





INTOWN

Danny Wilson believes **BRENTFORD** are 'dark horses' for League 1 promotion this season, and with boss Andy Scott having made a number of noteworthy signings over the summer, it would be a brave person who bets against the Town manager.

HOWEVER, despite this undoubted promise, it has been a tough start to the season for the Bees, with a 2-0 defeat at Carlisle United on the opening day of the campaign being followed by a 2-1 reverse at the hands of Walsall at Griffin Park last weekend

This has done little to dampen spirits in West London though, with the excitement about the signings of Nicky Forster, Craig Woodman and Richard Lee still keeping confidence high around the club.

Sandwiched in between these defeats was a victory over Cheltenham Town in

the Carling Cup, with goals from Woodman and Robbie Simpson clinching a 2-1 win at Griffin Park which saw the Bees through to the second round of the competition for the first time since 2007.

Former Town striker Gary Alexander notched his first for the visitors in Saturday's 2-1 defeat to Walsall, and will be hopeful of causing problems again today alongside long-time Town nemesis Nicky Forster.

Scott's side did not travel particularly well last season. winning just five of their 23 away trips in 2009/2010. from which Town can draw some encouragement as

they seek their first home win of the season this aftermoon

In the two clashes between the sides last season, Town came away with 3-2 victories on both occasions, with a brace from Alex Revell and one from Ben Hutchinson sealing the win at Griffin Park in October, and a Billy Paynter double and one from Danny Ward clinching the points in Town's last home game of the season in May.

Bees fans will be hopeful that their side can reverse those score-lines as they bid to kick-start their season at The County Ground this afternoon.


BRENTFORD arrive in Town today looking to register their first League I win of the campaign, and can boast an experienced squad with a

number of summer signings in contention for a starting berth this afternoon.




ALEX McCARTHY 41

The 20-year old goalkeeper joined Brentford in the first week of the new season initially on a 28-day loan from Reading. He made his England U21 debut against U2bekistan two days prior to signing for The Bees. Last season he spent a season long loan with League 1 side Yeovil Town where he made 45 appearances in total.



SIMON 31

The goalkeeper made his debut for the Bees when he came on as a substitute against Hartlepool United as a substitute for the departing Wojciech Szczesny in the final game of last season. He subsequently made his full debut for The Bees at Carlisle United in the opening game of this season.



NICKY FORSTER

8

Nicky Forster returned to the Bees on a two-year contract in June 2010.

The striker started his career at Gillingham during the 1993-94 season and scored 18 goals. During the summer of 1994 he turned down a new contract and joined the Bees. He formed a prolific partnership with Carl Asaba and Robert Taylor and made 109 league appearances for Brentford and scored 39 goals during his time at Griffin Park. He was capped by England at under-21 level soon afterwards.

In January 1997, he was sold to Birmingham City for a fee of £700,000. Two years later he was on the move to Reading before spells with Ipswich Town, Hull City and Brighton & Hove Albion.



McCRACKEN 5

McCracken joined Brentford on a two-year contract from MK Dons in June. The 28-year old Glaswegian is a strong central defender, with Scottish Under-21 international honours. He began his career with Dundee United and subsequently played for Wycombe Wanderers as captain and MK Dons, who he joined in the summer of 2009.



PIM BALKESTEIN

Balkestein signed for Brentford permanently in mid-August on a three-year contract. The Netherlandsborn centre-back came through the ranks at SC Heerenveen. He joined Ipswich Town in June 2008 and made his debut against Preston North End in August 2008. Last season he spent two loan spells with Brentford.



KARLEIGH 22

A strong athletic centreback, Osborne came through the Brentford youth team ranks. He made his league debut for Brentford against Hull City in May 2005 at the age of just 17 under Martin Allen, having been an unused substitute earlier in the season when he was only 16. He is approaching 100 league starts for The Bees.



LEGGE

32

The 25-year old was signed by Andy Scott twelve months ago from Tonbridge Angels. He began his career playing non-league football for Eastbourne United, Hailsham Town, Eastbourne Borough. Woking and Tonbridge Angels. He scored twice in 28 league appearances last season.



