

we're simply just focusing


on ourselves to keep the momentum going. As I say, it's important that we keep our feet on the ground because there's plenty of football still to play and we know what qualities


Swindon possess,

Williams was Mark Cooper's assistant last season and also assisted Chairman Power as he became caretaker managerchairman for a short while. Martin Ling was appointed as manager earlier in the season, but following his sudden resignation, Williams was his replacement and in March 2016 he signed a 5-year contract after winning 6 of his first 10 games in charge.

A former Under 21s manager at Brighton & Hove Albion, unlike many managers, Williams didn't have a senior career in the professional game, although he was a youth player at both Norwich City and Bristol Rovers.



Tyrell **Belford**

Age 21 Position Goalkeeper Previous Club Liverpool

Belford is battling for the position as first choice stopper with Liverpool loanee Lawrence Vigouroux and he has recently been starting for Luke Williams' side having spent the majority of the season as the understudy. Signed by Liverpool from Coventry City in 2009, he spent three years with the club as a scholar before his release and subsequent move to Swindon Town. He has made 7 appearances so far this season, and 20 altogether since his arrival at The County Ground in July 2013.



Raphael Rossi-Branco

Age 25 Position Defender Previous Club Whitehawk

The Brazilian central defender spent his early career in his homeland playing for the likes of Cruzeiro and Porto Alegre. He arrived in the English game with Brighton based non-league outfit Whitehawk and after playing 29 times in 2013 for the club, he signed for Swindon Town in August the same year. A ball playing defender, Raphael has made 85 appearances (4 goals), including 34 this season and was sent off in a Boxing Day defeat to Gillingham.



Bradley Barry

Age 21 Position Defender Previous Club Brighton & Hove Albion

A former youth team and development squad player at Brighton & Hove Albion, Barry never made a single appearance for the club's senior side and following a successful trial, he signed for Swindon Town on a one year deal in August 2015. Barry made his professional debut in a Johnstone's Paint Trophy, penalty shoot-out victory at Newport County and he has gone on to feature regularly for the Robins this season, making 33 appearances altogether.



Jamie Sendles-White

Age 21 Position Defender Previous Club Hamilton Academical

A former QPR youth player, he never featured for the first team and spent time out on loan to gain vital match experience. He had loan spells with Colchester United and Mansfield Town ahead of an August 2015 move to Scotland to sign for Hamilton Academical. During six months with Hamilton, he made 7 appearances, 3 of which from the substitutes bench, before a return to England with Swindon Town in February 2016. He has made 7 appearances to date for The Robins.



Brandon Ormonde-Ottewill

Age 20 Position Defender Previous Club Arsenal

Predominantly a left sided defender, Ormonde-Ottewill signed for Swindon Town on a free transfer in July 2015 following his release by former club Arsenal. He never made an appearance in the first team for The Gunners and made his professional debut in Swindon's 4-1 opening day victory against Bradford City back in August 2015. He has made 28 appearances for The Robins and scored his one and only senior goal to date in a 1-1 draw at Sheffield United in late January.



James **Brophy**

Age 21 Position Defender Previous Club Edgware Town

Offered his chance in the professional game in the summer of 2015 after spending all of his early career in the non-league pyramid. He has made 24 appearances to date this season and made his debut in a Capital One Cup defeat at home to League Two side Exeter City. His next appearance was a start in a Johnstone's Paint Trophy, penalty shoot-out victory at Newport County, before finally making his league debut in a 3-1 away victory at Crewe Alexandra.



Nathan **Thompson**

Age 25 Position Defender Previous Club N/A (Youth System)


Usually the skipper at Swindon Town, Nathan Thompson is returning this afternoon from a three match suspension following a red card in a 4-1 home defeat to Wigan Athletic at the end of March. He came through the youth system at Swindon Town and progressed through to earn a professional contract in April 2009. Thompson made his debut in October 2010 in a Johnstone's Paint Trophy victory against Torquay United, coming on as an early substitute for Scott Cuthbert. He has made 145 appearances to date for The Robins, and has one goal, which he scored back in August 2013.



