

clash. I am writing these notes prior
to our game against Coventry on
Good Friday, so at this moment
in time we are five points clear of
second-placed Swindon.

hey have the best goal difference in the division, so we know this will be a tough test but one I feel we will take in our stride. Every game as we go in to the last five games will be a cup final and you the fans will be important, so I ask you to get behind us today and in the next four games as we go for automatic promotion with our destiny in our own hands.

Hopefully we will have Dean Furman and Cameron Howieson back to bolster the ranks for the final run in. Both players have featured in their countries' World Cup campaigns over the past week and hopefully have returned ready for action. We knew when we took both players that we would lose them for a while but felt that the quality they brought to the squad was worth them missing a couple of games. We all saw Dean's quality against Portsmouth when he came on and although we have not seen Cameron yet, I can tell you he is a very talented young lad.

Following our last home game against Portsmouth, I felt we had to go to our local rivals Scunthorpe and win, especially when we heard that the game between Sheffield United and Brentford was postponed earlier in the day. It was never going to be an

easy game with them struggling for points at the wrong end of the table but I felt we approached the game in the right frame of mind. With all the bad weather, I must commend their snow clearers who managed to clear the pitch and get the game on. We really did not want another postponed game that would have made the run in even more congested.

We started the game strongly because Scunthorpe is a team that starts strongly so we knew we needed to match them early in the first and second halves and that's what we did. It was very important to get a goal early on in the game. People will say it was fortuitous as it was an own

goal which made for a tense last few minutes. Generally, however, I was delighted with the team's effort and the teamwork that was on display at Glanford Park, but fair play to Scunthorpe as they played their part and I thought it was an enthralling game.

I think it's important that we know how to win and finish games. Last week we should have finished the game off in the first half but the lads are generally doing well.

Friday.

Swindon have been there or thereabouts at the top of League 1 all season, and have maintained their push even without their former manager Paulo Di Canio. As you will have gathered, owing to holiday printing deadlines I have written these notes without knowledge of our Coventry result, but right now Swindon sit behind us in the league

This is bound to be some game today, and the team will have to get used to the early kick off brought about by the television coverage. It's nice to know that Sky Sports pushed for this game some weeks ago, and they must have known then that top was going to play second and it would make for compulsive viewing.

Swindon are a quality side and we struggled to hold them at the County Ground but we came away with a valuable 1-1 draw. That support has been magnificent away from home, and is shown by the magnificent away form-13 wins aloneand they really need that same backing at home.


The home support generally speaking has been very much quieter than the away support and, as I have said, in the results on the road it has made such a difference.

So in the words of Norwich City's celebrity director Delia Smith, "Let's be having you".

No time right now for shrinking violets, let's get sorted and give it all we have.

At Scunthorpe the players played incredibly well and the result could easily have been 5-2. We could have been out of sight by half time if we had converted the many chances that we created. The home side, which is normally quick out of the traps, were a panicky old bunch once they had conceded that first own goal.

After the game their directors said they didn't know how they had just lost by the odd goal, and the margin in our



favour should have been greater. The main thing is that we banked three points when many of the others in the top six were snowed off. All credit to the Scunthorpe club for getting the game on. I came over the Pennines on the M62 and there were four foot drifts and snow piled high at the side of the roads.

We now have three home games to determine our fate, and the sooner we get the points the better before we go to Crewe and then host Notts County. I am not a greedy person but I would like to have this all sewn up before we go to Brentford on the last day of the season.

I know I have said this many times this season, but this is also where you can help out with the extra support from the stands. Please encourage all your relatives and friends to come down to the Keepmoat with you and give us a lift over the finishing line.





