Good afternoon and welcome to the Memorial Stadium, for our penultimate home game of the season, against Swindon Town.

We were disappointed not to take all three points against Gillingham on Saturday, as we set out to attack the game in a really positive manner and get a lot of men forward. That was the case for the first half an hour, as we started at a good tempo with some good attacking play.

Unfortunately, when the chances came, we couldn't take them and no matter what level you play at, when you are on top you need to score the goals that you deserve. That wasn't the case on Saturday, even though we started the game in a very encouraging way.

We conceded a soft goal, which meant we had to work hard to get back into the game in the second half, but the players showed a good mentality and a good spirit to be able to do that. Whilst it took a long time for the equaliser to arrive, courtesy of a great strike by Steve Elliott, we had two very good chances before his goal when we could have got back into the game.

Naturally, it was disappointing to draw another home game, even though we were delighted with some of our play. However we are very keen to end our

home games with two wins, as it's been a while since we won a league game here at the Memorial Stadium.

In fact, it's been an intriguing season at home. We started off badly, then went on a run of eleven league and cup games without defeat. However since our home game against Doncaster, on 4th March, we have been disappointing again, so we want to turn things around.

Our aim this week will be to win both remaining home fixtures, and we have a confidence we can do it, but we are going to need a good spirit about us. Sometimes we can't produce the football we would like to on the pitch, but the players are still showing a hunger and desire to win games, and that must continue.

We are looking to next season, and the formation changes that we have put in place have freshened us up and made us look more of a threat, which has been pleasing, and that will continue toward the end of the season.

People have said that we've played 4-4-2 for years, which is true in a defensive sense, but when we've attacked we have always done so with a fluidity about us and with people coming off the shape from wide areas. We'll continue that over the last few games, as we would like wins to improve our league position and to move up to where we feel we should be in the table.

With next season in mind, we have had some younger players on the bench including Charlie Clough last Saturday. We may see him in action before the end of the season, and we may see one or two others, though as I've previously said, it's about getting the balance right.

We are in a position where we can experiment, but we are also in a position where we are still looking up the table and we want to overtake a few teams, but whatever happens we want to make

sure we finish strongly.

The average age of our squad, in recent weeks, has been pretty low and that's something Lennie and I addressed when we first came together. We had a very young bench on Saturday, and a few young boys in the starting eleven, which bodes well for the future.

We have had a few tough games at Swindon in the last couple of years, and have come away from the County Ground disappointed at having lost when we felt we deserved better. The game there earlier this season was spoilt by four sendings off, which made it a bit of a farce in the end. It's a local derby, though, and under lights at the Mem, so we are definitely looking forward to it.

We need three points to push us up the table again, and we need the support of the fans just as much as we have in recent weeks The home record has been average, at best, but the support has been better than that so we want to make sure we finish on a high to ensure that we give them something to cheer about, and make sure the last few games here are enjoyed by everyone.

Swindon enjoyed a very good result on Saturday, scoring six goals against Port Vale without reply. Scoring six goals in any game, whatever the opposition, is a good achievement and we have to be wary because they have some good attacking players capable of scoring goals.

Our own form has been alright, without being brilliant, but we'll be confident that this is a game we can win. Both teams are in a safe position, looking upwards, and looking to finish the season strongly and while you could make quite a few comparisons between two teams promoted last season, it would be nice for us to finish above them.

I hope that you all enjoy the game.

Accompanied by two bottles of bubbly, courtesy of the sponsors who named him man of the Match last Saturday, defender Steve Elliott arrived at the post match press conference to describe his wonder goal six minutes from time.

His stunning left foot volley earned Rovers a point, and whilst confirming League One status for next season, the goal pushed the visitors nearer to relegation to League Two.

He described his fourth goal of the season as his best ever.

It's definitely the best goal of my career, as I hit it so well. It came after a long ball forward but Josh Klein-Davies went for it and went down. I thought the referee had given a foul, so I was quite relaxed and hit it. The moment I made contact, I knew it was going in and I think I was already off celebrating before it crossed the line!

Described by many observers as the goal of the season, that accolade probably still stays with Rickie Lambert, for his strike at Luton earlier in the season, and Steve agreed.

I think Rickie's goal is still the best, as his strike came as the ball dropped from a height and he showed great technique to volley it into the net

Saturday's goal came at the end of a frustrating afternoon for Rovers. Having created a number of chances in the opening half an hour, a combination of near misses and good goalkeeping prevented them from taking the lead and they fell behind seven minutes before half time when John Nutter scored with a

close range header.

I think we deserved a point, as we created a few chances in the first half but couldn't take them. Then we got a little bit sloppy and conceded what was a poor goal from our point of view and had to dig in again.

In the end, I think a point was a good result. I know we should be beating teams at the foot of the table, and that's no disrespect to Gillingham, but we are mathematically safe now so, in the grand scheme of things, it was a good point.

Two more home games this week, against Swindon tonight and Brighton on Saturday provides an opportunity to improve the record of only five wins at the Memorial Stadium this season. The ten draws on home territory go a long way to explaining why we are not challenging further up the table.

I think that five wins and far too many draws tells its own story. It's all very well drawing, but you may as well win a few more and lose a few more and gain more points that way. To be perfectly honest, those drawn games at the Memorial Stadium have hindered our play off chances, so we'll be looking to win the last few games and push on.

We have two decent games to complete our home fixtures and will have to be on our mettle for the game against Swindon where there is a little bit of local pride at stake, so we will be going all out to win and put in a good performance.

Having missed ten weeks of the season with a knee injury, he's pleased to be ending the campaign back in the side, so to walk off with three Man of the Match awards on Saturday made for a good afternoon's work.

We didn't play particularly well and could have done a lot better, but on a personal note I was very pleased with my goal and the fact that we gained the point required to make us safe. It's just great to be back in the side, and to score a goal like that today topped everything off and made it a great day for me.

Brought a touch of class to the Memorial Stadium. Scored 14 goals from midfield, created many, many more, and kept the crowd entertained with his flair and style. Ryan Williams: The diminutive winger gave the team much needed width and would create plenty of attacking chances for those around him.

Vitalijs Astafjevs: The Latvian was an accomplished midfielder, capable of changing a game at the blink of an eye. His pinpoint passes and strong shots will live long in the memory of all who watched him play.

■ RIGHT MIDFIELD: Jamie Cureton: See below; Jamie received a number of nominations for the right midfield birth from people who wanted to find him a place in their team.

Vitalijs Astafjevs: He was nominated in a number of positions, as it seems people are desperate to get him in the team somewhere.

Mark Walters: Like Vitalijs, Wally's attacking qualities got him a vote in more than one position.

CENTRAL MIDFIELD: (any two from six): Ian Holloway: Ollie will always be known in Bristol for his spirit and determination, whether as a player or a manager.

Jamie Shore: It was clear to all who saw him play that he exuded natural talent and great vision, but unfortunately a knee injury proved too much to shake off. Gary Penrice: His personality and eye for goal made him popular on the terraces, and fans were happy to see him return to Bristol in 1997 to link up again with his best mate Ollie.

Craig Disley: His work rate in midfield has earned him many fans, and this year his nine goals from midfield have helped to relieve the pressure on our strikers.

Stuart Campbell: When he was handed the captain's armband Campbell became a totally new player. Able to control the

midfield and deliver a beautiful corner kick. Vitalijs Astafjevs: Let another nomination for the versatile Latvian.

STRIKERS: (any two from six):

Nathan Ellington: The free scoring striker regularly wowed crowds both home and away, most notably with his hat trick against Derby in the FA Cup in 2002. He had speed, strength and skill in equal measures.


Jason Roberts: At a time when Rovers were churning out quality strikers like there was no tomorrow, Jase was one of the best. Scoring 38 goals in just two years, he made a massive impact on the club. Richard Walker: Became a goal hero during our promotion season, as he scored a number of crucial goals, including two wonderful strikers at Wembley to see us lift the play off trophy.

Barry Hayles: Scored 32 goals for Rovers in just 62 appearances. Strong and tough, Barry had a fighting spirit which could always be relied upon when the chips were down.

Jamie Cureton: Could always be relied upon to score a goal. Born in Bristol, he spent four seasons with Rovers before heading across to Reading

Rickie Lambert: His goal at Hartlepool pushed us into the play offs on the final day of last season and his strike that put City out of the Johnstone's Paint Trophy cemented his place in Rovers folklore.





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The win that all but secured League One status finally arrived, at Walsall, last Tuesday after a winless run of eleven games.

The scenes of celebrations on the pitch afterwards weren't simply relief at having gained the three points, but at the manner in which victory was achieved.

Yet again it was another outstanding performance on the road and those supporters who follow Rovers around the country have certainly witnessed some excellent performances this season, along with seven wins.

Goalkeeper Steve Phillips kept his fifteenth clean sheet of the campaign at the Bank's Stadium and hinted, in his post match interview, was already looking ahead to next season, suggesting that the best was yet to come from this side.

Fifteen clean sheets this season isn't good enough on the back of last year, and I think I certainly need to set my standards higher than that

However to come up a division on the back of such a good season, with few additions to the squad, and do so well is an indication of how good we can be and tonight, for example, I thought the lads were absolutely awesome.

That performance shows what we are capable of on a good pitch. I know everyone goes on about the playing surface at the Memorial Stadium, but it's there for all to see that we do play better on a better pitch and our style of play is obvious.

We don't try to lump it forward, we play it the right way, and our players are suited to play it in the right way. The pitch tonight suited us as the rain on the top surface meant that we could zing it about and a three or four goal winning margin wouldn't have flattered us tonight.

Steve looks ahead

Whilst it was an important result, he refuted suggestions that Rovers had been in a relegation fight.

Of course the win was important, every win is, but I think everyone associated with the playing side here is a little bit frustrated at people even mentioning relegation because we are a far better team than our league position suggests. I think we proved that tonight, though we do need to score more goals. That's been a big gripe this season and probably was last season, in all fairness.

The lads get chances and if we want to get out of the league, or extend our season via the play offs, then we need to start sticking the ball in the net more often or it won't happen, it's as simple as that.

This league is a lot better than League Two and if teams were creating the number of chances that we do, then ninety nine times out of a hundred, they are going to stick them away and it's also something we need to do.

Whilst the whole team played well, he had special words of praise for the defenders in front of him.

I think our defence deserve special praise tonight, because they were awesome. To be honest, though, I thought the whole team was superb. That game was us in a nutshell and we'll go back down the M5 and be pleased with ourselves, as we've gone up a place in the table and be looking at a mid table finish.

Even though we were all really pleased with our performance, we were saying afterwards that we still need to put our chances away. Our defending was superb, as was our counter attacking, against a side that are seventh in the table and there for a reason.

I thought we thoroughly deserved the win, although we could have won by a bigger margin. All of our play was fantastic, but if Walsall had scored with a couple of minutes to go, then we would have been very frustrated. That's happened to us a few times this season, with the game at Cheltenham being a prime example of how we have dominated teams but either lost or drawn. We need to transform situations like that into wins next season because if we can, then we will enjoy a very, very good campaign.

Rovers returned from Huish Park with a hard earned point under their belts following this goalless draw.

They adapted to the atrocious conditions far better than their hosts and were unfortunate not to take all three points, and were twice denied a goal by good saves from Begovic.

The first chance of the afternoon came after 12 minutes when Lambert's downward header, from Campbell's free kick, was comfortably saved by Begovic. Two minutes later another Lambert header, from Campbell's corner, was cleared as far as Hinton, whose shot drifted well wide of the target.

