MANAGER - DAVE FLITCROFT

DAVE FLITCROFT WAS ANNOUNCED AS SWINDON TOWN'S NEW MANAGER ON MONDAY 5 JUNE 2017, PUTTING PEN TO PAPER ON A TWO-YEAR CONTRACT WITH THE ROBINS.





MANAGERIAL CAREER

Born in Bolton, Flitcroft began his career with Preston North End in 1992 but he only made a handful of outings for the club before spending a short stint on loan with Lincoln City.

A move to Chester City took place the following year and the tough-tackling midfielder went on to play a key role in the club's promotion to Division Two.

After racking up nearly 200 appearances for Chester, Flitcroft agreed a switch to Rochdale in 1999 and it proved to be a match made in heaven with The Dale reaching the Division Two Play-Offs in 2001/02, in addition to making it all the way to the Fifth Round of the FA Cup the following season. Having clocked up over a century of games during his time at Spotland, Flitcroft went on to have short spells with Macclesfield Town, Bury and Hyde before deciding to call time on his playing career.

He opted to cut his teeth in coaching midway through the 2006/07 campaign, joining old club Rochdale as Keith Hill's Assistant. The pair formed a close working relationship and they were both snapped up by Barnsley in June 2011.

And it was at Oakwell where Flitcroft was handed his first shot at the big time after he was placed in Caretaker charge following Hill's departure during the 2012/13 season.

It did the trick too, with Flitcroft guiding his side to some impressive results on their way to securing their Championship status in dramatic circumstances, exploits that led to the former player being handed the top job on a permanent basis.

He then took over at Bury in December 2013 and again performed miracles, steering the club away from the relegation zone and to an impressive twelfth placed finish.





LAWRENCE VIGOUROUX GOALKEEPER

Lawrence Vigouroux has established himself as a key figure at Swindon and he will no doubt be looked upon to play an instrumental role in Town's bid to seek an immediate return to League One.

The firm fan favourite first arrived at The County Ground in August 2015 on a season-long loan deal from Premier League outlit Liverpool. He wasted little time in making the number one jersey his own and he finished his debut campaign in Wiltshire with 36 outings under his belt.

However, Vigouroux really came to the fore during the 2016/17 campaign, producing a string of brilliant displays to keep twelve clean sheets, despite the Reds' relegation to Sky Bet League Two.



BEN PURKISS DEFENDER

The vastly experienced defender signed for Town last month on a free transfer and will look to make the right-back spot his own next season.

Captain at Port Vale, the 33-year-old has also represented the likes of Sheffield United, York City and Walsall.



CHRIS HUSSEY DEFENDER

Signed for the Reds on a season-long loan from Sheffield United in July 2017. The attacking left-back has two promotions on his CV with Bury and The Blades and he'll be hoping to add a third during his time with Town.



CHRIS ROBERTSON DEFENDER

The experienced centre-back became Town's first signing of the summer in June and the 30-year-old can count the likes of Preston North End, Port Vale and Ross County amongst his former clubs.



OLLY LANCASHIRE DEFENDER

Once highly-rated by Southampton, the centre-back captained Rochdale to promotion from League Two in 2014/14, while he will bring a commanding presence to the Town back-line.



JAMES DUNNE MIDFIELDER

Another summer signing for Town, the toughtackling midfielder has racked up over 250 appearances and has impressed for the likes of Portsmouth and Cambridge.



LUKE NORRIS STRIKER

Luke Norris bolstered Town's attacking options in August 2016 after arriving from Gillingham for an undisclosed fee, putting pen to paper on a three-year deal at The County Ground. The powerful striker, who has previously plied his trade for Hitchin Town, Brentford, Boreham Wood, Northampton Town and Dagenham & Redbridge, opened his account for The Reds in November 2016 against Exeter City. After finishing last season with six goals to his name, Norris will be looking to improve on that tally in 2017/18 and help fire Town to promotion from Sky Bet League Two.



JOHN GODDARD MIDFIELDER

John Goddard signed for Town on a threeyear-deal in May 2016 after The Reds paid an undisclosed fee to Woking for his services. The attacking force bagged 20 goals in all competitions for Woking during the 2015/16 National League season, winning the club's Player of the Season Award and earning a move to The County Ground as a result. Despite it being his first season as a professional footballer, Goddard adapted well to life in League One last season and he opened his account for Town away at Shrewsbury in October 2016, Goddard, who has also won two caps for England C, finished the 2016/17 campaign with three goals and five assists in 48 outings, and he will be looking to go from strength to strength this season.

THE VISITORS



JAMES BROPHY MIDFIELDER

James Brophy is preparing to enter into his third season with Town after first arriving at The County Ground in the summer of 2015. After impressing during a successful trial, the flying wing-back was handed a one-year deal at The County Ground and he impressed during his debut season in professional football, earning a new deal prior to the start of the 2016/17 campaign.