WOODMAN

Woodman is a left-back who began his career with Bristol City as a trainee before turning professional in June 2000. He had loan spells with Mansfield Town, Torquay United before signing for Wycombe. He was a key player during the Chairboys promotion season in 2008/09. missing just ten minutes of league action all year




O'CONNOR

O'Connor is Brentford's longest-serving player after signing professional forms in 1999. He made his 400th appearance against Swindon Town last season. The Blackburn-born 28-year old's long-service was rewarded with a testimonial against Fulham in July 2010 at Griffin Park. He scored 5 goals from midfield last term.



WOOD

A committed player who can play either left-back or left midfield. Wood joined Brentford in May 2008 before signing a contract extension a year later. He started out in non-league with Cray and Bromley, where his performances caught the eve of professional clubs with Griffin Park his destination of choice



BEAN

Bean was signed by Andy Scott in May 2008 after being released from Blackpool. His first season proved successful and he signed a new two-year contract the following season. He started his career as a trainee at OPR. He went on to spend four years there before a move to Blackpool in 2006 and joined Brentford in 2008.

INTERESTING FACT!

Lou Macari brought Chris Kamara back to Swindon from Brentford in August 1985 with a fee of £12,500. In total Kamara made 298 league appearances scoring 32 goals for Swindon before joining Stoke City in July 1988 for £27,500.



DIAGOURAGA 💪

Diagouraga returned to Griffin Park from Peterborough United on a three-year deal in the summer after an impressive loan spell with The Bees last term. The Paris-born midfielder will be well known to The County Ground faithful after an eight-game loan spell in Wiltshire back in March 2006.



GARY ALEXANDER 29

Another player returning to his former club this afternoon, Alexander joined Brentford from Millwall just two days before the start of the season. A goalscorer for The Lions in the 2009 League I play off final, he began his career with West Ham before spells at Swindon, Hull City and Leyton Orient




CHARLIE MacDONALD 10

The experienced striker joined Brentford in July 2008 for an undisclosed fee on a two-year contract.

He scored 18 goals in his first season at the Club and helped Brentford to the League 2 Championship. He was awarded the Powerade League 2 Player of the Month award for February 2009 and topped Brentford's goalscoring charts last season earning a new contract in March.

The 29-year old started out at Millwall before joining Charlton Athletic as a trainee and turned professional in August 1998. He made his Charlton debut in January 2000 but was released in May 2002 and slipped into Non-League playing for Margate, Stevenage Borough, Crawley Town and Gravesend & Northfleet.



Having taken 62 points from 46 games last term, Brentford boss **ANDY SCOTT** saw his side secure a comfortable midtable finish. After a difficult start to the new campaign, he will hope to get back on track with a Wiltshire win today.

ANDY Scott started his professional career when Sheffield United signed him from Sutton United in 1992.

He signed for Brentford as a player for £75,000 in November 1997 and went on to make 136 appearances for the Club scoring 35 goals and being an integral part of The Bees Third Division Championship winning side the following season.

In the 2000/01 season having scored 13 goals in 22 appearances in January he was surprisingly sold to Oxford United fully recouping the initial outlay of £75,000.

He moved on to Leyton Orient in March 2004 and played 50 games before having to retire from the game when diagnosed with the life threatening heart disorder hypertrophic cardiomyopathy.

Scott then took up a coaching role at Leyton Orient before becoming the club's youth team manager.

In May 2007, he returned to The Bees as assistant manager to Terry Butcher. After a difficult first few months of the campaign (which included a 7-0 demolition at Peterborough United) Butcher was sacked from his managerial post Scott stepped up to take over as caretaker manager and did enough to be awarded the job on a permanent basis, signing a five-year contract in January 2008. His first calendar year in charge

resulted in winning the BBC London 'Manager of The Year' for 2008 and he won the 2008/2009 League 2 title.

The summer of 2009 saw a significant switch over of playing personnel with nine out of contract players allowed to seek pastures new Scott was runner-up of the prestigious LMA Manager of the Year Award



One To Watch

25-year old **ROBBIE SIMPSON** began his football career with Norwich City at the age of nine, spending six years at Carrow Road after signing schoolboy terms.




AFTER being released by The Canaries he joined up with Cambridge City and made his debut for the club as a 16-year old. He spent four seasons with Cambridge City, scoring 42 goals in 113 appearances for the club before a switch to rivals Cambridge United in the summer of 2006. He finished the 2006/07 campaign with 17 goals from just 33 appearances and at the end of that season he won a multitude of club awards.

