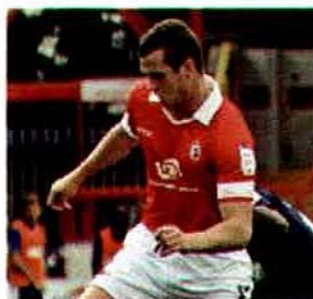

Good afternoon and a warm welcome to Paolo Di Canio and everyone from Swindon.

We've got high expectations of our visitors. I've watched them first hand already this season, I think they're a good side and I expect them to be there or thereabouts come the end of the season.

A lot will be made about the manager because he's had a magnificent career and was a very, very good footballer who I admired. He'll want to be judged now on what he does as a manager and sometimes it's difficult to separate the two. Just from speaking to people about him as a player it comes across how professional he was and I'm sure he'll demand the same of his players and sometimes he will be the one who doesn't want to have the focus put on him.

I certainly expect him to do well.

As regards ourselves, I'm obviously disappointed that we lost during the week but there are signs, like the shoots of recovery, and we've shown that we're capable of doing things but we're just so

inconsistent in our game at the moment, even within individual games.

The pleasing thing is that we're still making chances but the disappointing thing is that we're not hitting the target enough and that's something that we've got to work on and as I've said before the players that are here will get a go.

If they can't do it, we'll have to find a way of changing the personnel round but I still believe that we've got a squad of players here who can compete at the top end of the league and nothing I've seen in the last three or four weeks has altered that fact. In fact, if anything it's confirmed it for me.

We just need to get a few more wins under our belt and we've got two home games in a row now and we've got to cash in on them.

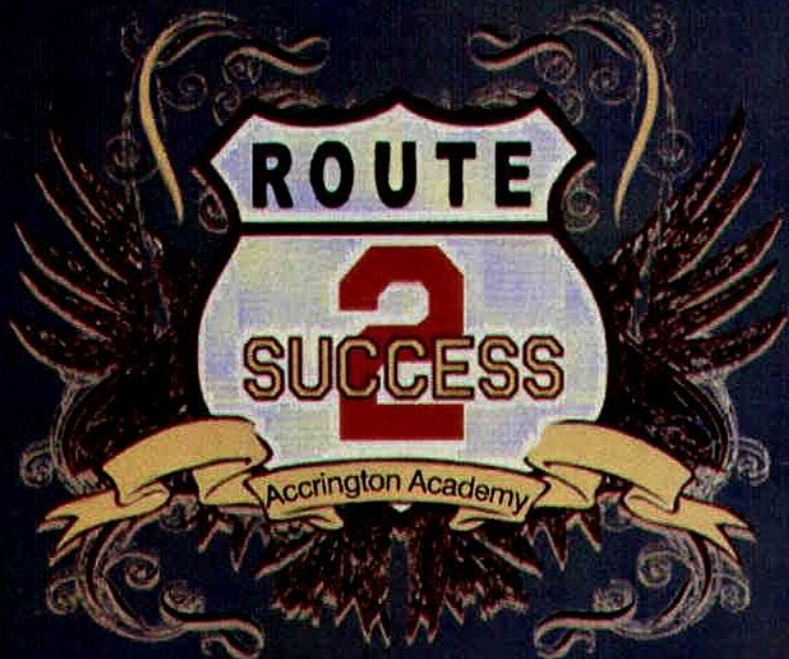
Today the club officially launches its partnership with the East Lancashire Hospice, which is a terrific cause and

Good afternoon everyone. It's a massive game today for the team and also for me personally.

I've made a few mistakes recently that have cost the team goals and to be honest it is getting me down but it's just something I'm going to have to work on.

Last year I was always one of the main markers picking up the opposition's big threats in the box and I don't think I cost us a goal apart from Aldershot away. This year for whatever reason in the last few games I've been involved in incidents that have ended up costing us goals and it's something I want to eradicate quickly because it's doing my head in!

I've just got to try and put the past out of my mind and when second balls do drop, make sure they drop to me rather than opposition players because that's happening too regularly at the moment and it's costing the team.