DONCASTER ROVERS YOUTH HARTLEPOOL UTD YOUTH

SATURDAY, 16 MARCH 2013 AT CANTLEY PARK, DONCASTER FOOTBALL LEAGUE YOUTH ALLIANCE NORTH EAST CONFERENCE REFEREE: MR L FLOYD

This match was a top against bottom clash on a wet surface and a cold morning. The Rovers started well with Whitehouse, in the third minute, passing inside to Whincop but his shot was pushed out for a corner.

t the other end a cross from Smith on the Hartlepool right was palmed away by Myers and cleared by his defence. In the 14th minute Whitehouse had a good shot from the edge of the penalty area fumbled by the keeper, Scott, the ball going out for a corner. Two minutes on and a great cross from Peterson, on the right, was met with a header by Whincop just inside the area but it went over the bar. The breakthrough came in the 24th minute when Middleton put a corner into the goalmouth. The referee blew and pointed to the penalty spot indicating that Nearney was pulling at Peterson's shirt preventing him from going for the ball. MIDDLETON stepped up and duly planted the ball into the net. Four minutes later and the referee again pointed to the spot, this time for a penalty to Hartlepool, when Bridges was fouled. Walker took it but Myers, diving to his right, pushed it round the post for a corner. In the 33rd minute the Rovers increased

their lead with a terrific goal from WHITEHOUSE. He received the ball around the angle of the penalty area on the left and hit it over the keeper, just off his line, into the far top corner of the net. Dominating the game, the Rovers added a third five minutes before the break when Whincop put in a good cross from the left for PETERSON to put into the net at the near post with a thumping header.

The Rovers picked up the second half where they had left off and three minutes in Whincop had a shot palmed away by the keeper and Middleton, following up, put over the bar. However, in the 51st minute, another terrific goal added to the Rovers score. Following a corner from their left, the ball came out to Mitchell LUND, on the edge of the area, from where his looping header went into the far top corner of the net for goal number four. Despite the visitors making their three substitutions goal number five arrived in the 55th minute when PETERSON thumped a terrific shot from the right into the far top corner. Past the hour and substitute Terrell, for the Rovers, was put through on goal but, as the keeper came out he lifted the ball over him and over the bar. The match was over as a contest with the Rovers running out winners by five clear goals, every one special.

THE PROFESSIONAL GAME AND RESPECT

Clearly, the professional game has a big role to play in demonstrating Respect towards match officials and in general.

As part of the Respect programme, there are a number of changes to the matchday procedure which apply to the professional game:

- The manager or a senior member of coaching staff and captain will meet the referee with their team sheet at least one hour before kick-off
- Players will enter field of play together and shake hands prior to kick-off
- The referee will work with both team captains to help manage behaviour during the game
- There will be changes to the way the technical area will be managed by the fourth official

The Minister for Sport said: "Football is the most high profile sport in the world and the game is in the spotlight constantly. Footballers today are not just sportsmen, they are role models for young people around the world.

"Passion is at the heart of the game, but being passionate doesn't mean disrespecting people. It's absolutely crucial that players, coaches, officials and spectators sign up to Respect. We need to see a commitment to change at all levels of the sport, and I'm grateful to the FA for leading the way."



As part of the project the Rovers Education Foundation has received funding to run a volunteering trip to Likoni in South Mombassa in June and will be taking five of their Doncaster based students with them to share the experience.

During the visit the team from Rovers, along with two members of staff from NPower, will be undertaking many different activities including providing out of school activities for local children, supporting the teens with leadership training, helping with some teaching and supporting maintenance work on the school building in Likoni, which is run by the Education For Life charity. Set up and managed by a Doncaster couple, the charity started out as a small organisation set up to feed local children. It has grown throughout the years and now the charity have set up and run the school and orphanage named Tumaini.



Jenna Scully, Education Manager at the Rovers Education Foundation, said: "We are delighted to have received funding for the Rovers Go Wild Project. We have offered five of our students the opportunity of a lifetime to take part in this international partnership. All our learners could apply and were interviewed for a slot on our team — although all our students will be involved in fundraising to create a legacy for the project.

"The lucky students who we are taking with us will meet similar aged young people from Likoni and engage in a skill swap. Each of the five students who will be visiting Likoni will be accompanied by a staff member from the Rovers Education Foundation who will mentor them throughout the trip and in addition our staff will be sharing examples of best practice gaining new skills which could influence future generations in Doncaster.







lan was an important part of the Rovers squad in our first few seasons in the Conference after relegation from the Football League. Amongst other things, he will be fondly remembered for a memorable hat-trick against rivals Rushden and Diamonds at Nene Park, and a fine winning goal against Farnborough in the Conference Cup Final at a packed Belle Vue, as well as the now infamous 'Get Duerden On!' chant which could often (and sometimes still is!) be heard in the stands.

he VSC is using todays game to raise funds and awareness for lan's son, Oliver, who is in need of an adapted wheelchair.

