Finally, I'm sure you would like to join with me and wish Chambo a speedy recovery, following his early exit against Brighton last Tuesday night.

In what was a freak accident and he suffered a very deep gash to his leg. It looks as if he will be out of action for the next month or so and Dave and the specialist will be monitoring the situation closely.

It was his first start since early November and to end up with such a deep wound so early in the game was a big blow for both Chambo and us.

He's not exactly been the luckiest player in the world this season, as he has suffered a series of injuries and we wish him a speedy recovery.

Also missing tonight will be Paul-Jose Mpoku, but his absence is for a much more pleasant reason, as he is away on international duty with Belgium.

We wish him well and look forward to welcoming him back in time for Saturday's game against Bristol Rovers.

WELCOME back to Brisbane Road as the games continue to come thick and fast.

By my rough calculations, ten of our 46 League games will be midweek fixtures in the second half of the season, and with our cup exploits continuing too there aren't going to be too many Tuesday evenings off for players, staff and fans alike!

It's been an incredibly busy week as I'm sure you can imagine. The extra attention and focus that's been on the Club is something for us to relish and everyone is looking forward to our day in the spotlight against Arsenal.

It's a chance the players deserve through their outstanding achievement of winning away against two of the best teams in the Championship and we're all delighted that the supporters have such an exciting fixture to look forward to as well.

I'm pleased that judging by the feedback we have received, the vast majority of fans agree with the ticketing policy we have put in place for the game.

It would have been easy to give Arsenal the entire East Stand, but it is a tribute to how far our matchday operation has come that the Police and licensing authorities were both more than satisfied that we would be able to safely and comfortably segregate the stand to ensure that an additional 1,800 Orient supporters will be able to

see the match.

As I write, on Monday evening, over 2,600 of our 2,800 season ticket holders have snapped up their reserved ticket, and after the match you're here tonight for, we'd anticipate a good few hundred more queuing with stubs from this and the Brighton game to buy theirs too.

But that should still leave a decent number to go on general sale and so all supporters will have the chance to purchase a ticket for what will be our biggest home game since the 2001 play-off semi-final.

I have to say that what I've been most pleased about over the last two matches is that the professionalism of the team has shone through in games against the top two sides in the division and it's clear their minds are still on the task in hand.

We were the better side against Brighton, and at Bournemouth on Saturday in heavy rain and swirling wind we stuck at our task before being justly rewarded with Dean Cox's superb equaliser.

A win tonight would take us in to the top half and we mustn't forget that it's League 1 where we earn our living and that's still the main priority, so get behind the lads this evening and let's keep this superb run going.

- DONE of Swindon Town's greatest achievements was when they lifted the League Cup in 1969, beating Arsenal at Wembley, League Cup success earned the club its first invitation to European competitions. but they were not eligible to participate because they played in the then Third Division. So, as compensation, they were entered into the 1969 Anglo-Italian League Cup and the 1970 Anglo-Italian Cup and won both.
- SWINDON TOWN won promotion during the 1993/94 season to the Premier League, the only time the club has played in the top level of English tootball. Swindon were also the first team to win promotion to the Premier League via the play-offs, beating Leicester City.
- THE highest attendance at the County Ground of 32,000 was recorded on January 15 1972 in an FA Cup third round replay against Arsenal. The capacity of the ground is now 15,728, so it is unlikely that this record will be broken in the foreseeable future.
- **DENGLAND** youth international Johnny Skull was on Swindon Town's books as an amateur and was offered pro forms. He declined and joined Wolverhampton Wanderers. but was never able to break into the first team and drifted out of League football. He joined Banbury and seven years after Swindon's first approach they offered him a month's trial in September 1957, which he completed and then signed and finally made his long-awaited Football League debut.
- SWINDON TOWN defeated Newcastle United in the FA Cup in the 1928/29 season and loswich Town in the same competition in 1947/48. In both matches the opposing goalkeeper was the same Mick Burns.

The Robins sit just one place above the relegation zone on goals scored, but more worrying for Wilson's side is the fact Tranmere Rovers, the side directly below them, have three games in hand.

Wilson will be desperate to build on what was a decent draw at home to Rochdale on Saturday, after his side came from behind to salvage a point late on, but he will also be keen to grab three points to put an end to a run which has seen Town win just one of their last 11 fixtures.

His biggest concern will be finding a goal scorer after leading scorer Charlie Austin - who had bagged 17 already this season - was sold to Championship side Burnley during the transfer window for an undisclosed fee on a three-and-half-year deal.

The former builder joined Swindon from nonleague Poole Town in October 2009 and scored 37 times in 65 games but he left with Wilson's best wishes.

"You just can't stand in the way and we have to move on," said Wilson. "We wish him all the best, he's done tremendously well in such a short space of time. He's exceeded everybody's expectations, it has been a real fairytale for him."

