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THE CHAIRMAN: DARRYL EALES

The Transfer Window and the Whole Game Solution

Welcome to our long-awaited League One meeting with Swindon Town.

My first taste of the rivalry between the two sides was in last season's JPT game and I am sure today the atmosphere will be just as electric. Accordingly, it is a great pleasure to welcome fans, players and officials from Swindon. Let's hope the game justifies the occasion and is a great advert for football in general, and local derbies in particular.

Local rivalry in football and achieving 'bragging rights' is part of the fabric of football. It is this partisanship which makes football the fantastic game it is but let's remember, we all have a responsibility to support our team, respect the opposition, and most of all, ensure that all our energies are channelled positively and without excess. We aspire to be a 'Community Club' - let's put that into practice today!

I discuss below two main themes which are uppermost in my thinking - our squad and our activity in the transfer windows - and some initial thoughts on the 'Whole Game Solution' which is currently in the consultation stage.

We are now six games into the season. Our performances may best be described as a 'curate's egg' - good in parts! I think it is clear that there is a perceptible increase in quality in League 1 but at the same time, we have nothing to fear and can look forward to an exciting season.

Disrupted

Without doubt, defensively, our plans have been disrupted by injury, which has meant that, so far, Michael has been unable to play an unchanged side - a vital ingredient, in my view, in achieving the consistency required to consolidate first and foremost, and then see where we are at around the half-way stage of the season.

What I can say is that I am delighted with our squad and, indeed, our overall success in the transfer window. We have a robust, structured and planned approach to recruitment and we managed to secure virtually all our of our key targets identified at the beginning of the window, albeit somewhat later than we had anticipated, but, as is often the case, timing is not always within our control.

As well as Michael and Faz, I would like to mention the roles of Craig Dean and Mark Thomas in identifying, analysing and performing due diligence on players. It really is a labour of love and both deserve great credit.

Strengthened

In my view, we have strengthened both the quality and depth of the squad, as well as having excellent balance once we are injury free! It is overall a young squad, with highly talented group of players, many of whom can go onto play at higher levels - hopefully at Oxford United!

We believe we have built wisely, both in terms of investment through transfer fees and a significant but judicious increase in the playing budget. We are very fortunate to have a manager who understands the realities of football and who seeks to build for the future through investment in talent, while also recognising the need to try and balance the books.

I have always said, whether it is business or sport, it is 'people

before plans'. If you get the people right, and the culture right, and focus on the how and a consistently high level of performance, both on and off the pitch, then the results will come. This, in my view, is the only way to build sustainable long-term success.

Under Michael's stewardship and with Greig now settled into his new role, I believe we are developing a highly capable, increasingly professional set up, based on a community-orientated team-based ethic and putting the interests of Oxford United Football Club first.

Proposals

Turning next to the very outline proposals for a 'Whole Game Solution'.

First of all, I would stress that this is a complex issue with many conflicting perspectives. Resolution will be achieved only by open and transparent debate and full engagement with all key stakeholders, especially fans.

All of us, myself included, need to ensure we don't adopt a slightly self-righteous, superior position, as I believe we are all fans who love the game of football and want to do our best to ensure the sport prospers over the long term, while also protecting the traditions which have served the game so well and ensure the game stays true to its heritage.

Based on the above, it is premature, at this stage, to make any detailed response to the 'Whole Game Solution' proposals

because there is simply not enough substance to the proposals at this stage, especially in terms of what is the issue we are solving, what are the real benefits, what alternatives have been considered and, of course, what are the financial implications.

Many fans believe that there is a hidden agenda and, as part of the proposals, there is an intention to introduce 'B' teams into the League structure. This is not my view - I may be wrong! But I do not doubt the honourable intentions of the Football League.

However, I do think the process of publication of the 'Whole Game Solution' proposals so far have created a climate of suspicion. There has been inadequate consultation, a seeming lack of transparency and poor communication, and this must change if any proposals are to have legitimacy. This must include appropriate engagement with fans!

Attention

At this stage, I have focused my attention on considering what issue we are seeking to resolve, especially from the point of view of a League 1 professional club:

- Is there really fixture congestion outside the Premier League necessitating a change to league structure, including a 5th division and additional teams?
- If the answer above is yes, is the answer a wholesale reorganisation of the League structure?

• If the answer again to this is yes, and there are additional teams, it must be clear from the outset that any new League teams earn the right to be in league structure, which means promotion from the National League, subject, of course, to the National League being happy with this.

On other important issues such as a winter break or regionalisation, I speak as a fan and am wholly against both for Football League clubs.

Consultation

What I can say, unequivocally, is that we will form a structured OUFC response to the fully formed 'Whole Game Proposal' and this will be done after full consultation with our fans. We have already had a preliminary meeting with OxVox and, in the interests of expediency and efficiency, I would recommend that all fans views are diverted to OxVox so that they can get a fairer picture of the overall 'fan' perspective.

I hope I do not come across as against change. For me, change is essential and perpetual, but there is no point in change for the sake of change.

I welcome the commitment by the FA, Premier League and Football League to look at better solutions and I look forward to a constructive and lively discussion over the ensuing months and, ultimately, large-scale agreement to a solution which safeguards the game at all levels.

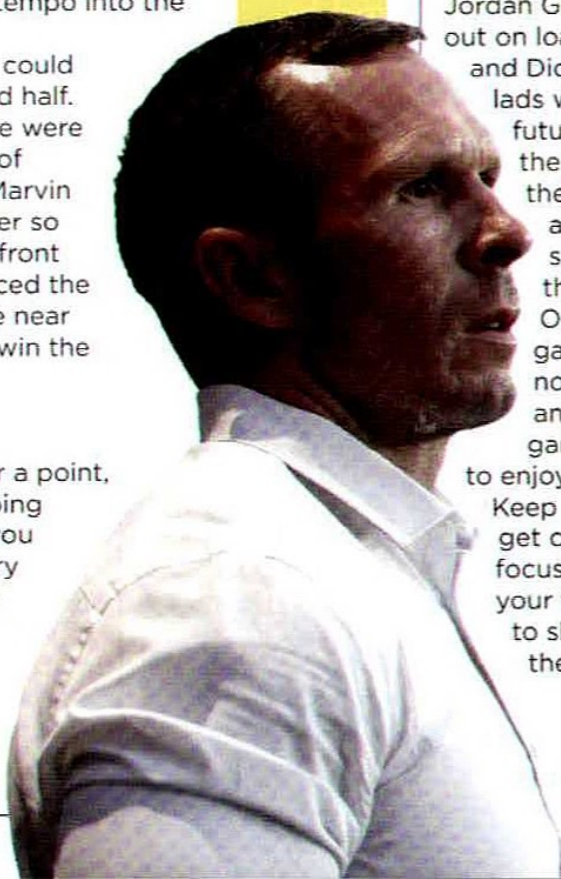
Progress

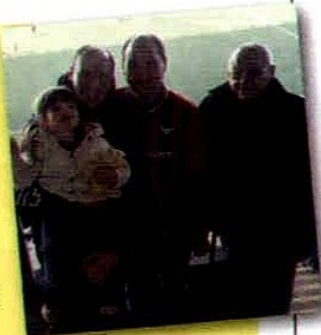
With newest pro Jordan Graham at Didcot and George Jeacock at Brackley, it takes the total to seven players playing locally and Head Coach Michael Appleton said:

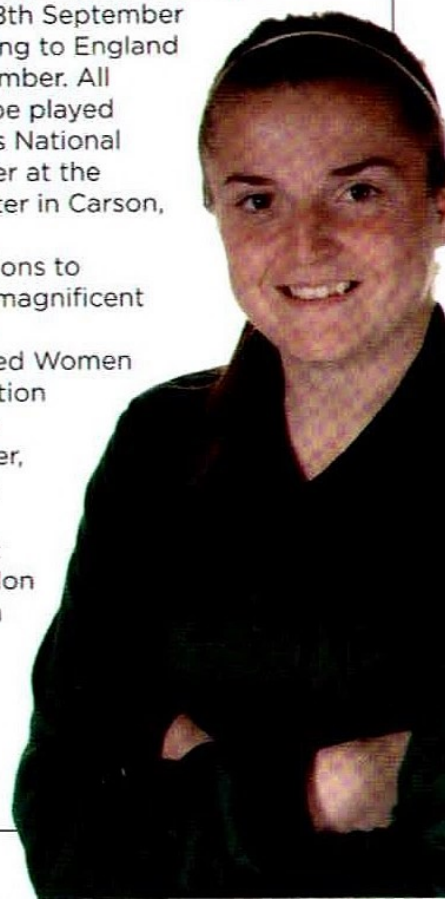
International Demi called up

The Robins come to Grenoble Road

It's derby day as Oxford United host Swindon Town at Grenoble Road.

Swindon come into the game sitting just one point above the U's and have been boosted by a deadline-day signing. Former Watford midfielder Sean Murray put pen to paper on a one-year deal with the option of a further year. He spent time on loan at Wigan Athletic last season, scoring once in eight appearances in all competitions.

Last time out, Luke Williams' side drew 2-2 away to Peterborough. The Posh found themselves ahead through the prolific Gwion Edwards, notching his fourth goal of the season when he headed home Marcus Maddison's free kick. Swindon levelled, however, through Michael Doughty, who dispatched his penalty after seeing his initial shot handled by Michael Bostwick.

New signing Murray was introduced but endured a nightmare start to his

Town career. Just four minutes into his debut the former Hornet tripped Chris Forrester inside the box to give away a penalty.

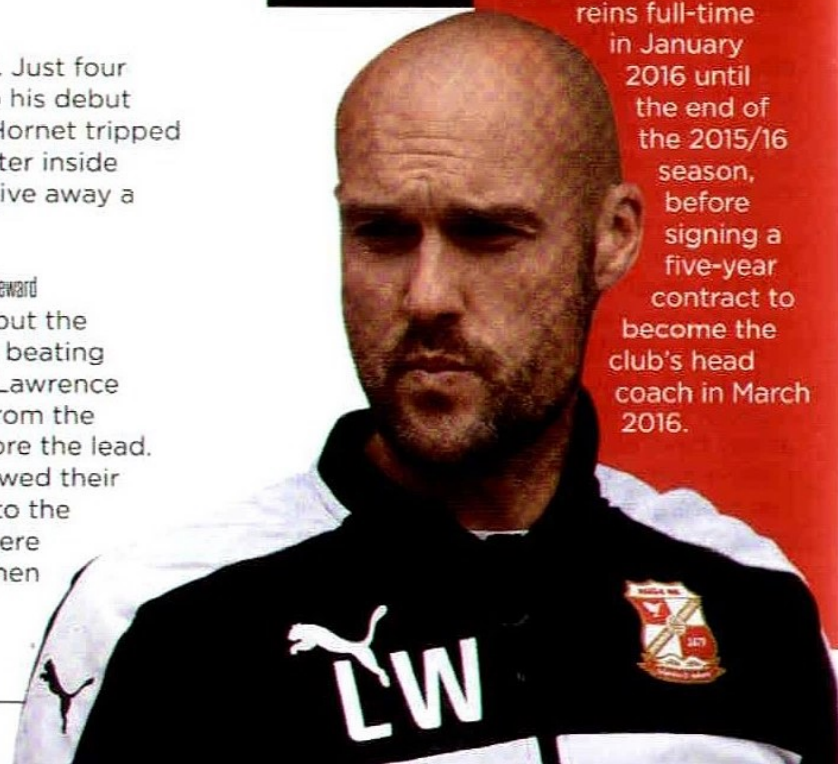
Reward

Maddison put the Posh ahead, beating goalkeeper Lawrence Vigouroux from the spot to restore the lead. Swindon clawed their way back into the game and were rewarded when a vicious Michael

HEAD COACH LUKE WILLIAMS

Williams spent three seasons at Brighton and Hove Albion, where he was in charge of the Under 21s and a coach with the reserve team, before joining Swindon ahead of the 2013/14 campaign.

He has also been an FA Skills Coach and has worked at Leyton Orient and at West Ham. After serving as a coach under the previous two incumbents at Swindon, he was handed the reins full-time in January 2016 until the end of the 2015/16 season, before signing a five-year contract to become the club's head coach in March 2016.





ONE TO WATCH NATHAN THOMPSON

A product of the Swindon Town academy, Thompson made his breakthrough into the first team during the 2012/13 campaign after signing professionally in 2009. He made his Swindon debut in October 2010.

The tough-tackling defender was a regular as Swindon made the League One play-offs. One of the first names on the teamsheet and a firm fans' favourite ever since, the two-time Player of the Year winner is the current skipper at the County Ground.

One of only five players to have captained Swindon at Wembley, Thompson has made over 150 appearances for the Robins.

Doughty free kick was turned into his own net by Peterborough man Jack Baldwin with 14 minutes to go. Swindon came closest to winning the fixture when substitute Luke Norris prodded an effort wide.

Swindon Town head coach Luke Williams told swindontown.co.uk: "We looked very comfortable until we conceded and then the game changed a lot because Peterborough gained more confidence and we started to chase the game. There was more

space everywhere. But to come back twice was excellent and it shows that we are capable of digging in and overcoming circumstances.

"We created chances around their box to get a shot on goal but we didn't quite manage that final action, or when we did it was without conviction. I don't think there were huge problems, it was just about executing their jobs slightly better."

The goalkeeper put pen to paper on a permanent deal at Swindon Town in the summer of 2016, joining from Liverpool after enjoying a loan stint in Wiltshire during 2015/16. Was previously with Tottenham Hotspur.

11. JAMES BROPHY



The defender signed a one-year deal with Swindon following a successful trial period in 2015 before agreeing an extension at the conclusion of the 2015/16 campaign. The left-sided defender joined the Robins from non-league football.

27. BRADLEY BARRY



The former Brighton defender signed a deal with Swindon in August 2015 following a successful trial period. Was voted Players' Player of the Season at the end of the 2015/16 campaign.

20. DARNELL FURLONG



On loan from Queens Park Rangers, Darnell is the son of former R's striker, Paul. On the books at Loftus Road for nearly a decade, the full-back had a loan at Cambridge United last season.

28. LLOYD JONES



The defender joined Town on a season-long loan from Liverpool in August 2016. Plymouth-born Jones moved to Anfield from his hometown club in 2011 and has been a regular in the Liverpool academy sides ever since.

