

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

Good Afternoon Ladies and Gentleman, Boys and Girls, and welcome back to Priestfield Stadium for this afternoon's Sky Bet League One fixture against Swindon Town.

Firstly I'd like to extend a warm welcome to the team of Directors, Coaches, Players and Supporters that have made the trip from Wiltshire and, result aside, I wish you a pleasant stay at the home of Football in Kent and a safe journey home later this evening.

It's only six weeks since the two teams last met at the County Ground and everyone performed to their maximum on the day to record a much deserved 3-1 win, our second victory at the venue in the space of eight months.

It's hard to believe that we are already into early February, only three months until the end of the regular season. We remain in an excellent position in the league table and with everyone seemingly capable of beating any team in this division

Last weekend we made the incredibly long trip to Blackpool which, on the day, seemed the coldest and most miserable place on the planet with bizarre weather conditions, hail, rain, mist and sun all in 90 minutes.

I think you would find more grass in a house gutter than on the pitch but the boys worked hard on the mud, had most of the possession but were unable to break down a solid and well organised Blackpool defence.

Prior that we recorded a brilliant 2-1 win over Peterborough United which put us second in the league table, however Walsall's midweek win ensured we slipped down to third.

As many of you will know the transfer deadline closed earlier this week and we were able to retain the services of our key players despite a lot of interest. We really could have done with the cash as we are really



suffering from the walk out of Centerplate, our caterers, last March and the loss of income as a result thereof, plus the spend to bring facilities up to scratch.

But the importance of keeping the squad together over the next three months as we attempt to reach the playoffs, our second goal, meant that we wouldn't entertain the offers we had on a couple of our players. We can all now focus on the effort that will be needed to turn our season into a successful one.

Away from the field momentarily and I'd like to officially welcome Steve Waggott to the club who has been appointed CEO this week and he will be responsible for all day to day matters, taking some of the mounting pressure off me personally given the work I have to do on a legal and strategic matters at the moment. I'm sure you will join me in wishing him well.



I'd like to start off by commenting on the recent speculation surrounding Bradley Dack and John Egan.

People were aware of the interest in Bradley and John and the Chairman takes a lot of credit in keeping the squad together, certainly for now because there were some serious bids coming in which would have broken the transfer record at the Football Club and that shows his intent.

It also shows the backing and belief he has in myself and the players and I think it was a massive boost for the whole club, including the fans that we were able to keep this talented young squad together during a tricky transfer window.

Position

Credit to the players too, their heads were not turned and it hasn't affected them – it shows their belief in what we are trying to achieve at the club and what they feel they can achieve certainly this season with the team and the position we are in. When 11 o'clock passed I was a very relieved man.

There is no doubt that a lot of members in this squad have a lot of potential and if it isn't to be fulfilled with this club then we understand top players will move on.

On top of being able to keep those two players we were also able to secure the services of Dominic Samuel on a half season loan which is very good for him because after each of his loans there has been an unsettling period but now he knows he's here for the remainder of the season and that was massive for us and I think we are still to see the best from him.

He's been excellent for sure but I think we will see him come to the fore now and I'm sure we will see an improvement in his performances, we were delighted with that.

In regards to Deji Oshilaja we may be able to get him back but that will only be done once the window re-opens. That would be another great addition to the squad and with him knowing us it would be like having a player back from injury.

When the window closed there was some excellent news and that lifted the whole club. We were a bit down after the Blackpool game; it was a performance with grit and



determination but it was a really difficult pitch with the weather conditions and we found it hard to stamp any fluency or brightness in the final third.

The players gave it everything but it wasn't a cohesive pitch in terms of how we wanted to play. I always felt that perhaps the team that scored first would go on to win as the surface wasn't easy to chase a game on, credit to Blackpool though because once they got in front they defended well but on another day it would have been 0-0 and another valuable point.

What I said to the players after the game is that in those conditions you have to make sure you don't lose and take a point but the group are learning on their feet and I have no doubt that will prove invaluable experience should they come across those same conditions again.

That was followed by another fantastic second half performance against a really good Peterborough side.
To come from behind was a magnificent effort and a high quality display, certainly in the second half as they played well for a long period in the first half.

We made some changes at half time and credit to the players as they came strong and were worthy of the 2-1 win, there is no doubt about that.

Opportunity

We are in the business end of the season now, it's a short month in February and then it's all about March and April. Four of our next six games are at home and that gives us a really good opportunity if we can continue our form, we know today will be a difficult game against a Swindon side who have made some improvements following a poor start and on their day can be a dangerous team to play against.

However we need to focus

on ourselves from now until
the end of the season, we can't
affect people's games in hand or
whatever else they are doing.
We've done very well so far, the
group have really focused this
week – speculation has been put
behind them and we can now
solely concentrate on trying to
gain promotion from this league.

Your support has been key to our success all season and will continue to be in the 16 games we have remaining after this one. I ask you to keep turning up in numbers as the atmosphere generated can only have a positive impact on the players, and as our record shows, they respond well.

Thanks again, we appreciate it enormously.

FOOTBALL FOR EVERYONE

AT TODAY'S GAME GILLINGHAM FC IS SHOWING ITS SUPPORT FOR THE FOOTBALL V HOMOPHOBIA CAMPAIGN.

Football v Homophobia (FvH) takes place year round and the campaign has its Month of Action in February. It is an international campaign to tackle homophobia and prejudice against Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual & Transgender (LGBT) people in football. The aim of FvH is to make football safe and welcoming for everyone.

