

THE GAFFER

Good evening and welcome to THE COUNTY GROUND for the first leg of our play-off tie with Charlton Athletic.

I'M SURE everybody will be looking forward to Wembley already, but in my experience, the play-offs are all about preparing your side for one game, rather than three.

Obviously I might not have even needed to be writing these programme notes, had things gone our way at Millwall on Saturday afternoon but unfortunately it wasn't to be.

It was a good game between two different styles of teams, and we got it down and played some great stuff at times which I was very pleased with.

There was a great atmosphere inside the ground, and the fans were treated to a very good game of football, and most importantly everyone behaved themselves which was brilliant.

In terms of our performance, we really couldn't ask anymore of the players as they absolutely ran themselves into the ground.

We had a plan for the game and it worked pretty well for large parts of it.

They passed the ball around very well in what was a high pressure and pretty changeable atmosphere, as it varied massively depending on what was happening at Elland Road.

That was obviously a strange situation for the players to be reacting to and it noticeably affected both sides, but in the end it didn't matter anyway.

Overall I was pleased with the way we played, and hopefully we can take that sort of performance into this play-off campaign.

That starts tonight with the visit of Charlton, and having played each other twice already this season, it's fair to say that both teams will know what the other is all about.

We know that we'll have a tough test against Charlton both home and away, but we're underdogs and hopefully that can help us play with that sort of relaxation we saw on Saturday against Millwall.

Both the games against Charlton earlier in the season ended in draws, and obviously we were disappointed to have conceded late equalisers in both of those games when we'd probably done enough to win the games.

But results like that just prove how tough this league is and how resilient Charlton are, so we know we're in for two very difficult games over this weekend.

As I mentioned, I've been involved in the play-offs before, and I have to say the old adage of 'it's about keeping your head when all around you are losing theirs' sums it up for me.

It's just about keeping that little bit more composure at crucial times, because it's a very high pressure environment.

You do need to have that bit of competitiveness and fire in your belly during the game, but the most important moments in the games will come when you need to put your foot on the ball and have that bit of calmness that can create a goal.

So we'll go into it very

committed, but hopefully with a certain composure that will let us play our game and come away with the right result.

As I'm sure you can appreciate the general feeling is a mixture of nervousness and excitement going into it really.

We've got three games to get promoted. We want to get to the final and we want to win the final, it's as simple as that.

When we set out at the beginning of the season we were aiming to get to the playoffs, and having got here, this is part one of the job done.

You have to take your hat off to the players because to reproduce the form they have done on a regular basis and get the results they have done is outstanding, and they have shown immense character and psychological strength this year against some very good sides.

But we don't want to just let it peter away now, we want to see it through, and if we can perform as we have done for the majority of this season, then I think we stand a great chance.

Finally I'd like to thank you for your excellent support throughout the season, and here's hoping you can help us finish the job.














Executive Insight

We outsourced the telesales part of the home ticket sales to Ticket Zone and they have assisted us greatly but there have been some STFC Box Office phone issues which have made it frustrating for some fans to obtain tickets Despite making outsourced telesales facilities available. a great many more fans than expected decided to turn up at the STFC Box Office and queuin order to obtain their ticket This only served to compound an already overloaded system but I hope you all got there in the end.

Well that is it. The pen is now laid to rest until the start of next season and whatever that delivers for us. Your support this season has been wonderful and we thank you for that.

I hope you have enjoyed the journey and it is by no means over. We have all come a long way since August 8th 2009 and Gillingham, but as that old Peruvian proverb says: "little by little one walks far".

Pitch plans explained

TONIGHT'S game will not be the last at The County Ground this season, with the club's annual Play on the Pitch fixtures set to take place before the playing surface goes 'under the knife'.

The Play on the Pitch games are a popular part of the club's event schedule, offering supporters the chance to run-out at The County Ground and attempt to recreate their favourite Town moments

Once the Play on the Pitch fixtures have taken place, Town groundsman Marcus Cassidy will get to work on the maintenance programme for the playing surface to prepare it for the 2010/11 season (hopefully in the Championship!).


"The original plan was for the pitch to be taken up on 24th May, but if we make it to Wembley then the manager will use the pitch for training in the build-up to the final," said Cassidy.

"The top surface will be removed but we won't be doing the drainage work this year as the work we did last year has proved really effective. The money we have saved on not doing the drainage work will be used to apply 100 tonnes of sandsoil top-dressing mix, which will be mixed into the top 5cm of the pitch."

Cassidy continued: "After being leveled and flattened, then we will look at laser-grading the surface to make more of a natural camber. The pitch will then be verti-drained which decompacts the surface before being leveled

again and reseeded.

"It sounds a lot of work, but it's a process we have done before and the pitch should be in great shape again next season."

Tracy lost her long and brave fight against kidney disease and at the age of 37 passed away in February 2010.




Last year's final was played out in front of 59,661 with Scunthorpe United beating Millwall 3-2





"We were on a run from the previous season and it became more and more difficult to lose. The power of the team

and everything they had going for them, the momentum carried them over. The players we signed came good and worked well as a team. More importantly, they were all prepared to work hard.

"Everyone ended up a winner. I became a winner because of the hard work the players put in, most of the supporters ended up winners, so our hard work was worth it.

"Once you've had one promotion you know the higher level is going to be more difficult - your priorities change. You start to think about avoiding relegation, or

consolidating as opposed to promotion - so to go up gave us even more satisfaction."




"I was lucky when I was here; in the five seasons I played for Swindon we were involved at the top end in four of them. We were in three play-off finals, three of which we won, in 1987, 1990 and 1993, so it's a great feeling to be involved at that level. It's what you play for.