Replacement

The club moved quickly to secure a replacement for Austin by snapping up Torquay United striker Elliot Benyon for an undisclosed

The 23-year-old, who has signed a two-anda-half-year deal, was one of the leading scorers in League 2 this season with 14 goals to his name. However, Wilson was quick to take the pressure off the striker by rejecting comparisons between him and Austin.

"Elliot is a different player to Charlie, but we do hope that he's got the goals in him that will help us," said Wilson.

"We've known about him for a long while. We're fortunate that we were able to agree a fee with Torquay."

It has been so far so good for all concerned, as Benyon was the hero on Saturday as he snatched the injury-time equaliser on his debut much to the delight of his manager.

The Robins' current League position has certainly surprised a few after they came so close to promotion last season.

Sneaked

After finishing fifth, The Robins sneaked through to the play-off final after an epic encounter with Charlton Athletic which was settled by a penalty shoot-out after finishing 3-3 on aggregate.

Yet, it was not to be for Wilson's side, after they went down 1-0 to Millwall at Wembley in front of 73,000 fans.

DANGER MAN...

Jonathan Douglas

29-year-old midfielder Jonathan Douglas has made 78 appearances for the Robins since making the move south from Leeds United in the summer of 2009.

Primarily a central midfielder, Jonathan has also played as an attacking central midfielder, on both flanks and at right back since making his debut for Monaghan United in the League of Ireland at the age of 16.

He moved to England with Blackburn Rovers at 18 and made his debut against West Ham United in a League Cup tie in October 2000.

However, a cruciate ligament injury hampered his progress and he was loaned to Chesterfield and Blackpool in 2003. He fought his way back into contention at Ewood Park though, and ended up playing 16 League games for the club before moving on to Leeds on a season-long loan in 2005.

He helped Leeds reach the Championship play-off final that year and signed permanently the following summer.

Douglas remained at Elland Road for a further three years, making 165 appearances in total before deciding to make the County Ground his next destination.

THE REST....

Another former Leeds man in the Swindon ranks is goalkeeper David Lucas, who left Elland Road for Wiltshire two summers ago. The Preston-born stopper previously played for his hometown club and Sheffield Wednesday. Youngster Mark Scott provides further back-up between the posts.

21-year-old defender Callum Kennedy has come through the ranks at Swindon and enjoyed a loan spell at League 2 side Gillingham earlier this season. Lescinel Jean-François, a Haiti international, has played for Guingamp in France and linked up with Swindon in 2009. Right back Nathan Thompson, 19, has made one League appearance for the Robins, and Danny Wilson bolstered his defensive options last month with the signing of Czech left back or centre back Milan Misun from Celtic.

In midfield, Simon Ferry is yet another ex-Celtic man in the Swindon ranks, while former Southampton and Nottingham Forest player **David Prutton** signed from Colchester last summer. 18-year-old Billy Bodin, son of former Swindon player Paul, made his debut this season, and Will Evans, also 18, is another option.

Swindon's squad is completed by 19-year-old striker Jordan Pavett, who made the move from non-league Redbridge last month.

THE MANAGER...

Danny Wilson

51-year-old Danny Wilson was appointed as manager of Swindon Town on December 26 2008, just over a week after he left his post at Hartlepool United.

As a player, the Wigan-born midfielder earned 24 caps for Northern Ireland, and he also won the League Cup with both Luton Town and Sheffield Wednesday.

He began his career with his hometown club and later played for Bury and Chesterfield before moving up to Nottingham Forest in 1983.


Wilson joined Brighton & Hove Albion the same year and then played for Luton, Sheffield Wednesday and Barnsley, where he moved into management.

In the 1996/97 season, he guided Barnsley into the Premier League, and in the summer of 1998, after Barnsley's relegation back to Division One, he returned to Sheffield Wednesday.

Wilson's stay in the Hillsborough hotseat lasted nearly two years and his next managerial opportunity came at Bristol City.

Four years later, with City still in Division Two, he moved on to MK Dons, but he was unable to prevent their relegation to League 2 in 2006.

He then managed Hartlepool for two years – winning promotion to League 1 in 2007 – before arriving at Swindon.

When Geraint Williams took over the managerial reins in February, being able to celebrate safety with games to spare looked unlikely, but the O's pulled off their escape brilliantly to end the campaign 14th in the League 1 table.


Jason Demetriou's super 20-yard strike, following a forceful run down the left from Wayne Gray, was enough to win this County Ground clash – Orient's only League triumph there in the last 15 attempts.

7,735 turned up to the match, with the majority left disappointed as Swindon's relegation fears were left to linger.

They eventually secured safety themselves, finishing the season one place behind the O's, three points further back with 53 to their name.