New signing Andrews saw his debut curtailed after just 17 minutes when he was stretchered off following a challenge by Skiverton.

The Yeovil skipper, then had his side's first goalscoring opportunity, but headed over following a corner on the left, while at the other end Coles ballooned a left foot shot high over the bar.

Skiverton's acrobatic overhead cross was punched clear by Phillips, but Rovers regained the upper hand and put the home defence under pressure late in the half, forcing three corners in quick succession. From the second of those, Lambert powered a header towards goal only to see Begovic touch the ball over the bar

The first chance of the second half fell to Rovers but Elliott's 25 yard free kick cannoned into the Yeovil defensive wall. The home side then squandered a good opportunity when Owusu broke clear but opted to shoot when he had time to take the ball on and his long range effort was well wide of the target.

Lines went close when he ran on to Lambert's through ball, only for Begovic to make an unorthodox save with his legs.

With three minutes left

on the clock the keeper again came to his side's rescue when he touched a free kick from Campbell over the bar. Lines then had a shot blocked when the resulting corner was cleared to him on the edge of the box.

Lines then played in Klein-Davies, who saw his shot drift just wide of the target and the striker then hit a shot straight at Lee-Barrett, while at the other end Hinton blocked a shot from Boland and Porter hit the loose ball wide of the upright.

Lambert headed straight at Lee-Barrett when well placed and the keeper kept out another effort from the same player with a fine save.

The visitors threatened in the final minute of the half and Phillips saved well from Foley and Nelson hit a shot high over the bar.

The game didn't improve after the break, though Boland saw a shot blocked and another effort from Monkhouse was comfortably saved by Phillips.

Lines and Klein-Davies just failed to get on the end of a couple of decent crosses from Pipe before Phillips was called into action again, making saves from Foley and Monkhouse.

Substitute Williams drew a good save from Lee-Barrett, who kept out the striker's low drive, while Monkhouse hit two chances over the bar at the other end and before the ninety minutes were up another effort, from Humphries, met the same



English FA Tour to the West Indies, 1955

It's now 53 years since Geoff Bradford, Rovers talented goalscorer, was selected by the English Football Association for their tour to the West Indies.

The tour party was made up of fifteen professionals and two amateurs, and the trip was a reciprocal one as the Trinidad FA had visited England in 1953.

Apparently the FA Selection Committee had considered a remarkable number of players for the tour, including 14 goalkeepers, 39 full backs, 66 half backs and 97 forwards before finalising their squad.

(Southampton) Bedford Jezzard & Bobby Robson (Fulham) Gordon Nutt (Cardiff) and Stan Pearson (Bury).

The party assembled at Lancaster Court Hotel in central London on Monday, 9th May 1955 and left that evening flying out to Bermuda.

The first match, against a Bermuda XI, was played in a temperature of 80 degrees (27c) on the Prospect Field. Fulham's Bedford Jezzard astounded the home side with his powerful shooting, scoring four times, while Bradford contributed two goals in an emphatic 11-1 victory.

A much changed Bermuda side were hammered 14-1 in the following match, and that despite the home goalkeeper performing heroics. Both Bermuda goals in those first two matches were own goals, scored by Owen and Langley.



the hospitality and the sightseeing.

In the first of three matches against Jamaica in five days, the tourists ran out 7-0 victors on two occasions and also registered a 4-2 victory in a more competitive game, when the two home goals were greeted with much delight from the crowd. Bradford scored in all three games, and netted two superb hat tricks

A short flight to Trinidad followed, where the matches were played on cricket grounds –three of which took place at the Queens Park Oval in Trinidad. The first, against North Trinidad, was the hardest of the tour and Jezzard scored the only goal of the game eight minutes from time.

The highest crowd to witness a tour match, 16,000, were in attendance for the next match and they saw the touring side put on a superb display, scoring six goals without reply.

Bradford scored a first minute goal in the next game and bagged another hat trick. Then followed a two hour flight to

Curacao, for the final two matches. The final game was played under floodlights and concluded the successful tour.

The touring party also had time to watch a day of the final test cricket match between the West Indies and Australia in Kingston on their way home. The eleven match tour, which lasted a month, resulted in nine wins and two draws. Sixty nine goals were scored by the tourists and just eight conceded. The performance of Rovers' Geoff Bradford was certainly noted by the management team on the tour as within four months he was selected for the full England International team and won his solitary cap in the 5-1 victory in Copenhagen against Denmark.

Geoff scored one of the goals in that game, and despite being told by England manager Walter Winterbottom that he would play in the next International against Wales he was never selected again, to his extreme disappointment.

FROM THE CHAIR

I knew it would happen when I had a 'bit of a go' at the team following the defeat at Bournemouth that made it eleven games without a win; an excellent performance and all three points at promotion chasing Walsall!

Rovers were clearly the better side in an exciting game of attacking football that was very reminiscent of last season's League Two encounter at the Bescot Stadium both in terms of weather and performance and it virtually assured our safety in the higher division. Hopefully survival was completely guaranteed with a home win over struggling Gillingham last Saturday.

Tonight we should be presenting the Football Club with a cheque for £55,000. which has come out of the Supporters Club's general fund in much the same way as we used to do on a regular basis before we took over all the ticket sales and club merchandising, the profits from which we hand over internally. Whilst the Share Scheme is not involved in this particular piece of funding the Football Club has agreed to provide us, in return, with shares equivalent to those we have been purchasing from the scheme. This, we hope, will give us a boost towards reaching our target of £750,000 invested by the Share Scheme into the Football Club before the scheme expires in December. What a fantastic achievement that will be for the scheme devised by Steve Burns six years ago when the team was in the basement division and in severe danger of dropping out of the League altogether. How much better things are today with Rovers cementing promotion to League One and about to



embark on the building of a brand new state of the art stadium in just a couple of months! Whilst the Share Scheme has been a fantastic success, so too has another of Steve's ideas, albeit involving lesser sums of money but which has been vital in providing improved facilities here at what we can easily forget was a very basic old style rugby ground when Rovers moved in! I am referring of course to the 50/50 Draw, which was set up to help fund whatever needed to be upgraded for the benefit of our long suffering supporters. Such things as covering the rainswept Clubhouse Terrace and Family Enclosure, the superb new floodlights, (remember how gloomy it was here before!), improving the always troublesome public address system etc etc. In a way the 50/50 Draw reaches a natural conclusion before the Share Scheme as, from the end of this season, there should be no longer be any need for us to help pay for improvements to facilities. For the next two seasons our temporary landlords, wherever they may be, will automatically be providing the facilities and when we move back to Horfield there should of course be no need to make any improvements! The Executive Committee has backed my idea that we do however continue with the 50/50 Draw, which has become so popular with fans over the last decade or so. What we want to do is to use the draw to provide additional funding for the Rovers' Youth Scheme

Tonight's clash will now certainly lack the intensity of last season's dramatic home win in the corresponding fixture that was settled by as fine a goal as you

could see anywhere in the Premier League. However, the honour of 'Best in the West' will likely fall on the victors tonight so get behind those boys in bluel







There is a good seafaring connection between the navy and our history as the Pirates, and we enjoyed having several members of the crew as our guests.





In Rovers case, 1952/53 was the season to remember as Geoff Bradford scored 33 of the club's league goals, as promotion was achieved for the very first time.


Swindon's records had stood for far longer, 1926/27 to be precise, when Harry Morris scored 47 of his side's 100 league goals

The only other mentions for Second Division Swindon and Third Division Rovers came in the list of recent transfers, where we learn that the Wiltshire club had signed Mick McGovern from QPR and Charlie Tusan from Crusaders, while goalkeeper Jim Ladie had moved to Rovers from Cardifl

Bert Hoyle


Born on this day

Born in the small Yorkshire town of Baildon on this day in 1920, Herbert Hoyle was always a goalkeeper.

6' 3", with huge hands and broad shoulders, he cut an imposing figure between the posts. Despite spending three pre war seasons with Bradford Park Avenue, Bert did not break into league football until 1946. By then, he had spent many years playing services football in Italy, Yugoslavia and Greece, appearing regularly for the Combined Services team. This side could select the likes of Len Shackleton, Raich Carter, Stanley Matthews, Tom Finney and Tommy Lawton and played at top venues across Europe. He became good friends with the Wolves player Stan Cullis and played for the Stan Cullis XI against England in Naples where, injured after only 25 minutes, he was substituted by the England goalkeeper Frank Swift.

Hoyle signed for Wolves in May 1946, where he briefly shared a house with Billy Wright, and for Exeter City three months later. That breakthrough into league football came with the Grecians, for whom he appeared in the first post war league game, a Third Division (South) encounter with local rivals Torquay United, which ended in a 1-1 draw. Although he shared goalkeeping duties with a fellow former Wolves keeper, Barney Singleton, Hoyle appeared in 82 league games for Exeter in four seasons, including both matches against Rovers in the 1948/49 season. The meagre income from immediate post war professional football was supplemented by summer work at local farms. On 10th May 1950, Hoyle signed for Bristol Rovers in a deal worth E350, as manager Bert Tann's first signing, earning the club's top wage of £16 per week. He made his debut for the side on the opening day of the season, as a Vic Lambden goal earned a 1-0 victory at home to Swindon Town. During his first

year with Rovers, he appeared in all 58 first class matches, as Rovers finished sixth in Division Three (South) and reached the quarter finals of the FA Cup for the first time

in the club's history. In February 1951, Hoyle kept a clean sheet at St James' Park as Rovers ground out a goalless draw to earn a replay where, beaten by a cruel deflection, the Third Division club lost to the eventual winners. Newcastle United. The 1952/53 season brought even greater success and Hoyle played in the opening 29 league games as Rovers lost only twice. Indeed, a club record run of twelve consecutive victories around Christmas included a 7-0 win against Brighton. Goals conceded were few and far between – by February the club had scored 67 goals and conceded only 24. He appeared in a total of 105 Third Division (South) matches for Rovers. Hoyle was an extrovert on and off the field and his confidence and assertiveness in the penalty area were crucial to Rovers' success.

On his way home to Dawlish, following a goalless draw with Bristol City at Ashton Gate in February 1953, Hoyle was involved in a car crash that ended his professional career. The only consolation to him was that he had already played in enough fixtures to win a Third Division (South) championship medal once Rovers had secured the title with a 3-2 win against Newport County in April. Bert retired officially at the season's end and appeared briefly for Exmouth Town from August 1953 before running the Ship Inn at Cockwood, near Starcross. Devon for many years. The open house policy there enabled generations of Rovers fans to meet the amiable goalkeeper who spent hours regaling his visitors with detailed tales of his years in football. Bert enjoyed nothing less than sharing his experiences with fans old and young. The day to day running of the pub was later taken over by relatives and the pub was sold in June 1994 but, by then, many eager visitors had been able to meet a charming and engaging man and relive the halcyon days when Rovers reached the quarter finals of the cup and gained promotion to Division Two. In a careless moment, he had once admitted his love of oranges and soon Bert Hoyle's Eastville goalmouth was regularly carpeted with fruit every home game. Not that he minded, for the genial goalkeeper. who died in Dawlish on 5th July 2003, was first and foremost a lover of people and would gladly spend every moment talking with the loyal fan base gathered behind the celebrated banana shaped flower beds at the Tote End or Muller End.

Older supporters may remember the 1986/87 season as one in which Rovers came perilously close to sinking for the first time into the uncharted waters of the fourth tier of English football.