We just seem to be being punished all the time. I don't remember Bav having to make a significant save the other night against Tranmere, though his handling and distribution was

excellent, but we came away beaten again.

At home it doesn't seem to be happening for us at the moment. We've got to start taking our chances better. I thought we created the best chances in the game against Tranmere and I think if other teams made those chances against us they would have punished us.

At the minute we don't seem to be making the most of them and I think we should have at least taken the game the other night to penalties.

The tide's got to turn quickly or else we'll find ourselves at the wrong end of the table scrapping in a relegation fight rather than where we were last year.

We've lost the same number of games as Southend who are top of the league and that just makes it more frustrating for us. We've drawn too many games, but if we can start converting draws into wins then maybe the season will look a bit brighter.

We've got to go out in every match now, be really positive and do all we can to get three points.

Today it's Swindon. I've watched them a couple of times this season and they look like a decent side. I think we're going to have to be at our best to beat them, but we're certainly due a performance at home and fingers crossed that'll come today.

Enjoy the game.

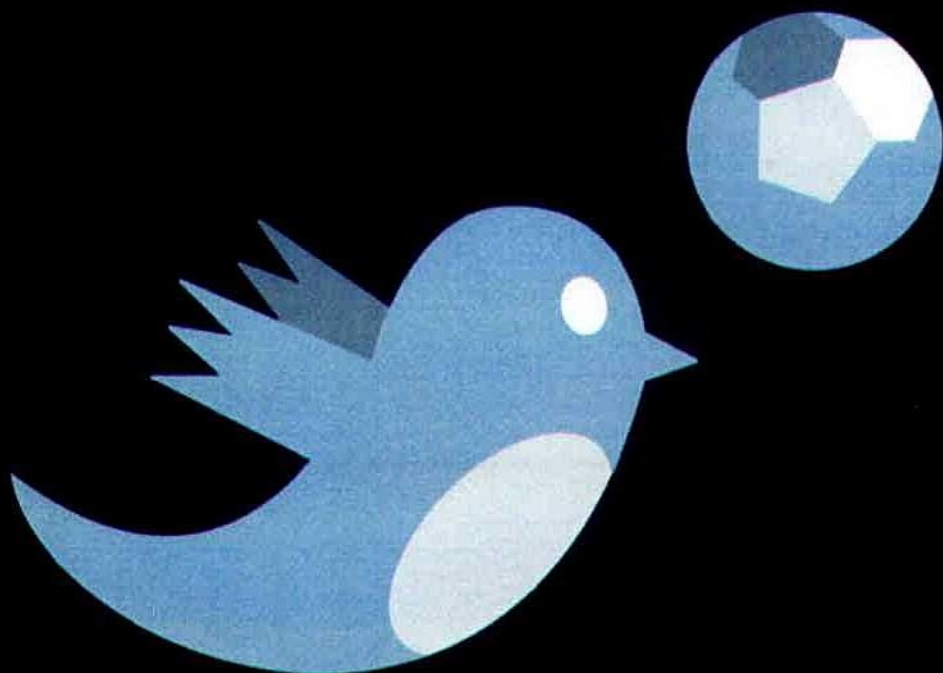

1 Mattia Lanzano Goalkeeper. Italian who departed native side USD Gavorrana 1930 in July to sign a two-year deal with Town. The 20-year-old custodian travelled with the squad on the pre-season tour to Italy, and made his debut in the 11-0 win over Norcia.

3 Callum Kennedy Defender. Former Reading youngster Kennedy was first granted a taste of first team action by former Town boss Paul Sturrock. After loan spells at Gillingham and Rotherham United during 2010/2011, Kennedy returned to The County Ground as first-choice left-back for 2011/12.

4 Aden Flint Defender. Flint joined Town from Blue Square North side Alfreton Town in January 2011, after having been pursued by Danny Wilson for a considerable time. He was named man of the match in the 3-0 win over Crewe Alexandra on the opening day of the season.