In total, Orient have met Swindon 73 times in all competitions, with both teams having won 25 games apiece.









IN TONIGHT'S edition of E10 we take a look at two players to have represented both Orient and tonight's opponents Swindon Town.

MARTIN LING

Former Swindon Town midfielder Martin Ling became the first man in 36 years to lead Orient to automatic promotion when they secured third place in League 2 in the 2005/06 campaign.

Ling's Orient side won a dramatic final day fixture against Oxford United by the odd goal in five to earn their place in the higher division in the most memorable way possible.

Born in West Ham on July 15 1966, he began as a junior with the Hammers, but gained his apprenticeship at Exeter City in January 1984, going on to make 117 League appearances for the Grecians, with 14 goals.

He joined Swindon for £25,000 in July 1986, but after just four senior appearances, he moved on to Southend United for £15,000 on October 16 1986.

Ling enjoyed à terrific spell with the Shrimpers, scoring 31 goals from 138 games and, after a brief period on loan at Mansfield Town, he returned to Swindon for a £15,000 fee in March 1991.

Five fine seasons in Wiltshire later - which included one in the top flight - he linked up with the O's on a free transfer

Ling's fine passing range soon became evident to the O's fans and we won the club's Player of the Year award in 1998.

In total he played 174 games for the club, scoring eight goals, before returning as youth team boss in 2000 following a short time at Brighton & Hove Albion.

His under 19 side won the Football League Youth Alliance in a final at the Millennium Stadium in 2001, and later that year he stepped up to become assistant manager to Paul Brush.

In September 2003, after Brush left his post as boss, Ling took over on a caretaker basis, before being appointed permanently in December of that year.

Ling enjoyed a fine record of improving the O's League position year-on-year up to the end of the 2007/08 season, when they finished 14th in League 1, but a poor first half of the following year led to him being replaced by Geraint Williams. He then took charge of Cambridge United, bt he left his post last week

However, that day in Oxford will live long in the memories of O's supporters as Ling hauled the east Londoners up from the lower reaches of League 2 to become established members of the division above.

DAVE MORRISON

Swindon's current Fitness & Conditioning coach Dave Morrison spent three years as an O's player between 1997-2000.

After playing in non-league for Chelmsford City, the Waltham Forest-born winger was sold to Peterborough United for £30,000 in 1994


After three years with the Posh, which included 77 League appearances, he linked up with the O's, where a further 46 games followed, although his 1997/98 season was hampered by a knee injury suffered on the first day of the campaign.

He moved to Irish side Bohemians in 2000 and remained there for four years prior to returning to the English game with deerminster. Tamworth, Moor Green and Solihull Moors

Dave also completed a home degree in Sports Science, following that up with a Masters Degree at Wolverhampton, whilst warking for a year with the Walsall youth team.

He then worked briefly at Wolves prior to joining Swindon as their Fitness & Conditioning coach.

Ocassionally, of course, we can be magnanimous. The old lady behind us in the Supermarket with just one item, can be smilingly nodded through. The rest of the day then passes in a haze of smug self-righteousness. It's a cheap, painless kindness that we can bring up anytime.



Most of us have memories of other, less well organised times, and lessons appear to have been well learned.

I once stood in line for four and a half hours outside the old Lyceum, before being told that all tickets had been sold for the upcoming T-Rex concert had been sold. The notices clearly stated 'one per person', so the sight of obvious touts walking away clutching handfuls was a bitter pill to swallow.

But tonight will be fine. Even if we have to stand in line for a few hours. It's worth it. It's Arsenal at home. As the great Marc himself said. It really doesn't matter at all....life's a gas.







This was to prove a difficult season for the Club and its Supporters who were given little to enthuse over during a season that saw them locked in a battle against relegation for much of the time whilst also utilising the services of three managers before the campaign was completed.

The number of managers that took charge of Orient during the season. Benny Fenton was in control from August until December but was then sacked just before Christmas and Les Gore took over in a caretaker capacity for the remainder of the month before Dave Sexton was appointed in January 1965.

- Fenton signed eight players during the summer including Scots goalkeeper George Ramage and fullback David Forsyth, Other additions were full-back Jeff Harris from Enfield and Barnet's England amoteur international Tony Harding whilst youth players Billy Carter, Johnny Lambert and Billy White were signed on professional forms. During the early weeks of the season, Welsh international right-half Malcolm Lucas was sold to Norwich City and Dennis Sorrell, a left-half, was signed from Chelsea. Further signings included centre-half Andy Nelson from Ipswich Town and Norwich City's Colin Worrell.

There were 19 goals scored during our first three home matches of the season. Ted Phillips scored a hat-trick in the opening day 5-2 win against to Portsmouth with Dave Dunmore and Terry Price also on

the mark before we beat Manchester City 4-2 ten days later with Phillips and Dunmore bagging a couple apiece. Another five goals were seen when Derby County provided the opposition in E10 although, sadly, four of those entered our net.



