THE FUTURE IS VERY BRIGHT

_ 00D afternoon welcome to the Memorial Stadium for our game against Swindon Town.

Our last home game, against Exeter, brought us three points, but our performance wasn't up to our normal standards. We

failed to pass the ball to our usual levels which brought a lot of frustration to myself, and the players, because one of the main factors of our progress over the last few years has been passing the ball well. When we don't do that it's very noticeable and it does lead to frustration, which is understandable, but to arind out a result when we weren't playing at our best bodes well for the future.

I don't think we deserved anything at Colchester last week, where we came up against a very organised, strong, and methodical team that we found very difficult to break down and our play going into the final third wasn't up to the level required to create and score goals.

However we did make some progress in our passing, which was better than it was against Exeter, but football is about being good in both boxes. Against Colchester, unfortunately, we weren't good enough in their box to warrant getting anything out of the game.

We are currently seventh in the table and I think there were only two or three occasions last season when we were in the top half of the table, and one of those was the final weekend of the season, so we are pleased with the progress we've made. Obviously expectations rose when we found ourselves third in the league for a number of weeks in September, but we found it tough going when we had a run of games against the top teams in the division.

At the start of the season we identified that embedding ourselves in the top half of the table would signify progress. If we can continue the form we've shown over the first twenty games, we are looking to make it an interesting end to the season with the play offs being a realistic possibility. Certainly we are still looking up, and although the league is very tight, we don't want to feel we have under achieved because of the

> We've been pleased with the progress we've made in League One, in the two years we've been in it, but now we are trying to step up into a group of big teams with recent Premiership history and big budgets. Our aim is to do that, but getting there isn't going to happen overnight. We can't wave a magic wand to get there and

we are trying to do it in a sustainable way, which means steady progress.

We have had some disappointments over the last two months in terms of results and, at times, performances but we feel some of the newer players coming into the squad are making decent progress. With January round the corner, when we will be looking to add a couple of players to the squad, we feel that the future is very bright and that we are still on target with our progress.

It's been a very sad week at the club following the death of former Chairman Ron Craig, after his illness. Ron played a huge part in the Bristol Rovers family for almost 25 years, in a number of capacities, and was a huge supporter of football at all levels of the club. He will be sorely missed by everyone, and we will remember him today with a minute's applause before kick off.

We all send our love and best wishes to his wife Ann, who will be attending the game, on this sad occasion.

Those of you who travelled to Colchester last week will be aware that a one minute's silence was observed in Ron's memory

As the league stands at the moment, there are a lot of clubs looking to consolidate in the play off places. Two or three sides at the top of the table have managed to pull away a little bit, but certainly Swindon and ourselves are in the group trying to sustain a play off place.

That adds to this afternoon's occasion. Games between the clubs are always keenly contested, and over the last two or three years we have

certainly had some tight encounters and no little controversy. Today, though, I think today you will see both teams trying to play football in the right way.

I would like to welcome manager Danny Wilson and his staff to the Memorial Stadium and it will be good to see Danny again. We have come up against his teams on a number of occasions over the last few years, and you can guarantee that his teams do play in the right way.



respects to former Rovers
Chairman and Director and,
above all, Rovers supporter Ron
Craig who passed away last
week.

Current Chairman Nick Higgs led the tributes to Ron, saying; "We were all deeply saddened by the death of our dear friend and colleague Ron Craig. Although we were aware that Ron was ill, nothing can prepare you for the shock of losing someone close to you.

"A lot of wonderful tributes have been paid to Ron this week and I can only add that he was a fantastic man, a great friend and a wonderful colleague.

"I remember, when I joined the Board, that Ron welcomed me with open arms and offered me all the support and advice he could while I got to grips with the workings of the club. I was then fortunate enough to be asked to become his Vice Chairman during his period of Chairman, and we worked very closely together. When I took over as Chairman, Ron was still on hand as a Director to offer me his invaluable knowledge and support.

"His passion and commitment to the club were clear for everyone to see, and he was always at the ground ready to lend a hand or a friendly ear. Although his main roles were with the Youth and Community Departments, he actively supported

everybody in their daily duties. You could always rely on Ron to be there to make the difficult decisions as well as the easy ones.

"Ron was always the first to put his name forward to attend club functions and he was known and well respected by all the fans as a true gentleman with Bristol Rovers at heart. He had a no nonsense, practical approach to problems, but always carried out his role with a smile and a sense of humour.

"Ron will be sadly

missed by all who knew him, and will leave a big hole in the heart of this football club."

Ron first joined the Bristol Rovers Board of Directors in 1986 following the move to Twerton Park, though he had been a Rovers supporter for some thirty years prior to that.

He was always a familiar figure on the team coach for away matches and seldom missed a game.

He became Chairman of the club in April 2007, the day after Rovers had lost to Doncaster Rovers in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy Final at the Millennium Stadium.

That game proved to be the club's last defeat of the season, and they went on to gain promotion via the play offs. Many said that he was a lucky charm and that he had the longest unbeaten run of any Chairman and Ron clearly enjoyed fulfilling the Chairman's role and there was no prouder man than he on that never to be forgotten day at Wembley.

Ron stepped down as Chairman last year after presiding over a very successful period in this club's long history, though he remained a Director of the club.

On his appointment as Chairman, Ron said; "I'm delighted and honoured that my fellow Directors have elected me to be their Chairman.

"However it is not only an honour, but a responsibility, to uphold both the long traditions of our club, to help take it forward, and to make progress as befits a club in a large city like Bristol."

He also spoke of his hopes for the future and of how he would co ordinate the work of his fellow Directors and ended by saying;
"I would ask for your full support in my new job. I promise you that I will do my very best for Bristol Rovers."

It was a promise he fulfilled, not only as Chairman, but in everything he did for Bristol Rovers.

He took what can only be described as a hands on role in helping to develop both the Youth and Community Departments of the Football Club.

His main interest outside of the club was golf and he played the game regularly, and with a passion.

He will be missed greatly his fellow board members, past and present staff and players, and by the many supporters he met at home and away games.

Those who met him whilst he was representing the club at the many meetings he attended on its behalf will also miss him. He was held in the highest regard by Football League and Football Association delegates, as well as his contemporaries from the many other Football League clubs he regularly came into contact with when on club business.

That fact was very much in evidence at the club's own dinner to mark its 125th anniversary in May of this year, when the principal guest, Lord Mawhinney, spoke of

> his regret that Ron was not able to attend and expressed the hope that he would soon be well enough to watch his club in action again.

We all have our own personal memories to remember Ron by, and our thoughts and best wishes go out to his wife Ann and his family and friends at this sad time.

A one minute's applause in Ron's memory will be held prior to kick off this afternoon.

"However we started strongly in the second half and scored two early goals through Stockwell and Staley.







Many of us thought Joe had done enough to win us the game, but Leicester's late burst denied us on the day. It was a great strike, and well deserving of a place on the short list.

The League is very keen that supporters







DOMINIC BLIZZARD

KEEP BELIEVING

AVING started the last two games, midfielder Dominic Blizzard is the first to admit that, in the matches against Exeter and Colchester, we haven't exactly played free flowing football.

However we still did enough to collect all three points against Exeter, though we returned home empty handed from Colchester last Saturday.

"We have to be honest and say that we haven't been anywhere near what I imagine would be our best at all.

"We need to work a lot better on keeping the ball, and getting it and passing it. We can't let other teams dictate how the game is going to go and we have to establish ourselves in the game by playing how we should be playing.