We are hoping to have a raffle and collection in the Belle Vue Bar during the Q&A session and prizes will be announced before the game. Oliver suffers from a very rare genetic condition and his story, in lan and Caroline's words, is told below...

"Oliver was born at 34 weeks in Doncaster (where we lived at the time) and straight away taken to the neo-natal ward for oxygen as he struggled to come to terms with life. After 48 hours, the neo-natal consultants decided to run genetic tests on Olly as he had what they described as 'dismorphic features', which wasn't nice to hear at the time. It came back that he had a marker chromosome 1 duplication. This karyotype has never been seen before, anywhere in the world, and Olly is unique.

Our son was placed on a website called DECIPHER, which records all unique children and their genetic layouts. It was on this site that we found a boy in France who is 16 years old and has a very similar collection of issues to Olly.

In his first few months of life, his scoliosis (a severe curvature of the spine) was very apparent. But due to a hernia, we also discovered a heart murmur during his pre-operation examination. We were then transferred to Leeds Infirmary, for an eco of his heart by Dr. John Thompson. After an in-depth examination, we were taken into a room and told that Olly had Hypertrophic Obstructive Cardiomyopathy and that he was in the latter stages of heart failure (This is the condition that causes some footballers to drop dead during a match and was linked to the Fabrice Muamba incident).

Dr. Thompson prescribed beta-blockers in an attempt to slow down Olly's heart. He said, just take him home and love him, as that was obviously the thing that was keeping him alive. A tough four weeks followed in which Olly had a few funny spells where we thought we were losing him. We returned to the hospital to see Dr. Thompson who was surprised to find that Olly's heart had calmed down slightly and the medicine might be working.

After a few ups and downs, he was classed well enough to have his hernia operation. The risks were high under anesthetic but the surgery was necessary. At this stage (eight months) we felt a million miles away from any scoliosis intervention. After more ups and downs with eco's, Dr. Thompson decided to prescribe Nifidapine - something angina patients take in old age along with beta-blockers. Since that day - aged oneand-a-half-years old - Olly has not looked back. He still has cardiomyopathy, but his heart is relaxed and functioning very well, with no signs of heart failure. In 2009, we moved to Norwich to be nearer family and Olly is being seen by Dr. Derrick, a heart consultant at Great Ormond Street.

Throughout all of the above, Olly had scoliosis - a significant 100 degree curvature of his spine, very rarely seen to such an extent in a small child. He had to have several plaster casts fixed on to his body to prevent the curvature getting any worse. These castings were changed every six months and they encased him from his waist to his shoulders. Understandably, he didn't like them! When he was three years old, it was decided that the castings were not working. His curvature was too strong and he needed surgery, sooner rather than later - especially now his heart was functioning well. The window of opportunity arrived in September 2011. Olly had his 12-hour operation - which

Olly had his 12-hour operation – which aged my wife and I considerably – with a huge team around him controlling everything, from his heart through to his nervous system, as his surgeons fixed two titanium rods to his spine for future growth extensions. The risks for Olly throughout such a huge operation, bearing in mind that he had not had a smooth ride in the previous three years, were very high. Yet would you believe it, he came through with flying colours,

the anesthetists saying that his heart behaved completely normally for the whole 12 hours of surgery.

Olly now has a heart eco every six months through Great Ormond Street. He has his rods extended at Addenbrookes every six to eight months, to control his growth. He continues to surprise all the specialists and defeat the odds and currently is in the very fortunate position of not only being a happy little boy but also has no known imminent risks to his life. He continues to develop at his own pace, but he's not yet talking or walking and has plenty to catch up on.

At this stage, as parents, we are now in a place that we never expected with our little boy. And although we are scarred quite a lot, we try, as best we can, to celebrate just what a brave young man he is. Oliver was an IVF baby. However, since things have settled, we found ourselves pregnant last July and he now has a beautiful little sister, Nancy.

