'Forgotten Men'

Alan Hodgson takes a look at some of the lesser known players that have contributed to Town's history over the years...

Jackie Slicer

Outside Left

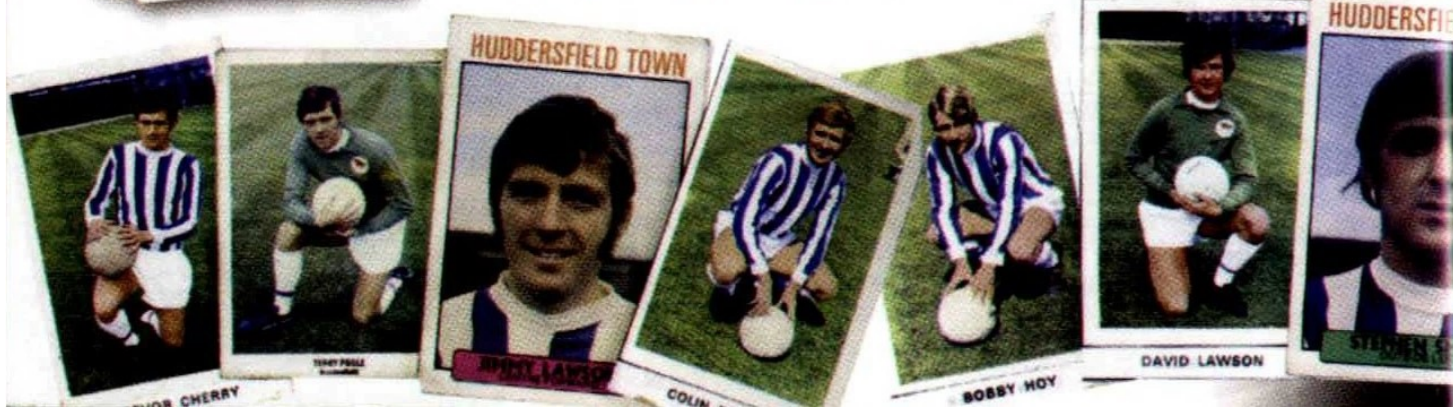
Born in Bramley in November 1902, John Slicer was attached to seven Football League clubs during his career and also three non-League sides. As a young man he started out with the Bullcroft Main Colliery team but was soon to join Doncaster Rovers in 1923. From there he moved to Chesterfield but having made no appearances at first team level with either club he is thought to have spent some time in the USA before returning to join Midland League side Mexborough Town. It was from here in March 1925 that he made the great leap to sign for Huddersfield Town who at that point were poised to win their second successive League Championship under the charismatic Herbert Chapman. That summer Chapman stunned the Club by leaving to manage Arsenal, and as Cecil Potter duly guided Town to their historic third title in a row Slicer watched from reserve team level. When he did finally get his first team chance it was under

new boss John Chaplin on 2nd October 1926, and he marked the occasion with two goals in a 5-3 home win over Leicester City. During the season he was to make seven appearances as Town finished runners-up in the top flight, his final game being a 0-0 home draw with Aston Villa on 7th May 1927. Two weeks later he was transferred to Norwich City where he was to miss only one game in the next three seasons (playing in 119 consecutive matches) before joining Luton Town in 1930. During 1932 he then moved to non-League side Ashton National but was tempted back by Third Division (North) side York City prior to ending his playing career with Bury in 1934/35. The much travelled 'Jackie' Slicer passed away in 1979.

Syd Rawlings

Outside Right

James Sydney Dean Rawlings was born in Wombwell in May 1913 and began his football career with Preston-based works team Dick, Kerr's. In March