It was the first campaign at Twerton Park following the enforced departure from Eastville and Rovers were in freefall towards the relegation trapdoor. After 22nd April, the side incredibly still had eleven League games to play, eight of these at home; four of those home matches were lost and Rovers ultimately survived relegation courtesy of Phil Purnell's final day goal at Newport County. Lying in 21st place in Division Three after a 2-0 defeat at Bournemouth, Rovers were in dire need of points and a pitifully low crowd of 2,435 at Twerton Park saw Jeff Meacham and Kenny Hibbitt return to the side in place of lain Alexander and David Rushbury; Nicky Tanner, a future Liverpool player, and Geoff Twentyman, now a well known voice on local radio, were both in the Rovers

line up. Carlisle were unchanged following their single goal home defeat to Middlesbrough, meaning that Wes Saunders and the former Everton pair of Billy Wright and lan Bishop all played. Two goals in each half saw Rovers through to a comfortable victory, Meacham scoring the first, Gary Penrice adding one in each half and Purnell also finding his way onto the scoresheet. For Carlisle, this represented the third in a run of seven consecutive League defeats that led to relegation, Rovers surviving with \$1 points.

On the same day, our visitors Swindon Town defeated Darlington 1-0 at home in the same division. Having beaten Rovers 4-3 eleven days earlier, in a game played at Ashton Gate, the Robins won through a second half David Hockaday goal before a crowd of 7.740. Leigh Barnard and the former Rovers striker Steve White returned to the side, with Peter Coyne and Chris Ramsey making way, whilst Darlington recalled Gary Whetter and Gary Hinchley for the missing Chris Evans and Stewart Ferebee. Darlington were also relegated, whilst Swindon, thanks to a brace of White goals against Gillingham past goalkeeper Phil Kite, were promoted via the play offs.



Landlords and The Blues

Good evening and welcome back again as we set in place the final blocks of the season in our penultimate game against Swindon Town and, subject to the official announcement, the Memorial Stadium as it stands today!

Our visitors this evening have made the short trip along the M4 to fulfil a fixture originally scheduled for earlier in the season but cancelled due to our hugely successful FA Cup run.

An interesting evening lies ahead as both teams are closely matched in the league. Add to that the extra spice and intrigue which is thrown into the melting pot with the possibility of the County Ground being considered as an alternative home venue for us during the redevelopment of the Mem.

Just 39.9 miles separates the home of Bristol Rovers and the home of Swindon Town, but what do we know about the 'other' Robins from our league?

Starting with the all important football facts we have faced them 83 times, excluding friendly games, since season 1920/21 and have won 29, lost 36 and drawn 13 in the league, whilst in the cups we have lost two and won one in the FA Cup and won one and lost one in the League Cup.

In the transfer markets a fee of £1.5m was received for Kevin Horlock from Man City in January 1997, and a record £800k was paid for Joey Beauchamp to West Ham in August 1994. Past glories include one season in the Premier League during 1993/94, having conceded the third highest number of goals to date, a record

that now belongs to Derby. The League Cup was won in 1969, by defeating Arsenal 3-1 after extra time and there is an important connection between the clubs in that John Trollope, father of Paul, holds the record for the number of league appearances for one club (770) and was also manager of Swindon between November 1980 and March 1983.

Other interesting facts about Swindon show that it was a small market town, mainly for barter trade, until the mid 1800's. The industrial revolution was responsible for an acceleration of Swindon's growth. The construction of the Wilts and Berks Canal in 1810, and the North Wilts canal in 1819, was at the heart of this growth as the canals brought trade to the area and the population started to grow.

In 1840, Isambard Kingdom Brunel chose Swindon as the site for the railway works he planned for the Great Western Railway, which were completed in 1842. During the first half of the 20th century the railway works was the town's largest employer, and one of the biggest in the country, employing more than 14,500 workers. The works' decline started in 1960, and the Evening Star was the last steam engine to be built in the UK. Rolling stock maintenance for British Rail was the focus after the loss of its loco building role. In the late 1970's, much of the works closed, and the rest followed in 1986. These days the towns major employers include the Honda car production plant at South Marston, BMW/Mini in Stratton, mobile phone company Motorola, and retailer W H Smith, with its distribution centre

and headquarters.

From the world of music, Swindon has spawned XTC, Justin Hayward of the Moody Blues, Gilbert O Sullivan, and Jamie Cullum who, although born in Essex, was raised near the Town. TV/Cinema and radio celebrities include. Diana Dors. Billie Piper, Melinda Messenger and Mark Lamarr, host of the quiz show 'Never Mind the Buzzcocks'. Finally, other citizens and former residents of the SN postcode include jockey John Francombe, explorer David Hempleman-Adams and golfer David Howell.

I cannot finish this piece on Swindon without mentioning the infamous road traffic roundabout known as the 'Magic Roundabout' at the junction of five roads including Drove Road, Queens Drive and Fleming Way. It is near the County Ground. The official name used to be County Islands but the name was changed in the late 1990's to match its popular name. It was also the inspiration behind the subject of the song 'English Roundabout' by local band XTC from the album English Settlement.

Last Tuesday's superb win at Walsall not only ended Paul Trollope's worst run without a victory since taking over as Rovers coach, but it also removed lingering fears of relegation for all but the most manic of depressives.

Rickie Lambert's 18th goal of a very productive season, and his 20th in the League since joining from Rochdale, earned Rovers a precious three points to dispel the awful prospect of Gillingham moving to within two points of us at the Mem three days ago.

After all the talk of a play off challenge, buoyed by the luxury of several games in hand, the stark reality of a nervous finish had emerged. Yet Rovers' first victory over Walsall since Peter Beadle's winner at the Bescot on Boxing Day 1997 meant that we could all breathe the spring air a little more easily.

Defeat at Bournemouth had sealed Rovers' tenth league game without a win, which was the first time we had all endured such a sequence since the hapless team Phil Bater inherited from Ray Graydon spiralled towards the Conference four years ago. Two years earlier, Garry Thompson's side played eleven matches without tasting victory, when the only saving grace was the fact that it was the last year only one team was relegated from the Football League, and Halifax Town obliged by being beyond useless.

Yet to compare the current side with those teams is grossly unfair. Not only are Rovers playing in a superior level of football, but some of their performances within those ten games were really encouraging, with two in particular catching the eye. Few teams have come away from Swansea with anything other than a sound beating, and despite the fall from grace of the former European Champions, a point at the City Ground is still a noteworthy result. The problem was that despite such a considerable effort, the total points haul from those fine displays was a mere two, and while Rovers could not add to their paltry total of five home victories, mid table security remained a long way off.

If someone had said to me at the start of the season that Rovers would win seven away games in the League - and with one more trip to come at plummeting Orient, it could yet be eight - I would have expected a play off challenge at least. That haul is one more than that of second placed Carlisle, and the same total as Rovers managed a year ago. However, while Rovers were very solid and consistent at home last season, form at the Mem has been patchy at best this time around, with no wins until late November, too many draws and more defeats than victories. We all know that the pitch is a huge contributory factor in this, and can only hope that wherever we play next season there is more grass, less mud or bare soil, fewer bobbles and a better chance for our team to play its football.

I am writing this article the morning after the win at Walsall, a victory that was made all the sweeter by two other away successes in the Championship.

Best in the West

Two of Bristol City's misfiring, erratic and downright depressing promotion rivals finally managed to win at the same time, which had seemed about as likely as Heathrow's Terminal 5 winning an award for 'best baggage handling of the year'. West Brom's Black Country derby victory at Molineux, coupled with Hull's resounding victory at Barnsley, has at last appeared to punish City for a run of seven points from an available 24, a sequence which, even in this most crazy of divisions, is hardly worthy of a team bound for the Premier League.

It's not entirely that I am bitter and twisted about City, it's just that I want Rovers to be competing with them again, and with our own team now doing so much better, the last thing we want is for them to be in the Premier League.

Yes, yes, it would be a laugh seeing them get hammered every week, and perhaps even challenge Derby for the title of the worst ever team in that division, but with earning potential of up to £50m, if spent wisely it could take us years for us to be even close to them again. It's only eight years since we finished above City, and I don't want it to be another eight before we get the chance to put one over on them. That's the trouble with having two teams in the same town: whatever you do, you're always judged in relation to the other lot. Harsh, perhaps, but unavoidable.

One thing is for sure. The only thing we can affect is our own league position, and that will be improved tonight with victory over Swindon Town. City may be beyond us for the moment, but there is every chance that Rovers could finish the season as the West Country's top team in League One, and after years of looking up to Torquay. Exeter, Yeovil and Cheltenham - let alone the Moonrakers — that would be an achievement in itself.

A life-changing experience!

With just one more home league game to play at the Memorial Stadium before we move away for the redevelopment, it is hard not to feel like we are coming to the end of an era.

I have only been a full time Rovers fan for the last 10 years, as growing up I was led to believe that football was the domain of horrible, smelly boys. At 15 I became curious and decided to check it out for myself, and the rest, as they say, is history.

Because of my relatively short time as a member of the Rovers family, the Memorial Stadium is the only home I have ever really known. And it is for that reason that there will probably be a tear in my eye when I say goodbye at Saturday's game.

Despite its ramshackle appearance and rather outdated facilities, the Mem will always hold a special place in my heart, as the place I started the greatest love affair of my life. I started out on the Blacktorn End as a rowdy teenager and enjoyed the boisterous atmosphere and camaraderie of the terraces. As I became more dedicated. I would regularly turn up to matches on my own, and not bat an eyelid as the rain lashed down - of course this was in the days before the Raise the Roof campaign covered the home end. After three years of following the boys I took the bold - some would say foolish step of getting a Rovers tattoo on my ankle, so it is a good job I plan to be Rovers til I die!

Football became my favourite topic of conversation and it wasn't long before my rugby loving mum changed her allegiances to the round ball. It was around this time that I started making proper friends and I switched my season ticket to the West Stand after bonding with a certain fanzine editor over a shared appreciation of Vitalijs Astafjevs! I have held the same spot by the tunnel ever since, and find it hard to imagine standing - or even sitting - anywhere else.

Following Rovers over the last ten years has been a real rollercoaster ride of emotions - I don't think any other relationship would manage to cope with such stresses and strains. I think that we all agree that if our partners routinely

upset and hurt us in the same way as Rovers do, we would not keep coming back for more.

Despite the low points, which for me include the way certain 'fans' react to bad results, I am definitely a member of the rose tinted spectacles brigade. My time as a Rovers fan has changed my life, to the extent that I now feel really sorry for people who do not have a passion in life. Rovers has given me; entertainment, excitement, a chance to see the country, some wonderful friends and even a job. I have had the chance to spend more quality time with my mum, and have adventures up and down the country.

When I first started to come to games, I didn't know anyone. Up until recently I had a close group of friends on the terraces. But now, I cannot walk round the stadium without people stopping to talk to me every few minutes. Being a Rovers fan is about more than just football, it is about being part of something much bigger, and the Memorial Stadium is a big part of that.

I am a bit of an amateur photographer, and love to document my life in pictures, so I imagine I will annoy the hell out of everyone on Saturday, as I attempt to capture our last moments at the Mem. These will be pictures I can look back on for years to come, but our memories can only take us so far.

The new Memorial Stadium marks a


new period in our history and signals the ambition of our club, and the willingness of everyone here to take Bristol Rovers forward. For that reason I could not be more excited about the redevelopment. 

Looking back on his first season at the club, striker Andy Williams is disappointed he hasn't scored more goals.

It's been a little bit disappointing. mainly because I'm a striker and I'm judged on the number of goals I score, and I've only managed seven so far. In spite of that, though, I have enjoyed my first season here.