Jordan **Turnbull**

Age 21 Position Defender Previous Club Southampton

Originally in the youth setup at Swindon Town, he was picked up by Southampton in 2011 and progressed enough to earn a professional contract in 2013. He is yet to make a senior appearance for Ronald Koeman's side, but has gained senior experience out on loan at Swindon Town. Turnbull was important for The Robins last season as they reached the play-off final, racking up a total of 51 appearances (1 goal). He has again been a regular this season for the club, and has made 40 appearances to date as he continues his development as a promising young defender.



Yaser **Kasim**

Age 24 Position Midfielder Previous Club Brighton & Hove Albion

Currently side-lined with a knee injury,
Town head coach Luke Williams has
said he hopes to have Yaser Kasim back
before the end of the season. A former
apprentice at Tottenham Hotspur, the
Iraq international began his professional
career with Brighton & Hove Albion in
October 2010. He featured just twice for
The Seagulls before signing for Swindon
Town in August 2013, following loan stints
at Macclesfield Town and Luton Town.
To date, he has made 111 appearances
(5 goals) for The Robins and last season
formed a formidable central midfield
partnership with Massimo Luongo.



Fabien Robert

Age 27 Position Midfielder Previous Club Lorient


French attacking midfielder Fabien Laurent spent 7 years in the youth setup with Lorient in his native France. He played for both the club's first tearn and second team, racking up 83 league appearances in all, with 16 goals to match. He got his first taste of English football in 2012 when he had a brief loan stint with Doncaster Rovers, and he signed for Swindon Town in July 2015 after a successful trial with the club. He has made 37 appearances (4 goals) so far this season, with three of his goals coming in the first 5 games of the season.



Anton Rodgers

Age 23 Position Midfielder Previous Club Oldham Athletic

Son of the former Swansea City and Liverpool manager Brendan Rodgers, he spent time in the youth system at Chelsea before a move to Brighton & Hove Albion in 2011. He progressed through the youth system before his release by the South coast club in May 2013. In July 2013, he signed for Oldham Athletic on a one year contract and made just 14 appearances before a move to Swindon Town in July 2014. To date for The Robins, he has made 48 appearances (5 goals).



Michael **Doughty**

Age 23 Position Midfielder Previous Club Queens Park Rangers

Currently on loan from Championship outfit Queens Park Rangers, highly rated midfielder Michael Doughty has impressed during his time at The County Ground and to date has made 13 appearances (4 goals) for The Robins. A former Wales U21 international, Doughty has made 12 appearances to date for his parent club and has spent much of his career out on loan. He had loan stints with Woking, Crawley Town, Aldershot Town, St. Johnstone, Stevenage and Gillingham before his arrival in Wiltshire. He made his professional debut in January 2011, coming on as a late sub in a 1-0 defeat to Blackburn Rovers.



Louis Thompson

Age 21 Position Midfielder Previous Club Norwich City

The brother of Nathan Thompson, Louis is currently on loan at Swindon Town from Norwich City until the end of the season. Like his older sibling, he came through the youth ranks at Swindon before turning professional and moving into the first team. He made his senior debut in a 3-2 Capital One Cup defeat to Aston Villa in October 2012 and went on to make 44 appearances (3 goals) before a move to Norwich City in September 2014; he has since returned on loan.



Nicky **Ajose**

Age 24 Position Forward Previous Club Leeds United

A man very much in form, Ajose has been prolific for Swindon Town this season and arrives this afternoon having scored 23 goals, with 9 in his last 9 appearances at the time of writing, A Manchester United academy graduate, he had a loan spell with Bury before a permanent switch to Peterborough United in July 2011. Over the course of the next three years, he managed just 27 appearances (7 goals) for The Posh and then went on a number of loan stints, with the likes of Scunthorpe United, Chesterfield, Crawley Town, Bury and Swindon Town. He had a brief spell last season with Leeds United before a return to The County Ground on a permanent basis in September 2015.



Jermaine **Hylton**

Age 22 Position Forward Previous Club Redditch United


A former youth player at both Kidderminster Harriers and hometown club Birmingham City, he began his senior career with nonleague side Redditch United in 2012 and scored 45 goals in 54 games before signing for Swindon Town in January 2015 on a 2 and a half year deal. He made his professional debut in a 3-0 away victory at Coventry City just 5 days later and scored his first goal in a 1-0 victory against Peterborough United in April 2015. He has made 29 appearances to date for the club and has managed just the solitary goal.