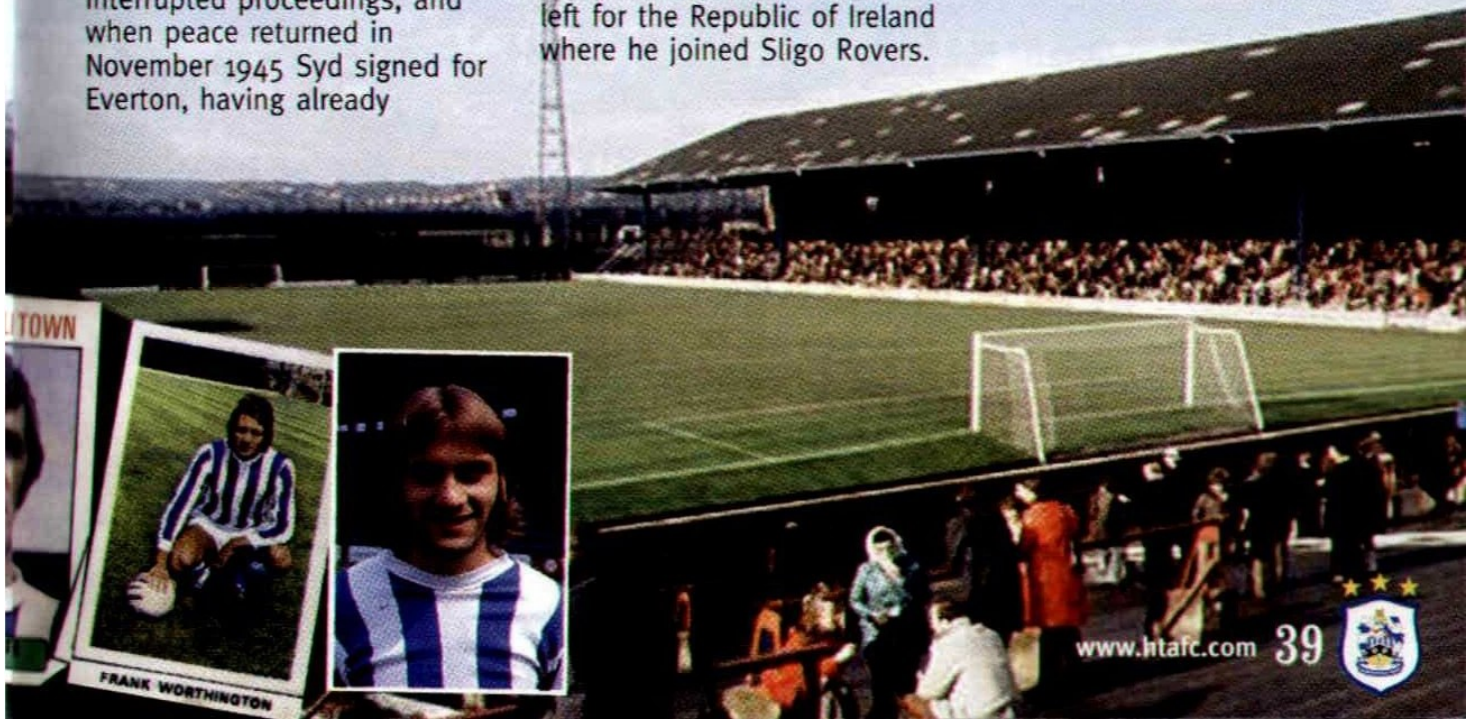
1932 he signed for Preston North End and played a dozen games for the Lancashire side before joining Town in February 1934. Syd made his debut a week later on 3rd March in a 3-1 home win over Wolves and kept his place for the following six games, scoring once in a 3-2 win at West Bromwich Albion. Town ended the season as First Division runners-up but with Charlie Luke and Jackie Williams the preferred right-wingers Rawlings was to make just four more starting line-ups. During 1934/35 he scored in an early season 2-4 defeat at Everton but his final first team outing was on Boxing Day 1934 in a 2-3 home defeat by Leicester City. The following March he was transferred to West Brom where he stayed until moving to Northampton Town in June 1936. A further move to Millwall followed in December 1937 and he helped the Lions to the Third Division (South) title that season. After 27 goals in 53 matches for Millwall the Second World War interrupted proceedings, and when peace returned in November 1945 Syd signed for Everton, having already

'guested' for them during Wartime League competitions. However, two months and two FA Cup ties later he surprisingly left for Plymouth Argyle where he eventually retired from the game in 1948. Syd Rawlings sadly passed away in 1956 aged only 43.

John Gilligan

Midfield

With just one brief appearance as a substitute to his name John Gilligan has one of the shortest Huddersfield 'careers' on record! Born in Abingdon in May 1957 he had signed pro forms with Swindon Town almost exactly a year before Huddersfield manager Tom Johnston took him on loan at Leeds Road, but after coming on for Franny Firth in a 1-2 defeat at Barnsley on 2nd October 1976, he returned to Swindon at the end of that month. In January the following year he was again loaned out by the Robins, this time to Northampton Town, but played just a handful of Third Division games for the soon to be relegated Cobblers. Gilligan then left for the Republic of Ireland where he joined Sligo Rovers.