MIDFIELDERS

5. ANTON RODGERS



The midfielder joined Town in the summer of 2014 after leaving Oldham Athletic. A regular fixture last term, he has now racked up over 50 appearances for Swindon. Anton is the son of Celtic manager, Brendan.

10. JOHN GODDARD



A highly rated talent in non-league football, Goddard was plucked from National League side Woking in the summer of 2016, joining for an undisclosed fee. The midfielder netted 20 times for the Cards last term.

4. CONOR THOMAS



Formerly with Coventry City, the midfielder came through the ranks at his hometown club and would go on to spend 15 years with the Sky Blues, racking up over 100 appearances for the Midlands side.

7. MICHAEL DOUGHTY



A graduate of the youth ranks at Queens Park Rangers, Doughty is back on loan for the whole of the 2016/17 season after spending the latter part of last term at the County Ground.

After starting his career as a trainee at Aston Villa, Delfouneso has gone on to play for a number of clubs, including the likes of Leicester City, Coventry City and Blackburn Rovers. Joined Swindon last month.

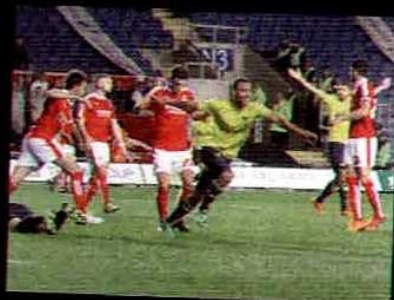
Although this was a Football League Trophy tie there was a real cup atmosphere in the ground as both teams gave it everything.

United went close on 10 minutes when Callum O'Dowda's shot from the edge of the area came back off the bar and were handed a significant advantage after half an hour when Jordan Turnbull was sent off for kicking out at Jake Wright.

Oxford took full advantage just before half-time when, following good approach play, Ryan Taylor got the ball to Kemar Roofe who

shot home to send the home fans wild. United could have increased their lead before the break as Lawrence Vigouroux made a magnificent save from Jordan Graham, tipping his 20-yard goal-bound shot on to the post.

United laid siege to Swindon's goal in the second half, with debutant goalkeeper Benji Büchel hardly troubled. United doubled their lead from a right-wing cross



from Graham; Taylor got in front of the defender to head on and there was Roofe to bury his second of the night and earn Oxford passage to the next round in a competition that would end with a Wembley final for the U's.

Haven't we seen you before...

Jim Barron

We look at a player who played for both Oxford and Swindon

Jim Barron started his career as a youth with Newcastle West End, and he played for England Boys Clubs against Ireland. He joined Wolves in 1961, playing eight league games for Wanderers, and also played 20 minutes for Chelsea against Wolves during a tour of the West Indies in 1964.

Barron joined Chelsea in May 1965 but he made just one appearance for them before moving to Oxford at the start of March 1966. He was United's regular goalkeeper for four years, but an impressive display against Nottingham Forest in the League Cup fourth round in October 1969 led to Forest paying Oxford £30,000 for his services, after he'd kept 51 clean sheets in 165 appearances.

Barron made 180 appearances

for Forest before he moved to Swindon in August 1974. He played 93 games for the Robins, leaving for the USA in March 1977 to join the Connecticut Bicentennials, with Swindon agreeing to cancel his contract. Barron played 10 games before joining Peterborough, helping them to a club record of just 33 goals conceded in 1977/78. Twenty-one games later Barron retired from playing.

He became assistant manager

at Wolves, and he was caretaker manager for three games in May 1984. In 1986 Barron was coach with Íþróttabandalag Akraness, winning the Icelandic Cup, and two years later he took charge of Cheltenham Town for one season, while at the same time acting as personal goalkeeping coach to Wales 'keeper Neville Southall.

After a succession of coaching positions Barron became a scout.

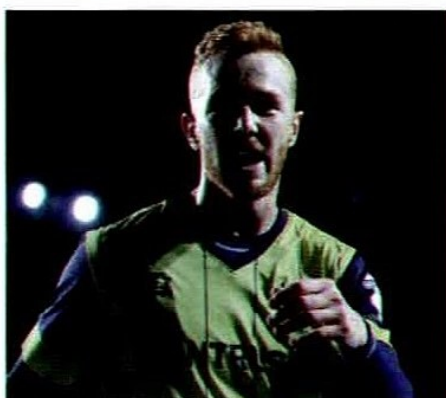
Exeter pulled a goal back just before half-time and then equalised on the hour to give United a jolt, but the U's reacted in style.

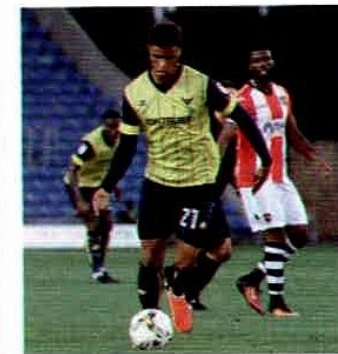
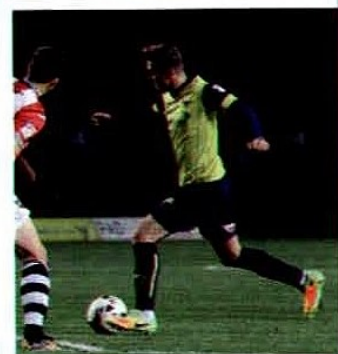