Ellis landolo

Age 18 Position Forward
Previous Club Maidstone United


Signed in July 2015 after impressing during a trial which saw him play against Swindon Town's U18s, he made his professional debut, coming on as a substitute in a penalty shoot-out victory against Newport County back in September. Prior to his move to The County Ground, he had spent time in the youth systems at both Gillingham and Maidstone United. He is yet to score his first professional goal, but he has made 9 appearances to date.



Jonathan **Obika**

Age 25 Position Forward Previous Club Tottenham Hotspur

A graduate of the youth system at Tottenham Hotspur, he made just 4 appearances for the club, all of which in cup competitions. His first loan spell away from White Hart Lane was with Yeovil Town and made 26 appearances (11 goals) before going on to have stints on loan at Millwall, Crystal Palace, Peterborough United and Swindon Town. He returned to Yeovil Town and made a further 39 appearances (7 goals) before then going on to spend time on loan at Charlton Athletic and Brighton & Hove Albion before a move to Swindon Town on a permanent basis. Obika has made 67 appearances (21 goals) for the club to date.

MIKE SUMMERBEE

Brilliant winger Mike Summerbee was capped eight times by England after leaving Swindon Town. Initially with Cheltenham Town, he moved to the County Ground in March 1960 and was an important figure in Swindon's 1962-63 promotion success. He netted 39 goals in 218 League games prior to joining Manchester City for £35,000 in August 1965, amassing a vast collection of honours under the Joe Mercer and Malcolm Allison partnership at Maine Road, Later playing for Burnley, Blackpool and Stockport County, where playermanager, he has since been a successful businessman and his son Nicky also starred for Swindon Town.

DON ROGERS

England U-23 winger Don Rogers scored twice in Swindon Town's 1969 League Cup final success. Signing professional at the County Ground in October 1962, he featured in Swindon's 1962-63 promotion campaign and was ever-present in four successive seasons. He starred as the Robins won promotion again in 1968-69 and the Anglo-Italian Cup in 1970, reuniting with Bert Head at Crystal Palace in November 1972. Moving to QPR in September 1974, he rejoined Swindon in March 1976 and netted 148 goals in 412 League games overall before reuniting with Stan Harland at Yeovil Town in March 1977. He has since run his own sports shop in Swindon.



PETER DOWNSBOROUGH

Goalkeeper Peter Downsborough was ever-present 'Player of the Year' in Swindon Town's 1968-69 promotion and League Cup 'double' success. Signing professional for hometown Halifax in September 1960, he moved to the County Ground in exchange for Bill Atkins in August 1965. He was ever-present as Swindon reached the FA Cup sixth round in 1969-70 and made 274 League appearances prior to joining Bradford City in November 1973. Twice ever-present, he starred as they reached the FA Cup sixth round in 1975-76 and won promotion in 1976-77. He had a testimonial match in May 1980 and later worked at a power station, settling in Stainland.

JOE BUTLER


Versatile midfielder Joe Butler was Swindon Town's 'Player of the Year' in 1969-70 and 1972-73. He turned professional with hometown Newcastle United in September 1960, given his League debut against Manchester City in April 1964, but failed to secure a regular first-team slot and joined Swindon in August 1965. Starring in their 1968-69 promotion and League Cup 'double' success, he was ever-present in two consecutive seasons and helped the Robins to win the Anglo-Italian Cup in 1970. He netted 18 goals in 342 League games prior to joining Aldershot in March 1976, then played for Witney Town. Settling in Swindon, he has run a taxi firm.

JOHN TROLLOPE

Long-serving left-back John Trollope holds Swindon Town's appearance record. Signing professional at the County Ground in July 1960, he made his League debut in Swindon's 1-1 draw at home to Halifax Town a month later and was ever-present in seven consecutive seasons including the 1962-63 promotion success. He featured in Swindon's 1968-69 promotion and League Cup 'double' campaign as well as their 1970 Anglo-Italian Cup final triumph. Scoring 21 goals in 770 League games for Swindon, he was their coach, then manager between November 1980 and March 1983. Later Swindon's youth team boss, he was awarded the MBE.