Benny Fenton spent borely a year in charge of Orient before he was relieved of his duties. The team won only 14 of the 48 League matches under his stewardship with 22 games ending in defeat. Formerly manager of Colchester United, he joined Orient in November 1963 but his style of football that saw two wingers playing in a deep-lying role failed to inspire or entertain. With the O's hovering towards the foot of the table in December 1964, he was sacked although 18 months later, he took over at Millwall, His most memorable achievement with us was masterminding the FA Cup victory at Leicester City.



Four successive defeats around the turn of the year left the O's at the foot of the table with 22 points from 28 matches and persuaded the Orient directors to appoint Dave Sexton as boss. He had previously played for the club before becoming a well-respected coach with Chelsea. His first game in charge saw us suffer another reverse (1-0) at Crystal Polace.



25-A total of 25 players were used during the campaign by the trio of managers. The most League appearances, 36, were recorded by forward Gregory and centre-half **Andy Nelson** who only joined us after the opening month of the season but then played in every match.

8,920 - The average League Andrews Road during the season. That represented a fall of 1,439 from the previous term and the figures were set to continue to decline over the next two years. The highest recorded home attendance was for the match against Crystal Palace which attracted 17,711 to Brisbane Road to witness a single goal victory for the visitors whilst the lowest figure was on January 16 when 5,132 watched us lose 3-2 to Swansea Town as the Swans were then titled.

Four teams completed the double over us; Swindon Town (3-0 & 1-0), Derby County (4-1 and 1-0), Norwich City (3-2 and 2-0) and Crystal Palace against whom we lost both matches 1-0. Orient failed to take maximum points from any of their opponents in the two head-to-head encounters.

Two youngsters who were to serve Orient so well in the future were beginning to make their mark. A 17-old Peter Allen was playing well in the reserves whilst 15 year-old centrehalf Paul Went captained the England Schoolboy international side against Scotland at Wembley. Both players were destined to make their first team debuts for the club in season 1965/66.

SKIPPER Stephen Dawson featured on last week's Friday Football Programme live from the team hotel ahead of the draw at Bournemouth.

It was just a short chat about the recent events at the club and what was to come over the next couple of weeks including a host of important League games before the visit of Arsenal.

Stephens' time was much appreciated from our point of view as it is great to get a sense of how a squad is feeling on the eve of a game, and it's great that the club, the manager and players are prepared to let us interrupt their prematch preparations.

Now, why mention this little tableau of what goes on week in and out at BBC London? Well it was brought back to my mind while watching Superbowl XLV on Sunday evening. I have always taken an interest in the sport since I was a kid and now working in the sports media it's fascinating to see how things operate over the pond.

Media access to players post-match in the NFL is almost intrusive with cameras poking their way under the noses of players seemingly just after they have got out of the shower... and it appears that there is a whole phalanx of reporters desperate to get the story.

But the players seem to be comfortable with the situation and appear to understand that for them the sport is also a product and as a result there falls upon the participants to accept that the consumers want to see more.

Now I'm not suggesting that the dressing rooms of football grounds up and down the country should be thrown open to hoards of media types wielding microphones and cameras, but there is a case to suggest that those who play the media well can quiet often create a positive image which goes a long way with a savvy public.

On a completely different tack, the question again got banded about this week about who would want to be a football manager. More good people lost their jobs over the last few days, two with a connection to the O's. Both Martin Ling and Andy Scott are now looking for an alternative employer after parting company with Cambridge and

Brentford respectively.

Then two days aga Roberto Di Matteo was sacked by West Bromwich Albion, despite the Baggies still being outside the relegation zone.


I can understand that those who run and own clubs can start getting twitchy when results take a turn for the worse,

and past achievements seem to be very readily forgatten. But there now appears to be a culture in our game that managers are easily expendable, although how this benefits our game in general I am not sure.


I am convinced that all three men will get back involved in the game at some stage but it won't be easy and no doubt there will be others joining them in the dole gueue soon.



The Team that was...1956/57

JIMMY ANDREWS

A stylish insideforward, Jimmy was signed by English club West Ham United from Dundee in November 1951

for £4,750. He made a total of 120 League and Cup appearances for the Upton Park club before making the short journey to Brisbane Road to join the O's who had just been promoted from the Third Division (South). Whilst at Leyton Orient, he scored eight goals in 35 League appearances over a span of three seasons but during that time, the clever ball-playing figure was unable to claim a regular place in the side.