Simpson chose to join
Coventry City at the start
of the following season,
linking up with Iain Dowie
at The Ricoh Arena. It was
a dream start to his Sky
Blues career for Simpson
who netted just five minutes
into his competitive debut
in a League Cup tie against
Notts County. However, the

following two seasons at Coventry proved to be frustrating with just four goals from 24 league starts.

Coventry allowed the striker to leave in the summer of 2009 following a £300,000 offer from Huddersfield Town. After struggling with injury last term. The Terriers allowed the frontman to join Brentford on a season-long loan in August.

Ferry impressed during the midweek demolition of Plymouth Argyle in a reserve team game, with a typically fervent midfield display.

"The boys did really well and to win against such a strong Plymouth side four nil was a fantastic achievement," Ferry added. "I enjoyed the game and it was great to get another ninety minutes under my belt."

Callum Kennedy

WITH experience of facing today's visitors Brentford last season, Callum Kennedy is hoping to continue his own fitness drive with the aim of returning to the first team fold before too long.

Kennedy played a full game for the Town second string in midweek against Plymouth Argyle and admits he is feeling sharper, stronger and closer than ever to full fitness after shaking off an injury sustained at the back end of last term.

"It was good to get 90 minutes under my belt. In fitness terms I am still getting back into it but the training is going well and I'm nearly there now.

"The away game against Brentford last season was a close one. I think we went ahead twice and Brentford kept coming back into the game, but thankfully we held on for the win. The Brentford fans were really loud on the day and I remember it being a really good atmosphere down there at Criffin Park.

"Hopefully the lads can get back on track with a win at home this weekend."


STRIKER Vincent Pericard insists the Town squad are now moving in a positive direction after The Robins claimed a share of the spoils in the North East.

Today's match referee **STEVE RUSHTON** has officiated three fixtures so far this term, most recently taking charge of Swansea City's 4-0 win over Preston North End seven days ago.



HE last refereed Swindon in February in League 1, overseeing the 2-2 draw against Huddersfield Town at The Galpharm Stadium. Here the official matchday magazine gets to know a little more about the man in charge of this afternoon's contest.

How did you get in to refereeing?

My Dad was a Football League Referee and having watched him for many years I decided to take the refereeing course. The idea was first to help with my GCSE PE and secondly to earn some pocket money.

What has been the highlight of your career so far?

There have been many highlights, but getting onto the Football League National List of Assistants was a very proud moment.

What is the best game you have officiated and why?

For the overall sense of achievement I would say the FA Youth Cup Final between Manchester City v Chelsea in 2007/08. To be awarded the Three Lions badge and officiate on such a high-profile game in my second season will always take some beating.

What are your aims as a National List Referee?

My first aim is to be the best that I can be for all appointments. The second is to finish as high as I can on the merit list. Third is to be in a position whereby I am considered for promotion to the Select Group.

What skills do you need to become an Assistant Referee?

You need to have a good level of physical fitness so that you can maintain alertness as the game progresses. You need to understand the difference between assistance and interference. You need the mental strength to make the big decision when it is required.

Who has been the biggest influence on your career and why?

My Dad has been a huge influence on my career. He has acted as a coach, mentor and friend. He has never been afraid to tell me my faults and has always identified the positives. He kept faith with my ability when early promotions up the pyramid were hard to achieve.

In your opinion who is/ was the best Referee?

I have the utmost faith in my own ability, but would love to emulate the achievements of Phil Sharp.

THE last home game against Leyton Orient was a special one for Town fan David Walker.

The Arkell's Stand Season Ticket holder attended his 1,800th consecutive Swindon fixture against The O's after starting to follow The Robins back on 13th September 1947 against Crystal Palace. The game finished 0-0, with Walker cycling to and from the game.

"The top one would be the Swindon versus Burnley at West Brom in the third deciding game of the League Cup semi-final in 1969," he says astutely.

"I remember Smith scoring in the first half, then Burnley equalised a minute before fulltime to send the game into extra-time. Having gone behind, Noble scored to help give Swindon the win.

"What made the game so memorable for me was being at the front of the crowd and being able to hear everything. I could hear Willie Penman talking to Peter Noble and saying 'Burnley are finished'. Seconds later Bellamy scored an own goal for Burnley before Peter Noble scored the winner.

