





FROM THE CHAIRMAN **PAUL D.P. SCALLY**

Good evening Ladies and Gentlemen, Girls and Boys and welcome back to Priestfield for our second home game in four days against Swindon Town. On behalf of all connected to the Club, I'd like to welcome the Directors', Management, Players and supporters of our friends from along the M4 to Priestfield, and result apart hope you all enjoy your stay and have a safe journey home.

As we begin my 20th year as your Chairman, a period that has seen just about every twist and turn in football and life possible, I still look forward to

the first home game of every season, seeing old friends return for another challenge, watching the invariably rebuilt team get their legs into gear after an intense pre season schedule, seeing the hallowed turf at its best and of course hoping the game produces a positive result and performance such that it sets a positive feel about the Club in general for the long and challenging season ahead. That was certainly the case on Saturday when we hosted Yeovil Town, who were of course relegated from the Championship in May, in a game that perhaps

gave us an early glimpse of the great spirit, character, work ethic and desire in our players, and a wish to play decent football when possible which Peter and his team are trying to create on the training ground. I certainly left Priestfield with a warm sense of satisfaction, firstly of course with the three points safely in the bag, but maybe more so because I know this season we have a strong dressing room, with decent characters and a good mix of players all of whom have great qualities and are capable of doing a good job for the team when called upon.

I think given the injuries we have picked up already this season, to put on a performance such as we did on Saturday, to get a result which was as much a product of organised hard graft and determination as it was footballing finesse, to see two more players leave the field on stretchers as a result of their bravery and will to put their bodies on the line, shows that we have that special inner desire to go that one step further, which will over the course of the season be the difference between good and very good sides. I saw both Josh Hare and Joe Martin in the medical room after the game, Josh was still looking very shaky after being knocked unconscious when he blocked a hard driven cross, an injury that protocol rightly insists carries a 7 day 'no





play' rest period and Joe took a nasty knock to his knee, the result of which we won't know for 24 or 48 hours. Whilst injuries are frustrating, they do challenge the Management in reorganising the team and tactics, and I think Peter did a great job in bringing in Stephen Bywater so quickly as cover for our injured keeper Stuart Nelson, and of course every injury gives a chance to another player in the squad to come in and show what they have in their locker.

On other matters it was very touching and emotional to witness the minute's applause you graciously gave before the game on Saturday in memory of Aidan, the son of Nigel and Sue Hidson, who was tragically murdered along with his friend and fellow student Neil Dalton in Malaysia on August 6th. It was clearly a touching and difficult moment for the family who bravely came to the game and watched from pitch side and were very grateful for the dignity and support you all showed, but

what was ironic was that Nigel told me at half time that whilst Aidan was a massive Gills fan, he had also supported Newcastle United from a young age and given he was studying medicine at Newcastle University, he had been going to their games during his time up north. Is it therefore coincidence that we should be drawn against the mighty Newcastle United, for the first time in some 30+ years in the Capital One Cup, or was Aidan pulling some strings for us from above, to give a fine draw to the team he really loved? Whichever it is, we are all very excited at the prospect of facing my good friend Alan Pardew's Premiership boys next Tuesday night, and I hope we get a big house and create an exciting atmosphere for what will be a very interesting evening, and a game that both sides will be going full out to win, especially with a place in Europe up for grabs for the eventual Cup winners, GFC in Europe.... anything is possible in life !!!.

Tickets are on sale now, at the

ticket office or online, so be sure to get your family and friends down to Priestfield next week and enjoy a night of what will certainly be fine entertainment. Back to tonight, we all have a role to play in creating the atmosphere which helps the players, who in turn will give their all for the cause. There are never going to be easy games in this division, each has its own challenges, but Priestfield has always been a difficult place for visiting teams, and that in most part is down to the theatre you all create.

Let's make Priestfield rock tonight and hopefully the rest will follow.





TONIGHT'S OPPPOSITION



SWINDON TOWN

... Mark Cooper's men got off to a perfect start in the league campaign with a 3-1 victory at home to newly promoted Scunthorpe, before defeating John Still's Luton 2-1 at Kenilworth Road in the first round of the Cup this time last week ...

This evening we welcome Swindon Town to MEMS Priestfield Stadium who, like Gillingham, have claimed one victory in their opening two league outings to start the 2014/15 season and advanced to the second round of the Capital One Cup.

Mark Cooper's men got off to a perfect start in the league campaign with a 3-1 victory at home to newly promoted Scunthorpe, before defeating John Still's Luton 2-1 at Kenilworth Road in the first round of the Cup this time last week.

However on Saturday they were denied at least a point by Crawley due to a hotly contested penalty decision, which saw defender Louis Thompson sent off before Izale McLeod netted the spot kick.

to give the Red Devils all three points at Broadfield Stadium. Tonight's visitors will be looking to build on a relatively successful 2013/14 season where they finished just eight points shy of Peterborough United who secured the final play-off place in the division.

Season

In order to achieve at least a top six placing this time around Swindon may look to Michael Smith who scored eight goals last season for the club, having joined from Charlton Athletic in January for an initial fee of £100,000.

He had previously had a loan spell at AFC Wimbledon where he netted 10 times in 24 appearances, and he's begun this season very well having scored four goals in Swindon's opening three matches.

PREVIOUS MEETINGS

Swindon haven't defeated Gills since October 2011 when goals from Matt Ritchie and Jonathan Smith in the last ten minutes secured a 2-0 win at the County Ground.

Last season however Gillingham registered four points against Town over our two league meetings. The first game finishing 2-2 with Cody McDonald coming off the bench to score a late equaliser, and in January a goal either side of half time from Leon Legge and Michael Harriman secured an impressive 2-0 victory at MEMS Priestfield Stadium.

In total the two clubs have met on 92 separate occasions - of those Swindon have the better record with 35 victories. Gills have won 30 times and the other 27 games have resulted in a draw.







SWINDON TOWN

MANAGER



MARK COOPER

Cooper took the reins at the County Ground in August 2013 following a spell as Assistant boss under Kevin MacDonald.

His first year proved successful, with the Robins finishing eighth in the Sky Bet League One table - eight points shy of Peterborough United who occupied the final play-off position.

As a player Cooper played for a host of clubs, most notably for Exeter City and Tamworth, the latter he went on to manage between 2004 and 2007 before joining Kettering.

After clinching the Conference North title he guided the club to eighth place in the Conference National, alerting the attentions of the Posh who offered Mark a three-and-a-half year deal in November 2009.

His tenure would only last 13 games however prior to a stint at Darlington, a second spell at Kettering and then Telford.