"In our last two games we have probably been second best, in both matches, though we did manage to win the game against Exeter."


The consistency required is still not quite there, perhaps, but if the side could play and pass the ball as they did in the second half at Charlton less than three weeks ago, they shouldn't have too many problems maintaining a top ten position.

"We do need to be doing what we did in the second half at the Valley for longer periods in a game, as that gives you the best chance of winning a football match, but we haven't done that and not got a footbold in the last two games at all. We enjoyed a good spell at Charlton but we need to be doing it consistently and for longer periods."

There are ways of improving things, though

"I think it's just about continuing to work hard and keep believing in ourselves. We need to avoid spells in games when we aren't doing our job, and we can't afford to take our foot off the pedal. We need to get back to basics and be brave, getting on the ball and passing it, and playing for each other and that will make the difference, I think."

We need to remember that we are still seventh in the league and looking up, rather than down, the table. "WE HAVE

"We are in that position, yet we haven't been playing that well. It just shows that had we picked up a few more points recently we could be sitting in third or fourth place, and in a really comfortable position.

"We haven't really performed in the games we've lost but, apart from Leeds and Norwich, we haven't really been outclassed and there's not a massively high standard in the league. We've lost games yet come away thinking the opposition didn't have a lot to offer, either, so it's been very frustrating."

This afternoon's game offers the chance of getting back to winning ways after last week's defeat, and registering a fourth successive home win, but it won't be easy.

"It's almost a local derby, against a side that's doing very well. I'm sure that it will be a very competitive game but it's a chance for us to get ourselves going again and, hopefully, get a good result.

"We go into the game on the back of three home wins and you always want to be strong at home, because it gives you a massive platform to build on. Any points picked up away from home are a bonus, but we fancy our chances at home, where we feel we are a very strong side."

At present he's not playing in his fovoured central midfield role and he admits he's having to learn a new role.

"Because I'm not playing in my natural position, I feel as though I'm only doing half a job for the team but getting more games and minutes on the pitch is a bonus for me.

"Playing out wide, whether that be right or left, is just different for me and the way we play the game here is completely different to what I'm used to It's something I didn't realise, and it's taken me a while to adapt.

"Last season I was more used to having a lot of the ball, whereas I'm not getting that at the moment as we are grinding out results and I'm trying to do a job for the team. Hopefully, the nice flowing football will come in time."

He's confident, though, that the side can remain in the upper reaches of the league.

"We have some decent players here and I don't see why we can't play the football we want to, because I see it in training every day. It just takes a bit of confidence, and self-belief, to be able to do it in a game and while we might be lacking a little bit of that at the moment it will come, along with the results.

"We are approaching a crucial time of the season, when a lot of games are played in a short period. Any team that can get a bit of form going now can find themselves pushing right up the table and it's something we need to remain positive about."


The visitors certainly made a lively start and Carl Regan needed to be alert to glance a Scott Golbourne cross behind for a corner.

The visitors went close to levelling early in the second





■ Jo Kuffour sets off for goal



BETTER THAN LAST SEASON

We would like to extend that run against Swindon and, hopefully, put in a slightly better performance as well.

"Last Saturday, we couldn't get our passing going at all. I think I got the ball

to my feet twice in the whole time I was on the pitch, when nothing went right."

Today's local

him come up against a side managed by Danny Wilson, someone he knows from his time at Hartlepool.

"I've played in a few local encounters in my career, including this fixture of course, and know what to expect. When I storted out there were the 'old firm' games in Glasgow, and Falkirk against Dunfermline was also classed as a local derby. Unfartunately, though, I never got to play for Swansea against Cardiff in my time with the Welsh club.

"Swindon went chead of us last week and, with both teams looking to stay in and around the top six, there's a lot more than local pride at stake in this fixture. They are doing really well this year and, knowing Danny Wilson from my time at Hartlepool, I anticipate that his side will prove to be tough apponents and we are going to have to be on top of our game to get anything from it."

Rovers go into the game in seventh position, better placed than at the same stage last season.

I think people seem to forget that we finished in 11th place last year and that it's a harder league this time around. There are stronger teams in the division this year, and we are actually doing better than we did last season, so we are definitely improving

"You aren't going to go from finishing 11th to challenging in the top three the following season. It's just not going to happen; it's all about progression and, at the moment, we are 7th which is an improvement on last year, so I think we need to be realistic in our expectations."

As we enter a crucial phase of the season, having played most of the teams in the division, it's a good tie to assess how things might turn out.

"Saying that the Christnas and New Year periods are a crunch time is a little

"It depends on your view of the game, and how you want to play it, of course, but I believe if you play football properly you don't need a big man up front. If you play football, the ball will never be in the oir to the front men. We just need two players up front with good footballing ability and a football brain, and I think Jo and I both have that."

MEMBERING RON

7-IEN my father and I took control of Bristol Rovers in 1985 things were as bad as they could get without financially, actually putting the club into receivership.

We were playing at Eastville, the rent had not been paid for five months and we were threatened with being locked out of our traditional home which was 'given away for a pittance' during the 1940's. The playing squad had little or no value, so it was not a question of selling anyone to recoup a transfer fee to ease the mounting debt.

T o make matters worse, we also found that VAT returns

had not been completed for six months, so debt was coming out of the closet from all directions. Indeed the club had not paid anyone for a while, and accounts with our suppliers were being closed down by the hour. It seems the single objective was to funnel all the cash available to pay the players wages and keep the club playing in the Football League.

On top of this mess, the club owed their bankers over £150k in loans, which doesn't seem much money now in football terms. but was a horrendous amount when you didn't have a penny to your name. The first question we asked ourselves was why on earth we had joined the board to take on this task when it was not of our making.

Roy Redman, who now resides in the USA, was the third director on the board and we set about trying to recover the business from a seemingly impossible position. The only asset we had was the Hambrook Training Ground which was in Green Belt and had little or no chance of

We were meeting in the offices of our company secretary, who worked for a major accounting firm in Clifton, and before every board meeting (usually three times a week) he officially advised us we were insolvent. Indeed, it was difficult to see where the next

penny was coming from, when we were notified that a Bristol business man wanted

How should we react to this news, after all the financial state of the club was shrouded in mystery when I joined, and it was still not fully understood when my father came on board as Chairman. But now we had discovered the true position, no one would surely want to invest in a football club in this financial mess?

Ron Craig turned up a few days later. He had a successful engineering business in Bristol. He was advised immediately by our auditors, very bluntly, that the club was insolvent. Roy, Dad and I had already put in large amounts of cash on a regular basis just to keep the club afloat. Why on earth would anyone want to join a business in our position?

Ron understood the situation and we expected him to walk out immediately, but he sat there and said; "When do I start?"

I advised him that as soon as he signed his cheque over, the money would disappear in a black hole and there was very little chance of him seeing it again. This did not deter Ron and he stayed for the meeting and signed over his cheque. Ron wanted to

help the club and be part of it. He realised it was not going to be an easy ride, but he wanted to join three people, who he had never met before, and fight for the future of Bristol Rovers Football Club.

The sale of the Hambrook Training Ground, for twice its value, to a group of local business men, and a move to Twerton Park Bath, were, if you excuse the pun, ground breaking decisions for a Football League Club, but they worked, and with due prudence the club paid its debts and stayed in business.

After ten years playing away from our home city we returned to Bristol. Without Ron Craia's help it may never have happened. Ann Croig

also played her part, along with my mother, in providing the food at Twerton Park to save on caterina costs.