Prejudice and discrimination in football affects us all, not just LGBT people. In fact a lot of the homophobic language and abuse that is directed at football players, managers, officials and fans, targets heterosexual people. This doesn't mean that it's OK. Using discriminatory language towards someone because you don't like the way they play football, manage a team, make a refereeing decision or because of whom they support is wrong. It's against the Laws of the Game and can be a criminal offense, but most importantly, it can make football an intimidating and unpleasant place for people.

Football is changing, and more people are coming out in the professional game. But we still have some way to go to make sure that football is a welcoming sport for all sections of the community.

Throughout Football v Homophobia month and beyond, please help Gillingham FC by standing up to prejudice and discrimination against LGBT people in the game. Together we can make football a welcoming place for everyone.

DOUBLE TRIUMPH IN THE FUTSAL CUP FOR THE GILLS

Last week The Howard School and Rainham School for Girls headed off to Leyton Orient to represent Gillingham FC in the Area Finals of the Kinder +Sports Futsal Cup.

The Kinder +Sport Futsal Cup is a new schools competition for Under 16 Boys and Girls run by the Football League Trust in collaboration with Community Trusts at the 72 League Clubs. The competition kicked off this season seeing thousands of Year 10 and 11 students battle it out to represent their local club at the National Final.

Both Finals were played on a round robin basis of two leagues with each team playing each other twice – home and away before the winners of each league faced each other in the final. The boys from The Howard School encountered Leyton Orient and Dagenham and Redbridge, while the girls from Rainham Girls played Dagenham and Redbridge, QPR and Southend.

Finals

Both teams comfortably won their group stage with only one loss each, both against Dagenham and Redbridge. This set up finals between the boys and the school representing Charlton Athletic with the girls facing the school representing Dagenham and Redbridge.

The mirroring from the group stages continued as both teams won their finals in impressive fashion, meaning both teams would continue on to the Regional Finals taking place in February. At the Regional Finals the teams will each meet three other Area Finals winners from the South with the top two teams on the day from both the boys and girls going on to represent the South in the National Finals Festival taking place in March.






Swindon are winless in six league matches against the Gills, last beating them in October 2011 (D2 L4).

Since the Gills triumphed at the County Ground on Boxing Day, ongoings at today's visitors to the MEMS Priestfield Stadium, Swindon Town, have been rather eventful.

Three days after the sides' last encounter, manager Martin Ling resigned from his role after just 56 days, citing health reasons. The former Town player won five of the nine matches he took charge of Town in, as he steered them away from the relegation zone.

Former Brighton under-21 manager Luke Williams has been in charge since, initially as a caretaker, before the club recently announced he will remain in his current role until the season end.

He won his first two games in the role, both in attentiongrabbing style. Town went from being two-nil down against Southend United after 13 minutes to winning 4-2 on January 9th, before Williams's side overturned a 3-1 half time deficit against Crewe to claim a 4-3 victory courtesy of a lastminute Nicky Ajose goal seven days later.

Since then, Town have drawn 1-1 against Sheffield United, lost late on at home to Barnsley 1-0 last Saturday before falling to the same scoreline away to Port Vale on Tuesday night. They sit 17th in Sky Bet League One ahead of this afternoon's fixture.

In his first weeks in charge, Williams had to deal without loanees Ben Gladwin, Adam El-Abd and Louis Thompson, who returned to QPR, Bristol City and Norwich City respectively in recent weeks having become mainstays of the Town starting line-up. Thompson has this week returned to the County Ground in a deal that will keep him at the club until the end of the season.

Williams has also brought in midfielder Michael Doughty on loan from QPR. The 23-year-old played nine times for the Gills last season, and subsequently made three substitute appearances for his parent club in Premier League games. Town were also believed to be chasing Exeter City's leading scorer Tom Nichols, who joined Peterborough United from the League Two side on transfer deadline day.

The Gills have won three of the last five meetings between the two sides, although Town earned a point in their last meeting at the Priestfield Stadium in August 2014. Goals from Danny Kedwell and Kortney Hause twice put the hosts in front, before a last-minute own goal by goalkeeper Stephen Bywater levelled the tie. Town's last victory in Kent came in the infamous 1986-1987 season, which ended with the Wiltshire club winning the third division play-off final in a replay at the Gills' expense.

PAST PROGRAMMES

When the fixtures were announced for the 2005/06 season it was the date of our first meeting with Swindon Town in almost two decades that was of most concern to many Gills fans of a certain age.


Strangely we weren't scheduled to meet until the second-half of the season, with the return match exactly one month later, and both teams had played 26 league games by the time they met here at

Priestfield on 14 January 2006. It hadn't been a vintage campaign for either side. The Robins were 23rd in the table, a position they were to occupy come the end of a season that saw them return to the fourth tier for the first time since 1986. We were in 19th position and very inconsistent having won three, drawn three and lost three of our last nine matches. Most notably we had failed to win away from home, drawing five and losing nine of our fourteen games on the road in all competitions.

As often happens when we have a season of poor away form, our home form was excellent and only Barnsley, Nottingham Forest and leaders Swansea City could boast better records.

The Gills issued a 68 page programme for the visit of Swindon, which cost £2.50 and, as this season, was A5 size. The cover featured Danny Spiller in action at a sun drenched Priestfield when Colchester had been the visitors on the opening day.

There were some references to the significance of the occasion, one of them in chairman Paul Scally's



column where he said that, 'Before my time as chairman I understand games against Swindon were always spicy, and I have no doubt that today's event will prove to be no exception as both sides battle for points'.