COLIN CALDERWOOD

Central defender Colin Calderwood was capped 36 times by Scotland after leaving Swindon Town. Signing professional for Mansfield Town in March 1982, he moved to the County Ground in July 1985 and was 'Player of the Year' as Swindon stormed to the Fourth Division title in 1985-86. He also starred as they won promotion in 1986-87, then featured in two further play-off finals including the 1993 Wembley triumph. Scoring 20 times in 330 League games, he moved to Tottenham Hotspur in July 1993, then Aston Villa and Nottingham Forest. He later managed Northampton Town, Forest and Hibernian, since assisting Chris Hughton at various clubs.



FRASER DIGBY

England U-21 goalkeeper Fraser Diaby was Swindon Town's 'Player of the Year' on three occasions. Initially with Manchester United, he reunited with Lou Macari at Swindon in September 1986, appearing in their 1986-87 promotion campaign. He was ever-present in 1988-89, starring as the Robins qualified for the play-offs in consecutive seasons including their 1993 Wembley triumph and were League Cup semifinalists in 1994-95. Also featuring in the 1995-96 Second Division title success, he had a testimonial match in July 1997 and played 417 League games, joining Crystal Palace in August 1998, then Barry Town, QPR and Kidderminster Harriers.

ALAN McLOUGHLIN

Republic of Ireland international midfielder Alan McLoughlin was 'Player of the Year' when Swindon Town reached the Second Division play-off final in 1989-90. Starting with Manchester United, he reunited with Lou Macari at Swindon in August 1986 and helped qualify for the playoffs in successive years. He scored 19 times in 106 League games before sold to Southampton for £1,000,000 in December 1990. Moving to Portsmouth in February 1992, he was ever-present as they reached the First Division play-offs in 1992-93. He joined Wigan Athletic in November 1999, then played for Rochdale and Forest Green Rovers, since holding coaching posts.

SHAUN TAYLOR

Influential central defender Shaun Taylor captained Swindon Town to the Second Division title and FA Cup fifth round in 1995-96. He impressed with Bideford before moving to Exeter City in December 1986 and skippered their 1989-90 Fourth Division title triumph. Joining Swindon in July 1991, he was ever-present as the Robins won promotion to the Premier League in 1992-93. He was their 'Player of the Year' three times and netted 30 goals in 212 League games while at the County Ground. Moving to Bristol City in September 1996, he captained them to promotion glory in 1997-98. He has since coached at Exeter City and Torquay United.

LEE PEACOCK

Former Scotland U-21 striker Lee Peacock was 'Player of the Year' when Swindon Town won promotion in 2006-07. Initially with Carlisle United, he helped them to win the Auto Windscreens Shield and promotion in 1996-97. He joined Mansfield Town in October 1997 and moved via Manchester City to Bristol City in August 2000. Starring as they won the LDV Vans Trophy and reached the Second Division playoffs in 2002-03, he joined Sheffield Wednesday in July 2004. He moved to Swindon in January 2006 and netted 20 goals in 125 League games before joining Grimsby Town in January 2010, then Havant & Waterlooville and Eastleigh.


ood afternoon and welcome to The Coral Windows Stadium at Valley Parade for our third Saturday game running.

In this programme feature we take a look back through the realms of history and the various different kits worn by Bradford City Football Club since 1903. Each week a different kit whether home or away will be recalled and some memorable games will be remembered, as we appreciate our footballing predecessors.

his kit was worn during the 1984-85 campaign which saw the club clinch the old Third Division Championship, and endure the fire disaster which is synonymous with the club.

25th August 1984 City 2 Cambridge United 0

This was a great start to the season, Cambridge had been relegated from Division Two a

massive twenty three points shy of safety and we beat them comfortably on the opening day of the season. Cambridge had David Moyes at centre half as well as future England international Andy Sinton in midfield. We got off to a flyer when the previous seasons top scorer John Hawley netted after eight minutes. Peter Jackson added a second before half time to complete the scoring.

28th November 1984 City 3 Millwall 1

This victory took us to the top of the table, a position we never lost. After a goal less first half all the goals came in a frenetic eleven minutes spell round the hour mark. Greg Abbott broke the deadlock from the penalty spot after fifty six minutes, five minutes later he doubled the lead, then within a further two minutes Bobby Campbell had scored our third goal. Despite a quick response from Steve Lovell

four minutes later Millwall were not allowed back into the game. A grand crowd of almost nine thousand watched the game and saw City climb to the top of the table, replacing Millwall in the process.