"The play-offs are a great thing for English football. It

means that the teams down to halfway in the table are all involved until the end of the season. It keeps all the teams interested; there's nothing worse than having nothing to play for at the end of a season."



Town drew three times as the season came to an end before facing Blackburn Rovers in the play-offs. However, consecutive 2-1 wins saw Town face Sunderland at Wembley.



Town won 1-0, but the joy was infamously shortlived.


and secondary schools by providing school resource packs containing manuals, flash cards, software, DVD's, numeracy resources and books aimed at educating a child with Down's syndrome.





"It is the best goal scoring return I've had from a season."

WHEN compiling their own lists of possible replacements for Simon Cox at the start of the season, few Town fans would have pinpointed Billy Paynter as the man most likely to fire their team into the play-offs.

However, what supporters have been treated to this season from Paynter has been nothing short of revelatory, with the once enigmatic front man's sensational goal scoring form striking fear into every defence that lines up against him.

And the 25-year-old, who notched his 29th goal of the season in the 3-2 defeat at Millwall last Saturday, admits he is as delighted as the Town faithful with his remarkable transformation.


"It is the best goal scoring return I've had from a season so I'm really pleased,"

He and the other lads have given me the chances and luckily I've been in the right place to put them away.


"I always think if you miss a chance, you've just got to get on with it, because the next one will come along before you know it and

you'll put that away.


"People can dwell on it if they like, but personally if I've missed a chance I just laugh it off really, because you've got to be fully focused on sticking the next one away

Paynter's name has been one of the most boisterously hollered from the stands this








term, and the striker is delighted to have become a favourite amongst the supporters - who he believes can still play a significant part at the crux of Town's season.

"It's a cliché but they are our 12th man, and we need them on our side," he said.

"Throughout the season they have been tremendous and it's definitely helped a great deal. We're just hoping for a few more of those great turnouts from them and hopefully that can spur us on through the play-offs.

In spite of his plentiful Football League experience, the end of season top six lottery is something Paynter is going into



as a complete novice - although he admits this might not have been the case had it not been for his current employers.

For Paynter was part of the Port Vale squad that missed out on the play-offs on the final day of the 2003/04 season, thanks in the main to Town's 1-1 draw with Hartlepool United at The County Ground - a result which saw both sides go into the top six in place of Vale.

"This is the first time I've been in the playoffs, as I just missed out when I was at Port Vale," he said.

"I think it was the Swindon v Hartlepool conspiracy season, when they drew 1-1 on the last day to make sure they were in the play-offs.

"We went down to Rushden and we won 3-0 and we were thinking that Swindon had won, but apparently it was a draw and they both went into the play-offs!

"I think they just stood in the corner for the last five minutes at 1-1! But I'm over that now


The Scouse hitman is understandably delighted with the most productive season of his career so far, but is adamant that his personal achievements will pale into insignificance unless he can fire Town to Wembley and into the Championship - starting with this evening's clash with Charlton Athletic.














CHUTIC SPARK

Picture the scene. It's pre-season at Celtic and time for the kit stash to be handed out to the burgeoning squad at Celtic Park. FERRY, NUMBER 53, is amongst them. Without a competitive first team appearance for The Hoops the campaign looked like being a long one for the 22-year old - and so it proved.

THE PHONE CALL from Town boss Danny Wilson changed everything. Bags were hastily packed before Ferry linked up with fellow Celtic reserve team regular Ben Hutchinson for a journey into the unknown. SN1 2ED: to be more precise.

Ferry was quickly thrown into the rough and tumble of League 1 life with a starting slot against Southend United at the end of August. Part of a Town squad which included the now departed trio of Anthony McNamee, Tope Obadeyi and the aforementioned Hutchinson.

Wilson, himself a former midfielder, has seen Ferry's partnership with the guile and class of Jonathan Douglas at the heart of the Town engine room blossom. The midfield duo were paired together once again last weekend for the trip to Millwall.

"It was a bit of a weird day wasn't it?" recalls Ferry, looking back on the frantic final day at The New Den. "We knew what was happening at the other grounds as the crowd were jumping about when Bristol Rovers scored.

"We got back into the game

but didn't manage to take anything out of it in the end.

I must say fair play to Leeds though, they went behind with ten men and came back to win. They probably deserve to go up for that."

Off the field, Ferry's fashion sense may be open to discussion but his form on the pitch has been unquestionable during what has been Town's best League 1 season in six years.

Now he is hoping to shine once again as Swindon try to get the better of Charlton to secure a place at Wembley. Home advantage, according to the man himself, could be a blessing.

"I quite like being at home first because if we can go to The Valley with any sort of lead then we will be buzzing. When we were there in the league on Boxing Day we fancied our chances and should have got

"If we can take a result there on Monday night then I think we will be more than capable of holding out.

"These are two big games that we have to look forward to. We know what Charlton are about having played them twice in the second half of the season and I thought we could have won both games."

Being part of a large SPL squad does have it advantages though. Ferry was afforded a rare taste of life in the Celtic first team in a friendly against Tottenham Hotspur in the Wembley Cup last summer. The midfielder is now hoping to line up a second trip to the home of English football in less a year.

"I never thought I would get this sort of experience coming down here," he says, with an FA Cup third round date at Fulham and a first senior goal at Tranmere Rovers added to his portfolio this term. "Going to Millwall last weekend was an experience in itself! Now we have the play-offs and the chance of going to Wembley.

"It has been a really great season and I couldn't have asked for much more."