Former Everton striker Paul Rideout had given the visitors an early 12th-minute lead, but the late strikes from the Town duo kept the promotion bandwagon on track.

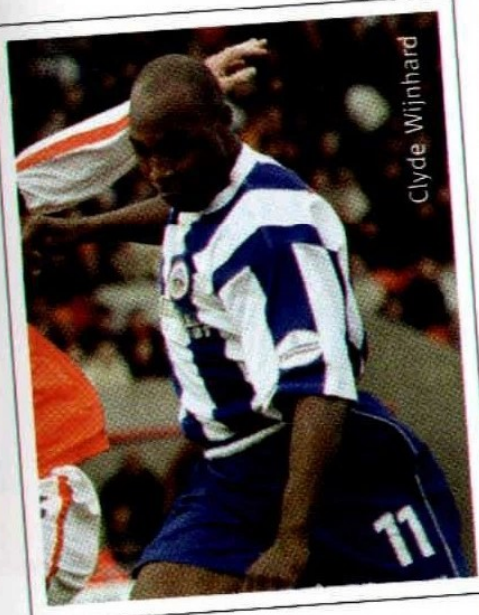

The win was a bonus for the Town boss after he had been forced into several changes due to injury and suspension; missing from the line-up were regulars Kenny Irons and Danny Schofield.

This game was Armstrong's last for Huddersfield as he traded the blue and white stripes of Town for those of Sheffield Wednesday – the Terriers netting £100,000 in the process.

Notable names in the visiting line-up included future Town defender Steve Yates and current Wigan midfielder Jason Koumas.

A Message from the Safety Officer

● Let me start by introducing myself. My name is John Robinson and I am the Safety Officer for Football at the ground. I am employed by KSDL to ensure that any football event we run at this ground is run safely. My colleague John Topham does the same for Rugby matches.

KSDL and HTAFC work closely together to try to make every football match we run down here as safe and entertaining as we can make it. Obviously, when running a football match we have to adhere to the relevant legislation. I am sure you all know we are frequently inspected by the Local Authority who issue the Safety Certificate for the stadium, without which we could not run the match, the Football Licensing Authority and the Football Association to make sure we are running events properly. So far, the result of those inspections has been very positive. That doesn't mean though that we can be complacent.

In recent weeks we have become aware of a deterioration in the behavior of a small minority of fans down at the stadium. Some fans have taken to standing persistently throughout the game and others refuse to heed the requests of stewards to stop smoking and continue to smoke when asked not to do so.

Others use foul and abusive language towards other fans and towards stewards. The stewards are here to do a job so please listen to them. Their job is to make the match as safe and comfortable as we can. Abusing them while they try to do so helps no one and can easily deter other fans from coming down again. Working with the club, we want to encourage a broader fan base down here and that includes families - the Fans for the Future. It helps no one when we receive complaints about the conduct of some fans that turns regular Season Ticket Holders and other loyal Town fans away from us. This means we lose loyal fans who we like to see down here. Surely no right minded Town fan wants that?

To help improve the atmosphere down here I would ask for your support. We accept that football is a passionate game and that everyone who is passionate about the game will stand at times of excitement. When we score a goal or have a near miss, when a player is sent off or we have a poor decision are all times when we expect the crowd to get behind Andy Ritchie and the team. We know many of you will want to sing to get behind the team. That's fine, but

please accept that standing persistently throughout the game not only stops other fans enjoying the game when they can't see but is also precisely the type of behaviour that could attract penalties from the football authorities. If a steward asks you to sit down, stop using bad language or to stop smoking he or she is only doing so for the best of reasons. They are asking to make sure that both you and your fellow fans around you enjoy the match safely and comfortably.

I have seen the letter sent by Sean Jarvis to fans in the ground today. We fully support the club in what they are doing. Hopefully it shows that both KSDL and HTAFC are working together to make the stadium a more exciting place to be.

Finally, I know that most fans act in a reasonable way and do enjoy the game. Please help us to make sure you continue to do so. I hope I have explained that we are trying to improve the atmosphere down here and to make it a more attractive place for younger fans and families to come to.