ASSISTANT MANAGER



LUKE WILLIAMS

Williams spent three seasons at Brighton and Hove Albion where he was in charge of the Under 21s and was a coach with the reserve team, before joining Swindon ahead of the 2013/14 campaign.

He has also been an FA Skills Coach and has worked at both Leyton Orient and West Ham.

HEAD OF GOALKEEPING



STEVE HALE

Steve was appointed Head of Goalkeeping at Swindon in the summer of 2014.

Hale looks after all the goalkeepers at Swindon Town and has also overseen the development of young keepers from his own private school through to Swindon Town and other clubs.

Steve is an FA B Licence Goalkeeper Coach & Uefa B Licence Outfield Coach.

MEET THE TEAM



MASSIMO LUONGO MIDFIELDER

Luongo joined Swindon from Tottenham on a season-long loan last summer before completing a permanent move just before transfer deadline day. The midfielder spent time on loan at the club at the end of the 2012/13 season.

The stylish midfielder has won many fans during his time in Wiltshire so far, including Australian national team coach, Ange Postecoglou. Luongo was part of the Socceroos squad at the 2014 World Cup in Brazil, the third player in Swindon history to represent his country on the biggest stage.

GOALKEEPER

TYRELL BELFORD

Belford signed a deal with Town in the summer of 2013 following his release from Liverpool's Academy and provides cover for Wes Foderingham. The highly-rated youngster was at Coventry before he was snapped up by the Anfield outfit.

DEFENDERS

NATHAN THOMPSON

A product of the STFC Academy, Thompson made his breakthrough into the first team during the 2012/13 campaign. The two-time Player of the Year winner ended last term with the captain's armband and will skipper Town this season.

NATHAN BYRNE

Byrne penned a two-year deal with Swindon in the summer of 2013 after a successful loan spell the previous campaign. Back on a permanent deal, the defender has proved a versatile member of Mark Cooper's squad.

DARREN WARD

After joining initially on loan from Millwall in the summer of 2012, the centre back made his Town debut against local rivals Oxford before penning a permanent deal in January 2012. He started his career as a youngster at Watford making 67 appearances, including a number of Premiership games before joining Millwall, Crystal Palace and then Wolves.

JACK BARTHRAM

The versatile youngster, who can play in defence or in midfield, penned a one-year deal with Swindon at the start of the 2013/14 campaign. Barthram had

previously played with Tottenham Hotspur's youth team before his release in the summer.

RAPHAEL BRANCO

Formerly with the academy at Brighton and Hove Albion, the Brazilian centre-half penned a deal with Town in the summer after a successful trial period. Made his debut against Plymouth Argyle in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy. He stepped off the bench to make his league debut in a 1-1 draw at Bradford City.

MATHEW JONES

The left full back is a graduate of the youth Academy at Swindon, penning his first professional deal in the summer of 2014. Mathew is the son of former Swindon player, Tom.

CURTIS DA COSTA

Another graduate from the STFC Academy, the defender put pen to paper on his first professional forms with the club in the summer.

JOSH LELAN

The mobile defender is currently on an initial one-month loan from Derby County. A graduate of the youth academy at Pride Park, Lelan spent time on loan with Gateshead last term.

JORDAN TURNBULL

The 19-year-old central defender initially began his career in the youth team at the County Ground prior to joining the academy setup at Southampton.

He is contracted for another year at St. Mary's Stadium but rejoined Town on a season long loan two weeks ago.

BRAD SMITH

The 20-year-old left back is on loan from Premier League

giants Liverpool having made one professional appearance for the Reds - that coming against Chelsea at Stamford Bridge in December last year.

He has signed a season long deal and made his debut on the opening day of the season.

MIDFIELDERS

RYAN HARLEY

The experienced midfielder joined Town in July 2013 after his release from Brighton and Hove Albion. He made his name with Exeter City before securing a move to Swansea. From there he moved east to Brighton and had a spell on loan at MK Dons in the latter part of the 2012/13 campaign.

YASER KASIM

A former player with Brighton's Academy side, Kasim penned a permanent deal with Town ahead of the 2013/14 campaign. In his time at the Amex Stadium, the classy holding midfielder spent time on loan at Luton and Macclesfield Town. Yaser has also represented Iraq at international level.

LOUIS THOMPSON

The youngster came up through the ranks at the STFC Academy and made his debut for the first team whilst still a first year scholar at Leicester City in the FA Cup fourth round in January 2012.

BEN GLADWIN

Formerly with the Academy at Reading, Gladwin penned a professional contract with Swindon at the end of November. Signed from Marlow FC, the central midfielder had plied his trade in the non-leagues before moving to Wiltshire after impressing on trial.

ANTON RODGERS

The midfielder joined the Town in the summer of 2014 after leaving Oldham Athletic. Having started his career at Chelsea, Rodgers broke into the professional game with Brighton and Hove Albion. Anton is the son of Liverpool manager, Brendan.

FORWARDS

CONNOR WALDON

Swindon-born Waldon is a product of the club's Academy system, signing professional forms in the summer of 2013. He made his Town debut as a substitute against Stevenage at the end of the 2012/13 season.

MICHAEL SMITH

A January 2014 signing from Charlton Athletic, the striker made the perfect start to his Swindon career when he netted twice on his debut against Shrewsbury at The County Ground.

GEORGE BARKER

Barker is a product of the youth system at Brighton and Hove Albion and made his Seagulls debut in March 2013, coming on as a substitute at Barnsley. Has spent time on loan at clubs in the lower leagues and was most recently with Newport County.

ANDY WILLIAMS

The 28-year-old can play either as a striker or a winger and joined Swindon in the summer of 2012 on a two-year deal from Yeovil.

He has scored 11 times in 45 league outings for Town but last season returned to Yeovil on a short term loan deal, however this was cut short due to a serious cruciate injury picked up in training.

WES FODERINGHAM GOALKEEPER

The shot-stopper came through the ranks with Fulham's Academy before moving to Crystal Palace.

He initially joined Swindon on loan in 2012 and enjoyed a prolific start to his Town career where he didn't concede a goal in his first five games.



PAST PROGRAMMES SWINDON TOWN

When Swindon Town visited Priestfield on 8 August 2009 they found a club in celebratory mood and this is reflected in the programme, no fewer than 16 of the 68 B5 pages containing an image from either our League Two play-off Final against Shrewsbury or the celebrations in the days after.