Rebuilding

He made mention of the problems the club was facing with rebuilding the team, something that manager Ronnie Jepson also considered in his notes. He explained that he was looking for players he could coach rather than players at the end of their careers but added that our squad size still needed to be reduced

The news page mentioned two players who had recently left, both Scotsmen brought to the club by Neale Cooper during his short spell in charge. Goalkeeper Tony Bullock, who will ever be associated in my mind with the word Burscough, had joined St Mirren, while Steven Hislop had joined Livingston and by coincidence made his debut for them that afternoon against Inverness, the team that we had signed him from.

player Sean Clohessy who had made his Gills debut at home to Wycombe in the JPT two months earlier. He scored his first goal in last home game of 2005, a 3-0 victory over MK Dons, which he described; 'Brent Sancho told me to push forward and I got the feeling that the ball was going to drop on the edge of the box. Luckily I hit it properly. The referee did quite well. He was blocking the keeper's view and it also went through his legs.'

He recalled his time as a Gunner ('We used to see Arsene (Wenger) but he didn't know too much about you unless you were with the first team') and also his hopes for the rest of the season ('If we put a nice run of games together maybe we could push for the play-offs').

We were never serious play-off contenders but we did eventually put a nice run of games together, winning six in a row and only failing to extend that to a club record seven when we were beaten 4-3 at Yeovil.

Elsewhere there was a Q&A with Leon Johnson who wanted it to be known that he introduced the G Star clothing brand to the dressing room, and a feature on David Peach, who played for both the Gills and the Robins and was an FA Cup winner with Southampton in 1976.

Opposition

Graham Dorkins Whistle Stop poured scorn on Birmingham City's idea to have sponsored announcements when red and yellow cards were dished out to opposition players at St Andrews, while a regular two page article looked at the work of the club's main sponsor, which was local housing organisation MHS Homes. Swindon were managed by Gills legend Iffy Onuora who a year later was to become Gillingham's

caretaker boss after Ronnie
Jepson's departure early on in the
2007/08 season. There had been
rumours that Ron Atkinson was
going to become Iffy's assistant
but it was later announced that
he was at the County Ground
in an advisory role to record a
TV programme called, "Big Ron
Manager".

There was a crowd of 7,300 to see the resumption of one of football's stranger rivalries and it was a great day for the Gills as we won 3-0 thanks to goals from Darren Byfield, Michael Flynn and Neil Harris.

We lost the return game at the County Ground 1-0 on Valentine's Day but a fortnight earlier had picked up our first away win of the season, winning 2-1 on our first visit to the Liberty Stadium against a title challenging Swansea who would eventually finish 6th, 11 points ahead of us in 14th place.

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In any event we have paired Jamie Reid and Peter Lloyd and already their impressive commentary on our own GIIIs Player is receiving great accolades.

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
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



OH, TO BE BESIDE THE SEASIDE...

Gillingham's first trip to
Blackpool since August 2006 (not
counting detours to Fleetwood)
could and should have been
another fun day out in an
enjoyable campaign but it didn't
really pan out that way.

It began online on social media in the build up with Blackpool fans politely asking any travelling Gills fans to reconsider attending (unlikely) or at least to boycott all merchandise, food and drinks inside Bloomfield Road. The response was largely supportive and many pledged to do just that. The situation at Blackpool and the less than happy relationship between their fans and owners (The Oyston family) have been a cause celebre for quite a while now and it doesn't appear to be getting any better.

Last season Blackpool FC made the headlines for all the wrong reasons as they were relegated from the Championship with just 4 wins (none away), a record low 26 points and culminated in their abandoned fixture at home to Huddersfield that featured a mass pitch invasion protest featuring a chap on a mobility scooter. That might have raised a smile but with one fan recently jailed and others being sued for what they had written on football forums

the battle for the future of the Tangerines is arguably the most poisonous in League football at the moment.

Unfortunately they aren't the only ones as fans at Aston Villa (shambles on the pitch), Coventry (recovering from their insane Northampton odyssey), QPR (huge debt and instability), Bolton (truly spectacular debt), Leeds (impulsive owner) and Newcastle (cynical owner) all continue to test the boundaries of any theoretical "fit and proper person" test. However Blackpool's ongoing situation appears to be the most divisive - number one in the recent Daily Telegraph list of "The Ten Worst-Run Football Clubs"!

Sustained

Gills fans made their own feelings quite clear during the home game at Priestfield back in September with numerous anti-Oyston chants and then sustained abuse when they were spotted exiting stage right in the Medway stand ten minutes before the final whistle. They were warned that dissent at the return game might be not tolerated given some Crewe fans were refused entry at Blackpool with an anti-Oyston banner even after they agreed to leave it with the stewards at the turnstiles.

The last time Gills fans were asked to boycott anything was the opening day of the season in August 2002 in the Championship at Selhurst Park when the moribund shell of Wimbledon was poised to decamp to the concrete jungle that is Milton Keynes. A few did but 1,800 did travel to see a surreal 1-0 win. With just over 600 "home fans" dotted around it felt more like a reserve game but at least the Gills triumphed and those that did follow the Gills made their feelings abundantly clear to anyone actually in the directors box that cared a jot what we thought of that particular ongoing scandal.

20 years ago and the Gills were also an interested third party in another club imploding. Brighton and Hove Albion had just been kicked out of the Goldstone Ground and were homeless and destitute. The Gills offered them a temporary rented home for two seasons before they moved back to the city for the "delights" of the Withdean Stadium. Again most ordinary fans across the nation had nothing but sympathy for their plight and breathed a little sigh of relief that it wasn't their own club being asset stripped.

Back to Blackpool in 2016 and it appears many of the Pool



fans have decided to vote with their feet. Our taxi driver from Blackpool North told us his own son had been sued for £10,000 for his part in the campaign and many fans had now given up the fight. They won't be back until the attuation changes. I don't blame them, it must be heart-breaking. The hardest thing a lifelong fan ran ever do it boycott their own is loved team.