We are hoping that telling Oliver's story will help to celebrate what an inspiration he is: that a summer ball and golf day (my perk) will allow all of us to raise a glass to someone who really is a miracle, whilst also ensuring we can raise the funds to afford everything that Olly needs and wants over the coming years.





Rovers Timeline

1912-1913

The club were still having problems as regards finance but it was decided to keep all the regular players from the previous season, the only exception being Albert Green, who moved on to Gainsborough Trinity, who were now in the Midland League after failing to be re-elected to the Second Division.

n attempt had been made to increase the entrance fee from 4d to 6d (2½p) at the club's AGM but the motion was defeated. However, season ticket prices were increased.

to stay in the top half of the table. In addition they had played two FA Cup games beating Denaby United away in the Preliminary Round before losing at Castleford Town. Three Wharncliffe Charity Cup games had also been played. In the first Round they persuaded Hickleton Main Colliery to play at the Intake for a fee of £5 and went on to beat Silverwood Colliery in the next Round at home before losing in the semi-final at The Wednesday Reserves.

The second half of the season was a fans delight, thirteen home games out of the nineteen left. Fine, if they could afford it. The Rovers could ill afford any

in 4th place. Rotherham County were the Champions, ten points in front of Chesterfield Town.

Harold Buddery topped the scorers list with 14 goals and John Pattinson, who had joined the club in September from Manchester City had 10 goals to his name. For the captain, outside left Billy Bromage, the season ended on a sour note. Since joining the club in the summer of 1910 he hadn't missed a League game until the 12th April 1913. He sustained an injury in a benefit match for long-serving Teddy Lowe and missed the last three matches of the season. He left the club following the end of the season.

In the Play-Off Final of the South Yorkshire League between Hickleton Main Colliery and Brodsworth Main Colliery at the end of April 1913 at Mexborough Town's ground a piece in the local paper was headed "Excited Spectators". Brodsworth had taken the lead with a penalty after half an hour and Hickleton fought hard to equalise. During a melee in the Brodsworth penalty area a Hickleton player allegedly deliberately kicked a Brodsworth player with the result that they came to blows. The referee sent them both off the field much to the chagrin of the opposing spectators, who soon started to fight each other in a free-for-all. The match was abandoned and the police called. In a hundred years things have barely changed!

THIS WAS THE PENULTIMATE MATCH AT HOME AND THE ROVERS, WHO HAD SLIPPED TO THIRD PLACE IN LEAGUE I IN THE LAST THREE GAMES, NEEDED A WIN TO TRY AND OVERTAKE CARLISLE UNITED, WHO WERE IN SECOND PLACE, THE LAST AUTOMATIC PLACE BEHIND RUNAWAY LEADERS SWANSER CITY.

They also needed the points to keep in front of the two teams closest to them, Nottingham Forest and Southend United. The Rovers made several changes from the team that had only drawn at Huddersfield Town on the previous weekend. Sam Hird came in for the suspended Matt Mills, Lewis Guy replaced James Coppinger, Sean McDaid came in for Richie Wellens and a new front pair of Mark McCammon and Gareth Taylor replaced Jason Price and Paul Heffernan. Coppinger and Wellens had taken knocks and were rested in preparation for the final push.

he Rovers dominated the first half but only made the breakthrough five minutes before the break when Taylor put a through ball out to the left for McDaid to collect and take it on to slot past Brezovan in the Swindon goal.

The second half started with Rovers on the attack in the early stages but Swindon hit back with a free kick from Timlin going just wide. A corner kick followed a few minutes later and was headed wide. Then Steve Roberts in trying to clear from his penalty area hit Paynter, with the ball spinning into the air back towards the Rovers goal but Sullivan was alert enough to tip it over the bar. Past the hour the Rovers got a grip on the game and

were assisted in the 66th minute when Aljofree brought McCammon down in the penalty area. The referee awarded the penalty and sent the Swindon man off. Stock took the penalty and scored whilst sending the keeper the wrong way. If the Rovers thought it was over against the ten men they soon found out otherwise. The last ten minutes they were forced on to the defensive as the ten men of Swindon went for broke. Nicholas put a good header to a free kick straight at Sullivan and Paynter went through on the left but his shot from just inside the area was saved by the Rovers keeper. Then in added time a shot from Peacock hit Sullivan and bounced back into play thus keeping a clean sheet for the Rovers. The win brought the Rovers closer to Carlisle, who lost at home to sixth place Leeds United. The Forest won at Tranmere Rovers to keep the pressure on the Rovers but Southend United only managed a draw at home to Northampton Town. It was still all to play for.