Paul Scally opened his programme notes by referring to, 'an exciting season in prospect with, what for me is the most impressive collection of teams ever to grace the third tier of the game coming to Priestfield over the next nine months'. Those teams included Southampton and Norwich City who have since played in the Premier League, Leeds United, who we would be meeting as equals for the third season in six having never previously met in the league before, and Charlton Athletic.

who we would be playing in the league for the first time since 1982. Scally also expressed his satisfaction that Andy Barcham, Simon King and Curtis Weston had committed to the club by signing new or extended contracts during the summer.

Additions

Blues News listed the new additions to the squad. Kevin Maher had signed a two year deal from Oldham while Chris Palmer had spent the previous season at Walsall. Josh Gowling had joined on a one month loan from Carlisle and Rashid Yussuff had signed from Charlton after impressing in pre-season.

Gowling's loan move, which later became a permanent deal, was necessary due to the injuries the squad had picked up in pre-season as Mark Stimson outlined in his

notes. Simon King and Stuart Lewis both had ankle problems while Dennis Oli had a knee injury and Kevin Maher had picked up a knock in a friendly against Crystal Palace at Selhurst Park. To add to these problems Simon King had required a week off when his son contracted swine flu.

Stimson also mentions a fifth and more recent new signing, Jacob Erskine. He had initially impressed playing against us in pre-season for Bromley and made one of four first team appearances when he came on as a substitute against Swindon.

The programme's main article was Curtain Raisers by Andy Ford, which covered four pages and looked back on the run of twelve consecutive seasons, from 1987/88 to 1998/99, when the Gills were handed a home game on the opening day.

Always one for forensic detail Andy's other article, Away Days, looked at the season ahead in terms of our opponents and their distance from Priestfield. We would be travelling 6,910 miles compared to 8,316 miles in League Two, had lost our nearest possible away game (Dagenham) and replaced it with the furthest (Carlisle) and would be visiting three grounds for the first time (Colchester, Southampton and MK Dons).

Magic Moments was a new feature in which a former Gills player talked about one of the greatest moments in the club's history. The first player was Ty Gooden and the opening paragraph quoted John Motson's commentary when he scored our equaliser at Highbury against Arsenal in the FA Cup fifth round in 2002. "Ty Gooden for Gillingham. That's a brilliant effort... OH WHAT A GOAL! You won't see a better one than that in the FA Cup".

Opponents

Gooden reflected on the warm welcome that he and Paul Shaw, another former Arsenal junior, received from the backroom staff at Highbury when they returned for that game and the "nerve wracking" delayed fourth round tie against Bristol Rovers by which time our potential fifth round opponents were known. Of his goal he said, "I can remember the goal as if it was yesterday... perhaps one of those things that was just meant to be". Of the way the game changed when Robert Pires and Thierry Henry came on (we went on to lose 5-2) he recalled that, "the injection of pace and ability was something that will live with me forever. The game changed almost instantly".

The Swindon game was a 12:30 kick-off on police advice and only a neutral reading this will need reminding of the

final score, a 5-0 romp in the August sunshine watched by 6,852 that put the Gills top of League One. We had hoped that we would stay there for at least a week but Paul Lambert's Colchester United had other ideas, winning 7-1 at Norwich City a couple of hours later.

Our goal scorers that afternoon were Mark Bentley, Adam Miller and hat-trick hero Simeon Jackson. The latter two featured in the programme as did John Nutter who set up the second and third goals.

Performances


Jackson had spent part of the summer on international duty for Canada, marking his full debut against Cyprus with a goal and then appearing in all four games in the CONCACAF Gold Cup in the US. He told the programme, "that's out of the way now and it's all about this season" but his performances for his national side weren't forgotten and a few months later he was named Canadian Player of the Year for 2009.

Nutter talked about the 2008/09 season, in which he missed just one game and was part of a back four that kept nineteen clean sheets,

and compared his Wembley experience with that two years earlier for Stevenage in the FA Trophy. He explained, "With Stevenage it was a great day out but with Gillingham it was more about business and it was such a great feeling to take Gillingham back to where they should be".

Adam Miller took part in Rapid Fire, a less than serious Q&A piece, during which he said that the person from history he'd most like to meet was Jesus because, "Let's be honest he'd have a few tales to tell".

Despite our most memorable start to a season it was Swindon who went on to have the better campaign, recovering from their heavy defeat to finish fifth in League One and reach the Play-off Final where they lost to Millwall. Meanwhile we were relegated on the final day of the season at Wycombe Wanderers with the worst away record in the division, picking up just six points from six draws on the road. By contrast we had the best home record outside the top eight, collecting twelve wins and a total of forty four points at Priestfield.



We responded well and scored four goals in the last 25 minutes


of the half. Ryan Crandley scoring two and Mitchell Dickenson the other two - the pleasing points that we scored two from good build ups and two from set plays.


It was a disappointing second half but the boys have had a decent start to the season and are working very hard towards improving their game.



A LOAD OF CRYSTAL BALLS...



Football fans often tick off the years by season 2011-12, 12-13, 13-14 rather than the more conventional calendar. Many also mark the passage of time with the passing of the World Cup every four years. Often they'll be able to tell you exactly when they were and what they were up to during each competition, whether it be doing their exams at school, watching at home or down the pub with mates in England, on holiday somewhere or even at the actual tournament.

If you watch your first "proper" World Cup aged ten and live to be eighty you'll experience 18 World Cups, it isn't many really. On the day of the confirmation of England's somewhat premature exit from Brazil 2014 I watched Costa Rica's fateful 1-0 win over Italy in the flat and

pub opposite the St Lawrence cricket ground in Canterbury. The pub was thronged with Kent fans gearing up for the one-day T20 game against Sussex and keeping an eye on the vital group game.

A chap in his early 70's sat down opposite me and we got talking, it soon transpired that as a young man he had actually attended the 1966 World Cup Final. Wow, only the third person I've ever met who was there that day. His eyes twinkled as he thought back to that summer day at Wembley more than half a lifetime ago. It was quite a poignant moment to think that time is catching up on both the surviving players and spectators present that day and I wondered whether such a victory will ever be repeated. Quite by coincidence a group of lads at

the bar in their 30's and 40's were also discussing the World Cup, one of them then said "I was born in 1968, after we won the World Cup, I'm now 46, and I don't think England will very win the World Cup in my lifetime..." his mates paused, took a thoughtful sip of their beer, did a few mental calculations and then all agreed, "yeah, no chance". It was all rather matter of fact, no gnashing of teeth or wailing, just a quiet acceptance that after 48 years of trying and one semi-final to show for it, a fatalistic realism has settled upon many England fans.