If he can help Town to Wembley success this term, then his season at Swindon will have been the journey of a lifetime, even if it did start at 53

SIGNING FOR **SWINDON TOWN**

An extraordinary run of 46 goals in 46 games for Poole Town alerted both Town and AFC Bournemouth to the youngster's talents, and with a transfer embargo preventing the Cherries from signing him on, Town pounced to seal one of the deals of the season.

'It was a dream come true for me to sign here," he said.

"I worked really hard at Poole and thankfully my chance came. I thought my opportunity had gone first time round when I was released from Reading. but I was determined to make the most of my second chance as soon as I got here."

PROFESSIONAL COMFORTS

Having previously plied his footballing trade at the likes

of Thatcham Town, Kintbury Rangers and Hungerford Town, Austin was well-versed in the art of washing his own kit every weekend.

So imagine his surprise upon leaving the pitch at St. James Park, Exeter having made his debut in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy first round clash, when Town Kit Man Roger Jones packed Austin's shirt and shorts away and told him not to worry about it.

"I'd gone from Poole Town where I took my own kit and boots, still clogged in mud from the game before, to having someone cleaning my boots for me and all my kit being laid out." he said.

"Rog (Jones, Town Kit Man) just said make sure you put the right stuff in the right baskets at the end of the game. It was a bit ridiculous considering I'd been washing it myself up until then!"

SCORING ON HIS FULL DEBUT

Six goals in five reserve games after arriving at the club heightened calls for his inclusion in the first team squad, and the fans' wishes were granted on November 21st, when Danny Wilson selected the youngster for the mammoth away trip to Carlisle.

It was a dream start for Austin, who scored what proved to be the winning goal within three minutes of his full debut.

"I knew it was in as soon as I'd hit it - I didn't even see it hit the net! I just ran away to celebrate with the boys as soon as I could. It was a dream start."

SIGNING HIS FIRST AUTOGRAPH

The fact that fans want his name written on a piece of paper still baffles the striker, and he admits the feeling of being asked for the first time is something he'll never forget.

He said: "People ask me for autographs now and I think to myself: 'Are you sure?'

"The first one was for a young lad before Brighton game at The County Ground. It was a bit weird I have to say, but I guess it comes with the territory and I'm used to it now."

COVERAGE IN THE NATIONAL PRESS

Austin's 'Roy of the Rovers' tale caught the imagination of the national press early on in the piece, with both The Mail on Sunday and The Observer wanting a piece of the action.

He said: "The national journalists were all really nice guys, and were pretty well researched.

"They had all done pieces

with other higher-profile players before, so they made me feel at ease early on.

"My family showed me the articles in the flesh and it was pretty unreal to see my face in the national papers!"

6-0 ON AGGREGATE!

The 3-0 double over Leeds United will go down as many Town fans' most memorable matches of Season 2009/2010. and Austin was instrumental in both victories; bagging a brace in the first at The County Ground, and scoring once at Elland Road.

"It was a sell out at The County Ground, and everyone was up for it and we got a great result," he recalled.

"The ball ran loose for me on the edge of the box and I reacted and hit it and it went in. It was an unbelievable feeling and it gave us a brilliant start and we went on to win which was amazing.

"Then the game at Elland Road was a massive game, I couldn't tell you how many people were in there, but everyone knew what they had to do, and we did it.

"Bill scored just before half time, and then again straight after which was half the job done. Then for my goal, Darbs did well on the right, Bill chipped it into me and I just nodded it in."

SIGNING HIS CONTRACT EXTENSION

Having initially signed on a short term deal until the end of the season. Town fans were keen to see Austin's services secured for the foreseeable future as the rumours of higher division interest began to surface.

But the youngster put pen to paper on a two-and-a-half year extension to the deal in early February, quelling any anxiety in the process.

"I was over the moon when the offer first came about." he said.

"It had started to play on my mind after I'd made such a good start I must admit, but I was relieved to have got it all out of the way. I think it helped me concentrate on my game and help Swindon towards promotion - which hopefully we can achieve in the next few weeks!"

CHANGING HIS CAR

During the first few months of his time at the club, Austin would drive to training in an '04 registration silver Vauxhall Corsa every morning.

However, soon after sealing his new contract, the youngster began to arrive in slightly more stylish fashion.

He said: "To be honest I wasn't really bothered about driving into training in a Corsa before, but it was nice to get a bit of a nicer car.

'I'd always planned to change it, but I was just waiting for the right time and I suppose that was after I got the new contract!"

SCORING THE WINNER AT ST. MARY'S


Tuesday March 16th saw one of the most impressive of Town's many away victories this season, with a resilient performance seeing Danny Wilson's side leave Hampshire with all three points.

The sight of Austin rolling the ball home after rounding Kelvin Davies and charging over to celebrate with the 2,000 strong away following is one of the most iconic of Town's season, and the striker admits it was a special moment.

"Wardy played a great ball, and I saw the keeper set himself, so I knew if I knocked the ball past him I'd have a decent chance. I did that and it was just a matter of rolling it in after that," he said.




Swindon Town Football Club scored 73 goals, chalked up 22 wins, used 30 players and accumulated 82 points during the regular League One season. Here is how the 2009/10 season unfolded. The play-offs will determine how it ends.





TOWN can point to many contributing factors in what has been the most satisfying season since the days when Ossie Ardiles and Glenn Hoddle brought a touch of international class and ultimately Premiership football to The County Ground.

AFTER a traumatic decade away from the top two divisions which saw the very existence of the club threatened on at least two occasions, the leadership of Danny Wilson, a cool-headed, vastly-experienced manager, and Andrew Fitton, a passionate, ambitious chairman very much in touch with the supporters, has stirred echoes of those early 90s successes.