Turnstiles

When we finally got to Bloomfield Boad we found quiet streets lacking any pre-match buzz, the horizontal sleet and the gale off the Irish Sea didn't help, but the magical vibe associated with any match was clearly missing. At the turnstiles we were greeted by a plethora of chunky stewards who gave everyone a thorough frinking and demanded to know whether the Gills flag in my bag had a fire certificate and what was on it. Given it was sleeting at the time and was put up in a deserted temporary stand of metal and plastic their real reason for the third degree was presumably to weed out any more home made protest flags rather than the risk of apontaneous combustion.

The 499 travelling fans were housed in a portion of the

Mortensen Stand - affording us a fine view of a terrible pitch but that can't have gone down well with the remaining Pool fans given it was their boisterous home end until recently. Amazing to think the ground hosted Premier League football as recently as 2010-11.

In the intervening years since our last visit in League One Blackpool had been up and back down, two new stands, albeit one that looks semi-permanent and boasts a plethora of obstructive posts. have made it back into a four sided stadium again. A far cry from the two and a half sided limbo a decade again and unrecognisable from the rusting, semi-derelict hovel I found on my first visit to the Fylde coast back in 1985. With a Kop minus a roof and partly condemned it was a miserable place to watch football. Sparse crowds and an air of decline and ghosts of former glories haunted the place. The flaking orange paint and faded adverts from another era made it a sad cliché of the time.

Now 30 years later it is very orange and shiny, but something was missing, oh yes, people. The official attendance was given as 6,828 but that must have been tickets sold rather than bums on seats because it looked like

no more than half that number in reality. It might have been freezing cold, blowing a gale and sleeting on and off but that wouldn't normally put off hardy northerners, so presumably the boycott is keeping people away. Aside from the away section (several noisy spells of anti-Oyston chanting), the atmosphere was largely non-existent, funereal. It must be tough for the "home" players to motivate themselves in such a situation, but credit to Neil McDonald and his cobbled together team for putting a recent

together team for putting a recent run together. They were well drilled, adapted to the conditions well, got their noses in front via a soft penalty and held on to win on a pudding of a pitch. At the final whistle we

At the final whistle we disconsolately headed off for our train back to Preston and the long slog back to Kent with a view to warming up, drowning our sorrows and fretting about the transfer window. At least though we could be thankful that we aren't stuck in a horrible limbo like Blackpool supporters. I trust they enjoyed their one season in the sun but doubt many of their fans will think it was all worth it now. How the authorities and the League don't intervene is a mystery to us all.

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LEGENDS REVISITED DAVE PEACH

in the child's prested ever

Dave Peach won our official yets quite convincingly in the latter stages of 2013, and the man himself came to MEMS Privated Stadium to unveil his number three shirt in our legends lounge.

After leaving Gills he went
in 18 win the FA Cup with
seuthampton in 1976, and
played alongside former
Manager Peter Taylor for a
short while as he finished off his

However prior to even signing
for the club Dave was given
the huge honour of being a ball
hey for the 1966 World Cup
final, and the full back says

speaking to Phill Catterick he said. I played for the county in Hadfordshire and we played for the County Cup, got through to the final and played Middlesex. They told us after the game that they were going to toss

a coin and regardless of the result, one of the teams would go the quarters and the semis and one would go to the final.

"Fortunately we got to the final, there were eight of us and out of the squad of 16, eight would be around the pitch and the other eight would be on the side-lines as guests.

"I was about the third one out and I was behind the goal when our disputed goal was scored! It was definitely in.

Autographs

"I was also behind the goal when Geoff Hurst scored the final goal of the game. The other lads were in the stands but they spent the day with us, we got a tour of Wembley and met both squads of players, had lunch and it was a fantastic day.

"We all got an England strip, kept the tracksuits and got all of the autographs.

"I still have the programme which is signed by both sets of players."

Peach then exchanged Wembley

Stadium for Priestfield having decided to leave Chelsea, and he revealed it was perhaps the decision that made his career.

He added: "Basil Hayward brought me here from Bedford; he was a prominent manager in the Southern League and had a lot of success. I was a schoolboy at Chelsea, I left school in the January and they didn't take their next batch of apprenticeships until the summer.

"He found that out and asked me if I would come here straight away and he would give me a three year apprenticeship on the spot. I had a chat with my Dad and I think I did the right thing.

"At Chelsea I used to go in the school holidays, train with them and their first team and looking at their calibre of players I probably wouldn't have made it.

"What I have got out of the game I have worked my nuts off for, but they just had natural ability.



"I came here and there was only one apprentice and that was Bobby Foulks, and I knew him because Basil bought him from Bedford.

"The opportunities were more and as it turned out I was in the first team when I was 17 so I think I made the right call."

I asked Dave what memories he has of the club in particular, and like most players, he identified his debut as his favourite.

He said: "My first game – I was sub at Rotherham on a Saturday and I came on in the last 15 minutes up front because Gordon Riddick got injured.

"I came off having not touched the ball, I ran like a headless chicken and didn't get a kick, but I remember it.

"On the Wednesday we were playing at home against Barnsley and that was my first game at left back and I scored.

"It was a cross from the half way line, the wind got it and went over the keeper's head as he came out...but we'll say it was a shot!"

Potential

A change of Manager didn't change a great deal as Peach continued to impress, however it wasn't long before bigger clubs had spotted his potential. He said: "After Basil had left it was Andy Nelson who was great to me, I stayed in the side. There

was a lot of speculation for a couple of years that I was going here, there and everywhere and people were watching me.

"He always promised me that if they had the right offer he would let me go and wouldn't stand in my way. When the offer came in from Southampton I don't think the club was keen to take it but Andy made that promise and that's what happened."