So from me, to you the fans, be loud and proud but please understand the difficulties we collectively face regarding safety etc.

Speaking of being loud and proud, the first couple of days at the club this week have been fantastic. I would like to take this opportunity to thank fans for their understanding and patience with us on issuing for Tickets for the Chelsea game. As I am sure you will appreciate it becomes a very difficult time for the ticket office when there is such a high demand in a short period of time. Combined with the Giants season which starts tomorrow - it can be quite hectic! However I would like to stress a massive thanks to all supporters who have been understanding of this situation.

For those that are travelling to Stamford Bridge, I would like to put out another plea - please wear something blue and white for the day. We are very keen, as we did two years ago, to let the Chelsea brigade know that the Terriers are in town and what better way than to wear your colours!

I briefly mentioned atmosphere above and the importance of it here at the stadium. To that effect I am currently creating a team of individuals who can help us improve the atmosphere at the stadium. To date I have spoken to our drummer Ian Drew, who incidentally doubles up in his spare time as a DJ, who has offered to help. 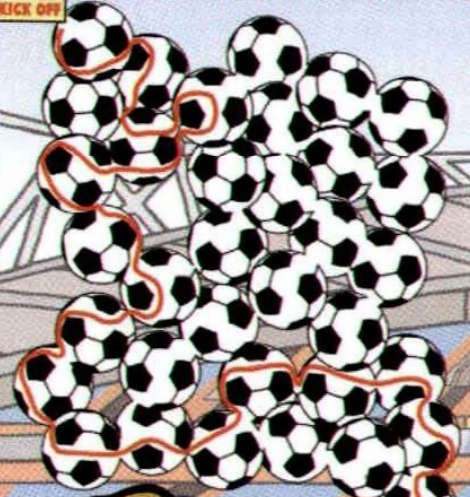

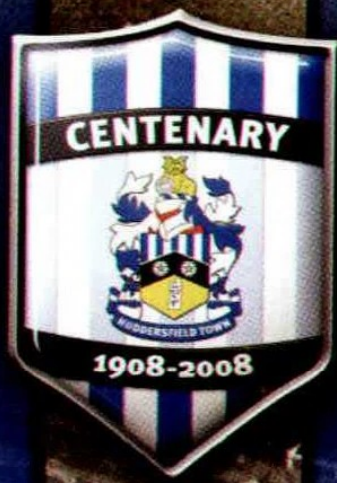

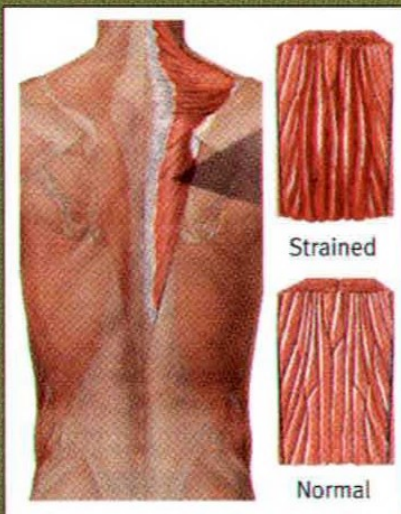

● The term 'muscle strain' often appears in the press when referring to the state of a player's injury. What exactly does this mean & what does it mean for the player?

Strains frequently occur in sports that require explosive muscular effort over a short period of time, like in football, other sports could include sprinting, jumping, basketball, rugby etc.

When the demand made on a muscle exceeds its strength a rupture may occur, for example when suddenly stopping, deceleration, or rapid acceleration or the combination of both when turning, cutting, jumping etc.

Strains often occur in muscles that move two joints eg. The hamstring muscles which flex the knee and extend the hip joint. These muscles cannot perform the two functions at the same time during running and are dependent on



neuromuscular feedback to avoid injury. Other susceptible muscles are the quadriceps muscle in the front of the thigh, the gastrocnemius muscle in the calf, & the biceps muscle in the upper arm.

Strains can be classified by the degree of rupture, first & second degree strains are partial ruptures, and third degree strains are complete ruptures.

First Degree

First degree or mild strain is an overstretching of the muscle with a rupture of less than 5% of the muscle fibers.

Second Degree

Second degree or moderate strain involves a more significant but less than complete tear of the muscle.

Third Degree

Third degree or severe strain involves complete disruption of the muscle.