5 Joe Devera Defender. Devera became Paolo Di Canio's first signing as Town boss in June 2011. He linked up with the Robins after an established spell with Barnet and will hope to use his considerable experience to help Swindon to success.

6 Alberto Comazzi Defender. Experienced defender Alberto Comazzi signed a two-year deal at The County Ground in July. The 32-year old progressed through the youth team ranks at AC Milan before spending time with the likes of Como, Monza and Verona.

7 Paul Caddis Defender. Caddis signed alongside fellow Celtic youth team graduate Simon Ferry in August 2010 for a combined undisclosed fee. Caddis made 42 appearances in the ill-fated 2010/11 season, and was voted Fans' Away Player of the Year.

8 Simon Ferry Midfielder. Along with Paul Caddis, Simon Ferry made the permanent switch from Celtic in August 2010, penning a three-year deal. Ferry made 25 appearances during the 2010/11 season and was often a frustrated figure on the substitutes bench, especially during the second half of the campaign.



10 Matt Ritchie Midfielder. After two separate loan spells, Matt Ritchie signed a two-and-a-half year contract at with Town in January 2011. The 22-year-old was voted Fans' Player of the Year for his efforts in 2010/11.

11 Etienne Esajas Midfielder. Former Sheffield Wednesday man who signed for Town after impressing during a three-week trial at the club during the summer. The Dutchman scored in each of his friendly appearances for the club.

12 Alan McCormack Defender/Midfielder. Former Preston and Southend man who signed a two-year-deal at the County Ground in the summer following his release by Charlton.

13 Oliver Risser Midfielder. Namibian international who penned a two-year-deal at The County Ground in July 2011, and was named club captain shortly after. A powerful defensive midfielder, he can also play as a centre-back.

14 Jordan Pavett Striker. Pavett won a nationwide competition to sign a professional contract with Swindon Town. Pavett, 19, beat more than 3,500 amateur players to the dream prize in Samsung's 'Win A Pro Contract'.



competition. He was handed the number 14 shirt by Paolo Di Canio ahead of the 2011/12 season.

15 Nathan Thompson Defender. Youth team product who signed his first professional contract in 2009 and penned a new one-year-deal at the club in the summer after making two first team appearances last season.

16 Ibrahim Atiku Midfielder. Ghanaian who signed a two-year deal with Swindon Town in the summer of 2011. The midfielder was offered a contract after impressing on trial in Italy on the club's pre-season tour.

17 Alan Connell Striker. Swindon Town clinched the signing of Grimsby Town striker Connell for an undisclosed six-figure sum in July 2011. The former Ipswich, Torquay, Hereford and Bournemouth man has won promotion to League One on three separate occasions.

20 Abdul Said Midfielder. A midfielder of Somalian descent, Said joined Swindon from Coventry City on a two-year scholarship in July 2009.

23 Raffaele De Vita Striker. Italian striker De Vita signed a two-year deal with the Robins in June



2011, joining Town after a spell in Scotland with Livingston. He joined Blackburn Rovers aged 15 and came up through the youth and reserve team ranks at Ewood Park but first team opportunities never surfaced and the frontman opted to leave.

24 Jonathan Smith Midfielder. Swindon Town secured the signing of York City midfielder Smith in June 2011. The former Forest Green Rovers man joined the Robins for an undisclosed fee, signing a two-year contract at The County Ground.

26 Phil Smith Goalkeeper. Smith joined Town in July 2006 from Crawley Town and made his first start for the club in the Carling Cup defeat by Brentford in August 2006. He made 33 starts in Season 2010/11, and competes with Mark Scott and Mattia Lanzano for a starting place at The County Ground.

27 Alessandro Cibocchi Defender. Paolo Di Canio sealed his tenth signing of the summer with the capture of left-back Cibocchi in July 2011. The 28-year-old joined Town on their pre-season tour of Italy, and did enough to convince Di Canio he was worth a contract.