Brophy, who plied his trade for Edgware Town prior to his move to Wiltshire, scored his first goal for The Reds against QPR in August 2016 and he finished last term with 33 games under his belt. Having shown his quality throughout the last two seasons, Brophy will now be looking to play a vital role in Town's bid to secure an immediate return to Sky Bet League One.



ELLIS IANDOLO STRIKER

Ellis landolo put pen to paper on a professional deal with The Reds in August 2015 following a successful trial period. Once on the books of boyhood club Gillingham, the attacker caught the eye of Town whilst plying his trade for the Soccer Elite FA Academy, paving the way for a move to Wiltshire. landolo made 13 outings during his debut season at Swindon before featuring on 15 occasions in 2016/17, scoring his first-ever goal for the club courtesy of a stunning effort from long-range against Luton Town in December 2016.

Town opted to hand the 19-year-old a new one-year deal earlier this summer and he will now be looking to play a key role in The Reds' bid to secure an immediate return to Sky Bet League One.



WILL HENRY GOALKEEPER

Highly-rated goalkeeper Will Henry will be looking to kick on this season after making real progress in 2016/17. Henry burst onto the scene in April 2016 after saving a penalty on his Town debut away at Rochdale.

Once on the books of Bristol City, the talented stopper signed a professional deal that summer and went on to make seven appearances in 2016/17, while he was also invited to an England Elite Goalkeepers Camp on more than one occasion last term. He will now be looking to impress in pre-season in order to stake a claim for the number one jersey.



TOM SMITH MIDFIELDER

Tom Smith will be looking to cement himself as a first-team regular in 2017/18 having shown his quality in his previous three seasons as a professional at The County Ground. The highly-rated midfielder was handed his first professional contract in the summer of 2014, going on to make his first-team debut away at Preston North End in 2015 before opening his account for the club with a stunning effort against Crewe Alexandra in September 2015.

Smith featured twelve times for Town last term while he spent a short spell out on loan with League of Ireland First Division outfit, Waterford, scoring once in ten outings. He will now be hoping to establish himself as a key figure in the Town midfield ahead of the 2017/18 compaign.

DID YOU KNOW?

The Robins have played at The County Ground for 121 years, having moved to the ground in 1896. There have been five different Swindon Town crests since the clubs inception, with the current design coming into effect in 2007 after a public vote.

Swindon won the 1970 Anglo-Italian Cup after defeating Napoli 3-0. They also went on to win the inaugural Anglo-Italian League Cup Winners' Cup, beating Roma 5-3 over two legs.

Shortly after moving to the County Ground the Robins changed their club colours to green and white but, following problems obtaining green dyes, they reverted to the traditional red in 1901.



AMINE LINGANZI MIDFIELDER

Town's latest signing was once regarded as a hot prospect and he will no doubt bring plenty of physicality to the Reds' engine room next season. Helped Portsmouth secure promation from League Two last season.



JORDAN YOUNG STRIKER

Having burst onto the scene midway through the 2015/16 campaign, big things are expected of Jordan Young. A product of the STFC Academy, the talented attacker was handed his Town debut against Port Vale in February 2016 - the fourth-youngest player to make their Swindon bow after Lloyd Macklin, Paul Rideout and Ernie Hunt.

Then, if that wasn't enough, Young bagged his first-ever goal in professional football

against Shrewsbury Town on the final day of the 2015/16 campaign to become The

Reds' third-youngest scorer behind Paul

Rideaut and Andy Caton. Young's fine form

earned him a three-year deal in the summer

of 2016 and, although he endured an injury

hit 2016/17 season, the stage is set for the youngster to make his mark this term.



HARRY SMITH STRIKER

Joined Town on a season-long loan deal from Championship outfit Millwall in July. Scored six goals in twelve outings for the Lions in 2016/17 in what was his first-ever season in professional football.

The towering frontman, while good in the air, is also extremely talented with the ball at his feet.



STRIKER

Fresh after making his Swindon Town debut at the tail end of last season, Scatt Twine will be hoping to make an impact in his first season as a pro footballer. Having notched over 30 goals in a stellar season for the U18's, the striker was rewarded with a first-team debut away at Charlton Athletic on the final day of the 2016/17 campaign, replacing Islam Feruz in the second-half.

Twine will now be hoping to impress throughout pre-season in order to force his way into the manager's plans for the forthcoming Sky Bet League Two campaign.



DONAL MCDERMOTT STRIKER

The former Manchester City prospect became signing number nine of the summer after putting pen to paper on a one-year deal following his departure from Rochdale. The midfielder will bring plenty of substance and style to the Town midfield.



DION CONROY DEFENDER

Dion Conroy enjoyed a fine start to life at The County Ground and he will no doubt look to establish himself as a key figure at the heart of the defence in 2017/18. The central defender signed for Town from Premier League giants Chelsea for an undisclosed fee in January 2017, putting pen to paper on a two-and-a-half-year-deal. He was chucked right in at the deep end and, despite being unable to help Town preserve their League One status, he produced many hugely encouraging displays at the heart of the defence. Good with the ball at his feet and more than capable of getting stuck in when it comes to the physical side of the game, Conroy, who has also plied his trade for Aldershot, will no doubt have a big part to play for The Reds in League Two.