"The Wembley trips will never match that game at West Brom. It was incredible."



ODDIN WELL

It's been quite a year for Town youngster **BILLY BODIN.** In the past twelve months
the Welshman has turned 18, played for
his country at U21 level, won the league
title with the Town U18s and signed a
first professional contract at The County
Ground. That's what you call a whirlwind
introduction to the pro game.

NOW six weeks into the 2010/11 season, we sat down with the 18-year old to gauge his thoughts on making the step up into the senior ranks and how mixing it with the world's best young players can help him make an impact at club level.

You have played quite a bit of international football already, most recently playing for Wales U21s in Malta last week. How did that go?

It was a great experience. The weather was pretty hot out there and although we dominated the game we couldn't quite get the win. Getting more game time at international level was great though and I was really pleased to be involved again. It was the third time I had played for the U21s and I have enjoyed it every time. Hopefully I did well enough to be included for the forthcoming games against Hungary and Italy.

Who is the toughest team you have played against on the international scene?

I played for Wales U19s against Spain U19s and they were tremendous. It wasn't surprising to see Spain lift the World Cup this year because they have so much ability and a tremendous understanding of the game.

And the best player played with?

Ched Evans and Simon Church are both up there as the best players I have played with, certainly in the Welsh set-up. Going away and getting involved with Wales is great experience and seeing how other teams play their football is really useful.

What are the strengths and weaknesses of your game do you think?

My strengths are probably getting the ball at my feet and running at defenders. I like to score goals but have played in quite a few positions. I came on up front at the end of the Nottingham Forest game at The County Cround in pre-season. That was a great experience because I was playing against established Championship players.

Who were the players that you admired when you were coming up through the youth team ranks?

When I first signed at Swindon on scholarship forms I was playing most of my football as a left winger, so Anthony McNamee was one of the players in my position in the first team at the time. He was one of the best in the league at running at defenders when he was here. In terms of scoring goals, Billy (Paynter) and Charlie (Austin) did ever so well last season and I took a lot on board from watching them.

"It was a great experience

because I was playing against established Championship players."

Who did you support as a boy?

Manchester United. I started following them when I was about eight-years old and one season I went to see nearly every game.

This season I think Hernandez will do well for them and probably end up as top goalscorer for United.

What has been the most memorable moment of your career so far?

There have been a few actually. Signing my first professional contract here at Swindon was a big moment for me. Winning the Milk Cup in Northern Ireland was fantastic and making my first appearance for Wales at U21 level was another milestone I'll remember.

And what has been the biggest challenge for you so far?

I think the 2010/11 season will be the biggest challenge of all for me. There are some really good players in the squad at the moment and I know I'm going to have to work really hard to break in. I want to try and play as much as I can but that will only come through working hard on the training ground and taking the advice that I am given on board.

BODIN:



What is the best advice you have ever been given?

I have been told 'work, tackle, chase' on a number of occasions and that always seems to ring true. If you think that during a game then I don't think you can go far wrong.

Does it still feel strange adjusting to being a professional rather than a youth team player?

On the first day of pre-season I did actually walk straight into the youth team dressing room. It took a few days to get used to the fact that I was now one of the pros but that's all part of the adjustments I have had to make. 'Prutts' has been great with me and taken me under his wing a bit. He has a bit of banter with everyone.

I have a bit more spare time now, too. I go shopping quite a lot and it's nice just to chill out. I usually stay quite local and either go into Swindon or head into Reading. Starbucks is quite popular with a few of the lads. My favourite is a caramel frappuccino.

Do you have a nickname?

'Prutts' calls me wet-look because of my hair. He thinks I use too much gel on it but I don't think it's that bad. Most of the other lads just call me 'Bodes'.

The Town changing room was recently infiltrated by a mystery 'lookalike' poster. What was yours and who were the best lookalikes?

Mine was down as Frank Lampard's other half, Christine Bleakley, because of my smile probably. The best ones were probably Michael Rose and David Ball who were down as twins

How much has Danny Wilson spoken to you about your aims for the year?

The manager had a word with me in Austria and we chatted about

the season ahead and what my aims should be. He told me to keep working hard and apply myself in the best way possible.

Where would you like to be in five years time?

I would like to be playing as high as possible. The first priority is to get into the starting side here at Swindon and try and get a regular run of games under my belt. My dream is to be playing my club football in Spain and also for the Welsh national team. You have to aim high.