Ran never missed many matches in his association with Bristol Rovers, always travelling with the team, and he was a great ambassador for the club at away games and at Football League meetings.

Ron was particularly interested in the youth team and was in charge of that department for many years. He would always speak his mind and his judament of people was rarely wrong. He did not suffer fools gladly, but if you needed help, Ron would never let you down.


When I decided to step down as chairman, I was delighted when Ron offered to take my place, as he deserved the opportunity, and our promotion via the play offs at Wembley was a fitting tribute to Ron's long term service with Bristol Rovers.

Ron, the board and all of our supporters thank you. We are eternally grateful for your support and your dedication in helping to safeguard the future of our beloved Bristol Rovers. We will remember you and we will treasure your friendship.



SOMETHING FOR OUR VISITORS ... A RETURN FOR THE DOG?

DIRATES' defender DANNY COLES will be missing today after receiving his fifth yellow card of the campaign at Colchester last Saturday.

The absence of COLES could mean a return for PAT BALDWIN, who is on loan from the Essex club and was not allowed to play in last week's game. COLIES, once with Bristol City, made his move from Hull permanent in January last year after an initial loan spell. Confusion reigned over the availabilty of JEFF HUGHES, a former Lincoln City midfielder, who has been playing at left back in the absence through injury of AARON LESCOTT. HUGHES left Sincil Bank for Crystal Palace in July 2007 and later went to Peterborough on loan. A later loan spell here was blighted by injury but he came here permanently in June last year. His booking at Colchester was thought to be his fifth of the campaign but the yellow card he received at Southampton in September turned out to be a case of mistaken identity and was withdrawn. HUGHIES could occupy his more accustomed left wing role this afternoon, allowing LESCOTT to return at left back.

Dubbed 'The Dog' by former manager IAN ATKINS for his tenacious qualities in midfield, LESCOTT, who joined us from Stockport, initially on loan, in March 2004, has been sidelined since the end of October. BALDWIN could be re instated alonaside STEVE ELLIOTT in the centre of defence. Baldwin made his debut for Rovers, in last month's win against Gillingham, at right back as CARL REGAN was suspended. REGAN, a summer signing from MK Dons, began his career with Everton before moving to Barnsley in June 2000. He made 37 League appearances for the Tykes before switching to Hull. Loan spells at Chester and Drovlsden were followed by a return to Deeside and a switch to Macclesfield 15 months later.

ELLICTT, formerly of Derby County and Blackpool, has been on the bench of late but was recalled for last week's visit to Essex. He was preferred to former Cardiff City defender BYRON ANTHONY, a former Welsh U-21 international, who

last featured at Charlton. Central defender ALIEX KITE, 20, son of Rovers' physic and former keeper PI-IIL, is currently on loan at Paulton Rovers, while 21 year old keeper MIKE GRIEEN is at Gloucester City on a season long loan.

Last month HUGHES and former Filton College scholar CHRIS LINES each scored in three

consecutive games. LINES' form during November resulted in a shortlisting for the League One Player of the Month award, but the accolade went to Huddersfield's WILLIAMS. DOMINIC ROBBIE BLIZZARD, a close season signing from Stockport, played eight games for MK Dons during a two month loan spell from Watford in 2007, 20 year old BEN SWALLOW has emerged from the youth ranks to make an impact on the left flank. He replaced BLIZZARD after an hour of last Saturday's game, and a later substitution saw ANDY WILLIAMS take the place of MARKWRIGHT. Often used on the right wing, WILLIAMS, now off the transfer list, spent most of the 2008/09 campaign on loan back at Hereford after his July 2007 transfer from the Bulls. WRIGHT, a deadline day signing from Brighton, left Milton Keynes for the Seagulls in the summer but was unable to settle on the south coast. He started as a trainee at Walsall, Skipper STUART CAMPBELL was a trainee at Leicester before LENNIE


against Exeter last Tuesday week.



UR Wiltshire neighbours replaced the Gas in the final play off position in last Saturday's table, with a 3-2 win over Leyton Orient.

It was the Robins fourth win on the bounce, fuelling expectations that DANNY WILSON's rebuilt squad has clicked into gear.

The departure of League One Golden Boot joint winner SIMON COX in the summer left a huge gap to fill. But there have been encouraging signs that the



search could be over. Former bricklayer CHARLIE AUSTIN was plucked from Wessex Premier League Poole Town in October. He scored the only goal of the game just three minutes into his full debut, at Brunton Park, three weeks ago. He then hit the winner over Huddersfield Town, and a double against Orient, to take his current tally to four goals from three starts. AUSTIN was working for his for his dad's building company and knocking in the goals for Poole Town. He bagged 46 goals in 46 games for The Dolphins last season and another 18 goals in 11 this term. A transfer embargo put paid to a move to League Two Bournemouth over the summer.

BILLY PAYNTER will probably partner AUSTIN, and will be the only survivor from the Robins starting eleven at the Mem last November. Last Saturday BIEN HUTCHINSON, on loan from Celtic, did not even get a place on the bench. DANNY WARD, LEE PEACOCK and ALEX REVELL were the preferred attacking options.

PAYNTER was a Port Vale trainee, and played over 100 games before moving to Hull City in November 2005. He moved to Southend United in August 2006, and went on loan to Bradford City in January 2007. Here he was in instant success, partnering several different strikers and scoring a sensational thirty yard volley at Ashton Gate as the Bantams won 3-2. He was transferred to Swindon in August 2007. WARD left the Leeds United Academy in 2007 to sign for Bolton Wanderers, and has made two brief Premier League substitute appearances this season. He is in the third week of a one month loan deal.

PEACOCK was a Carlisle trainee who made over 80 appearances for the Cumbrians until transferring to Mansfield Town in October 1997. He moved to Manchester City two years later, but could not command a regular place and moved to Bristol City in August 2000. After 175 games for City, he moved to Sheffield Wednesday in 2004, then to Swindon in January 2006. REVELL, who joined Swindon at the start of September on a six month loan from Southend United, has also played for Cambridge United, Braintree Town and Brighton.

A settled midfield has recently had to be disrupted after former Watford winger



MANAGER'S PROFILE... DANNY WILSON

ANNY Wilson the Northern Ireland international midfielder made over 600 appearances with Bury, Chesterfield, Nottingham Forest, Brighton, Luton, Sheffield Wednesday and Barnsley.

He won the Littlewoods Cup with Luton in 1988 and the Rumbelows Cup with Sheffield Wednesday in 1991.

At Barnsley he began his managerial career by taking the difficult step from player to player manager. He guided the Tykes to the Premiership in 1997 then, after relegation the following year, accepted the poisoned chalice at Sheffield Wednesday.

He could not halt the Owls demise, and departed Hillsborough in March 2000

with relegation inevitable.

Bristol City were his next employers where he enjoyed four successful years, twice coming third in the League only each time to suffer heartbreak at the Play Off stage. Danny took charge of MK Dons in December 2004. He steered them to safety on the final day of his first season, but was dismissed in May 2006 after their relegation.

In June he joined Hartlepool and achieved immediate success, winning promotion to League One in his first season. However, after two and a half years he was surprisingly sacked as Pools fell into the bottom half of the table.

Ten days later, on Boxing Day 2008, Wilson was announced as Manager of Swindon Town.