I endured a difficult time just before Christmas, as it took me a while to settle in, but apart from that it's been really enjoyable. As far as the team are concerned getting to the Quarter Finals of the FA Cup was a great achievement and, for long periods, we looked quite decent in the league. At one time, we had a chance of reaching the play offs but our challenge fizzled out a little bit towards the end of the campaign.

His season couldn't have got off to a better start as he came off the bench at Port Vale in our opening fixture, and scored the equaliser in a 1-1 draw.

I hadn't scored in pre season, which was a little bit disappointing, but getting that goal at Vale Park was one of the best things that's happened to me this season. After that, Richard Walker and Rickie Lambert played really well up front for a while and I was just fighting to get a spot in the team. Then I scored against West Ham, in the Carling Cup, and started a few more games but, unfortunately, didn't score as many goals as I would have liked.

Things changed just after Christmas, when he and Rickie formed a useful looking partnership up front.

I think we established quite a good

partnership at that time, and we were both scoring quite regularly. We enjoyed a good run in the side together, which helped, as it coincided with a good run for the team. I wasn't too worried about not scoring at that time, because the chances kept coming. However I wasn't really taking enough of them and, because of that, I lost my place in the team.

I tried not to let the lack of goals affect my confidence, and would have been more worried if I hadn't been getting chances in games. To be honest, though, if I'd been able to take all the chances that came my way, who knows how many goals I would have scored this season.

That's the positive I can take from my own season and, hopefully, I can work on converting more chances through pre season and come back stronger for the new campaign. That will be my main aim for next season, but I would still like to score a few more before the end of this season and maybe reach double figures which would make it a reasonable first season at the club.

In spite of a lack of goals, he's been encouraged by the team spirit that exists within the squad.

There's a group of lads who have been here a good few years and I just sensed, when I first arrived, that there was a really good team spirit about the place. Everyone was really welcoming when I arrived, and we all get on really well. It's just a good place to be, and the fact that everyone gets on is a big help when you are a newcomer. The spirit here is such that even when we have been under the cosh in games, it

hasn't as felt though we are going to lose. That was certainly the feeling when we went on an eleven game unbeaten run earlier this year, and I'm sure that will continue into next season.

The key feature of the season has been the away record which, at the time of writing, had yielded seven wins and seven draws from the 22 games played.

Many of the pitches we play on away from home enable us to get the ball down and play, which is what we like to do. Sometimes that can be tricky at the Mem, although I think we've done it a few times. I'm sure our home fans would like to see more attractive football, but we have tended to play better away from home this season.

Next season, of course, every game will be an away one as we relocate to a temporary home while the Memorial Stadium is being redeveloped.

It's just something we are going to have to adjust to, but I don't think that playing elsewhere for a season or two will prove to be too much of a hardship, though it will be tough for our fans, who will have to travel further to see us every week.

As for next season, he believes that this side can make a push for the upper reaches of the league.

On a personal level I'd like to be involved in at least as many games as this season, and to make a positive contribution towards the team and that means I need to score a few more goals. As for the team, we will have had the benefit of playing at this level for a season and we will be a lot wiser. which will help us to push on a little bit more.


















Welcome, SWINDON TOWN



In contrast to the fixture here twelve months ago, when promotion nerves dominated the game, tonight's meeting promises to be a far less nail biting affair but there is still plenty to play for.

Our visitors have a chance to gain their second double of the season and score their first ever goal at the Mem at the third attempt.

One thing for certain is that Christian Roberts will not be able to repeat the match winning performance from November. The Jormer Cardiff, Exeter and Bristol City striker will be missing after a serious knee operation. Simon Cox and Lee Peacock could be given first crack at breaking the Robin's duck at the Mem but Billy Paynter who scored for the reserves last week is pressing for a start as is youth team striker Ben lovce. Blair Sturrock has been ruled out for the rest of this season with a fractured arm and Barry Coor has a shoulder problem but that did not prevent him being included on the bench at Doncaster eleven days ago.

Leading scorer Cox joined the Robins on loan from Reading in August 2007 and the deal was made permanent in January. He was a trainee with the Royals but only made a few substitutes appearances in the blue hoops. Loan spells at Brentford and Northampton Town gave some experience of life in the lower divisions. Peacock was a Carlisle trainee who made over 80 appearances for the Cumbrians until transferring to Mansfield Town in October 1997, Two years and 100 games later he moved to Manchester City where he could not command a regular place and made just four starts before moving to Bristol City in August 2000 and immediately becoming part of the furniture. Lee played 175 games for City and scored 63 goals before moving to Sheffield Wednesday in July 2004 then to Swindon in January 2006. After more than ten years and nearly 500 games as a striker, Peacock was transformed into a midfielder last season by previous boss


Paul Sturrock but was pushed back into attack against Oldham two weeks ago.

Paynter was a Port Vale trainee and played over 100 games before moving to Hull City in November 2005. He moved to Southend United in August 2006 but struggled to hold down a regular place and went on loan to Bradford City in January 2007. Here he was in instant success partnering several different strikers and scoring a sensational thirty yard volley at Ashton Gate as the Bantams won 3-2. He was transferred to Swindon in August 2007. Joyce was brought to Swindon by former Rovers winger and current Swindon assistant manager David Byrne who had worked with the young striker at Plymouth College. Sturrock, the son of former manager Paul Sturrock, was born in Dundee and joined Dundee United before going out on loan to Brechin City in August 2000. He played 33 games before following his father to Devon and Plymouth Argyle in October 2001. In December 2004 he moved to Kidderminster Harriers and three months later scored against us in a 1-1 draw at

Meet the Manager Maurice Malpas

In January 2008, Maurice Malpas became manager of Swindon Town after the takeover of the club by local businessman Andrew Fitton.

Malpas joined Dundee United from Leven Royals in 1979 on the recommendation of the Club's scout in Fife, Jock Speed. He made his Premier Division debut two years later against Airdrieonians and quickly established a regular place at full back. Less than eighteen months later, still a part timer studying for an Honours Degree in



Electrical Engineering, he won a League Championship medal, the youngest member of the triumphant 1983 Dundee United - Champions of Scotland team.

In 1984. Maurice won the first of his club record fifty five caps for Scotland against France in Marseille the last part time footballer to represent Scotland and on the eve of his wedding day. With

Dundee United he recorded the club's all time record of 617 League appearances by the time he retired from playing in 2000. He changed from player/coach to full time coach at Tannadice and was part of the temporary management team following the dismissal of Alex Smith in October 2002.

In 2003 Maurice joined Motherwell as assistant to manager Terry Butcher and replaced the former England captain in May 2006 following Butcher's departure to coach Sydney FC. A year later he departed and became caretaker manager of the Scotland U-21 team but was disappointed to miss out to Billy Stark when a permanent appointment was announced. Having spent his whole working life playing and coaching north of the border, his appointment at Swindon heralds a new beginning.



He returned to Sheffield in June 2004 but this time with Wednesday and moved to MK Dons two years later. 





Football historian LEIGH **EDWARDS** profiles six leading **Swindon Town managers**

BERT HEAD

Bert Head plotted Swindon Town's 1962/63 promotion success. Signing professional for Torquay United in October 1936, the defender moved to Bury in February 1952 and was assistant boss before becoming Swindon's manager in October 1955. He produced several fine players including Mike Summerbee. Ernie Hunt, Don Rogers and Rod Thomas before returning to Bury as manager in August 1965. Appointed Crystal Palace's boss in April 1966, he guided them to the top flight for the first time in 1968/69 and had a spell as general manager. He was later manager and director at Bath City and died in February 2002.

DANNY WILLIAMS

Danny Williams guided Swindon Town to a promotion and League Cup 'double' in 1968/69. A former wing half, he turned professional with hometown Rotherham in October 1942 and starred in their 1950/51 Third Division (North) title triumph. He made a club record 459 League appearances for the Millers before becoming trainer-coach in July 1960. then was manager prior to taking charge of Swindon in August 1965. Leaving the County Ground in July 1969 to manage Sheffield Wednesday, he then managed Mansfield Town before rejoining Swindon as boss from March 1974 until May 1978. He now lives in Bournemouth.

FRED FORD

Fred Ford plotted Swindon Town's 1970 Anglo Italian Cup final triumph. He was a centre-half with Erith & Belvedere, Arsenal, Charlton Athletic, Millwall and Carlisle United, then coached Bristol Rovers before becoming Bristol City's manager in July 1960. He guided them to promotion in 1964/65 and discovered several notable players, then coached Swindon from September 1967 until his appointment as Bristol Rovers boss in April 1968. Returning to Swindon as manager between October 1969 and May 1971, he later coached Torquay United, then was Oxford United's chief scout until his death in October 1981.

OSSIE ARDILES

Former Argentina international midfielder Ossie Ardiles was unlucky not to lead Swindon Town to the top-flight in 1989/90. Together with Ricky Villa, the World Cup winner made headlines with his transfer from Huracan to Spurs in July 1978. He helped them win the FA Cup in 1981 and UEFA Cup in 1984, moving to QPR in May 1988. Appointed Swindon's boss in July 1989, he plotted their 1989/90 Second Division play off final success but they were denied promotion due to an illegal payments scandal. He took charge of Newcastle United in March 1991, then managed West Brom and Spurs before coaching overseas.

ANDY KING


Former England U-21 midfielder Andy King managed Swindon Town to the Second Division play offs in 2003/04. Signing professional for Luton Town in July 1974, he joined Everton in April 1976 and appeared in the 1977 League Cup final. He moved to QPR in September 1980, then West Brom a year later and rejoined Everton in August 1982. After spells at Wolves, Luton again and Aldershot, he became Mansfield Town's boss in November 1993. He was assistant boss at Grimsby and Swindon, where he was appointed manager from November 2000 until August 2001, then again between January 2002 and September 2005.

PAUL STURROCK

Former Scotland international striker Paul Sturrock guided Swindon Town to promotion in 2006/07. A legend at Dundee United, he starred as they won the Scottish Premier title in 1982/83. Scottish League Cup twice and were Scottish Cup finalists four times. He became their coach in June 1989, was St Johnstone's boss and rejoined Dundee United as manager in September 1998. Taking charge of Plymouth in October 2000, he plotted two promotion campaigns, then managed Southampton. He led Sheffield Wednesday to promotion in 2004/05, then was Swindon's boss for a year until rejoining Plymouth in November 2007

Rickie to the rescue

Former Blackpool, Macclesfield, Stockport and Rochdale striker Rickie Lambert has acquired a reputation for scoring important goals since his £200,000 move from Spotland in August 2006.

His winning strike against Bristol City in the Area Final of the Johnstone's Paint Trophy in February last year was eclipsed at Hartlepool in May by the goal which clinched a play off place. No less vital was his header at Walsall last Tuesday evening which virtually assured the Pirates of League One survival this term. Last season saw Lambert paired with Richard Walker, who has not enjoyed much success this time round and now seems to be out of the picture altogether. Walker joined Rovers from Oxford United in August 2004, after beginning his career as a trainee at Aston Villa, and playing for Cambridge, Blackpool, Wycombe and Northampton.

Lambert has worked with a number of striking partners this season, including Andy Williams and the ill fated Coventry City front man Wayne Andrews, whose loan spell from the Sky Blues lasted just 17 minutes before he suffered knee ligament damage at Yeovil. Williams was Hereford United's leading scorer in their Conference promotion campaign before moving to the Mem last summer. He was one of three strikers introduced from the bench at Bournemouth last Saturday week, along with Sean Rigg and Josh Klein-Davies

Rigg, a Filton College graduate scored his first senior goal of the season against Northampton last month and recently agreed a contract extension to keep him at the Mem for the next two seasons.