WEVE MET BEFORE

CARLISLE UNITED GRABBED A VITAL WIN AGAINST PLAY-OFF CHASING SWINDON TOWN THANKS TO THEIR FOURTH CLEAN SHEET IN FIVE GAMES AND A NEAT FINISH FROM OWLS LOANEE GARY MADINE.



A bright start from the home side brought an early corner which Foderingham had to punch clear. Thirlwell popped it back to the edge of the box but a push on Stephens gave the visitors a free kick which eased the pressure.

A high ball forward found Madine with space and his chest control opened a gap for a volley. He took it as it hit the floor and it spun wide of the upright off the top of his boot.

Madine almost turned provider as United stayed on the front foot but his through ball for the late run from Berrett had just too much on it and the keeper was able to clear.

A foul on Michael Smith from Chimbonda gave the Robins their first chance of the afternoon but the outswinging set piece was an inch in front of Stephens. And the same player was invited to run forward moments later when a holf clearance fell at his feet. He let fly from distance but it was always going over the bar.

Carlisle regained the initiative and nice football left Redmond with the ball at his feet on the edge of the box. He hesitated, but Berrett followed up with a piledriver which had to be blocked. Madine rose highest to meet the corner but he couldn't keep the header down and it rose high over the bar.

A cross shot from Potts caught Swindon light at the back but Madine and Amoo were left with their heads in their hands as they left it for each other and the ball ran harmlessly away to safety.

Swindon tried to slow things down and Miles Storey tried his luck from distance when he was allowed to creep forward. It was a good connection but he couldn't keep it down.

It was a better spell for the Robins as they controlled the midfield play but it was Carlisle who almost opened the scoring when Berrett sent a lovely delivery into the box. Madine powered onto the header but Foderingham somehow stretched himself to make a fantastic save.

The lobbed clearance from the acrobatic stop found Michael Smith with grass to run onto and he had support as Cox and Kasim strode forward. The cross was teasing but O'Hanlon protected his goal as he stepped in front of the attackers.

The pace of the game slowed as both sides sat deep with the ball but United sparked life into the crowd when Chimbonda found Potts just inside the Swindon half. His forceful run took him to the byline and his cut back was perfect for Madine to control. Two touches got the ball out of the big striker's feet and he finished it off beautifully as he spun and poked a shot into the bottom corner.

United ended the half on top with Madine and O'Hanlon sending efforts wide, and Redmond had a shot blocked as the whistle blew to thundering applause from an appreciative crowd.

A free kick on the right gave Swindon the first chance after the break and Pickford had to dive across to save as Alex Smith sent it over the wall. Stephens got to the corner when it dropped at the near post but he couldn't guide his header on target.

United broke forward as they cleared their lines and Chantler put Potts on the overlap with a well timed pass. He crossed on the run but it bobbled agonisingly across the face of goal, as Foderingham fell to the floor, until Luongo swept it clear.

Swindon came right back into it as they pushed men forward and Michael Smith had a wonderful chance when he was sent clean through by Kasim. He hurried his effort and Pickford was able to make a comfortable save.

Substitute Alex Pritchard then had options left and right as the Robins kept probing and he was left to apologise for his wastefulness when he opted to shoot and left it easy for Pickford.


A run of corners followed for the Robins and former Blues loanee Troy Archibald-Henville popped a header over from close range as the pressure started to mount.

United were denied what was a clear penalty midway through the half when a dinked touch from Madine was stopped by a hand as he tried to spin away. The referee waved play on much to the disgust of the crowd.

Chances were at a premium through the closing stages and Louis Thompson showed his frustration when he shot from long range when he couldn't find a way through. Pickford was happy to see it go wide.

The Robins were restricted to shots from distance as Carlisle played on the break, but midfielder James Berrett added to the Brunton Park selection worries when he received a second yellow card deep into time added on.

But it was the result the home side deserved and the crowd showed their appreciation for what was another gritty performance when the final whistle eventually blew.

IN EACH PROGRAMME THIS SEASON WE'LL BE BRINGING YOU REGULAR UPDATES FROM THE CLUB'S BOARD OF DIRECTORS ON A WIDE RANGE OF SUBJECTS AND ISSUES.

This week Sales and Marketing Director Phil King tells us about the ongoing refurbishment work in the catering and bar facilities around the ground.

This summer has been a very busy one, with refurbishments taking place in many parts of Brunton Park.

Most of these works have been in 'fan facing' areas – with a particular focus on bars and catering areas. With the announcement of our new caterers, abm Catering, we were very keen to improve facilities – both in terms of look and functionality.

Club sponsors World Group, and Matthew Spooner in particular, have been a great assistance in renovating and expanding the catering facilities at Paddock South and behind the Warwick Road Ends

This support is in addition to the commercial partnership we have with them for the back of shirt sponsorship, which they have continued on from last season. Both of the catering units have been pretty much doubled in

size, meaning we can serve more fans at peak times before games and at half time.