AT THE MEMORIAL STADIUM

ANTHONY MCNAMEE decided to join Norwich City on loan. The regular trio of JONATHAN DOUGLAS, JON-PAUL McGOVERN and SIMON FERRY are likely to be joined by ALAN SHEEHAN

MICHAELTIMLIN, ALANO'BRIEN and CRAIG EASTON all remained on the bench last Saturday. Former Eastleigh winger MARK MARSHALL made eight starts while on loan at Hereford United and returned at the end of November to sit on the bench during the FA Cup win at Wrexham. Teenagers LLCYD MACKLIN and KURT HAMMONDS are recovering from injuries, and unlikely to be available until the New Year.

Republic of Ireland international DOUGLAS joined Blackburn Rovers from Monaghan United in 2000 but did not make his Premier League debut until November 2002. He went on loan to Chesterfield, Blackpool, Gillingham and, in August 2005, for a whole season with Leeds United before making the move permanent twelve months later. His 100 plus league appearances for Leeds include the Yorkshire club's 3-0 win at the Mem in September 2007 and a 2-2 draw here in March 2009. He signed for Swindon Town on a free transfer four months later. McGCVIERN was a Celtic trainee who played on loan for Sheffield United before transferring to Livingston in 2003. PAUL STURROCK took him to Sheffield Wednesday a year later. He was ever present during the Owls promotion to the Coca Cola Championship in his first season at Hillsborough. He moved to MK Dons in 2006 then Swindon in 2007.

FERRY was also a Celtic trainee. He was a member of the Scotland U-19 side that reached the final of the European Championships in 2006, and made his senior debut in green hoops a few months later during a pre season tour of Poland. After missing almost three years with various injuries, he made the bench for many of Celtic's games in the 2008/09 run in and agreed a loan move to Swindon in the summer. SHEEHAN joined Leicester City from Belvedere FC in 2003 and made 20 league starts before joining Leeds United in January 2008. He has already appeared at the Mem this term, when Oldham went down 0-1 in September. His loan spell with the Latics expired at the beginning of November,





and a new loan deal was agreed between Leeds United and today's visitors three weeks later.

TIMLIN was a trainee at Fulham. who had loan spells with Scunthorpe United and Doncaster Rovers before joining the Robins for the first time on loan in November 2006 and returning on a permanent contract in November 2008. Republic of Ireland international winger C'ERIEN made his league debut against the Gas while on loan at Carlisle United in October 2006. It was quite an occasion, as he scored after only seven minutes, and that remains the only senior goal of his career to date. He had joined Newcastle United's Academy from St Joseph's Boys club in Dublin, and made his debut for the Magpies in January 2006, after completing his loan at Brunton Park. He moved to Hibernian in 2007 and made over 50 appearances for the Edinburgh club before moving to Swindon this summer. EASTON played over 200 games for Dundee United, and 36 for Livingston before making his Football League debut for Leyton Orient in August 2005. He arrived at The County Ground in June 2007.

A settled defence has been constructed with previously out of favour KEVIN AMANKWAAH, reunited with his former boss at Ashton Gate, becoming a fixture at right back joined by four summer signings. Scotland internationals SCOTT CUTHBERT from Celtic, and GORDON GREER from Doncaster Rovers have been introduced into the centre of defence. international LESCINEL Haitian JEAN-FRANCOIS has established a regular place on the left and in the nets is **DAVID LUCAS** from Leeds United.

LUCAS spent ten years with Preston North End, two with Sheffield Wednesday and a short period at Barnsley before joining The Whites in September 2007. His deputy is former Margate keeper PHIL SMITH signed from Crawley Town in July 2006.

AMANKWAAH was a trainee with Bristol City, and made his debut in March 2000 at Oldham. After loan periods at Torquay and Cheltenham he joined Yeovil Town in 2005 and transferred to Swansea City in 2006. He was released by the Swans and became a Robin again in July 2008. CUTHRERT came through the ranks at Celtic Park and captained the Scotland side that included current team mate SIMON FERRY at the finals of the UEFA U-19 Championships in 2006. He joined St. Mirren on a season long loan last term, and signed for Swindon in July.

Robins skipper GREER started his career with Clyde, and moved to Blackburn Rovers in 2001. He made just one Worthington Cup appearance at Ewood Park and went on loan to Stockport County before returning to Scotland in 2003. In three seasons with Kilmarnock he played over 100 times, until moving south again with Doncaster Rovers. But after ten league games he joined Swindon in January 2009. JEAN-FRANCOIS has also played in Scotland. During 2006 he was on loan at Falkirk and in 2008 on trial with Aberdeen. In France, he has played for the reserve teams of Paris Saint Germain and Sedan and in Lique 2 for current French Cup holders Guingamp.

Former skipper HASNEY ALJOFREE has recently made a long awaited return to action for the reserves, but needs time to regain his full fitness. The former Plymouth and Dundee United defender had been out of action for over 10 months with an ankle injury. Nigerian U-20 international YINKA CASAL who was signed from Dutch club Cambuur in 2008 is recovering from a knee operation and SEAN MORRISON is on loan at Southend, so former trainees CALLUM KENNEDY and NATHAN THOMPSON provide defensive cover.



LEIGH EDWARDS profiles seven leading post war Swindon Town goalkeepers

NORMAN UPRICHARD

Northern Ireland international goalkeeper Norman Uprichard gained the first five of his 18 caps while at Swindon Town. Initially with Distillery, he moved via Arsenal to Swindon in November 1949. He contested a first team slot with Sam Burton. helping Swindon reach the FA Cup Fifth Round in 1951/52 and making 73 League appearances prior to joining Portsmouth in November 1952. Starring as they finished third in the top flight in 1954/55, he moved to Southend United in July 1959 and later played for Hastings United. He became a publican, then ran the Queen's University bar in Belfast and has since settled back in Hastings in retirement.



PIETIER DOWNSBOROUGH

Goalkeeper Peter Downsborough was ever-present in Swindon Town's 1968/69 promotion and League Cup 'double' success. Signing professional for hometown Halifax in September 1960, he moved to the County Ground in an exchange deal involving Bill Atkins in August 1965. He was ever present as Swindon reached the FA Cup Sixth Round in 1969/70 and made 274 League appearances prior to joining Bradford City in November 1973. Twice ever present, he starred as they reached the FA Cup Sixth Round in 1975/76 and won promotion in 1976/77. He had a testimonial match in May 1980 and later worked at a power station, settling in Stainland.

JIM BARRON

Goalkeeper Jim Barron starred as Swindon Town took eventual winners West Ham to an FA Cup Fourth Round replay in 1974/75. Initially with Newcastle West End, he joined Wolverhampton Wanderers in November 1961 and had a spell as Peter Bonetti's understudy at Chelsea before joining Oxford United in March 1966. He was an important figure in their 1967/68 Third Division title triumph, moving to Nottingham Forest in July 1970. Ever present in 1970/71, he joined Swindon in August 1974 and made 79 League appearances prior to joining Peterborough United in August 1977. He managed Cheltenham Town and has since held various coaching posts.

KENNY ALLEN

Tall goalkeeper Kenny Allen was a key figure in Swindon Town's 1985/86 Fourth Division title triumph. He had spells with Tow Law, Hartlepool and Hellenic prior to joining Bath City in September 1973, starring in their 1977/78 Southern League title success. Moving to AFC Bournemouth in August 1978, he helped win promotion in 1981/82 and reunited with David Webb at Torquay United in March 1984. He joined Swindon in September 1985 and made 45 League appearances before rejoining Torquay in December 1986. Ever present as they were Fourth Division play off finalists in 1987/88, he also appeared for them in the 1989 Sherpa Van Trophy final.