29 Lukas Magera Striker. Czech international signed in August 2011 from Politehnica



Timisoara. The 28-year old 6'4 forward made his Swindon debut against Rotherham Utd.

30 Leigh Bedwell Goalkeeper. Second year scholar Bedwell came up through the Town ranks and due to injuries to Phil Smith and Mark Scott has made the bench a few times this season.

32 Ahmed Abdulla Midfielder. Central midfielder on loan from West Ham until January.

33 Jake Jervis Striker. Striker on a one month loan deal from Birmingham City

36 Liam Ridehalgh Defender. Left back signed on a one month loan deal from Huddersfield Town.

39 Mehdi Kerrouche Striker. Algerian striker Medhi Kerrouche became Paolo Di Canio's eighth signing of the summer, agreeing a two-year contract at The County Ground after leaving United Arab Emirates side Al-Oruba during the summer.

How would you sum up Swindon's season so far?

Inconsistent. They're the best footballing side in the league and that's been proved by their home form this season. I think the team are just beginning to build-up a head of steam after a tricky start to the campaign. Paolo Di Canio has completely re-built the squad since his arrival as manager and quite often new players, especially foreigners, take time to bed in.

The manager seems to always be in the headlines - what's he like really and what impression is he making on the club?

Paolo Di Canio is going to attract headlines wherever he goes, that is inevitable. I've been fortunate enough to get to know him slightly better over the past few months and very much enjoy his company. It would be easy for me to talk about his passion for the game but that is there for all to see. He comes across as a very loyal person who is desperate to make this work at Swindon. His commitment and dedication to the job is admirable.

What kind of style and system can we expect from Swindon this afternoon?

Whether home or away, Di Canio sets his side up in a 4-4-2 formation but with plenty of attacking intent. He encourages

the full-backs to get forward and join in. He also favours hitting teams with speed on the break. You're likely to see Swindon springing attacks which consist of three midfielders as well as the two strikers even if they are breaking out from just outside their own box.

What would you say is the biggest strength of the team?

The ability to play neat and attractive football. Some may argue that doesn't work all the time in League Two but Town don't change the way they approach games even when they are away from home. Di Canio's ethos is that he wants his players to be as creative and attack-minded as possible.

And the biggest weakness?

Defending set-pieces has been a huge problem for Swindon this season. They had a spell in the opening weeks of the campaign where every single goal they conceded came from a set-play. Di Canio highlighted the problem very quickly and worked extremely hard with his back-line to eradicate the errors. They seemed to have disappeared recently but old habits crept back in in last weekend's 3-3 home draw with Hereford.

What's your score prediction?

I won't go down well for this but 2-1 Swindon. They need to start turning performances into wins away from home.

One To Watch

Paul Caddis



Right-back Paul Caddis has probably been Swindon's most consistent player across the season. He's the captain as well. Naturally his defending is excellent but he also holds the ability to get forward and cause problems in and around the opponent's area. From an attacking perspective, Matt Ritchie is also worth keeping an eye on. He's probably too good to be playing at this level.

After leading your last game against Hereford and then drawing, how determined are the players to get back to winning ways this weekend?

It was disappointing to let a 2-0 lead slip after controlling large parts of the game. It has made the squad even more determined to win the next game and start to improve our away form.

You're currently sitting 13th in the table – is that a fair reflection of the way the season's gone for the team so far?

Usually the table doesn't lie but I feel we have played a lot better than our position shows. If you look at the stats they show we control a lot of the games we play, we need to start turning this pressure into wins.

Can you put your finger on why results at the County Ground haven't been replicated away from home so far?

If I had the answer we'd be top of the league! At the moment we are

more comfortable at home but we always try to play the same way home or away. We want to win every game we play.

How would you sum up Swindon's style of play this season?

Mainly we get the ball down and play a passing game, but maybe there are times when we need to be physical or more direct like other teams we have played this season.

What is Paolo di Canio like to work with?

Quite different, he is very passionate and his sessions are very different, he is very tactical and works hard on shape. Everyone understands his ethos and the squad are happy working with him.