This was one of the problem areas that came up most in a recent fans survey that we conducted and it was something we were aware of being an issue throughout last season.

World Group have also teamed up with other local businesses including John Heaney at EEC, Colin Carter at Yesss Electrical, Peter Tyson's, Atlas Interiors, Pioneer Foodservice, Donaldson's Furnishers and Carlisle Glass in assisting with the refurbishment of the Sunset Suite.

The changes we have put in place have made a massive difference, and there is more that we would like to do.

We want to make this a bar that fans can be proud of and want to spend some time in, before and after games and also on a non-matchday for functions such as birthday parties and christenings.

The new caterers are putting a food offer into the bar on match days

serving good quality, local food and Heineken are also going to be offering a much-requested real ale alongside their other popular brands.

We have also made improvements where we can to other areas such as the Sporting Inn and Legends Lounge – putting in new entrance doors, courtesy of World Group, and making improvements to the bar areas.

The 'old' Sponsors Lounge in the upper West Stand has also been given a facelift and rebranded to become the '1904 Lounge'.

This will be available to businesses and groups of fans to hire out on a matchday for an affordable hospitality package for 20 – 25 people – perfect for networking or celebrations. Bendles Solicitors have already booked out the lounge for a number of games this season, and it is fantastic to see them supporting the Club once again.

Catering and bar areas are a large part of the matchday experience, and this is something I have said a few times that we are committed to improving. The works we have done through the summer have gone a long way towards this, but there are still areas we would like to progress further. The Club plans to introduce a more permanent 'fan zone' area and this is something that we will develop into the season and build on going forwards.

The new operators, abm Catering, are committed to providing a quality service in all areas of the ground and fans will see the results of this.

We have provided the results of the fans survey to the caterers, and they have listened to what has been said both good and bad.

They will also engage with fans going forward, through the Carlisle United Supporters Group forum meetings we have and other ways, and act on feedback and ideas.

We conducted a very thorough process across the last 6 months to look at all options available to the Club in terms of catering – including the potential of bringing the operation 'in-house'.

I am very satisfied that we have chosen the best option for the Club and that all concerned will see the benefits of that.



ACADEMY MANAGER DARREN EDMONDSON GAVE US A PRE-SEASON UPDATE FROM THE UNDER-18 SET-UP AS THE LADS PREPARE TO KICK OFF THEIR SEASON THIS WEEKEND.

"You find in pre-season that the lads start to get a bit more match fitness into their boots as the days go by and their minds get sharper along with that," he said. "That's when you see them play more of their football and that's why it has been encouraging for us.

"The last few weeks have been big weeks for the lads because they've worked very hard and they've had games to play in amongst that. We needed to look after them as well as keep them at it because the season is upon them and we want them to be at their best.

"We're keeping them all as fresh as we can and they're responding very well. At the moment they're starting to click defensively and when you play the better teams in pre-season – the likes of Celtic, Derby, Newcastle and Blackburn – you expect that potentially you're going to lose all of those games.

"What we learned last summer was that you can lose those games but you can still learn from it. It's always a good thing to learn from your weaknesses and, if you do that, you tend to find that you'll grow and develop from it. Hopefully come the start of the season we'll have ironed a few issues out and we can get cracking again."

Key to the progression of the squad from their summer foundation is the integration of the first years and the attitude shown by the second years as they face a tough season on and off the pitch.

"The first years are integrating well," he confirmed. "Most of them have got some decent minutes under their belts and we've tried to give everybody at least 45 minutes in each of the games we played.

"The good thing we got from last season was that so many of the lads who are now first years got to play in our games because of the injury problems we had. That gave them a lot of unexpected but very valuable experience.

"Likewise the lads who are now second years got more pitch time as well, so it puts the squad in a very good place. We'll see what that means for us once we get into the nitty gritty of the season.


"As we always know it's a big year for the second years because they have to complete their education, play their football and deal with the mental side of wondering whether or not they'll be offered a contract. We tried to help the lads with that last year but it does come down to individuals and how they find ways to cope and get through.

"Part of being involved in football is learning to be mentally strong and how to see yourself through the ups and downs you go through on and off the pitch. Hopefully that experience we've spoken about from both age groups will help to see them all through."

And on being back in football action, he said: "It's great to get back on the field because the closed season does seem to take a long time to get through. Before you know it you're into the first game of the season and that's why it's good to have someone like Gav Skelton beside me.

"His arrival has given us a real lift because he's such a positive character. The lads have taken well to him and they're really excited about the work he's got them doing. We work well together but I think a lot of that is because we've done it before.

"I know when it's time to shut up, because he's going to start speaking, and vice versa. We're putting our own stamp on one or two things and for someone who is quite young he comes with a lot of experience in management. That can only be a plus for us all."

WE TAKE A LOOK AT THE LATEST GOINGS-ON IN SKY BET LEAGUE TWO TO KEEP YOU INFORMED ON WHAT'S HAPPENING AROUND THE LEAGUE.