TODAY'S OPPONENTS

SWINDON TOWN



EST. 1879 • THE ROBINS • THE COUNTY GROUND

SWINDON TOWN ARE TODAY'S VISITORS TO THE KEEPMOAT STADIUM, IN WHAT COULD PROVE TO BE A CRUCIAL MATCH FOR BOTH SIDES TO PUSH FOR AUTOMATIC PROMOTION.

Founded in 1879, the club turned professional five years later. Their current home is The County Ground, which has remained The Robins home since 1886 and has a capacity of over 15,000.

he Robins did not enter the Football League until they were one of the founding members of Division Three in 1920, when they beat Luton Town 9-1 in their first game. Prior to entering the Football League, Swindon made the FA cup semi-final in 1909/10 before being beaten by Newcastle United.

The Robins also met English
Champions Manchester United for the charity shield in 1911 and the match is still the highest scoring charity shield match ever played. Swindon were beaten 8-4 at Stamford Bridge. In 1913, The Robins reached the FA Cup semi finals for a second time, this time they were defeated 1-0 in a replay to Barnsley.

Having been affected by World War II more than most other clubs, Swindon struggled to make progress through the Football League and did not achieve promotion until 1963. Six years later and The Robins won their only ever major domestic trophy, when beating Arsenal to win the League Cup.

Former England international Glen Hoddle took charge of the club in1991 and after his first full season as manager, the club missed out narrowly on the second division playoffs. However, a year later Swindon made the play-offs and achieved promotion to the Premier League, beating Leicester City 4-3, this was the first time The Robins had won promotion to England's top flight.

They were relegated from the division a year later after conceding 100 goals, a record that is yet to be beaten.
Relegation and financial problems saw The Robins slip to League Two by 2006.

Kevin MacDonald, following the resignation from former Italian international Paolo Di Canio, who left the club in January, manages the present side. They currently sit second in League One, five points behind Doncaster (at the time of writing).

Top scorer for The Robins is James Collins, with sixteen goals, Andy Williams has also scored 12 goals so far this season.

The last time Rovers and Swindon met was December 8th, at The County Ground, which ended 1-1. The sides have met on seventeen occasions, with Rovers winning seven and The Robins two.


The last meeting at the Keepmoat was in 2008 and Rovers won 2-0.

Prior to taking his first managerial job at Swindon MacDonald's career in coaching most notably included a spell as caretaker manager at Aston Villa following the resignation of Martin O'Neill on 9 August 2010. MacDonald also worked as assistant manager of the Republic of Ireland, with his ex-Liverpool team-mate Steve Staunton, who he used to coach at Aston Villa. In 1994, he also spent a short time as caretaker manager at Leicester City.

At 25 years of age Simon Ferry has quickly notched up over 100 appearances for Swindon becoming something of a permanent fixture in the side over the last few seasons and being pivotal in the club's 2011/12 League Two success gaining promotion last year.

Having joined Celtic at the age of 12, Ferry progressed through the ranks at Parkhead along with out on loan Town player Paul Caddis and former Town teammate Scott Cuthbert, enjoying much success. At a crucial time in his career as the midfielder was starting to break into the fist team he was sidelined for nearly two years with a serious ankle injury.

Ferry initially joined Swindon on loan in the summer of 2009 to regain match fitness and restart his career and went on to make 46 appearances in his first real year of professional football after his initial loan was extended to the end of the season. Ferry then made the permanent switch from Celtic in August 2010, penning a three-year deal and has never looked back becoming an important figure for the club.

22 year old powerful forward James Collins signed for Swindon on a two-year deal after rejecting the offer of a new contract from former club Shrewsbury Town at the beginning of the season. Coventry-born Collins started his youth career at Aston Villa where he made his way up through the Villa youth ranks enjoying loan spells at Darlington and Burton Albion during his time with the club.