In general, do you think the league table is taking shape, and who do you expect to be challenging come May?

It is taking shape but already it is clear that anyone can beat anyone,

teams at the top have been more consistent. It's still close though and there is plenty of scope to climb the table. I thought Rotherham would be up there but they have slipped a little and I also think Southend could do well.

What are you expecting from Accrington Stanley?

A really tough game, I have watched them a few times and they will be a tough team to break down and physical.

Have you been to the Crown Ground before? What do players think about going there?

Yes a few times, I played there in a trial game after I left Blackburn Rovers, I enjoyed it - the ground has character, it will be a hard place to go and play.

There was still time for the visitors to grab a point with substitute Sam Winnall floating over a free-kick into the box which Pell glanced into the far corner in the 90th minute.

The Long road back

Kevin is back in his stride at Stanley and more ambitious than ever to succeed in English football.



You were on loan at the Crown last season and came back in the summer looking a better player. What's different this time around?

I think just getting a whole pre-season under my belt. I spent the whole pre-season at Burnley and that was great. Last season I didn't really know what was happening, but this time I had a good pre-

season, felt a lot fitter and sharper and the move to Accrington came about again and I was just much happier about everything.

Is this the best run you've had as a professional?

I think so. I think this is the longest run of games I've had in a long time. It can only be good for me to play games. The staff at Burnley keep in

touch and keep an eye on me so I've just got to keep playing and try to keep playing well.

You've put in some eye catching performances this season. How much do you take notice of what other people say about your game?

I try and take it all in my stride really. It's no good taking a load of compliments and then going out in the next game and playing badly. You've just got to keep going, put whatever other people are saying into the back of your head and go to the next game and try to keep your performance level up.

What are your aims for the season?

Well my main objective is just to play well for Accrington and if there's somebody watching from Burnley then that's just a bonus. I know there's usually someone watching me, so my priority's just got to be doing well for Accrington and I know if I keep doing that then I'll stand a chance when I go back to Burnley of maybe getting into their team. That is something in my mind, but I'm at Accrington at the moment and that's what I'm concentrating on.

Before you returned to Accrington Eddie Howe told you that you had a chance to work yourself into his plans. How good was it to hear that?

It was really encouraging. He seems to like working with young players, like the

manager here, and he seems to be bringing in his own setup with a lot of younger players. Hopefully in the future I can be a part of that if I do well here.

What have you made to Stanley's start to the season then?

Well the results haven't been the best but we've played really well at times and I think little things are catching us out, giving away sloppy goals like at Plymouth last weekend and against Tranmere in the week.

But we are creating lots of chances and I get the feeling that it won't be long before we hit a team for four or five goals. We're creating so many chances that there's going to be a time when we take them all and then we could get a really good win.

You got your first ever Football League goal at Plymouth last weekend. Is that something you'd like to add to your game?

Yes, I think I should be scoring more goals really. I should be getting a couple a season anyway! I didn't score any last season and that one at Plymouth was my first since I came to England and I want to be scoring a lot more goals than that. I'm going forward for set pieces and the gaffer is using me as an attacking weapon from them and I felt I should have scored in games before I did last weekend.

Hopefully now that one has come along I'll be able to get a few more.

You were also put on standby for the Republic of Ireland under 21s recently. That must be good for your international aspirations?

I was supposed to be called up earlier this year, but then I broke my toe so I couldn't join up with the squad. The manager said he'd keep in touch with me and that all I had to do is keep playing well and that I would get my turn so hopefully if I keep doing my best I'll get my chance again.

It's a proud moment to represent your country and it'd be a privilege for me to do so. Hopefully my form for Accrington will continue and give me that chance to represent Ireland.

Domestically it's Swindon today - is it going to be strange seeing someone like Paolo Di Canio at the Crown Ground?

I suppose it is! As a player he was a bit of a legend but once we get on the pitch that makes no difference, we'll forget about it. It's going to be eleven players against eleven players on the pitch and we'll be doing our best to beat them.