STEVENAGE HAVE LAUNCHED AN AMBITIOUS NEW PROJECT TO ENCOURAGE FANS TO HELP RAISE **FUNDS TO CONSTRUCT A NEW NORTH STAND AT** THE LAMEX STADIUM.

The stand has been in the pipeline for six years, and it is now hoped it will be constructed in time for the 2018/19 season. The Boro have planning permission in place for the new stand and have received a £450,000 grant from the Football Foundation but, with the total cost of construction estimated to be £950,000, the club are offering fans the chance to help raise the rest of the money required. Supporters are able to contribute via a 'mini-bond' which will earn them interest on a six-month basis.

A minimum contribution of £500 has been set, with a maximum of £25,000, and the money will be paid back over a five-year period. Stevenage manager Darren Sarll said: "When you drive past the ground on the North Stand side you kind of get a snippet of us in non-league. We have to embed this as a Football League club. The North Stand is the last part. This really is about us as a town, us as a football club, supporters and everyone involved with the club standing shoulder to shoulder and moving forward in the next decade."

The Hertfordshire side have also been in the news after three graduates of the Jamie Vardy V9 Academy earned contracts in the Football League. After a £100,000 investment from the Leicester City striker, 42 non-league players were invited to Manchester City's training complex for a week's worth of training with the aim of impressing scouts from over 60 professional clubs. Three players have gone on to earn deals at League Two clubs, with Stevenage snapping up Tamworth's Danny Newton and Bromley's Blair Turgott after both impressed at their respective clubs last season.

The third player is Lamar Reynolds, who penned a deal at Newport County after impressing during the Exiles' pre-season campaign. The striker netted 27 goals in 36 appearances for Isthmian League Division One North side Brentwood Town last season and caught the eye of the Exiles' scouts. After agreeing to move to Rodney Parade, he said: "I like to get goals. I just want to quickly make an impact and show that there's talent in the non-league which is where I came from, that's the main target for me. "I am confident I can score as many goals as last season. That's the main target anyway. Fingers crossed and, as long as I work hard, I'll definitely be able to get it."



ELSEWHERE, NOTTS COUNTY OWNER ALAN HARDY HAS COMPLETED HIS PURCHASE OF ILKESTON TOWN FC FOR AN UNDISCLOSED FEE.

Hardy took over at Meadow Lane in January and also owns several successful companies in the local area. Ilkeston Town were wound-up in 2010 when still a Conference North club after owing HM Revenue and Customs £50,000. A new club, Ilkeston FC. formed in its place but suffered financial difficulties towards the end of last season and were then wound-up.

Hardy stepped in to revive the club, however, and has reverted to their previous name of Ilkeston Town. He has acted swiftly and appointed former Nottingham Forest defender Steve Chettle as manager after he departed National League North side Nuneaton.

Speaking after taking over, Hardy said: "Having grown up in neighbouring Eastwood, I simply couldn't allow one of the East Midlands' finest non-league clubs' existence to cease when I knew there was a viable method for me to take it forward.



Experienced midfielder Bostwick joined the newly-promoted side having being placed on the transfer list by the Posh at the end of last season. Winger Anderson, meanwhile, spent last season on loan with the Imps and now joins on a three-year deal.

On the deals, Cowley said: "Very infrequently I am surprised by football. But I have to admit that to acquire the signature of Michael Bostwick was beyond my wildest expectations for our football club. To be able to bring in a top League One player who won various individual awards at Peterborough last year represents outstanding business on our part."

He netted 16 times for the Grecians in 2016/17 and Brentford bass Dean Smith was pleased to capture his signature, saying: "Ollie is a player with an awful lot of potential. He showed last season what great talent he has and he has developed into a goalscorer. There is more development to come and we believe we can bring that out of him."

Ampadu, meanwhile, has agreed to join Premier League champions Chelsea after an impressive breakthrough season which saw the youngster become a regular in the Grecians' side. His transfer is still being negotiated as the two sides attempt to agree a fee without the need for a tribunal.

Exeter chairman Julian Tagg said: "We are delighted for Ethan and we wish him all the best for the future. Chelsea have behaved impeccably throughout the lead up to this point and therefore we are hoping through these negotiations we will avoid the need for a tribunal. However, we — like any other club — will reserve our right to do that should we need to."

KITS TO AFRICA



CARLISLE UNITED HAVE HELPED TO PUT SMILES ON THE FACES OF SOME WONDERFUL CHILDREN IN TANZANIA THIS SUMMER THANKS TO OUR CLOSE LINKS WITH HIGH HESKET CE SCHOOL.

Mrawi Primary School is situated on the slopes of Mount Kilimanjaro in Tanzania and the pupils have had links with High Hesket since 2002, with letters and gifted donations towards school supplies sent each Christmas by the Cumbrian gang.