Peach lived up to his name and reported price tag of £50,000 by helping Southampton clinch the FA Cup in 1976.

Peach had ensured the Saints got to Wembley in the first place by converting a penalty kick to make the score 2-0 against Crystal Palace in the



semis, and Bobby Stokes was the man who got the allimportant goal in the Final to conquer Manchester United his 83rd minute strike giving United little time to battle back. Dave said he had lived out a boyhood dream by lifting the cup, but said his start to life at the Dell (the club's ground at the time) was far from easy. He said: "We got relegated, it was the first year they had three go down and we finished third from bottom and it was devastating because we were winth or seventh when I arrived. "He [Lawrie McMenemy] tried to change too much too soon because he took over from Ted Bates and they had a few villains there and he tried to kick a few out too early and we went down.

"He got sorted and we re-built and got promotion back to the first division, we went to the Cup Final in 76 which is every footballer's dream.

"Having said that I'm not so sure it is now because I don't think they take it as seriously because the structure of the game has changed.

"In those days it was a dream to play in the Final, you used to get up at seven o'clock in the morning and watch it the whole way through.

"Hopefully it doesn't die; I don't think it will but there is so much emphasis on the TV rights and the European Cup, but in those days it was just the league and the FA Cup.

Dream

"I scored a pen in the semifinal against Palace. Peter Taylor played in that game, he was their star man then with Malcolm Allison and we got the dream draw really and we performed on the day.

"We got in front just after half time; it could have gone either way because they were a decent side. Mike Shannon fell over in the box with about eight minutes to go, we got a penalty and I knew if I scored they wouldn't come back.

"It was probably the worst penalty I ever took; I just blasted it. It went straight as a die and the keeper moved and I got away with it.

"The next year we went back and played in the League Cup Final against Nottingham Forest and got beat 3-2. I scored the first goal in that game so to score at Wembley was nice."

Peach finished his playing career at Leyton Orient in 1983, with Peter Taylor having already been at the club for two years prior to his arrival.

He said Peter was a winger who he would have hated playing against, but due to injuries their time on the pitch together was minimal as he explained:

"He was a good player, one of those that apart from being quick he was one of those wingers you hated," he said.

"He could go inside or outside, most wingers got the ball, used their pace and went down the line - he had skill and ability and that's why he went on to play for England."

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
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




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GILLS GO STATESIDE

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
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




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Gillingham's 1967-8 season began a few hours after most other clubs, the opening day home Division Three fixture against Northampton Town kicking off at 7.30pm on Saturday 19 August 1967 in order to avoid a clash with the final day of the cricket match between Kent and the Australians at Canterbury.

The 2-0 win over The Cobblers was a rare bright spot during the opening weeks of the campaign. A report of the 3-0 defeat at Fellows Park included 'Gillingham, completely outplayed by a fast and stylish Walsall side, have only goalkeeper John Simpson to thank for the fact that their inevitable defeat was not turned into a humiliating rout', whilst the coverage of the 4-1 home loss against Southport a week later, on the opening Saturday of September 1967, featured the following, 'A slow, pathetic Gillingham side paid the price for their many failings. If a drastic Gillingham team overhaul is to

follow this battle it would be hard to single out exceptions on this sorry display'.

On Saturday 30 September we travelled to the County Ground to take on Swindon Town. We went into the match in nineteenth position with seven points from eight fixtures, whilst the hosts were thirteenth, one point better off. The Gills were handicapped before the game even started, due to an injury suffered by our goalkeeper.

Unique

A match report began, 'The irony of John Simpson's martyrdom at Swindon on Saturday was that Gillingham were forced to adopt safety first tactics and deny themselves the spoils of victory. A prematch back injury, unique in my experience, painfully immobilised Simpson, who was constantly on the verge of collapse and once dismissed ambulance men as they hurried on to the field with a stretcher. The Gills 'keeper told me after the match, "It happened

in the kickabout. I felt my back go as I stretched for a shot from Brian Gibbs". The heroics of this snarling, bitter match belonged to Simpson'.

Understandably, blanket defence was the tactic employed by Gillingham, 'with newlysigned Bill Williams almost literally crushing the challenge of home leader Pat Terry. Laboured Swindon could not respond to the urgent appeals of a 12.808 crowd dumb-founded and crestfallen at their team's failure to master the handicapped visitors'. Terry had played for The Gills between 1958 and 1961. Despite the emphasis on defence, we did score on two occasions, 'Bill Brown's brace of goals made nonsense of the buffoon image with which he is unjustly labelled at Priestfield'. Brown gave us the lead twice. once in the tenth minute and the second just before the hour mark, only five minutes after the hosts had drawn level, the blameless Ray Bailey putting through his own net. The match

report indicated that it was a feisty encounter, 'indulgent refereeing contributed to this herculanean struggle in which the Williams-Terry feud evoked memories of the old-time blood and glory battles. Nostalgia apart, it sparked off a chain reaction of anger which teetered on the edge of an explosion. The Gills pivot was lucky to escape with a lecture. Terry was not so fortunate and was booked for arguing with a decision'.

The hosts rescued a point late on when 'Don Rogers saved Swindon's blushes with an eighty-third minute equaliser after the Gills' defence had loitered upfield to leave Simpson at the winger's mercy.

Gillingham survived a final onslaught, Simpson again collapsed after punching a Rogers free-kick over the bar'. Rogers went on to score the two extra-time goals that gave Swindon a 3-1 victory over top-flight Arsenal in the 1969 League Cup Final. Simpson was back in goal for the following Wednesday's home match against Stockport, winning his battle for fitness thanks to the efforts of Kent County Cricket Club masseur George Preston. who treated him before the game.