Do you think the standard of League Two has gone up? Lots of players and managers seem to be taking a step down...

I think so. Most players just want to be playing football, so

whether that's in League Two or League One, the Championship or the Premier League or wherever it doesn't matter. Players just want to be playing games.

I think all the leagues in England are getting a lot more competitive now and that can only be good for us, playing games against a lot of good players.

As a player at a Championship club and not playing it's a lot better for me to come out on loan and make appearances at a consistent level. Then whenever I go back to Burnley it can't really be put to me that I've got a lack of experience because I will have played a lot of games. For me it's all about playing well and consistently and hopefully it'll all come good for me.

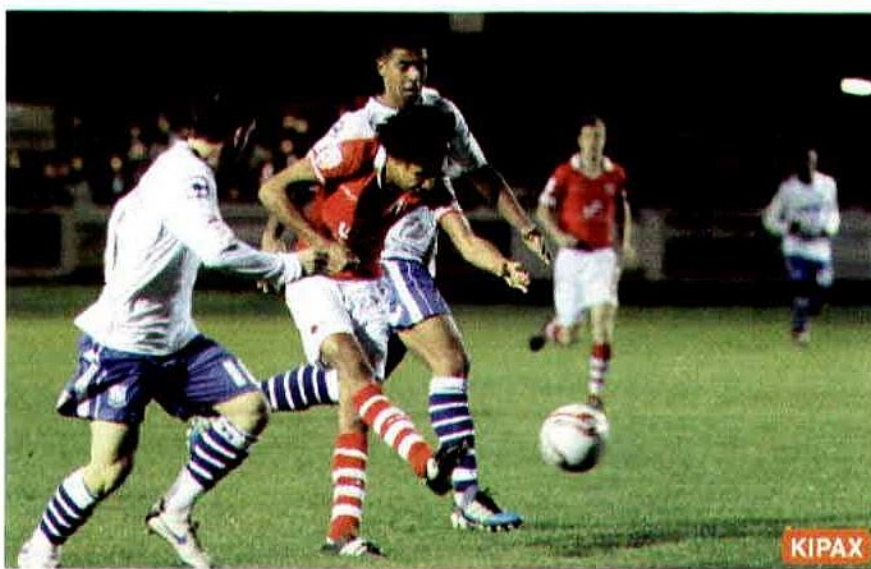
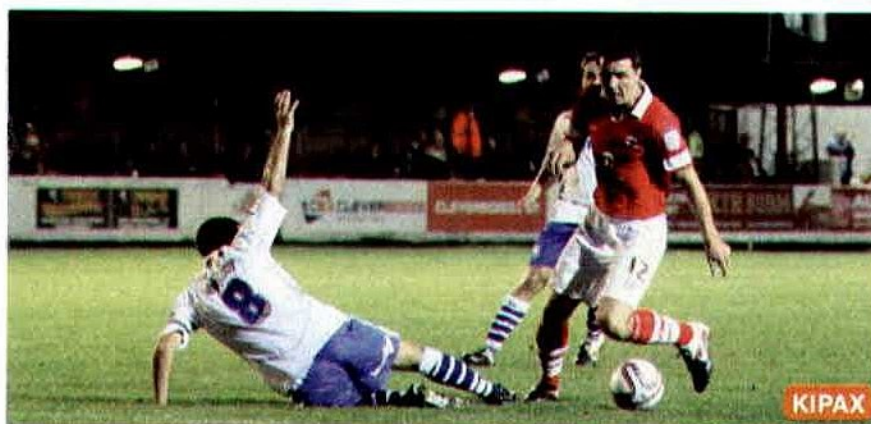
Johnstone's Paint Trophy 12/10/11

INVESTOR IN PEOPLE

The FOOTBALL LEAGUE Paper

INCREASINGLY in the modern game, it doesn't take much to convince a player to switch sides.

A big bonus here, an extra few grand on the salary there, and suddenly your top scorer is talking about joining a club who "match my own ambitions".

Yet for all the cutthroats and mercenaries, there is still a place for loyalty, still room for the old fashioned one-club man.