All you need to know about the new STFC Membership scheme...

FOR some considerable time STFC has been exploring ways in which it could engage more effectively with the broad spectrum of supporters, be they Season Ticket holders, regular matchday attendees or keen fans who cannot get to The County Cround for reasons of logistics or geography. The solution, whilst not revolutionary but tried and tested across many league clubs, is a Membership scheme, hence the introduction of the STFC Red Membership scheme.

The STFC Red Membership scheme was launched recently with three different tiers of Membership:

JUNIOR RED ONE RED CLUB RED

Since the launching the Membership scheme in July, close to 1,000 supporters have joined and there is growing interest in the scheme. Zoe Collman will be joining as STFC Membership Secretary next week and we are confident that once onboard, she will be successful in taking the project on and growing the Membership.

Each category of Membership carries a menu of benefits, benefits which in our view far outweighs the modest joining fees. In the case of Season Ticket holders, One Red Membership is FREE, so there is no reason for all 5,500 Season Ticket holders not to sign up. Of equal importance, Membership will hopefully help bond fans closer to the club through a series of innovative communication programmes and by being a Member of the scheme; they will feel a sense of pride of ownership. Furthermore, at the time of ticket allocation for the League One Play-Off Semi-Final and Final, there was concern amongst many fans, that those who were non Season Ticket holders but regular matchday attendees, where not being properly recognised. The STFC Membership has been designed to help

prevent this being a recurring issue.

Now it has become apparent that amongst some Season Ticket holders there is a degree of unhappiness about the Membership scheme concept. The feeling is that the introduction of the Membership scheme has removed the 10% club shop discount, something that they consider to be a long established Season Ticket holder benefit. There is also unhappiness that it is proposed that 3rd shirt purchase priority will go first to STFC Club Red Members and not Season Ticket holders.

The club is keen to stress that none of these actions should come as a surprise as the removal of some Season Ticket holder benefits, in tandem with the introduction of the STFC Red Membership scheme formed an integral part of the 2010/11 Season Ticket campaign literature. The club also attempted to signal to Season Ticket holders, that the price of Season Tickets was being maintained (in the case of the Town End reduced to £199) in return

for stripping away some benefits and introducing a Membership scheme.

A recent analysis carried out by FourFourTwo has revealed that at £259 for an Adult Season Ticket, Swindon Town is the third cheapest Season Ticket across the entire 92 league clubs. The club cannot continue to offer Season Tickets at these competitive prices without introducing alternative revenue generating initiatives. The STFC Red Membership scheme is one such initiative and if considered fully, the benefits will become readily apparent.

So as a measure of your support for the club, which is doing everything possible to deliver a well-run, financially sustainable club with a bright future, we would encourage you to take up Membership and by doing so, demonstrate that you share this commitment.







CHARLIE AND THE FOOTBALL FACTORY



CHILDREN attending a recent Football in the Community course had the opportunity to meet and greet one of their heroes!

Charlie Austin took time out after training to spend time with the children who questioned the striker about making the transition from non-league rookie to professional marksman and his time at Swindon so far. Austin has made a fine start to the new campaign and he has now scored an impressive 21 goals in 31 league appearances. Despite his success on the pitch, the frontman continues to make an impact off it, as he explains.

"The kids were on a ground tour with Football in the Community. I saw them go into the away dressing room and I thought it would be a nice touch to go in and say 'hello'. They were quite a lively group and hopefully they enjoyed the tour and will be back at The County Ground soon cheering the lads on."

FC SWINDON MALAKIA

WITH the help of two Gloucestershire-based Doctors, Swindon Town Football Club have helped start a football team in the small Sierra Leone village of Malakia.

Doctor Rohit Sethi contacted STFC before travelling out to West Africa in the summer and the club happily donated a full set of football kit to the cause. After returning from the trip, Dr Sethi emailed the club with a review of what was a successful visit.

"Every year my wife and I volunteer our time to work on medical projects in Sierra Leone," said Dr Sethi.

"Although the war has now ended the country remains 'very broken'. Most of Sierra Leone still has no running water or electricity and nearly three quarters of the population live on less than one pound a day.