Amid a growing sense of optimism, the stadium has veered gradually towards capacity crowds as Swindon recovered from a 5-0 opening day defeat at Gillingham to shuffle quietly towards mid table, before accelerating towards a play off place in mid-season.

And while automatic promotion was narrowly missed out on after final day disappointment, the fact that Town's playoff place was secure with three games of the season left illustrates just what a successful season it has been at The County Ground.

Danny Wilson made astute pre-season signings with the likes of Celtic graduate centre-back Scott Cuthbert and the ex-Leeds duo of midfielder Jonathan Douglas and goalkeeper David Lucas.

All three have been supremely consistent and formed what has at times been an impenetrable defensive unit along with new captain Gordon Greer.

National headlines have been made with the fairytale story of former bricklayer Charlie Austin, who has emerged from non-league football to instantly project himself to the legendary status of modern day Town goal scoring heroes Sam Parkin and Simon Cox.

Austin has won the hearts of the fans not only with his goals, but also through his hard working, down to earth approach to the game. For supporters, local lad Austin represents their own dashed hopes of making the big time, and the fans have been in raptures witnessing that dream unfold before their eyes.

However one must not forget the equally impressive contribution of Austin's strike partner Billy Paynter. Still only 25 years old, Paynter had carved out a successful career in the lower divisions acting more as foil for the likes of Cox, whilst contributing steadily to the goal tally.

This season however, has seen Paynter blossom into a prolific goal scorer in his own right, admirably leading the line as a lone striker until the emergence of Austin transformed Swindon's strike force into the most feared in League One.

Their prolific partnership has propelled Town into the upper echelons of the league table, with many of those goals having come since Austin's debut in November.

Perhaps the biggest success of Swindon's season however has been Wilson's forays into the loan market. Whilst early season candidates to accompany Paynter in attack such as Bolton's Tope Obedayi, Celtic's

Ben Hutchinson and Southend's Alex Revell ultimately failed to make a huge impression, the acquisition of four other temporary signings has proved vital to the club's achievements this season.

The January additions of full back Alan Sheehan from Leeds and teenage forward Danny Ward from Bolton added steel and flair to the left side, with Ward in particular earning huge plaudits for his mature performances and impressive goal return in an unfamiliar role.

Liverpool youngster Stephen Darby has grown in confidence with each game since his arrival in March, adding to his already polished positional sense and passing game from right back.

But the most special praise is reserved for 21 year old Scottish midfielder Simon Ferry, whose loan move from Celtic in August was swiftly extended to the end of the season.

Ferry has been a virtual ever present since and in pulling the strings in tandem with Douglas, his energetic displays have injected a creative spark long missing from the heart of the Swindon midfield.

For supporters, one of the biggest delights has been the impact this squad overhaul has had on players left over from previous regimes.


The likes of Jon Paul McGovern, Kevin Amankwaah and Lescinel Jean-Francois were considered steady back up players at best under the stewardship of Maurice Malpas, yet all three have been revitalised by the extra quality Danny Wilson has installed alongside them, and can now count themselves as firm fans' favourites.

Behind the scenes, Mr Fitton's business acumen and visionary strategies have seen the club successfully re-engage with supporters, wary after years of unfulfilled promises under various consortiums and investors.

A sensible pricing structure made season tickets affordable to a much wider element of the fan base, and a similar offer, coupled with the possibility of Championship football at The Country Ground, has generated strong sales for next season already.

With Town having narrowly missed out on an automatic promotion place, it remains to be seen whether they can cap what has been an incredible season with a play-off victory.

But whatever the outcome, it has been a season which will live long in the memory for all connected with the club.

It was an impressive start to the season for tonight's visitors, winning their first five games and remaining unbeaten in nine - cementing their credentials

They suffered their first defeat at the hands of Colchester United in late September, and then enjoyed decent runs of form either side of a shock 1-0 FA Cup Third Round defeat at the hands of Northwich Victoria.

It was over the Christmas period that Parkinson's side began to lose ground on their automatic promotion rivals, as three consecutive draws against Millwall (4-4), Town (2-2) and Brentford (1-1) saw The Addicks drop into the dreaded third position - a standing upon which they never improved.

Inconsistency dogged tonight's

visitors for the remainder of the season, as they failed to register more than two consecutive wins during their run-in, and despite winning on the final day at Oldham Athletic, they finished two points adrift of promoted Leeds United in the final standings.

Town fans will remember the previous meetings between the sides with mixed emotions, as The Addicks snatched late equalisers on both occasions, with Miguel Angel Llera making it 2-2 in the last minute at The Valley, and Nicky Bailey levelling the scores at 1-1 at The County Ground seconds before the final-whistle.



FRAZER RICHARDSON


CHARLTON'S second signing of the summer. right-back Richardson arrived at The Valley having skippered Leeds United last term.

He featured 23 times in the league in 2008/09 and Simon Grayson was the seventh manager he had played under in his seven years as a first-teamer.



SCOTT WAGSTAFF



He is now with his 11th club and had previously spent a loan spell at Swindon during the 2003/04 play-off campaign against Brighton & Hove Albion.



DAVID MOONEY

Currently on loan from Championship side Reading, Dublin-born striker David Mooney did not feature in either of the two fixtures against Swindon earlier this season but has faced The Robins before, in one of only two appearances for Stockport ounty during a loan spell in January 2009.