So here, without further ado, we pay tribute to the Football League's stalwarts - the men who have spent the longest time at a single club in the entire League.

Aaron Webster - Burton Albion
(Time at club: 13 years, 3 months)

When Nigel Clough arrived at Burton as player manager in 1999, Webster was a shy, lanky 18-year-old fresh out of the club's youth team.

But in the ensuing ten years, Webster would be as important to Burton's fairytale rise as Clough himself, playing left back, left wing, attacking midfield and centre forward as the Brewers were eventually promoted to the Football League in 2009.

An inconsistent first season had some doubting whether he could cut it at the higher level, but last term's tally of eleven goals in 42 games was his best ever campaign.

Now 30, he has 77 goals in 443 appearances for Burton.

Kevin O'Connor - Brentford (12 years, 3 months)

Like Webster, versatility has been the key to O'Connor's staying power. A striker when he signed professional terms in 1999, he has since played right-wing, right-back, central midfield and defence, and even had a stint at left-back. Now 29, the set-piece specialist is fourth on Brentford's all-time appearance list with 468 games and has played over 30 matches in each of the past nine seasons. Relentless.

Alan Dunne - Millwall (11 years, 3 months)

Few can doubt that Dunne has been a slow burner. Having emerged from the youth team in 2000, a string of bad injuries meant it would be four years before the Irishman established himself in the side.

However, once ensconced, Dunne has been impossible to shift. Fast and energetic with an eye for the spectacular (he spent time as a left winger), he was voted the fans' player of the season in 2009-10 and followed that up with 38 appearances last term, taking his tally for the club to 236.

Nick Montgomery - Sheffield United (11 years, 3 months)

A Leeds fan as a kid, Montgomery actually rejected a switch to Elland Road in the summer of 2010 to stay with United, ensuring hero status. Part of the side that won promotion to the Premier League in 2006, he won plenty of plaudits in the top flight for his ability to break up play in front of the back four and, though 29, remains a class act.

UP and RUNNING

Padraig Amond has opened his account for Stanley in the league and now he's looking to go to the next level.





Last weekend's draw at Plymouth was a landmark match for Stanley's Irish contingent. Kevin Long netted his first goal in English football to make it 2-1, before Padraig Amond scored his first in League Two to ensure the Reds went home with a share of the spoils.

The duo have been given the collective nickname of "Jedward" in the changing room, and one of the partnership feels he is starting to rediscover his X Factor.

Amond joined Stanley on loan from Pacos de Ferreira on loan earlier this season as a striker, but has gone on to show some real versatility, including doing an unfamiliar job at Home Park after the Reds had been reduced to ten men.

"I was given a little wing back role," he explained. "Well, wing back/left winger/striker anyway! We all worked really hard in that game, Charlie Barnett came on and did well and we were on the front foot.

"It's been unusual to play in different positions. Obviously I want to play up front because that's what I've always done, but

I'm happy playing anywhere on the pitch at this stage and it's nice to weigh in with a goal as well."

The 23-year-old has scored goals wherever he's been in his career, whether in his home country with Shamrock Rovers and Sligo Rovers or in Portugal. But until last week he only had one to his name for his new club, against Carlisle in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy, and admits that finding the net was something of a relief.

"I missed a chance at 2-2 against Aldershot and missed another before I scored against Plymouth but then did score so I was really happy," he said. "I have played a few different roles that I'm not used to so far, but I think I'm getting used to them and adjusting. I'm just so happy to be playing football again.

"Goals give players confidence. That's all it is. I've got one in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy and one in the league now and I'll be looking to kick on. I want to play in every game I can and score in every game I play. I'm a greedy player like that and every goal makes me happy! Now I want to be scoring more."

The team hasn't been producing the right results consistently so far this season, but despite the setback of losing to Tranmere in midweek, Padraig believes that there were signs in the comeback against the Pilgrims a week ago that show that the Reds have got the ability to improve their league position.