Winger Marvin Johnson talks to the match programme

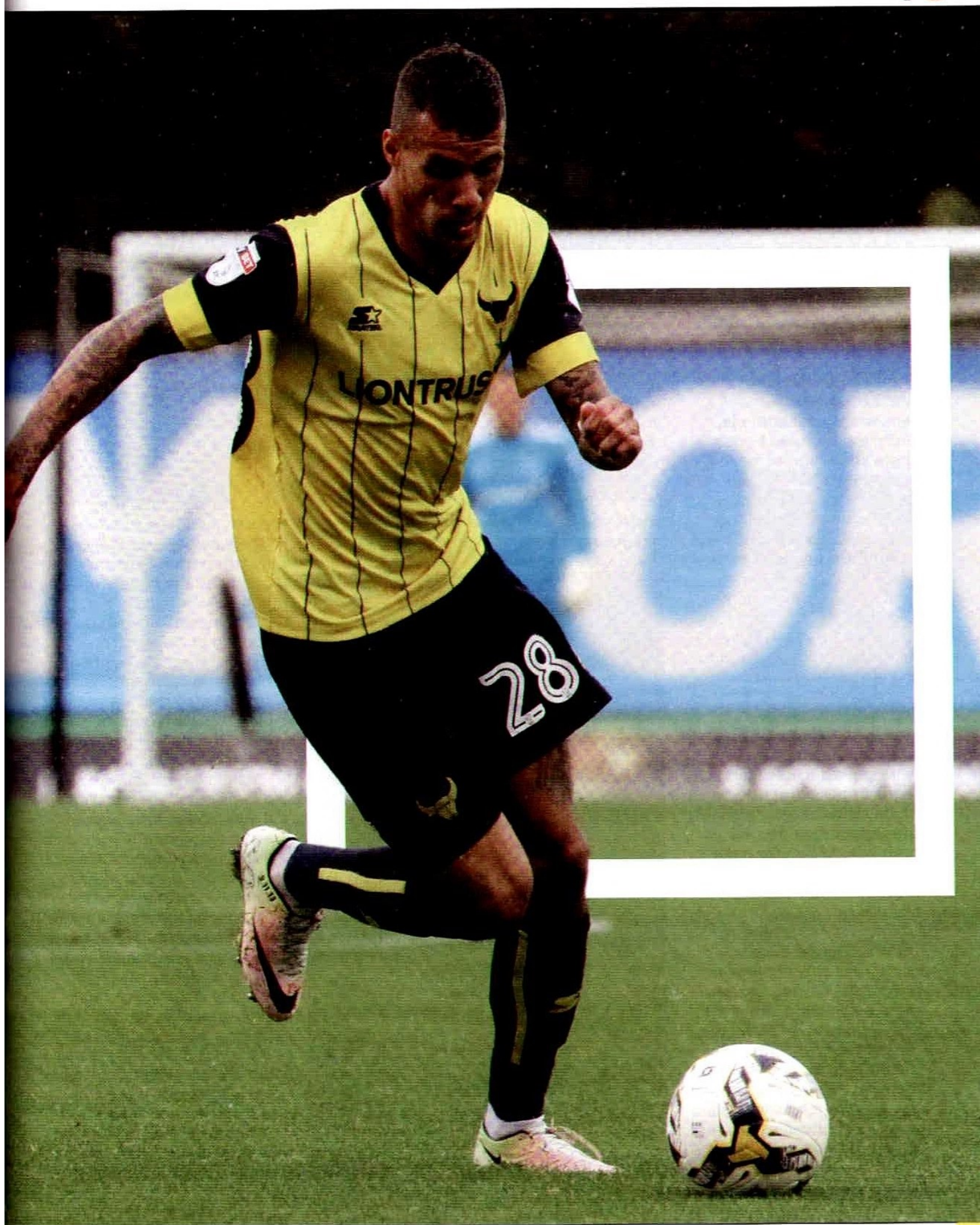
I think it's fair to say that Marvin Johnson made quite an impression on his Oxford United debut last week. The 25-year-old forward came on at half time against Rochdale and his pace and energy impressed everyone as the U's grabbed a last-minute winner when Liam Sercombe put the finishing touches to one of his crosses.

"I thought Rochdale started well but we were a bit below our best," he says. "It wasn't so much what Rochdale were doing, as us not doing great ourselves. But we came out in the second half after the gaffer had a word and we came back out determined to step the tempo up and work harder off the ball, not just on it.

"We knew the result was there for us, and scoring in the 88th minute just shows that we weren't going to give up, or wait, see it out and settle for a boring 0-0 draw. We wanted all three points. We kept going, kept digging in and I thought we deserved the win."

Marvin began his career with Solihull Moors before joining Romulus and then Kidderminster Harriers, where he attracted interest from a number of clubs. He moved to Motherwell before joining the U's on deadline day.

"I'm very pleased to be at a club like Oxford, which is obviously on the up and ambitious. The Manager has a great reputation for working with players and helping them develop their game.

"It was hard to leave in the end because Motherwell fans were great with me. From the moment I got there I had a great feeling about the club," he said, "and every single day, anything I've needed they were there to help me. I was never once unhappy at the place and I gave 100 per cent in every single game and tried to work hard for the team. I feel like I gave my all to Motherwell and to the fans and so it was a big decision to leave."

Gutted

The Motherwell fans were gutted to see Marvin leave, but their loss is very much United's gain, with the Oxford fans getting right behind him from the moment he first got the ball last week and tried to take his man on.

"The fans' reaction was a good bonus because you don't want them being unsure of you, you want them behind you straight away," he says. "If fans get on any player's back then they start doubting themselves but I thought the fans were brilliant last week, really positive. All you hear out there is the noise and the reaction when you

Impressive

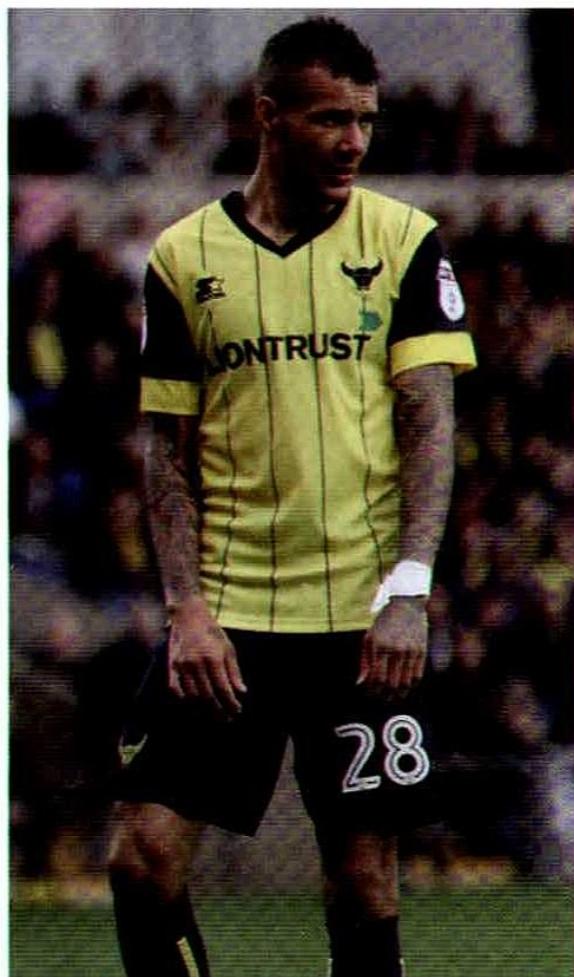

"You never know if you're coming or going on a day like that," he laughs. "Anything can happen and I'm just glad that we got it over the line. I don't want to go through all this again anytime soon."

Marvin teams up with a familiar face at the U's. It was while United were watching Chey Dunkley that they first became aware of the winger playing in the same Kidderminster side.

"I spoke to Chey and he only had good things to say about the set up here and the fans," Marvin says. "It's good to have people you know at a club. It's not too far from home for me and with my son starting school for the first time this week it is good to be close to him and settled here."

Marvin remains ambitious and looking to make progress this season as

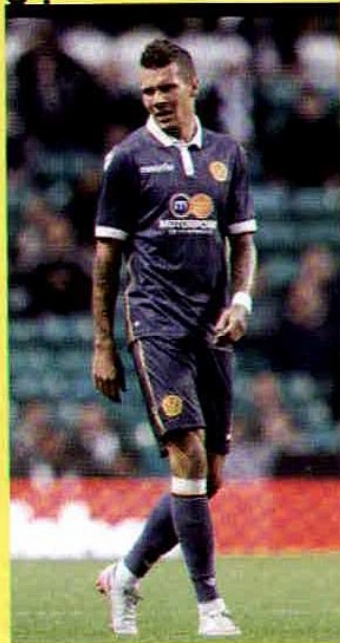


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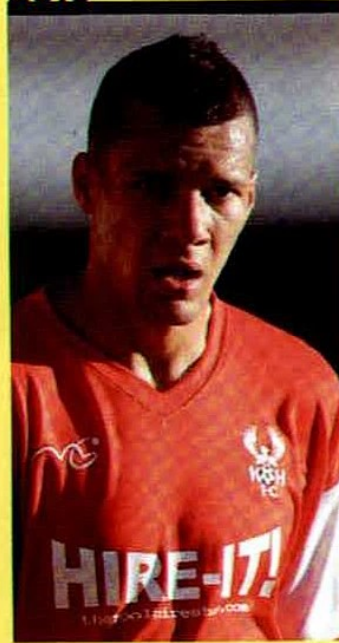

"I want to come here and keep improving as a player; the club has a great reputation for doing that. I'm not happy just to come here; I want to kick on again, help the team out and make sure we continue to go in the right direction."