Klein-Davies, 18, who with his fellow striker Matt Groves, a 19 year old former scholar, has won a one year contract extension, was released by Bristol City last summer. Lewis Haldane, a former Southampton schoolboy and Welsh U-21 international, was originally a striker but is now used primarily for his pace on the flanks:

We are used to seeing former Mansfield Town youngster Craig Disley alongside skipper Stuart Campbell in central midfield, but in our last three games he has been employed in a 4-4-1-1 formation behind Lambert. The switch has given Filton College graduate Chris Lines, who recently signed a two year extension to his contract, the opportunity to relinquish his left wing role to partner Campbell. Campbell, who arrived from Grimsby Town three years ago, started as a trainee with Leicester and made two substitute appearances for Birmingham City before his £200,000 switch to the Mariners in September 2000.

David Pipe, a close season signing from Notts County, no longer faces competition for his right wing spot from Sammy Igoe, who has gone to Hereford United on loan. Charlie Reece joined Filton College after his release by Aston Villa while the left sided Adam Mahdi graduated to the professional ranks through the Centre of Excellence and the College. 17 year old Charlie Clough, also from the Centre of Excellence, signed a two year deal last September. Reece. Mahdi and Clough have all been offered contract extensions. James Fraser, a former Worthing midfielder and England Schools U-18 captain, proved a popular loan signing during his three months with Tiverton Town.

Byron Anthony, a Welsh U-21 international who graduated through the ranks at Cardiff City, regained his place in central defence at the Bescot last Tuesday at the expense of Craig Hinton, who recently signed a one year contract extension. Our more mature visitors will remember Hinton's uncle Alan, a hero with Nottingham Forest and Derby County in the Brian Clough era. Craig is a former Birmingham City trainee and Kidderminster Harrier.

Steve Elliott, a former Derby County and Blackpool defender who joined Rovers from Blackpool in the summer of 2004, returned on Easter Monday after a two month absence due to a knee injury sustained in the FA Cup replay against Fulham. Danny Coles, a former Bristol City defender, arrived on loan from Hull City in November after playing against



Rovers for Hartlepool and has since signed a two and a half year deal. In our recent home game against the Monkey Hangers, Coles suffered severe bruising on a knee but has not ruled out a return before the end of the season. His absence has meant a return to right back for Aaron Lescott, who joined the Gas, initially on loan, from Stockport as a midfielder four years ago.

Alex Kite. 19, the son of Rovers physio and former goalkeeper Phil, has been given a year's contract extension while Ryan Paddock, 19, who was once on Aston Villa's books, has been released as has 19 year old right back Tom Godsell. Ex Hereford United defender Ryan Green, who arrived from Edgar Street two weeks after scoring in the 2006 Conference play-off final, will miss the rest of the season with Achilles problems.

Welsh U-21 cap Joe Jacobson. ex Cardiff City, is the first choice at left back, with former Northampton midfielder Chris Carruthers likely to be on the bench. 18 year Tom Parrinello. Rovers' reserves' regular left back, has been signed up for another season as has 19 year old Mike Green, Steve Phillips' deputy between the posts. Phillips, a former Bristol City keeper, played over 250 games for the Robins before crossing the river in the summer of 2006. Goalkeeping coach Steve Book, the former Forest Green Rovers and Cheltenham Town keeper, has been registered as a player in case of emergency.



Twenty the target

It was on Easter Monday, in the game against Swansea at the Liberty Stadium, that Paul Trollope introduced a new formation to a side known for playing 4-4-2 in almost every game.

The 4-4-1-1 formation, seen for the first time that evening was a huge success, in the first half at least, as Rovers took a two goal lead into the interval and could have been even further ahead.

That game ended all square, though, as the Welsh side hit back to score twice in the second half. The same system earned another valuable point at Nottingham Forest, though wasn't as successful at Bournemouth, but the first three point haul playing that way came last Tuesday, at Walsall.

It certainly appears to have benefited striker Rickie Lambert, as he's scored in three of those games and after last week's win at the Banks's Stadium, he spoke of the confidence it's given him.

I enjoy it, as it means I'm playing a lot higher and therefore I'm closer to goal, so when the ball comes into the box I've got more chance of scoring. All I have to do is concentrate on getting on the end of the crosses that come in.

With Rickie playing the lone striker role and Craig Disley tucked in behind him, it can hardly be described as a negative tactic as the two wide midfielders are encouraged to get forward at every opportunity.

We get people into the box very quickly, and 'Dis' is brilliant in the role just behind me. He's an attacking midfielder, but he can be like a second striker as he can finish and he makes some great runs into the box.

Having pace on either flank is a great asset. My job is to get the ball to them and, instead of going out to them, I simply stay in the box hoping they will get a cross in and, in recent games, they have been doing just that.

His goal last Tuesday was a fine example of how the system works as the ball was played out to the left, and Joe Jacobson whipped in a cross and Rickie was on hand to apply the finishing touch.

It was an ok goal, he said modestly in his post match interview, adding.

I just got my head to it and when I looked up it was in the back of the net.

It was a great cross from Joe and I was

He confirmed that the emphasis, in training, has been to get the ball into the box as quickly as possible.

made up to score again.

I've been told me to stay up and not to come off my marker as much as I usually do, as the wide men will get in as many crosses as they can. David Pipe has put in some great balls in the last few games and although I've got on the end of them, I haven't scored as many goals as I would have liked, so I was relieved when that one went in tonight.

The strike was his eighteenth of the season and, while he won't readily admit to setting himself targets, he'd love to break the twenty goal barrier.

I think a total of twenty is achievable for the season, because I'm confident enough at the moment. When I'm confident, I feel as though I'm going to score in every game and my goals tend to come in short bursts of four or five, so I hope this is the start of another little run.

The win at Walsall, the first since three

points were gained at Millwall on the first day of March, eleven games before, came as a relief to supporters, though he says the players were confident they could get back to winning ways.

It was quite a long run without a win but confidence didn't really disappear, as we all thought that we would get a win and push on. Now, I think we can go on and finish in mid table.

A good finish to the campaign will, he feels, set things up nicely for the 2008/09 season.

It sends out a message for next season. I feel. Lennie has said, and the boys agree, that if you finish a season badly the likelihood is that you will start the next season badly. On the other hand, if you finish one season strongly, you are likely to start the next season in a similar manner. In any case, finishing well gives the fans encouragement over the summer, as they look ahead to the new campaign.

If only home results had been better, then something more than a mid table finish might have been a possibility.

It does need to improve, and it would be nice to finish the season with a couple of wins at the very least. As we speak, we've only won five at the Memorial Stadium all season and our fans deserve better than that.

In fact, those supporters who travel away have seen more wins on the road than they have at the Mem.

I think the away fans have been brilliant and, to be honest, they are the ones who have seen us at our best this season, as some of our away performances have been superb.





Lowering the bar

By now we should know whether Rovers and Swindon have safely negotiated their first seasons back in League One, or whether one or both of us still have lingering doubts.

The first scenario looks the most likely, and that will signify that all four teams promoted from the basement last year have stayed up in the higher division.

The play off winners are, understandably, the most likely to fall at the first hurdle seeing as they were the lowest ranked of the sides promoted, but this year Rovers' achievement (I hope this is not a Murray Walker moment) in surviving League One has been matched by Morecambe (Conference play off winners) and Blackpool, with the only exception being Derby County.

A battling 2-2 draw with a decent Portsmouth team on the opening day gave Rams fans hope that they might be able to compete, but heavy losses to both Tottenham (4-0) and Liverpool (6-0) away from home soon after came as something of a reality check.

County's first win arrived in the middle of September as Kenny Miller sunk Newcastle I-O at Pride Park and those three points briefly lifted them off the foot of the table above Bolton.

However, that was Derby's only victory in any competition this season. Even in the cups they needed a penalty shootout to get past Sheffield Wednesday in the FA Cup Third Round before being thrashed by Preston, and in the League Cup they were knocked out on spot kicks by Blackpool.

The 6-0 home defeat to Aston Villa last week made it 28 league games without a win, and 31 across the board if you discount shootout triumphs. It has been a truly abysmal campaign and with a pathetic 11 points from 34 games at the time of writing, they are threatening to re write the history books.

Up until the modern era, the record low for a top flight season was 17 points by Stoke City in 1984/85 who registered just three victories in 42 games, two of which happened to be against Arsenal and Manchester United.

Swindon were the first Premier League side to have a go at the record with their

wretched season under John Gorman in 1993/94.

Town took 16 games to notch their first win, when former Wycombe striker Keith Scott scored the only goal against QPR, whose starting eleven included lan Holloway and Steve Yates as well as future Rovers front man Bradley Allen.

Big money summer signing Jan-Aage Fjortoft, bought from Rapid Vienna, had failed to score in his first 20 outings for Swindon but broke his duck against Spurs in late January before scoring a hat trick (two from the spot) in the next game at home to Coventry.

Both matches were won but there would only be one more triumph, completing a double over QPR at Loftus Road, before bowing out of the big time with a suitably embarrassing 5-0 defeat to Leeds at the County Ground on the final day.

The following year Ipswich (27) and Leicester (29) both registered fewer points than the Robins (30), with the Suffolk side memorably pummelled 9-0 at Old Trafford thanks to five goals from former City prodigy Andy (now Andrew) Cole.

The reduction of clubs in the Premiership from 22 down to 20 in 1995 meant that the number of fixtures dropped from 42 to 38, therefore increasing the chances of an assault on the 17-point mark.

Graham Taylor's Watford, having been promoted two years in succession, predictably struggled at the top table in 1999/2000 but a draw at Middlesbrough and victory over Coventry at the end of the season saw them finish on 24 points.

Bradford beat Liverpool on the final day to avoid the drop but they had no such luck in 2000/01. With ten matches left, they were stuck on 16 points but back to back wins over Charlton and Derby in April saw them reach a final tally of 26 points.

Two years later, Sunderland came close to the record when they ended with 19 points but these were all picked up by mid January. The rest of the season was a blur as they suffered 15 straight defeats and registered the

lowest ever number of goals in the top division with just 21 scored in 38 games - Marcus Stewart got the last of them in the 2-1 loss to West Brom.

Manager Mick McCarthy took over in March 2003 and had to wait until the middle of August for his first win but the Black Cats eventually made it into the play offs. A year later he took them back into the Premiership, but nobody could have foreseen what was to happen in 2005/06.


An unbeaten run of three games at the end of autumn, including a 2-0 win at neighbours Middlesbrough, lifted them outside the drop zone but it was another four months before West Brom were defeated. As April arrived, they had just 10 points on the board, but two draws and a morale boosting win over Fulham took them to 15 points at the close.

Sunderland had recorded the lowest all time top flight points total and equalled Stoke's measly three wins in a season. Nobody could be that abject again could they?

Step forward the toothless (or should that be horn less) Rams. With only one win to their name and just 16 goals so far, it looks like the bar will be lowered once again.



Derby fan Steve Elliott will be hoping his former club can bounce straight back to the Premiership next season.






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
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












Left: Wolves. 29th July 1972

Past Pirates

Wolverhampton Wanderers

Wolves had been in existence for two years before they adopted their present name. They started life as St Luke's FC, in 1877, but our first meeting against them took place almost a century later.

On 29th July 1972 they came to Eastville for a First Round Watney Cup tie. At the time Rovers were a Second Division club, while Wolves were in the top flight. League positions counted for nothing, though, as Rovers ran out 2-0 winners thanks to goals from Bruce Bannister and Kenny Stephens.