"It would have been a very different story if we hadn't performed like we did in the second half at Plymouth. I think we should have got three points in the end but when you looked at the score at half time when we were 2-0 down and down to ten men then we probably would have taken 2-2.

"On reflection on the second half we probably should have won the game but the lads showed good character to fight back and get the two goals in the second half." John Coleman has clearly been frustrated at the start to the new season for his team, but Amond feels that sometimes that's no bad thing. It certainly seemed to work the last time they took to the field in League Two!

"The gaffer had a chat with us at half time and said a few things and looked for a reaction, which I think he got," he continued. "I think sometimes we need a reaction amongst ourselves and from the first minute in that second half we were straight at them and we weren't like that in the first half. I think we're much better when we're on the front foot."

If there's one player in the Stanley squad with the desire to get on that front foot and pose a threat to defences, it's Padraig Amond. Even if he is playing left wing back...

Cheltenham Town

League Two (21/10/11)

Stanley's next outing sees Cheltenham Town visit the Crown as Friday night football returns.

Who Are They?

Cheltenham Town Football Club was founded in 1887 by Mr Albert Close White, who on discovering football whilst in London returned home and held trials at East Gloucester Cricket Club. Cheltenham turned professional in 1932, joining the Birmingham combination league. It was also at this time when the club decided to start playing in red and white shirts, earning their nickname, 'The Robins'.

In 1935 Cheltenham joined the Southern League and would spend 50 years there. During this time, two local based players made a big impact on the clubs history. Roger Thorndale set the club appearance record, turning out for the Robins 702 times, while Dave Lewis scored a record 273 goals.

Cheltenham spent 50 years in the Southern League before manager John Murphy lead the team to the treble and gained promotion to the Football Conference. The Robins spent seven years in

the Conference, with Andy Gray turning out for them in this time.

Steve Cotterill's arrival at the club saw them return to the Conference in 1997 after edging out fierce rivals Gloucester City in an exciting promotion race. An impressive first season back in the league saw them finish as runners up and also win the FA Trophy, beating Southport 1-0 at Wembley. The next season they went one better, winning the League and gaining promotion to the football league.

The 2001-2002 season saw the club seal promotion to the then Division Two. Cotterill left to take over Stoke City, and his successor, Graham Allner, was unable to keep the Robins in the division. They were back in League One for the 2006-07 season after beating Grimsby 1-0 in the play off final. They spent three seasons in the third tier of English football before relegation saw them return to League Two for the start of the 2009/10 season.

Cheltenham went from underdogs of League One to one of the bigger clubs in League Two but since their return to the fourth tier of English football success has been hard to come by for the Robins. Current manager, Mark Yates was appointed manager of the club in December 2009 after Martin Allen left the club. Having been at the bottom of the table in October, Yates was able to guide the club to safety as they preserved their Football League status with a 22nd placed finished. In his first full season in charge the Robins performed better and ended the season in 17th position.



Current Crop

Last season Cheltenham finished 17th in League two with 13 wins and 13 draws giving them a total of 52 points. The Robins are currently seventh in League Two ahead of today's matches and have picked up 20 points from 12 games. They come into the game on a three match unbeaten run during which they have won twice.

Standing in Stanley's way will be Cheltenham captain Alan Bennett. The centre back was signed from Wycombe in the summer and was made captain by manager, Mark Yates. He brings a wealth of football league experience to the

Robins defence and has also been capped at international level for the Republic of Ireland. He scored his first goal for the club in the 2-1 victory over Dagenham and Redbridge.



Previous meetings

Since Cheltenham's return to League Two for the 2009/10 season, Stanley have faced them four times. Stanley have won on two occasions, with an emphatic 4-0 at the Crown Ground in October 2009. The other victory came at Whaddon Road last year with Stanley emerging as 2-1 winners. In this fixture last year the Robins ran out 4-2 winners. Terry Gornell and Phil Edwards scored for Accrington but 2 goals from striker Jeff Goulding and one each from Brian Smikle and Robin Shroot were enough to give the away side three points.