AKPO SODIE

The youngest of the 10strong Sodje clan, Akpo, who was born in Greenwich. started his career with OPR. before representing Huddersfield, Darlington and Port Vale and Championship side Wednesday. He is currently on loan from the Hillsbrough club, after making 44 appearances scoring nine times.

CHARLTON beat the deadline day transfer window in March to sign Brighton & Hove Albion's experienced striker Forster.

Surrey-born Forster started his career at non-League Horley Town, before joining Gillingham in May 1992. He went on to represent Brentford, Birmingham City, Reading, Ipswich Town and Hull City - where Phil Parkinson was manager - before switching to Brighton in 2007.

A willing runner who is also good in the air, the 36-year-old has already scored at The County Ground this season. He notched for Brighton in their 2-1 defeat in Wiltshire back in December.

Forster is out of contract in the summer, but will hope to finish his extended League 1 campaign by using his experience to help The Addicks reach Wembley.





Having seen his side's hopes of automatic promotion dashed on the final day of the League One season, **PHIL PARKINSON** now has to help navigate The Addicks through unpredictable play-off waters.

CHARLTON were in action at Oldham Athletic last weekend and ran out 2-0 winners, although the result was not enough to secure an automatic spot after Leeds saw off the challenge of Bristol Rovers at Elland Road.

The Addicks have recent play-off experience, having missed out on a final spot in 1996 before securing their place at Wembley two seasons later against Sunderland. The final saw Charlton defeat

Sunderland 7-6 on penalties after the game had finished 4-4 at the end of extra-time.

Parkinson has tasted promotion to the Championship before with Colchester United at the end of the 2005/06 season, in what was his first spell as a manager after finishing 11 seasons as a player with Reading. The U's finished the campaign in second spot, although Parkinson departed Layer Road to take up the offer of the

manager's chair at Hull City.

After a short spell at the KC Stadium, he was appointed as assistant to Pardew in January 2007. The pair had worked together previously, when Parkinson was Pardew's captain during a glittering career at Reading.

Initially lined up as a potential replacement for Alan Curbishley in the summer of 2006, Parkinson finally became manager at The Valley in November 2008.

He was installed as caretaker boss when Alan Pardew left the club by mutual consent following a 5-2 home defeat against Sheffield United, and was handed the job on a full-time basis on the final day of 2008.

Parkinson plots

After eight games in caretaker charge, Parkinson was finally named Charlton's 19th permanent manager, and



One To Watch

Tough-tackling **NICKY BAILEY** was a rare highlight for Charlton during the disappointing 2008/09 season, finishing the campaign - his first with The Addicks - as the club's top scorer with 13 goals.

HIS TALLY, coupled with a never-say-die attitude and all-action displays, led to the flame-haired midfielder deservedly being named Charlton's Player of the Year.

It's a title Bailey is becoming used to winning, having scooped Southend United's equivalent accolade in 2007/08 and Barnet's in 2005/06, when he also won The Bees' young player gong.

After being released by

Fulham as a youngster, Bailey was snapped up by non-League Sutton United, hitting 31 goals in two seasons to catch the eye of Barnet, who paid just £10,000 for his services.

Bailey helped Barnet into The Football League in 2005 and earned international recognition for the England C side, but after three seasons at Underhill, he departed for Roots Hall in a £175,000 switch.

Charlton signed Bailey in




mid-August in a package that could yet reach £750,000, and the Hammersmith-born ace, who prospered on the left flank following Phil Parkinson's appointment, took just four games to net his first goal, a sign of things to come.

Along with teammate Frazer Richardson, Bailey was recently named in the 2009/10 PFA Team of the Year and with 13 goals to his name this campaign, it's not hard to see why.



although he was unable to stave off relegation, The Addicks lost just one of their final eight games in 2008/09.

Charlton now have a chance to make an instant return to the Championship, although Parkinson will know from personal experience the ups and downs which professional football can deliver.





DOUGLAS has played a huge part in Town's captivating transformation from relegation strugglers to promotion contenders and has made 43 League One starts for the club in what has been his first season in Wiltshire.

The experienced middleman has already landed three Player of the Year awards and will surely be amongst the frontrumers at the club's official end of season presentation night once the season comes to a close.

However, Douglas knows more than most about the contrasting emotions a play-off campaign can bring. The Irishman captained Leeds United against Doncaster Rovers at Wembley in May 2008 and cut a forlorn figure on the Wembley turf whilst watching Leeds' rivals Doncaster – who included Gordon Greer amongst their ranks - lift the League One play-off trophy.

Douglas, who made 16 appearances in the Premier League for Blackburn Rovers, is determined to help The Robins win promotion to the Championship which would put local derbies against Bristol City and Reading back on the fixture list.

You are becoming pretty familiar with the end of season play-offs now aren't you?

This is the third consecutive year that I have been involved in the play-offs and they are exciting games. Winning at Wembley is a great achievement for any player but I have lost in two finals so am yet to achieve that. Hopefully this will be third time lucky for me.

What did you make of Charlton when you played against them earlier in the campaign?

Charlton are good side and were rightly one of the favourites to go up at the start of the season. They are a big club with a decent manager and have some good players. However on our day we are capable of beating any side in the division and that's why we have reached the play-offs ourselves.


They are not a side that will sit back and let us attack them, that's just not the way they play so it should be a good, open game. I think we play better when teams come here to attack.

Your old club Leeds United were promoted last weekend, it seems quite ironic that yourself and Frazer Richardson left last summer yet are now going head to head in the play-offs!

Leeds finished the season as the second best team in the division and well done to them. They have done well and are another big club who will be delighted to have secured a return to the Championship.