Disappointed

Mind you, Marvin should really have scored on his debut...

"I should have done," he says of an injury time chance. "It was probably easier to score than not! I was disappointed at the

time and then all weekend but you just have to pick yourself up and get over it. We won, which was the main thing so you move on and focus on the next game."

And so we move on to the little matter of Oxford United v Swindon Town, a derby like no others. Marvin has played in local derbies before:

"Everyone," he grins. "It's obviously massive for the fans but as players we just have to try and view it as another game, and one we need to get three points from. We have to be level-headed and try and do things right and if we do that then we can definitely get another win under our belts."

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A typical day for Rob Hall

As I mentioned last week, Rob Hall continues to make progress every week as we look to bring him back after his ACL reconstruction.

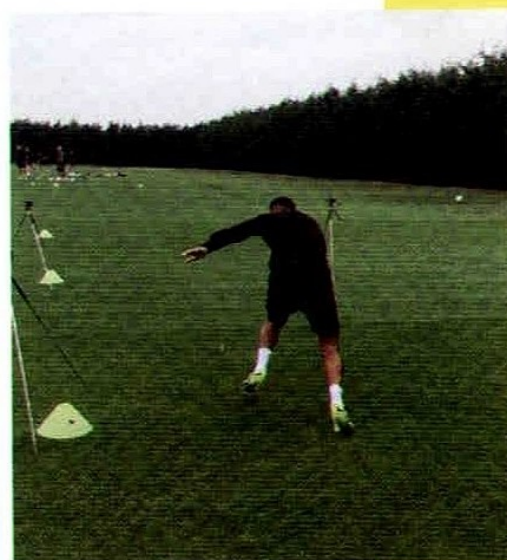
The first few weeks of his rehab were a little slow as I began to establish where Hally was with his rehab, and also work out what he would and wouldn't respond to. We now have a solid rehab plan in place and we are working through this to get him strong, fit and ready to play.

Hally's typical day will involve some treatment first thing in the morning, where we might complete some joint mobilisations to reduce any stiffness, or he might get a massage to help with any muscle soreness from the day before. He then completes his daily control, balance, stability and glute-control programme. We have assessed Rob and think this may have been the reason for his injury, so these exercises (as boring as they can be) are vital and we have already seen improvements in his landing mechanics and control.

Drills

After this, we complete pitch-based drills working on position-specific and football-based skills. This may be running, turning, landing and football exercises, where we are building Rob towards

a return to training. Through these drills, Liam McWhirter will assess the GPS data and give us indications on how hard Rob is working and how close to actual training loads we are. This is all to get him ready for a return and be prepared for the physical components of training when fit. Hally is stepping up this conditioning work this week with Scott Daly, and will continue to work with us both over the next period of his rehab. We are building towards his review in October, where we hope the surgeon is happy and gives him the all clear.

Forces

Finally, in the afternoon Rob will be in the gym completing his strength work for both lower and upper body. He is certainly lifting some heavy weights now as we make him as strong as possible in his legs to withstand the forces of a return to training. Rob will definitely tell you that being injured often means working a lot harder than when you are fit!

On another note, I'd like to wish Will Holliday (academy therapist) all the best as he leaves us for new ventures. Thanks for all your hard work and assistance over my time here.

Today is a massive game and I know you will be in full voice for the lads.

Gerry Summers

Continuing our series looking at past managers

Following the brief reign of disciplinarian manager Ron Saunders, the United board turned to rookie Gerry Summers to take charge of team affairs.

Summers' first professional club was West Bromwich Albion, making his debut as a wing-half in 1955, playing 20 games in his debut season for the First Division side. He played just twice the following season, after which he joined Second Division Sheffield United.

At the end of his fourth season with the Blades they won promotion to the top flight, finishing fifth in the First Division the following year. In April 1964 Summers moved to Hull City of Division Three, before moving to Walsall in October 1965. He left Fellows Park in 1967, after which he did some coaching at Wolves and was a coach on the staff of the FA before being appointed manager at the Manor in July 1969.

During Summers' first season he managed to consolidate the side in Division Two and also reached the quarter-finals of the League Cup, losing 1-0 at Carlisle United in a replay after a 0-0 draw at the Manor. In September 1970, Summers took United to the top of the Second Division, the highest the club had ever been. However, they fell away from the top and ended the season in 14th place. United finished 15th the following season, but in 1973 they had their highest finish yet: eighth in the Second Division.

Tougher

The following season was much tougher for United, who looked like they could go down until the final match of the season; a 0-0 draw at Millwall left Oxford in 18th place, just two points above relegated Crystal Palace. In 1974/75 United had another relatively successful season, finishing in 11th place, but for much of the season they were higher than that.

Summers' big signing in the close season was Peter Houseman from Chelsea, but United made a poor start and were bottom by the end of September. As a result attendances fell, and because of the club's precarious financial situation Summers was dismissed. Three weeks later he was appointed manager of Third Division Gillingham. His final game was a 3-2 home defeat by Charlton Athletic on 29 September 1975.

Summers had six seasons with the Gills before being sacked at the end of the 1980/81 season. He went on to coach at West Bromwich Albion, Leicester City, and Derby County, becoming Youth Development Officer with the Rams until his retirement in October 1998.

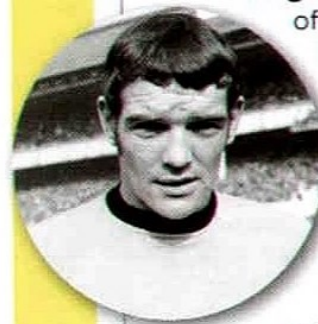

I'd have loved to have played at Lords but then I did get two goals at Ayresome Park to make up for it."



Hugh Curran: "I started of playing with Nigel Cassidy and we had a good understanding. We were both good in the air but I don't think Gerry Summers had a plan as such to play long-ball football or anything like that. "We were a good side and it was very hard for anyone to beat us at the Manor at that time. But we just couldn't seem to win away. I often had an argument with Gerry Summers about it, asking why we couldn't win away from home. It wasn't planned that way, obviously, and the training didn't go that way. We just seemed to go into our shells away from home. "It wasn't very enjoyable apart from going to Swindon and beating them away from home. That was a great day!"

Good Luck Charlie

We speak to United's recent defensive acquisition

It was a relatively busy transfer deadline day for Oxford United this season. First through the door was central defender Charlie Raglan, arriving on loan from Chesterfield until January.

Charlie made his debut in last week's win over Rochdale and we spoke with him at the training ground earlier in the week to ask him if it was all a bit of a whirlwind.

"It was a bit of a surprise," he confirms. "I played 90 minutes against Wolves under 23s on the Tuesday night in the Checkatrade Trophy and we had the day off on the Wednesday. I had a phone call saying there was a possibility of a move to Oxford and there were a few texts exchanged and a few rumours on social media, so I was just spending the whole day waiting for something a bit more concrete. Then it was a case of getting down to Oxford from Manchester, which I did about 6.30 or seven o'clock, to sign the papers and then it was straight into training the next day.