Excitable

A few weeks later and I was getting excitable messages from my niece who happens to live in Frankfurt in Germany. It might not be the liveliest city in the country but at two o'clock in the morning there were tens of thousands of ecstatic people on the streets. They were hanging out of windows tooting their car horns, climbing up monuments, sitting up lampposts going absolutely mental. They'd won the world cup... again. Quite innocently my niece then suggested "it would be quite fun if England won the World Cup soon", all I could do was smile.

Now much has been made of the German model of how they run and organise their football. From modern facilities and well qualified coaches even at youth and grassroots level to how they govern their professional game with a "50+1" rule giving supporters (a bit like county

cricket members) the final say on any fundamental decisions at their club. Not the day to day running, but it does prevent clubs becoming the plaything of eccentric billionaires that seek to change their name, colours or even location on a whim.

Strict controls over financial decisions limiting spending on transfers and wages might have stopped the Bundesliga from attracting the sort of "galacticos" Real Madrid and Barcelona hoover up on a regular basis, but it has also saved them from clubs getting themselves into huge debt and ending up in administration. It has also deterred some of the more greedy potential chairmen from getting their claws into their top clubs. The German philosophy is very different from England, the free market extremes are at least regulated with the result that tickets are a fraction of the cost of those in England.

Dominated

The fact that the German clubs have recently succeeded in European competition despite not simply spending their way to the top has caught the eye of many fans yearning for a game less dominated by money and greed. The fact that the leadership of the German Football Association is strong enough to enforce financial probity, encourage clubs to actually feature plenty of young home grown talent in their starting elevens and were able to order a root and branch revolution in their coaching ten years ago after their relatively poor showing at Euro 2004 makes the leadership of our own game look rather pathetic in comparison. Our elite clubs are fundamentally selfish and greedy and none care one jot for the health of the national team.

So what can be done in England? What is possible? What might professional football in England look like in 2024? The



Germans (or Turks) are set to host the Euros then, will England have a team that can genuinely challenge by then? Would our own 10 year plan ever be taken seriously or implemented? There has been some improvement in the coaching set up nationally and some of the England age group teams have done well recently, but there is always a time lag with these things and the nagging fear that there isn't the will to follow things through.

Internationally

Perhaps though it isn't all doom and gloom. The administrators and guardians of the game nationally and internationally are gradually introducing financial fair play which should reduce the hording of so many young players by big clubs and

encourage them to nurture more of their own talent. Increasingly stringent "fit and proper" tests for owners might help weed out the real charlatans and should England introduce the sort of financial controls that they have in Germany and France where binding seasonal budgets are presented and rigorously enforced (no licence to play without one), then clubs might be protected from themselves!

Quota

Whether any English clubs would adopt a quota system of English players in squads or teams is unlikely any time soon, but perhaps within the decade if the proportion has fallen significantly lower then even the FA might act! Obviously the quality of the raw material would have to improve and whether the coaching philosophy and general level of competence can be improved and turned into a coherent programme churning out quality players for the elite end of things is difficult to say.

Many supporters would also like to see the clubs adopting the "German model" in terms of ticketing prices and access for ordinary fans, an increasingly middle class and aging set of season ticket holders in the Premier League does not help the vibrancy or atmosphere. Neither does overbearing policing and stewarding and of course the debate over the reintroduction of terracing will ebb and flow over the next decade. Calls for trials at interested clubs and the clamour for the authorities to at least engage in meaningful dialogue grows by the month. Whether it be "rail" seating or just properly managed terraces many point to the fact that in Germany fans are given the choice whether to sit or stand. They have the highest attendances in their top division in the world and the vibrancy in the grounds now puts the Premier League to shame.

ADRIAN PENNOCK

This evening's special guest at MEMS Priestfield Stadium is a player who will not need much of an introduction to the majority of Gills supporters.

Adrian Pennock returns to Priestfield tonight having enjoyed a seven year stint with Gillingham between 1996 and 2003, having started his career at Norwich City before joining Bournemouth in 1992.

Tony Pulis, who managed Pennock at Dean Court, brought the centre-back with him shortly after taking the reins at Priestfield and the defender would go on to make 200 professional appearances for the club, captaining the side that clinched promotion to the Championship in May 2000 against Wigan at Wembley - then under the management of Peter Taylor.

However an ongoing knee issue eventually took its toll

and Adrian was forced to retire from League Football in 2003, his final appearance in a Gills shirt coming on September 29 2002 during a 2-2 draw with Crystal Palace at Selhurst Park.

Favourite

During his stint in Kent he became a firm fans favourite, to the point where supporters gave him his own infamous chant which went 'He only scores own goals.' However Pennock's sense of humour endeared him even further to the Gills faithful and as a result remains one of the most popular Gillingham players in recent history.

On retiring he remained in the game, firstly as Assistant Manager at Gravesend & Northfleet where he also acted as Assistant Manager. He went onto manage Welling between 2005 and 2007 and guided the

team to their highest league position in six years.

However he left his position at Park View Road to take up a coaching position at Stoke City under former boss Pulis.

He was initially named as Youth Coach but was promoted to the role of First Team Coach in the summer of 2011 where he would remain for two years before departing the Britannia Stadium.

In November last year he was announced the new Manager of Forest Green Rovers and ensured a top half finish as the team finished 10th in the Conference Premier.



GOLENGHAM THE HOME OF FOOTBALL IN KENT

Gills new striker got his first taste of first team football for the club last Tuesday when he started against Yeovil in the Capital One Cup. The 21-year-old signed a two year contract at MEMS Priestfield Stadium during the summer and is now eager to show his potential following loan spells at Northampton Town and Dagenham & Redbridge.

Q: You spent three years at Brentford, you went out on loan and got some goals to your name at various league clubs but did you feel you needed a permanent move in order to settle down?

A: Yes, Brentford offered me a new deal but they said I'd be going straight out on loan so I thought I may as well go somewhere permanent - I think it was the right thing to do at the right time.

Q: I'm sure loan spells help in terms of getting experience and scoring goals, but in the back of your mind you don't know where you will be in a few weeks' time so there is always an element of uncertainty?

A: Yes exactly, it was coming to the end of the season so it was almost like I was in the shop window. I had to play every game as if I was being watched - it's definitely better to sign somewhere so you know where you will be for a season or two.

Q: I'm sure players weigh up their options with the help of agents and advisors, but what was the specific appeal with Gillingham?

A: It's a big club - it was good to know they were interested, we've got a good

Manager, I knew a few of the boys and it was close to home so everything seemed right and at the end of the day it proved to be a no brainer.