With first team opportunities limited at Villa, he signed a permanent 18-month contract with Shrewsbury in January 2011, finishing the 2010/11 season with an impressive eight goals from 23 appearances. Last season Collins fired 17 goals in a total of 47 appearances helping Shrewsbury to promotion from League 2, finishing second behind champions Swindon.

Since signing for Swindon the young striker has taken very little time to settle into playing at a higher division scoring 12 goals this season and despite a change of managers remains the focal point of Swindon's frontline as the club chases promotion in a high scoring Swindon attack.

It was Southend however, where McCormack returned the following season initially on loan but after impressing he did enough to secure a permanent move to Roots Hall in December 2006. After a largely successful spell with Southend the midfielder was released in 2010 where a month later he signed for Charlton Athletic seeing limited opportunities with his new club.

Following his release from Charlton Athletic, the Irishman trained with Swindon for a week before putting pen to paper in July 2011, making a move from his natural midfield role to form a formidable partnership at the club with Aden Flint gaining promotion in 2012 and gaining the captain's armband in the process.

The 21-year old initially joined the Robins on Ioan in October 2011 and kept 9 clean sheets in 15 games prompting then manager Paulo Di Canio to buy the goal keeper and make him his first choice keeper ahead of understudy Leigh Bedwell.

Foderingham, who began his career at Fulham, was loaned to Bromley to gain first team experience and caught the attentions of Crystal Palace in a pre-season friendly demonstrating his potential to his future employers so well they decided to sign him. After training though pre-season the goal keeper returned to Bromley on loan to continue his development along with a spell at Histon.

The former England youth international has been ever present this campaign being the first choice option for both managers at the helm this season conceding a league low 29 goals in 38 appearances, further cementing his importance to the club.

MIKE SUMMERBEE: Young winger who joined Manchester City in August 1965, then Burnley, Blackpool and was Stockport's player-boss. The England international became a successful businessman.

ERNIE HUNT: Leading scorer who

moved to Wolves in September 1965, then played for Everton, Coventry City and Bristol City. He became a publican in Ledbury, then a window cleaner in Gloucester.

JACK SMITH: Centre-forward who moved to Brighton in January 1964, then Notts County and Margate. He managed Ramsgate and Bath City, then was Portsmouth's youth coach and died in May 2008.

CLIFF JACKSON: Ex-England Schoolboy who joined Plymouth in June 1963, then Bert Head's Crystal Palace, Torquay and Cambridge City. He worked in community sports projects and lives in Devizes.

ARNOLD D'ARCY: Winger who moved to Cheltenham in July 1964, then Gravesend & Northfleet. He was a painter and decorator with Peter Chamberlain in Swindon for 36 years, settling in Southmoor.












One call









HE PLAYED FOR BOTH TEAMS

IAN MILLER CAME TO PROMINENCE WITH DONCASTER ROVERS AFTER JOINING THEM FROM NOTTINGHAM FOREST, WHERE HE NEVER MADE THE FIRST TEAM.

A Scotsman, born in May 1955, was signed as a professional by Bury before the Forest moved in for him. He joined the Rovers along with keeper Dennis Peacock and a cash payment in exchange for Terry Curran moving to the City ground.

laying at outside right he became a fans favourite with his trickery on the ball and his ability to put over a good cross for Peter Kitchen and Brendan O'Callaghan to score the goals. In 1976-77 and 1977-78 he was selected in the PFA Team of the Year for the 4th Division. After 124 League games and 14 goals he was inevitably transferred, to Division 3 Swindon Town in exchange for £25,000 and Mickey French. His League record in his three seasons at Swindon was remarkably similar to the Rovers, 123+4 League games and 9 goals.

In August 1981 he moved on to Blackburn Rovers in the Second Division where he spent eight seasons before finishing his playing career with spells at Port Vale, Scunthorpe United and Stafford Rangers in the Conference, with an impressive Football League record of 567 games and 40 goals.