FRASER DIGBY

England U-21 goalkeeper Fraser Diaby featured in Swindon Town's 1992/93 First Division play off final triumph. Signing professional for Manchester United in April 1985, he reunited with Lou Macari at Swindon in September 1986 and appeared in their 1986/87 promotion success. He was ever present in 1988/89, starring as the Robins qualified for the play offs in consecutive seasons and were Coca-Cola Cup semi



finalists in 1994/95. Also featuring in their 1995/96 Second Division title triumph, he had a testimonial in July 1997 and played 417 League games, moving to Crystal Palace in August 1998, then Barry Town, QPR and Kidderminster Harriers.

BART GRIEMINK

Big Dutch goalkeeper Bart Griemink missed just one match for Swindon Town in 2001/02. Initially with WK Emmen in his native country, he joined Birmingham City in November 1995 and was a League Cup semi finalist that season. He followed Barry Fry to Peterborough United in October 1996 and featured in their 1999/2000 promotion campaign, moving to the County Ground in July 2000 after a loan spell. A fine shot stopper, he made a significant contribution to Swindon's improved results and made 124 League appearances for the Robins before joining Southend United in July 2004. His playing career was ended by knee problems in June 2006.

RI-IYS IEVANS

England U-21 goalkeeper Rhys Evons starred as Swindon Town qualified for the Second Division play offs in 2003/04. A former Chelsea trainee, he turned professional in February 1999 but failed to make an impact at Stamford Bridge and was loaned to Bristol Rovers, QPR and Leyton Orient before joining hometown Swindon in July 2003. He missed just one match in 2004/05 and made 118 League

appearances while at the County Ground. Moving to Blackpool in July 2006, he featured in their 2006/07 promotion campaign and joined Millwall in January 2008. He returned to Bradford City in August 2008 and missed just one match last season and is now back with Bristol Rovers.

FOOTBALL? IT'S JUST A RELIGION!

AST weekend, a disgruntled
Rovers fan called in to
Saturday Sport and, after
cataloguing his woes concerning
Rovers' current situation, he
then declared; "What have we
done for the last 40 years?"

Quite how lying seventh in the table can cause anyone to have that much grievance, I was still intrigued by his views. He was quite unhappy about players and team selection but from this stemmed the bigger picture of what Rovers had achieved - or not, as the case may be - in his time as a Gashead.

Admittedly our history is barely peppered with success stories; an awful lot of clubs only have intermittent success throughout the decades, though. Judging what we have done in the Trollope years alone, however, we have gone from 19th in League Two to seventh in League One, where we are today. That's a whopping 36 places in four years, which, objectively, is great progress. We have also had two memorable cup runs, in the Johnstone's Paints Trophy and the FA Cup since then. So in our recent history, at least, we have done well.

The caller went on to say that, throughout the years, we have seen the likes of Fulham and Blackburn become big clubs. Yes, they've had money to help, but they'd become established top flight teams.

True. But arguably, we've survived difficult times whereas bigger clubs have slipped down the divisions, such as Nottingham Forest, Norwich and Leeds. So overall, we haven't had much to shout about in the last 125 years, but equally, things could be a lot, lot worse right now.

Let's be honest, success is not what you or I come to the Mem for. Of course, we would love Rovers to be doing even better, but would we be happier? Just listening to the regular moaners of the City persuasion on the radio shows that being in a higher division doesn't make you more chuffed with your team's progress. Yes, we could say that City fans

are never happy, ha ha; but we're just the same. We moan and grumble and criticise. Most football fans, sadly, do.

Football offers us so much more than whether we pick up three points on a Saturday or who scored what goal. I'm not a Rovers supporter for the hope that one day they'll be one of the biggest clubs in the Premier League. Sure, a few Europa League jaunts might be fun, but, let's be honest, it's not going to happen anytime soon. Dreaming of Premier League and European success, to me, is like dreaming of winning the lottery. A nice idea that's very unlikely to come true.

No. Football offers us so much more.

I was interested in a recent interview with Delia Smith where she drew on the comparison between football and religion. Talking to Aled Jones on Radio 2, she spoke of her perception of football as offering a sense of community; "I do think that football has a lot to commend it" she said, "because it is the one place where you find in its entirety, the whole meaning and purpose of community... you have little babies, ninety nine year olds all together... becoming a community."

Surely, whether we acknowledge it or not, that is one of the things that draws us to our football teams? We love our club but it's other human needs that fuel our sense of belonging to one special team - and that is sharing our club with others. Delia, famous of course for her role at Norwich as well as her 40 years as a cookery writer, went on to say, "I feel very much joined to all other football supporters everywhere in the world. You seem to belong to this wonderful community of people and what you share together is the deepest pain and the greatest joy. I happen to believe that joy is greater than pain and it always makes up for the pain in the end. It's a good way to be a community and to experience joy and hope together." I could not agree more. Our community grows at times of success - 40,000 at Wembley for example - and shrinks to a handful at some away games, but each gathering offers the community environment.

When asked whether being inside a football stadium was like being in church, Delia responded; "Well, it is exactly the same. I feel that if you are worshipping your football team, then you are worshipping God anyway as it is part of human life."

Her notion that football gives us our community and that it is our church could not be more apparent than when we come together to sing, or to remember during a minute's silence.

Today, we will do both, for the late Ron Craig, who will be sadly missed here at Rovers. Let's let our Gashead community come together today to remember Ron and to celebrate his life with a Rovers win.







Today marks our last meeting with Swindon in this decade, so we look to our first meetings with The Robins in the decade for our featured track, 'Beautiful Day' was the fourth chart topping single for the Irish rock band, where it spent just one week at number one in October 2000. It would also land them three Grammys including the coveted award for Record of the Year in 2001.

It was in the season of 2000/2001 where the clubs competed in the old Division

One and the first game took place at The County Ground on 21st October 2000, the date of our featured track. Rovers won 3-1 that day, and took a 3-0 first half lead with goals from Marcus Andreasson, Mickey Evans and an own goal from Martin Williams, Swindon scored a consolation goal from a last minute penalty scored by Mark Robertson. The return game at The Mem on, 24th March 2001, was a goalless draw, and Rovers were reduced to ten men late in the second half when Simon Bryant received a red card. The season would end in disaster for Rovers as we were relegated to the bottom division after finishing in 21st place. Swindon survived the threat of relegation by finishing one place above, us in 20th, with just a single point more to their tally.



Before the kick off this afternoon, we will all stand and pay tribute to one of our own who is no longer with us; Ron Craig.

Now I cannot regale you with stories of my life with Ron Craig, because we were not close friends.

I knew him, as many supporters did. He was Ron Craig, Bristol Rovers fan, all round decent bloke.

I got to know him, in the very loosest sense, when I was invited to help out at the Rovers with fundraising events and writing for the programme.

I had known of him for many years. Many people spoke of the work he did for Bristol Rovers when he joined the board. The consensus was that but for the likes of Ron Craig, the Rovers may never have survived the years at Bath City. I don't think that is, in any way, an exaggeration.

As the new millennium came and went, our club slipped into the fourth tier of English football. Just when it couldn't get any worse, it got worse.

The fans were revolting and the bars were not always a good place to be, before or after the match.

The directors were, as ever, to blame, even though they never kicked a ball. Some of them became real hate figures as the club sank lower.

As the directors sought refuge and, more importantly, the safety of the boardroom (and who could blame them?) one man still went into the bars to talk to fans.