Frazer is a good mate of mine and we were together at Leeds for four years. He is a good lad





and a good player and I have had some decent games with and against him over our time in football. Hopefully we can get the better of Charlton over the two legs though.

You have experienced the play-off final before as Captain. What do you recall of the 2008 final?

It's not nice getting all the way to the final and losing, especially by a single goal. 'Gordy' was at Doncaster at the time and I saw him after the game and he was buzzing and rightly so. Hopefully the two us of can be celebrating together at the end of the season. Charlton are up first though and we have to get past them.

How difficult is it to focus purely on the semifinals knowing that a place at Wembley is only 180 minutes away?

It's not difficult at all. If we go into the games thinking that we are already at Wembley then we will get guite a shock because Charlton are a good side. It's going to be difficult over two legs but these are games that we should be relishing. We have to be confident and look forward to the fixtures.

What are your views on playing at home first? Can being at The County Ground on Friday night prove to be an advantage before going

back to The Valley?

It doesn't really bother me too much. Last year with Leeds we had home advantage first but then went away to Millwall and lost out, so it doesn't really make a difference. For me the important thing is to perform well in the two games and come out on top.

The beauty of a twolegged semi-final is that should either side take an advantage from the first game, then there is still everything to play for in the return leg...

That's right. Both teams will know that whatever happens on Friday night the tie isn't over. We will go to Charlton

knowing we can go there and play having drawn 2-2 there on Boxing Day. We have played well against them over the two games and we won't have anything to fear going into the second leg.

And finally, breaking your goalscoring duck for the club in the play-offs would be great wouldn't it?

It would be perfect, even nicer if it came at Wembley! To be honest I don't care if I don't score as long as we make it through to Wembley and win. It would be nice to get a goal in the play-offs but I wouldn't be greedy. The most important thing first of all is that we get past Charlton.



PLAY-OFF PERFORMER

With a League One play-off winner's medal in the trophy cabinet, JON-PAUL MCGOVERN is hoping to use his experience to ensure The Robins' road to Wembley ends in success.

McGOVERN was one of the key cogs in Sheffield Wednesday's play-off winning side during the 2004/05 campaign and he played in every fixture that season. His performances this term have made him one of Town's most improved players and his consistency and inventiveness on the right hand side of midfielder have attracted praise from the Town management and fellow players.

And the midfielder will be hoping his recent award at the STFC Supporters Club presentation evening will not be the last he collects this season.

"It's always nice to get an award, but this one was voted for by members of the away travel club and they are what you would consider the real hardcore supporters. I was delighted to receive it from them because those fans have really put some miles in this season.

"The award was nice but it's promotion that we after and I am sure most of the lads would swap any other awards for that at the end of the season."

McGovern was part of the Sheffield Wednesday side which went on a ten-game unbeaten run during the 2004/05 campaign with the season ending in victory in the League One play-off final at The Millennium Stadium. He was a key cog in the Wednesday side that season and played in every game of the season.

Now in Swindon colours, the 29-year old Glaswegian made his 100th Town start in the final home game of the season against Brentford and has made 51 appearances during 2009/10 - the highest racked up by any Swindon player this term.

"I didn't realise my hundred was up against Brentford - it's always nice to play so many games for the one side. It feels like quite a while ago that I joined Swindon and it was a few regimes ago too. When I came in the club was under a bit of a financial cloud.

"A lot has changed since those days and the club is now moving forward in a very positive direction. The likes of Nick (Watkins) and Jeremy (Wray) have come in and worked wonders throughout the club."

McGovern also pitched in with vital goals during Sheffield Wednesday's promotion campaign, scoring twice in three play-off fixtures. He scored the only goal of the game in a 1-0 home win over Brentford in front of a 29,000 Hillsborough crowd before notching another in the final in Cardiff.

Now preparing to help The Robins navigate their way through the play-offs, McGovern is hoping to call upon his success at Sheffield Wednesday to help ensure Town are in the Championship when the new campaign gets underway.

"I would have preferred automatic promotion, but the play-offs are a great experience. The coverage you get and everything that goes with it is fantastic.

"We have players in the dressing room that have been there and done it. In some cases they have achieved success at higher levels and ahead of the play-offs I am more than comfortable that we can go through and win it."



HOW do you even begin to sum up a season which has exceeded almost everyone's expectations (apart from possibly those of Danny Wilson and Andrew Fitton)?

FROM Billy Paynter and Charlie Austin's goals – 48 combined and counting – to some heroic defensive displays from Gordon Greer, Scott Cuthbert & Co.

Afternoons and evenings at Craven Cottage, St Mary's Stadium and Elland Road, which will forever live long in the memory, and only the odd 90 minutes at places like Gillingham and Bristol Rovers which will quickly be erased.

Before writing this column, I was asked to select my five defining moments of the season. It would have been too easy to rattle off Southampton home and away, Leeds home and away, and the signing of Jonathan Douglas – although all have played a huge part in shaping Town's success.

So instead, I decided to plump for situations which

may have slipped under the radar (much like the team) but in my opinion were just as instrumental in their push for the promotion.

TUESDAY, AUGUST 11

Town travelled to MK Dons in the first round of the Carling Cup on the back of a 5-0 thumping by Gillingham.

Jon-Paul McGovern had been an unused substitute at the Priestfield Stadium and was seemingly behind the likes of Mark Marshall and Lloyd Macklin for the right-wing berth. But the Scot was handed a start at Stadium:MK and caught the eye with a stunning long-range strike in a 4-1 win.

The rest, as they say, is history, with McGovern going on to hold down a place in the starting line-up all season, rack up the most assists in League One and come second in the Player of the Year award.