In June 1959, he moved to Queens Park Rangers, who were managed by former O's boss Alec Stock and he scored 15 goals in 82 League games, before retiring and taking up a coaching role with the Loftus Road club. His reputation as a top-quality coach blossomed and he spent time with Luton Town and then Tottenham Hotspur in that role before he took up an appointment as manager of Cardiff City in 1974 after

Frank O'Farrell had resigned from the post. During his time in charge at Ninian Park, he guided the Bluebirds to promotion in 1975/76 and they also won the Welsh Cup on two occasions. In total, he won 63 of the 190 League matches played (a win percentage of 33.16%) whilst 51 games finished all-square but he was sacked in November 1978. He later worked as a scout for Southampton.



ALEX FORBES

Born in 1925, the Scottish winghalf began his career in England when joining Sheffield United after the end of

the Second World War. Whilst at Bramall Lane, he won the first of his 14 international caps for Scotland when selected for the match against England on April 12 1947.

An attack of appendicitis midway through the 1948/49 season saw Forbes lose his place with United and he signed for Arsenal in February 1948 for £15,000. Nicknamed 'Red' (for the colour of his hair) and known for his hard tackling, he become a regular for seven seasons and picked up two League winners' medals and an FA Cup winners' medal. He continued to also play for Scotland, eventually picking up 14 caps for his country. He is the last surviving player from Arsenal's FA Cup winning side of 1950. In all, Alex played 240 games for Arsenal, scoring 20 goals but injury blighted his final season with the Gunners which restricted him to five appearances in 1955/56 so he moved to Leyton Orient in August 1956 as the Club prepared for their return to Second Division football.

He never made the anticipated impact at Brisbane Road and spent much of the time in the reserve side having failed to oust Phil McKnight from the left-half position. After one season and eight appearances, he moved to Fulham for whom he only made only four appearances before joining non-league Gravesend & Northfleet.

After retiring from playing, Forbes spent some time coaching the Arsenal reserves and youth teams before emigrating to Johannesburg, South Africa, to coach children at a private school and run a business in the City before retiring. He was also chairman of the South African branch of the Arsenal Supporters' club.

of 2013.




The 21-year-old originally signed a deal until the end of this season, but his performances have persuaded manager Paul Ince to tie him to a longer contract.

He describes turning out for his country as a massive honour, even though in an ideal world he would also be involved in tonight's meeting with Swindon.

"It's a huge honour to be picked to play for my country," he said. "I've been playing for the national team since I was an under-15, and that's gone through to the under-19s and I'm the captain of the team too.

"I don't really know what to expect from Belarus. It will be a tough game. I've never played against them before, but it'll be good preparation for us as we look ahead to the European Championship qualifiers later in the season.

"We have some new players coming into the squad, so it will be good for

them and I'm looking forward to it.

"I'll probably be playing at the same time as we do against Swindon, so as soon as I'm away from that I'll be looking on the internet to see how we've got on, or probably my girlfriend or mum will tell me – and hopefully it's good news!"

Mpoku's last international call-up saw him take on England in a UEFA U19 Championship qualifier, and he scored as the Young Lions were defeated 2-1.

He continued: "I couldn't wait to play against England the last time I was called up. Ever since I came over here I've been wanting to play against England, so it was great to be drawn against them.

"I wanted to play against my best friend John Bostock, who also plays for Tottenham, and it was a great occasion.

"I scored in the game too, which was fantastic, and the fact it was near my home too made it even more special as my girlfriend was there, my family too.

"Playing internationally is a good learning curve because it's different to club football. When you're playing for your country, you're playing against the best in your age group from the other nations.

"It's interesting, because you can compare what you're like in Belgium to what they're like in Belarus for example

and see where you stand."

Mpoku had to leave home at 16 to join the Tottenham Academy, and having to make a new country his home was something he had already experienced, having left the land of his birth, the Democratic Republic of Congo, at a very early age.

He explained: "I was born in the Congo and moved to Belgium when I was one. When I was 12 I signed for Standard Liège and then when I was 16 I went to Tottenham.

"It was a big step and a big decision for me when I came to England, because there were a lot of clubs who wanted me.

"I had to leave my family and friends and I couldn't speak the language when I came here. I had English lessons every Thursday from 8am to 12pm for two years, and it was hard at the beginning because my English was rubbish.

"But now it's a lot better and
Tottenham have really helped
me as a club. They helped me
and they helped my family when
they have come over, putting
them into a hotel and they made the
transition a lot easier for me. I'm really
enjoying being in England and I'm loving
being on loan at Leyton Orient now."

The loan at Orient has provided Mpoku with his first taste of senior football, and he is relishing every moment of his experience.

He has scored twice in 20 games, as well as laying on a number of goals for his teammates and he is keen to add to that over the coming months.

He said: "Coming to Orient was another big step for me. Everyone loves to play first team football, so when they said I could go on loan here I was really happy to take the opportunity.