Not only did Ron walk the bars before the match, he would usually do the same thing after the match too.

I thought the same thing; that bloke has got some neck!

Hardly a towering glant, Ron would face the brickbats, deflect and even absorb the anger and then move on



somewhere else to face it all again.

And he knew my name.

If I had been him, my terrible memory would have seen me creating all manner of problems as I forgot people's names more often than I remembered them!

Even after yet another dismal defeat, Ron would leave me totally convinced it was just another blip! We'd be far better next week! If anyone else had said it, I'd have asked to count their marbles, but if he said it, well it must have been true.

He always supported the fundraising events too.

In the early years of this century, there was a skittles match in the Bristol Room where all the great and good were in attendance. We even managed to persuade Nathan Ellington to come along and play.

Now Nathan Ellington could do a lot of things with a football but I am afraid he could not hold a candle to Ron Craig on the skittle alley!

Although on the field this was a terrible time for the Rovers, off it we seemed to be all in it together. Through my sepia toned memory, I can still see Ron bowling the ball to its inevitable conclusion, encouraged by his playing partner Denis Dunford.

There was a lot of noise that night and an awful lot of laughter.

As a mere terrace dweller, I have little first hand knowledge of what directors at a football club do. I am auessina that, like a queen queens, a director directs! But people who know far more than I do, say he directed an awful lot!

I have friends at the Centre of Excellence, where Stewart Naughton grooms the boys destined to wear the blue and white quarters. Ron took a very active interest in the youth department and you could be sure that if there was a special talent coming through

Ron would have marked his card!

There were times, in recent years, when friendships at Bristol Rovers were strained and even broken.

By now, Ron had achieved the position of club chairman, a position I know filled him with great pride.

I wrote a private letter to him and to my surprise he wrote back very quickly; a letter of conciliation, for sure, but also one of blunt honesty.

Several months later, I attended a cricket match at the County Ground and who should wave at me but Ron Craig, who was with a party that included Paul Trollope.

The first thing he said was; "Did you get my letter?"

Now and again, I would bump into Ron and his lovely wife Ann, often by the 'deli' at Sainsburys, and he would always have the time to talk about his beloved Rovers.

After one such meeting, my partner said; "Who was that man? He was very nice!"

She was right about that, as she is right about most things.

If someone like me who knew Ron a little bit can fill a page with memories, just think what his close friends and family could do!

Thanks for everything, Ron. Rest in peace.



MHEN he looks back on his career, it's unlikely that Steve Elliott will recall his 200th league start for the club with as much fondness as his first game in the blue and white quarters.

That first match, against Mansfield at Field Mill, marked the only substitute appearance made by the central defender and ended in a 2-1 win for a side then managed by Ian Atkins. That game was played on 7th August 2004, while his 200th league start came last Saturday at Colchester.

"I don't think I'll remember too much about it, as it wasn't a particularly good game. It was just very disappointing, to be honest," said Steve earlier this week.

idy Boothroyd told The A Colchester Gazette he felt the U's display against Rovers "was one of their best since he took over as manager in September."

He said; "It was good to get back to winning ways, especially in the manner in which we did it.

"It was as good a performance as we have had this year and we played football. We did the right things at the right time and I thought that we played some terrific stuff in their half, as well.

"People want us to play sexy football and so do I, but you can't play sexy football in November when the pitch is wet - you have to play both ways.

"I've always found that it's best to win first - you get the style and efficiency afterwards and I thought that we got a great balance."

Boothroyd, the former Rovers' full back told The Gozette: "We've shown what we can be like when we're on our game.

"The players have set standards and now I can measure them up to that on a regular basis. The game was a fair reflection of what we're trying to do here. We're trying to attack teams and to give them problems and get behind them."

Paul Trollope told The Bristol Evening Post that he thought Rovers' attacking display was "the poorest of the season so far" after they suffered their fifth away defeat on the trot at Colchester.

And the manager acknowledged that the Pirates will look to the January transfer window to beef up their front line after they barely managed a shot in the 1-0 weekend reverse in Essex.

Once Colchester took a first half lead

through Kevin Lisbie, Rovers never looked like getting back into the game.

"We were very poor in the final third - in terms of creating chances, probably the poorest we've been all season," admitted Trollope. "I don't think their goalkeeper had a shot to save, which shows what we produced in that area of the pitch.

"At times we produced some very good defending and passed the ball quite well. But at no stage in the game were we good enough to create or score a goal.

"It's not been a problem all season, but when we got into some good areas in and around the box, we had a catalogue of poor of decisions, poor movement and poor quality.

"We've got what's available at the moment - January is around the corner and that situation may change," he said,

The Exeter Express and Echo had feared that Marcus Stewart would face a "hostile reception" when he faced Rovers at the Memorial Stadium.

But the Devon newspaper underestimated Gasheads who gave 'Stewey' a generous round of applause when he came on as sub. It was the first time I have seen a player applaud the opposition fans which to his credit he did although rather sheepishly.

Stewart had told the Express and Echo in the build up to the game; "There are Rovers fans who appreciate what I did and I always gave my all. I did a professional job when I was there. I

haven't been back to Rovers since I left. They were at Twerton Park back then and I am glad they are back in Bristol.

"The stadium might have changed, but the people behind the scenes haven't.

"People say I am a City fan, and I am a City fan, but I want what's best for Bristol because I am a Bristolian and the more teams we have from this part of the world

playing at a higher level, the better - and that includes Rovers.

"I support City - I did as a kid - but I support Rovers too and I always look out for their results and would never wish anything bad on them.

"I would never want them to lose. I am sure there are City fans who do, but I am not one of them. The time I had there was fantastic and I loved it. I came through the youth ranks and the managers looked after me.

"They gave me the morals in the game I have today and made me the player I am. That is something I will never forget.

"I would never have a go at Rovers - they are the club I joined as a kid because I felt they had the better vouth system. Maybe if I had joined City I would have had the same career. I don't know."

Darryl Duffy's goal just about got Rovers across the winning line but Exeter boss Paul Tisdale told the Express and Echo; "I think it would be hard to argue that we weren't the better side on the night.

"Ultimately we lost the game and didn't score but we created a lot of half chances, one or two good chances and we controlled the game. But the black and white of it was we lost, but it's very hard for me to go away today unhappy. You can't be dictated to by results too much and I'm very pleased with the way we played. I'm disappointed we didn't get at least a draw but that's life."

OCAL interest in the FA Cup is now all but over following the Second Round derby at Twerton Park and the subsequent Third Round draw which was to prove so unkind to the winners!




It was certainly a fresh start for the club and required careful preparation. Sixty-year-old club chairman George Humphreys made the first move by appointing Ben Hall, in July 1920, as Rovers' first full time manager. Alf Homer, stepping down from managerial duties, became the club secretary, a post he was to hold for a further eight years.

Hall had enjoyed a successful playing career as a centre half with Grimsby, Derby, Leicester Fosse and South Shields and a post war spell as trainer at Huddersfield preceded his move to Eastville.

His was the task of creating a side to represent Rovers in league action and building a team spirit worthy of the club. Four regular players from 1919/20, club captain Steve Sims, Joe Walter, Ellis Crompton and Bill Palmer, as well as emerging goalkeeper players Whatley, became the backbone of the side.

In all. eleven Southern Leggue players reappeared for Rovers in the Football League, Bill Panes, who had broken into the side at left back, formed a full back partnership with Jock Bethune, a Glaswegian who had gained considerable experience in Division Two with Barnsley and was to represent England at indoor bowls between 1936 and 1938.