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 27

Just a handful of fans were at the Madejski Stadium as Town's Reserves recorded a 4-1 victory against their Reading counterparts.

"But those present witnessed something special with the first glimpse of the prolific Billy Paynter-Charlie Austin partnership.

The strikers bagged two each and laid the foundations for their fruitful link-up at first team level. And boss Danny Wilson was clearly equally impressed – handing the duo a start only a couple of weeks later at Carlisle.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 26

The highly-rated but disappointing Tope Obadeyi had already returned to Bolton at the end of his loan spell, when Danny Wilson swooped on the Reebok Stadium once more.


This time arriving was Danny Ward, another striker with a glowing reference at reserve team level. The youngster had to be patient for a chance, but was handed a start in the FA Cup game at Fulham and has been an ever-present since.

Deployed on the left-wing, Ward's enthusiasm and attacking instincts have been hugely effective, but crucially different from predecessor Anthony McNamee, he possesses the willingness to muck in with the defensive side of the game and provides Swindon with a real balance to their side.

SATURDAY, MARCH 13

Town's promotion bid appeared to be stalling

following two defeats in four days at the hands of Bristol Rovers and Milton Keynes Dons.

But they went to Brighton's Withdean Stadium and ground out a dogged 1-0 victory thanks to Charlie Austin's goal.

It wasn't pretty - in fact it was arguably one of the poorest games of the season - but it reignited their charge and proved Swindon could dig in with a plan B when they were unable to play their normal passing game.

MONDAY, APRIL 12

The Sky cameras were in

town for what looked like being a comfortable home win for Danny Wilson's side against struggling Exeter.

But the Grecians took a first half lead and looked to be holding on for all three points until almost the final kick of the game when their skipper Matt Taylor bundled the ball into his own net.

The result left many people grumbling at a sense of two points lost, but that late, late drama kept Swindon's push alive and was crucial in maintaining confidence and focus for the final few matches.

In 1986/87. I was in the scrum on the touchline here at The County Ground as Charlie Henry was chaired off after a spectacular goal against Gillingham which took us to a replay at Selhurst Park. What a night! Our BBC Wiltshire pundit Phil King was among the half-naked players to come back out from the dressingroom for a celebratory lap of honour. What a sight!

Two years later came disappointment at the same stadium, beaten by a Wright and Bright-inspired Crystal Palace. The game proved to be Lou Macari's last match as Town manager.

Enter Ossie Ardiles and we were Twin-Towersbound at the end of his first campaign in charge. I remember interviews after a semi-final with Blackburn where the press room was in a hut across the cobbled streets from Ewood Park. This was before investment from Jack Walker! Then, a deflected shot from Alan McLoughlin (from the front of the diamond formation) clinched victory over Sunderland in what must be the most one-sided 1-0

success ever! Chris Kamara was my co-commentator. I should have been his agent for a subsequent career in the media!


The final with Leicester City in 1993 looked equally comfortable at 3-0 - the rest is history. Steve White can dine out on the foul which led to Paul Bodin's penalty and the jubilant journey home, with the players taking it in turns to appear out of the roof of the team bus en route to Swindon.

Eleven seasons later. a complete contrast at a wet Withdean Stadium in Brighton. I was pitchside tracking Rory Fallon, waiting to pounce on the man who'd netted the goal which secured a place at Wembley when the Town conceded at the last-minute - again, the rest is history.





Blood, Sweat & Tears

Anyone privy to the Championship's final day relegation showdown between Sheffield Wednesday and Crystal Palace will have seen exactly how fired up professional footballers can get when THE STAKES ARE HIGH enough.

BOOTS IN FACES, clashes of heads and dislocated toes gave both Owls and Eagles physios a hectic afternoon at Hillsborough as both sides played with a level of commitment indicative of the importance of the match.

So what should Town 'magic sponge man' Dick Mackey expect from this evening's hugely important play-off clash with Charlton Athletic?

While the official answer is: Nothing different to any of the previous 46 League One matches,' Mackey has been in the game long enough to know that there is always a special edge to crucial matches something which makes him more prepared than normal to be called into action.

"I think it would be dishonest to say that these sort of games don't bring out extra passion in players," he said.

"I should say that they are as committed for one game as they are the next, but in reality things can become desperate in these sorts of games.

"I think it's part of the human condition that in such an important game, no-one wants to be responsible for something going wrong in the game, and where there is such absolute commitment, it does make it slightly more worrying from my point of view."

During his time at the club, Mackey has treated players in some of the most high octane atmospheres, not least during

Town's last foray into the play-offs in 2004 when they slugged it out with Brighton & Hove Albion over two heartbreaking ties - with one event in particular etched upon his memory.

"Those games were very keenly fought indeed, although we were too good for Brighton for the majority of the tie," he recalled.

"I can remember Sam Parkin having a tooth knocked out, and we were trawling around the pitch after the game trying to

"We managed it in the end, and we stuck it in some milk, took it to the dentist and Sam got it shoved back in with matchsticks and drawing pins!

"That may give you a flavour as to the competitive nature of these sorts of games."

So a potentially frantic night lies in wait for one of Town's longest serving members of staff, but he is hopeful a heightened sense of awareness on his part will see the match pass off as peacefully as possible.

"The tempo will be fantastic right from the start until the end, but it's going to be quite a nerve wracking time as we've got to be vigilant with injuries in mind.

'Hopefully it will pass without us picking up anything bad - it's certainly something I've been mulling over for the last couple of days!"



"We've had patches where I've had five or six people in my office regularly, but when you do have numbers like that it allows you to get them out quite quickly.