After a couple of years as Youth **Development Officer at Port** Vale he moved into coaching with Wolverhampton Wanderers, Blackburn Rovers, Blackpool, Bury, Leicester City, Manchester City and Leeds United. After being dismissed at Leeds United along with Simon Grayson and Glynn Snodin in February 2012 the trio were back in harness at Huddersfield Town three weeks later. The Terriers were promoted to the Championship at the end of the season but in January 2013 they were again out of a job after a succession of defeats left them perilously close to the relegation zone.







JAMIE MCDONNELL IS LOOKING TO WRITE HIS NAME IN THE HISTORY BOOKS BY BECOMING THE FIRST EVER BOXING WORLD CHAMPION FROM DONCASTER.

McDonnell will fight Mexican knockout king Julio Ceja for the vacant IBF Bantamweight crown at the Keepmoat Stadium, in his hometown of Doncaster, on Saturday 11th May.

overs official website spoke to Jamie ahead of his press conference at the stadium where the location and date of the fight was officially announced.

Although he is confident in his own ability, Jamie is under no illusions of an easy fight against the young Mexican.

"I'm expecting a tough challenge," he said

"The kid's undefeated, he's twenty years old and has won 24; 22 of them by knockout.

He is only young so he's going to come here wanting to win the world title and make a name for himself.

He's going to come here and give 200% so it's up to me to go out there and give even more than him."

The Hatfield born boxer has spent many years building up to this world title fight and believes its now the time to show the whole world how good a fighter he is.

"This is the fight that I've have dreamt about, Dennis [Hobson] has got the

fight here in my home town, so its now up to me to do what I need to do to make my dream come true and become World Champion and do it for Doncaster.

I do believe that I'm a better fighter than him and that I will be victorious on the night."

Ceja is described by many as a 'knockout king' and his record certainly backs that bold tag, but McDonnell is full of confidence and is looking to prove that he is the better boxer of the two.

"I'm a skilful, thinking fighter. I've got a lot of heart and I like to get stuck in which you can see from my previous fights.

It's going to be tough, you just have to look at his record; that speaks for itself. He's been unbeaten in 24 fights and has 22 knockouts within that but I do believe that I am the better fighter and I will prove that on the night by beating him.

There's been a lot of hard work put in ahead of this fight, I haven't took the easy route to get here, and I've fought against the best; winning the British title and Commonwealth title and defended them successfully numerous times.

We've been studying the opposition closely and my team have come up

with a plan; we've been working our training around that plan.

We train three times a day and put everything we have into it and hopefully on fight night we will reap the rewards and I will get that belt around my waist.

I am a confident person; nothing phases me I just get on with the task in hand. When you've put in the hard work you won't have any doubts in your mind when you walk into the ring. I have put in the hard work and when I walk into the ring I know that I have done everything I can."

The fight is billed as the biggest sporting event, in history, to be held in Doncaster and McDonnell revealed that it makes the fight even more special for him.

"It's the best venue you could hope for. There's no better place to win your first World title so it fantastic that it will be held at the Keepmoat.

Its history in the making, I will be the first ever World Champion from Doncaster and to do it in my hometown will make it even more special.

This is not just for me; it's for my family, all my coach's and everyone who has believed in me and has supported me."

RTID caught up with new signing from Oldham, Dean Furman, on his first day with the club. Dean, who is a South African international, has joined Rovers just in time for the end of season promotion push and will provide manager, Brian Flynn, with another option in midfield going into the final games of the season.

Firstly Dean, tell us a little bit about how you started out in football as a young boy in South Africa and your move to England?

Starting out in football, I was just playing with my local side in South Africa and then my family decided to move over to England when I was five, where again I was just playing for my local Sunday club. I was then scouted by Chelsea, at the age of nine, and from then up until the age of eighteen I was with Chelsea's academy.

I would take it as a favour if you would kindly think the matter over, and make whatever suggestions you deem necessary. I am only writing to the following – Blackburn Rovers, Bolton Wanderers, Preston North End, West Bromwich Albion, and Aston Villa, and would like to hear what other clubs you would suggest.