16th February 1985 Hull City 0 City 2

Football in 1984-85

Unfortunately a hugely successful year on the field for Bradford City was overshadowed by the tragedy of the Valley Parade fire disaster where 56 lives were lost. The Bantams were crowned Champions of the Third Division ahead of nearest competitors Millwall and Hull City. Everton were runaway Champions in the First Division, finishing on 90 points – 13 points ahead of Liverpool and Tottenham

Hotspur. The 'whipping boys' in the top flight that season was Stoke City, who finished bottom and 33 points from safety on 17 points with just 3 wins all season. Oxford United won the Second Division title and skipping down to the basement division, Chesterfield were crowned as Champions.

Despite Everton's exploits in their league campaign, they couldn't

cap it with FA Cup glory, losing 1-0 to Manchester United in the final courtesy of a Norman Whiteside goal. In the European cup final between Juventus and Liverpool at Heysel Stadium in Brussels, there was another tragedy with 39 deaths due the collapse of a segregating wall and injuries to 600 people. The game was won by Juventus by a goal to nil with French midfielder Michel Platini scoring the winner.

understand how he made a living. He made an indelible mark on Eric McManus our plucky Irish goal keeper who had his collar bone fractured as a result the first minute foul challenge by Whitehurst. With no substitute goalkeepers allowed back then defender Tony Clegg went in goal and kept a clean sheet. Not bad considering Hull were our closest rivals! Don Goodman put us ahead just before the hour mark and Peter Jackson added the second eleven minutes from time. This victory left us twelve points clear at the top.


23rd March 1985 City 5 Brentford 4

Former Leeds goalkeeper David Harvey had a bit of a nightmare with this one. Brentford were just above the relegation places and ought not to have threatened us like this, but they quickly took a three goal lead inside twenty two minutes through Robbie Cooke (2) and Bob Booker. Within a minute John Hendrie had got one back for us, nine minutes later the same player further reduced the arrears. Mark Ellis brought the scores level immediately after the interval only for Cooke to complete his hat trick

seven minutes later. City were back on terms twenty minutes from time when Jamie Murray scored an own goal. Finally we managed to grab the lead, and hold onto it when John Hawley scored with fourteen minutes to go.

23rd April 1985 Cambridge United 0 City 4

This was the victory which confirmed promotion to Division Two, Poor Cambridge had already been relegated with six games still to go they were twenty four points from safety, but they held the Champions elect to a goal less first half. After the interval though City romped away thanks to two goals each for John Hawley and Bobby Campbell, Hawley struck first seven minutes after half time. City went two up when Bobby Campbell scored with just over twenty minutes to go. Hawley added a third ten minutes before Campbell wrapped the scoring in the final minute.


















ur first league meetings with Swindon came in the 1958-59 season, this was the first year of the 'national' divisions three and four following the regionalisation of the two bottom divisions. We were both playing in the third division and our first visit to the County Ground came on a Wednesday evening in September, and we came away with a good point after a 2-2 draw, but we should have gained both points. We led at half time thanks to a John Reid goal just before

the interval, and when Bobby Webb scored a second with ten minutes to go the points were as good as in the bag, surely? Three minutes from the end half back Lew Clayton halved the arrears and amazingly we conceded again two minutes later when Cliff Jackson levelled. A week later we met at Valley Parade and had conceded after just twenty two seconds when Jimmy Kelly scored. Derek Stokes had us on level terms ninety seconds later, but it would be Swindon who took all the points when Kelly scored again just before the hour.

The following season we met again and we went to the County Ground at the end of August to face Swindon whose front line was led by David Layne later to become a Bantam, we had our own goal scorer in Johnny McCole in our team. Swindon began the season with one draw and one defeat whilst we had a win and a draw under our belts. In a high scoring game Swindon took the points again, in spite of them scoring five times Layne failed to make the score sheet. Inside right John Richards scored a

hat trick with inside left Jimmy Gauld scoring the other two. We managed three goals and really you ought to be able to take at least a point with three away goals, especially fifty or so years ago. McCole scored to add to his pair he bagged at home to York on the opening day of the season, winger Bobby Webb scored the other two. On January 2nd 1960 one week before we met Everton in the FA Cup third round, we managed to claim our first win against Swindon when Derek Stokes, who would top the goal scoring







chart with an amazing thirty five goals, scored the only goal of the game. In the 1960-61 season at the end of which we were relegated to Division four, we beat Swindon here again, David Jackson and Bobby Webb scored for us whilst Cliff Jackson scored for Swindon who once again included Layne as well as a young Mike Summerbee. The return in Wiltshire was a disaster for a poor City side who were now led by Layne. We were relegated at the end of the season and didn't meet Swindon again in the league until 1977.