Q: Which of the boys did you know?

A: I knew Leggy, Antonio and Westy, he has moved on of course but as soon as I knew an offer was there I knew it was where I was going to end up.

Q: You got a few pre-season games under your belt and got your first taste of first team action away at Yeovil last week. It seemed a classic example of a complete team performance?

A: It was - we needed to bounce back after MK Dons, I thought we were good in the first half. It didn't quite happen for us in the second half but we needed to win and it was a good performance.

The team was changed around and it worked, we now have the reward of a nice home tie against Newcastle so things are looking up.

Q: Did you watch the draw?

A: Yes, I did. As I was sitting there I was aware Man Utd were still in the draw so I was kind of hoping we would get them away, but Newcastle at home is still a massive fixture and a great draw for us.

Q: Until that time comes though full focus must turn to our league games?

A: Of course, the league is the most important thing. It's always nice to get a cup run but we want to improve on last season and finish as high up as we can.

Q: We've been a bit unlucky with injuries but on the flip side that enables other players to impress

in the first team and a number of players did that at Yeovil?

A: Yes, I think both injuries we picked up at MK Dons weren't what we needed, especially at the start of the season because you work so hard to get fit and then have to do it all again.

However it gives other people the chance to play and make the Manager want to play them every week if they play well. Injuries are part of Football but it does open doors for others.

Q: As a striker you are judged on goals ultimately, but judging by pre-season and at Yeovil it appears you like to come a bit deeper, play others in as well as score yourself. Is that a fair assessment of your game?

A: I would say it is. I would have liked to have scored more in pre-season, I think I'm a bit behind in what I feel I should have got so I'm just waiting to get a league

goal or cup goal so I can get started for the season.

However the most important thing is the results - if I'm playing and other people are scoring then that's fine because the team are winning. I'll get my fair share for the season I'm sure.

Q: It's a very young squad but the one thing you all seem to have in common is hunger and a determination to impress?

A: Well I think that's why the gaffer went for a few young players - everyone who has come in are hungry and wants to play and perform to their best at all times. We've got the right balance with the experience with Keds, Leggy and Lofty so if we can find that balance we can be a very good side.

Q: Lofty has the armband but the Manager has said he wants 11 captains, is that leadership type quality something you work on during the week?

A: Definitely. We know Lofty is the skipper but even when we have meetings he says he wants everyone to speak up, everyone has their own opinion and if we can all work together and help each other the team will start playing good Football.

Q: Support was fantastic at MK Dons and then again at Yeovil, have you been surprised with how many people supported Gillingham?

A: I was very surprised, when I first moved down here and sorting everything out I couldn't believe how many supported Gillingham. Of course it's the only professional club in Kent so it has a big following which is a huge positive as they get behind us every single week which is a huge plus in games.

Q: We had quite a long pre-season and it seems to take ages for the action to begin, but now we've begun you have a lot of

games in a short space of time, so once it starts it gathers pace?

A: Definitely, everyone wants it to start and then all of a sudden it's on you but that's why we train every day because we sometimes have three games in a week and we are looking forward to it.

Q: So who's got the best banter in the squad?

A: Dacky is quite funny but it's probably stupid funny. Keds is good too but in general it's a great dressing room.

Q: On a personal note are you all settled now in terms of your move?

A: Yes. My partner moved with me so it was quite enjoyable and it was the first time in properly moving out. It was stressful at the start but we are settling now and everything is falling into place.



PAIN & PILL'S AWFULLY BIG ADVENTURE

CHRIS PAINE AND MATT PILLEN ARE LIFELONG GILLINGHAM SUPPORTERS, BUT THIS SUMMER THEY SWAPPED TRIPS TO OLDHAM AND CREWE WITH ONE OF A LIFETIME TO BRAZIL FOR THE 2014 WORLD CUP...

Q1. It must have been a dream to get to go to the 2014 World Cup in Brazil. Is it true a long shot football accumulator bet came through for you last season and you decided to spend the winnings on your trip?

Chris: Yes it is true! It was a mad idea I had with my mate Matt a few years back. I said I would "bet our way to Brazil". We both laughed, we never thought it would actually happen...

Q2. How did you come to the decision to blow your winnings on watching England? Did you hesitate?

Chris: No, we didn't hesitate for one second. It was the reason I was doing it. I had always wanted to go Brazil just for the country anyway. There are so many fantastic places and amazing things to see plus the chance of seeing a World Cup there is a once in a lifetime trip.

Q3. So you headed for Brazil, how did you get to Manaus in the middle of the Amazonian rainforest?

Chris: Our first stop from London was Rio de Janeiro. We had a day there and then a four hour flight to Manaus.

Q4. What did you make of the jungle and what did the locals make of the England fans and two Gills fans from deepest darkest Medway?

Chris: The jungle was fantastic, but I've never known heat like it though. The heat at around two in the afternoon was unbelievable. The stadium and the feeling on match day was fantastic. We felt very proud and thought England were so unlucky. The next day we did a tour of the jungle - via a boat ride that took us right into the jungle an hour or so upstream. We got to swim with river

dolphins, held alligators and snakes and were entertained by the monkeys. (It sounds just like Strood and the Medway then!). We also got to meet a tribe who live there. Fantastic.

Q5. England lost their first game to Italy, but it must still have been an amazing experience. What were your memories of it?

Chris: Being in the ground and hearing the FIFA music as the teams entered the pitch made the hair on the back of your neck stand up. England fans were on form too. I thought we were so unlucky against Italy. We will never forget that sense of achievement and excitement watching our country in a World Cup.

Q6. You then headed on to Sao Paulo for the crunch game with Uruguay, what was that like?

Chris: It was winter time in Brazil, not that you would have

thought it in Rio or Manaus but Sao Paulo was a lot colder and it even rained. Sao Paulo was a still good experience though, despite the actual stadium and surroundings still resembling a building site. The game itself had a real sense of "do or die", the celebrations when we equalised through Rooney were totally crazy. After a poor first thirty minutes I thought England grew into the game and on the second half performance could and perhaps should have got at least a draw or maybe even won it.

Q7. You must have been gutted when England lost to leave them on the cusp of elimination, did it ruin your trip?

Chris: No, Matt and I had both agreed at the start that if the football didn't go well we wouldn't let it ruin the whole trip. We were gutted and the feeling was awful, much like being relegated, but we still had so many things to see and enjoy. We headed back to Rio for four

more days which were fantastic - our favourite place.