The boot was on the other foot during October of the same year, in the Fourth Round of the League Cup when we suffered a comprehensive 4-0 defeat at Molineux.

Since then we have met, occasionally, in league matches. In 1976/77 we were both in Division Two, and in 1985/86 Division Three.

During the early 1980's Wolves suffered three consecutive relegations to end up in Division four. They were in the basement division for two seasons, and by 1988/89 were back in Division Three with Rovers.

Another good season followed, and they were promoted as champions with Rovers following them twelve months later, so fixtures between the clubs resumed in 1990/91. That sequence of fixtures lasted three seasons, until our relegation in May 1993.

The clubs have met on one other occasion, a testimonial match for David Pritchard was played here at The Memorial Stadium in July 2003.

There has been just one postponement, that being the home game scheduled for 15th February 1986. though a programme wasn't issued.

Wolverhampton Wanderers Reserves

Rovers travelled to play Wolves reserves in the very first year they moved to Molineux. The date was January 1898, with the return in Bristol three months later. The following season, home and away games were also staged. All four games were Birmingham and District League fixtures.

Wotton under Edge

Wotton under Edge may not be one of the biggest names in world of football. but in the history of Bristol Rovers they are just about the most important team we have ever met. Why? Well, as most of you probably know, the game played in Wotton in December 1883 was the very first football match played by Bristol Rovers, or The Black Arabs as we were known then.

It wasn't exactly a good start, though, as we lost 6-0. Including this game, there were six friendly fixtures with Wotton over a six year period. Two were at home, and two were away, but the venue of the others has never been established. As usual. I would like to mention Stephen

Byrne and Mike Jay's book 'The Definitive History' for this information.

Wotton Rovers

One hundred years after playing our first game Rovers made the trip to Wotton once more. The game was arranged as part of our centenary celebrations. Two years later, in August 1985, we made the trip once more for a pre season friendly. The programmes from both these games are featured on this page.

Worcester City

On 26th August 1952 Rovers played City in a pre season friendly, though I'm not certain if a programme was produced for this match. If you know the answer, please get in touch.

League celebrates 120 years

Last Thursday, 17th
April, marked the 120th
anniversary of the
inception of The Football
League thanks to a Birmingham
based Scot.

The lack of structure to the football landscape in 1888 meant that many matches were being cancelled due to bad weather, injuries or lack of transport. With fixture cards being rendered virtually meaningless William McGregor, a Midlands based draper and a Director of Aston Villa, set about making changes.

making changes.

He wrote to a handful of clubs and all of the teams he contacted agreed there was a need for something more organised, so a meeting took place at Anderton's Hotel in Fleet Street.

London on 22nd March 1888. A second meeting followed on April 17th, in Manchester, when the official plans were put in place.

Initially, 12 teams were invited to join The League, six from Lancashire - Preston, Bolton, Everton, Burnley, Accordington Stanley and Blackburn Rovers with the other six coming from the Midlands - Aston Villa, West Brom, Wolverhampton Wanderers, Notts County, Derby County and Stoke City.

The reason that all the founder members came from the North West or the Midlands was that at the time



there was no professional football being played south of Birmingham. The first programme of league matches took place on September 8th 1888, and Preston North End won the first league title without losing a game. Four years after the birth of The League, interest had grown dramatically and a Second Division was introduced and by 1920 there was also a Third Division (South) while the Northern equivalent was introduced a year later.

Up until 1992 the Football League Division One was the top level of English football, but then the top 22 clubs broke away to form the FA Premier League.

Football as we know it today has evolved massively over the years, automatic promotion and relegation replaced Test matches (play offs) in 1898 before play offs were reintroduced in 1987 for the third or fourth promotion places.

This season, Football League crowds are set to break the 16m barrier for the third consecutive season, there are exciting promotion and relegation scraps in all three divisions, and Championship club Cardiff City will feature in this season's FA Cup Final.

So here's to another successful 120 years.

Many people think that Bristol Rovers are the oldest football club in Bristol.

In fact that claim is held by Roman Glass St George FC who were formed in 1882, a year before the Rovers.

St George took part in the first ever recorded football match in Gloucestershire when they defeated Warmley 2-0 on December 2nd 1882.

In the early days of football, in the Victorian age, the paths of Eastville Rovers and St George were crossed on many occasions and throughout the 20th Century the clubs were closely linked.

On Saturday March 31st 1894 St George won their first Gloucestershire Senior Cup by beating Eastville Rovers 3-1 at the Chequers Ground, Kingswood, in front of 4.000 spectators.

By 1897 the two clubs were playing in the professional ranks of the Birmingham & District League, competing against the likes of Wolverhampton Wanderers Reserves and Aston Villa Reserves, where the clubs were renamed Bristol St George and Bristol Eastville Rovers for identification purposes.

In February 1899 the 'Eastville' was dropped and the club have been called Bristol Rovers ever since. The professional game was crippling, financially, for Bristol St George and they dropped out of the league after two seasons, reverting to the amateur game, whilst Bristol Rovers joined Bristol City in the Southern League.

Whilst playing in the Birmingham League both clubs also competed in the professional section of the Western League. On Boxing Day 1898, the two clubs met at Eastville Stadium in front of 14,897 spectators, which was a record crowd for the ground at the time. Bristol St George proved victorious running out 3-2 winners that day.

As Rovers went from strength to strength, St George reverted to the local leagues climbing to the Western League in 1928. In 1926 St George's best player, Cliff Britton left to join Rovers. Four years later he joined Everton and went on to make nine appearances for England.

The following season George Britton left St George to play for Rovers before later moving to Blackburn Rovers. Bristol Rovers picked up another local lad from Bristol St George in 1933, when they signed Phil Taylor. The 15 year old played for a season and a half for St George before making the Rovers first team. Taylor impressed at Rovers and eventually signed for Liverpool in March 1936 for £5,000. He went on to captain

Liverpool and was also capped 3 times by England. Taylor spent 23 years at Liverpool, the last three as manager, until he was succeeded by Bill Shankly.

The closeness of the two clubs was emphasised when Rovers Manager Brough Fletcher presided over St George's Annual Dinner in 1939, when the club celebrated their GFA Senior Amateur Cup win. After World War II. it was Rovers who helped St George out by donating goalposts, theirs having been destroyed during the hostilities.

Bristol St George progressed well after the war, and were always amongst the leading amateur clubs in the area throughout the 1950's and it was not uncommon to have Rovers scouts, as well as manager Bert Tann, attend matches when they could.

Throughout the 1960's, Bristol St George were the premier amateur club in the area and a few ex Bristol Rovers amateurs played for the club. Eastville Stadium became a second home for St George, as they won five GFA Senior Amateur Cup finals at the ground. The man in charge of training the team during this time was former Rovers centre forward Albert Iles.

Bristol St George, in this period, were renowned for their cup exploits not only in the GFA Senior Amateur Competition but also the FA Amateur Cup where they regularly beat Western League opposition. Their best result at that time was probably the 0-0 draw against Hendon, one of the best Amateur clubs in the country who boasted five Amateur Internationals. A crowd of 3,000 watched them at Bell Hill that day, on 28th January 1967. This was an impressive crowd, especially when you consider Bristol Rovers were hosting Arsenal in the Third Round of the FA Cup on the same afternoon.

As the club moved into the 1970's, one of their youngsters was catching the eye of the Rovers scouts. It was not long before Graham Day made the short journey from Bell Hill to Eastville Stadium. In May 1975 the close relationship between the clubs was secured with an agreement for Bristol St George to become a nursery club for Rovers.

An article in the Bristol Evening Post quoted Bristol Rovers' trainer/coach Bobby Campbell stating:
we have always had a close contact with St George and are cementing the ties still further. Rovers will have the pick of the St George players for their Youth team and St George will be supplied with promising players who need experience.

The following season St George striker Keith Rogers and defender Gary Mockridge both

played for Rovers reserves and in the 1976/77 season Rovers players Jeff Sherwood and Mike Malpass gained valuable experience at St George, whilst in the 1977/78 season Keith Brown left St George to sign for Bristol Rovers.

The last St George player to make it into Bristol Rovers first team was Gary Smart who made his Football League debut in October 1985, when coming on as a substitute, replacing former England Captain Gerry Francis. Ian McDonald and Kevin Miles also featured for Rovers reserves that season.


Bristol St George had mixed fortunes following this period and went on a downward spiral in the 1990's until they amalgamated with Roman Glass in 1995, which enabled the oldest club in Bristol to continue

Roman Glass also has a connection with the Rovers, being the club's main sponsor for three years in the 1990's. Roman Glass St George have gone from strength to strength in recent years, and the first team are now back in the Western (Toolstation) League for the first time since 1935.





We cannot deny the fact that the record attendance at Eastville was an impressive 38,742 whilst to the credit of those there at the time the figure for Twerton was a mere 9,464 and that was to host the mighty Liverpool. We cannot deny the right of the South End to exist or to enjoy the same level of support as ourselves. This is Bristol and when you consider the size of the city and the generous population in our nearby towns and villages the area is well big enough to support two full time professional football clubs, I say, and emphasise the same level of support. During our period of time in Bath, some would argue that we were made by others to look, and feel, like the smaller of the two clubs.

During my lifetime this is certainly not the case at all; when I was a child there was never a notion, that I can recall, of Rovers being not at the very least on a par. Take the 1958/59 season as an example. Both Bristol Clubs were strong in the second tier. We finished sixth and the South End boys finished a little way behind us in tenth place. We played them at home in the November and

attracted 32,104. We went to their place for the return fixture in March to play in front of 26.868.

The levels of support that we have enjoyed, and are extremely thankful for, over the past eighteen months, will have served to demonstrate that we are indeed not the smallest club per se and probably never have been. Nonetheless we will have our work cut out to maintain and build on the base levels of support that we know exists whilst we are away. It is so important that we continue to maintain and grow the support of our younger fans and families.



Peter Aitken

The Football in the Community is so vitally an import part of our work in this regard and one that we will be working incredibly hard to sustain over the coming months and during our time away. Quite simply we must maintain our presence in Bristol. Peter Aitken and a Wayne Noble are our full time coaches and their role within the club at this time is a vital one. At the game on Saturday against Gillingham

we were hosts to no less than one hundred local children and many parents. Activity started as early as 9.30 with coaching and fitness training culminating in tours of the stadium and dressing rooms, lunch and then the game itself.

The Football League Trust has established itself over the course of the season with Dave Edmundson at the helm. Dave was formerly Chief Executive at Burnley Football Club. The Trust is chaired by Mark Arthur who is presently Chief Executive at Nottingham Forest. The Trust is divided into five regions each with its own Regional Manager. We are

very lucky to have Bath City Manager John Relish as the top man in our South West and Wales region. John is a good man.


Whilst all clubs benefit from a base level of grant, the Trust has decided to top slice money for overall projects that it thinks will be to the benefit of football clubs and to their respective communities alike. The first of such projects is at the bidding stage. Considering our pending period of absence we simply cannot afford to miss out and every effort is being made to get our slice if the cake.

The Trust is developing a five year national project that would involve clubs working on an estate or estates with 11-18 year old boys and girls. Football is the central activity but the project delivery must include multi sports as well. The older young people must be given a delivery role in support of the coaches and go through to introductory awards, for example Sports Leadership awards. Activities will take place in the evenings and

in the respective communities. At Bristol Rovers we are confident in our abilities and skills to deliver such a programme.

The timescale for the bid was very short and we had to pull out all the stops as a team to draw up a local scheme and to present our written bid as strongly as we could. Our proposal bid is now with The Football League for their consideration and approval and we expect to learn as to whether we are successful or not by mid May.