"This year I took out a complete Swindon Town football strip which was used to start a youth team in one of the villages where I was working. The Village was called Malakia and so the team have very proudly called themselves FC Swindon Malakia."

Dr Sethi explained the important role that football plays in the lives of those children who live in what is one of the poorest countries in the world and has been ravaged by civil war and internal conflict.

"The boys that you see in the picture come from deprived homes and many of them have lost parents and family members as a result of the war. Most young people in Sierra Leone are 'football mad' and this provides a healthy distraction to the everyday hardships that they face," he continued.

"As you can see, wearing the Swindon Town shirts made them very proud and brought a lot of happiness into their lives. It is hoped that this will spur them on to train hard and join a local league!

"The medical work that we do is to support the provision of Mobile Health Clinics in this very poor region of Africa. We have also helped to set up a Feeding Centre for malnourished children."

TY GOODEN

TY GOODEN made 134 appearances for
Town in a seven-year spell at The County Ground,
and looks back nostalgically on his time at
SN1 of which he admits to holding
'fond memories all round.'

AN energetic, creative left-sided midfielder, Gooden made his debut at the age of 22 in March 1994 towards the back end of Town's ill-fated Premiership season, coming on as a second half replacement for Frank McAvennie during the 1-1 draw with West Ham United at The County Ground.

While many will remember the game as little more than a rare moment of parity with a Premier League side, Gooden recalls an entirely different feeling that day.

"Obviously it was a good result for us because we were on the end of some heavy defeats that year and I really felt for John (Gorman, then Town manager), because it was an impossible task to follow Glenn Hoddle." he said.

"But for me that game was just the culmination of a year's hard work, as I'd left Wycombe and wasn't fit enough because it was part-time so I had to really knuckle down and get fit.

"I came to Swindon on trial so had to work really hard to get a deal, and then did the same throughout that season, so to get my debut towards the end of it was a lovely reward for my hard work.

especially in such a big league."

Gooden went on to become a key part of both the Second Division Championship winning side of 1995/96, and of the team that cemented Town's First Division status in the late '90s – both eras he still recalls vividly.

"It was a great season ('95/96), but it was a little bit sad for me towards the end because I had to have a hernia operation so I missed out on the last 10 games or so," he said.

"But it was still a great season and it was great to feel part of what was a very successful team.

"The Championship – as it is now - has always been really tough, and midtable was probably about right

for a club of our resources at


"The season that sticks out is the one where we were top in November when Chrissy Hay was scoring all the goals, but he got injured and we couldn't stay there.

"It would have been great to get in and around the top end of that division, but you finish where you deserve to be at the end of each year and we did exactly that."

After retiring in 2005, the 37-year-old relocated to North-West France, where he still lives with his wife and three children, and has worked as a scout for both Reading and Sunderland

during his time abroad.

He said: "I really enjoy the scouting: it's great to still be involved in football and having a day to day involvement in it is probably the next best thing to playing.

"My contract with Sunderland has just come to an end and I'm in the process of working on a freelance scouting project which will hopefully be up and running soon.

"I'm based mainly in France but I've done a few bits and pieces in Belgium and Switzerland as well, and I did the African Nations Cup in Ghana in 2008 too.

"But it's usually French First Division games and it's great because you're not just watching first team football, you get to see reserves and all levels of youth football as well.

"And having done it for a while now you start to see players developing and can gauge how well you've been doing too."

Until recently Gooden had also been indulging his other major interest in life, fishing, by arranging holidays to the French town of Hambers, before selling the business he had run for five years in order to fully concentrate on his scouting career.


"It was different, and fishing is something I have a passion for so I enjoyed doing it," he said.

"I've always fished since I was 10 years old with my dad, and it really took off for me when I was at Swindon, as I used to finish training and spend the afternoon's fishing on the rivers out towards Lechlade!

"It was great at the time, but the football opportunity came up not long after I started it and it was difficult to juggle the two with a young family.

"Something had to give in the end so that's gone and I'm looking to concentrate on the football side again now."



28-year old Douglas had been at Elland Road for two years before the arrival of Prutton and Lucas in the summer of 2007, and it was from then on that their relationship developed, both on and off the pitch.

The Irishman, easily the quietest of the three, recalls his opening encounters with Prutton and Lucas – both his senior by three years and two months respectively.

"I used to live in Preston so I would see Dave out and about round there but I didn't really know him until I went to Leeds," he said.