"I'm learning every day, in training, in games and I know coming to Leyton Orient will improve me as a footballer so

"It's great to play with these players. In the changing room people like Dean Cox, Jimmy Smith, Forbesy and Ben Chorley, every single day somebody will say something and start laughing and I'm just enjoying it so much.

"Everyone is competitive in training, we might do the warm up and me and Ben want to win. We love it and there is such a



good spirit here.

"The manager is great too and I really appreciate it because for the manager to put someone in the team at 18 shows great trust in me.

"I'm thankful to him, because if I'd gone to another team maybe the manager wouldn't have had that faith, but he trusts me and I want to repay him."

Mpoku provided the assist for Orient's winner in their FA Cup tie at Swansea City, which set up next week's fifth round meeting with Arsenal, and he described that as a perfect moment.

"I didn't even see how the ball went in, I just saw the ball in the net and I was so happy for the team, for myself and for my family," he said.

"For everyone I was so happy, because we've come so far as a team – from the defeat at Brighton we went on an unbeaten run, beating Norwich and Swansea and then drew 0-0 when we played Brighton again at home.

"So when that goal went in at Swansea, everything from Norwich and the last month all came together and it was an emotional moment, especially as it came in the last few minutes of the game.





An extraordinary own goal from Swansea City captain Alon Tate gave Leyton Orient victory in the FA Cup tie, after Jimmy Smith gave Orient the lead in the 35th minute, heading post Yves Mo-Kalambay as the goalkeeper failed to deal with a free-kick.

Swansea equalised moments before half-time when Darren Pratley's chip picked out Cedric van der Gun to flick home.

Orient dug deep and a replay seemed imminent, but two minutes from time Tate swung at a cross and sliced into his own net.

Goals have also been in short supply with just 11 goals scored by the O's down the years although 18 have been conceded.

We failed to find the net in four of our first five matches on this date, the exception coming in 1930 when we beat Coventry City 3-1 at Lea Bridge to gain the Division Three (South) points. The next productive performance was 45 years and three games later when we struck the only goal of the game to beat York City at home before gaining a second successive win when a visit from Cambridge United saw us record a 3-1 win. Another barren run then followed with four of our remaining five matches failing to produce an Orient goalscorer the lone exception coming in 2000 when we beat Exeter City 4-1 at Brisbane Road.

Amongst our heavier defeats were the 4-0 reverses at Derby County during the 1907/08 season and 3-0 at Newcastle United in 1964.

St James' Park failed to prove a happy hunting ground for the O's who suffered a 3-0 defeat against the Magpies who were recording their tenth home win of the season from 15 matches.

Leyton Orient (listed in the League table within the matchday programme as merely 'Leyton') started the match in 14th place in Division Two had won just three of their 15 away League matches having also drawn three games.

A month earlier, United had been knocked out of the FA Cup 2-1 at non-league Bedford but they were on top form against the O's who had no answer to a potent Newcastle attack and who gained adequate revenge for their 1-0 setback at Brisbane Road in September when the home side extended their unbeaten home run to five matches on that occasion.


goal of the game, several good scoring chances were created and a penalty missed."

A crowd of 6,453 saw the two closely-matched teams, who were just below halfway in Division Two, compete in a hard-fought clash but Ricky Heppolette chose an excellent time to record his first goal of the season that allowed us to leapfrog our opponents and reach 28 points from the 28 matches played thus far. However, goals were in short supply with inside-forward Heppolette's strike being only the 11th goal scored by Orient in 14 home League matches whilst we had managed one fewer in the 12 matches on our travels.

Forward and ex-Crystal Palace player Gerry Queen, who was finding goals hard to come by having played 22 matches with just one goal to his name, extended his disappointing sequence after missing a penalty.

In his column in the matchday programme, Petchey wrote of his satisfaction at the

emergence of the younger players.
"One of the most encouraging features of this season has been the progress made by our young professionals," he wrote. "There is a great deal for young players to learn between the time they leave school and their graduation – if successful – to League footballers. So far this





season, three of our recent apprentices, Bobby Fisher, Tony Grealish and Laurie Cunningham, have made an impact at senior level.

"Much of the credit for the successful introduction of these young players to this level of the game is due to the encouragement and assistance given by our senior players. Peter Allen, Peter Bennett, John Jackson, David Payne, Gerry Queen, Tom Walley and the like provide a wealth of experience and advice which is passed on in training and by playing alongside the youngsters in the reserve and League teams. A system that ensures a first-class introduction and promotes and maintains the great spirit that exists within the Club."

pulled one back for Cambridge with ten minutes remaining but our two-goal cushion was restored when Brooks set up Chris Jones to complete the scoring.