Having been promoted again in 1976-77 we once again came across Swindon, our one away win of the season came rather fortuitously at Swindon. Joe Cooke scored what proved to be the only goal of the game, Swindon had Chris Kamara in their ranks but even he was unable to prevent the City win – unbelievable! When the return game was played in late April 1978 we needed a win to

keep our hopes of survival alive, we were four points away from safety and had a game in hand on Port Vale who were just outside the relegation places. Our flying winger Don Hutchins scored twice for us as we managed a 2-1 victory with Roy Carter replying for Swindon. We then failed to take any points from our final two games of the season and relegation was confirmed.

We met Swindon on the opening day of the 1987-88 season following their back to back promotions from Division Four to Two. The Swindon side contained Chris Kamara and Jimmy Quinn, the pre match entertainment (!) was provided by Jimmy Cricket, I can't see how he made a living! The game played at a high tempo saw City in control generally but the first half ended goalless. City won the day with two goals in eleven second half minutes, first of all Stuart McCall rounded Fraser Digby to score the first eleven minutes after half time. Ron Futcher added the second eleven minutes later to get us off to a good start. The return in January 1988 was a typically miserable winters day. Swindon absolutely dominated the game and were three goals ahead at half time thanks to Jimmy Quinn, Phil King and Colin Calderwood. To make matters worse Brian Mitchell was sent off just after the interval. The elements came to our rescue when the fog descended and referee David Elleray abandoned the game with eighteen minutes left. When the re-arranged game came round we were more like



our old selves, that having been said we fell behind again, in fact we fell two goals behind, Roy Wegerle and Dave Bamber scored in the first ten minutes of the second half. This time it was our turn to fight back to level, first of all Ron Futcher who had replaced Karl Goddard cut the arrears with twenty minutes to play, then in the final minute the other substitute Mark Leonard scrambled home an equaliser from close range to give us an unexpected point.

The following season we drew the game here 2-2, Leigh Palin and Paul Jewell scoring for us just three days after our League Cup win over Everton. We lost the return at Swindon when Duncan Shearer scored an early winner and Lee Sinnott was sent off.





The player has now left the club.

Ben Williams has been outstanding for City between the sticks this season and has kept a record number of clean sheets, the most that a single Bradford City goalkeeper has kept in one season. He has epitomised the solidity of the defence throughout the season and has really set the tone for the rest of the team.

Having spent last season as the second choice stopper to Jordan Pickford, a goalkeeper who clearly has a bright future in the game, he has stepped into the role as Number 1 seamlessly and he spoke to us recently about clean sheets, form, the defensive unit and the hunt for a spot in the top six.

23 clean sheets in 44 appearances this season for yourself, you must be delighted at the way things have been going so far this season?


'Yeah, I am. Statistically, it's a great return and as I said before it probably goes down as an individual award, if you like, but it's not something I could do on my own. The team have been fantastic, defensively as a unit we've worked really hard and credit should go to everyone really.'

It takes the pressure off the attacking players too doesn't it? We haven't scored a great amount of goals in comparison with the rest of the top half, but because of defensive solidity it hasn't been too much of an issue?

'We pride ourselves on the fact that we're a solid, hard-working team. We know we're not free scoring and we know we're not going to score 4 or 5 per game. We know we don't play a so called 'brand' of football that critics all around the country are going to love, but we're effective at what we do, we work hard doing it and it puts us in the position that we're in now.'

What's it like being a goalkeeper? Do you feel like there is more pressure on a goalkeeper to perform, because there's no hiding place is there if a mistake is made? 'If you make a mistake as a







be fair, because of how he helped me last year in a very strange situation, with me joining after Jordy's (Jordan Pickford) loan had been agreed. It was the first time I'd sort of not played consistently and he was great with me through that. The work we've put in since has led to clean sheets and ultimately, points on the table.'