"I used to travel in with Dave from Manchester to Leeds every morning when he joined, so I got to know him pretty well, and then just got to know Prutts through training and playing with him.

"They are two great lads and are both a little bit older than me so they've always told me to respect my elders!"

Prutton, firmly on the other end of the exuberance scale, remembers his early experiences as a Leeds United player, again centring largely on his new Town teammates.

"I think they knew each other from I don't quite remember where, but they travelled in together so they hit it off a bit earlier," he said.

"There were a core of lads who had been there (at Leeds) the year before and knew each other from then, so at the warm ups you'd be doing your stretching and would hear the lads chatting and think 'what are they talking about?', and then you'd try and get involved in it!

"But it didn't take long for us to get on, and you end up with that type of friendship where if someone had a problem with you they'd say it, and neither Dougie or Dave are particularly shy in saying their piece are they?"

Of those early morning trips into Whites training, Lucas recalls: "Dougie's company often lightened the mood on the trips into training at Leeds.

"His driving is fine to be honest, but it did get a bit depressing sometimes heading across the M62 in January in the freezing cold!

"Prutts was one of the first people I spoke to (at Elland Road), and on the first away trip I noticed he had similar tastes to me so there were plenty of easy ice breakers."

And in terms of the trio's off the pitch persona, there are very few contradictions in their analyses of each other's specific traits.

"Dougle tends not to be as flippant with his comments as Prutts is," said Lucas of the new Town skipper.

"They're both equally fun-loving, but they show it in different ways!"



"He's quite happy to sit there and not say anything, whereas I never shut up.

"Then with Lucs you have this big barking noise behind you all day telling you what to do - but he's not just a shouter, he's technically a very good 'keeper."

"Prutts is just a different sort of character really," commented Douglas on Town's summer acquisition.


"He doesn't really like playing golf or anything like that, he just likes being chirpy and smelly all the time.

"Lucs has got two little boys and he just likes to spend all his time with them really which is great.

'But they're both great lads and I'm delighted to have them here."

For Douglas, who was naturally disappointed to have lost close friend Gordon Greer to Brighton & Hove Albion over the summer, the arrival of Prutton was a welcome tonic, not least as it also signalled the pulling power Swindon Town now has as a club.

"It's great for me to have those two (Lucas and Prutton) down here, especially after I lost my other buddy Gordon (Greer) over the summer." he said.

"But not just for me, it's great to have them here for the team as well because they're both good players and that can only help the team this year.

"I know Prutts had a couple more clubs coming in for him over the summer, and the fact that he wanted to come here just shows what we achieved last year really at such a small club.

Lucas added: "Everyone here knows what Dougle is about as he was brilliant last season and Prutts brings energy and some more real quality to the team.

"He never stops bombing forward and he's got a lot of the attributes we need."

And as far as Prutton is concerned, he admits the presence of his fellow former Whites at The County Ground significantly influenced his decision to move to Wiltshire in July.

"I'll be honest, Dougle and Lucs were a big factor in me coming to the club over the summer," he said.

"It all ended quite differently for us up at Leeds really because the other two were playing towards the end whereas I wasn't and that got very frustrating for me.

"So I was delighted to come down here to meet up with some old friends, and with the quality this club's got, we should do well this season." The summer months saw many changes at The County Ground, one of the most notable of which was the departure of top scorer and livewire Billy Paynter, but Lucas and Douglas believe the club have found a ready-made replacement for the Scouser in 28-year old Prutton.

"We lost a big character in the summer in Billy Payriter, but Prutts has come in and has taken over from him really which is good," Douglas enthused.

"He has always been the same; he's a great lad and is brilliant to have around the dressing room.

"Billy was just about as loud as Prutts is I think," Lucas added, "and you need that bit of madness everyday in the changing room.


"It keeps everyone in a good mood and it helps keep things light-hearted because you can get bogged down with everything sometimes."

As is often the case with any matter, the last word is left to Prutton, who reiterates his appreciation of having met two close companions in the often frantic and nomadic world of professional football.

"When you meet people with a similar sense of humour and outlook on life to you then you tend to just get on with them straight away and that's what happened with those two," he said.

"We're into the same things, and when you spend a lot of time in hotels in each others" pockets then it's nice to be able to get along so well.