Manager Frank Clark reasoned: "This was another occasion when we, as the home side, failed to totally kill off the opposition, in that Cambridge. from being two-down, crept back into the game and there was some prospect of some tense final minutes before the third goal from Chris Jones settled matters. His was a goal of classic simplicity and I felt was due reward for having been our most consistent player over the last seven or eight matches." The run also enabled us to finally climb off the bottom of the Division Three table



Our tension was eased when Steve Watts doubled our lead although he looked suspiciously offside when he ran onto a pass from Tony Richards. However, Paul Buckle reduced the deficit just before the break to give the visitors hope before two goals in the final 20 minutes eventually settled the outcome. Firstly, Matt Lockwood scored with a spectacular volley before Richards capped an impressive display with our fourth goal seizing onto a through pass from Kwame Ampadu.

Captain Dean Smith, in his programme column 'Pearls From Dean', looked back on the match enthusiastically. "The win means we are full of confidence



Andree Selner, Senior Education Development Officer for Leyton Orient Community Sports Programme said: "It has been a great evening to celebrate all the hard work that the pupils have put into the programme this term with their friends, families and teachers.

"They have really excelled and you can see by their presentations the high standard of the work being produced.

"It's such a shame that the funding for this project has been cut by the Government after ten years of seeing how successful it has proved to be. It has not only raised achievement but also confidence, self-esteem, motivation and independent learning skills of the pupils involved.

"Unfortunately we can no longer deliver the programme for free to schools from March and schools are already unsure if the new budget they have will be enough for them to afford to pay for it."

HEIDEN EURO CUP

ORIENT'S under-13s recently returned from competing in the Heiden Euro Cup tournament in Germany.

Orient's Head of Youth Development Mel Jeffries writes

The Heiden Euro
Cup is an annual
indoor 5-a-side
tournament played over
a weekend in January for
players born in 1998 (U13s),
which is currently in its 12th
year.

Leyton Orient were only the second English team to be invited to send a squad to compete against other European professional sides from Germany, Austria, Poland, Netherlands and Armenia.

After working within other Centre of Excellences, I knew what a good experience this tournament could prove to be for the boys and was delighted when the players and parents were of the same opinion.

As you may be aware on the continent boys are age banded by the Year in which they were born (Jan-Dec), however in England boys play their football within the School Year (Sept-Aug). This obviously meant either we could select a squad across two age bands or select a squad which would be competing with some of its players playing older boys. I decided on the latter option which made the competition even tougher, thus adding

to the prospect of the boys playing against the likes of Borrussia Monchengladbach, FC Koln, Werder Bremen,

FC Koln, Werder Bremen, DSC Armenia Bielefeld et al.

The boys travelled on the Centre of Excellence minibus via Eurostar, through France, Holland and finally Germany, arriving at Heiden

Viktoria Sporting Club on the Friday evening. The group stages for their half of the draw did not commence until the Saturday afternoon, but their Coaches filled the morning with a training session and observation of the opposition in the other half of the draw.

After the group stages the boys finished fourth in a group of five, with the highlight being a hard fought 3-3 draw with BMG. This left them in a group of four to play on the Sunday for 16th-20th position. The performances improved in the second half of the competition and they finished in 18th position.

The boys travelled back on the Sunday arriving back late that same evening.

I hope you can see from some of the boys' comments after the tour that it had proved to be a worthwhile experience for all involved and something that as a department we will actively seek to continue with in our programme.

Luke Bennett said: "Going to Germany was a great experience and a lot of fun. We were the youngest team, but we still played well. The Germans are very strong and don't give up."

Jelani Watson-Gayle added: "It was good to see the German 5-a-side standard, I want them to see our standard of 11 a side. Also it was good to play football away from home."

Tommy Nevrkla said: "Going to Germany was a really good experience, as we played a different style of football against boys that were at least a year older than us. The games were played in a small indoor space, so there was less room to work in and the games were fast and furious.

"It also took time to get used to the fact that you could bounce the ball off the walls. In the end we had some good results and bonded really well together as a team."

ROCK 'N' ROLL FOOTBALL

FUNNY isn't it? You hardly get a decent mention for several decades and suddenly everyone's talking Leyton Orient. Arsenal fans are texting asking for tickets, the news media have woken up to our Olympic Stadium concerns, and I've now discovered that two chaps at indie-rock bible the NME are dedicated O's fans, having relocated from up north. I reckon we're now, officially, one of those 'fashionable' clubs you hear about.

I've often wondered whether we could trade on our location a bit, given that Leyton is only a stone's throw from trendy areas like Hoxton and Shoreditch, Stoke Newington and Dalston. The club have tried various schemes over the years to get local residents interested, but it's always tricky with several big sides on our doorstep (perhaps literally on our doorstep after 2012, unfortunately). I wonder if we can keep this current fashionable climate going, however.