Chelsea won the Premier League in 2004-05. Petr Cech kept 24 clean sheets that season, and they conceded just 15 goals in the league all season. Most successful teams are built on solid foundations aren't they?

'If you've got a solid foundation, you're not conceding goals and keeping clean sheets, the worst thing you can get out of a game is a draw. Teams like Chelsea, with the strike force that they'll have had and the chances that will have been created, if they're keeping teams out then they should've blown teams away in matches, and that's obviously what they did that season.'

At this club, we have different types of defenders, how much do you think this helps out the balance of the team. For example, Reece Burke is clearly an up and coming and talented young defender and then you've got the likes of Nathan Clarke who has played some 500 league matches, is 32 years old and knows the game really well.

'Credit to all the defenders who have come in at different stages, and

at different times, throughout the season so far. I thought Chris Routis and Nathan Clarke did fantastically well at Crewe on Easter Monday. When Greg has come in at left back for Mezza he's done really well, and we've also got Reece Burke, Chris, Nathan Clarke, Rozza and Darbs who has obviously been more or less ever present at right back.'

'They've all been great, every player has different attributes, but their job description is still the same; 'keep the ball out of the net', and they've all got that fantastic mentality and desire to achieve that as well as the lads in front of them.'

Early on in the season, Brad Jones was brought in and it looked like you two would have a real battle for that starting berth. Have you always backed your ability to be the first choice goalkeeper at this football club?

'I've always backed my ability, but when a player of Brad's calibre is brought in and where he has come from, it comes with the weight behind it that people expected him to play. He played, but it didn't really work out for him and he's gone on to play in Holland and is doing really well. He's not a bad goalkeeper, but

for whatever reason, it didn't really work out. That's turned out to work as a benefit to me and obviously I've tried to make the position my own. Joe is just fantastic in training and I've hard to work hard to keep that position and had to play as well as I possibly can.'

It's over 13 years since you made your Football League debut. Do you feel like the experience of players like yourself, Nathan Clarke, Stephen Darby and Tony McMahon has been key and is going to be key to the group for the remainder of the season?

'I think you need a healthy balance of experienced players in a team. The young lads bring an energy and a freshness. They also bring a naivety/confidence where they haven't been in different positions in a game that you have to be in. Coming into the run in now, where everyone has got to keep their heads and keep their cool, the experienced lads have got an important role to play if we're to pick up as many points as we possibly can.'

It must be exciting to still have something to play for at the right end of the table? Have you been involved in promotion pushes before in your career or is it something that's new to you?

The first year I was at Colchester we

had a real promotion push and we spent a lot of time throughout the season in the top six. We drew too many games towards the end of the season, and fell away. Obviously it's nice to be having the momentum at a different stage of the season now. The squad is coming together, it's getting larger and we've got quality players coming back in who have been out for a while, so it's really exciting times now for

the last few games."

Does the near miss with Colchester give you an experience of knowing what is required at this stage of the season to get into that top six? 'At the time it's difficult. You're looking back in hindsight at how you could've done things better. We didn't have a Plan B at the time, we drew too many games playing the way that we did, and we didn't try to alter that. Ultimately we ran out of games and ended up finishing 8th or even 9th in the table.'

'It's important that we believe in ourselves, keep doing what we're doing now, which lately has been successful.

With six games left, it's going to be a tough ask to win every single one of them, so if it happens where we lose one, or draw one that we should've won, then it's important that we keep our heads and just get on with the next one.'




That first half was one-way traffic and City could – and should – have been out of sight. But Billy Clarke missed a penalty and chances came and went.






IN THE TREATMENT ROOM



FA Community Shield Fund

The 2015 FA Community Shield contribution to the fund amounted to 40% of the total match day income, each competing club is allocated an equal section of the fund to donate to community initiatives of its choice.

A section of the fund will also be allocated to the 124 clubs, that participate from the 1st round proper, to nominate up to 3 local charities or community based initiatives to receive its share of the fund. The remainder of the fund will be donated to the FA Charity Partners, Breast Cancer Aware was chosen by the FA Community Shield Distribution Committee and FA Group staff following a robust selection process and it will be the FA's Official Partner until July 2016. We will be donating our share to the Clubs Upgrade the Parade.