"It was good to come in to the club and train the next day and everyone welcomed me with open arms; they were great with me and showed me the ropes pretty quickly. I stayed down here for a couple of nights and just got ready for the game and was just looking forward to that. Everybody's been top drawer from the players, staff and fans. Everybody's made me feel really welcome. I didn't know anyone here before, although I knew of a couple of people. I played against Oxford on the opening day of the season and luckily I didn't fall out with too many people!"

Start

After just two days of training with his new team mates, Charlie was chosen to start against Rochdale for his Oxford debut. We wondered if that came as a surprise to him.

"The manager told me that there was a chance I'd be involved in some capacity," he says, "so I

prepared myself to play, as you do, whether I was going to be playing or not. It was just important to win the game. I came off thinking I did okay personally but as a team we should have done better and by all accounts in previous games we probably played better and lost the games, so in that situation it's important to win. We spoke about it after the game and we said it's important to be consistent in your performances because that brings the right results.

Charlie may not have known anyone at Oxford, but he did acquaint himself with United players earlier, having played for Chesterfield against United here on the opening day of the season.

"It was a tough game from the point of view that we came off the pitch patting each other on the back and thinking it was a good point away from home," he tells us. "After speaking to a few of the lads here, they came off quite

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disappointed that they didn't win the game. I definitely thought it was a tough game and there were some good players here and I loved playing at the ground and in front of the fans and the pitch was top drawer as well."

After making his debut against Rochdale, today's game is on quite a different scale. We asked Charlie if he's aware of the rivalry between Oxford and Swindon.

"It's been mentioned quite a few times and I've not even been here a week so I get the idea. I heard about the game last season and there are quite a few local lads who have told me about it. I've not really got any experience playing in a derby but what I can offer is that I played against Swindon earlier in the season so I know a bit about them."

Competition

Charlie joins a United defence that, when everyone is fully fit, has a lot of competition for places. How difficult is it for a short-term loan signing to get games in these circumstances?

"I've come in and I did look at that but it was a chance to join a club that's definitely on the up and to be a part of this environment, it's a great place to come and play football. I'm here until January and I want to play as many games as I can and the only way to do that is by winning games, keeping clean sheets and playing well."

We asked Charlie if there are challenges making a debut with

a new team with only a couple of training sessions under your belt.

Characters

"It can be difficult coming in to a new set up, but it's just personalities and characters that you don't really know and there are different ways of speaking to people but Chey was pretty firm with me that we were there to keep a clean sheet and that's what we wanted and we achieved that."

"I spent a bit of time with Phil Edwards because he's away from home as well so there was communication all around the back four and in front of us as well and we did okay defensively. You can see that Easty's a decent keeper. He was struggling with his ankle actually and did well to come through the game and he definitely helped us out a lot; he made some big calls, some big punches and a couple of decent saves as well. You always need your keeper to play well."

"I want to spend as much time down here as I can to give myself the best chance of playing for Oxford. How that happens I'm not sure yet. Obviously I'll go home when I get the opportunity but the timing has to be right. It's a short-term contract and I'm here to put everything into Oxford."

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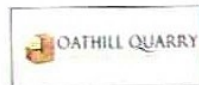
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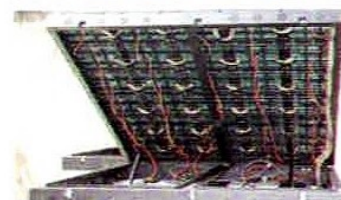

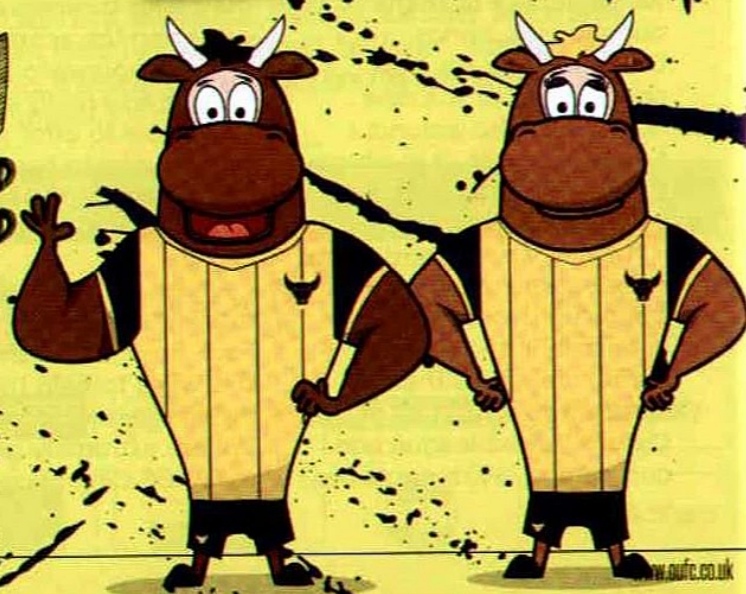

Passion

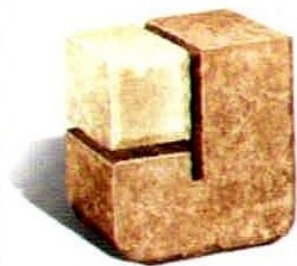
Don't get me wrong. The passion among both sets of fans remains the

Fly those flags proudly, enjoy the game, and come back next time prepared to be just as passionate in your support of the U's.

Blades of Glory

Chris Williams heads for the Steel Town...

There's a brilliant scene right at the start of the Full Monty where a vintage newsreel vividly describes how splendid it is to live and work in Sheffield.

As the announcers extol the virtues of life in England's steel capital the camera pans to Robert Carlisle ambling along by the side of a grubby canal, hand in pockets and with the weight of the world on his shoulders as he walks past derelict unloved factories from a bygone era.

Twenty years ago Sheffield wasn't in a very good place at all. The death of the mines and the factories had left the town as far from its stainless shining industrial past as it was possible to be. Now, as we crawl across a hill top through the pre-match traffic towards Sheffield United's Bramall Lane, we look down on a city rejuvenated. New opportunities have sprung up, new businesses have given new life to the streets that, although still lined by compact terraces, are no longer served by boarded up shops and closed-down mills.

Change

Bramall Lane embodies the change that you can see here. When I first came, many years ago, it was a vast anachronism, all grey steps and rusty pylons. The location is still the same, tight among the houses and pubs in the heart of the city but as we approach

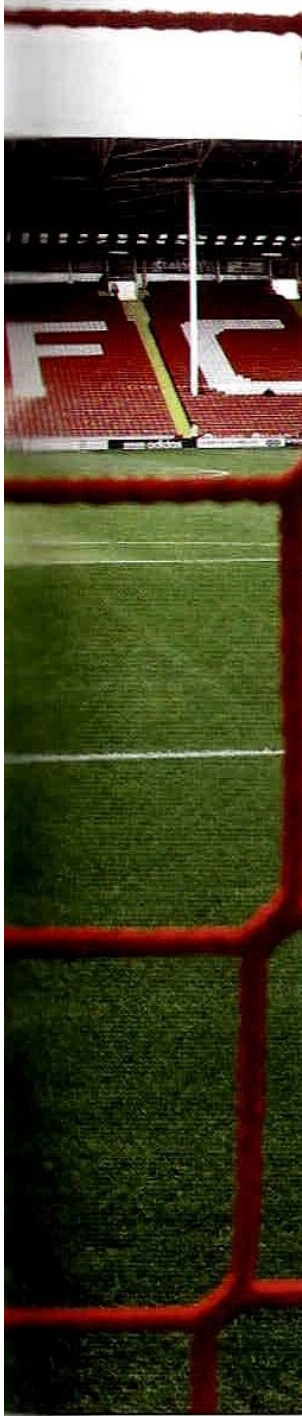
between statues of Derek Dooley and Joe Shaw, we walk towards a proud, glass-fronted stand that boasts a fine mix of past glories and current redevelopment.