"We've had one or two who have sort of hung around for longer than I would have liked, but in the main it's not been too bad.

'As a physic you are implicated when you get too many players hanging around your office, so you want to get them out playing as soon as possible.

"In my experience it's usually the one the manager wants who is in your office, but thankfully this year the manager has been able to put out pretty much the team he would have wanted to."



'Gordon's head injury was fairly moderate in the last match against Charlton here, so it wasn't too much to worry about, though head injuries are always a concern because there can be other problems associated with them

"But provided there is no concussion or anything then they're usually ok to deal with.

"To say the season and the injuries I've had to deal with have been straightforward is not quite accurate because we've had a few strange ones, not least Callum Kennedy with his pelvic problem.

"But thankfully, bar one or two incidents with opposing sides on the pitch where I've had to lend a hand, we've avoided any major catastrophes."





Two and a half years have now passed since the takeover. How quickly has that period passed for you?

That's a really interesting question - I suppose that the time's passed quickly and we've already done and achieved a great deal. On the other hand, sometimes the last ten minutes of a game can seem incredibly slow!

The ten point plan published soon after the takeover pledged Championship football within five years. That target is tantalisingly close now isn't it?

I think I said at the outset that if we achieved Championship football within three years, we would have succeeded and that if we didn't achieve it within five years, we would have failed. It is tantalisingly close now and maybe it's come a little bit

earlier than we expected, but history shows it's really difficult to get out of League One and into the Championship and we need to grab the opportunity while it's there.

Reaching the play-offs has certainly given the town of Swindon another wake-up call. Do you think people are now realising the good work that is going on?

I hope so, though it's not always obvious and it's easy to get disheartened when, for instance, crowds are low. But, with the quality of football that we've been playing under Danny's stewardship and the fact that we've shown ourselves to be a force to be reckoned with, I hope that people are beginning to realise that they don't need to travel to Reading, Southampton, Bristol and Aston Villa in order to enjoy a great atmosphere and good football.

How much, in terms of finance and reputation, would reaching Wembley benefit the club?

I think the really important thing is probably reputation - Swindon is back! We're a force to be reckoned with and people now hold us up as an example of how a club should be run rather than us being a bit of a 'joke'. And we haven't got there by accident - we haven't sneaked into the playoffs at the last game, we've really been showing our ability since Christmas. From this perspective, if you asked me which was the most important achievement, the financial or the reputational, I would have to say it's the reputation because we can build from here and our reputation will help us to attract the right players, etc.

Having said all of that, the financial aspects are important, but the play-offs are not

the financial bonanza that everybody thinks they are (that comes later if you get promoted). With the way the cash is pooled and split, and the amount that The Football League take out of the 'pot' to spread across the League, it's very dependent on the quality of the clubs you have in the play-offs because they bring the big crowds. For instance, if we were playing Millwall in the play-off final at Wembley, I suspect that we would get a crowd of over 75,000 so, the fact that we've got four big teams in the play-offs will make a big difference to the overall gate. With football finance so precarious, any additional money is helpful and certainly appearing in the play-off final would enable us to get a little bit closer to balancing the books.

What games have you been to at Wembley before and





what do you think of the new Wembley itself?

I've been to many games at both the old and the new Wembley - mostly Cup Finals and I also went to the League One play-off final last year between Millwall and Scunthorpe when Scunthorpe were promoted.

I think the new Wembley. as a piece of architecture, is fabulous - it can be seen from all over London, it's a fantastically iconic stadium, and in this regard, much better than the old stadium. But, somehow, it lacks the atmosphere of the old stadium - then again, that's said about many modern football grounds versus the older 'tighter' grounds.

With regard to the pitch, I don't want to jump on the 'band wagon' of everything that's been said over the last few weeks and months, but it's obvious there's a problem.

I went to the League Cup Final between Manchester United and Aston Villa earlier in the season and the most obvious thing was that the pitch seemed slow and almost heavy and that's ridiculous for a pitch of that quality. It's something that they need to sort out because. frankly, I think that good players want to play on good fast surfaces. The problem we all have is that every time there's a series of complaints, they decide to re-lay the pitch and I don't think that anybody has any faith in the latest one being any better than the last one.

Now onto tonight's game... you commentated on the game between Swindon and Charlton at The Valley on Boxing Day. Did you enjoy the experience and will you be 'behind the mic' again on Monday night?

There is a rumour that I might

be 'behind the mic' on Monday night, but I haven't decided yet whether to do it or not!

Look, at the end of the day, I enjoy the experience and I think the BBC has done a great job for us this year and they deserve great credit for the coverage, not only of the games, but the coverage of the club in general. I said at the beginning of the season that I would do a couple of games a season for them, probably based around festive holidays (so I did Boxing Day and Easter which happened to be Charlton and Leeds) and I'll do the same next year. With regard to Monday night, it's a question of 'wait and see', but I'm sure I won't be far away from the microphone at some stage!

Town have to play first leg at The County Ground and the second leg away. Does that give either side the edge?

A lot is said about this and the natural assumption is that you want to play your first leg away from home, but I'm not sure it's going to make a great deal of difference on this occasion. I expect both games will be very tight and nobody will want to make a mistake, so it may be reliant on a moment of class from a player in order to separate the teams. Having said this, if we play like we did against Leeds (either at home or away), then anything can happen.

A number of teams that we've played this season have said that we play some of the best football in the League – it was Paul Lambert at Norwich who said that, from a footballing perspective, we were the best team that they had played during the season. They say that the cream always rises to the top - let's hope that's true tonight.






You have played in a few night games here already. Are you looking