Futsal

Here at Bradford City FC Community Foundation we run a Futsal and Education Scholarship for 16-18 year olds. We offer both BTEC level two in sport and the BTEC Level 3 extended diploma, worth up to 3 A Levels and both run over 2 years.

These courses are for pupils in year 11 or 12 who are footballers but have or are predicted to get A-C in Maths and English.

We are also looking for students who are about to finish year 13 and leaving school as we now offer a 2 year Foundation degree course. You do not have to have done the two year Futsal scholarship course to do the Foundation degree. Our aim is to give pupils an opportunity to get a brilliant qualification that can lead to university as well as giving them a chance to play Futsal every week against other football league teams.

Football clubs are copying Bradford City.

In the last month, Huddersfield
Town have slashed the price of a
season ticket from £262 for this
season to £179 for 2016/17 to
become what (at the moment) will
be the third cheapest in the Sky Bet
Championship.

It was around this time last year that the Bantams announced they were dropping the price of a season ticket by £50 to £149 to become the cheapest in Sky Bet League 1, in a bid to fill the Coral Windows Stadium on a weekly basis.

The average home crowd this season has been 17,919. Not a bad effort at all and now it seems others want the same at their grounds.

And why not!

The power and importance of the Coral Windows Stadium crowd getting behind the players is often a topic that gets brought up on Pulse Sport in both pre-match and post-match interviews.

Indeed, only last month, assistant manager Steve Parkin told Jason & Stix: "We've been at the club five years now and we love to see the stands full of fans.

"We know what the atmosphere is going to be like and long may it continue.

"The players really appreciate it and sometimes it really can be a twelfth man."

So Bradford City are setting the pace and neighbouring teams are following their lead; it's now time the rest of the country took notice.

The Premier League will always be its own expensive beast, but what is stopping the divisions below slashing their prices, filling their stadiums and creating a great atmosphere for their players?

In the Sky Bet Championship, League 1 and League 2 just five clubs offered season tickets to their fans last summer at less than £200 for an adult (Charlton Athletic, Reading, Bradford City, Dagenham and Redbridge and Leyton Orient).

That is a shockingly low figure.

Clubs need to do what Bradford City did last year, what Huddersfield Town have done this year, and give their supporters a really good incentive to ditch Jeff Stelling et al on the television on a Saturday afternoon and go support their team.

Surely the Bantams' march into the League 1 play-off places has shown just how vital a part a big, roaring, partisan crowd can play in a team's success.

As Steve Parkin said himself: "It really can be a twelfth man."





Where do away fans sit?

Away supporters are mostly accommodated to one side of the South Stand (Blocks 6 & 7) towards the corner with the Lloyds pharmacy Stand. Around 3,000 supporters can be seated in this area. Apparently the stand is quite steep, meaning a fair bit of an effort to climb to the top of the stand. The leg room is adequate and the acoustics in the ground are good.

It is a wonderful arena that has a capacity of 32,500 and is certainly one of the best outside the top two tiers of English football. It's a stadium that also wouldn't look a tad out of place in the Championship or the Premier League.

Directions and Car Parking

- Take A6181, Manchester Road/A641 and A6177 to M606.
 (11 minutes, 3.1 miles)
- Take M1 and M69 to A444 in Coventry.
 Take exit 3 from M6. (2 hours 6 minutes, 123 miles)
- Follow A444 to B4118 in West Midlands. (7 minutes, 2.8 miles)

Journey Mileage: (2 hours 21 minutes, 129 miles)

Parking: Parking at the stadium is mostly for permit holders, although the club do sell on the day spaces in Car Parks A, B and C at £10 per car, although it is best to book a space in advance. Blue badge holders can also park at the stadium itself but again at a cost of £10.

The nearby Tesco/Arena Retail car park is well 'policed' on matchday. Free parking is restricted to just two hours only unless you spend £25 or more in one of the shops on the Retail Park, otherwise if you stay you can end up with a £50 parking ticket.

Closer to the stadium in Oban Road (Opposite the Longford Engine CV6 6HH) are two private car parks run by Ricoh Arena Event parking. Spaces can also be pre-booked online and cost £4 per car.