Bramall Lane is unique. Built as a cricket ground, it has hosted test matches and FA Cup finals. The history of the club is obvious. Down in the tunnel area there are life-size posters of great stars of the past such as Len Badger, Tony Currie and, above them all, Alan Hodgkinson. I hear the word legend a lot in football but nobody deserves that title more than Hodgy, who spent over 50 years in football, all the time looking only to help others and rarely looking for any sort of personal recognition. Almost a year has gone by since his death but I still miss our chats and laughs. Not the handshake so much. That was bone crushing.

Great man

His poster is directly outside the away dressing room and I nod silently towards the great man as we pass on a mini-tour of the inner workings of the modern day Blades. The pitch is a Desso version, state of the art and slick and ready for action. It is surrounded by giant red and white stands that hold in the noise and hint at what might happen here. Somehow neither United nor Wednesday have quite captured the heights this century. They remain massive clubs with diehard, unstinting support, but these days you need a





Russian oligarch just to make it to the Premier League it seems.

Up in the press room I am bewildered when a local upturns my pie, stabs it repeatedly with a fork and pours Henderson's relish into it. Must be a northern thing. I wouldn't dream of pouring my relish into another man's steak and kidney, but each to their own I think as I discreetly tip it into a plant pot.

From the top of the main stand I get a bird's eye view of the action. Blades boss Chris Wilder has been under pressure and pulls the least surprising surprise in the history of surprises by handing Jake Wright a debut at centre half. There are a few raised eyebrows among the locals but not among the Oxford fans, who know that Jake will be fired up and as determined as any player ever to pull on that red-and-white striped shirt. When the teams emerge the former United skipper gets a magnificent reception from the superb travelling army, who recognise his contribution over the last six-and-a-half years.

Powerless

He is powerless in the 16th minute though when Kane Hemmings fires United into the lead. A long-range effort from Liam Sercombe is pushed into the striker's path and he smacks it home to make it 0-1 and ensure that Wilder endures an uneasy first half. The fans are restless and if United could get a second goal then you sense the air could turn mutinous.

Seven minutes into the second half and John Lundstram, Wright's successor, almost makes it two but is denied by home keeper Simon Moore,



right in front of the travelling Yellow Army. That moment becomes pivotal.

This division is packed full with proven performers; Ched Evans and Matty Taylor have already scored against us and this time it is Billy Sharp who beats Simon Eastwood from close range to make it 1-1 and lift the mood.

Now the home fans are roaring and the whole place seems totally different. The U's look to counter but with 17 minutes left Mark Duffy swings in a free kick and centre-back James Wilson powers his header past the helpless Eastwood to win the game.

Conspicuous

It is Sheffield's first win of the season and they have to hang on a bit towards the end but they have edged a close 90 minutes and deserve the points. Mr Wilder is conspicuous by his absence afterwards, leaving assistant Alan Knill to deal with press duties, but Jake is magnanimous in his comments. He confesses to me that it's as fired up as he's been since we went back to his first club Bradford in the Football League; you remember, he got sent off.

Outside, the rain comes down on a cold steel town as they carry me away towards the distant car park. We have picked up a passenger, a soaked and stranded fan with no way home, so there are five of us crammed into our little MG. Cosy. I usually sulk all the way home after an away defeat, but this time it's only until the services. We lost, but it felt like a proper game of football between two proper clubs at a proper football stadium. I look at the fixture list. Next up MK Dons...

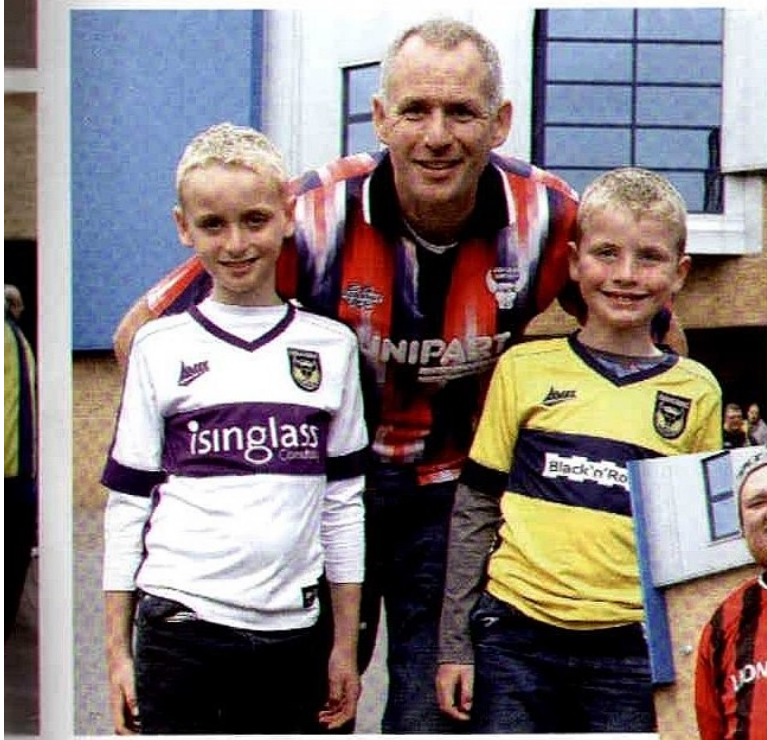
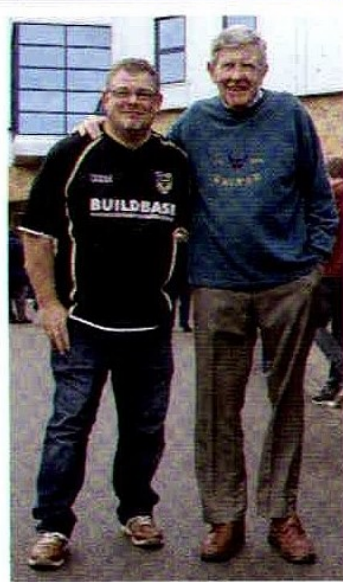
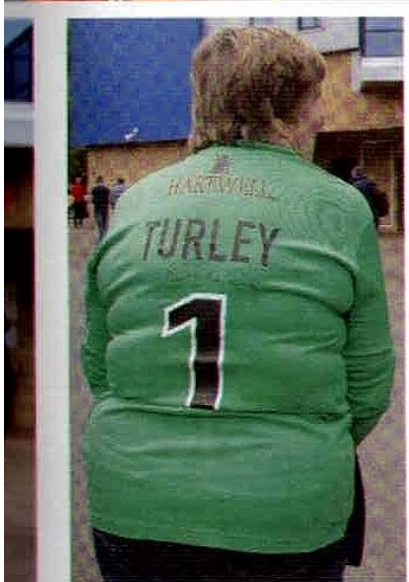

Shop till you drop

Continuing our series looking into every aspect of Oxford United



If you look around you this afternoon you'll see many Oxford fans wearing replica shirts or sporting club hats and scarfs, maybe with official pin badges. All of these items have been bought from the Oxford United club shop, either in the store adjacent to the DW gym or from the website: www.oufcshop.co.uk.