The return match against The Robins took place at Priestfield Stadium on Saturday 10 February 1968 and was watched

by a crowd of 5,116. At the time, our last victory had been at the beginning of December. The Gills were fourteenth, whilst Swindon were challenging for promotion, fifth in the table but only two points behind second-placed Bury, with a game in hand (in those days, only two clubs were promoted, both automatically, and it was two points for a win). Alan Hill's match report, under the title 'Skipper Riddick calms Gills with tonic goal, began Serenely confident Gillingham regained their sanity after a demented first half-hour in which their aimless scurries resembled the frenzy of a beheaded chicken in the final dance of death.

Rarely can the odds have been so heavily stacked against the ill-starred Gills and the soccer sorcery of that beautifully poised striker Don Rogers teased and worried them into a spate of errors. Happily for The Gills, Swindon's scintillating rhythms in midfield slowed to a leisurely andante in front of goal and Rogers himself was a culprit when, in one devastating breakthrough, he jinked past Simpson and then pulled the ball wide of the post'.

Goalmouth

John Arnott and Mel Machin shackled Terry for most of the game and Machin was fractionally wide with a header before home skipper Gordon Riddick scored in the thirty-fifth minute, his first shot was blocked but he followed up to head over keeper Peter Downsborough and into the net via the underside of the bar. The report also included, 'Much-changed Gillingham, who, without four regular first teamers and had a new left wing in Tony Thear and Bob Moffat, responded immediately to the tonic goal.




Moffat, making his first senior appearance for nearly two years, swept down the left to cross into the goalmouth and Thear shot hurriedly and weakly as Glbbs headed the ball down to him. Machin next pounced on to a Woodley centre to send a herce drive snaking inches over the bar. Astonishingly, The Gills were ahead at the interval, but Swindon had only themselves to blame. The second half placed the seal on a long-awaited success story and The Gills edged away from the relegation precipice with a sustained fightback. They might have won even more convincingly as Swindon's hitherto arrogantly commanding defence floundered uncertainly before a barrage of attacks'.

Tournament

We doubled our lead with a penalty on the hour mark. Swindon's 'Mel Nurse iammed the break on Gibbs as Moffat engineered a goal chance and the inside-forward measured his length in the area. Machin coolly stroked the ball home from the spot'. With ten minutes remaining, Gillingham extended their lead to 3-0, 'Gibbs lofted a precision cross to the far post and Thear rose above straining defence to hurtle the ball downwards into the net. Roger Smart reduced the arrears to 3-1 five minutes from time and that was how the match finished, the report ending with 'Gillingham's first win in eight games presents manager Basil Hayward with a selection headache. Perhaps he will bear with me when I say that Saturday's forced changes should have been made a long time ago. Failing fortunes demand urgent remedies and Thear, notably, and Moffat, played their part in a resolute revival'.

The Gills finished their league

campaign with a 1-0 home defeat against Shrewsbury but that wasn't the end of their season. For the first and only time, the Daily Express National Five-a-Side tournament in 1967-8 had been thrown open to all League clubs in England, Scotland and Wales, rather than just a selection of the top teams. Gillingham entered a scratch side (John Simpson, John Arnott, Dave Quirke, Mel Machin and John Meredith) but it was one that was good enough to win the Southern Area Final at Bracknell, courtesy of victories over Torquay, Oxford, Bournemouth and Portsmouth. It meant that we qualified for the Finals at Wembley Pool (now

known as the Arena). The likes of Manchester United, Arsenal and Liverpool had all fallen by the wayside in the qualifying rounds. A newspaper report of the Finals included, 'Against all expectations, Gillingham reached the Final with wins over Second Division sides Preston North End and Cardiff City and, in a tense Final, they went down 1-0 to London champions, Charlton Athletic', The Addicks picking up the trophy and £1,000 prize money. The report continued, 'The winning Charlton goal came two minutes from the end when Simpson had no chance with a lethal drive from Keith Peacock. Only a minute earlier, Mel Machin scraped the Charlton post with a fine shot, Millions saw the Final on television, and the cheers of the Gills' fans came over quite audibly. "The lads did very well to reach the Final. I was very pleased with them", said manager Basil Hayward afterwards'.

We made it to the Semi Final with a 1-0 last-kick victory over Preston, Meredith with the goal, and it was the same player who condemned Welsh champions Cardiff to defeat in the Semi-Finals. Norman Giller wrote in the following day's Daily Express, 'The little clubs marched to Wembley for an unexpected taste of the big time. Little in status they may have been, but they provided big effort, big excitement and big entertainment for 6,000 fans'.

The Final wasn't the only time that Peacock scored against Gillingham on television. The player, who went on to manage The Gills between 1981 and 1987, scored the only goal in a 1-0 victory for Charlton against us in a Division Three fixture at Priestfield in August 1974 that was covered by ITV's 'The Big Match' programme.

Just 15 months after Swindon had snatched a last gasp equaliser at Priestfield to all but seal our relegation to League Two, Gillingham demolished the Robins on a sunny lunchtime to record arguably our most satisfying and unexpectedly emphatic opening day result ever. The contrast in emotions following the 5-0 rout in August 2009 could not have been starker.

It created the illusion of a full rehabilitation under Mark Stimson after four years of painful decline since our Championship days. Arriving in November 2007 to inherit a disjointed and demotivated squad. Stimson set about revolutionising the club on his

terms, bringing in a host of eager recruits who had been influential in Stimson's success at non-league level with Stevenage and Grays. The change proved to be too much too soon and after an initial upturn in results we succumbed to a second demotion in three seasons.