The Mrawi school has 452 pupils and seven teaching staff compared to High Hesket CE School who currently have 193 pupils on roll and 12 teaching staff, plus additional support staff. The schools both serve local farming communities and lie within proximity to a city and mountainous regions.

As background to this latest fantastic and well received donation – in conjunction with Carlisle United – the staff and pupils at High Hesket sent us the following summary of their activities. In early 2015 Jen Ager, the teacher who coordinates the international and global work at High Hesket CE School, managed to retrieve a mobile telephone number for the headteacher at Mrawi Primary School, Mrs Imelda Minde, from a local charity.

Wanting to make a more meaningful link, and strengthen the relationship between the two schools, she rang Tanzania from Cumbria to introduce herself and discuss the prospect of

sharing some teaching ideas and possibly a collaborative teaching project. After numerous attempts, and despite the language barrier, the schools made contact and introductions were made.

The children at High Hesket School made contact, via post, and were replied to individually by 10-14-year olds from Mrawi Primary School. Questions relating to the local area, economy, popular culture and personal hobbies were shared. Chiara Mordain, the Year 6 president of the schools Fairtrade Committee, said: "We loved getting the letters from Mrawi – it made the children there real."

Later that year, after securing a grant from The British Councils Connecting Classrooms Programme, Margaret and Jen visited the school in Tanzania for the first time. Armed with well-packed luggage including school supplies, sports equipment and more correspondence from the children, they made the journey to Mount Kilimanjaro airport.

Jen Ager said: "The majority of correspondence to organise the trip had been conducted via sporadic text messages and the postal system. Mrawi Primary School can only collect their

post when the headteacher makes a trip down from the school into Moshi – so this system wasn't the quickest or the most reliable." After spending four days teaching at the school and meeting all the children, staff and members of the local community, a growing friendship, respect and desire to make the most of the link emerged for both parties.

The school in Tanzania made the Cumbrian teachers incredibly welcome, and despite their desperate need for some basic teaching and learning supplies and school building work, there were many similarities emerging between the schools alongside the obvious vast differences.

Two months after the trip, two teachers from Mrawi Primary School travelled to Cumbria for a reciprocal week in High Hesket, being hosted by Margaret at her home. The Tanzanian teachers, Imelda Minde and Fraternus Mushi, taught lessons to the High Hesket school children and visited other local primary schools.

"It was wonderful to see the interactions between the children and the staff and the questions that the children asked showed real curiosity, critical thinking and awareness of global development," Jen told us.

"It allowed the children to recognise the similarities and differences between the two cultures. The experience of meeting the teachers face-to-face transformed an abstract concept into concrete experience for the children and they were incredibly welcoming towards our visitors."

The use of social media has enabled the two schools to maintain communication – again on a sporadic basis. With the support of High Hesket CE School's community, building work has been undertaken at Mrawi School to replace much needed roof panels and toilet facilities. Photographs, videos and lessons used during both visits have enhanced the children's understanding of a different culture and given meaning to a place and a name for a lot of High Hesket pupils.

James Kidd, a Year 5 pupil and a member of the Fairtrade Committee, said: "Meeting the teachers from Tanzania was really interesting because we got to see how teachers from other countries give their lessons."

And this is where Carlisle United stepped in to help deepen the bond yet further with a donation of football strips and training kit for the children to use.

Finance Director Suzanne Kidd said:
"We send kits to Africa every year but
our usual route of achieving this wasn't
available to us this year.

"We've had links with High Hesket for a number of years, with regular visits by players and a school takeover with Keith Curle as headmaster just some of the projects we've done together, so we all saw this as a fantastic apportunity. "We are extremely proud to have been able to support a local school and to help to make a real difference to children in another part of the world."

With the help of a parent from High Hesket, a donation was made by CHOC to pay for the transportation of the kit out to Tanzania. The kit was used to dress the school sports teams and the waterproof jackets were handed out to use in the rainy seasons for those children and staff who had no waterproof clothing.

It wasn't long before photographs were sent from Charles, another teacher at the school, of an incredibly proud netball and football team wearing the donated sports club. The children of Mrawi were ecstatic to receive a huge bag from their Cumbrian friends of sporting kit showing Carlisle United's name and kit worn by real football players.

The kit is symbolic of coming from a place with meaning for the children of Mrawi, from people who care and will be incredibly well used. The story has helped join not only the children from two schools but also the extended communities involving staff, parents and local charities.

Margaret Taylor from High Hesket said: "We hope to visit again in the near future. There is more practical work to be undertaken in terms of organising structural developments to provide a functional kitchen, paint the school building and repair toilet facilities severely damaged by heavy rainfall."

Whilst in Tanzania Margaret and Jen met the local minister of education who confirmed how the school was one of the poorest in the region. Similar size schools in the same region have access to electricity, a kitchen and sanitary toilet facilities. As a result of the school link the teachers and children at High Hesket School have a further understanding of a different culture that is now embedded into the curriculum.

"With the involvement of our local community it is wanderful to hear stories being told and links being made with our friends in Tanzania," Margaret continued.