We spoke to shop manager Lee Barton and asked him where the shop sources all the various merchandise it has on offer.

"That's really down to three individuals," Lee says. "There's me, Claire Theobald (Head of Retail) and Peter Lee (Retail Director). We have an established group of suppliers who the club would have dealt with for a period of time and they're our first point of call. We would go to them



first to see what they have on offer in terms of the product; for example, if we want to introduce a new polo shirt, if we know there's a company we deal with and who we've got a relationship with, we would go to them to see what they produce; if that isn't quite what we want, then there are plenty of other people out there.

Showcase

"In November we are going to the Sports Merchandising and Licensing Show at Stamford Bridge, which is

where every supplier to football and sports clubs up and down the country will showcase what they're going to be doing for 2017. That will be an opportunity for us to take a few ideas of things that we want to pick, but we might see things that we haven't thought of to bring in.

"In terms of other products, there's a 1980s retro shirt that we've got in; that was one of the first things that I wanted us to do because clubs all over the country do them and it's a really cool thing. For example, the Retro Day that we did for the Rochdale game: fans love all that. It's great to be able to look back on previous eras and retro shirts are a massive thing at the moment: hugely popular, both the originals and the replicas. The originals are very difficult to source and for the replicas there are maybe two or three established companies in the country. This is where an idea came up and I put it to Peter and he has a fantastic contacts book and he says 'oh well, I know the chap who runs that particular company and he's able to start that relationship'.

Influence

"Peter is a really big influence on the store here. Certainly his many years of retail experience is one of the reasons why I came back to the club to work under him to learn as much as I possibly can. And then the refitting project that we had here in the summer was another reason why."

We wonder if it's possible to know beforehand roughly what sales you can expect from particular items.

"To be perfectly honest, no! You have an idea; you know what you think these particular items will do but often it's a case of going with your gut. Retro shirts are a perfect example; I strongly felt that if we got a good design it would do well and we've had them in for less than a week and already people are talking about them and buying them. We've trialled one shirt, one design, and we've got years and years of designs to go back on with some really iconic shirts. So if this one goes well then next time we'll maybe have two or three for sale."

Unlike a Premier League outfit, which

can offer pretty much anything and guarantee that enough people will buy it, United doesn't have that luxury, as Lee explains:

"We have to be really particular about what we get; the comparison with a Premier League club is fantastic because we're shown all sorts of obscure, peculiar products and they might be able to take a punt on pretty much anything, whereas we have to be very focussed on what we bring in here; it has to be something that people want and that there's a genuine desire for.

Popular

"The flip side to that is that we also have to be able to bring in things that people don't expect, something different like maybe the gnomes that we've got in. They're not something that every club shop would stock but they've been massively popular, something quirky and a bit different and people have enjoyed being able to buy them.

"I guess we base what people want on what they have already bought and on feedback. One thing about working in this environment is that people aren't shy about telling you what they want. There's nothing that I enjoy more than being in here on a match day and if someone wants to tell me 'I think you should get that in', I want to hear it. The new system that we've got in now is fantastic and it has a query section so on more than a few occasions this season people have said 'I think the shop should stock X, Y or Z' and that's a great opportunity for people to tell us what they think we should stock."

What new products are in the pipeline over the next couple of months?

"We have the baby and infant range, which is something that is really strongly sought after and it's something that last season we maybe didn't cater for. This year we've tried very carefully to stock a wide range of bits for the younger fan and this extensive range will be coming in throughout October. I'm looking forward to those getting here.

Selection

"We're also going to have probably





the biggest-ever selection of winter coats and jackets and that sort of thing; we've stocked them in the past with maybe one or two different designs but this year we're going to have a complete range so people are going to be able to wear all sorts of different tops throughout the winter and be nice and warm."

In terms of finance, does the retail team have a budget or how do they operate?

"It's more based on the risk factor of a particular item," Lee says. "There are certain staples that you know you're going to sell but with other things, if the minimum order is say 1,000 items and it's something that maybe just a few people would buy then it's unrealistic. We look at things on an individual product basis so if we can get in some stock in to trial and it may be a risky product, then let's get it in and if it sells well then maybe next time 1,000 pieces isn't so out of the question."

Aims

And, of course, the ultimate aim of the retail operation is to make money for Oxford United FC.

"That's what this summer has all been about," Lee agrees. "That's why we closed for a month to completely redevelop in here and so far it seems to have worked. We've been able to get more people in here on a match day and to service them quicker and more efficiently and to be able to stock more to maximise what we've got, whereas although the size of the club shop hasn't changed the way we've laid things out is completely different and made a significant difference."

"This year we ordered twice as much replica kit for the club shop to try to judge demand and it sold out, which is fantastic but it is a double-edged sword because there is an interim period where we have to get more kit in, so people will be disappointed because maybe their size isn't in stock. That should be an issue only for the start of the season because during the season we should have enough kit to cater for demand."

Match Day

We have seven members of staff. On a match day we will have anything up to seven working, usually it's between three and four in the shop and Charlotte, the assistant manager, will be in for half the week to enable me to get out and about and do other stuff.

We get in at 10 o'clock on a Saturday morning and pack the shelves, making sure there's as much stock as possible out there ready for the rush. Two people will also take stock for the mobile shop for Sue Trafford to get ready.

We open the doors at 11 although the real rush starts at about 1. Sometimes the period between one o'clock and three feels like 30 seconds, it's so manic. For a big game we often have queues out the door because not everyone can fit inside and we'll hopefully have a steward inside to keep it orderly. With the new system in place we can process customers a lot quicker, which is really helpful.

Then we close the doors at three o'clock and get the shop ready for when we re-open after the final whistle. That's fairly straightforward and it means that we can get across to watch most of the game. It's a lot quieter after the game, which enables those who don't want to endure the queues to come in and buy stuff a bit more leisurely.

The revamped web site also helps in that regard. With the new sleeker site it's a lot easier to order and pay online and it does take some of the strain on a match day. It's noticeably busier if we have a good result, for example on Monday we had over 50 orders ready to process after the weekend and we can now just about guarantee a 48-hour turn around between order and delivery. We also get orders from all over the world; I've personally sent out packages to the US, Japan, New Zealand, South Africa and many other places.

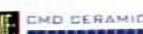

Hopefully staring with three points against our local rivals...

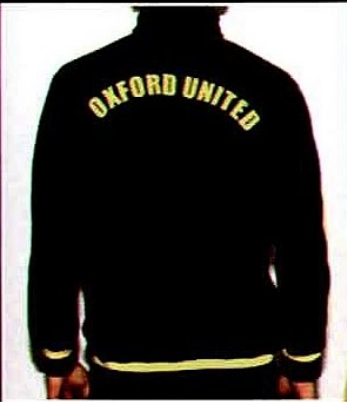