Promotion

Nevertheless, despite some erratic scorelines and defensive calamities, the side steadied itself in the basement and a terrific run in the second half the campaign saw us fall just short of automatic promotion. As ever, the glory of the event is amplified by play-off success at Wembley, and a huge Gills turn out at the new stadium

saw Simeon Jackson crown a fantastic season with the injury time header that beat Shrewsbury.

There was a palpable buzz around the club, a sense that the tide had turned. Sky Sports covered our pre-season preparations and season ticket sales increased for the first time in a decade. Stimson saw little need to strengthen his squad, Josh Gowling and Chris Palmer being the only notable signings. Meanwhile the emergence of Jack Payne as an assured holding midfielder was evident in a successful pre-season, which included the winner in a friendly at Selhurst Park.

Gowling made his debut in central defence in place of the injured Simon King. King suffered an ultimately career ending ankle ligament injury at Bromley, one of those innocuous studs-caught-in-lush-turf incidents that can blight the summer months, and it was a damaging loss which inevitably had a huge impact on our fate.

Swindon had narrowly avoided relegation themselves but noone foresaw the gulf in class as the game kicked off. The fixture was moved to 12.30pm on police advice, and the incessant drone of helicopters overhead accompanied the opening exchanges. The unnecessarily awkward kick-off time didn't deter an excitable home crowd, and the 6.852 gate was higher than all but one of the attendances recorded in the previous campaign. As is customary on the opening day of the season, I was hungover following an uncomplicated day at the Great British Beer Festival, and the combination of an early rise, blinding sunshine and a boisterous Rainham End really didn't help.

The prompt start afforded someone the opportunity to score the first goal of the English season and the honour went to the ever-dependable Mark Bentley. John Nutter played Jackson in down the visitors' right, he drew keeper David Lucas and squared the ball for Bentley to roll it into the empty net after just 12 minutes. Swindon soon settled and controlled possession for much of the remainder of the first half, but wayward finishing left manager Danny Wilson frustrated.

The killer blow came just seven minutes after the break. Nutter again supplied the pass from deep, it split the central defenders and gave the sprinting Jackson a clear run on goal.

Lucas hesitated and the ball was lashed past him before he could set his position.

The remainder of the game was played out in a carnival atmosphere as Swindon fell apart comically. Jon Nutter again supplied the assist for the third goal as his floated free kick left Lucas stranded and allowed the much-maligned Adam Miller to head home on 72 minutes.

The plaudits went to Jackson however, whose irrepressible form continued with two late goals. The first was quite brilliant. He accepted a quick



pass from a marauding Andy Barcham, and as Barcham advanced for a return Jackson nimbly nutmegged a defender, took aim from 15 yards and the sun kissed net billowed for a fourth time. Again the Swindon defence afforded him a reckless amount of space.

Seconds later and it was five, as Bentley's cushioned header found Jackson with his back to goal on the edge of the six-yard box. He had six defenders in close proximity but none managed an effective

challenge, as our striker span and scuffed it past the helpless keeper to complete his hattrick. Three sides of the ground cavorted incredulously while the Town End emptied, with just a scattering of Swindon's 788 followers remaining, each staring sulkily into the middle distance. The result and performance represented magnificent revenge for the frightful 5-0 drubbing we received at the County Ground in October 2007 when the remnants of the Ronnie Jepson side turned in one of the most embarrassingly shambolic displays I've ever seen from a Gillingham side.

Jackson had spent the summer on Gold Cup duty with Canada, and far from returning jaded he looked sharper than at any time in his career. He was substituted to a standing ovation in the final minute with no-one left under any illusion that he could deliver at this level.

We went home to watch the afternoon results roll in, and we were perturbed to lose top spot within three hours as Colchester contrived to hit seven past Norwich at Carrow Road. It's not quite true to say that it was all downhill from there, as anyone who only watched the side at Priestfield enjoyed a terrific season, laced with magnificent performances against Leeds, Charlton, Southampton and Millwall. Away from home the results were wretched as we accumulated a paltry six points. We were well beaten in the return at the County Ground. and an epic fail at Wycombe on the final day condemned us to relegation, while Swindon reached the play-offs. Stimson was relieved of his duties and Andy Hessenthaler returned to attempt to instil some unity into the club.





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

Dominic Samuel scores a crucial winner in the 70th minute as Gillingham secure maximum points in their final game of 2015.








FA TROPHY AND FA VASE

It's a big day for the county as our two remaining representatives in the Trophy and Vase look to win a place in the quarter-finals.

Dover welcome Guiseley to Crabble after a week off following the postponement of their game at Altrincham last weekend. The previous week they had taken an 84rd minute lead at home to Cheltenham live on BT Sport thanks to Nicky Derverdics' screamer. However any hope of inflicting the Robins first league defeat since September disappeared as two goals in less than a minute gave the visitors the points.

As long as today's game isn't drawn it will be the first of three consecutive home matches as Welling visit on Tuesday and Gateshead next Saturday.

Given the Whites league position, seventh in the table and among a pack of clubs with play-off ambitions, the Trophy could be seen as an unnecessary distraction. Realistically it probably represents a more attainable chance to end the

season with a first ever appearance at Wembley.

Guiseley, a small town near Leeds most famous for being the home of Harry Ramsden's original fish and chip shop, have two Wembley appearances to their name having reached the FA Vase final in 1991 and 1992.

Ashford United make the long journey to Tyneside for a Vase replay with Dunston UTS. Their hosts play on the south side of the river but only a couple of miles away from St James Park as the crow flies.

Last week the two sides drew 1-1 in the more rural surroundings of the Homelands Stadium. Shaun Welford gave the home side a 10th minute lead in front of a crowd of 636 but an equaliser midway through the second-half sent the game to extra-time.