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Jim Finney

Referees are seldom accorded a mention by the clubs they monitor, but Jim Finney, who died in Hereford on 1st April 2008 at the age of 83 was an exception.



Born on 17th August 1924, he qualified as a Football League referee in time for the

1959/60 season and quickly made a name for himself, controlling the 1959 Amateur Cup Final, two League Cup Finals and the 1962 FA Cup Final between Spurs and Burnley.

A linesman at the 1960 European Nations final, finney was also the referee who abandoned the Scotland v Austria game in May 1963 due to poor behaviour by the players, and sent off two Uruguayans in their World Cup quarter final against West Germany at Hillsborough in 1966.

His career was ended abruptly, by injuries received in a car accident shortly before he was due to referee the 1971 European Cup Final between Ajax and Panathinaikos and he was later an official at Hereford United and, until 2000, at Cardiff City.

Finney refereed seven League games involving Rovers. He took charge of the 2-0 defeat at home to Middlesbrough in April 1960 and two local derbies in the calendar year of 1963, Rovers losing 4-1 at Ashton Gate before Geoff Bradford's last ever Rovers goal helped the club towards a 4-0 demolition of their rivals that Christmas. Rovers defeated QPR 2-1 in April 1967, then defeated Scunthorpe 4-0, Bournemouth 3-2 and Torquay over the next few months.

During the Scunthorpe match in 1968, Finney refused to tolerate racial abuse being directed towards the visitors' winger Peter Foley and, once the ball had gone dead, informed a police officer who ejected the offending spectator from the ground.

Finney also refereed the two FA Cup ties with Oldham Athletic in 1961/62, which Rovers lost in a replay.

Johnny Steele

The former Barnsley manager, Johnny Steele, whose side played Rovers in 11 league matches in the 1960's, died of a stroke on 14th January 2008, at the age of 91.

Glaswegian born on 24th November 1916. John Steele had been a decent inside forward in his day, joining East Fife in 1934 from Lesmagahow Juniors and playing in 27 Scottish Second Division games, scoring three times. Apart from two loan spells at Raith Rovers, he was on the books of Ayr United from 1935 for three years and scored seven times in 45 matches in the Scottish League. In June 1938 he moved south of the border to join Barnsley in a £2,500 deal.

A regular in 1938/39, in when the Tykes were Third Division (North) champions, he also scored Barnsley's final league goal before World War Two and returned to the side in 1946, having recorded 101 wartime appearances for the club, his 56 goals including a four and three goal haul on successive Saturdays in February 1942 against Stockport County.

He retired from playing in 1948 and became a coach at junior level with Barnsley, progressing to club manager from March 1960 until September 1971 and then from November 1972 to April 1973, when he became a director. Steele's many years at the helm at Oakwell saw relegation to Division four in 1964/65 and promotion back up in 1967/68. In his first game against Rovers,

Barnsley won 4-0 with Eddie O'Hara scoring a hat-trick, but Rovers were to win six and draw two of the eleven fixtures during that era.

Wally Fielding

Wally Fielding, who appeared in 410 games in all competitions for Everton, scoring 54 goals, was a clever inside forward, and his two league matches against Rovers came in the 1953/54 season.

Rovers had been promoted as Third Division (South) champions and Everton were to be crowned Division Two champions that campaign, so the two fixtures that season remain the only occasion Rovers' path has crossed Everton's in the Football League. Fielding played in both games, the Toffees convincing 4-0 victory at Goodison Park on Christmas Day and a goalless draw at Eastville three days later.

Alfred Walter Fielding was born in Edmonton on 26th November 1919 and progressed through Aldsmede, Walthamstow Avenue and a trial with Charlton Athletic to sign, after wartime service in the Middle East, as an Everton player in September 1945. 'Everton's favourite cockney' stood just 5' 7", but his precision passing, his remarkable reading of the game and his trademark through ball, perfectly weighted inside the full back, helped maintain his club's position as a major force in English football. In all, 'Nobby', as he was also known, was to appear in 380 league games for Everton and he scored 49 times. In January 1959 he moved to Southport as player manager, his twenty league games and a goal against Millwall resulting in the fact that his career finished against Doncaster Rovers in May 1960, at the age of 40. Thereafter, assistant trainer and scout at Luton Town, these roles sandwiched around eight years as a youth team coach at Watford, where he 'discovered' Luther Blissett, preceded a move to Cornwall in 1981. It was at home in that county that Wally Fielding, believed to be the oldest former Everton player, died on 18th January 2008 at the age of 88.

Playing for the Gas

Football historian LEIGH EDWARDS traces every Bristol Rovers player from 60 post war league seasons.

RAY WHITE

Goalkeeper Ray White understudied Laurie Taylor while at Bristol Rovers. A former Southend United apprentice, he made his League debut as a 16 year-old in their 4-2 defeat at Reading in April 1964 and appeared in Southend's record 9-1 defeat at Brighton in November 1965. He moved to Eastville Stadium in July 1968 and appeared in Rovers' 2-2 draw at Northampton two months later as well as the next two matches against Swindon and Reading. Joining Dave Bumpstead's Brentwood in July 1969, he helped them win promotion in 1968/69. then played for Dover and Tonbridge. running an industrial cleaning business.

STEVE WHITE

Ex England Schoolboy striker Steve White had two spells at Bristol Rovers. Previously with Mangotsfield United, he joined Rovers in July 1977 and scored twice on his home debut. He moved to Luton Town for £195,000 in December 1979 and helped win the Second Division title in 1981/82, joining Charlton Athletic as part of the Paul Walsh deal in July 1982. Returning to Rovers for £35,000 in August 1983, he netted 44 goals in 151 League games overall before joining Swindon Town in July 1986. A promotion winner in 1986/87 and 1992/93, he later played for Hereford United, Cardiff City. then managed Chippenham Town.

TOM WHITE

Central defender Tom White made a significant contribution as Bristol Rovers qualified for the Second Division play offs in 1997/98. Locally born, he turned professional with Rovers in July 1994 and made his League debut in the 2-1 defeat at Bradford City seven months later. He provided cover for Billy Clark as John Ward's side reached the Second Division play off final that season. Scoring once in 54 League games for Rovers, he was loaned to Kingstonian and Hereford United before joining Yeavil Town in August 2000. He has since played for Mangotsfield United and is now manager of an estate agents in Bedminster.

WILF WHITFIELD

Wing half Wilf Whitfield played for Bristol Rovers either side of the Second World War. Initially with Birtley he joined Bury in July 1932 and made his League debut in their 1-0 defeat at Southampton two months later, 'Baggy' was ever-present in 1935/36 and starred as the Shakers narrowly failed to win promotion to the top flight in 1936/37. Moving to Bristol Rovers in June 1938. he was a corporal in the Army during the war and scored once in 26 Third Division (South) games before joining Torquay United in January 1947. Later with Bath City and Bridgwater, he resided in Bath until his death in February 1971.

DAVID WHYTE

Striker David Whyte briefly appeared as Bristol Rovers qualified for the Second Division play offs in 1997/98. Initially with Greenwich Borough, he joined Crystal Palace in February 1989 and featured in their 1993/94 First Division title campaign. He moved to Charlton Athletic for £450,000 in July 1994 and was leading marksman in 1994/95. Sidelined by a knee iniury, he had an unsuccessful trial at Reading before joining Ipswich Town in October 1997. He moved to Bristol Rovers in January 1998 and made four substitute appearances prior to joining Southend United in March 1998 but retired in September 1999.

DAVE WIFFILL

Midfielder Dave Wiffill briefly played for Bristol Rovers during the 1987/88 season. Locally born, he impressed with Bath City before moving to Manchester City for a then non league record £25,000 in April 1980. He failed to make an impact and spent four years with Hong Kong side Happy Valley until a broken leg necessitated a return to Britain. After a trial with Bristol Rovers, he appeared for Gloucester City and Bath City before rejoining Rovers in August 1987. featuring in the 3-1 win over Rotherham on the opening day, then the 2-1 defeat at Blackpool. He later had spells with Stroud, Clevedon Town and Thornbury.

ANTHONY WILLIAMS

Welsh U-21 goalkeeper Anthony Williams had a loan spell at Bristol Rovers at the end of the 1998/99 season. A former Blackburn Rovers trainee, he turned professional in July 1996 and was loaned to Macclesfield before joining Rovers on loan in March 1999. He made nine Second Division appearances. including the televised 2-2 draw at home to Manchester City. Also loaned to Gillingham, he joined Hartlepool in July 2000 and was ever present in their 2002/03 promotion success. He moved to Grimsby in July 2004 and was ever present again in 2004/05, joining Carlisle in August 2005. Now with Wrexham.

BOBBY WILLIAMS

Inside forward Bobby 'Shadow' Williams provided reliable cover for Wayne Iones and Ken Ronaldson while at Bristol Rovers. Locally born, he turned professional with Bristol City in May 1958 and played alongside England international John Atyeo. He featured in their 1964/65 promotion campaign before being sold to Rotherham United for £10,000 in February 1965. Moving to Bristol Rovers in March 1967, he netted five goals in 29 League games prior to joining Reading in August 1969. He later played for ASO Ostend, Cheltenham, Weymouth and Keynsham, then gave Reading lengthy service as youth team boss.

BRIAN WILLIAMS

Experienced left back Brian Williams was twice ever present for Bristol Rovers. Initially with Bury, he starred in their 1973/74 promotion campaign and was sold to QPR for £70,000 in July 1977. He joined Swindon Town for £50,000 in June 1978 and featured in their 1979/80 League Cup run, moving to Rovers in exchange for Gary Emmanuel in July 1981. Voted Player of the Year in 1983/84, he netted 21 goals in 172 League games. following Terry Cooper to Bristol City in July 1985. He played in two Freight Rover Trophy finals, joining Shrewsbury in July 1987, then was community officer at Hereford and Shrewsbury.



DANNY WILLIAMS

Welsh U-21 midfielder Danny Williams played for Bristol Rovers at the end of the 2003/04 season. A former Liverpool trainee, he turned professional in May 1997 but was unable to make an impact and joined Wrexham in March 1999. He moved to Kidderminster Harriers in July 2001 and missed just one match in 2002/03. After a loan spell at Chester City, he joined Bristol Rovers on deadline day in March 2004 and his solitary goal in six Third Division games came on his debut in the 3-0 victory at home to York City. He returned to Wrexham in August 2004 and featured in their 2005 LDV Vans Trophy final success.

DAVID WILLIAMS

Influential midfielder David Williams was capped five times by Wales after leaving Bristol Rovers. He became the first amateur to appear in the League for Rovers for 13 years when given his debut against Oldham Athletic in August 1975. Turning professional after completing a teacher training course, he was ever present in 1978/79 and 1981/82. becoming player-boss at 28 in May 1983. He netted 65 goals in 352 League games before joining Norwich City for £40,000 in July 1985. Helping win the Second Division title in 1985/86, he has coached at Norwich, Bournemouth, Everton, Leeds United and Manchester United.

GERAINT WILLIAMS

Welsh U-21 midfielder Geraint Williams gained 13 full caps after leaving Bristol Rovers. A former apprentice at Eastville Stadium, he turned professional in January 1980 and made his league debut in Rovers' 3-3 draw at home to Sheffield Wednesday nine months later. He netted eight goals in 141 League games before being sold to Derby County for £40,000 in March 1985. Starring in their rise back to the top flight, he joined Ipswich Town for £650,000 in July 1992 and helped them qualify for the First Division play offs in successive seasons. He moved to Colchester United in July 1998 and is now their manager.