I shouldn't really mention the NME as I actually work for a rival music magazine (called Clash, available in all good newsagents – well, not that I've checked) but our popularity there does suggest that Orient have a certain underground credibility, that could be worth tapping into

I interviewed Norman 'Fatboy Slim'
Cook a few weeks back and he was very
familiar with St Pauli's famous skull-andcrossbones club crest, while also being a
big shareholder at Brighton. "You look
at St Pauli, we all had the stickers on our
flight cases, but no-one knew much
about the football," admitted Cook,
"apart from that it's a cool team to
support."

Now Orient wouldn't be able to recreate the full St Pauli effect: you can still drink alcohol and stand in Germany so games have an atmosphere like a big rock concert, which, let's be honest, is a bit hard to imagine on a matchday at Brisbane Road. There's certainly an underdog spirit at the O's though, as we take on the big boys on and off the pitch, and you can see how that might appeal to those who take a more leftfield, independent approach to their rock 'n' roll.

Music papers like the NME and diehard indie fans generally were always notorious for championing bands while they were on the way up, then laying into them as soon as they sold some records and moved to a major label. Given that we're unlikely to be in the Premier League for, ooh, at least a couple of years yet, I reckon we're their perfect football team.

Admittedly, the last time I was in the Orient press box we spent most of half time talking about Chas and Dave...

an 34 minutes and Revell wrapped things up with a third six minutes into the second half. Last Saturday Bristol Rovers were beaten 4-2 at home by League leaders Brighton and are currently 23rd in the table with 27 points from 28 games.

SAFETYINFORMATION

THE expertise and experience of safety stewards, police, doctors and members of the St John Ambulance are vital ingredients in the safety management of the Matchroom Stadium. However, the successful implementation of this plan depends to a very large extent on the cooperation of you the spectator.

Please contact a steward if you have any worries over a matter of safety, concerns about the behaviour of other supporters or if you need help with ticketing or finding your way around the stadium. As Stadium Manager I would like to draw your attention to a number of key issues.

FIRST AID

Should you require medical attention ask either the nearest steward or a member of the St John's Ambulance who are located throughout the ground.

PERSISTENT STANDING

The Matchroom Stadium is an all-seater stadium and standing during matches or other events is not permitted. Spectators should remain seated at all times and not obstruct the view of others.

LOST PROPERTY

Stewards will ensure that any lost property is taken to a secure storage location. If you wish to claim property you believe to be lost in the stadium please ask the nearest steward or telephone the club on 0871 310 1881.

FACILITIES FOR DISABLED SUPPORTERS

Viewing areas for wheelchair users and dedicated toilet facilities are available throughout the ground. Disabled toilets are located on each concourse and all have emergency alarms.

The club provides a dedicated steward whose sole responsibility is the welfare of our disabled supporters and he visits all disabled areas regularly throughout the course of an event.

PROHIBITED ITEMS

Leyton Orient has a legal obligation to deny entry to the stadium to anyone carrying cans, bottles, glasses or containers of any description. Other prohibited items are clearly displayed at each turnstile block.

Spectators bringing such items will have them confiscated and these cannot be returned - they are given up as a condition of entry.


PLEASE DO NOT SMOKE

The Matchroom Stadium is a non-smoking venue. Spectators are requested not to smoke at any time in public areas and safety stewards are authorised to ask any person found smoking to leave the stadium.

LICENSED BARS/FOOD OUTLETS

There are many bars and food outlets open to the public here at the Matchroom Stadium.

For these outlets to operate safely and effectively it is critical that all



persons making use of them move away from the bar and counter area immediately after purchases have been made.

Supporters are reminded that it is a criminal offence to consume alcohol within sight of the pitch and any supporter attempting to carry alcohol into the stands faces possible ejection and arrest.

EMERGENCY EVACUATION

In the event of an emergency within the stadium which requires there to be any form of evacuation, a tannoy announcement preceded by an audible tone will be made.

Supporters should then follow the instructions given to them by the safety stewards and, in the event of an evacuation, should make their way to the nearest exit gate.

PLAYING SURFACE

Supporters are reminded that at no time are they permitted to enter the field of play. Any supporter who encroaches onto the pitch will be ejected from the ground and arrested.

I hope you enjoy your visit to the Matchroom Stadium.

SEATING

Whilst every effort is made to ensure you are provided with a clean undamaged seat for the event occasionally one may be overlooked. Should you have a problem please contact the nearest steward who will be happy to assist in either cleaning or arranging the repair of your seal.

MULTI-BALL

Leyton Orient Football Club are licensed by the Football League to operate a multi-ball system at its matches.

Would all supporters please support us in this endeavour and refroin from throwing balls directly onto the field of play and instead return them to the nearest ball boy situated around the pitch.