Should the Nuts & Bolts beat Dunston, Vase winners in 2012, then there's an even more daunting task awaiting them in the next round as they will be away to Salisbury FC, the Wessex League side formed following the demise of Salisbury City and managed by Steve Claridge.

VANARAMA SOUTH

At a quarter to five last Saturday evening it looked as though Maidstone were going to reduce the gap between them and leaders Ebbsfleet from six points to four. Minutes later that gap had increased to eight points as the Fleet scored an injury time winner at Basingstoke to win 2-1 while Maidstone conceded a last minute goal at home to Concord Rangers to draw 2-2.

Ebbsfleet's winner was scored by new signing Aaron McLean who played in the Premier League for Hull City just two seasons ago and who more recently has been at Barnet.

Margate continued their recent good form with a 1-1 draw at home to Bishops Stortford while Dartford's visit to Gosport was postponed.

RYMAN ONE SOUTH

It wasn't a vintage afternoon for our local sides last weekend. The stand-out result was Whitstable's 6-1 home defeat to a mid-table South Park who were on a run of six games without a win. That result means the Oystermen have just one point from their last five games and have kept only two clean sheets in the league this season.

Postponed

At the other end of the table 6th placed Faversham were beaten 5-1 at 5th placed Dorking Wanderers while Herne Bay were held to a 0-0 draw at East Grinstead. Folkestone's game at home to Whyteleafe was postponed, which meant 2nd placed Worthing were able to close the gap on the leaders to 11 points with a 3-0 win over Sittingbourne.

SOUTHERN COUNTIES EAST LEAGUE

There's been quite a transformation at Tunbridge Wells since Martin Larkin stepped down as manager in the summer and not for the better. But the Wells are on a run of four consecutive defeats. have registered 55 players this season and recently bid farewell to long serving midfielder Joe Fuller who has joined Sevenoaks. Attendances are down 20% but the Wells are still the second best supported team in the league. their average of 198 beaten only by Ashford United's 212.



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ANDY BRADLEY REFLECTS ON THE HIGHS AND LOWS OF GILLINGHAM'S PROGRESS IN LEAGUE ONE DURING THE 2005-06 SEASON

It's always heartening when a new signing makes a favourable debut and Tommy Black did in helping the Gills to a 1-1 draw at home to Rotherham.

The experienced 26-year old winger, secured on loan from Crystal Palace, didn't score but did provide the assist for Gavin Grant's equaliser.

It was the latter's first goal for the club and came from a corner expertly whipped into the box by Black.

Grant was also a relative newcomer to the side, having initially joined on trial from Tooting & Mitcham, in November, before being offered a contract.

But, despite hitting back from behind to claim a share of the spoils, manager Ronnie Jepson was far from happy.

"We were poor and lucky to come away with a point," he admitted.

"That performance represented a dip in our recent home form and wasn't appreciated by our supporters in the crowd (6,107).

"Hopefully, we can make a quick return to the same level of form we had been showing."

Former Priestfield favourite Paul Shaw set up Lee Williamson to shoot Rotherham ahead and they all but had another goal in the closing moments. Shaun Barker's attempt looked to have gone in off a post. In fact the ball appeared to be up to a foot over the line before being cleared but presumably neither the referee, nor his assistant, had a clear enough view and the Gills breathed a huge sigh of relief.

Whichever way you look at it though one point, whether deserved or not, is always better than nothing.

Circumstances

A much tougher midweek test awaited Gillingham when they travelled west to engage high-flying Swansea City on the last day of January.

Apart from anything else Swansea were holding third spot in the table whereas the Gills had gone 18 league games without an away win.

On that basis it was pretty much a home banker in most people's eyes. So, in such circumstances, it's always nice to be proved wrong and Jepson's men did exactly that by posting an impressive 2-1 victory. This despite having to play for more 20 minutes with a man short after Michael Flynn had picked up his second yellow card of the evening.

Unlike at the weekend, the team boss was this time delighted.

"That was more like it and I was very pleased," he said. "We played some good stuff and were cruising at 2-0 up.

"But that late penalty (with six minutes to go) let Swansea back into it and set up a tense finish. Thankfully, we managed to hold out for all three points."

Darren Byfield's great strike gave Gillingham an early lead which Neil Harris doubled with a simple tap-in on 71. This was just over a minute after Flynn had been sent off.

The spot kick Andy Robinson converted brought the Swans right back into contention but, despite bombarding the goal in a frantic finale, they were unable to score again.

Now, as far as the Gills were concerned, relegation worries were starting to recede a little as this result took them up to 12th in the ladder. That's the top half of the table and the team's highest placing since the end of August.

More encouraging news arrived the following day when Jepson continued his re-strengthening programme by bringing in a competitive 20-year-old centre-forward from a Yorkshire club.







GILLINGHAM 2 SWINDON TOWN 2

31 March 1979 - Priestfield Stadium Attendance: 9,460

The incident that ignited a near 40 year rivalry as Danny Westwood is sent off for the only time in his career moments before half time. His offence was swearing when pleading for the referee's protection following yet another foul by Swindon captain Ray McHale. Westwood was flabbergasted. "He reached for his pocket and the first thing he showed me was his vehicle road tax disc. Then out came the red card, and McHale congratulated him." Gills' ten men held on for a 2-2 draw after leading 2-0 on 26 minutes in an enthralling contest which was later marred by an attack on referee Hutchinson by an irate elderly spectator. A month later Gills lost the return 3-1 in Wiltshire, with McHale again influential in the dismissal of Gills' Terry Nicholl. Gillingham missed promotion by a point.