Symptoms & diagnosis will be discussed in the next programme.

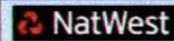

It's certainly not been dull following Huddersfield Town since the turn of the Millennium; from promotion hopefuls in what is now known as the Championship to near-extinction in the dark summer days of 2003 to the current steady progression and process of building as Andy Ritchie aims to take the Terriers back to the Promised Land.

One man who has seen it all from the inside is Town's long-serving Academy graduate Nathan Clarke. The 24-year-old centre-back made his first-team bow in September 2001 as a surprise selection in the 1-1 draw at Stoke City and his career since that point echoes the ups and downs of the club, with definite peaks and troughs along the way.

The highs have been notable - he was runner up in the prestigious 'Player of the Year' awards at the conclusion of the 2005/06 season and leading football magazine FourFourTwo has named him as one of the top 50 players outside the Premiership on two separate occasions.

However, it's not all been smooth for Nathan; he lost the majority of the 02/03 campaign with a knee problem and was forced to sit out the second-half of last term with a



similar issue. Despite these setbacks, he has now played in over 200 games for the Terriers alongside a vast array of defensive partners. You often hear about partnerships in football and the need to cultivate an understanding, be it between striking colleagues or centre-backs - but just how important is the relationship between you and your defensive partner? "I think it's most important that you have faith in the ability of your defensive partner," Nathan explained. "It just so happens that I've felt confident in every player that I have played alongside. I honestly believe that it boils down to whether you are good enough or not." All in all, 'Clarkey' has regularly played with around 13 different centre-backs in his seven years with the Terriers, but just what was it like playing alongside each one?

Kevin Gray

(July 1994 - July 2002)

"I learned a lot from Kevin. He was physically very strong and he was a physical player. He looked after me by sorting all the rough opponents out; he was probably the ideal partner for me to have when I broke onto the first-team scene. He talked me through everything and watched my back."

Adie Moses

(December 2000 - July 2003)

"Adie was good. He was a confident lad and he knew how to play at centre-back, even though he often featured at right-back too. He was just a good defender, but he came to the Club in a bit of a difficult period. Personally I had a bit of a bad year when he was here through injury."

Paul Scott

(August 1997 - August 2004)

"Even though 'Scotty' was a couple of years older than me when we came through the youth system, I knew him fairly well and we had played together a couple of times. I'd seen him around cleaning the boots too! I'm really happy to see him doing so well at Bury, because it must be hard when you leave the only Club you have known. He's established himself at Gigg Lane and it's no real surprise as he is a good player."

Nat Brown

(August 1998 - July 2005)

"I had to try and help Nat settle in a little as he was being converted from a striker to a centre-back by the manager, but he was always a good tackler and he was definitely built correctly - he was strong, physical and very obviously tall! He fitted into the role quite well, but sometimes he wanted a little bit too much time on the ball in the wrong areas. I think in all honesty he may have preferred it up front."

Eddie Youds

(July 2002 - June 2003)

"Eddie was brilliant with me, but I was in and out of the team quite a lot that season through injury. I trained a lot with him, but we didn't really play a lot together. He was a brilliant guy to have around though."

Ian Hughes

(July 2003 - June 2004)