At half back, David Steele was joined at

the end of 1919/20 by Scotsman David Kenny and, on the eve of the new season, by Derby County's Harry Boxley. Homer's last signings, inside forwards Bill Bird and Joe Norton, a former Manchester United player, were joined shortly before the new season by inside right Harold Bell. Another

former Barnsley player, Bell was to play in the inaugural league game and on only one further occasion in his sole season at Eastville.

Before the season started, Humphreys held a special meeting to introduce Hall. At this occasion, he was also able to inform the gathering that the club was now out of debt. He had paid for the Eastville ground in full and the club now owned nineteen acres of land, including property right up to the famous Thirteen Arches railway bridge, which overlooked the ground until its demolition in May 1968.

The club was also planning to dispose of striped shirts and play in white tops with navy blue shorts, a kit to which Rovers were to adhere to for their opening decade in the Football League. Hall made one additional signing during the season, that of wing half George Gane.

A Bristolian by birth, Gane had played league football north and south of the border, once commanding an alleged transfer fee of £750, a world record at the time. He had moved into non league football and, though now aged 34, was able to make one final league appearance in the 2-2 draw at home to Norwich City.

and Swindon have been feisty affairs in recent years, and with both teams in and around the play off places, don't be surprised if this afternoon's game continues the trend.

Only those with a long memory had any fond recollections of matches with our Wiltshire rivals until an unforgettable sun kissed afternoon at the Mem in April 2007

Paul Trollope knew that in order to sneak into the top seven, Rovers really needed to beat Swindon and then hope for Stockport (who held the final play off place with a week of the season to go) to slip up. Equally, however, Paul Sturrock's side was looking to clinch promotion in front of a boisterous travelling army who had travelled down the M4 hoping to secure an instant return to League One.

Without looking up any facts from the day, I simply remember a fantastic Rovers performance, with Steve Elliott and Byron Anthony ensuring the ex City 82 duo of Christian Roberts and Lee Peacock caused about as much trouble as choir boys after a glass of ginger beer.

But the highlight of the day was of course Rickie Lambert's dream goal, the type us lesser mortals fantasise about scoring in a kickabout with mates, let alone in a game of such magnitude. Andy was commentating that day, and he was in his element with some wonderfully spontaneous lines such as "Scouse Heaven Mark II" (referring to Lambo's winner against City two months earlier), and the beautifully alliterative summary "Sturrock stuffed!". There was also an X-rated prefix to " ... get in there" at the time of the goal which came out on the soundtrack even though he moved the microphone away from his mouth. The Gordon Ramsavesque uttering had to be erased with some careful audio editing during the compilation of the season's DVD, Sixth Sense.

Rovers secured a glorious win, Stockport were held to a draw at home, and for only the second time that season, Trolls was about to begin a week in one of the play

off places. (The other time had been after Lambo had scored the winner on his return to Rochdale in January). There was still a huge task ahead with a trip to another team about to be automatically promoted, Hartlepool, but Rovers' fate was finally in their own hands and that proved vital, as any Stockport fan who cheered their meaningless five goals at Darlington on the same day will testify.

That wonderful finale to the campaign was only just over two and a half years ago, which should be remembered when people criticise the performance of the current sauad. Yes, we would all like to have seen a few more clean sheets this season, an instant replacement for Rickie Lambert and five away defeats in a row has to be seen as a disappointment. However, with a visit to struggling Tranmere to come after today's massive match, Rovers have a great chance to go into the Christmas programme as a top six team. If we can hang in there until we have the chance to strengthen the sauad in January, we could have another grandstand finish to a season, just as when Rickie dazzled in the sunshine with that moment of genius at the Blackthorn End.

Then, once the domestic campaign is over, we can all look forward to what proves to be a spectacular World Cup. I am not a daily reader of The Sun, but I often read a copy on a Saturday, and despite the newspaper's questionable integrity they have the best headline writers in British journalism. They struck gold again by

illustrating our Group C opponents as:

■ England ■ Algeria ■ Slovenia ■ Yanks.

Although USA are a respectable outfit these days, and a far cry from the rabble of no hopers that inflicted England's most infamous World Cup defeat in 1950, you have to say that if they are our strongest opponents then it is a terrific draw.

Algeria upset the odds by winning a play off against Africa's best team for the last four years, Egypt, but I think Fabio Capello would prefer to face them than the Ivory Coast, Didier Droaba and all. Likewise, Slovenia did brilliantly to oust Russia in a head to head, but again we'd take them over even an off colour Portugal or France. England are therefore hot favourites to win the section, and should that be the case, John Terry and Rio Ferdinand could be shadowing Chris Dickson in the second round, if his Ghana team can clinch runners up spot in Group D after facing Germany, Serbia and Australia. It should be quite a summer

Finally, I must pay my respects to former Rovers chairman Ron Craig, who sadly died last week. Ron was one of the brave directors who helped to keep the club alive in the dark days soon after leaving Eastville, and I express my sincere condolences to his wife Ann, a truly charming lady, and the rest of his family at this difficult time.

On that sad note, may I wish you all a very Merry Christmas, and hope the boys deliver three more points in Ron's memory today.

Christmas sees the Gas travel north to face lowly Tranmere Rovers.

After finishing in a respectable 7th place at the end of last season yet missing out on the play offs, a slide in form during the current campaign has seen Tranmere win just five games in 20, with John Barnes being removed as manager in the process. After a disappointing 2-0 loss to the Scouse Rovers in the previous game at Prenton, the Gas look well placed to be able to snatch all three points this time around.

Prenton Park can be found from the M6/M56 by joining the M53 and exiting at Junction 4. Take the B5151 Mount Road turning via the fourth exit of the roundabout, and you will find the ground is signposted from hereon in. After around 2 and a half miles you will enter Storeton Road, and by turning into Prenton Road West, the 17,000 seater stadium should become visible to your right.

There is a good size car park at the ground, and users of this facility will incur a £4 charge. Street parking is generally not advised, as there is a strict residential parking scheme in the neighbouring roads surrounding the stadium, so don't get caught out. If you opt for the train, the closest stations are Rock Berry and Birkenhead Central, however both are a sizeable walk at around 15-20 minutes from each.

The ground is favourably located amongst many local amenities. If you are looking for a hostelry prior to kick off, the Prenton Park Hotel is just 20 yards away from the visting turnstiles, and is usually popular with away fans. Alternatively, The Mersey Clipper (behind the main stand) and The Sportsman's Arms (on Prenton Road East) are both a short walk away. Alcohol is also served within the ground itself, however if you are in need of something to eat, there are many restaurants and takeaways in the local vicinity.

The 20,000 all seater venue for the match, and home to Millwall since 1993, can be found by taking the A2 to New Cross and then by following signs for Surrey

Quays into Kender Street. Turn left into Old Kent Road and then a right at the turning signposted 'car pound', into Ilderton Road. Keep count of the turnings, and you will find Zampa Road is the seventh on the right! Unfortunately there are no parking facilities at the ground or any sizeable car parks in the surrounding area, so if you have travelled by car it would be best to try on street parking in the small estate just past the ground. Perhaps a better option in this instance would be to travel by coach or, failing that, South Bermondsey train station is just a five minute walk away from the stadium (a walkway link is also available on matchdays for away fans)

For refreshments prior to kick off, there are bars located around the ground itself and some hot food is also on offer. Alternatively, if you arrive early and have some time on your hands, the London Bridge area has plenty of places to grab a drink or bite to eat before moving on to The Den.