JOHNNY WILLIAMS

Experienced wing half Johnny Williams played for Bristol Rovers against Arsenal in the 1966/67 FA Cup Third Round. Locally born, he grew up in Plymouth and turned professional with Plymouth Argyle in October 1952, starring in their 1958/59 Third Division title triumph. He was ever present for them in three successive seasons and scored in the 1964/65 League Cup semi final first-leg. Moving to Eastville Stadium in December 1966, he netted ten goals in 68 Third Division games for Bristol Rovers before returning to Plymouth as reserve team coach for a year in June 1969. He has since run two garages in Plymouth.

KEITH WILLIAMS

Inside forward Keith Williams was Bristol Rovers' leading marksman in 1962/63. Signing professional for Everton in March 1954, he failed to secure a first team slot and joined his older brother Ray at Tranmere Rovers in May 1957. He topped their goalscoring charts on three occasions but was unable to prevent relegation in 1960/61, joining Plymouth Argyle in June 1961. Moving to Rovers for £6,500 in January 1962, he experienced relegation again that season and netted 18 goals in 49 League games until banned in April 1963 after a major bribery scandal. He later emigrated to South Africa, settling in Johannesburg.

RYAN WILLIAMS

Ex England Youth winger Ryan Williams regularly featured as a substitute while at Bristol Rovers. A former Mansfield Town trainee, he made his League debut as a 17 year old in their 1-0 defeat at Leyton Orient in January 1996 and moved to Tranmere Rovers for £70,000 in August 1997. He failed to secure a regular first team slot and joined Chesterfield for £80,000 in November 1999. Sold to Hull City for £150,000 in July 2001, he joined Bristol Rovers in October 2003, netting four goals in 43 League games while at Memorial Stadium prior to joining Aldershot Town in January 2006, following a loan spell.

STEVE WILLIAMS

Welsh Youth striker Steve Williams appeared in Bristol Rovers' 1980/81 relegation battle. A former apprentice at Eastville Stadium, he made his League debut in Rovers' 1-0 defeat at home to Wrexham in December 1980 and his solitary goal in eight Second Division games clinched that month's 1-1 draw with Notts County. He turned professional in April 1981 and moved to hometown Barry in August 1982. Leading marksman in three successive Welsh League title triumphs, he joined Sully in August 1985, then had a season with Bideford before rejoining Barry in August 1988. He later played for Barry based Denhome.

Past...

Doncaster beat Swindon 2-0 at the Keepmoat Stadium, thanks to goals from Sean McDaid and Brian Stock. The three points kept them in third place and guaranteed them a place in the play offs at the very least.

SATURDAY 12Th APRIL

Swansea's promotion to the Championship was confirmed following

their 2-1 win at Gillingham. The Swans fell behind to a Dennis Oli strike, but two goals from Guillem Bauza just before the interval saw them to victory.

The win extended their lead at the top of the table to seven points ahead of second placed Carlisle, who were beaten 3-2 at Leeds. The Cumbrians took the lead through Scott Dobie but fell behind early in second period, when Dougie Freedman and Jonathan Howson scored. Danny Graham then equalised, but a second goal from Freedman saw Leeds to victory and they remained in the final play off spot.

Nottingham Forest, with goals from Nathan Tyson and Wesley Morgan, were 2-0 winners at Tranmere and moved back

On target for Crewe were Nicky Maynard (2) and Tom Pope.

Cheltenham slipped nearer to the danger zone after losing 2-1 at home to Walsall. Goals from Tommy Mooney and Paul Connor put the Saddlers in the driving seat before Paul Connor scored a consolation goal for the Robins.

Bournemouth continued their run of good form with a fourth successive win, as they beat Rovers 2-1 at the Fitness First Stadium. Goals from Darren Anderton and Jo Kuffour put the Cherries two up before Rickie Lambert pulled one back.

Port Vale were held to a goalless draw by Huddersfield at Vale Park, a result that confirmed their relegation to League Two. They will be joined in the basement division by Luton, following their 2-1 defeat by Brighton at Kenilworth Road, Sam Parkin had given the Hatters the lead before Ian Westlake and Glenn Murray scored to give the Seagulls victory, their first at that venue since April 1934.

Leyton Orient slipped to their fifth consecutive defeat, losing 2-0 at Oldham, where Chris Taylor and Mark Allott were on target for the home side.



Constant changing

The Home International Championship looks set to be re introduced without England, but 50 years ago the talk was of how to get rid of that competition and play less football.

European football was just taking off. and top clubs felt their star players were playing too many games and the popularity of the Home Internationals was on the wane.

The only big crowds were in the games featuring England, with the annual contest against Scotland as the major clash and often the tournament decider.

In 1959/60, the top football League clubs wanted to see a reduction in the number of sides they played against as the leagues were made up of 22 clubs and Rovers finished joint sixth in the old Division Two, but there were no play offs and only the top two were promoted.

Villa and Cardiff went up, with Liverpool missing out in third position while Rovers finished on 47 points, the same as Rotherham. Huddersfield and Charlton.

A 4-0 defeat at Anfield, with three matches left, put paid to the Pirates chances of promotion to the top tier for the first time ever.

Just two years earlier, the old Third Divisions North and South were scrapped and merged into the existing Third and Fourth Divisions.

But yet again the Management

Committee of the Football League had plans for more reorganisation by splitting the competition into five divisions of 20 clubs, while England and Southampton star Mike Channon (who appeared in nine games for the Gas in 1982/83) wanted a structure of 1,000 clubs!

Channon advocated three Premier Divisions and then regionalised divisions North and South right down to Division Eight, which gave a chance for every ambitious club to rise up the pyramid.

League President Joe Richards proposed five divisions of 20 clubs. bringing in eight non league sides including Headington (now called Oxford), and Wigan Athletic..

Richards was also a strong believer of four up and four down, a controversial proposal at the time. He gave as an example that Second Division table of 1959/60. when Rovers finished joint seventh.

Richards said it was an example of how the interest can be killed long before the end of the season:

because it was obvious that Villa and Cardiff were going up to the First Division and the academic question remained as to who would be champions.

The most exciting season the lower two divisions of the league had ever enjoyed was 1957/58, when they had to fight for places in the top half in view of the switch to the new Third and Fourth Divisions. It was not decided until the last day of the season which teams were

> going to be fortunate enough to finish on the right side of the halfway line.

The fact that the management committee was already considering a return to regional sections for the new Fifth Division was that the recent scrapping of the Third North and South had been a failure.

During the first two years of the new set up, a bigger proportion of Southern clubs had won promotion from the new Fourth Division and

more Northern clubs had been relegated from the Third Division. As a result the Fourth had become largely a Northern body and Southern sides like Aldershot. Millwall, Exeter, Gillingham and Crystal Palace were trapped in a section where costs were steadily rising because they had to play so many games in the north and had fewer profitable matches against local rivals.

Joe Richard's new proposal for five divisions did not get through. Yet FA secretary Sir Stanley Rous had wanted to see a Super League of 16 clubs, paying higher wages, employing the best players and coaches, and having regular games against the best foreign teams; how familiar does that sound!

Sir Stanley felt that:

only by an organisation like that would British football begin to regain their rightful place in the world.

If only Sir Stanley could have seen the adverse effect the Premiership has had on our national game he might have changed his mind.

But even then in the 1960's Manchester United manager Matt Busby was complaining that the race for the League title had become a test of endurance rather than skill and called for 18 clubs in all divisions.

Another proposal back then, which is still being talked about today, came from Wolves manager Stan Cullis who wanted a mid season break during the bad weather months of January and February.

Cullis felt that because of the heavy pitches the emphasis in training was too much on stamina work and not enough on ball control. He said:


The Continentals have the advantage of concentrating more on work with the ball.


He told how Ferenc Puskas, the former captain of Hungary turned up at Molineux to train for that famous match between Wolves and Honved in 1954.

Puskas took one look at the heavy mud. kicked a ball about for a couple of minutes and retired to the dressing room saying:

The pitch is not fit for training, let alone playing.

He did not train, but his ball control did not suffer during the match. I wonder what Puskas would have made of our Memorial Stadium playing surface?





Brighton & Hove Albion

The Seagulls' hopes of making the play offs are soaring again after last Saturday's win at Kenilworth Road condemned Luton to the drop.

19 goal leading scorer Nicky Forster missed the game with a knee injury, but two crosses from Dean Cox enabled Ian Westlake and Glenn Murray to secure victory.

Today's visitors must wish they could still call on the fire power of Forster, whom they sold to Brentford in 1996. He hoped to be fit to face Hartlepool last Saturday, along with on loan Ipswich defender Matt Richards.

Another ex Gill we may see next Saturday is central defender Guy Butters, now 38, who spent six years at Priestfield before joining Albion early in the 2002/03 campaign. Westlake is on loan from Leeds for the rest of the season. Dean Wilkins splashed out £300,000 to sign Murray from Rochdale in January. Jonny Dixon, who arrived from Aldershot in January in a £55,000 deal, made his first senior start for Albion against the Hatters in the absence, through illness, of Brighton born striker Jake Robinson. French midfielder Therry Racon, on loan from Charlton, made his Albion debut in the Easter games against Swindon and Nottingham Forest.

Former Australian youth international Paul Reid, a long term absentee due to a cruciate ligament injury, was on the bench a fortnight ago for the first time in three months. Michel Kuipers, number one choice between the posts this term, played one game for Rovers before signing for Albion in July 2000.



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Reserves at Eastville

Tonight's photo was taken during the reserve team game against West Ham, at Eastville, on 16th February 1974.

Central defender Graham Day appears to have won this aerial challenge against two West Ham players, while striker Wayne Powell looks on.

The Hammers won this game 1-0 and the brief match report went as follows.

Failure to turn the chances they created into goals proved costly for Rovers as they tamely surrendered both points in this Football Combination game at Eastville.

Rovers badly missed the finishing of David John, who was surprisingly relegated to the substitutes bench.

John made a belated appearance in the 77th minute, when he replaced centre forward Wayne Powell. West Ham's goal was scored by Yilmes Orhan in the 37th minute. Rovers: Crabtree, Bater, Aitken, Moore, Day, Coombes, Britton, Jones, Powell (John (D)), John (M), Williams (G).

Graham Day, now mine host at the Flowerpot Inn Kingswood, represented Bristol Boys from U-11 through to the U-15's and was playing for Bristol City's 'A' side at the age of 15. The expected offer of an apprenticeship never materialised, however, and he moved on to Bristol St George.

It was Joe Davis, a former Rovers player, who recommended Graham to try his luck at Eastville and, after graduating through the 'A' team and reserves he eventually made his debut against Fulham in March 1975.


From then until 1979 he was a regular in the first team, partnering Stuart Taylor at the heart of defence.

In spite of playing in a struggling Rovers side, though, he also played alongside some of the world's greatest players of the time, thanks to three spells with Portland Timbers, in America. Twice he signed for the Timbers on loan, before finally making the move permanent when former Rovers boss Don Megson paid £40,000 to secure his signature.

During his time in America, he rubbed shoulders with the likes of Pele, Alberto, Best, Cruyff, Muller and Beckenbauer. However it all came to an end with the collapse of the National League and on his return to this country he signed for Forest Green Rovers and appeared for them in the FA Vase Final at Wembley.


He did enjoy a short spell with Bournemouth, at the same time as George Best, but his only appearance for them was in a Hampshire Cup Final before ending his career at Bath City, where he picked up a Somerset Cup medal to go with the Hampshire one and the Gloucester Cup medal he picked up when with Rovers - quite a unique hat trick!