Q8. Your final stop was Belo Horizonte for the Costa Rica game, with little to play for except pride what was the atmosphere like amongst the travelling England fans?

Chris: It was the best atmosphere at an England game that I have ever experienced. The fans were unreal and backed the team loud and proud. I think the majority appreciated we were a young team and quite easily could have had four points rather than none from the first two games. That's football sometimes...

Q9. What was it like being in Brazil for the World Cup? It looked fantastic, were the locals friendly?

Chris: Everything that was written about Brazil and the locals before the competition could not have been further from the truth. The country

was beautiful, the people were friendly, helpful and loved having us there. For the Brazil games there was a carnival atmosphere. The opener against Croatia was crazy, buses would just pull over on the side of the road, order the passengers off, lock up and they would just watch the game.

Q10. What were the best and strangest things you did on the trip?

Chris: Impossible to say really, some of the views from Sugarloaf mountain and the mountain of the Christ Redeemer were stunning as were the Falls at Iguazu. Views that will live with me forever. The trip into the Amazon forest was probably the strangest, holding snakes and alligators isn't your everyday activity! My other favourite memory was playing football on Copacabana beach with Matt. We expected a kick about just between the two of us, but got involved in a match with proper goals on the sand. It ended up the Rest of the World vs. Russia, two Englishmen, two Brazilians, two Mexicans and a Colombian. We won 9-5 and I scored a hat-trick - what an experience!

Q11. Did anything go wrong, if so what?

Chris: Not really apart from the results, ha ha! Everything else was plain sailing really and we achieved and saw so much. Matt picked up a stomach bug for a few days which left him feeling rough but it didn't really spoil anything.

Q12. What was your abiding memory of your rather remarkable trip round South America?

Chris: Everything exceeded expectations. Some of the views and sights were just breathtaking. The feeling of watching my country in the World Cup was unforgettable. I felt like a child again going to see my first Gills game under the lights again.


Stephen has been handed squad number 30.

RYMAN LEAGUE

All fourteen sides from the county are in action tonight as the Ryman League continues with its busy opening schedule that sees all teams play six matches in the opening sixteen days. In Ryman Premier Margate and Maidstone will be expected to gain three points from their home games against East Thurrock and Harrow, while Tonbridge have a harder looking task against big spending Lewes whose squad includes a number of former Angels players. VCD travel to Enfield Town who like the Vickers lost their opening two games.

In Ryman One South Whitstable Town were unbeaten in their opening two matches. The following two games will test their promotion credentials as they were due to travel to Guernsey on Saturday and host Merstham tonight. The latter, managed by former Bromley boss Hayden Bird, had a superb second half to last season picking up 48 points from 23 matches. Last Tuesday they beat

Three Bridges 6-0 and their performance prompted Three Bridges boss Paul Falli to claim it was the best from any club his team had played in the Ryman League.

Chatham Town host Ryman League newcomers Brightlingsea Regent in Division One North, the first ever meeting between the two sides, while Cray Wanderers also host new opposition when Barkingside are the visitors to Hayes Lane.

SOUTHERN COUNTIES EAST
A full programme of fixtures has been scheduled for tonight and tomorrow but some of those games may be postponed because of FA Cup replays, the extra preliminary round having been played at the weekend. Nineteen of the twenty SECFL sides were involved, the exception being Rochester United who have not entered.

The league has tried to ensure that no club has to travel too far for this round of fixtures so there's a meeting of the two Eriths at Park View Road, the

two Surrey sides as Croydon host Lingfield and the two West Kent sides as Sevenoaks welcome Tunbridge Wells.

Those who believe that the finest things in life are football, beer and curry could do worse than consider a visit to Greatness Park. Sevenoaks are sponsored by the local Raj Bari Indian restaurant and it's not unknown for their chef to turn up and prepare some of the best food in non-league football for spectators.

It's the start of a new era for Sevenoaks Town who have finished third from last, last and second from last in the SCEFL in the past three seasons, winning just thirteen games. In May they appointed Micky Collins as manager, the former Erith & Belvedere boss who guided the Dere's to a Kent League and Cup double in 2012/13. Sevenoaks got off to the perfect start to the season, beating Erith Town and Beckenham without conceding a goal, before East Preston visited in the FA Cup on Saturday.

Another relatively short trip

sees Lordswood travel to Woodstock Sports tomorrow. Former Gills striker Jason Lillis has returned to Lordswood as manager after admitting that he left them a year too early when he resigned in 2013. Woodstock finished bottom of the SCEFL last season but were reprieved from relegation because the ground of Kent Invicta League champions Hollands & Blair was not up to the required standard by the FA deadline.

KENT SENIOR CUP

This season the competition has a new sponsor, Kent Reliance. The company is of course a former shirt and stadium sponsor of the Gills, while one of the companies that it incorporated in 1986, Chatham Reliance, sponsored the competition the 1980s. There is £3,000 in prize money up for grabs with £2,000 going to the winners and £1,000 to the runners-up.

The Kent Senior Trophy winners usually receive a place in the Senior Cup as a reward. However last season's winners Beckenham Town have been banned from the both the Cup and Trophy following crowd trouble at the end of last season's final with Ashford Town. Instead they'll compete in the Surrey Senior Cup.

Last season the quarter-finals

were completed before Christmas. That is unlikely this season will most leagues scheduling their midweek fixtures for the first half of the season in an attempt to avoid the fixture pile ups of recent years.

This season ties will go straight to penalties if the scores are level after 90 minutes.



WORLD CUP REVIEW PART 2

After the searing heat and conviviality of Fortaleza, Sao Paulo at dawn was a sombre contrast.

Stumbling from our overnight TAM flight on which the crew were not troubled beyond closing the door, performing their take-off safety mime and turning off the lights, the largest city in the Americas greeted us wearily with slate grey skies and a chill in the air which had sent the residents scurrying for their woolly hats. If you ignored the parakeets and humming birds, it was not dissimilar to an away day in the West Midlands.

I'd visited the city once before for a single day. It's a vast urban sprawl with no defined centre, concrete tower blocks in shades of brown and grey stretching to the horizon. Sao Paulo is impossible to embrace without some local knowledge. Our supremely amiable pre-booked taxi driver, who stood grinning holding a printed picture of us that had been texted to him

the day before, greeted us in the Arrivals Hall. The language barrier prevented any in depth discussion beyond learning that he was an avid Corinthians fan (he proudly pointed out their training ground on route to our hotel).