"In today's rapidly growing global world it is important that our children are made aware of the stories of other communities and developments in worlds beyond their own doorstep.

"We are very proud of our school link and the involvement of our children. We hope the relationship will continue to grow based upon the mutual respect both school communities have for each other."





CARLISLE UNITED IN 1992/93 MITH DAVID STEELE

HAVING FINISHED BOTTOM OF THE FOURTH DIVISION AT THE END OF THE 1991-92 SEASON, CARLISLE UNITED SECURED AN UNWANTED PLACE IN HISTORY AS THE LAST TEAM TO FINISH BOTTOM OF THE OLD FOOTBALL LEAGUE.

At least there was no prospect of dropping into the Conference. Automatic relegation had been put on hold for two seasons as the League planned to expand from 92 to 94 clubs. That included the 22 First Division teams who would now become the FA Premier League.

The expansion plan was in any case soon to be abandoned. For financial reasons, Aldershot dropped out of the Football League in April 1992 and Maidstone United would similarly fail to start the 1992-93 season to leave total league membership remaining at 92. With automatic relegation returning for the 1992-93 campaign, it was clear that unless there was a change of fortune, Carlisle United could easily find themselves heading for the Conference.

This fact was, no doubt, of little comfort to United bass Aiden McCaffery as he contemplated the close season. Veteran defender Mike Graham was the most prominent of those players given a free transfer. He later turned out for Netherfield. Also released were a number of fringe first teamers including Lee Armstrong, Nicky Cranston and Jason Priestly. However, before the manager could contemplate any team strengthening, life at Carlisle United was about to change.

In mid May it was announced that Michael Knighton had taken over Carlisle United and that he would be the new chairman and chief executive. Born in Derbyshire in October 1951, Michael Knighton had been a youth player at Coventry City before injury ended his career. After training as a PE teacher at Durham, he taught and then took over a private school in Huddersfield. He later branched into property development before almost buying Manchester United for £10m in 1989. It would have been a remarkable deal had it come off but he remained on the Old Trafford board for some time afterwards.

It was certainly a challenge to take over at a club that had finished bottom of the league and with only seven contracted professionals, especially when contrasted with life at Old Trafford. Early July saw a series of open trials take place at Brunton Park and as a result a number of players were signed in time for the start of the new campaign in mid August.

George Oghani was the most experienced of the new signings, a veteran of over 200 league games with, primarily, Bolton, Burnley and Scarborough and a proven goalscorer. Full back Neil Williams also had over 200 league games under his belt with Hull City and then Preston North End. Midfielder Simon Davey was only 22 but had played some 50 times for Swansea, his hometown club.

Riccardo Gabbiadini in contrast had made a total of 34 league appearances as a forward but for no fewer than eight different clubs which may well be some sort of record? Central defender Ian Knight had been an England U21 international and had featured with Sheffield W and Grimsby while winger Ian Arnold arrived from Middlesbrough.

Pre season results were encouraging. The highlight was a 3-2 win over Sunderland with Oghani, Andy Watson and Andy Barnsley all on the scoresheet. Trips to Crook Town and Barrow resulted in 7-1 and 2-0 wins respectively. The season proper began with a home game against Walsall. An encouraging crowd of 4,199 saw Oghani open the scoring after two minutes. Unfortunately it was an own goal and though he soon made amends at the right end, United lost 3-4 with the luckless lan Knight making his only United appearance.

Better news came in mid week with a 4-1 victory over newly promoted Burnley in the League Cup with two goals from Gabbiadini. The following week a 1-1 draw at Turf Moor put the Blues into the second round. United's reward was a home tie with Norwich City of the newly constituted Premier League. The game at Brunton Park pulled in a season's best gate of 10,328 and resulted in a 2-2 draw. The Canaries won the replay 2-0 but considering they were to finish third in that inaugural Premier League season, this was no bad result for the Blues.

Results in Division Three were more mixed. September began with a 5-1 win over Bury, United's best win for over seven years. As a result a season's best league crowd of 5.357 turned up for the visit of York City only for the Blues to slump 2-1. Four days after the heroic draw against Norwich another home defeat at the hands of Scunthorpe saw Aiden McCaffery dismissed as manager.

His successor was David McCreery who was given the title of head coach. The passessor of 67 Northern Ireland caps, he had also enjoyed a long playing career with Manchester United, QPR, Newcastle, Hearts and latterly Hartlepool where had been player/coach. His first match in charge saw a 1-1 draw with Halifax and featured Tony Caig making his league debut in place of Kelham O'Hanlon who was ill.

The Blues were just out of the bottom four when the new boss took over but after a slow start, November saw three consecutive wins. It was enough to push the Blues up to twelfth in the table and earned David McCreery the November Manager of the Month award.

Unfortunately, November also saw
United knocked out of the FA Cup at the
first hurdle. It was the third time in four
seasons they had lost to Wigan. Nor did
United last long in the Autoglass Trophy.
Scarborough defeated the Blues 4-0 and a
2-0 victory over Hartlepool was not enough
to keep Carlisle in the competition. The
Harrtlepool game attracted a crowd of just
859, the lowest ever at Brunton Park for a
competitive fixture.