UR Boxing Day visitors boosted their strike force in the summer when they recruited Steve Jones, Darren Byfield and Sam Parkin.

Jones, currently the Saddlers' leading scorer, scored his ninth goal of this campaign at Yeovil eleven days ago.

Byfield's consolation effort against Southampton last Saturday was the 100th goal of his career. His contract with the Saddlers expires next month but the Jamaican international, whose former employers include Aston Villa. Preston North End, Sunderland, Millwall and Bristol City, is keen to extend his stay.

Parkin, who netted for the third time this season at Huish Park, spent three seasons with Swindon before a £450,000 move to Ipswich in the summer of 2005. Troy Deeney, signed from Chelmsley Town in February 2007. took his tally for the season to six with his brace against Oldham last month. His twelve last term included a twenty yard effort in the Saddlers' 1-1 draw at Scunthorpe in March which was voted Walsall's 'Goal of the Season'.

The Saddlers' midfield is likely to include Dwayne Mattis and the home grown Mark Bradley. Mattis's move from Barnsley was made permanent in August last year after a month on loan at the Banks's Stadium towards the end of 2007. Bradley, a former youth team skipper, has played in the centre of defence for Walsall's second string and at right back as a Wales youth international. First choice between the posts is Trinidad & Tobago international Clayton Ince, the Saddlers' fans' 'Player of the Season' in 2008/09.





afternoon and COD welcome back to the Memorial Stadium, the home of Bristol's original football club, for this afternoon's clash with Swindon Town.

A warm (and you'll all probably need some warmth) welcome to those of you from Wiltshire who have joined us today.

No doubt over the past few days the local media will have tried to hype this game up by dubbing it 'The West Country Derby' much as they did when Rovers played Yeovil Town, but the truth is this is not a derby at all.

I had a quick check on the information super highway that is the interweb, and was not surprised in the least, to discover that Swindon lies closer to Oxford than it does to Bristol so how on earth can this be a derby? I suppose media types need to need to clutch at any straws to sell their wares and the easiest/laziest* (*delete where not applicable) way is to claim the game as a derby.

Just for the record for any 'real' journalists reading this, Rovers only have one derby and that's not against Swindon Town, Cheltenham Town, Torquay United, Exeter City, Cardiff City, Swansea City or Plymouth Argyle - it against them from the Darkside south of the river.

I know some Gasheads (and a couple of Swindonians) who believe there to be some 'thing' between the two clubs, but I have to admit something about my relationship with Swindon Town - I don't dislike them. In fact I have no feelings about them at all. As far as I am concerned, we may as well be playing Accrington Stanley or Bradford City.

Rovers simply have a team put in front of them who have to be beaten (and beaten well). Although not a great drop in League position, the past few weeks have seen a huge dive in performances. Recently we arguably stole the points off of Carlisle United, desperately clung on to the points with our fingertips against Gillingham and picked the pockets of Exeter City.

A decent winning performance is long overdue and if there was ever a day for this to happen, then today it is as we remember the contribution to the Club of ex Chairman Ron Craia.

I am sure that Ron's history with the Club will be reported in detail elsewhere in this esteemed publication so I'll not even try to cover any of that, but I'll instead give you some of my memories of Ron.

I was first introduced to Ron some ten years ago by my very good friend and ex Pirate contributor Tim Blake. Tim and I used to spend some lunchtimes here at the Memorial Stadium chatting with groundsman Pete Prior about, well, groundsmanning (I believe I've created a new word) and generally chewing the cud. It was just a change of scenery and some fresh air during a lunch break.

One lunchtime, as we were figuring out how Rovers would fare that coming weekend, Ron wandered out of the Club offices and stopped for a chat with Tim who introduced Ron and I. We spent a few minutes nattering about, well nothing at all really, before Ron had to go to a meeting and we said our goodbyes.

About three or four weeks later, I popped to the Stadium with my two boys to buy something or other from the Club Shop and who should also be there but Ron, who was with his wife Ann, Straight away, Ron came over, shook my hand and said; "Hello Steve, how are you?" I was amazed that someone who must've met stacks of people and had been introduced to me only the once, would even recognise me let alone remember my name.

Both Ron and Ann stopped and chatted about how things were in general at the Club and how things were specifically on the playing side - even taking the time to talk to my two boys about their favourite players.

I went on to meet Ron (and Ann) on a number of occasions and was always struck by his passion for football in general and Bristol Rovers in particular. He was always ready and willing to stop for a chat (even with riff raff like me) and to answer people's questions and he was particularly interested in the youth setup at the Club - I am sure he would have loved to have seen nothing more than Rovers to line up with four or five good young players who were all products of the youth system.

Looking back over my time being

involved with this great Football Club, one of the overriding factors has always been the accessibility to fans of players, employees and Directors and that was epitomised by Ron Craig.

My personal condolences and, I am sure, those of all Gasheads ao out to Ann and the rest of Ron's family. Bristol Rovers have not only lost a good servant, but a good friend.

E FINAL SHOT

SQUAD ARE ON TARGET



OLLOWING A 3-1 DEFEAT AGAINST COLCHESTER, AT LAYER ROAD THE PREVIOUS WEEK, ROVERS RETURNED TO EASTVILLE ON 17TH SEPTEMBER 1966, WHERE THEY TOOK ON SWINDON TOWN.

They ran out comfortable 3-0 winners, thanks to goals from the 'H' squad of Hillard, Hamilton and 'H' himself, Harold Jarman who was making his 249th appearance for the club.

Today's photo comes from that match and shows Doug Hillard in the foreground, looking as though he's failed to cut out a cross from Swindon's John Trollope, while Jarman looks on.

The first goal arrived after 24 minutes; "Assisted by a marginal error of judgement by goalkeeper Downsborough, who carried the ball a foot too far outside his area. The linesman spotted him and Rovers were awarded a free kick smack in front of goal.

"Hillard moved up to take it and blasted the ball into the net off the wall of the Swindon defenders positioned between himself and the goal."

It was the only goal of the first half, though

Swindon did come close to equalising just before half time but Bernard Hall produced a brilliant save to deny Dawson a goal.

Rovers took the lead, in controversial circumstances, after 74 minutes; "A long pass out of defence found Jarman just over the halfway line. He looked several yards offside and the referee's whistle blew. But then it was realised that the injured Dawson was still standing alongside the goalkeeper, so referee Mr Burns allowed play to continue. Jarman moved into Swindon's penalty area, and took the ball round the advancing Downsborough."

The third goal came four minutes from time; "Hamilton nipped in to steer a superb through pass from Jones wide of Downsborough, and slipped it into the

Press reports indicated that it was the side's best performance of the season to date and said that; "Rovers were full of blustering enthusiasm."

Victory saw the side move into second place in the Third Division table, with six points from nine games. League leaders at the time were Workington while Swindon were down in 17th place with four points from their six matches.

By the end of the season things had changed somewhat, particularly for Workington, who finished bottom. Rovers ended up in fifth place, just two points behind runners up Middlesbrough, while Swindon were just three points and three places worse off.

There were a couple of interesting news stories concerning Rovers in the week leading up to the match. First it was announced that Wayne Jones was to be given a two month trial to see if he could earn himself a professional contract, and secondly proposals of a merger with local rivals City were given short shrift; "Rovers, struggling against the tide of rising costs and falling attendances, rejected the idea of amalgamating with City."

A crowd of 10,907 saw these two sides in action some 43 years ago.