Ponderous

We had several hours to kill, which added to our unease around England's prospects. A fabulous tournament was unfolding and at the start of June we would all have settled for England returning home after Spain, but the ponderous Champions were sent packing the day before, undone by the vibrant attacking flair of Chile. We didn't want to follow just yet.

We caught the metro to the cathedral district, a drab, damp and depressing precinct. The Fanfest was deserted so we found an acceptable bar where my friend Matt decided to indulge in his first caipirinha, the signature drink of Brazil. Far from

the exquisite cocktail sampled on the beach in Fortaleza, it appeared to be a glass of rocket fuel with a lemon ice-lolly melting in it. We departed swiftly for the stadium.

The Arena Corinthians is set on a hill in the east of the city, easily reached by train. Beset by tragedy and incomplete, it was the least inspiring venue in the country. The approach roads were unfinished, necessitating a long and winding walk, the local vendors struggling to flog cold beer in autumnal temperatures. The two ends were temporary – literally the equivalent of a two tier Brian Moore Stand with 52 rows in the upper section. An irrelevant roof spanned each end, serving only to cast an irritating shadow across the pitch in sunnier conditions. The ground's lack of character wasn't helped by FIFA's insistence that no banner or flag, the customary colourful and inventive backdrop that brightens and personalises every tournament, should dare

obscure their bland "All in One Rhythm" branding.

We took our position behind the goal early and gazed anxiously at the filling stands. I was wearing a light blue shirt, a decision I should perhaps have thought through more carefully for a game against Uruguay. Around 10,000 raucous England fans clumped together, intent on standing throughout and paying lip service to seat numbering. It made for a terrific atmosphere, even with the noise drifting into the sullen skies, but it was still an enormous effort to compete with the screeching antics of the more numerous Uruguayans.

Attendance

As is often the case following England, lower division supporters proliferated. We knew of half a dozen other Gills fans in attendance, and we were sitting behind Bristol Rovers followers. After their side's relegation from the league, their football fortunes were not about to get any better. You've all seen what followed and the 2014 World Cup will go down in history as one of England's tamest. Nevertheless it was a thrilling experience, a niggly, enthralling, exasperating contest that ended in the worst kind of doom. The central figure was inevitably Luis Suarez, the only game he turned up for. I've always liked Suarez, and if he could just temper the urge to sink his teeth into opponents he could become an all-time great. His on-field antics are outrageous, ranging from feigning injury in an attempt to get Liverpool teammates into trouble to disrupting play by kicking the ball away and deliberately throwing second balls on to the pitch to destroy the flow created by the multi-ball system. In previous, less lenient World Cups he would undoubtedly have been sent off.

A disjointed first half England display left us 45 minutes from near certain elimination following Suarez's heart-wrenchingly

clever header, yet still we created chances. Rooney hit the bar and had gilt edged chances to equalise before finally scooping home Johnson's precise cross. The moment is meaningless now, but in the instant we cavorted insanely, an emphatic release of joy doused by the shower of thousand flung beers. For the first time in my life I danced with a Leeds fan.

Common sense suggests we should have held on to our point and prolonged our involvement, but we were in the ascendancy and pushed for a winner. Staggeringly, for the second time in four years, we were undone by a failure to deal with a hoof down the middle, a wholly preventable farce. The cacophonous screech that greeted the sobbing Suarez's winner was simply intolerable. For a split second we clutched at straws in hoping it would somehow be disallowed, our expressions agast that an International team could not possibly concede such a dumb goal. There was no way back, and we slumped dejectedly into our seats for the first time all night. The atmosphere was resigned rather than ugly, and the only boos were in response to the lack of acknowledgement from the players as they traipsed off (Joe Hart the exception).

The dark trudge back to the station was depressing, supporters mixing happily enough despite borderline goading from the Uruguayans. Exhausted and unable to contact friends, we returned to the hotel where the second half of Japan v Greece was somewhat unappetising. I used my pidgin Portuguese to buy some street food on the way back, while Matt opted for peanuts from the mini bar and an early night.

There was little spare time in the morning before heading back to the airport. We met some despondent England fans who were damning in their verdict of the impersonal city, bemoaning a



Lack of celebration for the World Cup, no flags, no welcoming bars, no merchandise even. Suarez's giant head beaming from every news stand didn't help.

With a guide Sao Paulo would offer a wonderful cosmopolitan experience but if this was the only game you attended you would undoubtedly be left underwhelmed, and we were glad to be returning to the more uplifting environment of Fortaleza. The Italy game in Manaus by all accounts had been a lot more fun. We bumped into some fellow Rainham Enders who told of the sorry tale of a friend who was flying in especially for the Costa Rica game.

On the final approach to Fortaleza Airport, when he should probably have been concentrating on where he was going, our pilot muttered darkly of the Italy v Costa Rica result - I have no idea what he said but many in the plane cheered. A text message on landing confirmed the inevitable. England were out. Our naively optimistic hope at the outset was that we would return home before our country's finest footballers, which would have meant at least a quarter-final appearance. Our holiday was two weeks, England had lasted barely 60 hours. Nevertheless we kept the moping to a minimum. We had three more games to see live and wealth of drama to enjoy.

ANDY BRADLEY CHARTS THE HIGHLIGHTS AND LOW POINTS OF GILLINGHAM'S PROGRESS DURING THE 2004/05 SEASON

What a memorable night it was when Leeds United came to town a decade ago!

Apart from anything else it was a special occasion for two players, Paul Smith and Chris Hope.

The former made his 350th first-team appearance for the club and the latter clocked up his double century.

And both played a big part in an enthralling midweek scrap that was witnessed by a bumper crowd of 10,739.

Most of them went home on a high because Gillingham outplayed the visitors to secure a deserved 2-1 victory.

Goals at the start and end of opening half put them in a strong position (2-0) and left the fallen Yorkshire giants with too much to do in the second session.

All this left player/manager Andy Hessenthaler as pleased as punch.

"I have to express total satisfaction," he gushed afterwards. "It was just what we needed after the disappointing defeat at Ipswich on Saturday.

"We did particularly well to cope with the early loss of Nyron Nosworthy (groin strain) with Mark Saunders doing a superb job after switching to right back.

"Nyron's injury also gave me the chance to come on from the subs'

bench or, more accurately, the row behind the subs' bench.

"I had to sit there because of my touchline ban!"

Iwan Roberts played a key part in the early goal scored by fellow newcomer Darren Byfield.

Then, eight minutes after Byfield had lobbed against the bar, Patrick Agyemang pulled the ball back for Roberts to net another bang on half-time.

Spectator

Former Leeds legend Norman Hunter, an interested spectator, summed up the situation by saying to a colleague: "Welcome to the real world."