Twelfth place was as good as it got for the Blues that season. By now McCreery himself was playing fairly regularly in midfield as was lan Amold out on the wing. The selection of an unchanged team was a rare event as a succession of loan and short term signings also came and went including defenders Steve Holden Tony Gallimore and Dave Burgess and forwards Warren Hawke and Winston White. For White, who had just spent a month at Doncaster, Carlisle United was the twelfth league club of his career.

The second half of the campaign was relatively quiet. The Blues remained below halfway in the table though they were never in danger of relegation as they ended the season fifth from bottom while the Knighton effect had contributed to a 40% rise in home gates. The worst playing experience was a 6-0 drubbing at Bury with all six goals coming before half time. Yet in typical fashion United won their next three games without even conceding a goal.

The last twelve fixtures saw just one win but this again was an unexpected 3-2 victory at high flying Shrewsbury, the goals coming from top scorer George Oghani (2) and one from Simon Davey. The last match was a 2-2 draw at Scarborough. Tony Hopper started the game to become United's youngest ever player only to lose his record when Rory Delap, aged 16 years and 306 days, came on during the second half.

Once again the reserves competed in the Midland Senior League. Despite its name, United's opponents were all reserve sides from elsewhere in the north e.g. Tranmere, Stockport, Darlington, Halifax etc along with Wrexham. The second string held their own in both the league and league cup competitions. The reserves also clinched the Cumberland Cup defeating Gretna 3-1 after the first meeting had ended goalless. Along the way, the Blues defeated village side Langwathby by the astanishing margin of 20-0.



THOSE PRE-SEASON SUMMERS JUST GET SHORTER AND SHORTER DON'T THEY, WITH THIS ONE BEING SQUASHED DOWN EVEN MORE THANKS TO THE 2018 WORLD CUP COMING UP ON THE HORIZON AND OUR EFFORTS IN REACHING THE LEAGUE TWO PLAY-OFF SEMI-FINALS IN MAY.

In fact it was only 42 days between that heart-breaking defeat at Exeter and the players returning for their first day back at school on the 29 June. It must have seemed like even less than that for the staff at Brunton Park too with the Olly Murs and UB40 concerts to sort out.

With our first pre-season match being a 4-0 win at Carlisle City on the 8 July, it meant there were only really just over seven weeks between Blues matches for those who massively miss their United fix. It's back to the real stuff today though, no doubt in the rain, as we take on a Swindon Town side who are back at this level after five campaigns in League One, the Robins having won the title in the 2011-12 season when they were last competing in fourth fier football.

Somewhat understandably then, Swindon are one of the favourites with the bookies for an instant return to League One and are currently priced at around the 3/1 mark for promotion. Leading the pack in that market though are Mansfield Town, who were certainly splashing the wage bill cash early in the summer, with the Stags chalked up as low at evens in some places, that compared to Carlisle being at 7/2 or 4/1, and being a similar price to which United ended up at an the opening day of last season after being well backed down in the market.

I know a few lads who were doubly disappointed in January when Charlie Wyke left to join Bradford City as they had backed him each way at 20/1 or higher for the League Two top goalscorer.

Shoun Miller is sitting at that price at the moment with one firm, but it's no surprise at all to see that the top three players in the market at the time of writing are the Luton strike pair of James Collins and Danny Hylton, alongside Bornet's John Akinde. That Hatters duo of Collins and Hylton surely giving the Kenilworth Road outfit a very good chance of automatic promotion this time around after they lost to eventual winners Blackpool in the play-offs last season.

It's not always about what happens at the top of the table though, as often a relegation battle can be exciting as well, as long as you're not involved in it of course. Morecambe seem to be the favourites to go dawn, alongside Cheltenham, Crawley, Newport and Yeovil, although given that those five sides finished in the places directly above Hartlepool and Leyton Orient last season it suggests that not a vast amount of effort has gone into pricing up that market.

Away from our league though it's the Conference North for me that is going to be a real cracker of a division with Boston, Chorley, Darlington, FC United of Manchester, Kidderminster, Salford, Stockport and York making it a real big hitters league in the 2017-18 campaign, while definitely in the case of the latter two sides it also shows you just how far down the pyramid you can get if you're not careful.



Of all those clubs it's been Salford City chucking money at it this summer thanks to their Manchester United owner connections and a couple of years of good cup runs, former Carlisle players Max Cracambe and Danny Livesey being just two men in a strong squad.

As usual though the game is never played on a bookmakers board, as Leicester City showed a couple of years ago, even though they are back out to 400/1 in a place for the Premier League title this season. Better than that Huddersfield mind you who are 3000/1 to win it and already odds on 4/5 to be relegated. At least it is still some kind of competitive market though, fancy a bet on the Scottish Premiership? Well, if you do then Celtic are a juicy 1/20 on with a few firms, so good luck.