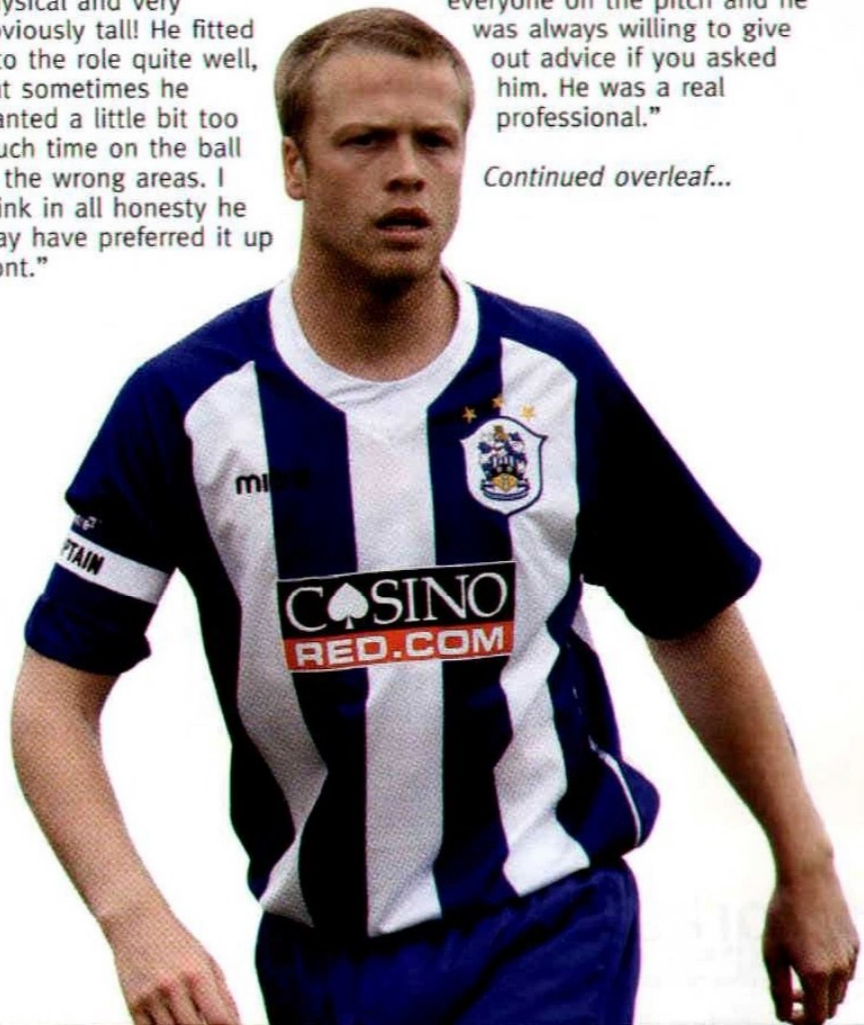
"I guess it's always been a help having an older head around and Ian has been around quite a bit. He wasn't with us for long, but he was nice to have around the Club."

Steve Yates

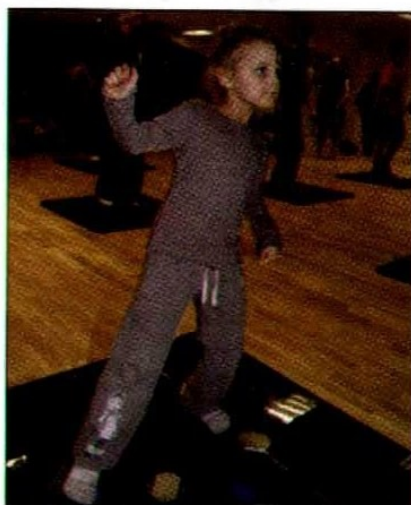
Robert Page (January 2008 to date)