By this I guess he meant that if Leeds expected an easy ride it definitely wasn't.

Although Danny Pugh pulled one back with 10 minutes to go, the Gills held out without too many scares to take all three points.

And it was pretty much a repeat performance the following Saturday when Preston visited Priestfield. Once more Gillingham won 2-1 with Byfield and Roberts both stretching the net again.

Sadly, though, victory was achieved at a price as Mark Saunders suffered a broken right leg just five minutes into the contest.

"Our victory was certainly overshadowed by his injury," admitted Hessey.

"Mark's a great lad and a great professional. We will miss him for sure, especially as he can play in a number of positions and never lets you down."

"Sadly, we will probably not see him in action again this season but you never know for sure."

"That apart I was pleased with our performance."

"We had to play at a high tempo to prevent Preston from having time and space on the ball and I thought we did that effectively."

"The only blot from my point of view was conceding a sloppy goal towards half-time."

"Last season we would probably have conceded again but this time we didn't and that's a massive plus."

Paul Smith's astute pass put in Byfield to break the deadlock and then, after Ricardo Fuller had levelled, Danny Spiller provided the cross from which Roberts headed the winner.

Victory took Gillingham up to the heady heights of second in the Championship table.

Magic! But, as we all know, getting there is one thing, staying there is much harder.

Especially with 43 games still to go!




HICKS FROM FRANCE

Q1. Back in France you're a huge fan of Racing Club de Lens who were newly promoted back to Ligue 1. What are your highlights watching "Les Sang et Or"?

Our first ever title at Auxerre in May 1998. It was magic, amazing. We had never won anything before except the pre-season League Cup, which wasn't as important as it is today. More than 4000 Lens fans travelled to Auxerre that day despite an allocation of only 1500 tickets. Many of us went down to Auxerre a few weeks earlier to buy tickets in the home stands from their ticket office because they didn't want to sell and post any back to northern France. That is what we did to "be there". I was back at home Sunday morning at 6.00, buying the newspapers and enjoying the front pages.

Q2. When and where did you first come over to see football in England?

My first ever game in England, with my usual travelling companion Francois, was Arsenal v Wimbledon in 1995 at Highbury and it finished 1-3 - Vinnie Jones was already a star in France, known for his explosive temperament. My second was at Chelsea a few months later versus Aston Villa. A year after that I went to Elland Road, Anfield and Old Trafford to support France at Euro 96.

Q3. What attracts you to English football?

The passion, the atmosphere, the songs, the high attendance in grounds. Football is a Religion, a way (or away!) of life in England. You can chat with any loyal fan

of any club and they all know the history and who played for them almost every season. It's very different with France, where we don't really have a sport culture and moreover a football culture. Maybe it's why we have only won two European Cups.

Q4. What was your first Gills game? The 2003 friendly in Le Touquet?

Yes, the friendly game at Le Touquet was the first I saw the Gills, RC Lens won 3-0. It rained hard but I was impressed by the 500 drunk travelling fans singing in the rain!

Q5. What made you choose to follow the Gills more often on your trips over to England?

To be honest, our first game at Priestfield was Ipswich in



the Championship in 2004. After the Le Touquet match we decided to investigate a ground in Kent, not too far, that should be easier to get tickets for. At that time it was getting more and more difficult to get tickets for the PL, especially at Chelsea or Arsenal (the best known London teams in France at the time) and my English friend who helped me to book my tickets moved to Lorient and back then my English was not really good enough to do it all myself.

That day against Ipswich the away end was sold out so it was "database only" so we could not buy our tickets ourselves. However we met a Gills fans selling the fanzine outside who offered to buy them for us.

Since that day we have tended to come to Priestfield two or three times a season, and now we go to away games too. The atmosphere at Priestfield reminds me of Bollaert (Lens) - a very friendly atmosphere.

Q6. What is your favourite moment watching the Gills?

Wembley in 2009 with Simeon Jackson's goal in front of the Gills end. I don't remember a crowd making so much noise! Seeing more than 53,000 people for a play-off final between two teams from the fourth level would be simply unbelievable in France. The atmosphere that day was a little strange, lots of tension and drama, many fans tense and the

tight score didn't help but when Jackson scored it was amazing.

The final game of the season when the Gills won the title against Wimbledon was special too. I brought my son Alex and he took a photo with Charlie Lee on the pitch with Francois at the final whistle.

Q7. What is your worst moment watching the Gills?

On the field it was the game against Cardiff in the Championship in 2005 - 1-1, because it felt like the Gills would be relegated a few weeks later even though I hoped to be wrong. That day and a win would have made the Gills virtually safe but instead it felt like hell.

Q8. How long does it take you to get to Priestfield from Douai?

Around three hours including crossing via the Shuttle or four hours via ferry.

Q9. How do English and French football fans compare?

There is no comparison between English and French fans. Just look at how many French and English fans there were in Brazil for the last World Cup or in Ukraine for the last Euros. See how many French fans follow their team in Europe in the Champions League and Europa League compared with England - it's a shame. We don't have your football culture, your culture of "following" except perhaps at Paris SG, Saint Etienne and RC Lens which are the three clubs with the most loyal fans in France. Even in the away end of Marseille in France you'll find 80% are actually local fans who have never visited

Stade Velodrome in their life but speaking with a Marseille accent even if they live in Normandy.

Q10. How many different grounds have you done in England?

MK Dons was my 25th, my son Alexandre has done ten already!

Q11. How many Gills games have you now attended?

I'm not sure, perhaps about 35. I'm a "new" Gills fan, I have only been going to Priestfield for ten years and maybe we only saw a maximum of three games a season at the start because of the language barrier.

Q12. What are your hopes for the new season?

To stay up. It is hard to judge just on the MK Dons game, the Gills played very well for the first 30 minutes. I do hope the Gills will achieve their goal and

stay up, it could be a long road and a tough task at times, but they can do it.

Q13. If some Gills fans fancied visiting France for a football weekender where would you suggest they went in terms of entertainment, atmosphere and warm welcome?

Lens of course! But you'll have to wait until the new Bollaert is finished for Euro 2016. Bordeaux is a good trip, a very friendly atmosphere at Chaban Delmas and some seasons you can combine very good football with some very fine wine. To be honest though, for me the best place to enjoy French football is at Geoffroy Guichard, home of "Les Verts" St Etienne. Their fans are amazing, singing, and cheering their team and loyal to their club. They are also the most popular club for people of my age due to what they achieved in the 1970's in Europe.