The opening of the £6million Main Stand in 1999 changed forever the look and feel of the ground. Before, it had always been small and homely, but the addition of the Main Stand has drastically changed the overall

he stand, which sits proudly along one side of the pitch, is a single tier cantilever holding just under 7,000 people. It looks huge compared to the other stands and is probably three times the size of the old Main Stand. It is simply designed, sits well back from the pitch and has windshields to either side. Considering that the overall capacity of the ground is just over 10,000, one can understand how the Main Stand dominates Gresty Road, accounting for 70% of the available seating.

The other three stands are roughly of the same height, covered and all seated, but are rather small when compared to the Main Stand. So much so, that balls are regularly kicked out of the ground during a game. The newest of these smaller stands is the Gresty Road End, which is the home end of the ground. This replaced a former open terrace and seats around 900. Opposite is the Wulvern Homes Stand, which was previously known as the Railway End. This has some executive boxes at the rear, but the seating area is only opened for the bigger games. The Whitby Morrison Ice Cream Van Stand at one side of the ground, has an unusual television/press gantry on its roof. It almost looks as if part of a portakabin was at some point bolted onto the roof and it looks a bit precarious. In the corner between the Wulvern Homes and Whitby Morrison Ice Cream Van Stands is a large clock, whilst on the other side of the Whitby Morrison Ice Cream Van Stand is a Police Control Box, keeping a close eye on the away contingent.

An unusual feature is the absence of dugouts, the teams instead are given a section of seating at the front of the Main Stand. You will also notice that the pitch is slightly raised above ground level. The ground is completed with a set of modern looking floodlights. I noted that on the Main Stand side of the stadium additional lighting is present half way up the floodlight pylons. One assumes that the height of the new stand prevented enough light getting to the pitch and hence additional lighting needed to be subsequently added.

AWAY FANS

Away fans are housed in the Whitby Morrison Ice Cream Van Stand at one side of the ground. The whole of this stand is given to away supporters and houses 1,680 fans, though if required the Wulvern Homes Stand can also be allocated to away fans. Entrance to the away stand is by ticket only, (no cash is accepted at ironically some of the oldest turnstiles I have ever seen at a League Ground). Tickets need to be purchased from the ticket booth next to the supporters club at the entrance to this stand. Please also note that alcohol is not available in this stand.

WHERE TO EAT AND DRINK

If you get there reasonably early before the game, the supporters club at the ground allows small numbers of away fans in. There are also a number of pubs within walking distance of the ground. The pick of these, is probably the Royal Hotel on Nantwich Road. As Barry Cutts a visiting Coventry City supporter adds; 'I found the Royal Hotel to be a warm & welcoming drinking house. Turn left out of the railway station & the pub is 50 yards down this road on the right hand side. There is also a fantastic chippie opposite'. Although the pub does not look that welcoming, with a number of bouncers on the door, once inside you will find it okay. There are separate bars for home and away supporters. The away supporters bar is called Clancys and is decked out in

an Irish theme. On my last visit it had a large screen showing Sky Sports and had a number of filled rolls for sale. For those who like their real ale then further down Nantwich Road on the left hand side just past the traffic lights is the British Lion. This comfortable small pub has been listed previously in the CAMRA Good Beer Guide and has regular changing guest beers.

If you park on the industrial estate just off Weston Road, then on your way to the ground you will pass the Brocklebank Pub, a Brewers Fayre outlet, which is very popular with away fans. It is also has a large screen showing Sky Sports. You can also park in their own car park which costs £2.50.

GETTING THERE BY CAR AND PARKING

Leave the M6 at Junction 16 and take the A5020 towards Crewe. Follow this road right into Crewe. At the roundabout junction with the A534, Nantwich Road, turn left, Gresty Road is down past the Railway Station on the left. Just before you reach this island on Weston Road, you will see a sign pointing to the right, which displays; 'Away Supporters On Street Parking'. This directs you to an industrial estate on the right of the road (you will also see the Volkswagen dealership, L.C. Charles on the front of it). It takes about 15 minutes to walk to the ground from here. Otherwise at the ground behind the Main Stand is a pay and display car park which costs £3.50 for the day. Obviously this fills up quite quickly on matchdays.

BY TRAIN

The ground is only a few minutes walk from the train station. As you come out of the Railway Station turn left and Gresty Road is down the road on your left.