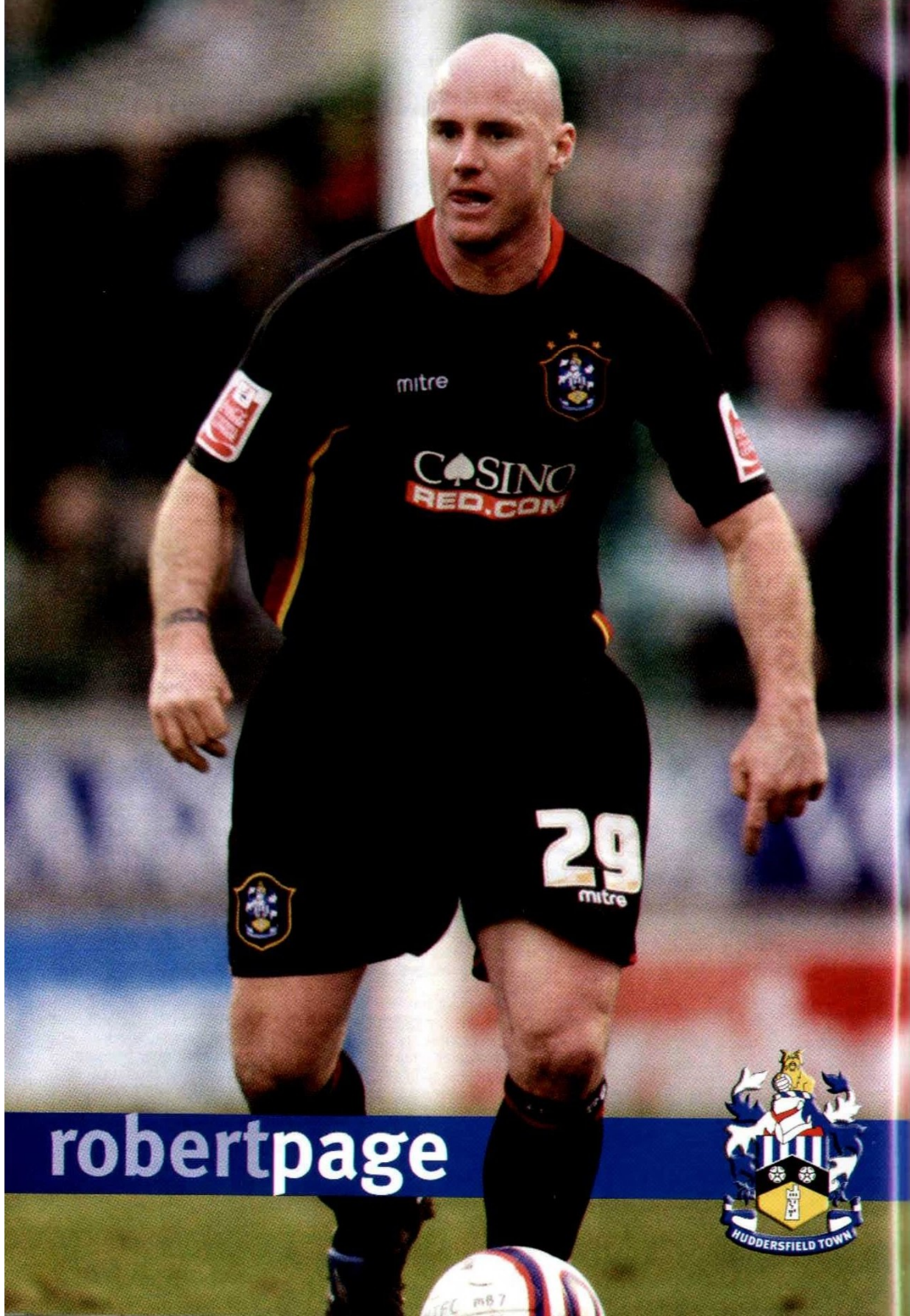

Carlisle United

● After last weekend's mammoth trip to Yeovil Town, the Terriers will be making a similarly long journey up the country to play an in-form Carlisle United side at Brunton Park on Tuesday evening.

The Cumbrians have changed their manager since the sides last met at the Galpharm Stadium back in August, with Neil McDonald leaving the club after apparently falling out with the Chairman. Former Cheltenham boss John Ward was a surprise choice to step into the managerial hot-seat in October but he has fared very well so far, guiding his side to 3rd in the League One ladder. Brunton Park has become a real fortress in recent times, with Carlisle recorded a record nine straight wins on home soil. Historically the Terriers have

struggled in matches there and you have to go back to 1984 for the last Town win in Cumbria, when a Mark Lillis goal gave Mick Buxton's side a 1-0 win in a Division Two game.

Somewhat ironically, their impressive home form is mirrored by their terrible away results. Ward's men have not picked up all three points away from home since a 1-0 win at Southend United in late October – another run of nine games! Given this fact, Ward will be keen for his side to continue picking up the points on home soil.

Ward's promotion campaign was boosted by an influx of real talent in the January transfer window. Veteran striker Scott Dobie added to Ward's striking option by joining the Club from Nottingham Forest and flying winger Cleveland Taylor signed

from Championship side Scunthorpe United. Young defender Evan Horwood also joined the Cumbrians from Sheffield United on a free transfer.

Former Town loanee Richard Keogh had impressed during a loan spell with Ward's side following the end of his temporary stay at the Galpharm earlier this season, but he has now returned to Bristol City. Preston midfielder Joe Anyinsah also ended his loan spell with the Club in early January. Former Blackburn Rovers trainee Joe Garner has impressed in his first full season as a Carlisle United player, netting 13 goals in all competitions. Although not physically the biggest or quickest, the 19-year old seems to have that happy knack of knowing where to be at what time; having said that, he has been greatly helped out by former Bradford City man Marc Bridge-Wilkinson, who leads the Cumbrians' assist chart this season having set up seven goals for his team-mates.