The late, great Bill Shankly once famously said: "Some people believe football is a matter of life and death. I can assure you, it is much, much more important than that."



NEVER has a quote been further from the truth than the last couple of weeks, when Exeter striker Adam Stansfield lost his battle with bowel cancer, and Southampton owner Markus Liebherr passed away suddenly.

While the pair may not be household names in the world of football, it put the sport (and ultimately that is all it is - a sport) firmly into perspective.

Fans across the country can grumble about their side's start to the season. complain about a lack of activity in the transfer market, and demand the sacking of their manager, but when a 31-year-old with three children under the age of eight loses his life. you cannot help but take a step back

and wonder if we all take the beautiful game far too seriously at times.

Liebherr rescued the Saints from the brink of extinction and, despite not being at St Mary's long, is thought of in Andrew Fitton-esque proportions at the south coast club for his rescue act.

And Stansfield may have only plyed his trade in the lower leagues, predominantly with Yeovil and Exeter, but was idolised wherever he went, and praised by supporters and teammates.

In times of sadness you can draw great strength, and the passing of both men proves that in a cut-throat business with increasing amounts of pressure heaped on players and managers alike, some of the good

guys remain.

And that is utterly refreshing in an era when stars of the game are seemingly becoming more and more detached from reality.

The New Season

THE opening couple of weeks of the season has proved one thing for sure - League One is going to be just as unpredictable as it was last year.

Who could have foreseen title favourites Southampton slipping up at home to Plymouth? Or Oldham under rookie manager Paul Dickov taking maximum points so far?

But that is why you can give me the Football League any day over the top flight. Excitement, entertainment, a touch of reality, and no total domination by the big spenders.

Finally, much has been written, spoken and agonised over Town's stuttering start to the season and I'm not going to go over that again here.

Apart from one thing.

Cast your mind back 12 months: in league action, a defeat on the opening day of the 2009/10 campaign was followed up by a draw, and suddenly Town manager Danny Wilson's talk of promotion seemed maybe a touch optimistic.

But it ended with Swindon agonisingly close to the top two and appearing at Wembley in the play-off final.

Prior to today's clash, there are 44 league games remaining, and this is arguably the most talented squad at The County Ground in recent history. Keep the faith, simple as that.

When Phil Thompson proudly held aloft the European Cup in Paris in May 1981, it was the realisation of every young Liverpudlian's dream.

For here was a lifelong Red, born into a working-class family in Kirkby, who completed a meteoric rise through the ranks to the summit of continental football.

Atmosphere: 8/10

There were only about 250 Town fans there but the atmosphere was really good in the away end. The Hartlepool fans didn't make a lot of noise, but the Swindon fans kept going and helped the team come back and grab a point."

Club shop: 6/10

"It was quite small but it seemed to have all the basics in there. There were

a lot of fans wearing new merchandise. Hartlepool's kit suppliers are Avec, which makes you appreciate the wide range of stock that adidas have."

Directions: 5/10

"I don't think the signage in Hartlepool was that good but it's only small place so it wasn't hard to find the ground. The journey is quite easy - all motorway - and I managed to avoid most of the traffic"

"I had a look at it on the morning of the game. It was easy to navigate around as Hartlepool use the same system as Swindon, so it was a similar layout."

Kiosks: 4/10

"The service was very slow. I missed the start of the second half because they only had two people working behind the kiosk and they had run out of pies, hot dogs and burgers. My friend had a burger before

the game and said they

were rubbish anyway."

Stadium: 4/10

"The ground needs some modernisation and money spent on it but as Hartlepool only get a few thousand in every game. it's understandable that

there isn't much resource to change things around."

Pies: 0/10

"I went to the kiosk at half-time and they had already run out of pies. Considering there were only 250 or so fans in the away end to sell-out wasn't great. I was looking forward to a pie!"

Programme: 6/10

"I think Hartlepool had done quite a bit of research on Swindon, so that was good. There didn't seem to be any sort of order to it and there were a couple of misprints. The Swindon section was good though."

Pitch: 7/10

"There weren't any bobbles or anything and it was certainly better than Wembley. It's the start of the season so you'd expect any pitch in the league to be pretty good."

Steward friendliness:

They were good and cracked a couple of jokes which was good to see - even if they were at the expense of my girlfriend! The stewards were helpful with directions and generally pretty helpful."
